





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2012 USC SPRING FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

Unfinished business.

The buzz started late last December, when All-American safety **T.J. McDonald** announced he was returning to USC for his 2012 senior season by saying, “I want to come back and finish things out and be part of something great.”

The very next day, Heisman Trophy candidate quarterback **Matt Barkley** declared his intention to return to Troy by saying, “The 2012 team has some serious unfinished business to attend to.”

Both players, along with their teammates and many college football prognosticators, realize that 2012 could be a special season for the Trojans.

USC has 19 starters (9 on offense, 8 on defense, plus the placekicker and punter) returning from a squad that ended the 2011 campaign as perhaps the hottest team in the nation. However, Troy could not play in the post-season while serving the second (and final) year of an NCAA ban. Last year, the Trojans went 10-2 overall for a No. 6 AP ranking and finished first in the Pac-12 South Division at 7-2. USC beat both teams that played in the Pac-12 Championship Game, winning at Oregon and then 50-0 over UCLA over the final 2 weeks of the season. One of its 2 losses came in triple overtime to BCS bowl-bound Stanford.

The 2012 Trojans bring back a 3,500-yard passer, a pair of 1,000-yard receivers, a 1,000-yard rusher, a duo of tight ends who caught 9 touchdowns, the defense's top 4 tacklers and a kicker who nailed 15 field goals. Returning from 2011 are a Biletnikoff Award finalist, 2 All-American first teamers, 5 Freshman All-American first teamers, the Pac-12's Offensive and Defensive Freshmen of the Year and the Pac-12 record holders for season receptions and TD passes. It is no wonder that this year's Trojans feature numerous players who are candidates for some of college football's top individual honors.

In all, 79 squadmen are back from last year, including 46 who saw action in 2011, 37 who lettered, 28 who were on USC's season-ending 2-deep and 27 who have started at least once in their career.

Although the Trojans are eligible to play in the post-season for the first time since 2009, the 2012 season marks the first of 3 years that USC's roster size will be limited by NCAA sanctions. The Trojans must cap their roster at 75 scholarship players annually and can sign no more than 15 recruits per year (both figures are 10 fewer than the NCAA maximum).

USC brought in a 12-player recruiting class this year that was ranked in the national Top 10 by some experts, which speaks about the quality of the signees despite the quantity. Along with this group are 5 new players who enrolled at USC this semester and will participate in 2012 spring practice (they do not count against the 2012 recruiting class).

The Trojans appear loaded on offense. The returning starters are:

—Barkley, a 3-year starter who will enter 2012 as the leading contender for the Heisman Trophy after last season setting a Pac-12 record

with 39 TD tosses while completing a school record 69.1% of his throws for 3,528 yards. The owner of 4 USC game records, he is on pace to be Troy's all-time passing and total offense leader.

—Biletnikoff Award candidate wide receivers **Robert Woods** and **Marqise Lee**, who both eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving barrier in 2011. Their combined receptions (184) and receiving yards (2,435) in 2011 were the most by a pair of Trojans in a season. The 2-year starter Woods, a consensus All-American in 2011 when he had a Pac-12 record 111 receptions and set a USC game mark with 17 catches, is on track to be the school's career pass catching and kickoff return leader. He was a finalist for the Biletnikoff Award last fall. Lee was a 2011 Freshman All-American and the Pac-12's Freshman Offensive Co-Player of the Year whose 11 TD catches among his 73 receptions were the most nationally by a freshman last fall.

—Tailback **Curtis McNeal**, who ran for 1,005 yards with 4 100-yard outings as a co-starter in 2011. His 6.9-yard average per carry was the best by a Trojan since 2005.

—Tight ends **Randall Telfer** and **Xavier Grumble**, who had 9 TD grabs between them as 2011 co-starters. Telfer's 26 catches last year was a record for USC freshmen tight ends.

—Center **Khaled Holmes**, a 2-year starter who is the leading candidate for the Rimington Trophy and is also an Academic All-American candidate.

—Guards **Marcus Martin** (a 2011 Freshman All-American) and **John Martinez** and tackle **Kevin Graf**.

Other offensive players back who have career starts are tailback **D.J. Morgan** (he started the first 2 games of 2011) and offensive tackle-guard **Jeremy Galten**, who became the first junior college transfer since 1990 to go directly from a J.C. to USC and start an opener at guard.

USC is almost equally well-stocked with returning starters on defense:

—2011 All-American McDonald, a 2-year starter who is the top Thorpe Award nominee. He has 163 tackles and 6 interceptions in his career.

—2011 Freshman All-American linebackers **Dion Bailey** and **Hayes Pullard**, who were the first freshmen to lead USC in tackles (they each had 81 stops last season). Bailey was the Pac-12 Freshman Defensive Player of the Year.

—Cornerback **Nickell Robey**, a 2-year starter who is a Thorpe Award candidate. He has 6 career picks.

—2011 co-starting defensive ends **Wes Horton** and **Devon Kennard**, who combined have 209 tackles and 40 starts in their careers.

—Safety **Jawanza Starling**, a 2-year starter whose 80-yard scoring fumble return changed the momentum in last year's win at Notre Dame.

—2011 co-starting middle linebacker **Lamar Dawson**.

—Cornerback **Isiah Wiley**.

Others on the 2012 roster with defensive starting experience are cornerbacks **Torin Harris** and **Anthony Brown**, who respectively started the first 4 and next 2 games last year before suffering season-ending injuries, tackle **George Uko**, safety **Drew McAllister**, linebacker **Tre Madden** and cornerback **Tony Burnett**.

Both of USC's specialists return. Placekicker **Andre Heidari**, a 2011 Freshman All-American and All-Pac-12 first teamer who is now a Groza Award candidate, hit 15-of-17 field goals and all 50 of his PATs last year. His 88.2% field goal percentage was third best in the nation (tops among freshmen) and his 50-yard field goal versus Stanford was USC's longest since 1990. Punter **Kyle Negrete**, an Academic All-American candidate and Burlsworth Trophy candidate who excels at directional punting, saw nearly half of his 39 punts in 2011 pin opponents within the 20-yard line (and only 10 were returned).

With all this talent coming back, the Trojans likely will enter 2012 highly ranked. But third-year USC head coach **Lane Kiffin** is cautious.

"As I have said before, the game is about the prep and not the hype," said Kiffin, whose 18 wins trail only College Football Hall of Famers Howard Jones and John Robinson (19 each) for most victories in the first 2 years as a Trojan head coach. **"Although there are now high expectations nationally for our football program, it is important to realize that we have always had extremely high expectations within our program."**

"This spring and fall as we prepare for the 2012 season, we will go about the development of our team and our players no differently than we did last season. We realize that this is still a relatively young football team at many positions. So it will be critical to have a great spring and fall of individual and positional development."

Although USC did not suffer many personnel losses from 2011, some key players have departed. The starters gone from 2011 are All-American offensive tackle Matt Kalil, a 2-year starter who won the Pac-12's Morris Trophy; All-Pac-12 first team defensive end Nick Perry, a 2-year starter who was a finalist for the Hendricks Award after notching 9.5 sacks last year (10th nationally); fullback-tight end Rhett Ellison, who had 53 career catches and earned All-Pac-12 first team honors last fall as a special teams player; and defensive tackles Christian Tupou and DaJohn Harris (3- and 2-year starters, respectively).

Also gone are 2011 co-starters Chris Galippo (166 tackles and 6 interceptions in his career) at middle linebacker and Marc Tyler (1,751 career rushing yards, with 5 100-yard games) at tailback. Others not returning who had some starting experience include wide receivers Brandon Carswell (40 career receptions) and Brice Butler (41 career receptions) and linebacker Shane Horton (99 tackles at USC).

The Trojan staff features 3 new full-time assistant coaches: Tennessee's 1998 national championship quarterback and NFL veteran **Tee Martin** (wide receivers), former Nebraska

assistant and North Carolina defensive coordinator **Marvin Sanders** (secondary) and **Scottie Hazelton** (linebackers), who was the defensive coordinator for North Dakota State's 2011 NCAA FCS national championship team. They will join holdovers **Ed Orgeron** (defensive coordinator/recruiting coordinator/defensive line), **Monte Kiffin** (assistant head coach), **Kennedy Polamalu** (offensive coordinator/running backs), **John Baxter** (associate head coach/special teams), **Clay Helton** (passing game coordinator/quarterbacks) and **James Cregg** (offensive line). **Justin Mesa** returns as the tight ends graduate assistant, while **Shawn Howe** becomes the defensive line graduate assistant after serving as a defensive administrative assistant in 2011.

As usual, USC's schedule is challenging. The Trojans will face 8 teams that played in a bowl in 2011, 6 teams that won at least 7 games last year and 4 squads that will be guided by new coaches. Troy plays 6 home games in the Coliseum in 2012. USC opens with a Sept. 1 home contest against Norm Chow-led Hawaii, just the third time that the Warriors have played the Trojans in the Coliseum. Troy then will make its first visit to the New York City area since 2000 when it meets Syracuse on Sept. 8 in 82,500-seat MetLife Stadium in East Rutherford, N.J. USC then begins Pac-12 play by facing the Bay Area schools, traveling to Stanford on Sept. 15 (the Pac-12's first conference game of 2012) and hosting California on Sept. 22. After a bye, USC resumes league play with a Thursday game at Utah on Oct. 4 (its first time there since 1917), followed by a trip to Washington on Oct. 13. The Trojans return to the Coliseum for an Oct. 20 game against Colorado before going to Arizona (under new mentor Rich Rodriguez) on Oct. 27. Troy opens the month of November with home games against 3-time defending league champion Oregon on Nov. 3 and Arizona State (and new coach Todd Graham) on Nov. 10. USC then plays its traditional rivals, first facing new coach Jim Mora's UCLA team in the Rose Bowl on Nov. 17 and then hosting Notre Dame on the Saturday (Nov. 24) of Thanksgiving weekend. Unfinished business, indeed.

OFFENSE

Nine starters return on offense from 2011: quarterback **Matt Barkley**, wide receivers **Robert Woods** and **Marqise Lee**, tailback **Curtis McNeal**, center **Khaled Holmes**, guards **Marcus Martin** and **John Martinez**, tackle **Kevin Graf** and co-starting tight ends **Randall Telfer** and **Xavier Grimbale**. Others back with starting experience are tailback **D.J. Morgan** and tackle-guard **Jeremy Galten**.

USC will look to build upon 2011's outstanding offensive showing. The Trojans return a 3,500-yard passer, a pair of 1,000-yard receivers, a 1,000-yard rusher and a pair of tight ends who combined for 9 touchdowns. USC's passing (294.2), total offense (456.8) and scoring (35.8) averages last year increased from 2010. Only its rushing average (162.6) showed a slight decline from 2010 (-26.7).


The Trojans were sixth nationally in passing efficiency (161.1) and in the nation's Top 25 in passing (15th), scoring (16th) and total (21st) offense. USC's yards-per-play average (6.5) was the third highest in school history, while its averages for total offense and passing offense were the fourth highest and its scoring offense average was the fifth highest. Troy's 8 sacks allowed were the fewest at USC since records were kept in 1987 (despite not starting a senior on the offensive line) and ranked the Trojans second nationally in 2011. USC led the Pac-12 in fewest penalty yards and was in the league's Top 3 in first downs, third down conversions and time of possession.

"We were successful offensively as last season progressed," said Kiffin. **"It is important that we continue in that direction in 2012. We return a lot of firepower on offense, but there are some depth and youth issues that we need to overcome. Spring practice will be crucial in this regard."**

QUARTERBACKS—USC is led in 2012 by perhaps the best player in college football, senior quarterback **Matt Barkley** (308-of-446, 69.1%, 3,528 yds, 39 TD, 7 int in 2011, plus 28 tcb, 14 yds, 0.5 avg, 2 TD and 2 tac). He is the leading contender for the Heisman Trophy as he enters his fourth year as a starter (he was sixth in the 2011 Heisman voting). Last season when he was a finalist for the Manning Award and Wuerffel Trophy, he set a Pac-12 record for touchdown passes (39) and a USC record for completion percentage (69.1%) while becoming just the fourth Trojan signalcaller to pass for more than 3,500 yards in a season. He also set 4 USC game records (35 completions, 468 passing yards, 6 TD passes and 470 yards of total offense). He is on pace to become Troy's career leader in pass completions, yardage and TDs and total offense yardage. He will be USC's first-ever 3-time captain.

Three untested young quarterbacks will battle to be Barkley's backup: sophomore **Jesse Scroggins**, who took 1 snap last year after missing the first 6 contests with a thumb injury, and high-potential redshirt freshmen **Cody Kessler** and **Max Wittek**.

Also available are 3 walk-ons in seniors **John Manoogian**, who took a few end-of-game snaps in 2 contests last fall, and **Emon Saeed** and sophomore **Anthony Neyer** (Saeed and Neyer each got into a game last season as a wideout for 1 snap).

"We are looking forward to challenging Matt Barkley, on and off the field, to be the best player in college football in 2012," said Kiffin. **"As good of a year as he had last year, he has the opportunity to be even better this season. He has high standards and goals, and they are all attainable this year. We are also looking forward to a very competitive race among the backup quarterbacks this spring. All of them are very talented and have bright futures."**


RUNNING BACKS—USC features a pair of high-quality tailbacks in 2012, but depth is a concern here. Last season's co-starting tailback, bruising Marc Tyler (he had 1,751 career rushing yards and 5 100-yard games) will be missed.

Senior **Curtis McNeal** (145 tcb, 1,005 yds, 6.9 avg, 6 TD in 2011, plus 3 rec, 19 yds, 6.3 avg and 6 KOR, 101 yds, 16.8 avg and 3 tac) returns after becoming USC's 27th 1,000-yard season rusher. He posted a quartet of 100-yard outings as a co-starter in 2011. The short but elusive McNeal's 6.9-yard average per carry last season was the best by a Trojan since 2005. He had USC's 5 longest runs of 2011, including 3 in excess of 60 yards. He is also an effective kickoff returner.

Sophomore **D.J. Morgan** (42 tcb, 163 yds, 3.9 avg in 2011, plus 2 tac) started USC's first 2 games of 2011 and then saw backup action the rest of the way. He was the first USC freshman tailback to start an opener in 5 years. He finally is 100% after a serious knee injury in his 2009 senior year of high school.

Redshirt freshman **Javorious "Buck" Allen**, a physical-style tailback, is also available. There there are as-yet-unused sophomore walk-ons **Kameron Germany**, **Alec Jaffe** and **Taylor Ross**.

The Trojans must develop a new fullback in 2012 now that Rhett Ellison has departed. In his career, the versatile Ellison played both fullback and tight end (he had 53 career receptions) and was a top special teams performer (he earned 2011 All-Pac-12 first team laurels as a special teamer).

Competing for the fullback job will be a pair of young players seeking their first game action: 250-pound redshirt freshman **Soma Vainuku** and freshman **Jahleel Pinner** (Mission Viejo High in Mission Viejo, Calif.), a prep All-American who arrives in the fall.

"Although this is not a very deep group, it is a group with a lot of talent," said Kiffin. **"We are looking for Curtis McNeal's game to become more complete and well rounded, and for him to build upon his 1,000-yard season of last year. D.J. Morgan appears fully healthy now and we want to get him, Buck Allen and Soma Vainuku lots of reps this spring and show us what they can do."**

WIDE RECEIVERS—USC has the best pair of wide receivers in college football in 2012 in junior **Robert Woods** (111 rec, 1,292 yds, 11.6 avg, 15 TD in 2011, plus 17 KOR, 393 yds, 23.1 avg and 13 PR, 118 yds, 9.1 avg and 7 tcb, 16 yds, 2.3 avg) and sophomore **Marqise Lee** (73 rec, 1,143 yds, 15.7 avg, 11 TD in 2011, plus 5 tcb, 33 yds, 6.6 avg and 10 KOR, 285 yds, 28.5 avg, 1 TD and 1 tac). The Biletnikoff Award candidates, who both had 1,000 receiving yards last fall, combined in 2011 for the most receptions (184) and receiving yards (2,435) by a pair of Trojans in a season. And they became the first Trojan duo with at least 10 catches in a game when they did so versus UCLA in 2011. Woods had 7 100-yard games in 2011 and Lee added 4. They also figure to again be used in USC's return game in 2012 (both have scoring kickoff returns in their careers).

The quick Woods, who will be starting for his third season, could become Troy's career pass catching and kickoff return leader sometime in his junior season. He was a consensus All-American and Biletnikoff finalist in 2011 when he caught a Pac-12 record 111 receptions and set a USC game mark with 17 catches. He was the only unanimous selection on the 2011 All-Pac-12 first team. He was one of just 2 players in the nation last season in the national Top 16 in receptions, receiving yards and all-purpose running. He had 4 games last fall with double digit receptions. He is one of only 3 Trojans in history to have a pair of career 200-yard receiving outings.

The high-leaping Lee earned Freshman All-American first team and Pac-12 Freshman Offensive Co-Player of the Year notice in 2011. His 11 TD catches (10 of which were at least 24 yards) were the most nationally by a freshman last fall. His 73 receptions were the second most ever by a USC freshman and his 13 grabs against UCLA tied the Trojan freshman record.

Speedy sophomore **George Farmer** (4 rec, 42 yds, 10.5 avg in 2011, plus 5 tcb, 15 yds, 3.0 avg and 3 KOR, 59 yds, 19.7 avg and 2 tac), a high school teammate of Woods and Lee, figures to get key playing time at wideout in 2012 and also could be used as a returner. Last fall, he worked at both receiver and tailback.

The others in the wide receivers mix have yet to catch a pass at USC. They include junior **De'Von Fournoy** (1 tac in 2011) and redshirt freshman **Victor Blackwell**, as well as walk-ons **Devin Forte**, a senior, and junior **Cody Skene**.

Joining the wide receiver corps in the fall as freshmen will be prep All-Americans **Nelson Agholor** (Berkeley Prep High in Tampa, Fla.) and **Darreus Rogers** (Carson High in Carson, Calif.).

"We are challenging this group to be the No. 1 wide receiver unit in the country," said Kiffin. **"As dominant as Robert Woods and Marqise Lee have been, they know they have areas where they can improve. They are special players and are ready to step up their games. We also are excited to watch the continued development of George Farmer, De'Von Fournoy and Victor Blackwell as they compete this spring."**

Last year's co-starters, sophomores **Randall Telfer** (26 rec, 273 yds, 10.5 avg, 5 TD in 2011, plus 1 KOR, 2 yds, 2.0 avg and 1 BLK FG and 1 tac) and **Xavier Grimble** (15 rec, 144 yd, 9.6 avg, 4 TD in 2011, plus 2 KOR, 3 yds, 1.5 avg), return after combining for 9 TDs. Telfer's 26 catches in 2011 set a record for USC freshmen tight ends.

Then there are soph **Christian Thomas** (3 tac in 2011), who missed the last 10 games of 2011 with a hip injury, and redshirt freshman **Junior Pomee**.


Prep All-American **Jalen Cope-Fitzpatrick** (Whitney High in Rocklin, Calif.) will join this group in the fall as a freshman.

"This is the deepest position group on our team, but also the youngest," said Kiffin. **"These players are all very talented and give us many options at tight end."**



Troy must find a new left tackle, as 2-year starter Matt Kalil declared for the NFL draft following an All-American first team junior season that saw him win the Pac-12's Morris Trophy.

Anchoring the line in 2012 will be senior center **Khaled Holmes**, the top Rimington Award candidate who will be starting on the line for his third season. He is also an Academic All-American prospect.

Both guards return, sophomore **Marcus Martin** on the left side after earning Freshman All-American first team honors in 2011, and junior **John Martinez** on the right side. Martin was the first USC true freshman to start at guard since 2004.

Junior tackle **Kevin Graf** is back after starting 2011 at right tackle. He might be tried at Kalil's left tackle spot, as will massive (6-6, 320 pounds) sophomore **Aundrey Walker**, who saw action in 11 games last fall.

The only other Trojan lineman with significant playing experience is senior tackle-guard **Jeremy Galten**, who appeared in all 12 games last year and even started the opener. He was the first player since 1990 to go directly from a junior college and start an opener at guard for USC (and the first to start on the line since 2004).

Other offensive linemen looking to get into the mix are senior center **Abe Markowitz** (foot injuries have sidelined him most of the past 2 seasons), junior tackle-guard **David Garness**, sophomore guard **Giovanni Di Paolo** (he can also play center), who missed last year with a shoulder injury, and redshirt freshman center-guard **Cyrus Hobbi**.

There are also several walk-on linemen: soph guard **Nathan Guertler**, who got into 4 games last year, and redshirt freshmen **Eric Jepsen**, a center, and guard-center **John Katnik**.

Freshman tackle **Chad Wheeler** (Santa Monica High in Santa Monica, Calif.) graduated a semester early from high school and enrolled at USC this spring.


Three prep All-Americans will arrive in the fall as freshmen: tackle **Zach Banner** (Lakes High in Lakewood, Wash.) and tackle-guards **Jordan Simmons** (Crespi High in Encino, Calif.) and **Max Tuerk** (Santa Margarita High in Rancho Santa Margarita, Calif.).

"We return a lot of experience on the offensive line, but no doubt we have a big hole to fill with the early departure of Matt Kalil," said Kiffin. **"Left tackle will be one of the most interesting battles on our team this spring. Khaled Holmes will be our rock up front. Marcus Martin, John Martinez and Kevin Graf all performed solidly last year and we look for them to**

continue to mature and improve. And we have a lot of quality young players on the line who can really help us. Their development during spring practice will be important."



DEFENSE

Eight defensive starters return from 2011: safeties **T.J. McDonald** and **Jawanza Starling**, linebackers **Dion Bailey**, **Hayes Pullard** and **Lamar Dawson**, cornerbacks **Nickell Robey** and **Isiah Wiley** and co-starting ends **Wes Horton** and **Devon Kennard**. Others back with starting experience are cornerbacks **Torin Harris**, **Anthony Brown** and **Tony Burnett**, tackle **George Uko**, safety **Drew McAllister** and linebacker **Tre Madden**.

USC's top 4 tacklers from 2011 are back, as are its leaders in interceptions, pass deflections and fumble recoveries. The Trojans' 2011 numbers improved from 2010 in rushing (111.4), total (374.8) and scoring (23.6) defense, with the rushing defense and sack (2.6) averages ranking in the national Top 20. USC held 8 of its 12 opponents to 17 points or less last fall. USC was in the Pac-12's Top 3 in red zone defense. But Troy must improve on its pass defense, which allowed 263.3 yards a game in 2011 after allowing 259.5 the previous year (those are 2 of the 4 highest totals in school history).

"I was very encouraged by the way we finished down the stretch defensively last year," said Kiffin. "We need to continue that improvement and get to the level of defense that we have seen at USC before. Most importantly, we must improve our pass defense, which has been vulnerable the past 2 years. We have a good chance of doing that in 2012 as we return our back 7 players."

DEFENSIVE LINEMEN—USC's defensive front suffered the most losses of any position unit from 2011, as 3 starters have moved on. All-Pac-12 first team end Nick Perry, a 2-year starter, left for the NFL after a junior season that saw him be a finalist for the Hendricks Award and finish 10th nationally in sacks with 9.5. Tackles Christian Tupou, a 3-year starter, and 2-year starter DaJohn Harris also are gone.

Senior ends **Wes Horton** (22 tac, 4.5 for loss, 4 sack, 2 dfl, 1 FF in 2011) and **Devon Kennard** (29 tac, 4 for loss, 2 sack, 1 SAF in 2011), who shared starts in 2011, figure to both start in 2012. Horton, with 22 starts spread out over the past 3 seasons, has 8 sacks among his 74 career tackles. Kennard, with 135 career tackles, has 18 starts over the last 3 years (including some at middle and strongside linebacker).

Last year's often-employed backup tackles, sophomores **George Uko** (18 tac, 1.5 for loss, 1.5 sack, 1 dfl, 2 FF in 2011), who started twice in 2011, and **J.R. Tavai** (4 tac, 1 for loss in 2011), are in line to earn starting jobs this season.

Three redshirt freshmen will challenge for playing time at tackle: **Christian Heyward**, **Antwaun Woods** and converted center **Cody Temple**.

Ends looking to get into the playing rotation are junior **Kevin Greene** (1 tac in 2011) and redshirt freshmen **Greg Townsend Jr.** and **Charles Burks**.


Then there are junior end **Morgan Breslin** (Diablo Valley Junior College in Pleasant Hills, Calif.), a junior college All-American who enrolled at USC this spring after leading the state's jucos in sacks and tackles for losses the past 2 years, and freshman end **DeVante Wilson** (Corona High in Corona, Calif.), who was set to enroll at USC for the 2011 fall semester after a prep All-American career but tore knee ligaments and took off last semester while recuperating.

Bolstering the line in the fall as a freshman will be prep All-American end **Leonard Williams** (Mainland High in Daytona Beach, Fla.).


"We suffered our most significant personnel losses on the defensive line," said Kiffin. "So it is extremely critical that our young players develop well and quickly, especially the tackles. Wes Horton and Devon Kennard will provide great leadership for this unit and we expect that they will continue to improve upon their playing ability."

LINEBACKERS—Troy returns a trio of acclaimed sophomore starters at linebacker in 2012 in **Dion Bailey** (81 tac, 2 for loss, 2 sack, 2 dfl, 1 FF, 2 int in 2011) on the strong side, **Hayes Pullard** (81 tac, 6.5 for loss, 4.5 sack, 2 dfl, 2 FF in 2011) on the weak side and **Lamar Dawson** (25 tac, 2 for loss, 1 sack in 2011) in the middle. And there is some capable young depth behind them.

Butkus Award candidates Bailey and Pullard were 2011 Freshman All-American first teamers and were the first freshmen to lead USC in tackles. They each posted a USC season-high 14 tackles in a game in 2011. Bailey was the Pac-12 Freshman Defensive Player of the Year.


Dawson emerged as the starter for the final 4 games of 2011 after backing up Chris Galippo, who had 166 tackles and 6 interceptions in his career while starting 28 times.

Angling for playing time are sophomore **Tre Madden** (15 tac, 1 for loss in 2011), who played on special teams in 2011 and even started once for an injured Bailey, senior **Dallas Kelley**, juniors **Will Andrew** (5 tac, 1 FR in 2011) and **Marquis Simmons** (1 tac in 2011), who sat out most of 2011 with a neck injury, and redshirt freshman **Anthony Sarao**.

Then there are walk-ons **Luke Freeman** and **Kyle Yatabe**, both juniors, and senior **Doug Scott**.

Freshman **Scott Starr** (Norco High in Norco, Calif.), a prep All-American, graduated a semester early from high school and enrolled at USC this spring.



DEFENSIVE BACKS—USC's entire starting secondary returns in 2012, as do most of the backups from 2011, making this the Trojans' deepest defensive unit.

The secondary is led by hard-hitting senior free safety **T.J. McDonald** (67 tac, 2.5 for loss, 3 int, 1 FR, 2 dfl, 1 BLK P in 2011), a 2011 All-American and All-Pac-12 first team selection who will be starting for his third year. He is the leading candidate for the Thorpe Award. He led the Trojans in interceptions (3) last fall and was third in tackles (67) after being the team's tackle leader in 2010. He has 163 stops and 6 picks in his career.

Like McDonald, senior strong safety **Jawanza Starling** (48 tac, 3.5 for loss, 2 dfl, 2 FR with 1 for TD in 2011) figures to be in the starting lineup for his third season. He will long be remembered for his 80-yard fumble return for a touchdown that swung the momentum to USC's favor in last year's victory at Notre Dame.

Junior **Nickell Robey** (63 tac, 5.5 for loss, 2 sack, 9 dfl, 2 int with 1 TD in 2011, plus 12 PR, 132 yds, 11.0 avg and 1 KOR, 20 yds, 20.0 avg), a lockdown cornerback, will start for his third season and is a Thorpe Award nominee after winning All-Pac-12 first team honors in 2011. He led the Trojans in pass deflections (9) and was fourth in tackles (63) last year. In his career, he has 111 tackles, 6 interceptions and 13 deflections. He also was one of Troy's top punt returners last fall, a task he might handle again in 2012.

The 3 players who manned the other cornerback spot in 2011—senior **Isiah Wiley** (39 tac, 2 for loss, 1 sack, 4 dfl, 1 FR in 2011), junior **Torin Harris** (17 tac, 1 int, 2 dfl, 1 FF, 1 TD on BLK FG ret in 2011) and sophomore **Anthony Brown** (16 tac, 1 for loss in 2011)—all return this season. Harris started the first 4 games of 2011 before being sidelined by a shoulder injury. Brown took over for the next 2 games before a broken ankle knocked him out of action. He was replaced the rest of the season by Wiley, who did a commendable job after transferring from a junior college.


Other experienced safeties are senior **Drew McAllister** (22 tac, 1 for loss in 2011), who has 2 career starts, and junior **Demetrius Wright** (13 tac, 0.5 for loss, 0.5 sack in 2011).

Also available at cornerback are seniors **Tony Burnett** (25 tac, 1 dfl in 2011), who has played often in extra defensive back formations and on special teams, and **Brian Baucham**, who sat out 2011 while ineligible, and redshirt freshman **Ryan Henderson**.


Then there are 3 walk-on safeties who have yet to play: juniors **John Auran** and **Luis Nevarez** and redshirt freshman **Troy Cardona**.

Sophomore safety **Josh Shaw** transferred to USC this spring from Florida, where he played in 10 games last season (starting once).

Adding to the secondary mix in the fall will be junior safety **Gerald Bowman** (Los Angeles Pierce Junior College in Woodland Hills, Calif.), a juco transfer, plus prep All-American **Kevon Seymour** (Muir High in Pasadena, Calif.) and **Devian Shelton** (Inglewood High in Inglewood, Calif.), both freshman cornerbacks.



"I am very excited about our secondary and how we expect it will develop," said Kiffin. "It is unusual to have all your starters back, plus the amount of experienced depth we have. T.J. McDonald is the best safety in the nation and is a true leader on and off the field. Nickell Robey might be the nation's best cornerback. He does so many good things for us. Add in players like Jawanza Starling, Isiah Wiley, Torin Harris, Anthony Brown and Drew McAllister and we are optimistic that our pass defense will be much improved from the past 2 years."

SPECIAL TEAMS


USC's placekicker (**Andre Heidari**) and punter (**Kyle Negrete**) are back from 2011, as are its leading kickoff (**Robert Woods**, **Marqise Lee**) and punt returners (**Woods**, **Nickell Robey**) and its holder (**Matt Barkley**). But the Trojans must find a new snapper.

The Trojans continued to make big plays on special teams in 2011. For the second consecutive year, USC blocked 7 kicks (1 was returned for a touchdown). Troy led the Pac-12 in field goals and PATs, allowed only 10 punt returns, had a scoring kickoff runback and turned a fake punt into a 35-yard gain. But conversely, USC allowed 2 kick returns for TDs, ranked only 38th nationally in punt returns and 79th in kickoff returns, converted just 1-of-4 2-point tries and had a net punting average of just 37.4 yards.

"We have been effective in many areas of special teams, to the point where they have been part of many game-changing moments," said Kiffin. "But we look forward to the continued improvement of our special teams going into Year 3 of our system. Our specialists, Andre Heidari and Kyle Negrete, were really on their games last year and we look for more of the same from them. And our returners proved to be dangerous at times. We have a number of redshirt and new players who we believe can help us in all areas of special teams in 2012."

PUNTERS—Senior walk-on **Kyle Negrete** (40.1 avg in 2011, plus 1 tcb, 35 yds, 35.0 avg) returns after an effective 2011 campaign. The candidate for Academic All-American and the Burlsworth Trophy is a master at directional punting, as 19 of his 39 punts in 2011 pinned foes within the 20-yard line (none were touchbacks) and only 10 were returned.

He is backed by redshirt freshman **Kris Albarado**.

PLACEKICKERS—USC has one of the nation's top young placekickers in sophomore **Andre Heidari** (50-of-50 PAT, 15-of-17 FG in 2011, plus 4 tac). Now a Groza Award candidate, he earned Freshman All-American and All-Pac-12 first team notice in 2011 after hitting 15-of-17 field goals and all 50 of his PATs. His 88.2% field goal percentage was third best in the nation last fall (tops among freshmen) and his 50-yard field goal versus Stanford was USC's longest since 1990. He hit 9 consecutive field goals at one point last year and was 4-of-5 on 3-pointers of at least 40 yards. Almost a third of his 76 kickoffs pinned opponents within the 20-yard line (10 were touchbacks).

Behind him are a pair of walk-on kickers, sophomore **Craig McMahon** (he kicked off twice last year) and redshirt freshman **Joshua Alswang**.

SNAPPERS—Chris Pousson, who flawlessly handled USC's short snaps for the past 4 years and the long snaps for the last 2 seasons, has graduated.

Redshirt freshman **Peter McBride** will inherit the job.

HOLDERS—Senior quarterback **Matt Barkley** returns for his second season as the holder on all placekicks and his quarterbacking ability has come in handy whenever the Trojans use an unorthodox formation for 2-point conversions. He will be backed again by senior punter **Kyle Negrete**.

RETURNERS—USC sports some dangerous return men. Junior wide receiver **Robert Woods** (17 KOR, 393 yds, 23.1 avg in 2011, plus 13 PR, 118 yds, 9.1 avg), who set school season records for kickoff returns and yardage in 2010 and led the Trojans in that category for the second consecutive year in 2011, is fourth on USC's career kickoff return list (1,364 yards). He also shared punt return duties last fall with junior cornerback **Nickell Robey** (12 PR, 132 yds, 11.0 avg in 2011, plus 1 KOR, 20 yds, 20.0 avg). Sophomore wide receiver **Marqise Lee** (10 KOR, 285 yds, 28.5 avg, 1 TD in 2011) also got into the kickoff return act last year, even returning one for a touchdown.

Others with experience as returners who might be used again this year include senior tailback **Curtis McNeal** (6 KOR, 101 yds, 16.8 avg in 2011) and soph wide receiver **George Farmer** (3 KOR, 59 yds, 19.7 avg in 2011). It also is possible that some redshirted or new players will be tried as returners in 2012.

Lake Charles, LA (St. Louis HS)

2012: Albarado will serve as the backup punter as a redshirt freshman in 2012.

2011: Albarado redshirted as a freshman punter in 2011, his first year at USC.

HIGH SCHOOL: His 2010 honors included **Max Preps All-American Medium Schools second team and All-State 4A** as a senior punter at St. Louis High in Lake Charles (La.). He averaged 45.3 yards on his 24 punts (with a long of 65 yards) and put 8 punts within the 20-yard line in 2010.

As a junior in 2009, he averaged 41.8 yards on his 38 punts, with 19 punts within the 20.

(18) DION BAILEY

Linebacker, 6-0, 215, So.*/Jr.
Lakewood, CA (Lakewood HS)

2012: The impressive Bailey, an All-American candidate who could receive Butkus Award consideration, returns for his second year as the starting strongside linebacker as a sophomore in 2012 after a standout rookie showing in 2011 when he was the Trojans' tackle co-leader.

2011: Bailey, who was moved from safety to linebacker prior to 2011 spring practice, earned the starting job on the strongside as a redshirt freshman in 2011 and had a stellar showing all season. Overall in 2011 while starting 11 games (all but Colorado), he tied for the team lead in tackles with 81, including 2 sacks, plus he had 2 deflections, 2 interceptions and a forced fumble. He and fellow linebacker Hayes Pullard were the first freshmen to lead USC in tackles since records were first kept in 1954. He suffered a concussion against Stanford and missed the Colorado game. He was named the **2011 Pac-12 Freshman Defensive Player of the Year** and made the **All-Pac-12 second team**. He was the **Defensive Freshman of the Year on the 2011 CollegeFootballNews.com Freshman All-American first team** and made the **2011 Football Writers, Sporting**

News, CBSSports.com, YahooSports.com, FoxSportsNext.com and Phil Steele Freshman All-American first team. He made **2011 SI.com All-American honorable mention.** He made the **2011 Phil Steele All-Pac-12 second team.**

He had 7 tackles against Utah, then a team-best 9 tackles (with a sack) and a fumble recovery against Syracuse, a game-high 10 tackles (with a sack) and added a deflection at Arizona State, a game-high and career-best 14 tackles (the most by a USC freshman since Chris Claiborne's 20 in 1996 against Arizona State) and 1 deflection against Arizona and a team-best 8 tackles and 2 interceptions (the first in the endzone at the end of the first half to keep Cal scoreless as it was driving and the second late in the game to set up a USC TD) at California to earn **College Football Performance Awards National Linebacker of the Week** honors. He added 6 stops at Notre Dame, then a game-high 13 tackles against Stanford before suffering a concussion. After missing the Colorado game, he had 2 tackles against Washington, 7 tackles at Oregon and 5 tackles against UCLA.


2010: Bailey redshirted as a freshman safety in 2010, his first year at USC.





**Quarterback, 6-2, 230, Sr./Sr.
Newport Beach, CA (Mater Dei HS)**

CAREER: He is third on USC's career passing (755 completions) and total offense (9,013 yards) lists, behind Heisman winners Carson Palmer and Matt Leinart. He is fifth on the Pac-12 career touchdown pass chart (80, second on the USC list) and 16th in pass yardage (9,054, third on the USC list) and 16th in total offense (9,013). He has thrown at least 1 TD pass in 32 of his 36 career games, at least 2 TDs in 21 games, at least 3 TDs in 13 games, at least 4 TDs 7 times and at least 5 TDs 5 times (the only Trojan to have done so), including twice with a school record 6 TDs. He has thrown for at least 200 yards in 24 career games (10 times over 300 yards and twice over 400 yards). He has 36 career starts (he is 27-9 as a starter).

2012: Barkley, the nation's leading candidate for the Heisman Trophy, will start at quarterback for his fourth season as a senior in 2012 and is expected to build upon his stellar 2011 campaign. He is on pace to break USC career passing and total offense records. He will be USC's first-ever 3-time captain.

2011: Barkley started for his third season at quarterback as a junior in 2011 and had a record-setting season as he was among the nation's top signalcallers. Overall in 2011 while starting all 12 games, he was 308-of-446 (69.1%) for 3,528 yards with 39 TDs and just 7 interceptions. He also had 2 rushing TDs and he made 2 tackles. He was eighth nationally in passing efficiency (161.2, third in Pac-12) and 16th in total offense (295.2, third in Pac-12). His 39 TD passes in 2011 broke Heisman Trophy winner Matt Leinart's Pac-12 and USC season record and were third most in the nation. His 69.1% completion percentage in 2011 broke Rob Johnson's 18-year-old USC season record. His 308 completions in 2011 tied for second on the USC season list (1 shy of Heisman Trophy winner Carson Palmer's 2002 record of 309), his 3,528 yards was fifth most in a season at USC (16th in Pac-12) and his 3,542 yards of total offense was third on the USC season ladder (14th on the Pac-12 list). He set 4 USC game records in 2011: completions (35 versus UCLA), pass yardage (468 versus Arizona), TD passes (6 versus Colorado and UCLA) and total offense (470 versus Arizona). In his final 6 games of 2011, he threw 23 TDs with just 3 interceptions. He threw for more than 300 yards 6 times in 2011

(including twice over 400 yards) and had at least 4 TD passes 5 times in 2011.

He finished **sixth in the voting for the 2011 Heisman Trophy**. He was **one of 10 finalists for the Manning Award, as well as one of 15 semifinalists for the Walter Camp Award, one of 16 semifinalists for the 2011 Maxwell Award and one of 16 semifinalists for the Davey O'Brien Award** (for the third consecutive year). He was the **2011 College Football Performance Awards National Performer of the Year**. He made **2011 AP All-American third team and SI.com and Pro Football Weekly All-American honorable mention**. He made the **2011 All-Pac-12 second team**. He was the **Offensive Player of the Year on the 2011 CollegeFootballNews.com All-Pac-12 first team and made the 2011 CBSSports.com All-Pac-12 first team**. He made the **Phil Steele All-Pac-12 second team**. He was USC's 2011 MVP. He was a **USC captain** for the second consecutive year (only the 10th Trojan 2-time captain). He was one of 13 **finalists for the 2011 Wuerffel Trophy** (given to the player who best combines athletics, academics and community service). He was one of 11 FBS players named to the **2011 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team**, recognized for their commitment to making a difference in their communities.

Against Minnesota, he completed 34 passes to eclipse Todd Marinovich's USC single game record of 33 (set in 1989) and had a 75.6% completion percentage (on 45 attempts) while passing for 304 yards with 3 TDs and no interceptions or sacks (he hit 16 passes in a row at one point); he was 18-of-20 in the first half for 163 yards. He completed 20-of-32 passes for 264 yards with a TD and an interception against Utah. Against Syracuse, he threw a USC record-tying and Syracuse opponent record-tying 5 touchdowns for the third time in his career (his scoring passes of 5, 31, 44, 43 and 9 yards went to 5 different receivers) while completing 67% of his passes (26-of-39) for 324 yards to earn **Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week** honors. He was 21-of-33 for 227 yards and 1 TD at Arizona State, but had 2 interceptions. He earned **Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week and College Football Performance Awards National Performer of the Week and National Quarterback of the Week** honors as he completed 82.1% of his passes (32-of-39) for a USC game record 468 yards with 4 TDs and 1 interception against Arizona (he was 22-of-26 for 301 yards with 3 TDs in the first half) and he also ran for a short score (his 470 yards of total offense also was a school game record), with both records he broke belonged to Heisman Trophy winner Carson Palmer; on USC's second play of the game, he threw a career-long 82-yard scoring catch-and-run pass to wide receiver Robert Woods, the longest USC pass since Palmer's 93-yard TD pass to Kareem Kelly in 2001. He hit 19-of-35 passes for 195 yards and 2 TDs (and no interceptions) at California. He joined Matt Leinart as the only USC starting quarterbacks to win twice at Notre Dame as he was 24-of-35 for 224 yards and 3 touchdowns (he also ran 4 times for 19 yards). He completed 28-of-45 passes for 284 yards and 3 TDs with 1 interception against Stanford. He threw a school-record 6 touchdown passes at Colorado while completing 25-of-39 passes

for 318 yards with an interception to earn **Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week and College Football Performance Awards National Performer of the Week and National Quarterback of the Week** honors. He hit 18-of-28 passes for 174 yards and 1 TD against Washington and he also had a 1-yard TD sneak. He was 26-of-34 (76.5%) for 323 yards with 4 TDs and an interception at Oregon. He completed 83.3% of his passes against UCLA by hitting a school-record 35 passes (in 42 attempts) for 423 yards and a USC record-tying 6 TDs with no interceptions (he hit 19 of his first 20 passes, including 13 in a row) to earn **Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week and College Football Performance Awards National Performer of the Week and National Quarterback of the Week** honors.

2010: Barkley started at quarterback for his second season as a sophomore in 2010 and had a solid year. Overall while starting 12 games (he missed the Notre Dame game with an injury), he was 236-of-377 (62.6%) for 2,791 yards with 26 TDs and 12 interceptions, plus he had 2 rushing TDs. He had a streak of 140 consecutive passes without an interception in 2010. He threw at least 2 TDs in 7 games in 2010 and at least 3 TDs 5 times, including twice with a school record-tying 5 TDs. His 236 completions in 2010 was eighth on the USC season list and his 2,774 yards of total offense was 11th on USC's season ladder. He was a **semifinalist for the 2010 Davey O'Brien Award**. He made **2010 All-Pac-10 honorable mention and Phil Steele All-Pac-10 third team**. He was a **USC captain**, the first sophomore ever name a Trojan captain. He had surgery on his right wrist prior to 2010 spring practice to relieve stiffness and clean up inflammation.

He completed 78.3% of his passes (18-of-23) for 257 yards with a USC single game record-tying 5 TDs against Hawaii. He hit 20-of-35 passes for 202 yards and 2 TDs against Virginia and he also had a career-long 20-yard scramble. He was 17-of-26 for 192 yards and 2 TDs against Minnesota, but threw 2 interceptions (after beginning the 2010 season without a pick in his first 72 passes). He was 16-of-25 for 290 yards with 3 touchdowns at Washington State but threw 2 interceptions. He hit 70% of his passes (14-of-20) for 186 yards against Washington, but had his streak of games with a TD pass snapped at 12. He completed 28-of-45 passes for 390 yards (all career highs) with 3 TDs against Stanford and he also tied for the team lead in rushing with 33 yards on 5 carries (with a career-long 27-yard scramble). He threw a USC single game record-tying 5 TDs (all in the first half, also tying a USC game record) against California and overall completed 25-of-37 passes for 352 yards as he earned **College Football Performance Awards National Quarterback of the Week and Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week** honors. He was 26-of-49 for 264 yards with a TD against Oregon (it was the most pass attempts by a Trojan since Carson Palmer's 50 against Washington State in 2002), but he was picked off twice (to snap a streak of 140 passes without an interception) and lost a fumble; he also scored on a 1-yard sneak. He was 26-of-37 for 215 yards and 3 TDs against Arizona State, but threw 2 interceptions (1 was returned for a TD and the other was in the end zone). He was

21-of-35 for 170 yards with a TD and an interception against Arizona (he was 15-of-20 for 124 yards in the first half) and also scored on a 1-yard sneak. He was 10-of-19 for 75 yards with an interception against Oregon State before being sidelined with an ankle sprain on USC's final play of the first half (the injury sidelined him for the next game against Notre Dame). He returned at UCLA and, playing with a high ankle sprain that sidelined him the previous game-and-a-half, completed 15-of-26 passes for 198 yards with 1 TD and 2 interceptions at UCLA.

2009: Barkley, who enrolled at USC in the spring of 2009 after graduating a semester early from high school and had an impressive showing in 2009 spring practice, won the starting quarterback job as a first-year freshman in 2009. Overall in 2009 while starting 12 games (he missed the Washington game with an injury), he was 211-of-352 (59.9%) with 2,735 yards, 15 TDs and 14 interceptions. He also had 2 short rushing touchdowns. His 211 completions put him 13th on USC's season passing list. He also was 12th on USC's season total offense list (2,697 yards). He was a **semifinalist for the 2009 Davey O'Brien Award** (he was the only freshman among the 15 semifinalists). He was named a **2009 CollegeFootballNews.com Freshman All-American honorable mention**.

He completed 78.9% of his passes (15-of-19) for 233 yards with a touchdown and no interceptions against San Jose State as he became the first USC true freshman to ever start a season opener at quarterback (and the first true freshman quarterback to start an opener for an AP Top 5 team since No. 3 Michigan's Rick Leach did so in 1975), as well as just the third Trojan true freshman signalcaller to ever start a game (joining Rob Johnson, 1 start in 1991, and Carson Palmer, 5 starts in 1998). He showed tremendous poise and leadership at noisy Ohio State as he completed 15-of-31 passes for 195 yards (with an interception) and led USC on a late 86-yard game-winning drive (contributing 55 passing yards and 2 sneaks for first downs in the series) despite bruising his throwing (right) shoulder in the second half, which sidelined him for the subsequent game at Washington. He returned to the starting lineup against Washington State and hit 13-of-22 passes for 247 yards, with a pair of long touchdowns (29 and 57 yards), despite still somewhat bothered by a sore shoulder. He was 20-of-35 for 283 yards with an interception at California. He hit 19-of-29 passes for a career-best 380 yards with 2 touchdowns and an interception at Notre Dame (he was 11-of-14 for 234 yards in the second half, including completing 8 consecutive throws) to earn **Davey O'Brien National Quarterback of the Week** honors. He hit 15-of-25 passes for 202 yards with 2 TDs and 2 interceptions (and he also scored on a sneak) against Oregon State. He completed 21-of-38 passes for 187 yards and 2 short touchdowns at Oregon (his final pass was intercepted). He was 7-of-22 for 112 yards with a TD (a 75-yarder, the longest at USC since a 93-yarder from Carson Palmer to Kareem Kelly in 2001 against Oregon) and an interception at Arizona State. He was 21-of-31 for 196 yards with 1 TD and 3 interceptions against Stanford. He was 18-of-26 for 206 yards with a 48-yard TD and an

interception against UCLA. He was 20-of-37 for 144 yards with a TD and an interception against Arizona. He hit 73.0% of his passes (27-of-37, with a career high for completions) for 350 yards and 2 TDs, plus ran for a short TD, against Boston College.

HIGH SCHOOL: His 2008 honors included **Super Prep All-American, Prep Star All-American, Scout.com All-American first team, ESPN 150, Super Prep Elite 50, Prep Star Dream Team, MVP of the Under Armour All-American Game, Super Prep All-Farwest, Prep Star All-West, Long Beach Press-Telegram Best in the West first team, Orange County Register Fab 15 first team, Tacoma News Tribune Western 100, Cal-Hi Sports All-State third team and All-Trinity League Co-MVP** as a senior quarterback at Mater Dei High in Santa Ana (Calif.). He completed 177-of-325 passes (54.5%) for 2,877 yards with 23 TDs and 18 interceptions in 2008.

As a junior in 2007, he was named the **Gatorade Male High School Athlete of the Year and the Gatorade National Football Player of the Year (the first time a junior was ever selected for either honor), as well as winning Joe Montana Quarterback of the Year Award**. He also made the **2007 USA Today All-USA second team, EA Sports All-American second team, Rivals.com Junior of the Year, Rivals.com Junior All-American first team, Cal-Hi Sports All-State first team, Cal-Hi Sports California Junior of the Year, Cal-Hi Sports All-State Underclass first team, All-CIF Pac-5 Division first team, Los Angeles Times All-Star Glenn Davis Award (as the top Southern California prep football player) and Orange County Register All-Orange County Offensive MVP**. He completed 213-of-340 passes (62.6%) for 3,576 yards (an Orange County record) and 35 TDs and 9 interceptions in 2007.

As a sophomore in 2006, he made **Cal-Hi Sports All-State Sophomore** while passing for 1,349 yards and 11 TDs.

A 4-year starter, he threw for 1,685 yards and 10 TDs as a 2005 freshman. Current Trojans Khaled Holmes, Victor Blackwell and Max Witte also prepped at Mater Dei.

PERSONAL: He's a communication major at USC with a B average (3.23 GPA). He made the **2011 Pac-12 All-Academic second team and 2010 Pac-10 All-Academic honorable mention**. He spent 11 days during 2010 Christmas break in Nigeria visiting orphans, widows, villagers and prisoners, doing construction work, distributing supplies and gifts and sharing daily fellowship. While in high school, he was active in his church (playing guitar in the choir) and in community service (he helped build homes for the poor in Mexico, volunteered at an orphanage in South Africa and spearheaded the Monarchs For Marines program that raised money for the families of wounded and fallen soldiers). His father, Les, lettered for 4 years (1976-79) in water polo at USC, captaining the Trojans his final 2 seasons and earning All-American second team notice in 1979. His brother, Sam, is a freshman hurdler on USC's track team. His cousin, Robbie Boyer, was a 2-year (2010-11) letterman wide receiver at USC whose only reception as a Trojan came on a Barkley pass on the final series of the season-ending 2011 UCLA game.

PERSONAL: He is a sociology major at USC.





Overall in 2009 while appearing in all 12 games (starting 5 times), he had 34 tackles, including 2 for losses, plus 3 deflections, 1 fumble recovery and 1 forced fumble. He made the **2009 ESPN.com Pac-10 All-Freshman first team and Sporting News Pac-10 All-Freshman first team.** He won USC's **John McKay Award.**

He had 5 tackles (1.5 for a loss) against San Jose State, then 1 tackle at Ohio State and 3 tackles (0.5 for a loss) while forcing and recovering a fumble that led to a USC TD against Washington State. 2012: Kessler will battle for the backup quarterback spot as a redshirt freshman in 2012.

2011: Kessler, who enrolled at USC in the spring of 2011 after graduating a semester early from high school, redshirted as a freshman quarterback in 2011, his first year at USC. He served as the backup quarterback.

He completed 175-of-251 (69.7%) of his passes for 2,831 yards and 36 TDs with just 2 interceptions in 2010 and rushed for 324 yards on 75 carries (4.3 avg.) with 8 TDs. He also averaged 36.4 yards on 32 punts in 2010, with a 13 pinning opponents within the 20-yard line and a long of 60 yards. Centennial was 10-2 in 2010.


2011: Lee emerged as a starting wide receiver as a freshman in 2011, his first year at USC, and had an all-star season. Overall in 2011 while starting 8 games (all but Syracuse, Arizona, Notre Dame, Oregon) and appearing in all 12 games, he had 73 catches for 1,143 yards (15.7 avg.) with 11 TDs, plus he had 5 carries for 33 yards (6.6 avg.) and 10 kickoff returns for 285 yards (28.5 avg.) with 1 TD. He also made a tackle. He was 15th nationally in receiving yards (95.3, fifth in Pac-12). His 11 TD catches were the most nationally by a freshman in 2011. Ten of his 11 TD catches in 2011 were at least 24 yards. His 73 receptions in 2011 were seventh on the USC season pass catching list (the second most by a Trojan freshman, behind Mike Williams' 81 in 2002). He had 4 100-yard receiving games in 2011. He and teammate Robert Woods each had at least 1,000 receiving yards in 2011, the fourth time that a pair of Trojans did that. Lee's and Woods' combined receptions (184) and receiving yards (2,435) in 2011 were the most by a pair of Trojans in a season. He made the **2011 Football Writers, Sporting News, CBSSports.com, CollegeFootballNews.com, FoxSportsNext.com, YahooSports.com and Phil Steele Freshman All-American first team.** He was the **2011 Pac-12 Freshman Offensive Co-Player of the Year and also made the All-Pac-12 second team.** He was the **2011 CollegeFootballNews.com Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and CBSSports.com Pac-12 Co-Freshman of the Year.** He made **2011 SI.com All-**

American honorable mention. He made the **2011 Phil Steele All-Pac-12 second team.**

He had 5 catches for 32 yards against Minnesota, then had 2 catches for 34 yards and an 8-yard run off a reverse against Utah and 2 receptions for 63 yards (with a 43-yard TD) against Syracuse. He had 4 catches for 50 yards (with a 24-yard TD) and had an 8-yard run on a reverse at Arizona State, then against Arizona had 8 catches for 144 yards (both career highs) with a 38-yard TD (Woods' and Lee's 399 combined receiving yardage was the most in a game by a USC duo ever) and he also had a 26-yard kickoff return. He had 4 catches for 81 yards (including a 39-yard TD) before hurting his shoulder at California. He then had 2 catches for 36 yards at Notre Dame, 7 receptions for 94 yards with a 28-yard TD against Stanford and 9 catches for 124 yards and 2 TDs (33 and 25 yards) at Colorado, where he also had 2 runs for 13 yards and a 14-yard kickoff return. He had 9 receptions for 74 yards, with a 9-yard TD, and an 88-yard TD kickoff return against Washington to earn **College Football Performance Awards National Kickoff Returner of the Week and Pac-12 Special Teams Player of the Week** honors. He had 325 all-purpose yards at Oregon (8 catches for a career-high 187 yards, both game bests, with a 59-yard TD to open USC's scoring, plus 6 kickoff returns for 134 yards and a 4-yard run) to earn **Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week, College Football Performance Awards National Wide Receiver of the Week and Rivals.com National Freshman of the Week** honors. Against UCLA, he caught 13 catches for 224 yards (both game- and career-highs)—the catches tied the USC freshman game record and the yardage tied for sixth most in USC history—with 2 TDs (42 and 52 yards) to earn **USC's Player of the Game versus UCLA Award** as he and Woods became the first Trojan pair with at least 10 receptions in the same game and he also had a 23-yard kickoff return.

TRACK: He is a long jumper on USC's track team.







2012: McBride figures to inherit the starting snapper job as a redshirt freshman in 2012.

2011: McBride, who enrolled at USC in the spring of 2011 after graduating a semester early from high school, redshirted as a freshman snapper in 2011, his first year at USC.

HIGH SCHOOL: His 2010 honors included **Under Armour All-American, Prep Star All-West and 5A Desert Valley All-Region first team** as a long snapper and defensive lineman at Chaparral High in Paradise Valley (Ariz.). Chaparral won the 2010 5A Division II state championship.

Safety, 6-3, 205, Sr./Sr. Fresno, CA (Edison HS)

CAREER: He has 163 tackles, including 5.5 for losses, and 6 interceptions in his career. He has 23 career starts.

2012: The hard-hitting McDonald, a Thorpe Award candidate who like his father has earned All-American honors at USC, returns for his third season as the starting free safety as a senior in 2012.

2011: McDonald started for his second season at free safety as a junior in 2011 and had an outstanding season. Overall in 2011 while appearing in all 12 (he started all but the Colorado game), he had 67 tackles (third on USC), including 2.5 for losses, a team-high 3 interceptions, 2 deflections, a fumble recovery and a blocked punt. He was **one of 15 semifinalists for the 2011 Thorpe Award and one of 20 quarterfinalists for the Lott IMPACT Trophy.** He made the **2011 Sporting News and Pro Football Weekly All-American first team** (joining his father, Tim, as the first father-son All-American first teamers in USC history), the **SI.com All-American second team and the Phil Steele All-American third team.** He made the **2011 All-Pac-12 first team.** He made the **2011 ESPN.com, CBSSports.com, CollegeFootballNews.com and Phil Steele All-Pac-12 first team.** He won **USC's 2011 Defensive Perimeter Player of the Year Award.** He was a **USC captain** (joining his father, Tim, as the first father-son captains in Trojan history).


He had a team-best 8 tackles against Minnesota, then had 2 stops and a fumble recovery (to set up a USC TD) against Utah and 5 tackles against Syracuse. He had 6 tackles

at Arizona State and then he had a pair of first quarter interceptions against Arizona (the first ended Nick Foles' streak of 210 passes without a pick dating to 2010) and he also had 6 tackles and a deflection to earn **Lott IMPACT Trophy National Player of the Week and Thorpe Award National Defensive Back of the Week.** He made 2 tackles (0.5 for a loss) at California, 5 tackles at Notre Dame and 5 tackles against Stanford (1 for a loss). He had 4 tackles while playing only the second half at Colorado (he was suspended for the first half by the Pac-12 for a hit in the Stanford game). He had 6 tackles against Washington and 8 tackles and blocked a punt at Oregon. Against UCLA, he had a game-best 10 tackles and had an interception (in the end zone with the Bruins threatening in the red zone) that he returned 25 yards and a deflection.

2010: McDonald was USC's starting free safety as a sophomore in 2010 and had an outstanding showing. Overall in 2010 while starting 12 games (he missed the UCLA game with a shoulder injury), he had a team-high 89 tackles, including 3 for losses (with a sack), plus 4 deflections, 3 interceptions and a blocked punt. He made the **2010 All-Pac-10 second team, Scout.com All-Pac-10 first team and Phil Steele All-Pac-10 first team.** He had surgery on his ankle prior to 2010 spring practice.

He had 4 stops with a deflection at Hawaii, then a game-best 14 tackles with an interception (in the end zone) and a deflection against Virginia, 7 tackles (with a sack) at Minnesota, 6 tackles (1 for a loss) and an interception that he ran back 20 yards at Washington State and a game-best 11 tackles against Washington. He added 4 tackles at Stanford, 3 tackles and an interception (to set up a USC TD) against California and 6 tackles (1 for a loss) and a deflection against Oregon. He had a game-high 13 tackles and blocked a punt (he also partially blocked another punt and downed a punt at the ASU 4-yard line) against Arizona State to earn **Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week** honors, a game-high 10 tackles against Arizona and a team-best 10 tackles with a deflection at Oregon State. He had a tackle against Notre Dame before spraining his shoulder early in the game (and sidelining him for the season finale at UCLA).

2009: McDonald saw limited action as a backup strong safety and played on special teams as a first-year freshman in 2009. Overall in 2009 while appearing in all 13 games, he had 7 tackles. He had 3 tackles

His father, Tim, was a 2-time (1985-86) All-American and 4-year (1983-86) letterman safety at USC, where he was named the team MVP his final 2 seasons, was Troy's 1986 captain and helped the Trojans to a victory in the 1985 Rose Bowl, and then played 13 years in the NFL as an All-Pro/Pro Bowler with the St. Louis/Phoenix Cardinals (1987-92) and San Francisco 49ers (1993-99), including on the 49ers' 1994 team that won the Super Bowl. His brother, Tevin, is a sophomore cornerback at UCLA. His initials stand for Tim Jr.


Tailback, 5-7, 190, Sr./Sr., Los Angeles, CA (Venice HS)

CAREER: In his career, he has 1,038 yards on 151 carries (6.9 avg.) with 6 TDs, plus 3 receptions for 19 yards (6.3 avg.), 19 kickoff returns for 343 yards (18.1 avg.) and 5 tackles. He has 4 career 100-yard rushing games. He has 4 career starts.

2012: The short but tough-to-tackle McNeal returns as the starting tailback as a senior in 2012 after a 1,000-yard outing in 2011.

2011: McNeal started USC's last 4 games at tailback as a junior in 2011 and had a very productive season while leading the Trojans in rushing. Overall in 2011 while appearing in all 12 games, he had 145 carries for a team-best 1,005 yards (6.9 avg.) with 6 TDs, plus 3 receptions for 19 yards (6.3 avg.) and 6 kickoff returns for 101 yards (16.8 avg.). He also made 3 tackles on special teams. He became USC's 27th 1,000-yard rusher in a season. He was USC's rushing leader 8 times in 2011. He had USC's 5 longest runs of 2011 (79 yards versus Washington, 73 yards versus UCLA, 61 yards against Stanford, 44 yards against Arizona and 43 yards against Syracuse). His 6.9-yard average per carry was the best by a Trojan with at least 10 carries per game since Reggie Bush's 8.7 in 2005. He made **2011 All-Pac-12 honorable mention**. He won **USC's Courage Award**.

He had 33 yards on 6 carries and a kickoff return for no yards against Minnesota, then 3 yards on 2 carries and also a 15-yard kickoff return against Utah. He came off the bench against Syracuse and ran for a game-best and then-career-high 79 yards on just 5 carries (15.8 avg.), with a then-career-long run of 43 yards, and he also returned 3 kickoffs for 61 yards and made 2 tackles. He added 14 yards

on 4 carries and returned a kickoff 25 yards at Arizona State. Against Arizona, he had a team-best 74 yards on 7 carries (10.6 average), including a then-USC season long 44 yard run, and scored his first career TD on a 9-yard run. He came off the bench at California to run for a game-best and then-career-high 86 yards on 17 carries with a short TD and he also caught a 10-yard pass and made a tackle. He again came off the bench at Notre Dame and had a game-high and then-career-best 118 yards on 24 carries (he also caught a 4-yard pass). he had a then-career-high and game-best 145 yards on 20 carries with 2 TDs (61 and 25 yards) off the bench against Stanford (he also had a 5-yard catch). At Colorado, he got his first career start and had 87 yards on 10 carries. Against Washington, he ran for a career-best 148 yards on 18 carries, including a 79-yard TD burst (USC's longest run since Reggie Bush's 81-yard TD run at UCLA in 2004) to earn **USC's "Jack Oakie Rise and Shine Award."** He had a team-best 94 yards on 20 carries at Oregon and then a game-best 124 yards on 12 carries with a 73-yard TD run against UCLA.

2010: McNeal was academically ineligible as a sophomore tailback in 2010.

2009: McNeal saw limited action at tailback as a redshirt freshman in 2009, but was used as a returner and on special teams. Overall in 2009 while appearing in 11 games (all but Ohio State and Washington), he ran for 33 yards on 6 carries (5.5 avg.), returned 13 kickoffs for 242 yards (18.6 avg.) and made 2 tackles.

He ran for 26 yards on 3 carries against Washington State, then had a 3-yard run at California, a 1-yard run against Oregon State and a 3-yard run against Boston College. He had a 16-yard kickoff return against San Jose State, then had 6 kickoff returns for 119 yards against Oregon State, 3 for 40 yards at Oregon and 3 for 67 yards at Arizona State. He had a tackle at both Oregon and Arizona State as the gunner on punt coverage.

2008: McNeal redshirted as a freshman tailback in 2008, his first year at USC.

HIGH SCHOOL: His 2007 honors included **Super Prep All-American, Super Prep All-Farwest, Prep Star All-West, Long Beach Press-Telegram Best in the West Best of the Rest, Tacoma News Tribune Western 100, Cal-Hi Sports All-State second team and All-L.A. City Offensive MVP** as a senior running back and defensive back at Venice High in Los Angeles (Calif.). He ran for 1,400 yards on 136 carries (10.3 avg.) with 19 TDs, added 278 receiving yards and scored touchdowns by rushing, receiving, interception and punt return.

As a junior in 2006, he made **Cal-Hi Sports All-State Underclass second team and All-L.A. City first team** while running for 2,008 yards with 42 TDs and getting 3,106 all-purpose yards.

In his career, he ran for more than 4,000 yards.





2011: Negrete proved to be an effective punter as a junior in 2011, skilled at putting the ball inside the 20-yard line and at limiting returns. Overall in 2011 while appearing in 11 games (USC did not have to punt against Arizona), he averaged 40.1 yards on his 39 punts. Of those 39 punts, 19 pinned opponents within the 20-yard line (with no touchbacks) and only 10 were returned. CAREER: In his career, he has 176 catches for 2,084 yards (11.8 avg.) with 21 TDs, 55 kickoff returns for 1,364 yards (24.8 avg.) with 1 TD, 14 punt returns for 122 yards (8.7 avg.) and 13 carries for 76 yards (5.8 avg.). He has 3,646 all-purpose yards on 258 plays (14.1 avg.). He ranks fourth on USC's career kickoff return list (1,364 yards) and tied for sixth on the career pass catching ladder (176 receptions). He has 9 100-yard receiving games in his career, including twice with 200 yards (joining Keyshawn Johnson and Dwayne Jarrett as the only Trojans to have done that), and 5 career outings with double digit receptions. He has 25 career starts.



ROBERT WOODS

2012: The All-American Woods, a Biletnikoff Award candidate who is one of the nation's most dynamic wide receivers and returners, returns for his third year as a starter as a junior in 2012. He is on pace to break USC career pass catching and kickoff return records.

2011: Woods was one of the nation's most outstanding and most exciting wide receivers and returners as a sophomore in 2011. Overall in 2011 while starting all 12 games, he had 111 receptions for 1,292 yards (11.6 avg.) with 15 TDs, plus 17 kickoff returns for 393 yards (23.1 avg.), 13 punt returns for 118 yards (9.1 avg.) and 7 carries for 16 yards (2.3 avg.). He was fourth nationally in receptions (9.3, first in Pac-12), eighth in receiving yards (107.7, second in Pac-12) and 16th in all-purpose running (151.6, fourth in Pac-12). He was 1 of only 2 players in the nation in the Top 16 in each of those categories. Only 4 other players in the nation had more catches or more receiving TDs. His 111 catches in 2011 broke Keyshawn Johnson's Pac-12 and USC season receptions record. His 15 TD catches in 2011 were 1 shy of the USC season record (tied for fifth on the Pac-12 season list) and his 1,292 receiving yards in 2011 were 17th on the Pac-12 season list. Four of his 15 TD catches in 2011 were at least 28 yards. He had 7 100-yard receiving games and 4 outings with double digit receptions in 2011. He and teammate Marqise Lee each had at least 1,000 receiving yards in 2011, the fourth time that a pair of Trojans had done that. Woods' and Lee's combined receptions (184) and receiving yards (2,435) in 2011 were the most by a pair of Trojans in a season. He had arthroscopic surgery on his ankle after the season.

He was one of 3 finalists for the **2011 Biletnikoff Award** and one of 16 semifinalists for the **2011 Maxwell Award**. He was a **2011 consensus All-American** as he made the **2011 Sporting News, ESPN.com, SI.com and YahooSports.com/Rivals.com All-American first team and Walter Camp, CBSSports.com and Phil Steele All-American second team**. He was the **Offensive Player of the Year on the 2011 CollegeFootballNews.com Sophomore All-American first team**. He made the **2011 All-Pac-12 first team (the only unanimous pick)**. He made the **2011 AP, ESPN.com, CBSSports.com, CollegeFootballNews.com and Phil Steele All-Pac-12 first team**. He won **USC's 2011 Offensive Perimeter Player of the Year Award**.

Against Minnesota, he caught 17 passes (the second-most receptions in a game by a Pac-12 receiver, just 2 shy of the record) to break Johnnie Morton's school single game record of 15 (set in 1993) for 177 yards and a school record-tying 3 touchdowns (all in the first half), with his first half totals being 11 grabs for 115 yards (he also returned 3 kickoffs for 73 yards, nearly breaking one for a score), to earn **Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week and College Football Performance Awards National Wide Receiver of the Week** honors. He had a team-best 8 catches for 102 yards against Utah and added a 14-yard kickoff return and a 17-yard punt return. He had 8 catches for 82 yards (with a 31-yard TD) and ran 14 yards on an end-around against Syracuse. At Arizona State, he had 208 all-

purpose yards (a game-high 131 on 8 receptions, 75 on 2 kickoff return and 2 rushing yards on a reverse). Against Arizona, he caught 14 passes for 255 yards (5 yards shy of the USC game record) with 2 TDs (a career-long 82-yard catch-and-run of a swing pass that was the longest completion at USC since Kareem Kelly's 93-yard TD in 2001 at Oregon and a 28-yarder) and he returned 3 kickoffs for 77 yards for 332 all-purpose yards. He had a team-best 5 catches for 36 yards at California along with a 24-yard kickoff return and an 8-yard punt return. He had 12 catches for 119 yards (both game highs) with 2 TDs (3 and 14 yards), plus 2 punt returns for 29 yards, a 20-yard kickoff return and a 5-yard run, at Notre Dame. Against Stanford, he had a game-best 9 catches for 89 yards with a short TD, plus 3 kickoff returns for 58 yards, 2 punt returns for 22 yards and a 2-yard run off a lateral. He had 9 catches for 130 yards and 2 TDs (15 and 45 yards) at Colorado, plus he had 2 kickoff returns for 33 yards and 2 punt returns for 3 yards. He had 2 catches for 5 yards against Washington, plus 3 punt returns for 32 yards, a 19-yard kickoff return and a 4-yard run. He had 5 grabs for 53 yards, with 2 TDs (12 and 4 yards), at Oregon, plus a run that lost 5 yards. He had 12 catches for 113 yards, with 2 TDs (4 and 41 yards), against UCLA, plus a 9-yard punt return (he and teammate Marqise Lee became the first Trojan pair with at least 10 receptions in the same game).

2010: Woods had a phenomenal showing as a wide receiver and kickoff returner as just a first-year freshman in 2010. Overall in 2010 while starting all 13 games, he had a team-best 65 receptions for 792 yards (12.2 avg.) with 6 TDs, plus he gained 50 yards on 6 carries (8.3 avg.) and returned 38 kickoffs for 971 yards (25.6 avg.) with 1 TD, had a punt return for 4 yards and made a tackle. He was 25th nationally in all-purpose running (139.8, second in Pac-10). His 65 catches in 2010 were 14th on the USC season list. His 971 kickoff returns yards and 38 kickoff returns in 2010 are USC season records. His 1,817 all-purpose yards is a USC freshman season record.

He was the **2010 Pac-10 Offensive Freshman of the Year** and made the **2010 Football Writers Freshman All-American first team (as a wide receiver), Sporting News Freshman All-American first team (as a wide receiver), Rivals.com Freshman All-American first team (as a wide receiver), Collegefootballnews.com Freshman All-American first team (as a wide receiver), Phil Steele Freshman All-American first team (as a wide receiver) and fourth team (as a kick returner), All-Pac-10 first team (as a kick returner) and honorable mention (as a wide receiver), as well as Sporting News Pac-10 Freshman of the Year, Scout.com Pac-10 Freshman of the Year and All-Pac-10 second team (as an all-purpose player), ESPN.com All-Pac-10 first team (as a kick returner) and Phil Steele All-Pac-10 first team (as a kick returner) and third team (as a wide receiver)**. He also won **USC's Bob Chandler Award and John McKay Award**.

He became the first USC true freshman to start a season opener at wide receiver in the post-World War II era when he did so at Hawaii, getting 4 catches for 46 yards along with 6

kickoff returns for 96 yards. He added 3 receptions for 64 yards and 2 kickoff returns for 35 yards against Virginia. He caught a team-best 4 passes for 33 yards against Minnesota and had 2 kickoff returns for 122 yards (including a 97-yard scoring runback to jumpstart USC, the longest kick return by a Trojan since Chad Morton went 98 yards for a TD against Purdue in 1998 and the first scoring kickoff return by a USC freshman since Reggie Bush did so against UCLA in 2003). He had 2 catches for 32 yards (with an 11-yard TD) and returned a kickoff 11 yards and a punt 4 yards at Washington State. He had 6 kickoff returns for 163 yards (including a 56-yarder to set up a USC touchdown) and a tackle against Washington. At Stanford, he had 12 catches (tied for fifth most in a game by a Trojan and 1 shy of the USC freshman game record) for 224 yards (the fifth highest game total by a Trojan, just 36 yards shy of the school record) with 3 touchdowns (including a 61-yarder) to tie the USC game record for TD catches as he earned **College Football Performance Awards National Wide Receiver of the Week** honors and he added 86 yards on 3 kickoff returns (and 0 yards on a rush) to total 310 all-purpose yards. He then had 7 receptions for 116 yards and 2 TDs (16 and 9 yards) against California to become the first USC true freshman to have back-to-back 100-yard receiving games since Dwayne Jarrett did so in 2004, plus he had 2 runs for 25 yards and returned a kickoff 25 yards. He had 259 all-purpose yards against Oregon (200 on 8 kickoff returns and 59 on a USC-best 7 receptions). He had 3 catches for 18 yards against Arizona State, then had a game-best 8 receptions for 41 yards, returned 3 kickoffs for 64 yards and had a 5-yard run off a lateral against Arizona. He had 3 catches for 15 yards, 2 rushes for 20 yards and 2 kickoff returns for 68 yards at Oregon State. He had 166 all-purpose yards (87 on a team-best 9 receptions and 79 on 3 kickoff returns) against Notre Dame, then added 3 catches for 57 yards and had a 23-yard kickoff return at UCLA.

HIGH SCHOOL: His 2009 honors included **USA Today All-USA first team, Parade All-American, EA Sports All-American first team, Super Prep All-American, Prep Star All-American, Scout.com All-American first team, Max Preps All-American first team, Max Preps All-American Medium Schools first team, Sporting News Top 100, Super Prep Elite 50, Prep Star Dream Team, Super Prep All-Farwest, Prep Star All-West, Orange County Register Fab 15 first team, Long Beach Press-Telegram Best in the West first team, Tacoma News Tribune Western 100, Cal-Hi Sports All-State first team, Max Preps All-State Division III first team, All-CIF Northwest Division Defensive MVP, Los Angeles Times All-Star Back of the Year, South Bay Daily Breeze All-South Bay Player of the Year and All-Del Rey League MVP** as a senior wide receiver and defensive back at Serra High in Gardena (Calif.). He had 66 receptions for 1,112 yards (16.8 avg.) with 15 TDs on offense and had 96 tackles and 8 interceptions (2 for TDs) on defense in 2009. Serra went 15-0 in 2009 and won the CIF Northwest Division title and the California State Division III championship (he had 226 all-purpose yards in the state final game).

As a junior in 2008, he made **Cal-Hi Sports All-State, Cal-Hi Sports All-State Medium School first team, Cal-Hi Sports All-State Underclass first team, All-CIF Northwest Division Co-Defensive MVP, Rivals.com All-Southern Section first team, South Bay Daily Breeze All-South Bay Player of the Year and All-Del Rey League MVP**. He had 81 receptions for 1,378 yards (17.0 avg.) with 19 TDs on offense, had 87 tackles and 7 interceptions (2 returned for TDs) on defense and returned 5 kickoffs and 2 punts for touchdowns in 2008. Serra was a CIF Northwest Division finalist in 2008.

As a sophomore in 2007, he made **Cal-Hi Sports All-State Sophomore first team, All-CIF Northwest Division first team, South Bay Daily Breeze All-South Bay first team and All-Del Rey League Defensive MVP**. He had 45 receptions for 801 yards (17.8 avg.) with 12 TDs along with 273 rushing yards on offense and had 81 tackles and 9 interceptions on defense in 2007. Current Trojans George Farmer and Marqise Lee also prepped at Serra.

He also was on Serra's track team, where he finished third in the 2009 California state 400 meters and anchored the 2009 state champion 400-meter relay team. In 2010, he won the CIF Division IV 200- and 400-meter races and ran on the winning 1,600-meter relay team. At the 2010 California state meet, he was second in the 400, third in the 200 and anchored the winning 1,600-meter relay team. He was the 2009 and 2010 South Bay Daily Breeze All-South Bay Track Athlete of the Year. He has bests of 21.01 in the 200 (fourth fastest in the nation in 2010) and 46.17 in the 400 (second fastest in the nation in 2010), plus a 45.8 split in the 1,600-meter relay. In 2010, he ran on relay teams that clocked a national-best 40.66 in the 400-meter relay and a state meet-record 3:08.42 in the 1,600-meter relay. 

LANE KIFFIN

USC HEAD FOOTBALL COACH



USC head football coach Lane Kiffin is regarded as one of the game's brightest young coaches. At just 36 (he is the fourth youngest current FBS head coach), he already has been a head coach at football's

top levels, both professionally and collegiately. He is known for his high football IQ, as well as for being a master playcaller, a vibrant leader and a superb recruiter.

The one-time Trojan offensive coordinator who then became the head coach of the Oakland Raiders and the Tennessee Volunteers returned to the USC program on Jan. 12, 2010, when he was named its head football coach.

His 2-year record at USC is 18-7 (.720) (and he is 25-13, .699, in 3 years as a college head coach). Only College Football Hall of Famers Howard Jones and John Robinson (with 19 wins) had more victories in their first 2 years as a Trojan head coach. Among Kiffin's signature USC wins were road victories at No. 18 Arizona in 2010 and at both Notre Dame and No. 4 Oregon in 2011. Four of his USC losses came on opponent scores late in the game (2 on field goals at the gun, 1 in triple overtime and 1 on a TD with 2:23 to go).

In 2011, he led USC (in its second year of a post-season ban) to a 10-2 overall record, a first place finish in the Pac-12 South Division at 7-2 (Troy beat both representatives in the Pac-12 Championship Game, Oregon and UCLA) and a No. 6 AP ranking (its highest finish since 2008). USC's 2011 win at Notre Dame made him the first Trojan head coach to win his first away game against the Irish and its 50-0 victory over UCLA was the third largest margin in the series' history. He was the **2011 CBS Sports.com and CollegeFootballNews.com Pac-12 Coach of the Year, and the Los Angeles Sports Council L.A. Sports Awards Southern California Coach of the Year**. His offense produced a 3,500-yard passer, a pair of 1,000-yard receivers and a 1,000-yard

rusher. USC's passing, total offense and scoring averages increased from 2010. The Trojans were sixth nationally in passing efficiency and in the nation's Top 25 in passing, scoring and total offense. USC's yards-per-play average (6.5) was the third highest in school history, while its averages for total offense (456.8) and passing offense (294.2) were the fourth highest and its scoring offense average (35.8) was the fifth highest. Troy's 8 sacks allowed were the fewest at USC since records were kept in 1987 (despite not starting a senior on the offensive line) and ranked the Trojans second nationally in 2011. On the other side of the ball, the Trojans improved from the previous year in rushing, total and scoring defense, with the rushing defense (111.4) and sack averages ranking in the national Top 20. USC held 8 of its 12 opponents to 17 points or less. USC led the Pac-12 in fewest penalty yards and was in the league's Top 3 in third down conversions, time of possession, first downs and red zone defense. And, for the second consecutive year, USC blocked 7 kicks. Kiffin's 2011 Trojans had 3 All-American first teamers (Matt Kalil, Robert Woods, T.J. McDonald), 7 All-Pac-12 first teamers, the Pac-12 Morris Trophy winner (Kalil), the Pac-12 Freshmen Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year (Marqise Lee and Dion Bailey) and 5 Freshman All-American first teamers, plus finalists for the Biletnikoff (Woods), Hendricks (Nick Perry) and Manning (Matt Barkley) Awards. Barkley set the Pac-12 season record for TD passes and the USC season mark for pass completion percentage, as well as school game standards for completions, pass yardage, passing TDs and total offense. Woods set the Pac-12 season receptions record and USC game receptions mark, while Woods and Lee combined for more receptions and receiving yardage in a season than any other Trojan duo (they also were the first pair of Trojans to both catch at least 10 passes in the same game). Lee's 11 TD catches were the most by any freshman in the country in 2011 and Randall Telfer's 26 receptions were the most ever by a USC freshman tight end. Bailey and Hayes Pullard were the first Trojan freshmen to lead the team in tackles.

In 2010 in his first year guiding USC, Kiffin led Troy to an 8-5 overall record (2 of the losses were on field goals at the gun in consecutive games and another came on a touchdown with 2:23 to play) and a third place tie in the Pac-10 at 5-4. He inherited a USC team that was ruled ineligible for post-season play because of an NCAA penalty for violations dating to the previous coaching regime and was short on personnel because of players who transferred once the penalty was announced (Troy had just 72 scholarship players, 13 shy of the NCAA limit). Despite this handicap, only Howard Jones in 1925 and John Robinson in 1976 (both with 11 wins) won more games in their Trojan coaching debut. Kiffin became the first USC head coach since Jess Hill in 1951 to begin his Trojan career with a 4-0 mark. With Kiffin calling the plays, the 2010 Trojan offensive numbers improved from 2009: total offense (431.5, +42.4), rushing offense (189.3, +22.5), passing offense (242.2, +19.9) and scoring offense (31.0, +4.5). USC averaged 6.0 yards per play in 2010, its sixth highest ever, and the Trojans twice had 600-yard offensive outputs. In 2010, offensive tackle Tyron Smith won the Pac-10's Morris Trophy and wide receiver Robert Woods was the Pac-10 Offensive Freshman of the Year (and a Freshman All-American first teamer). Smith was a first round pick in the 2011 NFL draft and was among a national-best 9 Trojan draftees.

Kiffin came back to Troy after guiding Tennessee to a 7-6 record in 2009 in his only season there. The Volunteers finished second in the Southeastern Conference Eastern Division at 4-4 and played in the Chick-Fil-A Bowl. Four of Tennessee's losses were by 10 points or less, including a 2-point road loss to eventual national champion Alabama and 10 points at then-No. 1 Florida. His Vols offense jumped at least 34 places in every national statistical category over the 2008 figures, while the defense was in the nation's Top 25 in pass and total defense. He was the youngest active head coach in the NCAA FBS ranks while at Tennessee.

Before that, Kiffin was the head coach of the NFL's Raiders for 2 years (2007-08), where at age 31 he was the youngest head coach in the NFL's modern era. He was 5-15 with the Raiders (4-12 in 2007 and 1-3 in 2008). His first year, Oakland's offensive numbers improved significantly from 2006 (its scoring offense improved by 7.2 points per game as the Raiders threw 10 more TD passes and its total offense went up 48.6 yards per game, including 35.5 rushing).

Kiffin spent 6 seasons (2001-2006) as an assistant at USC under Pete Carroll. He was the tight ends coach in 2001, then handled the wide receivers the next 5 years. He added the duty of passing game coordinator in 2004, then was promoted to offensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator in 2005 and 2006.



He coached a trio of All-American first team wide receivers in his first stint at USC: Mike Williams (2003), Dwayne Jarrett (2005-06, USC's first 2-time All-American wideout) and Steve Smith (2006). Jarrett set the Pac-10 record for career touchdown catches (39) and the USC career mark for receptions (216).

While the offensive coordinator in 2005, USC's offense was in the national Top 6 in every statistical category, including tops in total offense (579.8) and second in scoring offense (49.1), and set Pac-10 records for total offense yardage, first downs, points scored, touchdowns and PATs. The Trojans scored 50 points a school-record 7 times. USC became the first school to have a 3,000-yard passer, a pair of 1,000-yard runners and a 1,000-yard receiver in a season.

In 2003, Williams set USC career (30) and season (16) touchdown reception records, while fellow wide receiver Keary Colbert set the school career reception record (207). In 2002, Williams and Colbert became USC's first pair of 1,000-yard receivers in a season and wide receiver Kareem Kelly became the Trojan career reception leader (204). Williams, Jarrett, Smith and Colbert all played in the NFL.

Quarterback Matt Leinart won the Heisman Trophy in 2004 while Kiffin was the passing game coordinator and tailback Reggie Bush was the 2005 Heisman winner (later vacated) with Kiffin as the offensive coordinator.

While serving as USC's recruiting coordinator, Troy's recruiting classes in 2005 and 2006 were ranked by some as No. 1 in the nation. He was named one of the nation's Top 25 recruiters by Rivals.com in 2005.

Kiffin was a member of USC staffs that helped the Trojans win a pair of national championships (2003-04), post a 65-12 record (14 wins and 1 loss were later vacated due to NCAA penalty) and appear in a bowl game each of his initial 6 seasons: 2001 Las Vegas Bowl, 2003 Orange Bowl, 2004 Rose Bowl, 2005 Orange Bowl (BCS Championship Game, later vacated), 2006 Rose Bowl (BCS Championship Game, later vacated) and 2007 Rose Bowl.

Before coming to USC the first time, Kiffin was the defensive quality control coach for the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars in 2000 (he worked with the secondary).

He began his coaching career at Fresno State, his alma mater, where for 2 seasons (1997-98) he worked with the quarterbacks, wide receivers and defensive backs as a student assistant.

He then was an assistant at Colorado State in 1999, working with the offensive line. The Rams played in the Liberty Bowl that season.

Kiffin was a quarterback at Fresno State for 3 seasons (1994-96). He earned his bachelor's degree in leisure service management from Fresno State in 1998.

He prepped at Bloomington (Minn.) Jefferson High, where he played football, basketball and baseball.

He was born May 9, 1975. He and his wife, Layla, have 2 daughters, Landry, 5, and Presley, 4, and a son, Knox, 2.

His father, Monte (now USC's assistant head coach), has 46 years of coaching experience on the collegiate and NFL levels, having been on the staffs of programs that won 2 national championships (at Nebraska) and a Super Bowl (Tampa Bay Buccaneers). His brother, Chris, was a defensive lineman at Colorado State (2001-04) who was then an offensive intern at Nebraska and in 2010 was a defensive assistant at USC (he now is the defensive line coach at Arkansas State). His father-in-law, John Reaves, was a former quarterback at Florida and 11 years in the NFL (Philadelphia Eagles, Cincinnati Bengals, Minnesota Vikings, Houston Oilers, Tampa Bay Buccaneers) and 3 years in the USFL (Tampa Bay Bandits) who then was an assistant coach at Florida and South Carolina. His brother-in-law, David Reaves, was a quarterback at Appalachian State and then an assistant at South Carolina, Tennessee and now New Mexico. Another brother-in-law, Stephen Reaves, played quarterback at Michigan State and Southern Miss and for the CFL's Toronto Argonauts (he now is an offensive assistant at USC).

USC ASSISTANT FOOTBALL COACHES BIOGRAPHIES

JOHN BAXTER

Associate Head Coach
Special Teams Coordinator

John Baxter, known for producing extremely-productive special teams play on the field and developing academic success for players off the field, is in his third year at USC as the associate head coach and special teams coordinator. He joined the USC staff in March of 2010 after spending 13 seasons on the Fresno State coaching staff.

He was named the 2011 FootballScoop.com Special Teams Coordinator of the Year. For the second consecutive year, USC blocked 7 kicks. The Trojans also had a scoring kickoff return, made a 2-point conversion and converted a fake punt for a first down. In 2011, placekicker Andre Heidari made Freshman All-American first team and All-Pac-12 first team, and his 88.2% field goal percentage was third in the nation among kickers with at least 10 made field goals (and the best among freshmen kickers). Tight end/fullback Rhett Ellison made the All-Pac-12 first team as a special teams performer.

In 2010, USC's special teams blocked 7 kicks and punts, returned a punt and kickoff for a touchdown, scored 5 times on 2-point conversions, had a defensive PAT and made first downs on a fake punt and fake field goal. USC ranked high nationally in punt returns (seventh at 14.6) and kickoff returns (17th at 24.5) with wide receiver Ronald Johnson placing 12th nationally in punt returns (14.2). Wide receiver Robert Woods made the All-Pac-10 first team as a kick returner. Johnson was a sixth round pick in the 2011 NFL draft.

In his 13 years (1997-2009) at Fresno State, Baxter was the associate head coach and special teams coach in addition to handling either the tight ends (1997-2001, 2003, 2009) or wide receivers (2002, 2004-2008).

Baxter turned the Bulldogs' special teams into one of the top units in the nation annually. During his time, Fresno State blocked 84 kicks and punts (including a national-best 49 from 2002 through 2009) and scored 39 special teams touchdowns (with 3 safeties). The Bulldogs topped the nation in fewest punt return yards allowed in 2004 and 2005. A.J. Jefferson led the nation in kickoff returns in 2007. Clifton Smith's 189 punt return yards with 2 touchdowns against Weber State in 2005 were Fresno State game records, while his 5 career scoring punt returns also was a school mark. Six of Baxter's Bulldog kickers and punters earned All-Western Athletic Conference first team honors.

During his time at Fresno State, the Bulldogs posted a 100-66 record, played in 10 bowls (1999 Las Vegas, 2000-01-02-03 Silicon Valley, 2004 MPC Computers, 2005 AutoZone Liberty, 2007 Rody's Humanitarian and 2008-09 New Mexico) and won the WAC title in 1999.

Along with his coaching duties at Fresno State, Baxter developed the highly-successful and nationally-regarded program, "Academic Gameplan." His innovative and comprehensive study-skills program teaches students the rules, fundamentals, techniques and life skills needed to succeed in the classroom. "Academic Gameplan," which is now being used at schools throughout the country, was a key reason for the academic success of the Fresno State football program, which during Baxter's tenure produced 141 Academic All-WAC players and an NCAA APR score nearly 20 percentage points higher than the national average.

He was selected as the Clovis Co-Citizen of the Year in 2006, along with Fresno State head coach Pat Hill.

Baxter, 48, has 30 years of coaching experience. He began his coaching career at his alma mater, Loras College, where he served for 5 seasons (1981-85) as a student assistant (working with the running backs) during his undergraduate time.

He then moved on to Iowa State for 2 seasons (1986-87) as a graduate assistant working with the defensive line and special teams before the first of 2 stints at Arizona. He was with the Wildcats in 1988 (as a graduate assistant working with the defensive backs and special teams), went to Maine in 1989 for his first full-time job coaching the outside linebackers and special teams when the Black Bears made it to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs and returned to Arizona in 1990 and 1991 as the tight ends and special teams coach (the Wildcats played in the 1990 Aloha Bowl). He then was at Maryland for 2 seasons (1992-93) handling the running backs and special teams and Tulane for 3 years (1994-96) in charge of the tight ends and special teams before going to Fresno State.

He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Loras in 1985 and then his master's in higher education from Iowa State in 1987.

He prepped at Loyola Academy in Chicago (Ill.).

He was born on June 28, 1963. He and his wife, Jill, have 2 daughters, Kelly, 15, and McKenzie, 13. His father-in-law is current Weber State head coach Ron McBride, formerly the head coach at Utah.

JAMES CREGG

Offensive Line

James Cregg is in his third year at USC as the offensive line coach. He joined the USC staff in January of 2010 after spending 13 years coaching on the collegiate and NFL levels.

In 2011, USC was second in the nation in sacks allowed, surrendering just 8 (the fewest since records were kept in 1987) and did so while not starting a senior on the line. Offensive tackle Matt Kalil was an All-American first teamer and won the Pac-12 Morris Trophy, while offensive guard Marcus Martin was a Freshman All-American first team pick.

In 2010, offensive tackle Tyron Smith won the Pac-10 Morris Trophy, made All-Pac-10 first team and was a first round pick in the 2011 NFL draft.

Cregg spent 2009 at Tennessee as the offensive line coach. The Vols tied for the Southeastern Conference regular season lead with only 12 sacks allowed. Cregg's line helped tailback Montario Hardesty rush for 1,345 yards and 13 touchdowns (nearly a 1,000 more yards than he previously had in any season). Tackle Aaron Douglas made the SEC All-Freshman team.

Before that, he was an offensive line assistant with the NFL's Oakland Raiders for 2 years (2007-08).

Cregg, 38, began his coaching career at his alma mater, Colorado State, where he was a student assistant working with the offensive line in 1996 and then a graduate assistant for 3 seasons (1997-99). The Rams went 11-2 in 1997 as they captured the Western Athletic Conference title and won the Holiday Bowl, while the 1999 squad was the Mountain West Conference co-champion and played in the Liberty Bowl.

He then coached the defensive line at Colgate for 4 years (2000-03). The Raiders advanced to the 2003 NCAA Division I-AA championship game, but lost to Delaware to snap a school-record 21-game winning streak. In both of his final 2 seasons, Colgate won the Patriot League title, finished in the Top 10 nationally in rushing defense and was first in the conference in total defense.

He next spent 3 seasons (2004-06) coaching the defensive line at Idaho before moving on to the NFL.

Cregg was a 3-year (1993-95) letterman at Colorado State, starting on the offensive line his final 2 seasons and earning All-WAC honors as a senior. The Rams won the WAC title in 1994 and 1995 and played in the Holiday Bowl both seasons.

He received his bachelor's degree in social science from Colorado State in 1997.

He prepped at Norco (Calif.) High and was elected into the Norco High Hall of Fame in 2001.

He was born Aug. 18, 1973. He and his wife, Dayna, have a daughter, McKenzie, 6.

SCOTTIE HAZELTON

Linebackers

Scottie Hazelton, who helped North Dakota State to the 2011 NCAA FCS national championship as its defensive coordinator, is in his first year at USC as the linebackers coach. He joined the USC staff in February of 2012.

Hazelton, 38, spent the past 5 years (2007-11) at North Dakota State, the first 3 seasons handling the defensive line and the last 2 years as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach.

North Dakota State won the FCS national championship in 2011 and its defense ranked in the FCS Top 20 in 6 categories: first in scoring defense (after it was 90th in 2009, the year before he took over as defensive coordinator), eighth in turnover margin, 16th in pass efficiency defense, 17th in rushing defense, 19th in sacks and 20th in total defense. In 2010, NDSU was seventh in scoring defense and turnover margin, 15th in pass efficiency defense and 19th in sacks as the team advanced to the FCS quarterfinals. In 2008, the Bison led the FCS in pass defense and ranked third in sacks, fifth in total defense and tackles for loss and 19th in scoring defense. In 2007, NDSU was 18th in defensive third down efficiency and 22nd in rushing defense.

He began his coaching career at Fort Lewis College, his alma mater, handling the secondary for 4 years (1996-99) and serving as interim defensive coordinator in 2998.

He then was a graduate assistant working with the safeties for 2 seasons (2000-01) at North Dakota State (the Bison advanced to the NCAA Division II semifinals in 2000) before becoming the defensive backs coach at St. Olaf College for 2 seasons (2002-03). He then was the co-defensive coordinator at Missouri Southern State for 2 years (2004-05), followed by the linebackers coach at Michigan Tech in 2006.

He played linebacker at Fort Lewis, lettering for 3 years (1992-94). He received his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Fort Lewis in 1995.

He prepped at Horizon High in Brighton, Colo.

He was born on Dec. 19, 1973. He and his wife, Brooke, have 2 daughters, Ava, 7, and Sophie, 5, and a son, Bode, 2.

CLAY HELTON**Passing Game Coordinator
Quarterbacks**

Clay Helton is in his third year at USC as the quarterbacks coach. He added the passing game coordinator role in 2012. He joined the USC staff in February of 2010 after spending 10 seasons as an assistant at Memphis.

In 2011, quarterback Matt Barkley was a Manning Award and Wuerrfel Trophy finalist as he set the Pac-12 season record for TD passes (39) and the USC season mark for pass completion percentage (69.1%), as well as school game standards for completions (35), pass yardage (468), passing TDs (6) and total offense (470). He was eighth nationally in passing efficiency and 16th in total offense. He finished sixth in the Heisman Trophy voting.

Helton, 39, began his 10-year (2000-09) Memphis career as the running backs coach for 3 seasons, then coached the Tigers' receivers for the next 4 seasons before becoming the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach the final 3 years.

Among the Tigers' running backs he tutored was school rushing/scoring/all-purpose running recordholder DeAngelo Williams, who went on to finish seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting in 2005 and be an NFL first round selection.

As the receivers coach, he produced a pair of Conference USA All-Freshman picks in Maurice Jones (2005) and Duke Calhoun (2006), as well as the school's No. 4 all-time receptions leader in Ryan Scott. In 2003, Memphis set school season records for receptions and receiving yardage.

As the Tigers' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, the 2007 and 2008 offenses were among the top 6 in school history in total yards and points. Both squads were ranked in the top 26 nationally in total offense. Quarterback Martin Hankins became Memphis' No. 2 career passer and set single season records for completions, passing yards and touchdown passes in 2007. In 2009, Curtis Steele had his second consecutive season with 1,000 rushing yards, Calhoun became the school's all-time leading receiver and Carlos Singleton set the career mark for receiving touchdowns.

Memphis played in 5 bowls during Helton's time: the 2003 and 2007 New Orleans Bowls, 2004 GMAC Bowl, 2005 Motor City Bowl and 2008 St. Petersburg Bowl.

Helton was hired as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Arkansas State after the 2009 season, but was there just 2 months before coming to USC.

Before Memphis, he was the running backs coach at Houston, his alma mater, for 3 seasons (1997-99), working under his father, head coach Kim Helton.

He began his coaching career at Duke, serving as a graduate assistant in 1995 and then the running backs coach in 1996.

He played quarterback at Houston in 1993 and 1994, playing for his father both seasons and captaining the Cougars as a 1994 senior. In 1993, he completed 1-of-3 passes in late duty in Houston's 49-7 loss to USC in the Coliseum.

He spent 1991 and 1992 at Auburn, where he earned 1992 SEC All-Academic honors. He redshirted there in 1990.

He earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics and interdisciplinary science from Houston in 1994.

He prepped at Clements High in Sugarland (Tex.)

He was born on June 24, 1972. He and his wife, Angela, have 3 children: sons Reid, 14, and Turner, 8, and daughter Aubrey, 12. Besides being Houston's head coach from 1993 to 1999, his father, Kim, was an assistant in college (Florida, Miami and currently the offensive coordinator at Alabama Birmingham), the NFL (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Houston Oilers, Los Angeles Raiders, Washington Redskins) and the CFL (Toronto Argonauts) following his playing career at Florida. His brother, Tyson, is the quarterbacks coach at Alabama Birmingham after assistant coaching stops at Memphis and Hawaii and playing at Houston.

MONTE KIFFIN
Assistant Head Coach

Monte Kiffin, who is regarded as one of the game's best defensive minds, is in his third year at USC as the assistant head coach after joining the Trojan staff in January of 2010. He has 46 years of coaching experience on the collegiate and NFL levels, having been on the staffs of programs that won 2 national championships and a Super Bowl.

In 2011, USC improved from the previous year in rushing, total and scoring defense, with the rushing defense (111.4) and sack averages ranking in the national Top 20. USC held 8 of its 12 opponents to 17 points or less.

Kiffin was the defensive coordinator at Tennessee in 2009. The Volunteers were 12th nationally in both pass defense and pass efficiency defense and 22nd in total defense in 2009.

He spent 26 seasons (1983-2008) in the NFL, including the last 13 of those as the defensive coordinator with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, where he refined and popularized the famous Tampa Cover 2 defense. Eleven of his Buccaneer defenses ranked among the NFL's Top 10 in total defense and scoring defense, a league record. He was a member of the 2002 Super Bowl champions that led the league in total defense, scoring defense and interceptions. Six other Buccaneer squads advanced to the NFC playoffs during his time there.

His other NFL stops included the Green Bay Packers (1983 coaching the linebackers), Buffalo Bills (1984-85 coaching the linebackers), Minnesota Vikings (1986-89 coaching the linebackers and 1991-94 as defensive coordinator the first year and then handling the inside linebackers), New York Jets (1990 coaching the linebackers) and New Orleans Saints (1995 as the defensive coordinator). During his stints with the Vikings, they led the NFL in total defense in 1988, 1989 and 1994 (they were second in 1992) and advanced to the NFC playoffs 6 times.

Before going to the NFL, the 71-year-old Kiffin spent 17 seasons at the college level. He began as an assistant for 11 years at Nebraska (1966-76), his alma mater, handling the defensive line the first 7 seasons before becoming the defensive coordinator in 1973 when Tom Osborne took over for Bob Devaney. He was on the staff of Nebraska's 1970 and 1971 national champions. The Cornhuskers played in 9 bowls during his time there, including in his final 8 seasons (1967-74 Sugar, 1969 Sun, 1971-72-73 Orange, 1974 Cotton, 1975 Fiesta, 1976 Bluebonnet).

He then was the defensive coordinator under Lou Holtz at Arkansas for 3 seasons (1977-79), adding the assistant head coach title his final year there. The Razorbacks led the nation in scoring defense in 1977. Arkansas played in a bowl each season (1978 Orange, 1978 Fiesta, 1980 Sugar).

He next became the head coach at North Carolina State for 3 seasons (1980-82). He went 16-17, with winning records his last 2 seasons.

After being the Nebraska high school Player of the Year in 1958 while at Lexington (Neb.) High, he was a two-way tackle at Nebraska (1959-63) and the Cornhuskers played in the 1964 Orange Bowl when he was a senior. He then spent 1965 as a defensive end with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League (he sat out the 1964 season with a knee injury).

He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Nebraska in 1963.

He was born on Feb. 29, 1940. He and his wife, Robin, have 2 sons, Lane (USC's head coach), 36, and Chris (a defensive assistant at USC in 2010 and now the defensive line coach at Arkansas State), 29, and a daughter, Heidi, 42.

TEE MARTIN
Wide Receivers

Tee Martin, the quarterback for Tennessee's 1998 national championship team who then played in the NFL and has spent the past 6 years coaching, is in his first year at USC as the wide receivers coach. He joined the USC staff in February of 2012.

Martin, 33, spent the past 2 years (2010-11) as the wide receivers coach at Kentucky. He also served as the passing game coordinator in 2011. In 2010, Wildcat wide receiver Randall Cobb was an All-American first teamer and NFL second round selection, while wide receiver Chris Matthews tied for the Southeastern Conference lead in touchdown catches. Kentucky played in the BBVA Compass Bowl that season.

Martin began his coaching career as the passing game coordinator at Morehouse College in 2006, when the Maroon Tigers had the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference's top-ranked rushing, passing and total offense.

He then was the passing game coordinator and quarterbacks coach at North Cobb High in Kennesaw (Ga.) in 2007, helping the Warriors to a 10-1 record in the Class AAAAA ranks, and the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at North Atlanta (Ga.) High in 2008.

He spent 2009 as the quarterbacks coach at New Mexico.

Martin also was a coach for the Elite 11 Quarterback Camps (2007-08), Nike football training camps (2007-08) and the Nike Combine Tour (2008). He has mentored and evaluated more than 1,000 quarterbacks, including more than 30 Division I signees. He also created the "Dual Threat" Quarterback Camp and Academy in Atlanta in 2008.

In 2007 and 2008, he also was a college football analyst for the Comcast Sports Southeast's twice-weekly show, "Talking Football," and he did a weekly radio show about college football, "Hot Tee and Touchdowns," on the ESPN affiliate in Atlanta, 680 AM The Fan.

After prepping at Williamson High in Mobile (Ala.), he was a 4-year (1996-99) letterman at Tennessee. After serving as Peyton Manning's backup his first 2 years, he led the Volunteers to a 13-0 record in 1998, capped by the national championship following a Fiesta Bowl win over Florida State. He led Tennessee to another trip to the Fiesta Bowl in 1999 and was named All-SEC first team. He set NCAA game (since-tied 23 versus South Carolina) and season (since-broken 24) records for consecutive completions in 1998.

He was selected by Pittsburgh in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft, beginning a 6-year pro career. After 2 seasons (2000-01) with the Steelers (Pittsburgh won the 2001 AFC Central Division title), he went to NFL Europe in 2002, when he led the Rhein Fire to a league-best 7-3 record and a berth in the World Bowl. He returned to the NFL with the Oakland Raiders in 2003, then moved to the Canadian Football League and spent the 2004 and 2005 seasons with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

He received his bachelor's degree in sports management in 2004 from the U.S. Sports Academy (through Tennessee).

He was born on July 25, 1978. His real first name is Tamaurice. He and his wife, Toya, have a son, Kaden, 7, and 12-year-old twins, daughter A'Yadra and son Amari. His wife is a recording artist with hit singles "I Do!" (2001) and "No Matta What (Party All Night)" (2002).

ED ORGERON Defensive Coordinator Recruiting Coordinator Defensive Line

Ed Orgeron, one of the most popular assistant coaches in USC history, is in his third year back at Troy as the defensive coordinator, recruiting coordinator and defensive line coach after returning to the Trojan staff in January of 2010.

In 2012, Rivals.com named him one of the nation's Top 25 recruiters.

In 2011, he was named the Scout.com/FOXSports.com National Recruiter of the Year, ESPN/ESPN The Magazine named him the top recruiter in college football (and third best in all of collegiate athletics) and Rivals.com ranked him as the second-best recruiter of the previous 10 years (2002-11). USC in 2011 improved from the previous year in rushing, total and scoring defense, with the rushing defense (111.4) and sack averages ranking in the national Top 20. USC held 8 of its 12 opponents to 17 points or less. Defensive end Nick Perry, who tied for 10th nationally in sacks, was a 2011 All-Pac-12 first teamer and a finalist for the Hendrick Award.

In 2010, defensive tackle Jurrell Casey was an All-Pac-10 first teamer and a third round pick in the 2011 NFL draft.

Orgeron left USC after 7 seasons there to become the head coach at Mississippi for 3 years (2005-07), where he went 10-25.

He then was the defensive line coach with the NFL's New Orleans Saints in 2008 and spent 2009 as Tennessee's assistant head coach, recruiting coordinator and defensive line coach.

Orgeron was USC's defensive line coach from 1998 to 2004. He took on the added responsibility of recruiting coordinator in 2001 and then was named assistant head coach in 2003. USC's 2002, 2003 and 2004 recruiting classes were ranked among the nation's top 5 (the 2003 and 2004 groups were listed by many as No. 1). He was named the 2004 National Recruiter of the Year by The Sporting News and Rivals.com.

He coached All-American first team defensive linemen Kenechi Udeze (2003), Shaun Cody (2004) and Mike Patterson (2004), all future NFLers. The Trojans led the nation in rushing defense in 2003 behind the highly-regarded "Wild Bunch II" defensive line and were second in 2004. USC won the 2003 and 2004 national championship and played in 5 bowls games when he was on the staff: 1998 Sun Bowl, 2001 Las Vegas Bowl, 2003 Orange Bowl, 2004 Rose Bowl and 2005 Orange Bowl (BCS Championship Game).

Orgeron, 50, has 26 years of coaching experience. Before coming to USC, he was Syracuse's defensive line coach for 3 seasons (1995-97) and the Orangemen played in a bowl game each year (1996 Gator, 1996 Liberty and 1997 Fiesta).

He came to Syracuse from Nicholls State, where he was the linebackers coach in 1994.

Before that, he was the defensive line coach at Miami for 4 seasons (1989-92), where he coached 8 All-Americans, including NFL first rounders Cortez Kennedy, Russell Maryland and Warren Sapp. In 1988, he was a graduate assistant at Miami, working with the defensive line. During his tenure, the Hurricanes won the national championship twice (1989 and 1991), finished second in the AP poll once (1988) and third twice (1990 and 1992) while appearing in 5 New Year's Day bowls (1989 Orange, 1990 Sugar, 1991 Cotton, 1992 Orange, 1993 Sugar).

Orgeron also was a graduate assistant at Northwestern (La.) State, his alma mater, in 1984 and McNeese State in 1985, working with the defensive line at both schools, then was an assistant strength coach at Arkansas for 2 years (1986-87). The Razorbacks were in the 1987 Orange Bowl and 1987 Liberty Bowl. He worked in private business in 1993.

He was a 4-year starting defensive lineman at Northwestern State, captaining the Demons as a senior. He received his bachelor's degree in liberal arts from Northwestern State in 1984.

He starred in football, basketball and track at South Lafourche High in Galliano, La.

Born July 27, 1961, he and his wife, Kelly, have 3 sons, Tyler, 19, and 13-year-old twins Parker and Cody. He played himself in the 2009 Oscar-nominated movie, "The Blind Side."

KENNEDY POLAMALU Offensive Coordinator Running Backs

Kennedy Polamalu, a former USC player and assistant coach, is in his third year back at USC as the offensive coordinator and running backs coach. He returned to USC in July of 2010 after spending 6 years as an NFL assistant.

In 2011, tailback Curtis McNeal rushed for 1,005 yards and his 6.9 average per carry was the best by a Trojan since Reggie Bush in 2005. USC's offense also produced a 3,500-yard passer and a pair of 1,000-yard receivers. The Trojans were sixth nationally in passing efficiency and in the nation's Top 25 in passing, scoring and total offense. USC's yards-per-play average (6.5) was the third highest in school history, while its averages for total offense (456.8) and passing offense (294.2) were the fourth highest and its scoring offense average (35.8) was the fifth highest.

Tailback Allen Bradford was a sixth round pick in the 2011 NFL draft and fullback Stanley Havili was a seventh rounder. The Trojan rushing offense ranked 25th nationally. USC averaged 6.0 yards per play in 2010, its sixth highest ever, and the Trojans twice had 600-yard offensive outputs.

Polamalu, 48, who joined the Tennessee Titans as the running backs coach following the 2009 season, spent the previous 5 seasons (2005-09) as the running backs coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars. While there, both Fred Taylor (2007) and Maurice Jones-Drew (2009) earned Pro Bowl honors and the Jaguars offense totaled the third most rushing yards in the NFL over that time, including 4 Top 10 rushing finishes. In 2009, Jones-Drew finished fourth

in the NFL in rushing (1,391 yards), fourth in scrimmage yards (1,765) and second in total touchdowns scored (16). In 2008, Greg Jones became the highest paid fullback in NFL history. The Jaguars finished second in the AFC South Division and were in the AFC playoffs in 2005 and 2007, advancing to the AFC divisional playoffs in 2007.

He was the running backs coach for the Cleveland Browns in 2004.

Polamalu spent 4 years (2000-03) in his first stint as an assistant at USC. He was the running backs coach in 2000, spent 2001 as the special teams coordinator, then returned to his running back coaching duties in 2002 and 2003 while also continuing as special teams coordinator.

In 2003, USC's 4 young tailbacks who saw action combined for 1,887 rushing yards (157.3 per game) and 20 rushing TDs (plus 4 receiving TDs and 1 kickoff return TD). Tailback LenDale White's 13 rushing touchdowns were a USC freshman season record. Tom Malone was named USC's first-ever All-American first team punter (he also made All-Pac-10 first team).

In 2002, USC 4 tailbacks combined for 1,897 rushing yards (2 were NFL draft picks: Justin Fargas in the third round and Malaefou MacKenzie in the seventh).

In 2001, cornerback Kevin Arbet won All-Pac-10 first team honors as a special teams player and placekicker David Davis led the Pac-10 in field goals (tied for 17th in the nation).

In 2000, tailback Sultan McCullough ran for 1,163 yards.

USC played in the 2001 Las Vegas Bowl, 2003 Orange Bowl and 2004 Rose Bowl. USC won the national championship in 2003.

Polamalu spent 1999 as the linebackers coach at San Diego State, working under former USC head coach Ted Tollner.

He coached the running backs at Colorado in 1997 and 1998. The 1998 Buffaloes won the Aloha Bowl.

Before that, he spent 3 years (1994 to 1996) as San Diego State's running backs coach, guiding a pair of 1,000-yard rushers (Wayne Pittman in 1994 and George Jones in 1995). Jones, who was 32 yards shy of 1,000 yards in 1996, won All-WAC first team honors in 1995 and played in the NFL with Pittsburgh and Jacksonville. Pola also worked with the Aztecs special teams in 1996 (punter Noel Prefontaine was an All-American first teamer, placekicker Peter Holt was runnerup for the Lou Groza Award given to the nation's top kicker and return specialist Leandrew Childs was an All-WAC first team pick).

Polamalu was a graduate assistant coach at UCLA in 1992 and 1993, working with the secondary and special teams. The 1993 Bruins played in the Rose Bowl.

He began his coaching career as a volunteer assistant at Crespi High in Encino, Calif., for 3 seasons (1986-88) and then Westlake High in Westlake Village (Calif.) for 3 years (1989-91). Crespi won the 1986 CIF Division I championship and he coached prep All-American running back Russell White, who starred at California.

Polamalu was a 4-year letterman (1982-85) at USC, playing both fullback and linebacker. He began his Trojan career as a backup linebacker, but was moved to fullback by midseason of his freshman year. He ended up starting there the last 2 games of 1982 against UCLA and Notre Dame, as well as most of the next 3 seasons. In his career, he ran for 681 yards (he also caught 23 passes and in 1983 threw a 65-yard scoring pass against Stanford). He helped USC to a victory over Ohio State in the 1985 Rose Bowl (he also played in the 1985 Aloha Bowl).

He earned his bachelor's degree in history from USC in 1987.

He attended Mater Dei High in Santa Ana, Calif., where he was a prep All-American in football (he also was on the basketball and track teams). He also served as the student body president.

His nephew, Troy Polamalu, was a 2-time (2001-02) All-American first team safety on the USC football team who now stars in the NFL with the Pittsburgh Steelers (he was Pittsburgh's first round pick). Kennedy's brother, Ao Polamalu, played football at Penn State (1985-87). Nephew Nicky Sualua played running back in the NFL with Dallas and Cincinnati after attending Ohio State, while 4 other nephews played college football: Leie Sualua was a defensive lineman at Oregon, Joe Polamalu was at Oregon State in 1987 and 1988, Kaio Aumua played at UTEP and Michael Polamalu is a freshman running back at Navy.

Polamalu was born in Pago Pago, American Samoa, on Nov. 22, 1963, the same day President John F. Kennedy was assassinated (Polamalu was named in his honor). He returned to his homeland in the summer of 2011 and conducted a football clinic. It was then that he changed his name back to Polamalu (from Pola, which he has used since coming to California when he was 14) to "honor my parents, family and heritage."

He and his wife, Diane, have 3 sons: K.C. (Kennedy Christopher), 19, who was a walk-on fullback at USC in 2010, Matthew Aootoa, 18, and Raymond Trey, 13.

MARVIN SANDERS

Secondary

Marvin Sanders, whose previous coaching stops have included Nebraska, North Carolina (where he was defensive coordinator) and Colorado State, is in his first year at USC as the secondary coach. He joined the USC staff in February of 2012.

Sanders, 44, came to USC after spending 2 months as the associate head coach, defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Florida Atlantic.

Before that, he spent 3 seasons (2008-10) as his alma mater Nebraska's secondary coach, including the final 2 years there as assistant head coach for defense. The Cornhuskers led the nation in pass efficiency defense in 2009 and were third in 2010. They had 18 interceptions and allowed just 7 touchdown passes in 2009 and they added 19 picks in 2010. Cornerback Prince Amukamara was an All-American first teamer and Thorpe Award finalist in 2010, while safeties Eric Hagg (2010) and Larry Asante (2009) were All-Big 12 first team picks. All 3 players were NFL draft picks, with Amukamara selected in the first round.

It was Sanders' second stint coaching the Nebraska secondary, as he also coached there in 2003 when the Cornhuskers also led the nation in pass efficiency defense and set a school and league record with 32 interceptions. Safety Josh Bullocks was an All-American after making a school-record 10 interceptions. Bullocks was a second round NFL pick along with his brother, safety Daniel Bullocks, while cornerback Fabian Washington was a first rounder.

The Cornhuskers played in a bowl game each year Sanders was there: the 2003 Alamo Bowl, 2008 Gator Bowl and 2009 and 2010 Holiday Bowls.

Sanders left Nebraska after 2003 and spent 3 seasons (2004-06) as the secondary coach at North Carolina. He also was the co-defensive coordinator the first year, then was elevated to defensive coordinator the final 2 years. In 2004, the Tar Heels held Duke to just 234 total yards, the fewest by a UNC defense in 3 years, and they played in the Continental Tire Bowl. In 2005, North Carolina was 42nd nationally in total defense (an improvement of 67 spots from the previous year), had its most interceptions since 1999 and limited Virginia to 199 total yards. Safety Gerald Sensabaugh was an NFL draftee.

Sanders began his coaching career as the secondary coach at Nebraska Wesleyan for 2 seasons (1992-93). He then was the secondary coach at Minnesota-Morris in 1994, where he doubled as the sports information director.

He spent 5 seasons (1995-99) as the secondary coach at Nebraska-Omaha and also was the defensive coordinator the final 3 years. UNO won a pair of North Central Conference titles and appeared in the NCAA Division II playoffs twice.

He then coached defensive ends and outside linebackers at New Mexico State in 2000 before spending 2 seasons (2001-02) as the secondary coach at Colorado State. The Rams won the 2002 Mountain West Conference title and played in a pair of bowl games (New Orleans in 2001 and Liberty in 2002). Safety Dexter Wynn was an NFL draftee.

Sanders was a 3-year (1987-89) letterwinning defensive back at Nebraska. The Cornhuskers played in 4 bowl games during his time there (1987 Sugar, 1988 Fiesta, 1989 Orange, 1990 Fiesta), won at least 10 games each season and finished in the AP Top 11 each year.

He received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Nebraska in 1990.

He prepped at Thornwood High in South Holland (Ill.).

He was born on Oct. 2, 1967. He and his wife, Susan, have a daughter, Chandler Marie, 20, and a son, Payton, 16.

JUSTIN MESA

Tight Ends

Justin Mesa is in his third year as a graduate assistant. He is working with the tight ends in 2011 after being with the wide receivers in 2009.

He spent 2010 as an offensive administrative assistant.

In 2011, tight end-fullback Rhett Ellison made the All-Pac-12 first team (as a special teams player) and right end Randall Telfer's 26 reception were the most ever by a USC freshman tight end.

In 2009, wide receiver Damian Williams was an All-Pac-10 first teamer and then was a third round NFL draft pick after the season.

USC played in the 2009 Emerald Bowl.

Mesa, 29, was on the Trojan staff the previous 3 seasons (2006-08) as the recruiting and operations assistant. USC played in the 2007 Rose Bowl, 2008 Rose Bowl and 2009 Rose Bowl.

Before that, he served as a student manager for the Trojans for 2 years (2004-05).

He earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from USC in 2006. He is working on his master's degree in communication management at USC.

He played football and baseball at Cathedral High in Los Angeles (Calif.).

Born Aug. 30, 1982, he is single.

SHAWN HOWE

Defensive Line

Shawn Howe is in his second season with the USC football program. He is a graduate assistant working with the defensive line in 2012 after spending 2011 as a defensive administrative assistant.

Howe, 30, was an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Tennessee in 2010. The Vols played in the Music City Bowl.

He spent the previous 3 years (2007-09) as a graduate assistant coach at Memphis. He worked with the defense the first 2 years and spent 2009 handling the tight ends.

He came to Memphis after working as a volunteer assistant at North Carolina State in 2006, helping with the defensive line.

He began his coaching career at Rocky Mountain College, his alma mater, serving as the outside linebackers coach in 2004 and 2005.

Howe played defensive end and linebacker at College of the Redwoods in Eureka (Calif.) in 2000 and 2001, earning All-Mid-Empire Conference first team honors in 2000 when he was the team's Defensive Lineman of the Year. He then transferred to Rocky Mountain College, where he was a 2-year (2002-03) starter at defensive end.

He graduated from Rocky Mountain College in 2005 with a bachelor's degree in physical education and health. He is working on his master's degree in communication management at USC.

He prepped at Dallas (Ore.) High. Born Dec. 13, 1981, he is single.

AARON AUSMUS

Strength and Conditioning Coach

Aaron Ausmus, a one-time Trojan assistant who then headed up strength and conditioning programs at 4 universities, is in his third season as USC's head strength and conditioning coach. He returned to USC in February of 2010.

Ausmus, 37, was Tennessee's director of strength and conditioning in 2009, where he oversaw all of the Volunteers' teams.

He began his strength and conditioning coaching career at Tennessee, his alma mater, first as a graduate assistant for 2 seasons (1998-1999) and then as a part-time assistant the next season (2000).

He then became an assistant at USC for 3 seasons (2001-03), where he worked with the Trojans' 2003 national championship football team, as well as with the men's and women's track, women's soccer and men's golf teams.

He then was the head strength and conditioning coach at Idaho in 2004, where he supervised the strength, speed and conditioning programs for 16 men's and women's teams.

He spent the next 3 years (2005-07) as the head football strength and conditioning coach at Mississippi, then held a similar position at North Texas in 2008.

Ausmus was a member of Tennessee's track team (1994-98), where he was a 2-time All-American and won the 1997 NCAA indoor shot put title.

He has a bachelor's (1998) and master's (1999) degree in education from Tennessee.

He prepped at Campbell County High in Jacksboro, Tenn., where he competed on the track team.

He was born Nov. 6, 1974. He and his wife, Andrea, a former thrower on Tennessee's track squad who previously worked in the USC football office, have 2 sons, Max Aden, 4, and Bo David, 3.

WR **Robert Woods** and QB **Matt Barkley** connected on 3 touchdown passes and both broke long-standing school records as No. 25 USC held on despite being shutout in the second half to defeat Minnesota in the 2011 season opener, 19-17, before 68,273 fans in the Coliseum and a national ABC-TV audience.

It was USC's 14th consecutive season-opening victory, its 12th straight win over a Big Ten opponent and its fifth win in a row over the Golden Gophers.

Woods caught 17 passes to break Johnnie Morton's school mark of 15 (set in 1993) for 177 yards. It was the second-most receptions in a game by a Pac-12 receiver (2 shy of the record). Woods' 3 touchdowns (all in the first half) tied a school game standard. He also returned 3 kickoffs for 73 yards, nearly breaking one for a score.

Barkley completed 34 passes to eclipse Todd Marinovich's USC record of 33 (set in 1989). Barkley had a 75.6% completion percentage (on 45 attempts) while passing for 304 yards with 3 TDs and no interceptions or sacks. He hit 16 passes in a row at one point.

The duo connected on scores of 7 yards in the first quarter and then 43 yards and 2 yards in the second quarter to sandwich a 21-yard field goal by Minnesota PK Chris Hawthorne, giving USC a 19-3 lead at halftime. Barkley was 18-of-20 in the first half for 163 yards, while Woods had 11 grabs for 115 yards.

The Gophers scored twice in the second half, first on a 9-yard run by RB Duane Bennett midway through the third quarter 3 plays after the Trojans turned the ball over on a bad fourth-down snap out of the shotgun formation and then on a 12-yard pass from backup QB Max Shortell to WR Brandon Green with 8 minutes to play in the game. Minnesota got the ball back late in the game, but CB **Torin Harris** intercepted Shortell's pass near midfield to seal the win with 53 seconds remaining.

USC had 371 total yards (just 104 in the second half), while 171 of Minnesota's 302 total yards came after halftime. The Trojans ran for only 67 yards (their fewest since getting 61 against Penn State in 2008). USC had more plays (73 to 60) while holding the ball for 32:44. Six of USC's 8 penalties came in the second half.

Starting Trojan TB **D.J. Morgan**, a redshirt freshman, had a game-best 70 yards on 18 carries and first-year freshman WR **Marqise Lee** had 5 catches for 32 yards.

For Minnesota, Shortell—a true freshman—was 7-of-13 for 98 yards in relief of QB MarQueis Gray, who was 7-of-12 for 94 yards and added 47 rushing yards on 16 carries before leaving with an injury at the start of the fourth quarter. Bennett ran for 47 yards on 16 tries.

S.T.J. McDonald and **LB Hayes Pullard** were the leading tacklers (8 each) on a Trojan defense that posted 4 sacks. It was the Minnesota debut of head coach Jerry Kill.

The game marked the unveiling of a 40-foot by 150-foot high-definition video board on the Coliseum's west rim, the second largest board in college football.

TB **Marc Tyler** came back from an opening-game team suspension to run for 113 yards and OT **Matt Kalil** blocked a potential game-tying field goal at the end of the contest to give USC a historic 23-14 home win over new conference foe Utah before 73,821 fans and a national Versus Network audience in the first-ever Pac-12 football game.

After Trojan PK **Andre Heidari** nailed a 47-yard field goal (the first of his career) late in the first quarter, USC upped its lead to 10-0 on a 6-yard touchdown run by Tyler several minutes after **S.T.J. McDonald** recovered a Utah fumble. But Utah got on the board late in the first half on a 10-yard scoring pass from QB Jordan Wynn to WR DeVonte Christopher after the Utes recovered a USC fumble.

The Trojans scored on their first possession of the second half, driving 88 yards as QB **Matt Barkley** hit TE **Xavier Grimble** on a 9-yard TD pass. But Utah responded several minutes later, as RB John White ran for a 1-yard TD just 2 plays after the Utes recovered another Trojan fumble.

The teams then each had 5 unfruitful drives the rest of the way, although Utah got to the Trojan 24-yard line before trying a 41-yard field goal that Kalil blocked (it was the second consecutive game he blocked a field goal). USC CB **Torin Harris** scooped it up and raced 68 yards to the endzone as time ran out. (The Trojans were penalized when players on their bench ran onto the field in celebration during Harris' return, but the deadball penalty was negated by rule because time had expired. Most game observers left the contest believing the final TD did not count because the officials never signaled a touchdown. However, 2 hours after the game the Pac-12 clarified that Harris' touchdown counted and the final score was updated from 17-14 to 23-14.)

USC had nearly 100 more yards than Utah (416-319) and held the ball for 33:24. Troy was hampered by 3 turnovers (twice in the red zone) and inopportune penalties (6, including one that negated another Heidari 47-yard field goal).

Tyler averaged 4.7 yards on each of his 24 carries while posting his fourth career 100-yard outing. Barkley was 20-of-32 for 264 yards, but threw his first interception of 2011. WR **Robert Woods** caught a team-best 8 passes for 102 yards, while Grimble added 5 catches for 66 yards.

LB Hayes Pullard had 8 tackles (with a sack) and a deflection to lead the Trojan defense, which posted 8 pass deflections.

For Utah, Wynn completed 12-of-46 passes for 238 yards, Christopher caught 11 passes for 136 yards and White ran for 56 yards on 20 rushes.

USC's winning margin total of 11 points in its first 2 games of 2011 was the smallest opening 2-game margin in Trojan history. It was Utah's first game against USC in the Coliseum since 1948.

Prior to the game, a ceremonial game ball signed by all 12 of the league's head football coaches was presented at midfield to Pac-12 commissioner Larry Scott, with plans to auction it to raise funds for the 9/11 Memorial.

QB **Matt Barkley** threw a USC record-tying 5 touchdowns for the third time in his career to lead the Trojans to a 38-17 win over Syracuse before 65,873 fans in the Coliseum and an FX national cable audience. It also tied a Syracuse opponent record.

After trailing 3-0 on PK Ross Krautman's 23-yard field goal midway through the opening quarter, Barkley connected with 5 different receivers on his scoring tosses: a 5-yarder to FB **Rhett Ellison** to answer Krautman's 3-pointer (and start a 24-point USC scoring run), a 31-yarder to WR **Robert Woods** midway through the second period, a 44-yarder to wide open TE **Randall Telfer** on the opening possession after halftime, a 43-yarder to WR **Marqise Lee** late in the third quarter and a 9-yarder to TE **Xavier Grimble** early in the final quarter (it was the first career TDs for Telfer and Lee).

USC's other points came on PK **Andre Heidari's** 26-yard field goal late in the first half to give USC a 17-3 lead at intermission.

WR Alec Lemon was involved in both of Syracuse's touchdowns: he threw a 28-yarder off a lateral to WR Van Chew midway through the third quarter and then he caught a 12-yarder from QB Ryan Nassib late in the game against USC's backups.

The Trojans dominated in total yards (501-331), first downs (28-17) and time of possession (33:38-26:22), and converted 10-of-14 third downs. The Orange ran for just 73 yards.

Barkley was 26-of-39 for 324 yards, Woods caught 8 passes for 45 yards and TB **Curtis McNeal** ran for a game-high and career-best 79 yards (all in the second half) on just 5 carries. LB **Dion Bailey** topped the Trojans with 9 tackles (with a sack) and forced a fumble.

Nassib, who completed his first 11 passes, was 25-of-37 for 230 yards. TE Nick Provo had 8 catches for 85 yards, while Lemon added 7 for 72 yards. RB Antwon Bailey ran for 47 yards on 11 carries and caught 5 passes for 40 yards.

It was Syracuse's first game against USC in the Coliseum since 1924 and the first time a current Big East school played USC in the Coliseum since 1965.

Arizona State scored 3 unanswered touchdowns in the game's final 20 minutes to end an 11-game losing streak to turnover-prone No. 23 USC with a 43-22 victory on a warm evening in Tempe in front of 61,495 fans and a national ESPN cable audience.

It also snapped a 5-game Tempe winning streak by USC, which was playing its first road game of 2011.

With USC leading 22-21 late in the third quarter, the Sun Devils marched 76 yards to a touchdown on a 3-yard run by TB Cameron Marshall. Marshall then scored on a 4-yard run late in the fourth quarter as ASU drove 82 yards after sacking QB **Matt Barkley** and recovering his fumble deep in Sun Devil territory. Then, on USC's next offensive play, Barkley threw an interception under pressure that LB Shelly Lyons returned 41 yards for the final score.

The Trojans trailed 21-9 at halftime. Marshall scored on the game's fourth play, a 70-yard run. USC got on the board late in the first quarter on a 41-yard field goal by PK **Andre Heidari**. ASU scored early in the second quarter on a 2-yard toss from QB Brock Osweiler to WR Gerrell Robinson. But USC responded on the ensuing drive with a 29-yard Heidari field goal. The Trojans threatened on their next possession, but a Barkley pass was picked off deep in ASU territory and the Sun Devils converted it into a touchdown on Osweiler's 3-yard toss to WR Jamal Miles.

USC came out on fire in the second half but couldn't sustain it, scoring on its first 2 drives: a 24-yard Barkley pass to WR **Marqise Lee** and then a 10-yard run by TB **Marc Tyler** to forge its only lead of the game.

The statistics were nearly even, with USC having a slight edge in total yards (402 to 392) and first downs (23 to 22) as the Trojans held the ball for 32:09. But ASU didn't have a turnover to USC's 4 and the Trojans squandered opportunities in the red zone, with 2 turnovers there and twice having to settle for short field goals. Troy also was penalized 10 times for 87 yards and converted just 1-of-9 third downs.

Tyler ran for a game-best 149 yards on 22 carries (123 of those yards came in the second half), WR **Robert Woods** had 208 all-purpose yards (including 131 on 8 catches and 75 on a pair of kickoff returns) and Barkley was 21-of-33 for 227 yards. LB **Dion Bailey** had a game-best 10 tackles (with a sack).

For ASU, Marshall rushed for 141 yards with his 3 TDs on 25 carries, Osweiler completed 78.1% of his passes (25-of-32) for 223 yards with the 2 scores and Miles caught 9 passes for 55 yards.

The temperature was 98 degrees at the 7:15 p.m. kickoff and dropped only into the high 80s by game's end. A freak windstorm also blew throughout the stadium during part of the first half.

QB **Matt Barkley** set school game passing and total offense yardage records, WR **Robert Woods** came close to breaking the school game receiving yardage mark and **ST.J. McDonald** had 2 early interceptions that were turned into points as USC held on to defeat Arizona, 48-41, while both teams put on an offensive display on a warm day in front of 63,707 fans in the Coliseum and an FSN national cable audience.

It was USC's ninth victory over Arizona in the last 10 meetings. It was the fifth straight USC-UA game decided by a touchdown or less, but it equaled the most points the Wildcats have scored against the Trojans (also in 1982). It also was Arizona's fourth straight loss, seventh consecutive league loss and ninth loss in a row to an FBS opponent.

Barkley completed 82.1% of his passes (32-of-39) for a USC record 468 yards with 4 TDs and 1 interception, and he also ran for a score. He was 22-of-26 for 301 yards with 3 TDs in the first half. His 470 yards of total offense also was a school game record. Both records he broke belonged to Heisman Trophy winner Carson Palmer.

Woods caught 14 passes for 255 yards (5 yards shy of the school standard) with 2 TDs, and he also had 77 yards on 3 kickoffs.

The teams combined for 1,136 yards of total offense, the most in a Trojan game since USC and Texas A&M totaled 1,139 yards in the 1977 Bluebonnet Bowl. USC had 582 total yards (averaging 9.1 yards per play), including a school game record 468 through the air, while Arizona had 554 total yards and set USC opponent game records with 41 completions and 37 first downs (to Troy's 26). The Wildcats, whose 4 TD aerials tied the USC opponent record, held the ball for 33:50 while running off 86 plays (22 more than the Trojans). USC converted 7-of-10 third downs, did not punt or allow a sack and was penalized just 3 times.

The Trojans, who scored on their first 6 possessions, got out to a 17-0 first quarter lead, starting with Woods' 82-yard scoring catch-and-run of a Barkley swing pass (it was a career long for both players and the longest USC pass since Palmer's 93-yard TD pass to Kareem Kelly in 2001). McDonald then picked off Arizona QB Nick Foles on the Wildcats' next 2 drives (the first ended Foles' streak of 210 passes without a pick dating to 2010). USC converted the first one into a 46-yard field goal by PK **Andre Heidari** and the second into a 38-yard Barkley TD toss to WR **Marqise Lee**, who caught 8 passes overall for 144 yards.

Arizona got on the board on the ensuing series (the first of 5 straight Wildcat scoring drives) on a 4-yard pass from Foles to HB Taimi Tutogi early in the second quarter. USC responded with a 7-yard Barkley TD pass to TE **Xavier Grimble**, but Arizona came right back with a 27-yard Foles scoring pass to RB Ka'Deem Carey (USC OT **Matt Kalil** blocked the PAT kick). USC closed out the first half with Heidari's 31-yard field goal at the gun to forge a 27-12 lead.

The Trojans scored early in the second half on a 28-yard Barkley-to-Woods pass, but the Wildcats pulled within a touchdown on 1- and 16-yard Carey scoring runs (the first came on an 18-play, 93-yard drive and the second came late in the third quarter following a Barkley interception). USC quickly countered at the top of the fourth quarter with a 1-yard Barkley TD sneak, but Arizona then marched 85 yards, with Foles hitting WR Juron Criner on a 12-yard scoring pass. USC came right back to get a 9-yard TD run from TB **Curtis McNeal** (the first score of his career) midway through the final quarter (he had a team-best 74 yards overall on 7 rushes, including a career-long 44-yarder). After a failed USC fourth down try at midfield late in the game, Foles hit WR Austin Hill on a 4-yard TD with a minute to go, but McDonald then recovered the ensuing onside kick and Troy ran out the clock.

Foles was 41-of-53 for 425 yards with the 4 scores and 2 picks (his completions set a USC opponent game record and his TDs tied the USC opponent game mark). He completed passes to 12 different receivers, including 6 each to WRs Dan Buckner (88 yards) and David Douglas (43 yards). Arizona RB Keola Antolin had a game-high 87 rushing yards on 15 carries.

For USC, LB **Dion Bailey** had a game-best 14 tackles, while DE **Nick Perry** had 10 stops (2 for losses, with a sack) and CB **Anthony Brown**, making his first career start, also had 10 stops.

It marked the first time in USC history that opponents have scored at least 40 points in consecutive games.

LB **Dion Bailey** had a pair of interceptions to pace a defense that got 5 turnovers, QB **Matt Barkley** threw 2 touchdown passes and PK **Andre Heidari** hit 3 field goals to lead USC to a 30-9 win over California before 44,043 fans in the San Francisco Giants' AT&T Park and a Thursday night national cable audience watching on ESPN and ESPN 3D.

It was USC's eighth consecutive win over the Golden Bears.

USC, coming off a bye, opened up a 20-0 halftime lead on a pair of Heidari field goals (a 39-yarder midway through the opening quarter after a fumble recovery by DT **DaJohn Harris** and a 29-yarder late in the second quarter following an interception by LB **Chris Galippo**) and a pair of Barkley TD tosses (39 yards to WR **Marqise Lee** midway through the second period and a 7-yarder to WR **Brandon Carswell** late in the half after a failed fake punt by Cal). The Trojans came up with 4 turnovers in the first half: besides those by Harris and Galippo, DE **Nick Perry** had a fumble recovery and Bailey had an end zone interception with less than a minute to go.

After USC opened the second half with a 23-yard Heidari field goal to culminate a 15-play drive that lasted nearly 7 minutes, Cal responded with a 27-yard field goal by PK Giorgio Tavecchio late in the third quarter. The Bears scored on their next possession, a 3-yard run by QB Zach Maynard (but OT **Matt Kalil** blocked the PAT try).

After Bailey got his second pick of the game late in the contest, USC converted with a 2-yard TD run by TB **Curtis McNeal**.

The team statistics were close: Cal had 329 total yards (but just 35 rushing, the fewest allowed by USC since San Jose State had 9 yards in 2009) to USC's 313. Both teams had 18 first downs and converted just 6-of-15 third downs. USC held the ball for 32:03.

McNeal ran for a game-best 86 yards on 17 carries, Barkley was 19-of-35 for 195 yards, Lee caught 4 passes for 81 yards and WR **Robert Woods** had 5 grabs for 36 yards. Bailey had a team-high 8 tackles and the Trojan defense posted 3 sacks. USC lost 3 starters during the game to injury: Lee, TB **Marc Tyler** and CB **Anthony Brown**.

For Cal, WR Keenan Allen had a career-best 13 receptions (the most since Washington's Braxton Cleman's USC opponent record 15 in 2002) for 160 yards, WR Marvin Jones added 6 catches for 89 yards, Maynard hit 25-of-43 passes for 294 yards and TB Isi Sofele ran for 44 yards on 12 tries.

The game was played at AT&T Park while Cal's Memorial Stadium in Berkeley was being renovated.

QB **Matt Barkley** threw 3 touchdowns, including a pair to WR **Robert Woods**, and the Trojan defense came up with 3 opportune second-half turnovers, including a long fumble return for a momentum-changing score by S **Jawana Starling**, as USC posted a wire-to-wire 31-17 upset win at Notre Dame on a cool evening before a sold-out crowd of 80,795 and a national NBC-TV audience.

It was USC's ninth win over the Fighting Irish in the past 10 meetings, its fifth straight win in South Bend and its school-record 14th consecutive non-conference road victory. It was also the first USC night game in South Bend (as well as the series' latest kickoff, 7:30 p.m.) and the first Notre Dame home night game since 1990.

USC, unranked for the first time ever when it had a 5-1 record, came in as a 10-point underdog, but the Trojans dominated the statistics. USC had more total yards (443 to 267) and first downs (29 to 17) while holding the ball twice as long (39:41, its most since having it 40:02 against Texas Tech in the 1995 Cotton Bowl) and running off 22 more plays (79 to 57). The Irish's 267 total yards (a USC opponent season low) were 200 under their average and they converted just 5-of-13 third downs. While USC ran for a season-best 219 yards, ND managed just 41 yards on the ground.

The Trojans forged a 17-0 lead by scoring on 3 of their first 4 possessions. On USC's first drive, Barkley hit TE **Randall Telfer** for a 2-yard TD and then he hit Woods on a 3-yard score on Troy's next series late in the first quarter. PK **Andre Heidari** added a 25-yard field goal late in the second quarter. But Irish RB George Atkinson III took the ensuing kickoff 96 yards for a touchdown and the Irish added a 25-yard field goal by David Ruffer with 21 seconds in the half to pull within a TD.

After USC's opening drive of the second half stalled, Notre Dame took 19 plays to go from their own 9-yard line to USC's 1-yard line late in the third quarter, but on third-and-goal backup QB Dayne Crist fumbled the snap, with Starling eventually scooping up the bouncing ball and racing 80 yards for a dramatic score. It was the longest Trojan scoring fumble return since Zeke Moreno's 80-yarder at Oregon State in 2000.

Notre Dame came right back, as RB Jonas Gray raced 25 yards for a score at the top of the final quarter to pull the Irish again within a TD. But USC came up with turnovers on ND's next 2 series, first a fumble recovery by LB **Chris Galippo** which led to a 14-yard Barkley-to-Woods TD pass and then an interception by CB **Nickell Robey** that allowed the Trojans to run out the clock.

Barkley (who joined Matt Leinart as the only USC starting quarterbacks to post 2 wins in South Bend) was 24-of-35 for 224 yards, Woods had 12 catches for 119 yards, McNeal ran for 118 yards on 24 carries, TB **Marc Tyler** added 67 yards on 13 rushes and LB **Hayes Pullard** led USC with 8 tackles.

For Notre Dame, QB Tommy Rees was 23-of-37 for 190 yards, TE Tyler Eifert had 7 catches for 66 yards, RB Cierre Wood had 6 grabs for 41 yards and WR Theo Riddick had 5 receptions for 56 yards.

Lane Kiffin became the first USC head coach to win his first away game against Notre Dame. It was just the 10th USC-ND game that neither team was ranked.

In the highest-scoring game in USC history, the No. 20 Trojans fell in a back-and-forth heartbreaker to No. 4 Stanford in triple overtime, 56-48, before a loud sold-out Coliseum crowd of 93,607 and a national ABC-TV primetime audience.

Besides the 104 combined points being a USC school record, the Cardinal's 56 points were the most ever by a Trojan opponent. It was USC's first overtime game since 2003 (and first at home since 2001). It was the Cardinal's third consecutive victory over USC and third in a row in the Coliseum. It was the second straight USC-Stanford game decided on the final play. It extended Stanford's nation-leading and school-record winning streak to 16, although the Cardinal's NCAA record of consecutive 25-point-plus victories ended at 10.

After Stanford tied the game with 38 seconds remaining in regulation on a 2-yard run by RB Stepan Taylor that capped a 10-play, 76-yard drive, the teams traded touchdowns in the first 2 overtime periods. First, Stanford RB Jeremy Stewart scored on a 1-yard run, but USC answered on a 15-yard TD pass from QB **Matt Barkley** to WR **Robert Woods**. Then, Barkley hit TE **Randall Telfer** with a 12-yard TD toss, but Stanford countered with an 11-yard scoring pass from QB Andrew Luck to TE Levine Toilolo. Taylor's 5-yard run and a successful Luck pass to TE Coby Fleener on the required 2-point conversion in the third overtime period put Stanford ahead again. On USC's turn, the Trojans got to the 4-yard line, but on first-and-goal TB **Curis McNeal**—who had a career night—lost a fumble and the Cardinal recovered it in the end zone to get the victory.

The game began as a low-scoring affair, as Stanford held just a 10-6 halftime lead. The Cardinal scored on the game's opening series on a 10-yard Luck pass to RB Tyler Gaffney. USC PK **Andre Heidari** then hit a 22-yard field goal late in the first quarter. His counterpart, PK Eric Whitaker, connected on a 33-yard field goal midway through the second quarter, but Heidari nailed a 50-yarder late in the half (it was USC's longest field goal since Quin Rodriguez's 54-yarder against Michigan State in the 1990 Sun Bowl).

On the opening drive of the second half, McNeal jetted 61 yards for a touchdown to give USC the lead (it was the first time that Stanford had trailed in a game in 2011). McNeal then added a 25-yard scoring run on USC's next series to put the Trojans up 20-10. But the Cardinal scored touchdowns on its next 2 drives (a 5-yard Luck pass to FB Ryan Hewitt and a 2-yard Luck run) to regain the lead late in the quarter. USC re-took the lead on its next possession, a 28-yard Barkley pass to WR **Marqise Lee** early in the fourth quarter. Whitaker tied the game midway through the fourth quarter with a 29-yard field goal. After USC's next drive stalled, Trojan CB picked off Luck (just the fourth interception thrown by Luck in 2011) and returned it 33 yards for a dramatic touchdown with 3:08 to play to give USC a 34-27 lead. But Stanford quickly drove down the field to get Taylor's game-tying TD to force overtime (USC moved to the Stanford 40 late in regulation but a replay review ruled that the clock ran out before the Trojans could call a timeout and attempt a game-winning field goal).

McNeal ran for a career-high 145 yards on 20 carries with the 2 TDs, Barkley was 28-of-45 for 284 yards and the 3 TDs with an interception. Woods caught 9 passes for 89 yards with a TD and Lee added 7 receptions for 94 yards with a TD. LB **Dion Bailey** had a game-best 13 tackles, CB **Isiah Wiley** had 11 tackles and 2 deflections and Robey had 10 stops.

Luck was 29-of-40 for 330 yards and 3 TDs and he added 36 yards on 9 carries, but he was sacked twice (doubling Stanford's 2011 sack total). Taylor ran for 99 yards and the 2 scores on 23 carries. WR Griff Whalen caught 6 passes for 102 yards and WR Ty Montgomery added 5 grabs for 87 yards.

Stanford had more total yards (516 to 432) but USC's total offense, rushing (148 yards) and points totals far exceeded the averages that the Cardinal's nationally-ranked defense had been yielding (314.1, 75.6 and 12.6, respectively). Stanford ran off 20 more plays (88 to 68, the most plays by a Trojan opponent since Oregon had 88 in 2006), held the ball for 35:53 and scored on all 9 of its red zone trips (keeping it perfect in the red zone in 2011 on 47 trips). Stanford was penalized 11 times to USC's 2 and the Cardinal punted 5 times after having punted only 16 times all season. USC converted just 4-of-12 third downs.

This was the highest AP-ranked Stanford team that USC faced.

QB **Matt Barkley** threw a school-record 6 touchdown passes to lead No. 21 USC to an overwhelming 42-17 win at new Pac-12 member Colorado on a cold (high 30s/low 40s) Friday night in front of 50,083 fans and a national ESPN primetime audience.

The victory kept the Trojans undefeated in 6 tries against the Buffaloes.

After Colorado scored on the game's opening series (a 37-yard pass from QB Tyler Hansen to WR Toney Clemons), Barkley threw 4 TDs in the first half (a 33-yarder to WR **Marqise Lee** midway through the opening quarter, a 5-yarder to TE **Xavier Grimbles** at the top of the second quarter, a 15-yarder to WR **Robert Woods** midway through the second quarter and a 25-yarder to Lee late in the half). Colorado got a 30-yard field goal by PK Will Oliver to pull within 28-10 right before halftime.

Barkley hit Woods on a 45-yard TD late in the third quarter and then, after Hansen connected with Clemons on a 10-yard score early in the fourth quarter, Barkley broke the school record with a 19-yard scoring screen pass to TB **Amir Carlisle**.

Barkley was 25-of-39 for 318 yards but threw an interception, Woods (130 yards) and Lee (124 yards) each caught 9 passes, Carlisle ran for a game-high 90 yards on 10 carries off the bench, TB **Curtis McNeal** added 87 yards on 10 carries in his first career start and TB **D.J. Morgan** had 56 yards on 9 tries. CB **Isiah Wiley** led USC with 5 tackles. TE **Rhett Ellison** and TE **Randall Telfer** each blocked a field goal.

For Colorado, Hansen hit 17-of-37 passes for 250 yards, TB Rodney Stewart ran for 88 yards on 21 carries and caught 6 passes for 67 yards and Clemons had 5 receptions for 112 yards.

USC had decisive margins in first downs (31 to 19), total yards (561 to 384) and plays (72 to 62) while holding the ball for 32:42. CU converted just 5-of-14 third downs.

USC started 4 true freshmen (Lee, OG **Marcus Martin** and LBs **Lamar Dawson** and **Tre Madden**), plus PK **Andre Heidari**. It was the first time ever that USC started 3 freshmen linebackers (redshirt frosh LB **Hayes Pullard** joined Dawson and Madden).

It was USC's first Friday game since 1999 and Colorado's first-ever Friday home game.

TB **Curtis McNeal** ran for a career-high 148 yards with a long TD run, WR **Marqise Lee** scored twice on a reception and a kickoff return and the Trojan defense posted 7 sacks to highlight No. 18 USC's 40-17 Homecoming victory over Washington on a cool afternoon before 64,756 fans in the Coliseum and a national FX cable audience.

It snapped Troy's 2-game losing streak to the Huskies.

USC opened up a 23-3 halftime lead and was never threatened. The Trojans got on the board first on a 1-yard sneak by QB **Matt Barkley** midway through the first quarter. After UW PK Erik Folk, whose 3-pointers at the gun beat the Trojans the past 2 seasons, nailed a 46-yard field goal early in the second quarter, USC's ensuing drive appeared stalled at midfield, but on fourth-and-9 P **Kyle Negrete** took off on a fake punt and rumbled 35 yards to set up TB **Marc Tyler's** 1-yard scoring run 5 plays later. DE **Devon Kennard** then sacked UW QB Keith Price in the end zone following a bad snap for a safety (USC's first safety since the 2006 UCLA game). On USC's following possession, Barkley hit Lee for a 9-yard TD late in the half.

Lee then returned the opening kickoff of the second half for an 88-yard touchdown. After Washington answered just 3 plays later on a 1-yard scoring run by TB Chris Polk, the Trojans responded 2 plays later on McNeal's 79-yard TD burst (USC's longest run since Reggie Bush's 81-yard TD at UCLA in 2004). PK **Andre Heidari** finished USC's scoring with a 30-yard field goal on the first play of the fourth quarter. UW got its final points when QB Nick Montana hit WR Kasen Williams on a 20-yard TD toss against USC's walk-on reserves.

Lee caught 9 passes (for the second week in a row) for 74 yards, while Barkley was 18-of-28 for 174 yards. DE **Nick Perry** had 2.5 sacks, while LB **Hayes Pullard** and S **Drew McAllister** each had a team-best 7 tackles.

USC had 426 total yards, including 252 on the ground. USC had the advantage in first downs (21-13), plays (68-55) and possession time (34:15-25:45). Washington had a USC opponent season low 244 total yards, including just 46 rushing (both UW season lows), and converted just 2-of-13 third downs (both in the fourth quarter). There were 23 penalties in the game (11 by the Trojans).

Polk, the nation's No. 7 rusher, was held to 36 yards on 9 carries. Price was 12-of-16 for 125 yards and Montana was 9-of-15 for 73 yards after taking over for an injured Price. Williams had 5 catches for 44 yards.

QB **Matt Barkley** threw 4 touchdown passes and No. 18 USC held off a furious Duck rally to upset No. 4 Oregon before a national ABC-TV audience and a sold-out crowd of 59,933 loud fans on a cold (mid-30s) night in Eugene.

The victory by the more-than-2-touchdown underdog Trojans snapped Oregon's winning streaks of 21 home games (longest in the nation), 19 league games and 9 overall games, and it knocked the Ducks out of the national championship picture. It was USC's first win in the state of Oregon since 2005 after 5 straight losses.

USC built a 24-point lead late in the third quarter, but the Ducks scored 3 unanswered touchdowns before missing a 37-yard field goal at the gun that would have sent the game into overtime.

The Trojans jumped out to a 14-0 lead on a 59-yard TD pass from Barkley to WR **Marqise Lee** midway through the opening quarter and then a 12-yard Barkley scoring pass to WR **Robert Woods** on the opening play of the second quarter. Oregon got on the board on a 29-yard pass from QB Darron Thomas to TB De'Anthony Thomas midway through the second quarter, but USC countered on its next series with a 4-yard Barkley-to-Woods TD toss. The Ducks twice lost fumbles in the red zone in the first half, including at the 9-yard line with 23 seconds to go.

The teams then put 30 points on the board in the third quarter. USC started by getting a 26-yard field goal by PK **Andre Heidari** on its first possession after S **T.J. McDonald** blocked a Duck punt, but Oregon answered with a 9-yard TD run by TB Kenyon Barner only to have USC respond with a 3-yard scoring run by TB **Marc Tyler**. USC then went up 38-14 on its next drive on Barkley's 5-yard TD pass to TE **Randall Telfer**. But De'Anthony Thomas returned the ensuing kickoff 96 yards for a TD late in the quarter.

The Ducks scored on their next 2 possessions in the fourth quarter, first on an 8-yard Barner run and then, after a Barkley interception ended an impressive USC drive, on a 1-yard run by TB LaMichael James to pull within 3 points. USC then drove to the Duck 11-yard line before losing a fumble with 2:31 to play, and the Ducks' marched to the USC 20 before Oregon PK **Alejandro Maldonado** hooked his field goal attempt to the left as the clock ran out.

Barkley was 26-of-34 for 323 yards and the 4 TDs, Lee had 325 all-purpose yards (187 on 8 receptions, 134 on 6 kickoff returns and 4 on a Wildcat formation run), Woods had 7 catches for 53 yards, TB **Curtis McNeal** had 94 yards on 20 carries and Tyler added 49 yards on 12 tries.

LB **Hayes Pullard** had a game-best 14 tackles with 2 sacks and a forced fumble, while DE **Nick Perry** added 2 sacks and a forced fumble.

For Oregon, Barner ran for 123 yards on 15 carries, James had 78 yards on 20 rushes, Darron Thomas was 23-of-35 for 265 yards and De'Anthony Thomas had 214 all-purpose yards (162 on 3 kickoff returns, 49 on 3 catches and 3 on 3 runs).

The team statistics were nearly equal in first downs (Oregon had 26 to USC's 23) and total yards (OU had 474, USC had 462). The Ducks' 209 rushing yards were the most against USC in 2011, but 83 yards under their season average. Troy held the ball for 36:27.

QB **Matt Barkley** threw a USC record-tying 6 touchdown passes, including 2 each to record-setting WRs **Robert Woods** and **Marqise Lee**, to propel No. 10 USC to a 50-0 whitewash over crosstown rival UCLA before a sold-out Coliseum crowd of 93,607 and a national FSN audience.

It was USC's largest margin of victory over the Bruins since a 52-0 win in 1930. It also was the Trojans' fifth straight win over UCLA (and the 12th in the past 13 games), as well as their seventh consecutive Coliseum win over the Bruins. The victory gave USC a 10-win season and sole possession of first place in the Pac-12 South Division. It also ended the 2011 season for the Trojans, who were in their second (and final) year of an NCAA post-season ban. Despite finishing 2 games behind USC in the standings, UCLA entered the game guaranteed to be the Pac-12 South's representative in the inaugural Pac-12 Championship Game in place of the Trojans.

Barkley, in the thick of the Heisman Trophy race, completed 83.3% of his passes (35-of-42), including 19 of his first 20 throws, for 423 yards while breaking his own game record for completions and tying his own school game mark for touchdown throws. In the process, he set a Pac-12 and USC season mark for TD passes (39) and a school record for season completion percentage (69.1%) while finishing 1 completion shy of tying the USC season record of 309.

Woods, the Biletnikoff Award finalist who had 12 catches for 113 yards, set the Pac-12 and USC season standards for receptions (111). His 2 TDs gave him 15 in 2011, 1 shy of the USC season record. Lee caught 13 passes for 224 yards (both game and personal bests), tying the USC freshman game record for receptions. Woods and Lee became the first Trojan pair each with at least 10 catches in the same game. The duo also both finished the season with more than 1,000 receiving yards, the fourth time in USC history that 2 Trojans have done that. Their combined receptions (184) and receiving yards (2,435) in 2011 were the most combined by 2 Trojans in a season.

TB **Curtis McNeal** ran for a game-high 124 yards on 12 carries (10.3 average) with a touchdown, pushing him over the 1,000-yard rushing barrier for the season.

USC, bothered by pre-game comments from UCLA head coach Rick Neuheisel that the Bruins had "closed the gap" on the NCAA-sanctioned Trojans, scored on its first 4 possessions. Lee hauled in a 42-yard scoring pass from Barkley on the game's fourth play. Then, after a goal line stand by the Trojans on UCLA's ensuing possession, USC drove 98 yards in 5 plays, with McNeal breaking off a 73-yard TD run. Troy marched 92 yards the next time it had the ball, with Barkley hitting TE **Randall Telfer** on a 1-yard score early in the second quarter (and then he found TE **Xavier Grimble** on the PAT pass). On USC's next series, Barkley hit TE **Rhett Ellison** on a 3-yard scoring toss off a fake field goal and then, after the Bruins got to the USC 7-yard line on their next drive, S **T.J. McDonald** intercepted a pass in the end zone to preserve a 29-0 lead at the intermission, Troy's biggest halftime margin against the Bruins since being up 33-2 in 2003.

It was more of the same in the second half, as USC scored on its first 3 drives. First was a 52-yard Barkley-to-Lee bomb, followed by Woods catching Barkley's TD passes of 4 and 41 yards, the first to finish off a 93-yard drive and the second early in the final quarter. Late in the fourth quarter, USC stopped the Bruins in the red zone for the third time, this time again on downs, before running out the clock.

USC had 572 total yards (averaging 9.4 yards per play) to UCLA's 385. UCLA converted just 3-of-12 third downs (and none of 3 fourth downs). USC only punted twice.

McDonald had a game-best 10 tackles, while CB **Nickell Robey**, LB **Hayes Pullard** and S **Jawanza Starling** each had 9 stops. Robey had 2 of USC's 4 sacks. Pullard ended the season tied with LB **Dion Bailey** for the team lead in tackles (81), the first time in USC history that category was topped by a freshman.

For UCLA, QB Kevin Prince was 21-of-33 for 261 yards passing and also ran for 34 yards on 17 tries, WR Nelson Rosario caught 7 passes for 118 yards and RB Johnathan Franklin gained 55 yards on 8 carries.

Although both teams were allowed by NCAA rule to wear their home jerseys, the Bruins wore all-white uniforms and helmets for the first time. It was the eighth night game in the series and the 15th time the game was played on Thanksgiving weekend.
