**GAME #6** — UCLA (4-1, 3-0 and in first place in Pac-10 play and ranked No. 25 on the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll) returns home this week to host Notre Dame (0-5) in the final nonconference tilt of the season. Kickoff is slated for 5:00 p.m. PDT and the game will be televised by ABC with Dan Fouts, Tim Brant and Todd Harris calling the action. AM 570 (KLAC) and the Bruin Radio Network (Chris Roberts, Matt Stevens and Wayne Cook) broadcasts all of the Bruin games. Sirius satellite radio will air the game on channel 126.

**SERIES WITH NOTRE DAME** — The Bruins are 0-3 in the all-time series with the Irish, which dates back to 1963, with all three previous meetings taking place in South Bend. Notre Dame is making just its second visit ever to the Rose Bowl. The Irish last played in Pasadena in the Jan. 1, 1925 Rose Bowl game. Notre Dame's victory over Stanford that day earned the Irish and coach Knute Rockne the school's first-ever national championship.

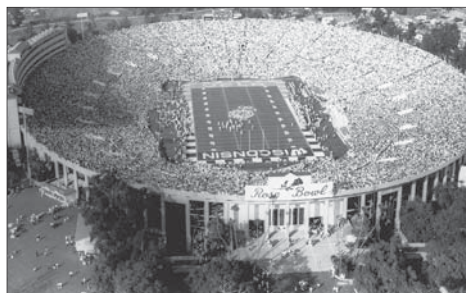
A year ago the Irish used some late minute heroics to post a 20-17 win. Notre Dame moved 80 yards in three plays on its game winning drive, scoring on a 45-yard pass from Brady Quinn to Jeff Samardzija with 27 seconds left to play. The Bruins led 14-10 at the half thanks to a pair of Patrick Cowan scoring passes. The first covered 54 yards to Marcus Everett and the second was a 36-yard play to William Snead. The Bruin entered the fourth quarter with a 14-13 lead and went up 17-13 on a Justin Medlock field goal with 7:19 to play. Cowan completed 16 of 30 passes on the day for 217 yards and one interception.

The Irish won 27-12 in 1963 and 24-0 in 1964, both games being played in South Bend. In the 1963 contest, Notre Dame outgained the Bruins 282 to 72 on the ground. The Irish led 14-6 at the half and went on to post a 27-12 win. UCLA's Mel Profit caught seven passes on the day for 104 yards and also played well at end on defense. Quarterbacks Larry Zeno and Mike Haffner each threw a scoring pass for the Bruins.

In the Oct. 17, 1964 clash, Notre Dame's California connection of quarterback John Huarte (Anaheim) and receiver Jack Snow (Long Beach) helped blank the Bruins 24-0. Huarte threw for 209 yards and two touchdowns for the then fourth-ranked Irish. Snow caught six passes for 124 yards and a score. Both players would go on to finish in the top five of the voting for the 1964 Heisman Trophy, which was won by Huarte. UCLA, which totaled 66 yards on the ground, managed to pass midfield only twice in the game, once in each half, but was unable to score. Quarterback Larry Zeno threw for 168 yards.

## THE 26TH YEAR

The 2007 season marks the 26th year that the Rose Bowl has served as the home of the Bruins. UCLA moved from the L.A. Coliseum in the summer of 1982 and went 6-0-1 in that first year, capping the season with a victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl game.

The 2006 season-opening win against Utah was UCLA's 100th at the Rose Bowl. The Bruins own a record of 107-44-2 since moving to Pasadena, including a 3-2 record in Rose Bowl games. UCLA is 22-5 overall at home under head coach Karl Dorrell and 14-1 in the last two-plus seasons.

In July of 2007, the Rose Bowl was selected the No. 1 sports venue by SI.com/SlonCampus.

Free shuttle buses are available at the Parsons Engineering parking lot in downtown Pasadena (Walnut and Fair Oaks). There is a \$9.00 charge for parking at the Parsons Lot. Shuttle service begins four hours prior to kickoff and runs up to one hour after the game.

The Metro Gold Line will run from downtown Los Angeles (and points further) to downtown Pasadena (approx. one block from the Parsons Lot) on game days. Gold Line patrons are encouraged to use the free shuttle from the Parsons lot to and from the Rose Bowl.

It also includes the Food Zone, which includes the following restaurants: American Pretzel, Baja Grill, Carl's Jr., Funnell Cakes Etc, Now You're Poppin', PSI Drinks, Robin's Wood Fire BBQ & Grill, Ralph's Grocery Company, South Street and Teri & Yaki. The Alumni Band will also be performing in the Fan Zone.

selection in four straight seasons. He was UCLA's second three-time consensus All-American. Easley remains UCLA's all-time interception leader, with 19, and is fourth on the career tackle list (374). He finished ninth in the 1980 voting for the Heisman Trophy. Easley was a first-round pick of the Seattle Seahawks in the 1981 NFL draft. He has been inducted into the National Football Foundation and UCLA Hall of Fames.

**2007 SEASON SCHEDULE** — There are six home games and six road matchups on the 2007 schedule. The Bruins play back-to-back home games on two occasions --- Oct. 6 vs. Notre Dame and (bye week in between) Oct. 20 vs. California (homecoming); and Nov. 10 vs. Arizona State and Nov. 24, following a bye week, vs. Oregon. UCLA will play back-to-back road contests once this season, on Oct. 27 at Washington State and on Nov. 3 at Arizona. The Bruins posted a 6-5 record against teams it played in the 2006 season and will meet again in 2007.

The Bruins will square off against five opponents who won at least 10 games in the 2006 season (BYU 11-2, USC 11-2, Notre Dame 10-3, California 10-3, Oregon State 10-4). Overall, UCLA will meet 10 opponents which won at least six contests last season (above teams, plus Utah 8-5, Arizona State 7-6, Oregon 7-6, Arizona 6-6, Washington State 6-6). Three opponents earned at least a share of a conference title (BYU - Mountain West champion; USC and California were co-champions of the Pac-10). The combined 2006 records of the teams that UCLA will play this season are 92-61 (.601). The teams UCLA will meet on the road this season posted a record of 42-34 (.553) last year. The combined record of the teams that the Bruins will host in the Rose Bowl this season was 50-27 (.649). The combined record of the three nonconference opponents UCLA will meet in 2007 was 29-10 (.744) last season (BYU 11-2, Notre Dame 10-3, Utah 8-5).

**LAST GAME** -- UCLA rallied from a 14-0 first quarter deficit, exploding for 28 fourth-quarter points en route to a 40-14 victory over Oregon State in Corvallis.

UCLA fumbled on its first two offensive plays and Oregon State returned the second for a touchdown and a 7-0 lead. The Beavers' lone offensive TD of the day with 18 seconds remaining in the first quarter gave them a 14-0 lead and they still led 14-6 at halftime.

UCLA created a break in the third quarter when Reggie Carter forced a fumble and Christian Taylor recovered it at the OSU five-yard line. Kahlil Bell

scored on a one-yard run but UCLA still trailed 14-12 when its two-point attempt failed.

In the fourth quarter, still trailing 14-12, Ben Olson found Brandon Breazell on an inside screen and the speedy receiver slipped one tackle and sped up the middle for a 69-yard touchdown and UCLA's first lead of the day, 19-14 with 9:12 remaining in the game. OSU fumbled the ensuing kickoff, Matthew Slater recovered it at the 21-yard line and three Bell runs later, the final one from four yards, the Bruins led 26-14.

On the next kickoff, John Hale forced a fumble and Rodney Van recovered it at the 39-yard line. On third and 13 from the 30-yard line, Olson and Breazell hooked up for their second touchdown of the day. Oregon State had a punt blocked by Corey Bosworth on its next possession and five plays later, Chris Markey scored UCLA's fourth touchdown of the fourth quarter.

Defensively, UCLA allowed just 248 yards and one touchdown. In the final three quarters, UCLA allowed just 101 yards and six first downs. The Beavers gained more than seven yards (not more than 20) on just three of their final 12 offensive possessions.

Kyle Bosworth and Trey Brown led the team with eight tackles each. Brown also made two key interceptions and Bosworth had a tackle for loss. Dennis Keyes and Alterraun Verner each had seven tackles and Chris Horton added six stops. Reggie Carter had five tackles, a sack and a forced fumble while Rodney Van and Christian Taylor each had four stops. Van had a sack and a fumble recovery and Taylor also recovered a fumble.

Offensively, UCLA started slow but finished with 353 yards, including 156 and four scores in the fourth quarter. UCLA finished with 133 net yards rushing against a defense that had allowed just 118 net yards in the first four games.

Ben Olson completed 14 of 25 passes for 220 yards with two touchdowns (69 and 30 yards) and one interception. Kahlil Bell led the team in rushing (80 yards and two touchdowns) and receiving (four for 49). Joe Cowan made three receptions and Brandon Breazell had two for 99 yards and two touchdowns (69 and 30 yards). Chris Markey added 58 yards on the ground. Kai Forbath made two second-quarter field goals (37 and 28 yards) and converted all four PAT attempts.

### UCLA PLAYER / COACH NOTES —

Redshirt senior **BRUCE DAVIS** is the **nation's leading returning** sack specialist, based on his sacks in the 2006 season. He ranked fourth (tied) in the NCAA and tied for first in the Pac-10 in sacks (12.5 - 0.96 ave.) and 18th nationally and second in the Pac-10 in tackles for losses (1.35 ave.).

He now has 20.5 career sacks to rank eighth in school history. This season he has 3.5 sacks, 4.5 tackles for loss, a fumble caused and a fumble recovery. He tied his career-best with seven tackles against BYU.

Senior running back **CHRIS MARKEY** became **just the fifth player in school history to rush for at least 190 yards in a game twice in a career after his 193-yard effort versus Washington**. He **ranks sixth in UCLA history in career all-purpose yardage with 3,882 yards, 11th in career rushing with 2,422 yards and first among running backs with 65 career receptions**.

## THE HEAD COACH



### Karl Dorrell 5th Season

The 2005 Pac-10 co-Coach of the Year, Karl Dorrell is his fifth season as UCLA's head coach. His record is 33-22 overall, 22-14 in Pac-10 play. **Dorrell is 21-9 in the last two-plus seasons**. He is the 15th head coach in UCLA history. Dorrell has led the Bruins to a bowl game in each of his four seasons as head coach.

In 2005, the Bruins compiled a record of 10-2 and finished the season with a victory in the Sun Bowl. They won their first eight games of the year and were ranked as high as No. 5 by the BCS and No. 7 on the Associated Press poll. A Bruin team won at least 10 games for only the seventh time in school history. Dorrell was a finalist for several national Coach of the Year awards.

Dorrell returned home to Westwood, where he played on teams that won five consecutive bowl games, after serving as an assistant coach at both the collegiate and professional levels. He is the first UCLA coach to go to bowls in each of his first four seasons.

He came to UCLA after working the previous three seasons for Mike Shanahan's Denver Broncos as an assistant coach in charge of wide receivers. Prior to his arrival in Denver, Dorrell coached 12 years on the collegiate level, including seven seasons as an offensive coordinator.

During his career as a collegiate player and coach, Dorrell has participated in 16 bowl games, including three Rose Bowls, two Fiesta Bowls, two Cotton Bowls and this season's Emerald Bowl. He played on teams that won three Pacific-10 titles and defeated USC four times in five seasons. His 108 receptions still rank No. 11 (tied) on UCLA's career list and his total of 1,517 receiving yards rank No. 15.

Dorrell's previous collegiate coaching experience includes six seasons at Colorado, two years at Northern Arizona, and one year each at UCLA, Washington, Arizona State and Central Florida.

He earned his bachelor's degree from UCLA following the 1986 season and began his coaching career in the 1988 season as a Bruin graduate assistant.

He became receivers coach at Central Florida the next season and moved on to Northern Arizona for the 1990 and 1991 seasons as offensive coordinator and receivers coach. He then embarked on the first of two stints at Colorado. Dorrell served as receivers coach in the 1992-93 seasons. During that tenure, receivers Charles Johnson and Michael Westbrook, became just the fourth pair of wideouts on the same team in NCAA history to accumulate more than 1,000 yards in the same season.

Dorrell returned to the Pac-10 for the 1994 season as receivers coach at Arizona State before going back to Colorado for the 1995-98 campaigns as offensive coordinator and receivers coach. The Buffaloes won three bowl games in that four-year span and were victorious in 33 of 47 games. He spent the 1999 season at Washington, serving as offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach.

The former Bruin then moved to the professional ranks and served as receiving coach with the Broncos from 2000 until the time he took the UCLA job on December 18, 2002.

Redshirt senior safety **CHRIS HORTON** was the Bruins' **leading tackler in 2006** with 95 and was second on the team with three interceptions. He had a career-high 12 stops versus Arizona State (Nov. 18) to earn Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week honors. This season he is **second (tied) on the squad with 31 stops**.

Redshirt junior quarterback **BEN OLSON's** five touchdown passes versus Stanford is tied for second on UCLA's single-game list, one shy of Drew Olson's mark of six, set against Oregon State in 2005.

Redshirt freshman **KAI FORBATH's** 52-yard field goal at Utah is the longest ever by a Bruin freshman and tied for fourth on the all-time list.

True junior tailback **KAHLIL BELL** rushed for 195 yards in the opener versus Stanford. That is the highest total by a Bruin in an opener. He also went over the 100 yard mark with 109 yards versus Washington. Bell is **third in the Pac-10 with an average of 104.4 yards per game**.

When **CHRIS MARKEY (193)** and **KAHLIL BELL (109)** both rushed for over 100 yards against Washington, it was the first time a pair of Bruins broke the century mark since the same pair did it against Rice in the second game of the 2006 season.

**MATTHEW SLATER's** 85-yard kickoff return for a touchdown versus Washington was UCLA's first since Brandon Breazell returned two for touchdowns in the 2005 Sun Bowl. In addition, he also had four tackles in the contest and was named the Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week.

**MATTHEW SLATER's** 85-yard kickoff return for a touchdown versus Washington was UCLA's first at the Rose Bowl since moving to the facility in 1982.

Redshirt senior cornerback **TREY BROWN** is now the player with the most consecutive starts (**35**). True senior **SHANNON TEVAGA** had his games started streak snapped at **34 straight** games when he sat out the Washington game with a knee injury. Others with starting streaks of note include OL Noah Sutherland (20), OL Chris Joseph (18), TE Logan Paulsen (14) on offense; on defense: DB Chris Horton (20), DL Bruce Davis (18), DB Dennis Keyes (18), DL Kevin Brown (17), LB Christian Taylor (12).

Cornerback **TREY BROWN** is also the leader with the most career starts among current players (35). Offensive guard **SHANNON TEVAGA** has 34 to top the offense. Others with 20 or more career starts include: OL Chris Joseph (23), OL Noah Sutherland (21), DL Kevin Brown (31), S Dennis Keyes (27), S Chris Horton (20).

Redshirt senior wide receiver **JOE COWAN** is one of just four players to have multiple career touchdown receptions of at least 77 yards. Danny Farmer had three and J.J. Stokes and Freddie Mitchell also had two.

Bruin head coach **KARL DORRELL** helped guide the Bruin team to the seventh 10-win season in school history in 2005. Dorrell has been a part of three of the seven record-tying seasons. In 1982, he was a freshman wide receiver on a Bruin team that went 10-1-1 and handed Michigan a 24-14 loss in the Rose Bowl. In 1988, Dorrell served as a graduate assistant coach on the Bruin squad that went 10-2 and bested Arkansas in the Cotton Bowl.

**KARL DORRELL** was named co-Coach of the Year in the Pac-10 for the 2005 season. He was the fourth UCLA coach to receive the honor, joining Bob Toledo (1998), Terry Donahue (1993, 1985) and Dick Vermeil (1975).

Redshirt senior linebacker **CHRISTIAN TAYLOR** ranks fifth on the team with 26 tackles. In 2006, he made a total of 83 tackles to rank second on the team in 2006 and also ranked third with 4.5 sacks and 13.5 tackles for loss.

Redshirt senior safety **DENNIS KEYES** leads the team with 37 tackles and his average of 7.50 is **15th (tied) in the Pac-10**. He led the Bruins with 10 tackles against BYU and had nine at Utah. Keyes returned an interception 60 yards versus Washington for the first touchdown of his career. In 2006, he was third on the team with 79 tackles.

**KARL DORRELL** is the first Bruin head coach to lead his team into a bowl game in each of his first four years on the job (2003-Silicon Valley Classic; 2004-Las Vegas Bowl; 2005-Sun Bowl; 2006-Emerald Bowl).

**PATRICK COWAN's** 78-yard touchdown pass to **BRANDON BREAZELL** in the 2006 Emerald Bowl was UCLA's longest offensive play from scrimmage and UCLA's longest since the 2005 Arizona State game, when Drew Olson and Joe Cowan combined for a 91-yard touchdown.

**Seven of BRANDON BREAZELL's 11 career touchdown receptions have measured at least 23 yards** -- 46, 23, 56, 35, 78, 69, 30 -- and he has also scored on kickoff returns of 42 and 45 yards.

**TEAM NOTES —**

The crowd of 72,986 at the BYU game (Sept. 8) was the highest for a home opener since the 2001 opener versus Ohio State (73,723). It was also UCLA's best non-conference crowd since that Ohio State game. UCLA drew 72,124 against Washington on Sept. 22.

UCLA has drawn 72,986 (BYU) and 72,124 (Washington) in its first two home games with Notre Dame and California on the October home schedule.

**DID YOU KNOW...**

Two Bruins on the 2007 roster are the sons of former Bruin standouts — DB Trey Brown (dad, Theotis, played running back from 1976-78 and rushed for 2,914 yards to rank No. 7 all-time at the school); LB Bruce Davis (dad, Bruce, played offensive line from 1975-78 and went on to a long NFL career, winning two Super Bowl titles).

UCLA, at No. 14, entered a season with an Associated Press national ranking for the first time since the 2001 team was ranked #15. The last time a Bruin team was ranked higher by AP entering a season was a No. 6 ranking in 1998.

UCLA has four sets of brothers -- the Bosworths (Kyle and Corey), the Cowans (Joe and Patrick), the Molines (Chase, Chad and Chane) and the Tevagas (Shannon and Sonny).

Nine seniors on this year's team are scheduled to graduate following the Fall Quarter - Kevin Brown, Trey Brown, Brigham Harwell, Chris Horton, Michael Pitre, Brian Rubinstein, Matthew Slater, William Snead and Noah Sutherland.

UCLA will once again be hosting the "I'm Going To College" program for local area school districts at selected football games. The next game is scheduled for Nov. 10 versus Arizona State.

UCLA and Stanford are the only Pac-10 teams playing three non-conference opponents who each won at least eight games a year ago.

UCLA is the only school to produce six quarterbacks — Troy Aikman, Steve Bono, Billy Kilmer, Tommy Maddox, Tom Ramsey, Jay Schroeder — to have played that position on a Super Bowl team.

During the last 25 years, UCLA has been ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 on 12 occasions, second only to USC (13) among Pac-10 schools. Washington is next with 10 rankings.

The selection of tight end Mercedes Lewis by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the first round of the 2006 NFL draft marked the 29th time a UCLA player has been taken in round one.

Drew Olson finished eighth in the 2005 Heisman Trophy balloting. It marked the 21st time that a Bruin has finished in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy voting.

UCLA has had at least one former player participate in 27 of the last 28 Super Bowl games.

The only three-time consensus All-Americans in Pac-10 history are Bruins (LB Jerry Robinson and S Kenny Easley).

UCLA has 13 former players currently working in the broadcast media - Troy Aikman, Charles Arbuckle, Wayne Cook, Randy Cross, Terry Donahue, David Norrie, Ron Pitts, Tom Ramsey, Floyd Reese, Matt Stevens, J.J. Stokes, Rick Walker, James Washington.

On May 13, 2007 UCLA became the first school in history to win 100 NCAA team championships.

**UCLA ON THE RADIO**

The 2007 season is UCLA's 11th with Clear Channel and the games will be aired on AM 570 KLAC. The Los Angeles all-sports station's broadcast includes a two-hour pre-game show and a post-game show.

Chris Roberts, a four-time Golden Mike Award winner, is in his 16th season as the voice of the Bruins. Former Bruin quarterback Matt Stevens is in his 11th year on the broadcast team and his seventh as the analyst in the booth. Former Bruin quarterback Wayne Cook is in his sixth season as sideline reporter.

Stevens and Cook host the one and one-half hour local pre-game show while Roberts, Stevens and Cook host the one-half hour network pre-game and network post-game shows.

AM 570 KLAC also provides ancillary programming, including coach Karl Dorrell and player interviews during game weeks.

Bruin games are also available nationally through an agreement with Sirius Satellite Radio, the Official Satellite Radio Partner of UCLA Athletics. Games can also be heard via the internet at [uclabruins.com](http://uclabruins.com) (a UCLA All-Access pass is needed). Fans can also hear the game for as little as 10 cents per minute by dialing 1-800-846-4700 (ext. 5929) to listen to the broadcast on the phone.



**UCLA ON TELEVISION**

ABC Sports will broadcast the Notre Dame game. Dan Fouts and Tim Brant will call the action from the booth and Todd Harris will roam the sidelines.

Heading into the Notre Dame game, 164 of UCLA's last 172 games have been televised live, including each of the last 33 dating back to 2004.

Nine games have been selected for live television in 2007: ABC (10/6 Notre Dame, 11/3 Arizona, 12/1 USC), Fox Sports Net (9/1 Stanford, 9/22 Washington, 9/29 Oregon State, 10/27 Washington St.), Versus (9/8 BYU, 9/15 Utah).

In 2006, all 13 Bruin games were televised live -- four by ABC (at Oregon, Washington St., at Cal and USC), three by Fox Sports Net (Utah, Stanford and at Arizona St.), one by ESPN (vs. Florida St./Emerald Bowl), one by TBS (at Washington), one by NBC (at Notre Dame) and three by FSN Prime Ticket (Rice, Arizona, Oregon State).

In addition, UCLA is featured every Monday night on FSN Prime Ticket. At 10:30 p.m., the station airs Bruin Rewind, a one-half hour highlight show of the previous game. At 11:00 p.m., FSN Prime Ticket airs a one-half hour show highlighting head coach Karl Dorrell's Monday afternoon media conference.

**Under Karl Dorrell, UCLA is 20-1 when it scores at least 30 points (won 15 straight) in a game and 12-1 when it scores 40 or more (11 in a row). The Bruins are 19-2 when they hold the opponent under 20 points, including the last 15 times.**

**UCLA has scored 40 points in back-to-back games (44 vs. Washington, 40 vs. Oregon State) for the first time since the middle of the 2005 season when it scored 40 or more in three straight games.**

**In the final three quarters of the Oregon State game, UCLA allowed just 101 yards and six first downs. The Beavers gained more than seven yards on just three of their final 12 offensive possessions.**

**Against Oregon State, UCLA finished with 133 net yards rushing against a defense that had allowed just 118 net yards in its first four games.**

UCLA's 624 yards of total offense in the 2007 opener versus Stanford was the 11th highest total in school history. It is the most ever in a Bruin season opener and the most in any game since the 2005 Arizona State game (660 yards).

UCLA's 45 points versus Stanford were the most in a season opener since 1998 when it scored 49 to open the season versus Texas at the Rose Bowl. It is also the most points scored by UCLA in a season opener on the road (UCLA scored 44 at San Diego State in 2005). The last time the Bruins scored more points in a Pac-10 road game was the 1998 Arizona contest (52-28).

UCLA's 338 rushing yards against Stanford were the most by the team since the 2004 Washington contest (424 yards).

**UCLA's 28 points in the fourth quarter at Oregon State tied the school record for points in a quarter. (since 1958). It had been done 12 other times since 1958, most recently in the second quarter against Rice in 2005.**

Against Washington, 18 of UCLA's final 19 offensive plays (all in the fourth quarter) were runs and those plays produced 157 yards, one touchdown and two field goals.

Eight of UCLA's 2007 opponents played in a bowl game following the 2006 season. Only Florida had more regular-season opponents earn bowl berths (10).

UCLA ended USC's streak of 63 straight games of scoring 20 or more points on Dec. 2, 2006 when it held the Trojans to nine points in a 13-9 victory.

Stanford converted just four of 18 third-down conversion attempts while BYU was six of 16 and Utah was five of 16. Washington converted just four of 16 attempts. Oregon State was just one of 14 on third down opportunities. **In five games, opponents have converted 20 of 80 (25.0%) third down opportunities -- first in the Pac-10 and fourth in the nation.** UCLA ranked **fifth nationally** in third-down conversion defense (28.4%) in 2006, having allowed 13 opponents to convert 50 of 176 third-down opportunities.

**UCLA has held its five opponents to 444 net rushing yards on 158 attempts (2.8 average) and ranks 16th in the nation (88.8).** The Bruins allowed Stanford 52 net yards rushing on 26 attempts (2.0 average), BYU just 44 net yards on 25 attempts, Utah 122 on 37 attempts, Washington had 124 on 32 attempts and Oregon State had 102 on 38 attempts. In 13 games in the 2006 season, UCLA allowed 91.1 yards per game (tied for ninth in the NCAA and tied for first in the Pac-10) and just nine touchdowns on the ground.

Under Karl Dorrell, UCLA's home record is 22-5 (.808). The .815 percentage ranks 18th in Football Bowl Subdivision for home record during the last four-plus years (2003-2007). UCLA's 10-game home winning streak in 2005-06 was its longest since 1997-1999, when it won 13 consecutive home games. The Bruins have captured wins in 14 of the last 15 games played at home in the Rose Bowl (loss 10/28/06 - Washington State).

UCLA's 31-0 shutout of Stanford on Sept. 30, 2006 was its first since 2004, when it shut out Stanford, 21-0.

**UCLA is 21-2 when it wins the turnover battle under head coach Karl Dorrell, including 3-0 (Stanford, BYU, Oregon State) in 2007.** It is 12-20 when it ties or loses the turnover battle, including 1-1 (Utah, Washington) in 2007.

UCLA is 6-1 all-time in overtime, including a couple of 2005 wins in extra time --- a 30-27 single overtime win at Stanford and a 44-41 single overtime win at Washington State. Head coach Karl Dorrell is 3-0 in overtime, defeating California in 2003 and Washington State and Stanford in 2005.

In the last seven seasons (2000-2006), UCLA has produced **seven consensus All-Americans** (2000, WR Freddie Mitchell; 2001, LB Robert Thomas; 2003 DE Dave Ball; 2005 TE Mercedes Lewis and KR Maurice Drew; 2006 DE Justin Hickman and PK Justin Medlock). Only one other school (USC) in the Pac-10 has produced more and UCLA's total is two ahead of third-place California. UCLA has produced 16 consensus All-America selections in the last 15 years (1992-2006), just two fewer than USC and eight more than No. 3 Arizona.

UCLA was one of eight schools to have two or more consensus All-Americans (Justin Hickman and Justin Medlock) in 2006 and the only school not ranked in the final Top 25. The others schools were: Michigan and Ohio State, three each; California, Tennessee, Texas, USC and West Virginia, two each.

**FRESHMEN** — Two true freshman, long snapper Christian Yount and defensive tackle Brian Price, have played thus far in 2007. Eight true freshmen played for the Bruins in the 2006 season. Seven played in the opener against Utah (DB Alterraun Verner, DB Jeremy McGee, WR Terrence Austin, WR Dominique Johnson, DB Christian Ramirez, RB Chane Moline, OL Micah Kia). DL Jerzy Siewierski made his debut against Stanford.

**Thirty-six true freshmen** have now played for coach Karl Dorrell during his four-plus seasons as head coach. A school-record 12 played for the Bruins in 2004. Nine played in the 2005 season and five saw the field in 2003.

**FIRST ACTION** — Ten players saw action in their first game in the 2007 season-opener at Stanford (DL Tom Blake, LB Joshua Edwards, PK Kai Forbath, TE Tyler Holland, DB Chris Meadows, WR Osaar Rasshan, LS Christian Yount, DT Darius Savage, DB Matt Culver, QB McLeod Bethel-Thompson). DT Brian Price made his debut versus Washington.

**FIRST STARTS** — Place kicker Kai Forbath, offensive tackle Micah Kia and tight end Scott Glicksberg made the first starts of their careers in the 2007 opener at Stanford. Cornerback Alterraun Verner made his first non-nickel back start versus BYU. Fullback Brian Theriot, defensive end Tom Blake, defensive tackle Jess Ward and cornerback Michael Norris all made their first career start at Utah. Offensive guard P.J. Irvin, tailback Kahlil Bell and defensive end Corey Bosworth made their first starts versus Washington.

**ACADEMICS** — Twenty-three members of the 2007 Bruin football squad were listed on the Athletics Director's Honor Roll for the Spring '07 quarter. To qualify, student-athletes had to post at least a 3.0 grade point average.

Nine seniors on this year's team are scheduled to graduate following Fall Quarter — Kevin Brown, Trey Brown, Chris Horton, Michael Pitre, Brian Rubenstein, Matthew Slater, William Snead, Noah Sutherland and Aaron Whittington.

**Seventy-three of the 80 freshmen** in Dorrell's first four classes (this does not include the 2007 class) are **still in school and progressing towards a degree** -- 68 are still active players and five others are injured-retired but still in school. Fifteen of the 19 members of Karl Dorrell's first recruiting class (2003) are still in school (one is already playing in the NFL) -- 13 are active players and two others are injured retired). In 2006, offensive guard **Chris Joseph** earned **first-team Academic All-America** honors on the ESPN's Magazine team. He was joined by **Kenneth Lombard** on the All-District VIII team.

Eight Bruins were selected to the **2006 Pac-10 All-Academic team**. Joseph and Lombard were first-team selections for the second straight year, offensive tackle Aleksey Lanis and fullback/special teams performer Dan Nelson were named to the second team and quarterback Ben Olson, wide receiver Andrew Baumgartner and tight ends Logan Paulsen and Ryan Moya earned honorable mention.

The UCLA football program has produced 16 NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners, 15 first-team Academic All-Americans (26 overall), eight National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Post-Graduate Scholarship recipients, one Rhodes Scholar and three members of the Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

In 2005, Chris Joseph was selected to the ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District-8 team. Joseph and Kenneth Lombard were named first-team Pac-10 All-Academic. Offensive guard Bob Cleary and defensive back Michael Norris were named to the second team while receiver Andrew Baumgartner and linebacker Dan Nelson earned honorable mention.

**COACHING MOVES** — The Bruins welcomed four new assistant coaches to the staff during the off-season.

**Jay Norvell** is the new offensive coordinator. He spent the previous three seasons in that capacity at the University of Nebraska. He spent two seasons on the staff of the Oakland Raiders prior to joining the Nebraska staff.

**Bob Connelly** joined the staff from the University of Alabama and will serve as the new offensive line coach. Connelly spent the last four seasons tutoring the Crimson Tide offensive linemen.

**Angus McClure** joins the Bruin staff as tight ends coach after spending last season at the University of Buffalo and the two seasons prior to that at the University of Nebraska.

**Eric Scott**, a former Bruin player (1995-97), also has joined the staff as the coach of the wide receivers. Scott made 27 career receptions as a wide receiver for the Bruins and also played on special teams as a punt returner.

Returning running backs coach **Dino Babers** has been named assistant head coach for the 2007 season. In addition, returning safeties coach **Gary DeLoach** will take charge of the special teams units.

**Mike Rutenberg** is in his first season as a defensive graduate assistant coach.

**NUMBER CHANGES** — The following players have changed numbers from last season's media guide for the 2007 season: #18 TE **William Snead** was #48; #24 RB **Christian Ramirez** was #21; #24 RB **Ryen Carew** was #35; #90 DL **Jerzy Siewierski** was #56; #61 C **Andy Keane** was #94.

**BOWLING** — The Bruins have qualified to play in a bowl game in nine of the last 10 seasons. UCLA has played in a bowl in each of the last five seasons (only USC among Pac-10 schools has a streak as long).

UCLA has played in a bowl game in 18 of the last 25 years. It has compiled a record of 11-7 in its last 18 appearances. UCLA's 11 bowl wins in the last 25 years rank No. 1 in the Pac-10. Only Florida State, Miami, Penn State, Georgia, Tennessee, Auburn, Alabama, and Michigan have won more bowl games than the Bruins in that span. UCLA leads all Pac-10 schools in bowl victories during that span, two more than USC and Washington (nine each).

## THE OFFENSE

**QUARTERBACKS** — Redshirt junior **BEN OLSON (#7)** has completed 63 of 122 passes for 922 yards, with seven touchdowns and five interceptions in four games. He sat out the game versus Washington due to headaches. He is **sixth in the league in passing yards (230.50)**.

He enjoyed a productive opener at Stanford. He completed 16 of 29 passes for 286 yards and a career-high five touchdowns in the contest with no interceptions. The five touchdowns rank second (tied) on UCLA's single-game list and all five went to wide receivers -- two to Joe Cowan (77 and 19 yards) and one each to Brandon Breazell (15 yards), Gavin Ketchum (six yards) and Dominique Johnson (four yards). The 77-yard pass was also the longest completion of his career. He was named Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week for his efforts.

Against BYU, Olson completed 13 of 28 passes for 126 yards with one interception. At Utah, he completed 20 of 40 passes for 290 yards with three interceptions. He had completions of 50 yards to Marcus Everett and 49 yards to Brandon Breazell.

After missing the Washington game due to headaches caused by the hits he took at Utah, Olson returned to action at Oregon State. On the afternoon, he completed 14 of 25 passes for 220 yards with two touchdowns and one interception. His first TD, an inside screen to Brandon Breazell that resulted in a 69-yard score, gave UCLA its first lead with 9:12 remaining. His second, a 30-yard strike to Breazell, made the score 33-14 less than three minutes later.

Olson started the first five games of the 2006 season, before he suffered a knee injury in the first half of the Arizona game. He completed 64% of his passes during those five contests and totaled five scoring passes. Olson's performance in the 2007 Spring practices merited his return to the starting lineup.

Olson made the most of his first career start in the 2006 opener against Utah. Under center to open a game for the first time since his senior year in high school (2001), he led the Bruins on a 79-yard touchdown drive on the first possession of the game. On the afternoon, Olson completed 25 of 33 passes for 318 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions. He completed passes to 10 different receivers, had four completions of at least 20 yards, and 14 of at least 10 yards. Olson completed his first nine passes.

His 318 passing yards rank No. 3 on UCLA's all-time list for quarterbacks starting their first game and were the most-ever in a victory. Steve Bono passed for 399 yards in his first start (a loss to BYU in 1983) and Tommy Maddox passed for 353 in a loss at Michigan in 1990.

At Washington, in his first career road start, he completed 18 of 31 passes for 135 yards but had two intercepted, including one that was returned for a touchdown. In the win over Stanford, he connected with eight different receivers on his 20 completions. He completed passes of at least 20 yards to three different receivers and produced 12 first downs.

Against Arizona, he completed three of four passes prior to suffering a tear of the medial collateral ligament in his left knee on UCLA's second series. He returned to practice on Nov. 7 but did not appear in a game the remainder of the season. On the year, he completed 79 of 124 passes (63.7%) for 822 yards with five touchdowns and five interceptions.

In 2005, he played in two games as the backup quarterback. He made his debut late in the fourth quarter of the Oregon State game (game seven) and threw his first career pass. He also played the final series at Arizona and completed two of three passes for 11 yards. He was sidelined for the first three games of the 2005 season due to a small fracture in his left (throwing) hand. Olson entered UCLA in January of 2005 following his transfer from Brigham Young University.

Olson was on a church mission for two seasons (2003 and 2004) after redshirting as a true freshman at BYU during the 2002 season. During his prep career at Thousand Oaks High, he completed 421 of 702 passes for 6,401 yards and 54 touchdowns. As a prep senior, he threw for 2,989 yards and 32 touchdowns.

Redshirt junior **PATRICK COWAN (#12)** (brother of wide receiver Joe) saw his first action of the 2007 season against Washington. Cowan injured his left hamstring in practice on Aug. 20 and had not suited up for the first three games of the season versus Stanford, BYU and Utah.

In the Washington game, Cowan started and completed 17 of 30 passes for 147 yards and one touchdown, a two-yard score to Dominique Johnson. He also carried the ball five times for 10 net yards. In the fourth quarter, he suffered a partial tear of the MCL in his right knee making a tackle following his only interception of the night. He did not suit up for the game at Oregon State.

In 2006, he took over the starting duties following an injury to Ben Olson in the fifth game of the year against Arizona. He played in all 13 games and started the final eight contests.

In the 2006 opener against Utah, he entered the game on the third series of the fourth quarter, played nine snaps and threw his first career pass. Against Rice, he attempted one pass from field goal formation but did not play quarterback. He performed the holding chores at Washington. Against Stanford, he played the final series and completed the first pass of his career. Against Arizona, Cowan entered the game in the first quarter, in place of an injured Ben Olson, and went on to complete 20 of 29 passes for 201 yards and two touchdowns. He also netted 16 yards rushing. He gave UCLA its first lead with a seven-yard scoring pass to Marcus Everett and his 15-yard strike to Matt Willis, with 7:25 left in the first half, gave the Bruins the lead for good, 14-7.

He made his first career start at Oregon and completed 16 of 31 passes for 112 yards. He grossed 20 rushing yards. At Notre Dame, he completed 16 of 32 passes for 217 yards and two touchdowns. In the second quarter, he connected with Everett for a 54-yard scoring play. Later in the quarter, he found William Snead over the middle for a 36-yard score and a 14-7 lead. Both of his touchdown passes came on third down situations (third-and-10 and third-and-seven). Against Washington State, he completed 17 of 37 passes for 252 yards with one touchdown (36 yards to Junior Taylor). He had five completions of at least 24 yards.

At California, he completed 22 of 40 passes for 329 yards -- all career highs. He completed passes to 10 different receivers and threw nine completions of at least 15 yards. He netted 22 yards on four carries, including a 12-yard touchdown run. On third down, he completed six of 11 passes for 117 yards, including 35 yards to J. Taylor, 24 yards to Willis and 29 yards to Logan Paulsen. His 329 passing yards at California ranked 23rd on UCLA's single-game list and fourth among sophomores. His 351 yards of total offense ranked 19th on that single-game list and third among sophomores.

In the win over Oregon State, he completed 12 of 23 passes for 126 yards and two touchdowns, both to Everett. On third down, he completed six of eight passes for 47 yards and a touchdown. At Arizona State, Cowan completed 14 of 24 passes for 187 yards with two touchdowns. Both scoring passes were to Brandon Breazell -- 56 yards to give UCLA a 7-0 lead and 35 yards with 6:41 remaining in the game with the Bruins leading 17-12.

In the win over USC, he completed 12 of 21 passes for 114 yards. In addition, he was the team's leading rusher with 55 net yards on 10 carries and scored UCLA's only touchdown. On the 91-yard touchdown drive, UCLA's longest of the year, he ran for 55 yards on four carries, including runs of 29 and 16 yards, and scored on a one-yard run. He completed both of his pass attempts (19 yds.) on the drive.

In the Emerald Bowl versus Florida State, he completed 15 of 36 passes for 240 yards and two touchdowns. His first touchdown was a first-quarter 78-yard catch-and-run strike down the middle to Breazell. It was the longest play of Cowan and Breazell's career. It was also UCLA's longest offensive play of the year and the 15th (tied) longest pass play in school history. Cowan also threw a seven-yard touchdown pass to J. Taylor in the second quarter.

On the year, he completed 145 of 276 passes (52.5%) for 1,782 yards, 11 touchdowns and nine interceptions. His 145 completions rank No. 17 (tied) on UCLA's single-season list. Cowan had seen his first career action in the fourth quarter of the 2005 game against Rice, but did not attempt a pass. It was his only quarterback action of that season.

Redshirt freshman **MCLEOD BETHEL-THOMPSON (#14)** made his debut in the 2007 opener at Stanford, playing UCLA's final offensive series, but did not attempt a pass. He did not play against BYU or Utah. In the fourth quarter against Washington, he played UCLA's final four series of the game and engineered one touchdown drive and two field goal drives without throwing a pass. UCLA ran out the clock on the fourth possession. He also played the final snap versus Oregon State.

Last season, he made trips to contests against Oregon, Notre Dame, Cal and Florida State (Emerald Bowl) but did not see game action. He lettered three seasons at Balboa High School in San Francisco, CA before enrolling at UCLA in the fall of 2006 as a walk-on. Bethel-Thompson threw for 2,100 yards and had 22 touchdowns and six interceptions as a prep senior. Following his senior campaign, he was selected first-team All-City, Player of the Year and All-Metro. As a junior, Bethel-Thompson was named first-team All-City and Back of the Year. He threw for 1,800 yards and totaled 19 touchdowns and nine interceptions. The young quarterback earned second-team All-City honors following his sophomore season. He also lettered in baseball, basketball and soccer. Bethel-Thompson was a second-team All-City selection in baseball after his senior season. His club soccer team advanced to the state cup finals three times. His grandfather, Wilbur Thompson, won the gold medal in the shot put at the 1948 Olympic Games held in London.

**RUNNING BACKS** — True senior tailback **CHRIS MARKEY (#28)** is one of the top backs on the West Coast, if not the nation. He is on the pre-season Watch List for the Maxwell Award, presented to the nation's top player, and the Doak Walker Award, presented to the nation's top running back.

Markey is the 14th Bruin to rush for 2,000 yards in a career and **currently ranks 11th on that list with 2,422 yards. He is also sixth on the career all-purpose yards list with 3,882 yards. He now has 65 career receptions to rank T-28th on that UCLA list and is first among Bruin running backs (Maurice Drew had 64).**

In the 2007 opener at Stanford, he ran for 71 yards on 20 carries and made one reception for two yards. Against BYU, he rushed for 50 yards on 16 carries, scoring the clinching three-yard touchdown with 1:12 remaining in the game. He ran for 22 of his yards on that scoring drive. At Utah, he carried 10 times for 32 net yards (long of 20) and caught one pass for four yards.

Against Washington, he came off the bench to rush for 193 yards, the second-highest total of his career, and one touchdown on just 14 carries. He had a 72-yard touchdown, the longest run of his career, to give UCLA a 31-17 lead following a Husky touchdown and he had a 66-yard run to set up a first-quarter field goal. He also made one reception for five yards, giving him 198 all-purpose yards.

**Markey is just the fifth back in UCLA history to rush for at least 190 yards in two or more games in a career** (he had 208 versus Rice in 2006). The others are Gaston Green (four), Freeman McNeil (three), Karim Abdul-Jabbar (three) and Theotis Brown (two).

At Oregon State, he rushed for 58 yards and one touchdown on 19 carries and also made two receptions for 13 yards, giving him 71 all-purpose yards.

**On the year, he has rushed for 404 yards (5.1 average) and three touchdowns and his average of 80.8 yards is eighth in the Pac-10.**

A member of the Doak Walker Award Pre-Season Watch List in 2006, Markey was named UCLA's co-Most Valuable Player and was also All-Pac-10 honorable mention. In 2006, Markey averaged 85.15 yards on the ground and 105.92 all-purpose yards. He ranked fourth in the Pac-10 and 32nd nationally in rushing yards (85.15) and 56th in the NCAA and eighth in the Pac-10 in all-purpose yards (105.92). He also led the team with 35 receptions and became the **first Bruin since Kermit Alexander in 1962 to lead the team in both rushing and receptions.**

His 1,107 rushing yards rank 11th on UCLA's single-season list and were the most by a Bruin since 2001, when DeShaun Foster ran for 1,109. He is the **11th Bruin to rush for 1,000 yards in a season**, which has been done a total of 18 times. He also finished with 1,377 all-purpose yards to rank No. 14 on that single-season list.

Markey enjoyed a career night against Rice in 2006, rushing for a career-high 208 yards (14th highest total in school history) on 23 carries. He had four runs of at least 20 yards -- 43, 36, 31 and 20 -- and three others of at least 10 yards. His previous career high was 161 yards versus Northwestern in the 2005 Sun Bowl.

At Washington, he rushed for 124 yards on 19 carries, including a 63-yard first-quarter run which set up a field goal. In the win over Stanford, he led the team in rushing for the third straight game, finishing with 88 yards on 18 carries. He topped the team for the fourth straight game versus Arizona (40 yards).

At Oregon, he rushed for a team-high 97 yards on 17 attempts and made four receptions. At California, he accounted for 199 all-purpose yards and was the game's leading rusher with 136 yards on 20 carries. He had eight runs of five

or more yards. On a fourth-and-one, he popped through and raced 70 yards for a touchdown, the longest run of his career. He also made a career-high six receptions for 63 yards. In the win over Oregon State, he carried 23 times for 84 yards and made three receptions. At Arizona State, he led the Bruins with four catches and rushed for 49 yards. Against USC, he rushed for 51 yards on 20 carries. Against Florida State in the Emerald Bowl, Markey rushed for a game-high 144 yards (103 in first half) on 19 carries.

In 2005, Markey, who saw action in all 12 games with a start against USC, finished 57th in the nation and eighth in the Pac-10 in kickoff return average (22.53). He was 14th in the Pac-10 in all-purpose yards (101.92) in 2005. He was second on the team in rushing with 561 yards, second with 1,223 all-purpose yards and fourth with five touchdowns. He was at his best against Northwestern in the Sun Bowl. He rushed for 161 yards on 24 carries to win co-MVP honors.

True junior tailback **KAHLIL BELL (#36)** enjoyed the best game of his career in the 2007 opener at Stanford. Bell ran for a career-high 195 yards, gaining numerous yards after the initial contact from the defense. He had runs of 59 (longest of his career), 31 and 22 yards among his 19 carries. His 195 yards were the most ever by a Bruin in a season opener, the most since Chris Markey ran for 208 against Rice in 2006 and rank 18th on UCLA's single season list. Against BYU, he led the Bruins 79 yards on 16 carries, including a four-yard run to give the Bruins a 17-0 lead in the second quarter. On that touchdown drive, he carried on all four plays, gaining 26, 17, 0 and four yards for the score.

Against Utah, he led the Bruins with 59 yards on 12 carries and also made two receptions for six yards. He made his first career start against Washington and rushed for 109 yards and one touchdown, an eight-yard tackle-breaking run to give the Bruins the lead for good 4:17 into the third quarter, on 27 attempts. He also made two receptions for 20 yards.

At Oregon State, he recovered from a tough start (fumbles lost on UCLA's first two plays) to lead the Bruins with 80 yards, including touchdowns of one and four yards, on 24 attempts. He also led the team with four receptions for 49 yards and finished with 129 all-purpose yards.

**On the year, he leads the Bruins in rushing with 522 yards on 98 attempts (5.3 average) and a team-high four touchdowns. He is third in the Pac-10 and 29th nationally with his average of 104.4 yards per game. He is also sixth in the Pac-10 in all-purpose yards (123.4 average).**

In 2006, Bell ranked second on the team in rushing in 2006 with his 239 yards over seven games. He led the Bruins in rushing against Utah, finishing with 34 yards. Against Rice, he carried 19 times for 102 yards. At Washington, he carried nine times for 27 yards. In the win over Stanford, he gained 53 yards on eight carries. At Oregon, he scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns on one-yard blasts. He suffered a sprained left ankle at Notre Dame and was unable to play against Washington State, California, Oregon State and Arizona State. Bell was suspended for the final two games of the year.

In 2005, he appeared in 10 games. He had six games with 20 or more yards of rushing, including a season-ending 136-yard, two-touchdown effort versus Northwestern which earned him a share of the Sun Bowl game MVP honors.

Redshirt senior fullback **MICHAEL PITRE (#32)**, an honorable mention All-Pac-10 selection in 2005, has been limited since the first week of 2007 fall practice by a left knee injury (bone bruise). He did not play against Stanford, BYU, Utah or Washington. Pitre returned to full practice the week of the Oregon State game and played a handful of snaps against the Beavers.

Pitre has established himself as an outstanding blocking back. In the 2006 game against Rice, he made a career-high tying four receptions for 43 yards, best on the team, including one catch-and-run for 17 yards. In the win over Arizona, he made four receptions for 32 yards. At Arizona State, he made three receptions for 30 yards. Against USC, he caught one pass and carried once. In the Emerald Bowl, he made one reception and carried once. On the year, he made a career-high 16 receptions.

In 2005, he appeared in all 12 games and made five starts. Versus Rice, he scored the first rushing touchdown of his career. Against Washington, he made four receptions for 20 yards and a touchdown. At Arizona, he carried seven times for 39 yards and made one reception. He caught a five-yard touchdown pass in the Sun Bowl against Northwestern.

True sophomore **CHANE MOLINE (#42)** injured his left wrist (fracture) in practice and has been limited by the injury since Aug. 10. He did not play in the 2007 opener at Stanford or against BYU. Against Utah, he carried three times for 30 yards and two first downs on the game's final series and also played on special teams. Against Washington, he carried three times for eight yards and also played on special teams. He carried once for seven yards against Oregon State.

In 2006, he tied for the **team lead with five overall touchdowns**. He made his debut versus Utah and accounted for 29 yards. He ran for 17 yards on seven attempts and also made one reception for 12 yards. Against Stanford, he scored UCLA's only offensive touchdowns, hitting paydirt from two yards away in the third quarter and from one-yard out in the fourth. Against Washington State, Moline led the Bruins with 32 yards on six carries. At California, he carried the ball eight times for 25 yards, including seven carries for 21 yards in the second half. He carried four times for 10 yards versus Oregon State. In the win at Arizona State, he scored a one-yard touchdown to give the Bruins a 14-3 lead. He carried twice versus USC. In the Emerald Bowl, he scored a touchdown on an eight-yard run to give UCLA a 27-23 lead with 5:49 remaining in the third quarter.

True sophomore **CHRISTIAN RAMIREZ (#24)**, who moved from safety to tailback during camp, made his offensive debut in the 2007 season-opener at Stanford and rushed for 55 yards on five straight fourth-quarter carries, including a 24-yard touchdown. He played on special teams versus BYU and Utah. He carried once for five yards and also played special teams against Washington. He appeared on special teams at Oregon State.

Redshirt sophomore **TREVOR THERIOT (#31)**, redshirt senior **CHAD MOLINE (#46)** and true senior **FRED HOLMES (#49)**, who moved from linebacker during camp, all saw action at fullback versus Stanford. Theriot caught one pass for four yards versus BYU and Holmes saw action on special teams. Theriot started at fullback against Utah and Washington and all three played on special teams. Theriot started at Oregon State and made one reception for five yards and Holmes played on special teams.

**WIDE RECEIVERS** — True senior **MARCUS EVERETT (#9)** sat out the Washington and Oregon State games due to an ankle injury he suffered in the contest at Utah (9/15). Before injuring his ankle, Everett made five receptions for 68 yards and two first downs against the Utes. He also had a catch-and-run for 50 yards but lost the ball stretching for the end zone in the third quarter. On the year, he ranks second on the team with 10 receptions and 134 receiving yards. Against BYU, he led the Bruins with five catches for 66 yards, including one for 37 yards, and produced three first downs. Everett did not make a reception in the 2007 opener at Stanford.

Everett now has **82 career receptions and ranks No. 21 on that list**. He is also the 25th Bruin to record **1,000 or more career receiving yards (1,084 - 22nd on that list)**. He has made a reception in 20 of his last 21 games (he had a string of 18 straight broken at Stanford) and 24 of the last 26.

In 2006, he tied for the team lead with five touchdowns and **led the squad with five receiving touchdowns in 2006**. He also led the team with 450 receiving yards and ranked second with 31 receptions. His 14.5 average was second on the team among players with more than two receptions. He topped the team with 21 receptions that resulted in first downs.

Everett made two receptions for 25 yards and one touchdown (fourth quarter) in the 2006 opener versus Utah. Against Arizona, he made one catch, a seven-yard reception in the end zone to give the Bruins a 7-0 lead. At Notre Dame, he made a career-high tying six receptions for a career-best 102 yards, including a career-long 54-yard catch-and-run for a touchdown.

He scored both Bruin touchdowns in the win over Oregon State and made a team-best (tied) three receptions for a team-high 64 yards. The first, following a fourth-down stand by the Bruin defense in the third quarter, was a 45-yard touchdown. In the fourth quarter, he worked himself free in the back of the end zone for an 11-yard score. His third reception set up a field goal.

In the win over USC, he led the team with five receptions for 72 yards. He made three key third down receptions. On the field goal drive that gave UCLA a 10-9 lead, he twice made receptions on third-and-eight for 13 and seven yards, the later reception set up the 22-yard field goal. On the fourth-quarter field goal drive, he made a 21-yard reception on third-and-15.

He ranked third on the team in 2005 with 32 receptions for 390 yards. He saw action in 10 games and made six starts. He had four games with five or more catches. After not suiting up for the first two games of 2005 due to a sprained shoulder, he came off the bench against Oklahoma to lead the Bruins with six receptions, good for 66 yards. At Washington State, Everett's nine-yard scoring catch (first of his career) in the back of the end zone with 44 seconds remaining in regulation completed UCLA's 17-point fourth-quarter comeback.

True senior **BRANDON BREAZELL (#1)** led the Bruins with six receptions for 111 yards and one touchdown (15 yards) in the 2007 season-opener at Stanford. In addition to his scoring grab, he also had a 49-yard reception. Five of his six receptions produced first downs and/or touchdowns. Against BYU, he made four catches for 35 yards but left the game in the third quarter after suffering some broken teeth in a collision following an interception.

At Utah, he tied his career high with six receptions and his 121 yards were also a new career best. He had receptions of 49, 22, 17, 15 and 13 yards and produced five first downs. Against Washington, he made four receptions for 30 yards and also threw a 57-yard pass to Terrence Austin.

At Oregon State, he again demonstrated his big-play ability. With UCLA trailing 14-12, he took an inside screen, slipped a tackle and raced 69-yards for a touchdown to give UCLA its first lead of the day, 19-14, with 9:12 remaining in the game. Less than three minutes later, Ben Olson and Breazell connected on a 30-yard pass to the goal line for another score.

After five games, he leads the Bruins with 22 receptions and 396 yards (18.0 average) and three touchdowns. He ranks **fourth in the Pac-10 in receiving yards (79.2) and his average of 18.0 yards per catch is the highest in the league among players with at least 11 receptions.**

Breazell **ranked 24th (tied) on UCLA's career reception list with 69 catches. In addition, he ranks 21st in school history with 1,097 yards. Seven of his 11 career touchdown receptions have measured at least 23 yards -- 46, 23, 56, 35, 78, 69, 30 -- and he has also scored on kickoff returns of 42 and 45 yards.**

He made 21 catches in 2006, ranking fifth (tied) on the team. His 389 yards ranked second on the squad, his four receiving touchdowns ranked second and his 18.5 average was the best on the team among players with more than two receptions. His 21 receptions produced 16 first downs and/or four touchdowns.

In the 2006 opener against Utah, he made three catches for 49 yards (three first downs). He made one catch against Rice for an 18-yard touchdown to give UCLA a 26-10 lead. Against Arizona, he led the team with five catches for 57 yards (four first downs). Against Washington State, he strained a muscle in his rib area prior to the game and only played a few snaps. He came off the bench but did not make a catch against either Cal or Oregon State.

At Arizona State, he made two receptions for 91 yards and two touchdowns. On the first one, just 6:36 into the game, he outran a defender to the end zone for a 56-yard touchdown. His second TD, a 35-yard one-handed grab, came with 6:41 left in the game and put UCLA up 24-12.

In the Emerald Bowl, he scored UCLA's first touchdown on a 78-yard catch-and-run. It was the longest reception of his career, UCLA's longest offensive play of the season and ranked 15th (tied) on UCLA's list of longest pass plays in history.

He totaled 24 receptions in 2005 to rank fifth on the squad while his four receiving touchdowns ranked second (tied). Overall, he ranked third on the squad with six touchdowns. Breazell scored the first touchdown of his career against Rice. At Stanford, he made three receptions for 28 yards, including a 23-yard over-the-shoulder touchdown grab in overtime which gave the Bruins the

victory. In the Sun Bowl, he earned Special Teams Player of the Game honors after returning two onside kicks for scores.

True junior **GAVIN KETCHUM (#10)** made a six-yard touchdown catch in the 2007 opener at Stanford. Against BYU, he made two catches for 13 yards. He also played at Utah. He made two catches for 32 yards versus Washington before suffering a sprained right ankle in the second quarter. He did not suit up for the Oregon State game.

In 2006, Ketchum made his first reception (14 yards) at Washington. In the first quarter against Stanford, he blocked a punt that was returned for a 12-yard touchdown. True sophomore **TERRENCE AUSTIN (#4)** made one reception for 22 yards in the 2007 season opener at Stanford and also averaged 13.7 yards on three punt returns with a long of 17 yards. Against BYU, he averaged 10.8 yards on five punt returns with a long of 22 yards and did not make a reception. At Utah, he made three receptions for 40 yards (long of 23) and ran once for seven yards. He did not return a punt. Against Washington, Austin made one reception for 57 yards, ran once for six yards and returned three punts for 19 yards (he had a long return negated by a penalty). He returned three punts for 14 yards at Oregon State.

**On the year, Austin is averaging 9.1 yards on 14 punt returns to rank fifth in the Pac-10. He has also made five receptions for 119 yards, tied for sixth on the squad.**

Redshirt senior **JOE COWAN (#26)** returned to action with a bang. In the 2007 opener against Stanford, he made two receptions for 96 yards and two touchdowns and gained 14 rushing yards on lateral passes. On the first, he caught a 19-yard pass from Ben Olson to give the Bruins their first score of the year. On the second, he took an inside screen, broke a tackle, stiff-armed a would-be tackler and raced down the right sideline for a 77-yard TD. It was the second-longest score of his career and made him just **the fourth player in school history to have multiple touchdown receptions of at least 77 yards (Danny Farmer had three and J.J. Stokes and Freddie Mitchell also had two).**

Cowan had one catch for eight yards versus BYU. At Utah, he had one reception for 19 yards and a first down. Against Washington, he made three catches for 28 yards, the first passes he has caught from his brother Patrick. At Oregon State, he made three receptions for 30 yards.

**He is currently tied for second on the squad with 10 receptions and his 18.1 average is the highest in the Pac-10 among players with at least 10 receptions. His 65 career receptions rank No. 28 (tied with Chris Markey) on that UCLA list.**

Cowan missed the entire 2006 season after suffering an injured right knee (posterior cruciate ligament) in practice. In 2005, he ranked second on the squad with 35 catches for 469 yards (13.4 average) and three touchdowns. Twenty-two of Cowan's receptions accounted for first downs (21) or touchdowns (three). He had five games (Oklahoma, Washington, Wash. State, Stanford, Arizona) with four or more catches. He had a big game against Arizona State, making three receptions for a career-high 109 yards and one touchdown. On the first play of the game, he caught a short slant pass and outran the defense for a 91-yard touchdown (fourth longest pass play in UCLA history).

Redshirt sophomore **OSAAR RASSHAN (#11)** saw the first game action of his career when he lined up as a wide receiver during the 2007 opener at Stanford. He did not play against BYU or Utah. He saw limited action against Washington. Rasshan switched from the quarterback position to wide receiver during 2007 fall practices. He served as the scout team quarterback during his first two seasons in the program and had not seen game action.

Redshirt freshman **DOMINIQUE JOHNSON (#19)** made his first career reception, a four-yard touchdown on UCLA's second possession of the second half in the 2007 season opener at Stanford. He saw limited action against BYU and Utah. Against Washington, he led the Bruins with five receptions for 32 yards, including a two-yard touchdown in the second quarter. At Oregon State, he made two receptions for 24 yards.

**On the year, he has made eight receptions (fifth on the squad) and is tied for second on the team with two receiving touchdowns.**

**OFFENSIVE LINE** — In five games, the line has helped UCLA's offense average 424.6 yards per game.

True senior right guard **SHANNON TEVAGA (#71)** had his starting streak of 34 straight games snapped when he did not suit up against Washington or at Oregon State due to a knee injury suffered at Utah (9/15). Tevaga is considered one of the top offensive guards in the West and has been added to the Lombardi Award Watch List. He was named a second-team pre-season All-America selection by some publications. Tevaga played all but eight snaps at Stanford and all but two against BYU. He injured his right knee late in the Utah game. He earned All-Pac-10 honorable mention for his efforts in 2006.

True senior **CHRIS JOSEPH (#60)**, who is on the Rimington Award Watch List, started his first game at center in the 2007 opener at Stanford. He played the entire game against BYU, Utah, Washington and Oregon State. In 2006 as a guard,

Joseph was named a **first-team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American**. In addition, he earned first-team All-Academic District VIII and All-Academic Pac-10 honors for the second straight year. He was co-winner of UCLA's Paul I. Wellman Award for All-Around Excellence. Joseph started all 13 games at weak guard in 2006. He played the entire contest in 11 ballgames during the 2006 season and came out only for the final series against Stanford and Arizona.

Redshirt senior **NOAH SUTHERLAND (#74)** has shifted to right guard for the 2007 season and started against Stanford, BYU, Utah, Washington and Oregon State, playing virtually every snap of those games. He started all 13 contests in 2006 at tackle. Sutherland, who played defense in 2004, saw action in a total of seven games at tackle in 2005, starting three of the last five games.

True senior **BRIAN ABRAHAM (#68)** started and played most of the 2007 season opener against Stanford, played every snap against BYU and most snaps versus Utah, Washington and Oregon State. In 2006, he played in all 13 games, starting once. He saw some action in the 2006 opener versus Utah and played the entire second half versus Rice at tackle in place of Aleksey Lanis. He also played the entire second half at Oregon for Lanis. In the Emerald Bowl versus Florida State, he started at strong tackle in place of the injured Aleksey Lanis and played the entire contest. He saw action in 11 of the 12 games in 2005 and made nine starts on the strong side.

True sophomore **MICAH KIA (#73)** made the first start of his career in the 2007 season opener at Stanford and also started against BYU, Utah and Washington. He came off the bench at Oregon State and played the entire second half. In 2006, he saw action off the bench in all 13 games. The bulk of his action came on special teams as a regular on the PAT/FG unit. Kia played offensive tackle versus Utah, Stanford and Arizona.

Redshirt sophomore **ALEKSEY LANIS (#78)** came off the bench at Stanford in the 2007 season opener and played both tackle positions. He did the same thing versus BYU, Utah and Washington. He started at Oregon State but did not play in the second half when his right knee tightened up. In 2006, he started the first 12 games but missed the Emerald Bowl due to a fracture in his left ulna. He was named **second-team Pac-10 All-Academic** and was selected **second-team Freshman All-America** by CollegeFootballNews.com and Scout.com. Lanis was also selected to the Sporting News Pac-10 All-Freshman team and was Freshman All-America honorable mention. He was co-winner of UCLA's John Boncheff, Jr. Memorial Award for Rookie of the Year.

Redshirt senior **P.J. IRVIN (#67)** made his first career start against Washington at guard in place of injured Shannon Tevaga and helped the Bruins rush for 333 yards. He also started at Oregon State.

Redshirt junior **MICAH REED (#58)** played in relief at left guard against Washington and Oregon State. He played the majority of the game against the Beavers.

**TIGHT ENDS** — True junior **LOGAN PAULSEN (#86)** and redshirt senior **WILLIAM SNEAD (#18)** figure to be the Bruins' primary tight ends in 2007.

Paulsen, who is listed on the **2007 John Mackey Award Watch List**, started and made one reception for 11 yards at Stanford in the 2007 season opener. He started but did not catch a pass versus BYU. Against Utah, he made two receptions for 32 yards and two first downs. He started against Washington and Oregon State but did not make a reception.

In 2006, he saw action in all 13 games, starting 12 times. He was fourth on the squad with 27 receptions and third (tied) with 331 receiving yards. He produced 18 first downs. He was co-winner of UCLA's Captain Don Brown Memorial Award for Most Improved Player.

Paulsen made his first career start in the 2006 opener against Utah and responded by leading the Bruins with five receptions for 90 yards, including a 46-yard reception. Two of his receptions were for at least 20 yards and he produced four first downs. Against Stanford, he came off the bench (the Bruins did not open with a tight end) and tied for the team lead with four receptions for 40 yards. **THE DEFENSE**

**DEFENSIVE LINE** — Redshirt senior **BRUCE DAVIS (#44)** stepped into the spotlight with his fine play at defensive end during the 2006 season. He ranks No. 1 nationally in sacks among returning players based on his 12.5 sack performance in 2006. Davis is a pre-season All-American and a candidate for the Chuck Bednarik Award, the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Lott Trophy for National Defensive Player of the Year as well as the Lombardi Award, which is presented to the nation's top lineman. He is also on the pre-season watch list for the Ted Hendricks Award, presented to the nation's top defensive end.

In the 2007 opener at Stanford, he was credited with two solo tackles. He recovered a fumble on UCLA's first defensive series, returning it 12 yards, and also deflected one pass. Against BYU, he tied his career high with seven tackles (six solos). He also recorded two quarterback sacks. On the second one, he also caused a fourth-quarter fumble after BYU had driven to the UCLA 13-yard line to end a scoring threat. He had two tackle assists at Utah. Against Washington, he had three tackles (two solos), including 1.5 sacks and another solo tackle for loss (2.5 total). He had one tackle assist at Oregon State.

On the year, he has 15 tackles. He **leads the team with 3.5 sacks and is T-46th in the NCAA and T-7th in the Pac-10 (0.88). He also leads the team with 4.5 tackles for loss (T-7th in Pac-10 at 1.10). He has also forced one fumble and recovered one fumble.**

**Davis now has 20.5 career sacks, No. 8 on UCLA's all-time list.**

In 2006, he was named **first-team All-American** by CollegeFootballNews.com and SI.com. He was selected second-team All-Pac-10 and was co-winner of UCLA's N.N. Sugarman Memorial Award for Best Leadership. On the year, Davis made 47 tackles, seventh (tied) on the squad. He also ranked tied for first on the team in sacks and second, behind Justin Hickman, with 17.5 tackles for loss.

Davis ranked **fourth** (tied with Hickman) **in the NCAA** and tied for first in the Pac-10 in sacks (0.96) in 2006 and **18th nationally** and second in the Pac-10 in tackles for losses (1.35). He was also tied for sixth in the Pac-10 with three forced fumbles. Davis ranked third (tied) on UCLA's single-season sack list and ninth on the single-season tackles for loss list.

Against Rice in 2006, he made two tackles, including a 15-yard tackle for loss. He also recovered a bad Owl snap for an 11-yard loss, giving the Bruins a possession they converted into a field goal. At Washington, he made two tackles for loss, including a third-quarter sack which caused a fumble. In the win over Stanford, he made 2.5 sacks among his six tackles, accounting for 21 yards in losses. He also caused a fumble. Against Arizona, he made four tackles, including one sack. At Notre Dame, he made five tackles, including 2.0 sacks for 11 yards and a third tackle for loss. Against Washington State, he had 2.0 sacks (11 yards) among his four tackles. At California, he made four tackles, including a sack, and forced a fumble. Against Oregon State, he had a seven-yard sack, and also recovered a fumble to set up UCLA's final field goal. At Arizona State, he made five tackles, including one sack. Against USC, he recorded one of UCLA's two sacks. Against Florida State, he made four tackles, including 0.5 for loss.

In 2005, he appeared in all 12 games and made 28 tackles to rank third among the defensive linemen. He was tied for third on the team with two sacks and was sixth with six tackles for losses. He moved to outside linebacker from defensive end during the 2005 Spring practices and played both positions early in the 2005 season before moving back to end.

He also made two tackles against BYU before leaving in the second quarter with a tear of his left medial collateral ligament. He did not suit up for the games versus Utah, Washington and Oregon State.

He started in 12 games in 2006 and ranked fourth on the squad with 6.5 tackles for losses and finished with 31 tackles. He made four tackles at Washington and Oregon. **KEVIN BROWN (#75)**, a redshirt senior tackle, made two solo tackles in the 2007 season opener at Stanford. Against BYU, he made three tackles (two solos), including a sack and a pass broken up. In 2006, Verner was selected **co-Pac-10 Freshman of the Year** and was also named a first-team Freshman All-America by Scripps/FWAA and CollegeFootballNews.com, second-team Freshman All-America by The Sporting News, Scout.com and Rivals.com and first-team Pac-10 All-Freshman by The Sporting News. He was co-winner of UCLA's John Boncheff, Jr. Memorial Award for Rookie of the Year. Verner ranked fourth on the team with 59 tackles in 2006. He was second on the team with two interceptions and became the sixth Bruin, and first freshman, to score two touchdowns on interceptions in the same season. With 2:16 remaining in the second quarter of the season-opening Utah game, he picked off a Ute pass and returned it 34 yards for a touchdown to give the Bruins the lead for good, 14-7. In the fourth quarter, he caused a fumble after a Ute reception, recovered it and advanced it 18 yards. His interception return for a touchdown was the first by a UCLA true freshman since 1989, when Carlton Gray returned one 65 yards versus Washington. At Washington, he led the team with nine tackles, including 0.5 for loss, off the bench. In the win over Arizona, he picked off a fourth quarter Wildcat pass and returned it 89 yards for a score. His return was the longest by a Bruin since Nov. 12, 1994, when Abdul McCullough scored on a 98-yard return versus Arizona State. At Oregon, he made his first start (UCLA was in a nickel package) and responded with seven tackles. At Notre Dame, he made six tackles. Against USC, he made four tackles, including one for loss, combining with Christian Taylor on a fourth-down run on the first play of the fourth quarter. In the Emerald Bowl, he made nine tackles and broke up two passes.

Redshirt junior cornerback **MICHAEL NORRIS (#22)** saw his first game action in a year during the 2007 season opener at Stanford and had one solo tackle. Against BYU, he was credited with four tackles (three solos). He made his first career start at Utah in a dime formation and made one assisted tackle. Against Washington, he had one solo tackle and also returned two kickoffs for 43 yards. He also saw action at Oregon State.

Norris sat out the 2006 season due to a knee injury (posterior cruciate ligament) suffered in pre-season camp. He saw action in all 12 games in 2005 and made the first interception of his career in the season-opener versus San Diego State. Against Oklahoma, he recovered a fumbled punt to set up UCLA's first touchdown. Against Northwestern, he played in the nickel package and made six tackles. He was selected second-team Pac-10 All-Academic for his efforts in the classroom.

True junior safety **BRET LOCKETT (#25)** played in the secondary and on special teams in the 2007 opener at Stanford. Against BYU, he saw limited action due to a strained hamstring and did not play at Utah. He made two solo tackles and broke up a pass versus Washington. He also played at Oregon State.

In 2006, he saw action in all 13 games as a safety and on special teams. On the year, he made seven tackles and recovered a fumble. He played extensively in the 2006 opener against Utah's spread offense and was credited with two tackles. He made one tackle at Oregon, playing defense and special teams. He made two tackles at California, playing defense and special teams. He recovered a fumble in the victory over Oregon State. He played on special teams at Arizona State and played both defense and special teams versus USC and Florida State.

Lockett made his Bruin debut in the 2005 season opener at San Diego State. He saw action in all 12 games that season and recorded two tackles.

Redshirt senior safety **MATTHEW SLATER (#18)** contributed on various special teams versus Stanford in the 2007 opener. He averaged 33.0 yards on two kickoff returns and also made four tackles (three solos). Against BYU, he averaged 23.7 yards on three kickoff returns, had one tackle and forced a fumble. At Utah, he made three tackles, including a sack on which he also caused a fumble and averaged 19.0 yards on six kickoffs.

**Against Washington, he returned a kickoff 85 yards for a touchdown to give UCLA a 38-24 lead with 9:33 remaining in the game following a Husky touchdown. It was UCLA's first TD on a kickoff since Brandon Breazell returned two inside kicks for scores in the 2005 Sun Bowl. On the night, he returned three kickoffs for 127 yards (42.3 average) and made four solo tackles. He was named Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts.**

**At Oregon State, he averaged 24.3 yards on three returns, made two solo tackles and also recovered a fumble by OSU on a kickoff return.**

**On the year, Slater is averaging 26.53 yards on 17 kickoff returns (39th in the NCAA, fourth in the Pac-10). He also leads the Pac-10 in fumbles forced (0.40).**

Redshirt sophomore safety **AARON WARE (#27)** played on special teams in the 2007 opener at Stanford, recovering an onside kick attempt by the Cardinal. Against BYU, he had one tackle assist. At Utah, he played three defensive snaps and also played on special teams. He made one solo stop versus Washington. At Oregon State, Ware made two solo tackles.

In 2006, he appeared in all 13 games and was credited with four tackles. He saw his first action as a Bruin against Utah in the 2006 opener, playing on special teams, and was credited with one tackle. He made one special teams tackle at Oregon. He had one special teams tackle at California and also made one versus Oregon State.

**THE KICKERS**

Redshirt junior **AARON PEREZ (#17)** averaged 45.8 yards on six kicks versus Stanford in the 2007 opener. His longest was 52 yards and he had one downed inside the 20. Against BYU, he averaged 44.0 yards on eight kicks and put six inside the 20-yard line. Just two kicks were returned for a total of two yards. Against Utah, he averaged 37.8 yards on five punts with one inside the 20-yard line. Against Washington, he averaged 52.7 yards on three kicks with one inside the 20-yard line. At Oregon State, he averaged 40 yards on seven kicks with four inside the 20-yard line. Four were returned for a total of 16 yards.

**In five games, Perez is second in the Pac-10 and ranks 25th nationally with his average of 43.24 yards on 29 kicks with 13 inside the 20-yard line.**

In 2006, he served as the team's punter in all 13 games. He averaged 42.56 yards on 62 punts which ranked fourth in the Pac-10 and 22nd in the nation. Eighteen of his 62 kicks put opponents inside the 20-yard line.

He had a huge game in the win over USC where he averaged 48.3 yards on six kicks, including two inside the 20-yard line. His 63-yard punt on the next to last play of the game was the longest of his career and only one of his kicks was returned by the Trojans for zero yards. The 48.3-yard average was the highest single-game mark of his career.

In 2005, Perez averaged 39.9 yards (eighth in the Pac-10 on 54 kicks with 19 inside the 20-yard line. Perez made his debut as the Bruin punter in the 2005 opener at San Diego State.

Redshirt freshman **KAI FORBATH (#15)** and redshirt sophomore **JIMMY ROTSTEIN (#37)** are handling the placekicking assignments. Forbath is the field goal kicker and Rotstein kicks off.

In his debut at Stanford, **Forbath** converted all six PATs and made one of three field goals, missing from 28 and 42 yards before making his first career field goal (39 yards). Against BYU, he converted both field goal attempts (37 and 40 yards and three PATs for nine points. against Utah, he converted field goals of 45 and 52 yards. The 52-yard field goal is the longest ever by a Bruin freshman and tied for fourth on the all-time list. Against Washington, he made three (47, 39, 30 yards) of four field goal attempts and five PATs for 14 points. He was selected one of three Lou Groza Award "Stars of the Week" for his efforts versus the Huskies. At Oregon State, he made both of his field goal attempts (37, 28) and all four PATs for 10 points.

**On the year, Forbath has made 10 of 13 field goals and all 18 PATs for a team-high 48 points. He has made 10 of his last 11 field goal attempts. He ranks fourth (tied) in the NCAA and first in the Pac-10 in field goals (2.00), second in the Pac-10 in kick-scoring (9.60) and 30th (tied) in the NCAA and fourth in the Pac-10 in scoring (9.60).**

He did not see action in his first season with the Bruins in 2006. He lettered three seasons at Notre Dame HS which won three CIF championships during his career.

**Rotstein** averaged 61.6 yards on his eight kickoffs at Stanford. Against BYU, he averaged 65.7 yards on six kicks and he averaged 67.3 yards on three kicks at Utah. He averaged 58.0 yards on nine kickoffs but Washington averaged just 13.0 yards on seven returns. He averaged 55.6 yards on eight kickoffs at Oregon State and OSU averaged just 14.5 yards on eight returns with two fumbles lost. He did not see action in the 2006 season. In his collegiate debut, he converted all five PATs during the 2005 Sun Bowl contest against Northwestern.

**RED ZONE** — Against Stanford, UCLA was four of five on Red Zone opportunities, scoring four passing touchdowns for 28 points. The fifth trip ended with a missed field goal. Against BYU, UCLA was three of three for 17 points (two rushing touchdowns and one field goal). At Utah, UCLA scored a field goal on its only opportunity. Against Washington, UCLA scored on four Red Zone chances -- two touchdowns (one rushing, one passing) and two field goals -- for 20 points.

**At Oregon State, UCLA converted five of six Red Zone opportunities (three rushing touchdowns and two field goals) for 26 points. On the year, UCLA is 17 of 20 in the Red Zone with 11 touchdowns (five passing, six rushing) and six field goals for 94 points.**

In 2006, UCLA was 39 of 45 on Red Zone opportunities (86.7%), with 19 touchdowns (nine pass, 10 rush) and 20 field goals, for 192 points.

Stanford converted both of its opportunities (one passing touchdown, one field goal) for 10 points. BYU was three of four in the Red Zone with two passing touchdowns, one field goal and one fumble for 17 points. Utah scored four touchdowns (three passing, one rushing) on its four attempts for 28 points. Washington scored on all four attempts (three passing touchdowns, one field goal) for 24 points. Oregon State was one (rushing touchdown) of three on Red Zone trips for seven points. **On the year, opponents have converted 14 of 17 opportunities with 11 touchdowns (nine passing, two rushing) and three field goals for 86 points.**

In 2006, the Bruin defense allowed opponents inside the Red Zone 34 times, resulting in 27 scores -- 17 touchdowns (seven rush, 10 pass) and 10 field goals -- for 148 points (79.4%).

**TURNOVERS** — In the 2007 opener at Stanford, UCLA caused one fumble (Trey Brown) but did not convert it into points. Against BYU, Trey Brown returned an interception for a touchdown. UCLA also recovered two fumbles (T.Brown and Blake) and converted one into a field goal for a total of 10 points. Against Utah, UCLA recovered one fumble (Tom Blake) and converted it into a field goal. Against Washington, Dennis Keyes returned an interception 60 yards for a touchdowns and Rodney Van also made an interception. Against Oregon State, UCLA recovered three fumbles and made two interceptions, both by Trey Brown, and converted them into three touchdowns and 20 points. **On the year, UCLA has recovered seven fumbles and made five interceptions and converted them into 40 points.**

UCLA did not commit a turnover against Stanford. BYU made one interception and converted it into a touchdown (seven points). Utah made three interceptions and recovered two fumbles and converted them into three touchdowns and one field goal (24 points). Washington made one interception and recovered a muffed punt and converted both into touchdowns. UCLA committed three turnovers (two fumbles and one interception) at Oregon State and one fumble was returned for a touchdown. **In five games, UCLA has committed 11 turnovers (six interceptions and five fumbles) for 52 points.**

In 2006, UCLA caused 27 turnovers (13 interceptions and 14 fumbles) and converted them into 80 points. UCLA committed 23 turnovers (nine fumbles and 14 interceptions) and they were converted into just 34 points (two offensive touchdowns, two defensive touchdowns and two field goals).
