TEAM OF THE CENTURY

As part of Nevada's celebration of 100 years of intercollegiate athletics in 1998, a football "Team of the Century" was selected. The selecting process included three official committees, starting with five separate nominating committees representing the different eras in Wolf Pack history (1898-1939, 1940-1959, 1960-1979, 1980-89, 1990-98). A research committee worked simultaneously with the selection committees to verify the accuracy of the nomination and then turned its finding over to an eight-member selection committee for the task of electing the team members.

The criteria for the selection of this elite team included:

- Individuals were dominating players in their times.
- Individuals were preferably highly-ranked statistical leaders (team, conference or national.)
- Team's record while player was at Nevada.
- Offensive linemen were selected on the basis of the team's ability to run the ball.
- Individuals may have received post-season honors and/or accomplishments.
- Positions would be grouped (not selecting left corner or safeties, but defensive backs).
- Priority was given for longevity.
- Team was representative of the 100 years of Nevada football, but not to the extent of lessening the significance of the team.

NEVADA IN THE COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

FRANK HAWKINS

In recent years, the Nevada Wolf Pack football team has been known for its prolific passing attack, but one of the greatest careers in Nevada football history came from a running back.

Frank Hawkins, originally from Las Vegas, came to the Wolf Pack in 1977 and over the next four years, broke five university records, including single-season marks for rushing attempts, rushing yards and rushing touchdowns in a season. He also holds the top two single-season rushing performances in school history. After his career was all said and done, Hawkins was the NCAA's third all-time rushing leader with 5,333 yards and was a three-time first-team All-American.

After his great career with the Wolf Pack, Hawkins went on to play seven years with the Oakland Raiders and was part of the 1984 Super Bowl championship team.

When talking about the past success of Nevada football, one name comes to mind: Chris Ault.

With the winningest record in Nevada history and eight Coach-of-the-Year awards to his credit, there is a little doubt that Coach Ault built the foundation for Wolf Pack football. Ault started his career at Nevada as a student and a quarterback where he earned All-Far Western Conference honors three years (1965-1967). After being an assistant coach at UNLV for a short period of time, Ault returned to his alma mater as the Wolf Pack head coach in 1976.

After 21 seasons in three stints as Nevada's head coach, Ault has acquired a career record of 177-73-1 record and eight conference titles. He has been voted coach of the year eight times, including two National I-AA coaching honors.

Ault, who was voted Coach of the Century for northern Nevada by the *Reno Gazette-Journal* in 1998, returned to coaching at Nevada in December 2003.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Rishard Matthews caught a touchdown pass and returned a punt for another score, and No. 13 Nevada used a strong defensive effort to cap its most successful season ever at college football's highest level by beating Boston College 20-13 in the Fight Hunger Bowl on Sunday night.

Colin Kaepernick threw for 192 yards and a touchdown for the Wolf Pack (13-1), who snapped a four-game bowl losing streak by tying a school record for wins in a season set when it played in what used to be Division I-AA.

This game matched BC's top-ranked rushing defense against Nevada's high-powered pistol attack that was third in the nation in rushing. The Eagles (7-6) did a good job controlling the Wolf Pack on the ground, holding them to a season-low 114 yards - more than 190 below their season average.

Kaepernick was held to 22 yards on nine carries, but managed to top 3,000 yards passing for the season. That allowed him to join Brad Smith and Vince Young as the only FBS quarterbacks to rush for at least 1,000 yards and throw for 3,000 in the same season.

With an efficient passing day by Kaepernick, the big plays from Matthews and a stout defense, the Wolf Pack were able to snap Boston College's five-game winning streak. The Eagles were held to 185 yards.

Freshman Chase Rettig completed 14 of 34 passes for 121 yards and two interceptions. Boston College played without leading rusher Montel Harris, who was listed as the starter but did not play after undergoing arthroscopic knee surgery in late November.

The teams traded field goals in the third quarter, giving Nevada a 20-10 lead heading into the fourth. Boston College was unable to capitalize on an interception that Luke Kuechly returned to the Wolf Pack 6. But two runs netted just a yard and Rettig threw an incompleting on third down, forcing the kick.

After Nevada's field goal late in the third, Rettig's was intercepted by Marlon

Johnson on a deflected ball that gave Nevada the ball at the BC 41. Vai Taua fumbled the ball right back but once again the Eagles were unable to take advantage.

Helped by a pair of pass interference penalties, BC got a 32-yard field goal from Nate Freese with 3:52 to play to make it 20-13. The Eagles got the ball back at their 10 with 3:06 to go and got a 32-yard pass from Rettig to Chris Pantale on their first play.

Two plays later Khalid Wooten intercepted a pass to seal the win and send the thousands of Nevada fans who drove a few hours from Reno home happy.

The Wolf Pack sold about 15,500 tickets, surpassing California and Navy for the most sold in the nine-year history of this game. The attendance of 41,063 was the second largest for the bowl. It included one streaker, who ran on the field in the fourth quarter, causing a brief delay.

After an early fumble by Kaepernick led to a 30-yard touchdown run by Andre Williams, Matthews provided the Nevada fans plenty to cheer about in the first half.

First, Matthews got behind the defense as Kaepernick scrambled to his left. Kaepernick then flicked a pass toward the end zone for an easy 27-yard score that tied the game for Nevada.

The Wolf Pack then held the Eagles to a three-and-out on the next possession and Matthews returned the punt 72 yards to make it 14-7. That was Nevada's first punt return for a score since Oct. 13, 2001. Nevada added a late 32-yard field goal by Anthony Martinez to take a 10-point lead at the half.

The game was sponsored by Kraft, which is using the bowl to promote its efforts to fight hunger in the United States. Instead of a coin for the opening toss, officials tossed an Oreo cookie that was chocolate on one side and vanilla on the other.

HONOLULU, HAWAII (AP) - Freshman Kyle Padron threw for an SMU-record 460 yards, leading the Mustangs to a 45-10 victory over Nevada in the Hawaii Bowl on Thursday night - SMU's first postseason appearance in 25 years.

The 18-year-old Padron, who was 32 of 41 and completed two touchdown passes, was confident and composed on the biggest stage of his career.

He earned the starting job after Bo Levi Mitchell was injured in the seventh game of the season and was largely unknown coming out of Southlake Carroll in Texas, which produced quarterbacks Chase Daniel and Greg McElroy.

Despite the tiny crowd at the game, people are paying attention to Padron - and SMU.

The Mustangs (8-5), who were 1-11 the previous two years, have their most victories since their last postseason game - also in Hawaii. SMU beat Notre Dame 27-20 in the 1984 Aloha Bowl to finish 10-2.

Shawnbrey McNeal added 63 yards rushing and three touchdowns, including two in the first quarter. He also had seven catches for 53 yards.

The loss was the fourth straight in the postseason for the Wolf Pack (8-5), whose No. 1 rushing offense in the nation was grounded. While SMU racked up 534 yards of offense, Nevada had held to just 314, including 137 yards rushing. The Wolf Pack averaged 362.3 yards rushing during the regular season and is the first team in NCAA history to have three 1,000-yard rushers. But Nevada was without two of them in running backs Vai Taua and Luke Lippincott.

Taua was ruled academically ineligible and Lippincott was sidelined with a toe injury.

BOISE, Idaho (AP) - Da'Rel Scott got out of the doghouse in time to run over Nevada.

Benched for 2 1/2 quarters for breaking curfew, Scott ran for 174 yards and two fourth-quarter touchdowns in 14 carries and Maryland held off the Wolf Pack 42-35 in the Humanitarian Bowl on Tuesday.

Scott's 49-yard touchdown sprint early in the fourth quarter broke a 28-all tie and his 2-yard TD gallop put the Terps up 14 points.

Colin Kaepernick kept Nevada (7-6) close, finishing 24-for-47 for a bowl-record 370 yards and three touchdowns.

Kaepernick and Nevada capitalized on a pair of mistakes by Maryland quarterback Chris Turner to pull even. Nevada's Jonathon Amaya intercepted Turner near midfield midway through the third quarter and returned it to the Maryland 22. Three plays later, Kaepernick hit Vai Taua behind the Maryland secondary for a 17-yard TD score to get the Wolf Pack to 28-21.

Turner was hit as he attempted to throw a screen at the Nevada 20. The throw went backward and Nate Agaiaua recovered for the Wolf Pack. Kaepernick needed only five plays and less than two minutes to draw even, hitting Marko Mitchell on a 21-yard TD.

The tie lasted only a couple of minutes. Turner hit Torrey Scott for 26 yards on third down, and two plays later Scott ran for his seventh touchdown of the season.

Kaepernick added a 15-yard touchdown run with 2:19 left, but Maryland recovered the ensuing inside kick and ran out the clock.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. – Paul Baker ran for 167 yards in his first start, and Donovan Porterie threw for career-high 354 yards and two touchdowns to help New Mexico beat Nevada 23-0 in the New Mexico Bowl.

The Lobos (9-4) ended a 46-year skid without a postseason victory and gave 10th-year coach Rocky Long his first bowl win in five tries.

New Mexico's defense also delivered just the second shutout loss for Nevada's Hall of Fame coach, Chris Ault.

The Wolf Pack (6-7) hadn't gone scoreless since losing 10-0 to Weber State on Sept. 27, 1980, a span of 329 games - the longest current streak in college football and the second longest in history.

It was New Mexico's first bowl victory since beating Western Michigan 28-12 in the 1961 Aviation Bowl at Dayton, Ohio. The Lobos also notched a nine-win season for just the fourth time in school history. Much of the credit goes to New Mexico's defenders, who pestered redshirt freshman quarterback Colin Kaepernick all afternoon.

The Wolf Pack averaged 36.2 points and 488.9 yards during the season. Nevada logged 23 scoring plays that covered at least 25 yards - second only to Oklahoma's 25 big-play TDs.

Nevada had 210 total yards, with only 73 yards rushing. On a chilly day, with the temperature at kickoff 34 degrees, Kaepernick finished 13-of-31 for 137 yards. He had 10 carries for 40 yards rushing.

Nevada had a first down at the Miami 36 in the final minute, but a diving interception by the Hurricanes' Chavez Grant with 18 seconds left sealed the win and got Coker the perfect sendoff that his players wanted.

Jeff Rowe threw a 27-yard touchdown pass to Marko Mitchell, and Brett Jaekle kicked four field goals for Nevada, including 44- and 40-yarders in the fourth quarter to get Nevada within a point. But the Wolf Pack got no closer, thanks largely to Grant's heroics at the end. Rowe was 20-of-31 for 192 yards for Nevada, which was making its first back-to-back bowl appearances since 1995-96, and Robert Hubbard had 60 yards on 20 carries.

Down by seven entering the final quarter against the fifth-ranked defense in the country, Nevada nearly pulled off a comeback -- and may have been denied a great scoring opportunity by a call that didn't go its way.

Facing a third-and-10 from the Miami 28, Rowe dropped back to throw to Anthony Pudewell inside the Miami 10. Pudewell was hit by Kenny Phillips as he tried to catch the ball, which bounced in the air. Replays appeared to show that Pudewell trapped the ball between his knees before it hit the turf, but officials ruled it incomplete and the Wolf Pack settled for a field goal.

Nevada junior quarterback Jeff Rowe scored on a 4-yard naked bootleg in overtime to lead Nevada to the win.

Senior B.J. Mitchell ran for 178 yards and two touchdowns, and junior Robert Hubbard had 126 yards rushing and three touchdowns for the Wolf Pack, which turned in its best season since 1996.

UCF kicker Matt Prater booted a 46-yard field goal with 1:32 left to draw UCF to 42-35, and the Golden Knights recovered the onside kick with no timeouts left to set up Brandon Marshall's dramatic 16-yard TD catch that sent the game into overtime.

Trailing 32-28, the Wolf Pack took the lead on Hubbard's 5-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter. Nevada scored again on Rowe's 7-yard scoring pass to Travis Branzell for a 42-32 lead with 3:18 remaining.

Kevin Smith scored on a 19 yard run to tie the game at 48 but

Prater, who had three field goals during the game, missed the game-tying extra point wide right, giving the Wolf Pack the win.

John Dutton completed 11 of his first 13 passes as Nevada forged out to a 9-0 lead after the first quarter as the Wolf Pack defense made a statement, allowing just 26 yards by Ball State in the opening period.

But early in the second quarter, LeAndre Moore broke free around right end and scampered 62 yards for the touchdown, pulling the Mid America Conference champion Cardinals to within two points.

In the third quarter, Dutton struggled as his hands became near frozen, and he finally gave way to Eric Bennett, whose "hot" hand rallied the Wolf Pack.

Bennett drove the Pack into scoring territory early in the fourth quarter and then hit Diamond Wilkins for the touchdown, Wilkins' second of the game. The drive covered 71 yards and Bennett completed four out of five passes.

Nevada, behind spirited defensive play most notably by linebackers Mike Crawford and DeShone Myles, held Ball State at bay until late in the game when quarterback Brent Baldwin found Adrian Reese for a 27-yard touchdown pass with just 2:26 remaining in the game.

Things got a little tighter when Ball State successfully covered an onside kick. But Crawford, who would be named game Most Valuable Player with 14 tackles, intercepted a pass up the middle and Nevada had its first bowl victory in 50 years.

The contest, aired nationally to an ESPN audience, proved to be one of the most entertaining of the bowl lineup.

Tait scored the game-winner from two yards out after Nevada was held to a field goal in their half of the first overtime period.

Nevada had rallied back from deficits of 14 points in the first half and 10 yards in the second half to tie the game at 34 when Damon Shea kicked a 26-yard field goal with 9:28 remaining.

Neither team could score in the remainder of regulation, setting up overtime, allowed by the NCAA in bowl games for the first time ever.

Tait and the Rockets gained 307 yards rushing and 561 total in the contest. Nevada gained 413, 330 of which came through the air.

Alex Van Dyke closed out his brilliant career at Nevada with another standout performance, catching 14 passes for 176 yards for the day. Mike

Maxwell was 27-of-49 passing with no interceptions, but no touchdowns either.

In an interesting "human interest" side story, Nevada's DeShone Myles played in the game (and led the team in tackles) despite undergoing an emergency appendectomy just 22 days before the game.

Nevada's first appearance in a bowl game in 44 years proved to be one of the most exciting games in the entire bowl line-up for the year as they lost a heartbreaker to Bowling Green in the inaugural Las Vegas Bowl, 35-34.

The Falcons scored touchdowns on their first four drives while holding the Wolf Pack to three points for a 28-3 lead in the second quarter. Chris Vargas entered the game at quarterback with 1:50 remaining in the half.

Midway through the third quarter, Vargas engineered three quick scoring drives which left the score 28-24 with 3:46 left. The Wolf Pack scored on its fourth consecutive possession with 12:41 left in the game after a grueling 78-yard drive that culminated with a 14-yard Vargas pass to Mike Senior to make it 31-28.

Nevada drove 86 yards to the one-yard line on its next possession and punched in a 19-yard field goal to make it 34-28. The Pack was forced to punt with 1:45 remaining on a fourth and one situation from the Nevada 32-yard line.

Punter Steve Lester fumbled the snap, which gave Bowling Green life from the 15-yard line. Falcon quarterback Eric White rolled right and found wide receiver David Hankins alone in the back of the endzone on a dramatic fourth and goal. Brian Leaver kicked the extra point, and Nevada's unbelievable comeback was denied the spoils of victory.

Vargas passed for 283 yards on 24-of-40 passing and ran for 22 more yards in the near comeback and was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

Freshman Chris Vargas came off the bench late in the fourth quarter to lead Nevada to a touchdown and a two-point conversion to tie the game, and the Wolf Pack went on to defeat Furman, 42-35, in triple overtime.

Nevada dominated the first half of the game, but failed to score touchdowns on three drives inside the five yard line and only led at the half 13-7.

The Wolf Pack scored 15 fourth quarter points, the last eight on a last-minute drive with a 13-yard pass from Vargas to Ross Ortega with 16 seconds left. Vargas calmly hit Joe King for the two-point conversion, and the game went to overtime at 28-28.

Nevada's Ray Whalen put the game away in the third OT with his fourth touchdown.

Midway through the second quarter, following a fumble by Indian QB Doug Pederson forced by a jarring sack by Mark Drahos, Fred Gatlin hit Taylor with an eight-yard scoring pass and Nevada was ahead for good. Whalen added another TD on a 24-yard run later in the quarter as Nevada scored 21 unanswered points to take a 21-7 lead at the half.

Beavers finished the game nine-of-25 for 86 yards, one interception and one TD.

After halftime, Massachusetts picked up where they left off and opened the lead to 44-7 with 6 minutes remaining in the game. The Pack had one final surge left in them to pull within striking distance, but it was too little, too late.
