UCLA plays at ASU on Friday, Nov. 26 on FSN; 12:30 PT
 Next home game: Dec. 4 v. USC



GAME 11 — UCLA (4-6, 2-5) travels to Arizona State (4-6, 2-5) on Fri. Nov. 26 for a Pacific-10 Conference game. Kickoff is set for 12:30 p.m. Pacific time and the game will be televised across the nation by FSN with Barry Tompkins and Petros Papadakis in the booth and Rebecca Haarlow on the sideline. The UCLA ISP Radio Network and AM 570 (KLAC) will radio broadcast the contest with Chris Roberts, Matt Stevens and Wayne Cook calling the action and it will be aired nationally on SIRIUS XM (126 SIRIUS). UCLA needs to win both of its remaining games (at ASU, home vs. USC) to become bowl eligible.



ROSE BOWL: THE 29TH YEAR

The 2010 season marks the 29th year that the Rose Bowl will serve as the home of the Bruins. UCLA moved from the L.A. Coliseum in the summer of 1982 and went 6-0-1 in that first year, capping the season with a victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl game. The 2006 season-opening win against Utah was UCLA's 100th at the Rose Bowl. The Bruins own a record of 119-54-2 since moving to Pasadena, including a 3-2 record in Rose Bowl games. UCLA is 34-15 overall at home in the last seven+ years and 26-11 in the last four+ seasons (2005-10). In July of 2007, the Rose Bowl was selected the No. 1 sports venue by SI.com/SlonCampus.

THIS WAY TO THE ROSE BOWL

Free shuttle buses are available at the Parsons Engineering parking lot in downtown Pasadena (Walnut and Fair Oaks). There is a \$12.00 charge for parking at the Parsons Lot. Shuttle service begins three hours prior to kickoff and runs up to one hour after the game. The Metro Gold Line will run from downtown Los Angeles (and points further) to downtown Pasadena (approx. one block from the Parsons Lot) on game days. Gold Line patrons are encouraged to use the free shuttle from the Parsons lot to and from the Rose Bowl.

THE SERIES WITH ARIZONA STATE — UCLA owns a 16-9-1 edge in the series record with the Sun Devils. The teams have split the last four contests played, including a 23-13 Bruins win last season in the Rose Bowl. ASU won the last game played in Tempe, a 34-9 verdict, in 2008. Rick Neuheisel is 3-3 overall vs. ASU, 1-1 while at UCLA.

In last year's Bruin win in the Rose Bowl (game 11), UCLA became bowl eligible with its sixth win of the season after recording its third straight win. Alterraun Verner started the game off on a high note as he intercepted an ASU pass and returned it 68 yards for a touchdown early in the first quarter. ASU answered with a scoring pass in the last minute of the quarter to tie it up. A couple of Kai Forbath field goals sandwiched around linebacker Akeem Ayers' nine-yard fumble return handed the Bruins a 20-7 advantage at the half. After neither team scored in the third quarter, UCLA added another field goal at the start of the fourth quarter. ASU closed out the scoring on a long pass play with 11:47 remaining in the contest. In 2008, UCLA was knocked out of bowl consideration with a 34-9 setback in the desert (game 11). ASU scored four defensive touchdowns in the battle (three interception returns and a fumble return) and managed only 122 yards of total offense in the game. UCLA rang up 306 yards of offense, but failed to find the end zone.

THANKSGIVING FOR EVERYONE

On Thursday evening, the UCLA players, coaches and staff, as well as families on the road, will participate in a Thanksgiving Dinner at the team hotel. The centerpieces (approximately 40) for that dinner will be gift baskets that contain canned and non-perishable goods, as well as Safeway gift cards to be used for turkeys and other groceries. Following the team function, the baskets will be collected and donated to UMOM New Day Centers, which provides temporary housing for homeless families in the Phoenix area. UMOM will distribute the baskets to families in their program so those families may also enjoy a holiday dinner.

LOOKING AHEAD — UCLA will host USC on Sat. Dec. 4. The game will be televised by FSN beginning at 7:30 p.m. The Bruins trail in the all-time series 28-44-7. USC has won the last three games played, including a 28-7 decision in the LA Coliseum last season. UCLA's last win, 13-9, came in the 2006 contest played in the Rose Bowl.

MID-SEASON HONORS — Junior linebacker **Akeem Ayers** has been named a **Butkus Award** semifinalist (15) and a **Lott IMPACT Trophy** quarterfinalist. Junior safety **Rahim Moore** is one of 10 semifinalists for the **Thorpe Award**. Senior place kicker **Kai Forbath** is one of 20 **Groza Award** semifinalists. Sophomore punter **Jeff Locke** is an **ESPN Academic All-District-8 first-team** selection and is on the ESPN Academic All-America ballot. **Ayers** and **Moore** have been named to the **Phil Steele first-team mid-season All-America team**. Senior long snapper **Christian Yount** is on the second team.

MID-WEEK GAMES — This season, the Bruins have played three non-Saturday games - Oct. 21 at Oregon, Nov. 18 at Washington and Nov. 26 at Arizona State. Prior to this year, the last time the Bruins played a regular-season non-Saturday game was Friday, Nov. 28, 2008 at Arizona State, dropping a 34-9 decision. The Bruins also played a Monday night game that year, defeating Tennessee, 27-24 in overtime on Labor Day night (Aug. 30). Before 2008, UCLA had not played on a week night since Thurs., Sept. 30, 1993, a 52-13 victory at San Diego State. The Bruins also played at San Diego State on Thurs., Sept. 26, 1991 (won, 37-12).

A LOOK AT THE 2010 SCHEDULE — Arizona was the fifth school to be ranked in the AP poll at the time of its game versus the Bruins. The last time the Bruins played as many as five ranked opponents (at the time of the game) during the regular season was in the 2003 campaign (5--24 Colorado, 1 Oklahoma, 18 Washington, 12 Washington State, 2 USC); it met seven ranked opponents (25 Alabama, 21 Ohio State, 19 Oregon State, 10 Washington, 20 Stanford, 16 Washington State, 7 Oregon) during the 2001 slate. The combined record of UCLA's 2010 opponents was 90-64 (.584) in 2009. Eight of the schools (Texas 13-1, Houston 10-4, Oregon 10-3, USC 9-4, Arizona 8-5, Oregon St. 8-5, Cal 8-5, Stanford 8-5) won at least eight games.

FORBATH ON TARGET — Redshirt senior kicker **Kai Forbath** had connected on 40 straight field goal attempts from a distance of inside 50 yards prior to missing earlier this season from 49 yards (wide right) against Stanford (he is now 47 of 52). After missing a 47-yard attempt in game 6 at Oregon in 2008, he made his last 12 from that range in 2008, sent all 25 kicks from that range of the 2009 season (misses from 51, 52 and 51) through the uprights and was three for three this year prior to his miss against Stanford.

He has made 52 of his last 60 overall attempts. He was 28 of 31 in 2009 and No. 1 in the nation with 2.15 field goals per game. He was second with his .903 percentage (23 or more attempts).

MOORE ON INTERCEPTIONS — Junior free safety **Rahim Moore** tallied his first interception of the 2010 season against Houston and moved into a tie for fourth on the all-time school list (14). In 2009, he picked off an NCAA-leading 10 passes in 2009 (3 v. SDSU, 2 at Tennessee, 2 at Arizona, 1 vs. Washington, 1 vs. WSU, 1 vs. Temple) in 13 games. He was No. 2 on UCLA's single-season list, one shy of the school record of 11 (Carlton Gray, 1991). His 10 interceptions in '09 were the most by a player in the Football Bowl Subdivision since 2003 and he was second (tied) in the country in passes defended (1.31).

FRANKLIN ON THE RUN — Redshirt sophomore tailback **Johnathan Franklin** ranks **27th in the NCAA** and fourth in the Pac-10 with his average of 94.50 yards per game. He has rushed for over 100 yards six times in his career and had a streak of three straight games earlier this season (158-Houston/118 Texas/ 216 Washington State), the first time a Bruin had done it since Maurice Drew in 2004 (Illinois, Washington and San Diego State).

Franklin has totaled 945 yards in 10 games and is on track for a 1,000-yard season --- recent Bruin 1,000-yard rushers include 2007: Chris Markey 1,107; 2004: Maurice Jones-Drew 1,007; 2001: DeShaun Foster 1,109; 2000: DeShaun Foster 1,037.

FIRST STARTS — **Fourteen players have made their first career starts in 2010.** Five positional players made their first career starts in the 2010 season opener -- DT Justin Edison, DT David Carter, DE Damien Holmes, LB Patrick Larimore and OT Sean Sheller. In addition, DE Nate Chandler made his first start on defense. Against Houston, DE Keenan Graham became the sixth player to record his first career start this season. At Texas, WR Ricky Marvray became the seventh player to make his first start. QB Richard Brehaut became the eighth player to make his first career start vs. Washington State. At Cal, DE Owamagbe Odighizuwa became the ninth player to make the first start of his Bruin career. F-back Anthony Barr (10th player) made his first start at Oregon. WR Jerry Johnson (11th player) made his first start against Arizona. Against Oregon State, WR Randall Carrol (12th player), DT Cassius Marsh (13th player) and LB Jordan Zumwalt (14th player) made the first starts of their careers.

GAMES MISSED — Due to various reasons such as pre-season or in-season injuries, transfers from other schools, redshirts or other issues, UCLA has just 60 scholarship players available - 27 on offense, 29 on defense and four on special teams. This number includes injured players who are expected back from injury this season.

TRUE FRESHMEN — UCLA has played 10 true freshmen this season. Of those 10, four (F-back Anthony Barr, DE Owamagbe Odighizuwa, DT Cassius Marsh and LB Jordan Zumwalt) have started at least one game. Odighizuwa, Marsh and Zumwalt all started versus Oregon State, the most on defense since S Rahim More, S Tony Dye and DE Datone Jones all started the ninth game of the 2008 season. They also started at Washington.

FROSH/SOPHS — Twenty-four of the 51 Bruins who played in the opener at K-State were either freshmen or sophomores. Six more true freshmen (four v. Stanford, one v. Houston, one v. Texas) and three redshirt freshmen (one v. Stanford, one v. Texas, one v. WSU) have made their debuts since, below is the K-State list:

In 2009, thirty-six players (24 freshmen, 12 soph.) such players saw action in the 2009 season.

LAST GAME — UCLA scored first but couldn't hang on during a Thursday night contest, dropping a 24-7 decision at Washington in a game that was closer than the final score would indicate.

The Bruins trailed just 10-7 more than halfway through the fourth quarter when backup quarterback Darius Bell, playing in his first game in place of injured Richard Brehaut, threw an interception that was returned for a touchdown to make the score 17-7 with 6:22 remaining. On UCLA's ensuing possession, the Huskies picked off a Clayton Tunney pass to set up another TD with 4:24 remaining.

In the first quarter, UCLA drove 92 yards on its second possession, the final 31 yards on a touchdown run by Johnathan Franklin. Aaron Hester then picked off a Jake Locker pass but Kai Forbath could not connect on a 44-yard field goal attempt that would have made the score 10-0.

In the second quarter, Washington converted a Brehaut interception into the game-tying touchdown with Jake Locker's three-yard run capping a 61-yard drive.

Washington took a 10-7 lead on its first possession of the second half. On UCLA's ensuing possession, Brehaut sustained a helmet-to-helmet hit on a six-yard run, finished the possession and then did not return to the game with what was diagnosed as a concussion. Bell made his debut with 7:09 remaining in the quarter.

Neither team was able to score until the Husky TD on the interception with 6:22 remaining in the contest.

On the evening, Washington had 321 yards of offense, 253 on the ground and 68 in the air. Both offensive TDs came following interceptions that resulted in drives of 61 and 43 yards. Rahim Moore, Akeem Ayers and Sean Westgate each made eight tackles.

Offensively, UCLA finished with 163 yards - 108 on the ground and 55 in the air. Bell, a JC transfer, and Tunney, a walk-on transfer from UC Davis, both made their collegiate debuts in place of the injured Brehaut. Franklin led the Bruins with 53 net yards (74 gross), including one touchdown, and also made two receptions.

WORKING OVERTIME

* UCLA is 7-1 all-time in overtime, including a 27-24 win over Tennessee in the 2008 season opener.

BOWLING — The Bruins have qualified to play in a bowl game in nine of the last 10 seasons (not in 2008).

* UCLA has won seven of its last 13 home games played against AP ranked opponents with wins over Houston (2010-23rd), Tennessee (2008-18th), Oregon

(2007-9th), Cal (twice, 2005-10th, 2007-10th), USC (2006-2nd) and Oklahoma (2005-21st) and losses to ASU (2007-9th), Fresno State (2008-25th), USC (2008-5th), Oregon (2009-13th), Stanford (2010-25th) and Arizona (2010-15th).

* UCLA's 34-12 win at Texas on Sept. 25 was its first road victory over a ranked team (AP) since Sept. 29, 2001 at #19 Oregon State (38-7). UCLA's last road victory over a Top 10 school (AP) had been Oct. 10, 1998 at #10 Arizona (52-28).

ROSE BOWL ADVANTAGE

* UCLA has won 26 of the last 37 games (.703) played at home in the Rose Bowl.

* Over the last seven-plus seasons, UCLA's home record is 34-15 (.694).

* UCLA has won 20 of its last 24 (.833) non-conference matchups played in the Rose Bowl (2010: W-Houston; 2009: W-Kansas St./ W-San Diego St.; 2008: L-Fresno St. / W-Tennessee; 2007: L-Notre Dame / W-BYU; 2006: W-Rice / W-Utah; 2005: W-Oklahoma / W-Rice; 2004: W-San Diego St. / L-Okla. St.; 2003: W-San Diego St. / W-Illinois; 2002: L-Colorado / W-Colorado St.; 2001: W-Ohio St.; 2000: W-Michigan, W-Fresno St., W-Alabama; 1999: W-Fresno St. / W-Boise State; 1998: W-Texas).

ROSE BOWL CROWDS

* In 2008, UCLA averaged 72,795 fans for its seven home games. The total of 509,563 fans at the Rose Bowl set a new school record and the average of 72,795 was the third highest in school history behind 2007's 76,379 and 1998's 73,709.

TEAM NOTES

* This season, UCLA scored 30 or more points in three straight games (Houston, Texas, WSU) for the first time since 2005 - four times (47 v. Cal, 44 at WSU, 51 Oregon State, 30 at Stanford).

* The last time the Bruins had a ball carrier rush at least 30 times in a contest (Johnathan Franklin carried 30 times vs. Washington State) was in the 2007 Oregon game, 30 by Chris Markey for 91 yards.

* UCLA's three-game winning streak this season was the third of that length under head coach Rick Neuheisel. The last time UCLA won four straight games was in 2005, when it opened 8-0 en route to a 10-2 record.

* UCLA's **437 net yards rushing against Washington State** was its highest total since it ran for 446 at Oregon in a 35-0 win on Nov. 17, 1979.

* **UCLA rushed for at least 250 yards in three straight games** earlier this season. The last time that happened was in 1993 against Stanford (259), San Diego State (269) and BYU (318). The last time UCLA rushed for at least 250 in four straight contests came in the 1978 season.

* Dating back to 1990, **UCLA is 34-1 when it rushes for at least 250 yards in a game** and has won 18 in a row.

* **UCLA rushed for five touchdowns in the win over Washington State.** The last time the Bruins ran for five TDs was in 2004 at Washington.

* Texas' crowd of 101,437 on Sept. 25 is the eighth-largest crowd to watch the Bruins play a regular-season game. It was the highest in Texas school history.

* With the loss at Kansas State on Sept. 4 and the win at Texas on Sept. 25, the Bruin **non-conference road record** in the first decade of the 2000's stands at 8-6 --- 2000-none; 2001-W Alabama, W Kansas; 2002-W Oklahoma State, W San Diego State; 2003-L Colorado, L Oklahoma; 2004-W Illinois; 2005-W San Diego State; 2006-L Notre Dame; 2007-L Utah; 2008-L BYU; 2009-W Tennessee; 2010-L Kansas State, W Texas.

* UCLA is 31-5 (13-3 in last 16 games) when it **wins the turnover battle** over the past seven-plus seasons. It is 1-0 this season (W at Texas) and was 4-2 (W at Tenn., W at WSU, W v. ASU, L at Stanford, L at Arizona, W v. Temple) in 2009.

* It is 19-43 when it ties or **loses the turnover battle** over the last seven-plus seasons, including 3-6 (W-v. OSU, WSU, Houston; L-v. Washington, Arizona, Oregon, Cal, Stanford, Kansas State) in 2010.

* Over the last seven-plus seasons, UCLA is 27-2 when it scores at **least 30 points** in a game and 14-1 when it scores 40 or more (13 in a row).

* Over the last seven-plus seasons, the Bruins are 30-3 when they hold the opponent **under 20** points, and had a 16-game streak snapped when they lost the Las Vegas Bowl, 17-16, in 2007.

* UCLA limited Kansas State to 64 yards passing in the opener and Cal to 83 yards and Washington to 68. In 2009, it held two opponents to **less than 100 yards passing**, Tennessee-93, Oregon-82. Washington's 39 yards in 2008 were the fewest allowed by the Bruin defense since Sept. 4, 2004, when the Bruins held Oklahoma State to 23 yards in the air. UCLA held three opponents (Oregon 42, Stanford 51, Washington 39) under 100 yards passing in 2008.

*The Bruin defense has held 21 opponents (16-5 record) over the last four-plus seasons to **less than 100 yards of rushing offense**. This season, it held Texas to 85 in the 34-12 win in Austin and Washington State to 73 yards. In 2009, it held SDSU to 39 net rushing yards, Kansas St. to 69 and Wash. St. to 73. In 2008, it limited three opponents to less than 100 yards on the ground (26-Wash. St., 96-Wash., 21-Ariz. St.). It held six opponents to under the century mark in 2007 (52-Stanford, 44-BYU, 46-Notre Dame, 67-Cal, 43-Oregon, 34-BYU bowl). In 2006, the Bruin defense limited seven opponents to less than 100 yards rushing (Rice-53, Wash.-49, Stanford-49, Arizona-minus 13, Notre Dame-51, Oregon St.-85, USC-55).

*The Bruin defense has limited **opponents to less than 300 yards** of offense in 21 contests (17-4 record) over the last four-plus seasons. This season, it held Oregon State to 267 yards. In 2009, it held SDSU to 277 total yards, Tennessee-208, Kansas St.-268, Wash. St. -181 and Temple-282. In 2008, it kept three teams to under 300 yards of offense (Wash. St.-177, Wash.-133, Ariz. St.-122). It held five opponents short of 300 in 2007 (Oregon St.-248, Notre Dame-140, Cal-299, Oregon-148, BYU bowl-265). In 2006, the Bruins held seven opponents under 300 (Utah-287, Rice-184, Wash.-249, Stanford-166, Arizona-222, Oregon St.-260, Ariz. St. -264).

* UCLA **passed for over 300 yards in three straight games (OSU-323, Wash.-371, WSU-324) in 2009**. The last time it did that was in 1982 (five straight).

* In a two-game stretch in 2009 (WSU and ASU), UCLA **forced 10 turnovers** (four at WSU, six vs. ASU) and **committed just one** (fumble at WSU). UCLA converted 10 of the takeaways into six scores (four touchdowns, two field goals) and forced a punt following its only turnover.

* UCLA's **565 yards of total offense** versus Washington State in 2010 was its highest total since gaining 624 at Stanford in the 2007 season opener.

* UCLA's **371 yards passing** versus Washington in 2009 was its highest total since throwing for 510 versus Arizona State on Nov. 12, 2005.

*UCLA's 27 passing yards at Texas was its fewest since the 1978 Oregon State game, when it had zero yards in a 15-13 loss. The last time the Bruins won a game with fewer passing yards (18) was the 1978 California game, a 45-0 win in Berkeley.

*UCLA's 26 rushing yards at Cal this season is the lowest total since running for 16 at Cal in 2008. UCLA's 144 yards at Cal this year was its lowest total since the 2001 USC game (114).

* The win at Tennessee in 2009 improved UCLA's record in the decade of the 2000's to 4-0 versus teams from the SEC. The Bruins swept a series with Alabama, winning at home in 2000 and in Tuscaloosa, AL in 2001. The 2009 win in Knoxville, TN completed a sweep of the Vols.

* Arizona State's 122 yards **total offense** in 2008 was UCLA's best defensive effort since holding Arkansas to 42 net yards in the 1989 Cotton Bowl.

* Arizona State's 21 **net yards rushing** in the 2008 contest was the lowest total by a Bruin opponent since UCLA held Arizona to minus-13 yards rushing in 2006.

RANKING THE KICKER — Senior **Kai Forbath** ranks second on the all-time school list for field goals with 83 (**school record John Lee, 1982-85--- 85; NCAA record is 87**). Forbath is third on the all-time Bruin scoring list with 345 points, 45 shy of Lee's record (390).

Forbath has kicked two or more field goals in 30 contests to set a **new NCAA record**. Kai has kicked three or more field goals in 13 games, **tying the NCAA mark** held by Luis Zendejas of Arizona State, 1981-84. Forbath is just four shy of the NCAA career field goal record of 87 held by Billy Bennett of Georgia, 2000-03. Last season, he tied the NCAA record (held by seven others, including UCLA's John Lee, who converted 16 of 16 kicks in 1984) for best percentage made from inside of 40 yards, when he connected on 19 of 19.

COACHING MOVES — The Bruins welcome one new assistant coach to the 2010 staff of third-year head coach Rick Neuheisel. **Clark Lea** who served as linebackers coach last season, while a second-year graduate assistant, moves into a full-time position for the upcoming campaign.

The Bruins also added two new graduate assistants in **Daronte' Jones** (defense) and **Brian Sheppard** (offense). Jones came to UCLA after five seasons assistant head coach at Bowie (MD) State University. Sheppard, the son of Cincinnati Bengal assistant coach (former Long Beach State head coach) Mike Sheppard, spent the last three seasons as a grad. assistant at New Mexico State.

AT THE STARTING LINE — Junior free safety **Rahim Moore** tops the team with 35 career starts. Junior receiver **Taylor Embree** (29), junior linebacker **Akeem Ayers** (26), junior offensive lineman **Mike Harris** (26), junior safety **Tony Dye** (24) and junior tight end **Cory Harkey** (21) are the only other Bruin position players with at least 20 career starts.

Junior FS **Rahim Moore** has the longest starting streak of any position player with 35 straight. LB **Akeem Ayers** and S **Tony Dye** are next with 23.

Coach **Rick Neuheisel entered the current season with** a head coaching record of 37-22 against the opponents on the 2010 UCLA schedule. (Arizona 4-2, Arizona State 3-3, Cal 3-3, Houston 0-0, Oregon 4-3, OSU 3-3, Stanford 4-1, Texas 2-1, USC 1-3, Washington 3-0, WSU 7-0, K-State 3-3). He was 32-18 as a head coach against Pac-10 teams, other than UCLA.

Offensive coordinator **Norm Chow** has worked with several of the NCAA's all-time career passing efficiency leaders. He has mentored six quarterbacks selected in the first-round of the NFL draft (Carson Palmer-1st pick in 2003 draft, Matt Leinart-10th pick of 2006 draft, Philip Rivers-4th pick of 2004 draft, Steve Young-1st pick of 1984 NFL supplemental draft, Jim McMahon-5th pick of 1982 draft, Marc Wilson-15th pick of 1980 draft).

Wide receivers coach **Reggie Moore** is in his third season with the Bruins. Moore returned home to UCLA where he played receiver from 1987-90. He caught balls from two of the top quarterbacks in Bruin history, Troy Aikman and Tommy Maddox. Moore entered the 2010 season ranked No. 18 on UCLA's all-time receptions list with 92 and receiving yards list with 1,483.

Sophomore wide receiver **Nelson Rosario (#83)** is a two-sport performer who placed sixth in the long jump at the 2010 Pac-10 Outdoor Track Championships. He equaled his lifetime best in the long jump with a 25-0 leap in the USC dual meet this season. He cleared 6-10.25 in the high jump at the Oregon dual for another lifetime best mark.

NUMBER CHANGES — The following players have changed their numbers from last season's media guide for the 2010 season: #4 QB **Kevin Prince** was #14; #10 **Ricky Marvray** was #11; #27 **Jeff Dickmann** was #24; #55 **Todd Golper** was #18.

NEW JERSEYS — The new **UCLA TECHFIT** jersey from adidas made its debut at Oregon. It is a complete reconstruction of the standard uniform with multiple innovations to reduce the weight of the jersey by 30 percent. These technologies include a streamlined fit, new fabric, reduced seams and an ultra lightweight name and numbering system. In addition, the UCLA TECHFIT jersey keeps players cool with integrated ventilation zones and moisture management fabric. Reduced seams and a restriction-free, high-stretch collar design increases range of motion to support player agility and speed.

CROSS TO THE HALL — Former UCLA and NFL football standout **Randy Cross** has been selected for induction into the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame. Cross lined up at both center and guard for UCLA in the 1973-74-75 seasons for coaches Pepper Rodgers ('73) and Dick Vermeil ('74-75). He started 28 of his 34 career games for the Bruins, including his final 23 straight, and was named a first-team All-American in 1975. UCLA posted a record of 24-7-3 during his career. Cross was a member of the 1976 UCLA Rose Bowl team that defeated top-ranked Ohio State in Pasadena by a score of 23-10.

Cross went on to be selected in the second round of the 1976 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. He played guard and center for 13 seasons with San Francisco, from 1976-88, and was on teams which captured the 1982, 1985 and 1989 Super Bowl Championship. Cross was selected to three Pro Bowls (1982, 82, 84) in his career and earned All-Pro honors in six seasons.

Cross will be honored at an induction dinner on Dec. 7, 2010 in New York City. The induction ceremony will be held at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, IN in the summer of 2011.

HEAD COACH



RICK NEUHEISEL

- *Owns a record of 81-50 in 10+ years as collegiate head coach
- *Led teams to three Top 10 finishes and eight bowl games
- *Coached three seasons in the National Football League

Rick Neuheisel, who quarterbacked UCLA to victory in the 1984 Rose Bowl and who owns a record of 81-50 as a collegiate head coach, concluded his second season as his alma mater's head football coach in 2009 with a berth in the EagleBank Bowl.

The energetic and personable Neuheisel returned to the collegiate ranks in January of 2008 after spending the previous three seasons in the NFL. In his eight years as a college head coach at the University of Colorado and the University of Washington, he fashioned a record of 66-30, winning at least 10 games on three occasions and finishing in the Top 10 three times, while leading his teams to seven bowl games. He was also recognized as one of the nation's top recruiters during his college coaching days.

Neuheisel spent the 2005-2007 as an assistant coach for the NFL's Baltimore Ravens. He served as quarterbacks coach in 2005 and 2006 and in January of 2007, was promoted to offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach.

During his four seasons (1999-2002) as head coach at the University of Washington, Neuheisel led the Huskies to a record of 33-16 (.673) and four bowl games (one Rose Bowl, two Holiday Bowls and one Sun Bowl). His Pac-10 record was 23-9 (.719) and Washington won one league title and finished second twice in those four seasons.

In 2000, Neuheisel led the Huskies to an 11-1 record, a first-place finish in the Pac-10 and a victory in the 2001 Rose Bowl.

During his four seasons (1995-98) as head coach at the University of Colorado, Neuheisel won 33 of 47 games (.702), including all three bowl appearances. His 20-4 record in his first two seasons at Colorado were the fifth-most wins at the time for a first-time head coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision (Division IA).

Neuheisel spent the 1994 season as a Colorado assistant coach under Bill McCartney after going to CU from UCLA.

Neuheisel spent six seasons (1988-93) as an assistant coach at his alma mater. During his final four years he tutored the wide receivers, helping to develop some of UCLA's all-time great receivers, such as J.J. Stokes, Kevin Jordan and Sean LaChapelle.

Neuheisel joined the UCLA staff full-time in 1988 and coached quarterbacks for two seasons, including NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Troy Aikman's senior year (1988). Aikman earned consensus All-America honors and finished third in the Heisman Trophy race, completing a school-record 228 passes (since broken) for 2,771 yards, a .644 percentage and a school-record 24 touchdowns (since broken). Aikman was the No. 1 selection in the 1989 NFL Draft.

In 1986, he served as a volunteer coach and his major assignment was to teach the offense to a transfer from Oklahoma who had to sit out the 1986 season – Aikman.

Neuheisel began his collegiate career at UCLA (1979-83) as a walk-on, holding for place kicker John Lee, and earned the starting quarterback job during his senior season (1983). In his final game as a Bruin, he overcame food poisoning to lead UCLA to a 45-9 victory against Illinois in the 1984 Rose Bowl. He was named the game's MVP after throwing for 298 yards and four touchdowns.

BRUIN ALL-AMERICANS — In the last 10 seasons (2000-2009), UCLA has produced **eight consensus All-Americans** (2000, WR Freddie Mitchell; 2001, LB Robert Thomas; 2003 DE Dave Ball; 2005 TE Mercedes Lewis and KR Maurice Drew; 2006 DE Justin Hickman and PK Justin Medlock; 2009 PK Kai Forbath). Only one other school (USC) in the Pac-10 has produced more and UCLA's total is three ahead of third-place California. UCLA has produced 17 consensus All-America selections in the last 18 years (1992-2009), just four fewer than USC and eight more than No. 3 Arizona.

UCLA has produced a total of 38 consensus All-America selections (34 players) in school history. That total ranks 15th among all Football Bowl Subdivision schools and second in the Pac-10.

QB FIRST STARTS — Nine of the last 12 quarterbacks to start a game for the Bruins have helped to lead the team to victory in their initial contest. Against Washington State, **Richard Brehaut** (So.) helped the Bruins to a 42-28 victory. Kevin Prince (Fr.R) helped orchestrate a 33-14 victory in 2009 against San Diego State. In 2008, Kevin Craft (Jr.R) engineered a 27-24 overtime win over Tennessee. In 2006, Ben Olson (So.R) helped lead the Bruins past Utah 31-10. Drew Olson (Fr.) was at the helm of a 34-24 Bruin win in Seattle in 2002. Also in 2002, the Bruins emerged with a 28-18 win over Stanford behind Matt Moore (Fr.). In 2001, Scott McEwan (Sr.R) piloted the Bruins to a 52-42 win over ASU. In 1999, Cory Paus (Fr.R) won his first start, against Fresno State, 35-21. The Bruins won the 1999 season-opener with Drew Bennett (Jr.R) under center in a 38-7 decision over Boise State.

On the other side of the ledger, the Bruins came up on the short end of a 24-20 score in Ossar Rasshan's (So. R) 2007 debut against Arizona State. Oregon bested the Bruins, 30-20, in Eugene in Patrick Cowan's (So.R) first start in 2006. Ryan McCann (Fr.R) was under center in USC's 17-7 win over the Bruins in the Coliseum in 1999.

ACADEMICS — Sophomore **Jeff Locke** has been voted the punter for the **ESPN Academic All-District 8 team**. Locke has earned a 3.57 gpa in his Economics major and has been listed on the Athletics Director's honor roll at UCLA following five academic quarters. Locke's name will now be placed on the national ballot with the Academic All-America team to be announced on Nov. 23.

All 17 of the seniors on the 2010 team are **scheduled to graduate** by the end of the school year and 11 are scheduled to graduate at the end of the current quarter. Of the 22 seniors on the 2009 team, 17 have already graduated and two more are scheduled to complete requirements at the end of the current quarter.

Senior punter/holder **Danny Rees** is a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy and a National Football Foundation Post-Graduate Scholarship.

Twenty-one Bruins were named to the Athletic Director's Academic Honor Roll for the 2010 Spring Quarter --- DB **Andrew Abbott**, LB **Luc Barbosa**, QB **Richard Brehaut**, RB **Derrick Coleman**, QB **Nick Crissman**, DB **Jeff Dickman**, WR **Taylor Embree**, PK **Kai Forbath**, LB **Todd Golper**, RB **Frank Guzman**, OL **Austin Hill**, DL **Andy Keane**, OL **Micah Kia**, LB **Glenn Love**, RB **Andy Magee**, DB **Marlon Pollard**, QB **Kevin Prince**, H/P **Danny Rees**, OL **Darius Savage**, WR **Josh Smith**, TE **Andrew Yelich**.

Six Bruins have been named to the 2010 Pac-10 All-Academic team. Sophomore punter **Jeff Locke** was named to the first team for the second consecutive year. He was joined on the first team by senior holder **Danny Rees**. Sophomore defensive end **Damien Holmes** was named to the second team for the second straight year. Sophomore quarterback **Kevin Prince**, senior linebacker/special teamer **Mike Schmitt** and junior linebacker **Sean Westgate** earned honorable mention.

Eleven Bruins were named to the 2009 Pac-10 All-Academic team (returning players are in bold). Punter **Jeff Locke** was selected to the first team. Earning second-team honors were graduating tight end Logan Paulsen, defensive end **Damien Holmes** and cornerback Alterraun Verner. Players earning honorable mention honors were offensive lineman Nick Ekbatani, wide receiver Gavin Ketchum, linebacker/special teams performer **Patrick Larimore**, tight end Ryan Moya, holder **Danny Rees**, fullback Trevor Theriot and linebacker/special teams performer **Sean Westgate**.

The UCLA football program has produced 17 NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners, 16 first-team Academic All-Americans (27 overall), eight National Football Foundation Hall of Fame Post-Graduate Scholarship recipients, two Rhodes Scholars and three members of the Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

THE DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE — Redshirt senior defensive tackle **DAVID CARTER (#85)** is **second on the team with his 3.5 sacks and is 19th in the Pac-10**. He is fourth on the team with his 4.5 tackles for loss. He made his first career start versus Kansas State and had five tackles, 0.5 sacks. Carter made four stops, one for loss, vs. Stanford and one tackle versus Houston. He had two tackles at Texas. Against WSU, he made five tackles, including 3.0 sacks for 18 yards. The senior made four stops at Cal but did not have any at Oregon. Against Arizona, he made a career-best eight tackles and forced one fumble. He was not credited with a stop against OSU. He collected six tackles at Washington.

Carter made a contribution as a key reserve on the line in all 13 games during 2009. He had a big game at Tennessee, making four tackles, 1.0 sacks, and occupied the linemen so the linebackers could make a stop on fourth-and-goal at the two-yard line to preserve the victory. He was named co-defensive winner of UCLA's Captain Don Brown Memorial Award for Most Improved Player.

DID YOU KNOW...

Three Bruin coaches and 10 players, including 2010 inductee Randy Cross and 2008 inductee Troy Aikman, are enshrined in the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

Coach Rick Neuheisel still holds the UCLA single season record for completion percentage. Neuheisel completed 185 of 267 passes (69.3%) for 2,245 yards in the 1983 season. He set a then-NCAA record when he completed 25 of 27 passes (92.6%) in a game that season against Washington.

UCLA has 13 former players currently working in the broadcast media - Troy Aikman, Charles Arbuckle, Wayne Cook, Randy Cross, Terry Donahue, Danny Farmer, David Norrie, Ron Pitts, Tom Ramsey, Matt Stevens, J.J. Stokes, Rick Walker, James Washington.

Twenty-two UCLA players have been selected to CoSIDA Academic All-America teams a total of 27 times. Offensive lineman Chris Joseph (2006, 2007) and wide receiver Cormac Carney (1981, 1982) were two-time first-team selections.

UCLA is the only school to produce six quarterbacks — Troy Aikman, Steve Bono, Billy Kilmer, Tommy Maddox, Tom Ramsey, Jay Schroeder — to have played that position on a Super Bowl team.

During the last 28 years (including 2009), UCLA has been ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 on 12 occasions, second only to USC (16) among Pac-10 schools. Washington is next with 10 rankings.

The selection of tight end Mercedes Lewis by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the first round of the 2006 NFL draft marked the 29th time a UCLA player has been taken in round one.

Quarterback Drew Olson finished eighth in the 2005 Heisman Trophy balloting. It marked the 21st time that a Bruin has finished in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy voting.

UCLA has had at least one former player participate in 28 of the last 31 Super Bowl games.

The only three-time consensus All-Americans in Pac-10 history are Bruins (LB Jerry Robinson and S Kenny Easley).

In the decade of the 2000's, UCLA has had 12 finalists / winners of the National player awards --- 2009 Kai Forbath - Groza Award winner; 2005 Mercedes Lewis-Mackey Award winner; 2004 M. Lewis, Mackey finalist; 2002 Mike Seidman-Mackey finalist; 2004 Chris Kluwe-Ray Guy Award finalist; 2003 Dave Ball-Bronco Nagurski Award finalist; 2001 Robert Thomas-Dick Butkus Award finalist; 2000 Freddie Mitchell-Fred Biletnikoff Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Vince Lombardi Award finalist; 2006 Justin Hickman-Ted Hendricks Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Ted Hendricks Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Chevrolet National Defensive Player of the Year Award.

On May 13, 2007 UCLA became the first school in history to win 100 NCAA team championships. The Bruins currently have 106 NCAA titles to their credit (winning women's gymnastics and softball titles in 2010).

UCLA ON THE RADIO

The 2010 season is UCLA's 14th with Clear Channel and the games are aired on AM 570 KLAC in Southern California. The games are produced by ISP, UCLA's corporate and media-rights holder. The Los Angeles all-sports station's broadcast includes a two-hour pre-game show (one hour local, one hour network) and a post-game show. Chris Roberts, a four-time Golden Mike Award winner, is in his 19th season as the voice of the Bruins. Former Bruin quarterback Matt Stevens is in his 14th year on the broadcast team and his 10th as the analyst in the booth. Former Bruin quarterback Wayne Cook is in his ninth season as sideline reporter.

Stevens, Cook and David Vassegh host the hour local pre-game show while Roberts, Stevens and Cook host the hour network pre-game and network post-game shows. Vassegh also hosts a post-game call-in show.

AM 570 KLAC also provides ancillary programming, including head coach and player interviews during game weeks. The half-hour Bruin Report, which highlights UCLA athletics, airs each Saturday at 6:00 am on KLAC and is available at www.uclabruins.com.

UCLA ISP network affiliates include KWDJ 1360 AM -Ridgecrest, KCTC 1320 AM in Sacramento. UCLA ISP Sports Network games are also available nationally through an agreement with Sirius XM Satellite Radio, the Official Satellite Radio Partner of UCLA Athletics.

Games can also be heard via the internet at uclabruins.com (a UCLA All-Access pass is needed). The home games are also broadcast in Spanish on www.uclabruins.com with Armando Aguayo and Mario Amaya.

LINEBACKER — Redshirt junior **AKEEM AYERS (#10)**, one of the best and most versatile defensive players in the nation, is a **Butkus Award semifinalist, a Lott IMPACT Trophy quarterfinalist and a Phil Steele Mid-Season All-American**. He is also on the Nagurski Trophy, Bednarik Award and Rotary Lombardi Award pre-season watch lists.

Ayers is currently **fourth on the team with 59 tackles, first with 4.0 sacks and tied for first with 9.5 tackles for loss and two interceptions**. He is T-22nd in the Pac-10 in tackles (5.90), T-12th in interceptions (0.20), T-ninth (tied) in fumbles forced (0.20), T-fifth (tied) in fumbles recovered (0.20), T-19th (tied) in passes defended (0.60), T-eighth in tackles for loss (0.95) and T-16th in sacks (0.40).

In the opener at Kansas State, he recorded a career-high 11 tackles, including a sack. He also recovered a fumble and tipped a pass. Against Stanford, he made seven tackles, 0.5 for loss, and broke up a pass. Against Houston, he made five tackles, two for loss. He also intercepted a pass at the goal line and returned it 77 yards late in the first half. At Texas, playing both linebacker and end, he made six tackles, including a sack and a second stop for loss. He caused a fumble with his sack and made his second interception of the year. For his performance in the Palouse, Ayers earned his first Pac-10 Player of the Week honors. In the win over Arizona State, he led the team with eight tackles, 2.0 sacks and a third tackle for loss. He also returned a fumble nine yards for his second touchdown of the year, and forced two fumbles. Against USC, he led the Bruins with nine tackles, 2.5 for loss. SECONDARY — True junior free safety **RAHIM MOORE (#3)**, one of 10 Thorpe Award semifinalists and a Phil Steele Mid-Season All-American, was named to the Nagurski Trophy, Lott Trophy, Bednarik Award and Thorpe Award pre-season watch lists after an honor-filled '09 season.

Moore is **third on the squad** with 65 tackles and 16th in the Pac-10 (6.50 ave). He made seven tackles in the opener at Kansas State. Against Stanford, he made seven stops and broke up a pass. In the win over Houston, he collected the 14th interception of his career (**T-4th on UCLA's career list**). His pick led to a Bruin touchdown. At Texas, he totaled eight tackles, one for loss, and broke up a pass. Versus WSU, he had two tackles and was involved in the fourth-down goalline stop that kept the score 28-28 and changed the momentum of the game. At Cal, he tied his career high with nine tackles. He shared the team lead at Oregon with eight stops. Against Arizona, he matched his career high with nine tackles, one for loss, and also recovered a fumble. He made four stops in versus Oregon State. At Washington, he tied for the team lead with eight tackles.

Moore started all 13 games in 2009 and was selected first-team All-America by Scout.com and second-team by the Walter Camp Football Foundation, AP, Rivals.com and Si.com. He was named first-team All-Pac-10 by the league's coaches. *Sporting News* selected him the Pac-10 Defensive MVP.

Moore **led the nation** with 10 interceptions (0.77 avg.) in 2009, No. 2 on UCLA's single-season list. He ranked second (tied) in the NCAA and first in the Pac-10 in passes defended (1.3). The last Bruin to make more interceptions was Carlton Gray, who set the school record, with 11, in 1991. No player in the Football Bowl Subdivision had made 10 interceptions in a season since 2003. He was a high honorable mention for the 2009 Thorpe Award.

Moore made three interceptions in the 2009 opener against SDSU to tie the UCLA single-game record -- Ron Carver (Texas 1971), Craig Rutledge (Oregon St. 1986) and Darryl Henley (Oregon St. 1986). At Tennessee, he made two picks and had a third erased by penalty. At Arizona, he made two interceptions to help keep the Wildcats off the scoreboard, one at the seven-yard line and the other at the one. Versus Washington, he made his eighth interception, with 54 seconds remaining in the contest, to help clinch the victory. At Washington State, he made his ninth pick. In the EagleBank Bowl win over Temple, he grabbed his 10th interception.

THE KICKERS

Senior KAI FORBATH (#25), winner of the **2009 Lou Groza Award** and a **2010 semifinalist**, has converted 52 of his last 60 field goals (.867) and 47 of his last 52 field goal attempts (.904) inside 50 yards. His .838 percentage is second in school history among players with at least 20 career field goals (John Lee holds the current record at .850).

He ranks **second in school history** with 83 field goals (**two shy of John Lee's school record of 85**) and No. 3 in career scoring with 345 points in 48 games. He is also just **four field goals shy of the NCAA career record (87)** held by Georgia's Billy Bennett (2000-03). His 83 field goals rank first among active Football Bowl Subdivision players.

Redshirt sophomore cornerback **AARON HESTER (#21)** started and made a career-high six tackles, one for loss, in the opener at Kansas State. He made two stops and broke up a pass versus Stanford. Against Houston, he was credited with three tackles. He started at Texas. In the win over WSU, he made five tackles and was credited with the stop on fourth-down on the Bruins' fourth-quarter goalline stand. He made one tackle at Cal. Redshirt sophomore cornerback **ANDREW ABBOTT (#26)**, who was awarded a scholarship during fall camp (Aug. 24), saw action off the bench at Kansas State. He recorded four tackles against Stanford. Versus Houston, he started in the nickel package and made a career-high seven tackles, two for loss. At Texas, he made a tackle and recovered a fumbled kickoff. He started in the nickel against WSU and made two tackles. He made three tackles at Cal. He totaled four tackles in a starting role at Oregon. He started against Arizona and made five stops. He started and made four stops in the Oregon State win. He played off the bench at Washington and made three tackles.

Abbott appeared in all 13 games in 2009. He made his debut as the nickel back versus SDSU. In the win over Arizona State, he started for the first time in his career as UCLA opened in a nickel package. He was co-defensive winner of UCLA's John Boncheff Jr. Memorial Award for Rookie of the Year.

Forbath enjoyed a record-setting day in the opener at Kansas State. He converted field goals of 44, 35 and 42 yards, despite being questionable (groin) for the game, and **tied two NCAA records in the process** - most career games with at least two field goals (27) and most career games of at least three field goals (13). Against Stanford, he missed from 49 yards - his only attempt of the night - to snap a streak of 40 consecutive field goals inside 50 yards. Against Houston, he converted his only field goal attempt (42) and all four PATs for seven points. At Texas, he kicked two field goals to set a new NCAA record. He missed his first attempt from 49 yards in the first quarter but converted from 39 and 49 yards in the second quarter. He added four PATs for 10 points. Versus WSU, he converted field goal attempts of 33 and 20 yards and added four PATs. He did not attempt a field goal and had a PAT at Cal. He made his two field goal attempts (25, 48) at Oregon. **His NCAA record** for most career games with two or more field goals is now 30 games. Against Arizona, he made all three PATs but did not have a field goal attempt. Against Oregon State, Forbath **kicked a 51-yard game-winning field goal with no time left on the clock** to lift the Bruins to a 17-14 victory. Just over one minute earlier, he missed a 46-yard attempt that would have given UCLA a lead with 1:17 remaining. He also missed from 49 yards in the second quarter. At Washington, he made his only PAT and missed a 44-yard field goal attempt.

Forbath, last season's **consensus All-America** kicker, made 28 of 31 field goals in 2009. He made all 25 attempts from inside 50 yards. He was **first in the NCAA and led the Pac-10** in field goals per game (2.15). His field goal percentage of .903 set a new UCLA record and was the second-highest nationally among players with 23 or more attempts. His 28 field goals rank No. 2 (tied) on UCLA's single-season list.

Forbath is the first UCLA player to record five field goals of at least 50 yards in a season (2007), including a freshman-best 54-yarder (third-longest in school history) versus Oregon. In the 2007 Las Vegas Bowl against BYU, he became the second player in school history to kick two field goals of at least 50 yards in the same game (Justin Medlock did it at Oregon in 2004).

Redshirt sophomore punter **JEFF LOCKE (#18)** is having an All-America caliber season. He has been named to the "watch list" for the 2010 Ray Guy Award. He is **second in the Pac-10 and fifth in the NCAA** with his average of 45.81 yards per punt. *His season average would rank No. 2 in UCLA history, as would his career average of 44.56.* UCLA is also fifth as a team in net punting (40.79). He has been named the punter on the **ESPN Academic All-District 8** team and the **Pac-10 All-Academic** first team.

Locke averaged 45.7 yards on six kicks at Kansas State. Three punts put the Wildcats inside the 20-yard line, including the three- and five-yard lines, and three traveled at least 50 yards (long 60). He averaged 68.6 yards on five kickoffs with just one return (23). Against Stanford, he averaged 43.2 yards on four kicks (long 47). He placed one kick inside the 20 and had two returned (2).

Against Houston, he averaged 46.8 yards on four kicks (long 55), no touchbacks and one kick inside the 20. Two punts were returned (4). He also averaged 64.7 yards on six kickoffs that were returned for less than 19 yards per kick. At Texas, he averaged 46.8 yards on four punts with one inside the 20 (Texas fumbled it and UCLA recovered to set up the first Bruin touchdown). The other three were not returned. He also averaged 68.3 yards on seven kickoffs with two touchbacks. In the win over WSU, he averaged 48.0 yards on two punts (neither was returned). He also averaged 68.4 yards on eight kickoffs with two touchbacks.

At Cal, he averaged 48.3 yards on a career-high nine punts (his 435 yards were also a career high). He placed three inside-the-20, long of 63 yards. He averaged 69.5 yards on his two kickoffs. At Oregon, Locke averaged 45.5 yards on four kicks, with two inside the twenty. He averaged 67.3 yards on three kickoffs. Against Arizona, he averaged 44.2 yards on six punts with two inside the 20-yard line. In the win over OSU, he averaged 46.0 yards on four kicks, with two inside the 20 (long 53). One of his kicks pinned the Beavers at their own two-yard line late in the game --- they netted one yard on three snaps before having to punt from the three-yard line. At Washington, he tied his career high with nine punts, averaging 44.3 yards with a long of 58 and two inside the 20-yard line. Washington had just 29 yards on six returns.

Locke was a **semifinalist (only freshman) for the Guy Award in 2009**, which is presented to the nation's top punter. He was selected second-team All-Pac-10 by the league's coaches and was a **first-team Pac-10 All-Academic** selection. He was named first-team Freshman All-America by Collegefootballnews.com and second-team by *Phil Steele Publications*. Steele also selected him first-team All-Pac-10 and he made *Sporting News'* Pac-10 All-Freshman team.

He averaged 43.63 yards (16th in the NCAA and second in the Pac-10) on 70 punts with 20 inside the 20-yard line and 12 of 50+ yards in 2009. UCLA was 20th na-

tionally and first in the Pac-10 in net punting (37.76). Only 23 kicks were returned (170 yds.). Locke had 20 touchbacks on kickoffs, most in the Pac-10.

THE OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS — True sophomore **RICHARD BREHAUT (#12)** did not see action in the season-opener at Kansas State. He came off the bench versus Stanford and completed five of nine passes for 42 yards with one interception. He did not play versus Houston or Texas.

Brehaut made his first career start in the win over Washington State. On the afternoon, he completed 12 of 23 passes for 128 yards and was not sacked nor intercepted. On the day, he engineered seven scoring drives - five tds and two fgs. He also scored the go-ahead touchdown on a one-yard run at the end of a 99-yard drive. All five touchdown drives covered at least 67 yards and four were 70+.

He came of the bench late in the Cal game and completed two of six passes for 19 yards. At Oregon, he started his first road contest and completed 16 of 23 passes for 159 yards -- all career highs or tied career highs (at the time) -- and one interception. He also ran for a six-yard score.

Against Arizona, he completed 13 of 27 passes for a career-high 228 yards and the first two touchdown passes of his career. His 68-yard scoring pass to Randall Carroll on UCLA's first second-half possession was the team's longest scoring pass since Ben Olson and Brandon Breazell hooked up on a 69-yard scoring play versus Oregon State in 2007. Brehaut also connected on a 49-yard touchdown pass with Josh Smith on a flea-flicker play.

In the win over Oregon State, Brehaut completed 13 of 19 passes for 127 yards (one interception) and ran 18 times for 61 yards (86 gross) and one touchdown. His longest run was 21 yards, UCLA's longest of the day. He directed touchdown drives of 72 and 70 yards. UCLA started its final possession on its own 17-yard line with 48 seconds remaining and Brehaut moved the Bruins 49 yards, setting up Kai Forbath's game-winning field goal from the OSU 34-yard line with one second remaining. He completed four of six passes for 37 yards on that drive.

At Washington, he directed a 92-yard scoring drive in the first quarter but left the game in the third quarter due to a concussion following a helmet-to-helmet hit. On the evening, he completed five of 14 passes for 42 yards and one interception and ran for 13 yards on three carries.

On the year, Brehaut has completed 66 of 121 yards (54.5%) for 745 yards, two touchdowns and five interceptions in his seven games (five starts).

Brehaut saw action in six games off the bench in 2009. He played the final possession of the San Diego State game, completing both pass attempts for 39 yards. Brehaut came off the bench (4Q) versus Oregon and completed five of 10 passes for 64 yards with one interception (tip). He was sacked four times. At Arizona, he (4Q) completed two of three passes for 11 yards. He played one series (2Q) at Oregon State. He went into the Washington game after Kevin Prince was injured, but lost a fumble in the red zone. He played a (4Q) series at Washington State and completed both pass attempts (10).

Brehaut enrolled for the 2009 Spring Quarter and got a jump on learning the position in Spring Practice.

True sophomore **DARIUS BELL (#11)** made his debut in the third quarter at Washington following an injury to Richard Brehaut. He threw three passes and one was intercepted and returned 28 yards for a touchdown to make the score 17-7 with 6:22 remaining in the game.

Bell joined the Bruin team in time for fall practices. He played last season at City College of San Francisco and led the team to a 9-1 record and a share of first place in the NorCal Conference. Bell completed 143 of 247 passes for 1,982 yards and 21 touchdowns with five interceptions. He posted a 149.31 pass efficiency rating which placed him fourth on the Northern California Football Association list. He also rushed 139 times for 751 yards and 11 scores.

Redshirt junior walk-on **CLAYTON TUNNEY (#14)**, who redshirted last season after transferring from UC Davis, made his debut in the fourth quarter at Washington. He completed one of eight passes for 13 yards with one interception. He last appeared in a game as a record-setting senior at Carlsbad's LaCosta Canyon High School in 2004. He redshirted at UC Davis in 2005, was on a Mormon mission in 2006-07, sat out for medical reasons at UC Davis in 2008 and redshirted at UCLA last year.

Redshirt sophomore **KEVIN PRINCE (#4)** will be sidelined for the remainder of the season after undergoing arthroscopic surgery on his right knee on Oct. 23.

Prince started and played every snap in the opener at Kansas State despite missing most of camp with a muscle strain (oblique). He scored UCLA's first touchdown (11-yard run) to give the Bruins a 10-7 lead and threw a 29-yard touchdown to Ricky Marvray with 1:19 remaining to bring the Bruins to within two points, 24-22. On the afternoon, he threw for 120 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions and ran 12 times for 31 net yards.

Against Stanford, he completed six of 12 passes for 39 yards with one interception. Against Houston, he engineered five scoring drives (four tds, one fg) and helped the Bruins convert five of six third-down opportunities in the first half. On the night, he completed nine of 17 passes for 99 yards with one interception. He was also the team's second-leading rusher with 60 net yards, including a dash of 24 yards and a two-yard touchdown, giving him 159 yards of total offense.

At Texas, he ran for 50 net yards (85 gross) and engineered an 80-yard scoring drive to open the second half to give UCLA a 20-3 lead. He also scored untouched on a 38-yard run late in the third quarter to give the Bruins a 27-6 lead. Prince completed five of eight passes (27), including a one-yard touchdown pass to Ricky Marvray to give UCLA a 7-3 lead in the second quarter. He had two key third-down passes to help sustain an 8:00+ minute fourth quarter drive.

Prince's right knee was sore and swollen the week following Texas game and he did not see action versus WSU. He returned to the lineup at California and completed 13 of 31 passes for 99 yards with one touchdown (six yds to Christian Ramirez) and an interception. He did not play at Oregon due to his knee injury.

Prince started all 11 games in which he played during 2009. He became just the second Bruin freshman (redshirt) quarterback to open a season under center, and the first to win a season-opener, when he took the first snap in the San Diego State game. He became **the second freshman quarterback in UCLA history** to pass for over 300 yards three times in a season (Tommy Maddox, 1990) and his 323 yards vs. Oregon State rank No. 5 on UCLA's freshman passing list. The 323 yards vs. OSU also rank 28th on UCLA's single-game list and are the most since Patrick Cowan threw for 329 at California in 2006. He was third on the team in rushing (165 yards).

Prince ranked seventh in the Pac-10 in total offense (202.6) and eighth in passing efficiency (115.4) and passing yards (186.3). His 2,229 yards of total offense rank No. 14 on UCLA's single-season list (No. 2 among freshmen behind Maddox), his 179 completions rank T-No. 11 (No. 2 among freshmen) and his 2,050 passing yards rank No. 18 (No. 2 among freshmen).

In the 2009 game at Tennessee, Prince became the first UCLA freshman quarterback to win his first road start since Drew Olson won at Washington in 2002. An x-ray examination the day following the Tennessee game, on Sept. 13, indicated that Prince had suffered a fractured jaw. He had the jaw wired close to assist in the healing process and missed the Kansas State and Stanford games.

He returned to the starting lineup against Oregon. Against Cal, he completed 21 of 41 passes for **311 yards** -- all career highs at the time. At Oregon State, he passed for a career-high **323 yards** and two touchdowns, completing 22 passes on 34 attempts. In the fourth quarter, he rallied the Bruins from a 19-3 deficit. He engineered touchdown drives of 70 and 94 yards and threw scoring passes of 58 yards to Nelson Rosario (8:06 left) and seven yards to Taylor Embree, on fourth-and-seven, with 2:06 remaining. He also passed for a pair of two-point conversions. In the final quarter, he completed nine of 13 passes for 198 yards and the two touchdowns.

Prince was on fire against Washington. In the first half, he completed 13 of 17 passes for 212 yards with one touchdown and one interception. However, with 5:07 remaining in the half, he was injured on a helmet-to-helmet hit at the end of an eight-yard run and did not return. At Washington State, he recorded his third 300-yard passing game. He completed a career-high 27 passes on 40 attempts for **314 yards** and one touchdown. He also led the Bruins in rushing with 76 yards, including a 68-yard touchdown scamper. It was the longest run by a Bruin quarterback since John Sciarra had a 71-yard non-scoring run against Tennessee in 1971. **His 390 yards total offense rank No. 2** among Bruin freshmen (Tommy Maddox holds the record with 445 vs. USC in 1990). It also ranks No. 9 (tied) on single-game total offense list.

At USC, he completed 10 of 22 passes for 90 yards and two interceptions prior to leaving the game in the third quarter (sprained right shoulder). He ran for 34 yards. In the EagleBank Bowl victory, he completed 16 of 31 passes for 221 yards. He threw touchdown passes to Nelson Rosario (46) and Terrence Austin (32) on a fourth-down play-action pass.

Prince had been named the starting quarterback a few days following the completion of 2009 Spring Practice. In 2008, he competed for the backup role at quarterback and dressed for each contest, but did not see game action.

RUNNING BACKS — Redshirt sophomore tailback **JOHNATHAN FRANKLIN (#23)** leads the Bruins in rushing with 945 yards (5.1 ave). He is **fourth in the Pac-10** and **27th in the NCAA** with his average of 94.50 yards per game. He leads the team with seven touchdowns, the highest total since Kahlil Bell had eight in 2008. He is also **eighth in the Pac-10 in all-purpose yards (99.70)** and 12th in total offense (94.50).

Franklin's 945 yards rank No. 21 on UCLA's single-season rushing list. He should become UCLA's first 1,000-yard rusher since Chris Markey in 2006 (1,107). His average of 94.5 yards projects to 1,134 yards over 12 regular-season games, which would be the highest total since Skip Hicks ran for 1,282 in 1997.

He has rushed for 100 or more yards six times in his career (four times in 2010) and did it in three straight games (Houston, Texas, WSU) earlier this season. The last time a Bruin had rushed for over 100 yards in three consecutive games was Maurice Jones-Drew versus Illinois, Washington and San Diego State in 2004.

Franklin is on track to become UCLA's first 1,000-yard rusher since Chris Markey ran for 1,107 yards in 13 games in 2006. At his current average of 99.11 yards, he would finish the regular season at 1,189 yards, UCLA's highest total since 1997 (Skip Hicks, 1,282 in 1997).

He came off the bench to lead the Bruin ground game at Kansas State. He finished with 60 yards on 13 carries and made one reception (15). He led the team against Stanford with 73 yards on 11 carries. Versus Houston, he ran for 158 yards on 26 carries, the most by a Bruin since Chris Markey rushed for 193 against Washington in 2007. He also scored three rushing touchdowns (11, one, 12 yds), becoming the first Bruin to do it since Chane Moline a year ago at Washington State. Four of his runs gained at least 10 yards (long 26) and 13 runs gained at least five yards. At Texas, he led the Bruins with 118 yards and one touchdown on 19 carries. His 11-yard touchdown run capped an 80-yard drive to open the second half, giving UCLA a 20-3 lead. He accounted for 56 yards on four carries on that drive, including a 35-yard run and his 11-yard touchdown. On the day, nine of his 19 carries accounted for at least five yards and he had just one for minus yardage (on lost fumble).

In the win over Washington State, he rushed for a **career-high 216 yards** and one touchdown (3) on 30 carries. His 216 yards rank No. 13 on UCLA's single-game list and were the most by a Bruin since Maurice Drew ran for 322 at Washington in 2004. Sixteen of his runs measured at least five yards and seven were for double figures, including carries of 33, 25 and 17 yards. At Cal, he led the Bruins with 54 yards on 13 attempts, including a 31-yarder. He rushed for 69 yards on 21 carries at Oregon and caught two passes (17). Against Arizona, he netted 44 yards on 13 carries. In the win over Oregon State, he netted 100 yards on 23 carries, including a one-yard touchdown run to tie the game at 14-14 late in the third quarter. At Washington, he scored UCLA's touchdown on a 31-yard first-quarter run and finished with 53 yards on 18 attempts. He also made two receptions to lead the team.

Franklin saw action in all 13 games during '09, making eight starts. He led the team with 566 rushing yards, 12th in the Pac-10. Franklin ranked No. 6 on UCLA's freshman rushing list. He recorded two 100-yard games during '09 (Kansas St.-119 and Cal-101). Only one player in school history (Tyler Ebell - 6 in 2002) totaled more than two 100-yard rushing games during his freshman season.

Franklin made his first career start in 2009 against San Diego State. On his initial carry, he scored a 12-yard touchdown. Versus Kansas State, he led the Bruins with 119 yards on 23 carries. He became the first Bruin to rush for at least 100 yards since Chris Markey in the 2007 Las Vegas Bowl. His 119 yards were the most by a Bruin since 2007 (Kahlil Bell 142 v. Cal). Against Cal, he rushed for 101 yards and two touchdowns on 11 carries. His 74-yard touchdown run in the second quarter was the longest run by a Bruin since Oct. 25, 2003 (Maurice Drew 83-yard touchdown run v. Arizona State). He had scored earlier on a seven-yard run.

True junior **DERRICK COLEMAN (#33)** ranks second on the team with 444 yards and his average of 49.33 yds (nine games) ranks **12th in the Pac-10**. He is averaging 6.2 yds per carry and is second on the team with five touchdowns.

In the opener at Kansas State, he started and ran for 29 yards on five carries. He started and carried six times for 23 yards prior to being injured (neck sprain/concussion) in the third quarter against Stanford. He did not play against Houston. Coleman returned to action at Texas and came off the bench to rush for 94 yards on 16 attempts, including a 29-yard touchdown with 53 seconds remaining in the contest. Six of his runs accounted for at least five yards and three were for double-figure yardage. He also made three tackles on special teams coverage.

Against WSU, he compiled a **career-high 185 yards on the ground and three touchdowns** (one, one, four yards), also a career best. His 73-yard run was the longest of his career and the longest since Johnathan Franklin had a 74-yard run last year versus Cal. Six of his runs measured at least five yards and four were in double figures, including, 73, 36 and 23 yards). At Cal, he carried twice for one yard. He totaled 34 yards at Oregon and made three tackles. He ran for 42 yards, including an 11-yard touchdown, on nine carries versus Arizona. He gained six yards on five attempts against Oregon State. At Washington, he ran for 30 yards on seven attempts.

Coleman, a member of the 2009 AFCA Good Works Team, appeared in all 13 games in 2009 and made one start (WSU). He was second on the squad with 244 yards. Coleman came off the bench to lead the Bruins in rushing versus San Diego State, running for 69 yards, including a 29-yard touchdown on his first carry of the game. Against Washington, he led the Bruins with 49 yards. He started against Washington State and led all running backs with 50 yards.

In 2008, Coleman played in the final 10 games of the season, made one start (at Washington), and was second on the squad with 284 yards.

Against Stanford, he ran for a career-best 52 yards on seven carries (long 20). He netted 29 yards on 12 carries versus Houston. Redshirt senior **CHRISTIAN RAMIREZ (#24)** appeared at F and on special teams in the opener at Kansas State. WIDE RECEIVERS — True junior **TAYLOR EMBREE (#82)** has made 16 receptions to lead the Bruins. His 14.2 average ranks second on the squad. He ranks seventh in the Pac-10 with 7.43 punt return average. His 101 career catches rank 16th (tied) on the all-time school list. He is 21st on the receiving yards list at 1,367 (Junior Taylor is at #20 with 1,372 yards).

Embree made one catch in four of the first five games this season --- (8) at Kansas State,(17) versus Stanford,(12) against Houston,(14) versus Washington State. He came off the bench at Texas, but was limited due to a hip flexor strain and did not make a reception. He caught the two-point conversion against Washington State that made the score 28-28 with less than a minute remaining in the third quarter. At Cal, he made four receptions (48), one for 19 yards. Embree made two catches (29) at Oregon, long of 20. Against Arizona, he started and made three receptions for 30 yards. Embree started in the win over Oregon State and made two receptions (54). He had a 43-yard catch in the second quarter, tying his career long, and a key 11-yard third-down reception on the game-winning field goal drive. He made one catch for 16 yards at Washington.

Embree appeared in all 13 games in 2009 and made 12 starts. He led the team with 45 receptions and was second with 608 receiving yards. Of his 45 receptions, 29 produced first downs (28) or touchdowns (two). His 45 receptions rank No. 17 (tied) on UCLA's single-season list. He became the **first UCLA receiver to make at least 40 catches in both his freshman and sophomore season.**

Embree matched his single-game career high with six receptions for a career-best total of 97 yards in the 2009 opener versus San Diego State. At Oregon State, he made five receptions (88), including a leaping grab for a seven-yard touchdown (first of his career) with 2:06 remaining in the game.

Embree appeared in 12 games in 2008 and made eight starts. He was second on the squad with 40 receptions and led the team with 531 receiving yards - both UCLA freshman records.

True junior **NELSON ROSARIO (#83)** is second (tied) on the team 15 receptions in the seven games in which he has played. He topped the Bruins with three receptions (29) at Kansas State. Against Stanford, he led the team with five receptions (44). Versus Houston, he made two catches (27, long 16). He paced the Bruins with two receptions (15) at Texas. Against the Longhorns, he broke the 1,000-yard barrier for career receiving yardage (now #29 on school receiving yards list). Versus WSU, he made two receptions (22) prior to suffering a left ankle sprain late on the first drive and was sidelined for the remainder of the game. He did not play at Cal, at Oregon or against Arizona. He was on the field for a few snaps versus Oregon State. He started at Washington and made one reception for 13 yards.

Rosario appeared in all 13 games, with two starts, in 2009. He led the team with 723 receiving yards and his average of 17.2 yards per catch. He was second on the squad with 42 receptions and produced 30 first downs, including two touchdowns. He finished 2009 on a roll making 30 catches for 526 yards (avg. 88 yds/g; 17.5 yds/catch) in the last six games of the year.

His 723 yards rank No. 17 (tied) on that UCLA single-season list while his 42 receptions rank No. 24 . He ranked T-12th in the Pac-10 in receiving yards (55.6) and T-18th in receptions (3.2). He earned honorable mention All-Pac-10 honors and was named co-offensive winner of UCLA's Captain Don Brown Memorial Award for Most Improved Player.

Rosario had a breakout game in a 2009 start at Oregon State, making a team-high six receptions for 152 yards and the first touchdown of his career, a 58-yard acrobatic leaping catch and run. He also had a 45-yard reception on UCLA's

game-tying touchdown drive. His 152 receiving yards were the most by a Bruin since Craig Bragg totaled 230 versus Oregon in 2002 and rank 19th (tied) on UCLA's single-game list. It was the first time since the 2007 season that UCLA had a receiver with over 100 yards. In the win over Washington, he led the Bruins with a career-high seven receptions and 111 yards. Rosario became the first Bruin since Mercedes Lewis in 2005 to record **100+ receiving yards in back-to-back games** and the first wide receiver to do it since Craig Bragg in 2003.

True sophomore **RANDALL CARROLL (#1)** ranks fourth on the team with his 13 receptions, second with his 187 receiving yards and **first with his 14.4 average.**

Carroll saw action off the bench in the opener at Kansas State but did not make a reception. Against Stanford, he had one rush(3). He did not have a reception in wins over Houston and at Texas. Against Washington State, he made two catches(13). He did not make a reception at Cal. Carroll caught two passes for 38 yards (long 26) at Oregon. Against Arizona, he scored on a 68-yard catch-and-run, UCLA's longest scoring pass play since the 2007 Oregon State game. On the afternoon, he made three receptions for a team-high 90 yards. In the win over Oregon State, he made a team and career-high six receptions (46). On the game-winning touchdown drive, he made three receptions (26). On his final reception (12), he was able to get out of bounds with one second remaining, setting the stage for Kai Forbath's 51-yard field goal for the win. He did not make a reception at Washington.

Redshirt junior **JOSH SMITH (#3)** made his UCLA debut at Kansas State. He averaged 26.0 yards on two runs, including a 43-yard reverse on the drive that brought the Bruins to within one point (17-16) with 6:28 remaining in the game. He also averaged 27.5 yards on two kickoff returns. Against Stanford, he made one reception(8) and had 104 kickoff return yards (five atts.). He played against Houston, but did not touch the football. At Texas, he had a 45-yard kickoff return which helped to set up the touchdown drive that made the score 27-6. Against Washington State, he had a kickoff return(27), a run(22) and a reception(5). At Cal, he averaged 30.4 yards on five kickoff returns, including one for 46 yards, and made one reception(5). He sat out the Oregon contest (suspension). Against Arizona, he tied for the team lead with three receptions(74). He scored his first Bruin touchdown on a 49-yard pass from Richard Brehaut on a flea-flicker play. On the day, he led the team with 114 all-purpose yards. In the win over Oregon State, he made three receptions (10), carried once (4) and averaged 23.7 yards on three kickoff returns. At Washington, he averaged 19.3 yards on four kickoff returns.

He is **seventh in the Pac-10** with his 23.33 kickoff return average and 19th in the Pac-10 in all-purpose yards (81.22).

Smith sat out the 2009 season after transferring from Colorado. He earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors as a kick returner in 2008 after recording the school's second-highest all-purpose yardage total for a single season. In that 2008 season, Smith totaled 1,987 all-purpose yards and set a school record with 50 kickoff returns for 1,276 yards. He brought one return back 93 yards for a score against Colorado State. Smith ranked fourth on the team in receptions (29) and second in receiving yards (387). He compiled a 10.4 yard punt return average on 28 chances, with a long of 51 yards.

OFFENSIVE LINE — Five redshirt seniors were on the field for the first snap at Kansas State --- tackles Micah Kia and Sean Sheller, guards Eddie Williams and Darius Savage and center Ryan Taylor. That unit helped the Bruins rush for 193 net yards and allowed just five tackles for loss (three sacks). The same group started and played every snap against Stanford. Against Houston, Mike Harris opened for Kia at right tackle and the starters played every snap (266 yards rushing). The same unit started and played virtually the entire game at Texas (Taylor and Williams missed some plays due to cramping) and enabled the

Bruins to rush for 264 yards against the nation's then No. 1-ranked run defense. The same five started and almost played the entire WSU game as UCLA rushed for its highest yardage total (437) since 1979 (446 at Oregon). UCLA again started the same unit at California and at Oregon. Kia replaced Sheller against Arizona but Sheller returned versus Oregon State and the Bruins rushed for 210 yards.

The Bruins started the same five offensive linemen (three making their first career starts) in the first six games in 2009, but made a change for game seven due to an injury to RG Eddie Williams (fractured ankle). The Bruins started five different right guards for the season, but the same player started all 12 regular season games at the other four line spots.

(Note - freshman Xavier Su'a-Filo, who started all 13 games at left tackle in 2009, is serving a Church mission and is not in school; junior Jeff Baca, who started all 13 games at left guard last season, is sitting out this season due to NCAA eligibility issues; junior Kai Maiava, who started 12 games at center last season, is out indefinitely after fracturing an ankle in fall camp).

In 2008, UCLA had started nine different combinations in 12 games and no combination in more than three straight games.

Redshirt senior **EDDIE WILLIAMS (#62)**, a junior college transfer a year ago, saw his first action in the 2010 opener at Kansas State since fracturing his ankle in game six of 2009 and played every snap. He played every snap against Stanford and Houston and almost every snap at Texas. He started and played the entire WSU and Cal games. He played almost every snap at Oregon and every snap versus Arizona, Oregon State and Washington.

Williams made his first Bruin career start at right guard against SDSU in the 2009 opener and started and played virtually every snap in the first five games of '09. He also started game six against Cal, but fractured his left ankle in the first quarter. He missed the rest of the season.

Redshirt senior **RYAN TAYLOR (#66)**, a junior college transfer a year ago, started at center in the 2010 opener at Kansas State and played every snap. He also played every snap versus Stanford and Houston. He started in his home state of Texas and did a fine job, missing part of the second half due to dehydration. He was named **Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week**, the first lineman honored since 2003. He started and played every snap versus WSU, California, Oregon, Arizona, Oregon State and Washington.

Taylor saw action at center in the 2009 opener against SDSU. Later in that season, he started at right guard versus Oregon State. He also played the entire game in the win over Washington. He sat out the last four games due to a foot sprain.

Redshirt senior **DARIUS SAVAGE (#77)** started at left guard in the 2010 opener at Kansas State and played every snap. He played every snap versus Stanford, Houston, Texas, WSU, California, Oregon, Arizona, Oregon State and Washington.

Savage played on special teams in every game during 2009. He saw action at right guard and on special teams against San Diego State in the opener a year ago. At Washington State, he started and played the entire game at right guard and also played against USC. In 2008, he started seven games at left guard and made his first career start at BYU.

Redshirt senior **SEAN SHELLER (#72)** saw his first action on the offensive side of the ball in the 2010 opener at Kansas State when he started and played every snap at left tackle. He also played every snap versus Stanford, Houston and at Texas. He started and played all but one snap versus WSU and played the entire game at California and Oregon. He did not play versus Arizona (suspension) and returned and played every snap versus Oregon State and Washington.

Sheller appeared on special teams and on defense in the 2009 season. (his only year on defense). He missed the 2008 season after injuring his left knee in an off-field accident and did not see action in 2007. He missed the 2006 season after suffering a right knee injury in training camp.

Redshirt senior **MICAH KIA (#73)** started at right tackle in the 2010 opener at Kansas State and played every snap. He also played every snap against Stanford. He was hampered by a sprained ankle and was available if needed versus Houston but did not play. He did not play at Texas and saw a few snaps of action against WSU at both tackle spots. Against Oregon, he played several snaps at tight end. Against Arizona, he started and played the entire game at left tackle. In the Oregon State and Washington games, he played a few snaps as an extra tight end.

Kia injured a knee in practice on Aug. 19, 2009 and missed the entire year with a torn ACL. In 2008, he started seven games - four at left tackle, one at right tackle and two at left guard. He made eight starts at tackle in 2007.

Redshirt junior **MIKE HARRIS (#65)** sat out the opener at Kansas State due to a violation of team rules and did not see action versus Stanford. He started and played every snap against Houston and Texas and all but six versus WSU. He played the entire contest at California, at Oregon, against Arizona and Oregon State and at Washington.

Harris started at right tackle in all 13 games in 2009 and had started 18 straight games prior to the suspension. For his efforts, he was named co-defensive winner of UCLA's Captain Don Brown Memorial Award for Most Improved Player. Redshirt freshman **GREG CAPELLA (#64)** made his debut in the third quarter of the win at Texas when Ryan Taylor had to leave due to dehydration and did a good job snapping the ball to Kevin Prince.

True freshman guard **CHRIS WARD (#75)** made his debut in the fourth quarter of the win at Texas, taking over at right guard when Eddie Williams was forced from the game due to dehydration/cramps.

Redshirt junior **KAI MAIAVA (#51)** is out indefinitely after fracturing his left ankle in a scrimmage on Aug. 21, 2010. He was listed on the Rimington Award pre-season watch list. Maiava, a transfer from Colorado, where he was a starter in nine games at left guard in 2007, started for the first time as a Bruin, at center, in the 2009 opener against SDSU. He went on to start the first 12 games of the season and played virtually every snap in those game. He was not eligible to play in the EagleBank Bowl.

True junior **JEFF BACA (#60)** is out for the 2010 season due to NCAA eligibility issues. Baca started at left guard in all 13 games in 2009 and has 21 career starts. In 2008, he appeared in nine games with eight starts at left tackle.

TIGHT END — True junior **CORY HARKEY (#87)** started the 2010 season-opener at Kansas State. His 35-yard catch and tackle-breaking run set up the touchdown that brought the Bruins to within two points (24-22) with 1:19 remaining in the contest. He did not make a reception versus Stanford. Against Houston, he had one catch(8). He started at Texas and blocked well. He started and made one reception(15) versus WSU. He had one reception(8) at Cal. He caught a career-best four balls at Oregon(22) and made one reception(7) against Arizona. He made a great catch on a shovel pass (12) against OregonState. He made a five-yard reception at Washington.

Harkey appeared in all 13 games (four starts) in 2009. He started at Stanford and made three catches (11). He made a diving reception on fourth-and-goal from the one for UCLA's first touchdown of the game versus UW.
