## NO. 8/7 USC FOOTBALL FACES NO. 3 MICHIGAN IN CLASSIC ROSE BOWL PAC-10/BIG TEN MATCHUP

### FACTS

USC (10-2 overall, 7-2 Pacific-10 for first place tie) vs. Michigan (11-1 overall, 7-1 Big Ten for second place tie), Monday, Jan. 1, 2 p.m. PST, Rose Bowl, Pasadena, Calif.

### THEMES

No. 8/7 USC, making an unprecedented fifth straight BCS bowl appearance, takes on No. 3 Michigan in the 93<sup>rd</sup> Rose Bowl in a classic Pac-10/Big Ten matchup. It's the third Rose Bowl trip in the past 4 years for both teams. It will be a battle of the winningest Rose Bowl team (USC) against the winningest college football team (Michigan). These also are the top 2 teams in Rose Bowl appearances, as USC is playing in a record 31<sup>st</sup> Rose Bowl and Michigan in its 20<sup>th</sup>. The Rose Bowl stadium has been USC's home away from home, as this will be Troy's 47<sup>th</sup> game there (but the first time it has played there back-to-back). USC will be looking to reverse a trend, as it has lost in its last 2 trips to this stadium...by a total of just 7 points. The teams have collided 7 times in Pasadena, most recently 3 years ago when a USC victory in the 2004 Rose Bowl led to a national championship. USC traditionally has fared well in a variety of situations it is facing: in BCS games, against the Big Ten, in January, on New Year's Day, on Mondays and in season enders. Both teams will have to overcome the disappointment of narrow regular season-ending losses to their archrivals that prevented them from playing in the BCS Championship Game. The Trojans—who captured a record fifth consecutive Pac-10 title this year—have played one of the nation's toughest schedules. Troy has won 55 of its last 59 games (the 4 losses were by a total of 12 points) under sixth-year head coach **Pete Carroll**, the nation's winningest active coach. USC—which has had an AP Top 4 finish each of the past 4 seasons (including national championships in 2003 and 2004)—has been ranked in the AP Top 10 for the past 56 games. Both teams have high-profile offensive players and stout defenses. USC's offense is ranked in the national Top 25 in passing yards and scoring. First-year starting QB **John David Booty**, who tops the Pac-10 in passing efficiency and total offense, has played like a veteran. Two-time All-American WR **Dwayne Jarrett**, who is the Pac-10's career touchdown reception leader, needs just 2 grabs to equal the USC all-time pass catching record. Fellow All-American WR **Steve Smith** leads the Trojans in catches and is 25 yards shy of a 1,000-yard season. TBs **C.J. Gable** and hard-charging **Chauncey Washington** lead the Trojan ground attack, running behind linemen like 2-time All-American OT **Sam Baker** and Rimington Award finalist C **Ryan Kalil**, another All-American. The young Trojan defense (just 1 senior starter)—featuring the likes of All-American DT **Sedrick Ellis**, LBs **Keith Rivers**, **Dallas Sartz**, **Oscar Lua** and **Brian Cushing**, DE **Lawrence Jackson**, CB **Terrell Thomas** and S **Kevin Ellison**—is the Pac-10's best and is ranked in the nation's Top 25 in every statistical category. Michigan, guided by 12<sup>th</sup>-year head coach **Lloyd Carr**, is making its 32<sup>nd</sup> straight bowl appearance. The Wolverine offense, averaging about 30 points and 190 rushing yards a game in 2006, is directed by 3-year starting QB **Chad Henne**, who is second on many of the school's career passing lists. All-American TB **Mike Hart** has hit the 90-yard rushing mark in

every game this season. UM's trio of WRs **Mario Manningham**, **Adrian Arrington** and **Steve Breaston**, who is also a dangerous return man, create quite a threat. All-American OT **Jake Long** anchors the O-line. Michigan leads the nation in rushing defense and is also highly ranked in every other defensive stat category. Spearheading that unit are a trio of All-Americans in DE **LaMarr Woodley**, the Lombardi Award and Hendricks Award winner and the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year who has 11 sacks, CB **Leon Hall**, who has 12 career interceptions, and DT **Alan Branch**, plus veteran LBs **David Harris** and **Prescott Burgess**. PK **Garrett Rivas** is Michigan's all-time leader in scoring and field goals. The game is sold out, a record 11<sup>th</sup> season sellout for USC in 2006, and it will be shown live nationally on ABC-TV.

### RANKINGS

USC is ranked seventh by USA Today and eighth by AP. Michigan is third in both polls.

### SERIES

USC leads its series with Michigan, 5-4. The Trojans have won the past 2 and 5 of the last 6. Seven of those meetings were in the Rose Bowl, where USC holds a 5-2 edge (winning in the 1970, 1977, 1979, 1990 and 2004 Rose Bowls and losing in the 1948 and 1989 Rose Bowls). The other meetings occurred during the regular seasons of 1957 and 1958, with Michigan winning both.

In the 2004 Rose Bowl in the teams' most recent meeting, QB Matt Leinart threw 3 touchdowns and caught another and the relentless Trojan defense recorded a season-high 9 sacks as No. 1 USC dominated No. 4 Michigan, 28-14. The victory (USC's 21<sup>st</sup> Rose Bowl win) gave Troy the AP national championship, 25 years after its last national crown, and its first 12-win season since 1978. And it snapped Michigan's 6-game winning streak. The Trojans built a 21-0 lead before Michigan scored late in the third quarter. After DT Shaun Cody blocked a Wolverine field goal attempt early in the game, USC scored 4 plays into its first possession when WR Keary Colbert made an over-the-shoulder fingertip grab of Leinart's 25-yard aerial. Then, late in the first half following LB Lofa Tatupu's interception (he grabbed a ball that bounced off of SE Braylon Edwards' foot and returned it 26 yards to the Michigan 3), TB LenDale White took a Leinart toss 6 yards for another TD. Then, on the opening drive of the second half, Colbert made a spectacular one-handed grab of a 47-yard Leinart bomb (despite being interfered with) to up Troy's cushion. However, Michigan answered on its next series with a scoring drive that took nearly 8 minutes, capped by QB John Navarre's 5-yard pass to TE Tim Massaquoi. But USC responded right back, scoring on a tricky 15-yard reverse pass from WR Mike Williams to an unguarded Leinart. Wolverine TB Chris Perry ran 2 yards for a TD early in final quarter, but Michigan had the ball for only 4:12 in that quarter and never threatened again. Leinart was named the Rose Bowl MVP as he connected on 23-of-34 passes for 327 yards with the 3 scores (and no interceptions), along with his TD catch. Colbert, who became USC's career reception leader (with 207 catches), had 6 catches for a career-best 149 yards. Williams added a team-best 8 catches for 88 yards. White's TD was his 14<sup>th</sup> of the year, tying the USC freshman season record, while TB Reggie Bush—who had 41 yards rushing, 42 receiving

and 49 on returns—set the USC freshman season all-purpose yardage mark (1,331 yards). Tatupu had a team-high 12 tackles, CB Will Poole added 10 stops (including 2 sacks) with 5 deflections and DE Kenechi Udeze had 3 sacks. USC's 9 sacks were its most since getting 13 against Oregon in 1992. Although Michigan held the ball 34:26 and had more plays (84 to 60) and first downs (25 to 19), the Trojans accumulated 410 total yards to UM's 320 (only 49 rushing). Michigan came into the game having allowed just 15 sacks and 5 TD passes all season. Navarre was 27-of-46 for 271 yards, Perry ran for 85 yards on 23 tries and Edwards had a game-high 10 receptions for 107 yards.

### USC IN ROSE BOWL STADIUM

USC is 28-18 in regular and post-season games it has played in the Rose Bowl, including 21-9 in the Rose Bowl game, 5-8 versus UCLA and 2-1 in the 1922 regular season. The Trojans have lost in their last 2 visits to the Pasadena stadium by a total of 7 points, to Texas in the 2006 BCS Championship Game (41-38) and to UCLA in the 2006 season finale (13-9). This is the first time that USC has played consecutive games in the Rose Bowl Stadium.

### USC ON NEW YEAR'S DAY

USC sports a 21-9 record in games it has played on New Year's Day, including an 19-6 mark in Jan. 1 Rose Bowls.

### JANUARY RECORD

USC has a 30-12 (.714) all-time record while playing in the month of January, including 24-11 in January bowls. Before losing to Texas in the 2006 BCS Championship Game in the Rose Bowl, USC had won its previous 6 January contests.

### SEASON ENDERS

USC is 61-41-11 (.588) in all season finales.

### USC ON MONDAYS

USC is 16-11 in games on Monday, including 12-3 in the post-season. USC's last Monday game was a 24-17 win over Auburn at home in 2002.

### USC IN BCS GAMES

USC is making an unprecedented fifth consecutive BCS bowl appearance (2003 Orange Bowl vs. Iowa, 2004 Rose Bowl vs. Michigan, 2005 Orange Bowl vs. Oklahoma, 2006 Rose Bowl vs. Texas, 2007 Rose Bowl vs. Michigan). USC's 5 overall BCS bowl trips is tied for second most (with Ohio State and Oklahoma) behind Florida State's 6. USC's 3 BCS bowl victories is second to Ohio State's 4.

### FUN FACT I

The last trips to the Rose Bowl game for both USC and Michigan resulted in narrow last-second losses to Texas. The Trojans fell to the Longhorns, 41-38, in the 2006 Rose Bowl (the BCS Championship Game), while the Wolverines lost to UT in the 2005 Rose Bowl, 38-37.

### FUN FACT II

The Grand Marshal of the 2007 Rose Parade, filmmaker George Lucas, is a USC alumnus and has a building on campus named after him. The Queen of this year's Rose Parade, Mary McCluggage, is the daughter of USC alums, Kerry and Vicki, and she has a brother, Matt, who is a current USC student.

## USC IN BOWLS

USC has a remarkable record in bowl games. The Trojans have the nation's sixth highest bowl winning percentage (.636) among the 68 schools that have made at least 10 bowl appearances (behind Utah's .727, Toledo's .700, Penn State's .658, Georgia Tech's .647 and Boston College's .647). USC is just 2 wins behind Alabama for most bowl victories, 30 to 28. Troy's 44 bowl appearances rank fourth behind only Alabama (53), Tennessee (45) and Texas (45). USC once won 9 consecutive bowl games (the 1923-30-32-33-39-40-44-45 Rose Bowls and 1924 Christmas Festival); only Florida State has won more in a row (11). USC's overall post-season record is 28-16. The Trojans were a bowl participant each year they were eligible from 1972 to 1990. Troy has appeared in an unprecedented 30 Rose Bowls, where it has a 21-9 mark. That's not only the most Rose Bowl wins of any team, but also the most wins by a school in a single bowl. USC has won 8 of its last 11 Rose Bowls. USC has also appeared in 11 other bowls—the Christmas Festival, Liberty Bowl, Bluebonnet Bowl, Fiesta Bowl, Aloha Bowl, Florida Citrus Bowl, Sun (John Hancock) Bowl (twice), Freedom Bowl (twice), Cotton Bowl, Las Vegas Bowl and Orange Bowl (twice).

## USC'S PAST 5 YEARS UNDER CARROLL

Sixth-year USC head coach **Pete Carroll** has a system in place that has made the past 5 years (since 2002) glorious ones for the Trojans:

- Four AP Top 4 finishes, including national championships in 2003 and 2004;
- Five BCS bowl appearances;
- Five Pac-10 championships;
- Still-active win streaks for home games (33) and Pac-10 home games (23) to go along with the no-longer-active victory strings for overall games (34), Pac-10 games (27), road games (18), non-conference games (16), games against AP Top 25 teams (16) and Pac-10 road games (13);
  - A winning record of 92.1% (58-5), including 9-1 against traditional rivals Notre Dame and UCLA;
  - An AP Top 10 ranking for the past 56 games;
  - 55 wins in the last 59 games, with the losses coming by just 12 points (the first by 3 points in triple overtime at California in 2003, the second by 3 points in the final 19 seconds to Texas in the 2006 Rose Bowl's BCS Championship Game to fall just short of an unprecedented third consecutive national championship, the third by 2 points on a failed 2-point conversion pass with 7 seconds to play at Oregon State in 2006 and the fourth by 4 points at UCLA in 2006 to deny Troy an appearance in a third straight BCS Championship Game);
    - A no-longer-active national-record 63 straight 20-point games;
    - A no-longer-active national-record 33 consecutive weeks as AP's No. 1-ranked team;
    - Twenty-four All-American first teamers;
    - Three Heisman Trophy winners;
    - Twenty-five NFL draft picks, including 7 first rounders;
    - Four Top 5 recruiting classes.

## HIGH RANKING

USC has been ranked in the AP Top 10 for its past 56 games, a school record. The Trojans have been in the AP Top 5 in 62 of the last 67 polls (including 3 pre-season polls).

## USC'S WINNINGEST 3, 2 AND 1 YEAR SPANS

USC's 37 wins during the previous 3 years (12 in 2003, 13 in 2004 and 12 in 2005) represented the winningest 3-year period in Trojan history. Also, USC's 25 wins during the 2-year spans of both 2003-04 and 2004-05 tied for its best 2-year spans. And USC posted its first 13-win season in 2004, its eighth perfect (unbeaten, untied) season ever.

## USC'S PAC-10 TITLES

After sharing the Pac-10 championship in 2002, USC won the 2003 Pac-10 title outright (its first outright crown since 1989) and again in 2004 and 2005 before sharing it in now in 2006. Those 5 consecutive conference titles are unprecedented in Pac-10 history. USC has now won the league title 36 times, more than twice as much as any other school.

## CONNECTIONS

USC does not have any players from Michigan, but the Wolverines have 9 California natives...Michigan DE **Eugene Germany** originally signed with USC in 2004, but left after that fall camp and transferred to Michigan...Longtime Trojan Marching Band director **Dr. Art Bartner** is a graduate of Michigan, earning bachelor's (1962), master's (1963) and doctoral (1971) degrees; he also played the trumpet for the Michigan marching, symphonic, varsity and jazz bands...USC offensive line coach **Pat Ruel** and defensive line coach **David Watson** both were coaches at Michigan's in-state rival, Michigan State; Ruel coached the offensive line there in 1998 and 1999, while Watson was a defensive graduate assistant there in 2004...Michigan assistant women's water polo coach **Jennifer Durley** is a former USC player (1998-2001) and assistant (2002-03)...Michigan associate men's track coach **Fred LaPlante** was the head coach of the USC women's team from 1984 to 1988.

## FOOTBALL POWERS

USC and Michigan have 2 of the top gridiron heritages in the country. Both teams have won 11 national titles (USC in 1928-31-32-39-62-67-72-74-78-2003-04 and Michigan in 1901-02-03-04-18-23-32-33-47-48-97). Michigan's .746 winning percentage and 860 victories are No. 1 among Division I-A schools, while USC's .702 winning mark is eighth best and its 742 wins are 10<sup>th</sup>. USC has appeared in 44 bowls (with 28 wins), while Michigan has been in 37 bowls (with 18 wins). Seven Trojans have won Heisman Trophies (Mike Garrett, O.J. Simpson, Charles White, Marcus Allen, Carson Palmer, Matt Leinart, Reggie Bush), as have 3 Wolverines (Tom Harmon, Desmond Howard, Charles Woodson). Michigan has had 126 All-American first teamers, while USC claims 146. USC and Michigan both have 27 players in the College Football Hall of Fame. USC has 10 alums in the Pro Football Hall of Fame and Michigan has 7. Both programs have had legendary coaches (USC's Gloomy Gus Henderson, Howard Jones, John McKay, John Robinson and now Pete Carroll, and Michigan's Fielding Yost, Fritz Crisler, Bo Schembechler and now Lloyd Carr). And both schools feature famous fight songs (USC's "Fight On" and Michigan's "The Victors").

## USC VS. BIG TEN

USC is 63-27-2 against Big Ten competition, including 15-9 in bowl meetings. USC has won its last 5 games, 26 of its last 34 and 33 of its last 42 against Big Ten opponents. USC last faced a Big Ten foe in the 2004 Rose Bowl, when the No. 1 Trojans defeated No. 4 Michigan, 28-14. Michigan, on the other hand, is 44-20 against the Pac-10 (its most recent meeting against a Pac-10 foe was also that 2004 Rose Bowl against the Trojans).

## USC PLAYERS LAST TIME VS. MICHIGAN

In USC's last game against Michigan (in the 2004 Rose Bowl), 27 current Trojans were on the roster. Of those, just 5 played in that game. LB **Dallas Sartz** (7 tackles, 2 for a loss, 1 sack, 1 deflection), TB **Hershel Dennis** (7 carries, 17 yards) and FB **Brandon Hancock** (2 receptions, 8 yards) all started. WR **Steve Smith** (1 reception, 9 yards), OT **Kyle Williams** and WR **Chris McFoy** also saw action.

## COMMON OPPONENT

USC and Michigan both defeated Notre Dame in 2006. The Trojans won, 44-24, on Nov. 25, while the Wolverines were victorious, 47-21, on Sept. 16.

## MICHIGAN BOWL HISTORY

Michigan has appeared in 37 post-season bowls, sporting an 18-19 record (.529). The Wolverines are 8-11 in the Rose Bowl, last appearing in the 2005 game (a 38-37 loss to Texas). Michigan's Rose Bowl wins came in the 1902-48-51-65-81-89-93-98 games and the losses were in 1970-72-77-78-79-83-87-90-92-2004-05.

## ALL-AMERICANS

In 2006, USC had 5 players named All-American first teamers, the fourth year in a row Troy has had at least 5 such honorees. WR **Dwayne Jarrett** (AP, Walter Camp, SI.com, Scout.com) and OT **Sam Baker** (Football Writers, The Sporting News, CBS Sportsline.com) both were named All-American first teamers for the second year in a row (Jarrett is USC's first-ever 2-time All-American first team wide receiver). WR **Steve Smith** (CBS Sportsline.com) also was an All-American first team pick, joining Jarrett to mark the first time that USC had a pair of All-American first team wide receivers in the same season. Rimington Award finalist C **Ryan Kalil** (Pro Football Weekly) was another All-American first teamer in 2006, the second year in a row that Troy had a pair of All-American first team offensive linemen. DT **Sedrick Ellis** (Collegefootballnews.com) was USC's fifth All-American first teamer in 2006. They become USC's 142<sup>nd</sup>, 143<sup>rd</sup>, 144<sup>th</sup>, 145<sup>th</sup> and 146<sup>th</sup> All-American first teamers. Jarrett was ninth in the voting for the 2006 Heisman Trophy. Additionally, S **Taylor Mays** (The Sporting News) was an All-American second team pick. Mays also was a Freshman All-American first teamer (The Sporting News, Collegefootballnews.com, Rivals.com, Scout.com) and TB **C.J. Gable** was a Freshman All-American second teamer (Rivals.com) as a kickoff returner.

## ALL-PAC-10

Head coach **Pete Carroll** was named the 2006 Pac-10 Coach of the Year, S **Taylor Mays** was a Co-Freshman of the Year selection and 8 other Trojans were named to the All-Pac-10 first team. In all, 17 Trojans made the All-Pac-10 first team, second team or honorable mention. It's the third time in Carroll's 6 years at USC that he has been named Pac-10 Coach of the Year, as he shared the honor in 2003 and 2005. Mays is USC's third Freshman of the Year honoree, joining wide receivers Kareem Kelly (1999) and Mike Williams (2002). USC had 3 repeaters on the All-Pac-10 first team: WR **Dwayne Jarrett**, OT **Sam Baker** and C **Ryan Kalil**. Joining them as first teamers were QB **John David Booty**, WR **Steve Smith**, DT **Sedrick Ellis** and LBs **Keith Rivers** and **Rey Mauluga**.

USC's second team All-Pac-10 picks were OG **Chilo Rachal**, DE **Lawrence Jackson**, LB **Brian Cushing** and CB **Terrell Thomas**. Five other Trojans were honorable mention All-Pac-10ers: PK **Mario Danelo**, S **Kevin Ellison**, TB **C.J. Gable** (as a kickoff returner), DT **Fili Moala** and LB **Dallas Sartz**. Kalil and Ellis won the 2006 Pac-10 Morris Trophy (for the league's top lineman, as voted by the league's linemen on the other side of the ball)

## INJURED STARTERS

Nine starters or projected starters have missed games with injuries this season: WR **Dwayne Jarrett** (1 game), OG **Chilo Rachal** (1), DT **Chris Barrett** (2), DT **Sedrick Ellis** (3), CB **Kevin Thomas** (8), FB **Stanley Havili** (9), FB **Ryan Powdrell** (10), S **Josh Pinkard** (11), FB **Brandon Hancock** (12), TB **Hershel Dennis** (12). Powdrell, Pinkard, Hancock and Dennis have season-ending injuries. Also, 5 key backups have missed some 2006 games with injuries: LB **Kaluka Maiava** (1), TB **Emmanuel Moody** (2), WR **Chris McFoy** (6), DT **Travis Tofi** (8), OG **Jeff Byers** (11), S **Will Harris** (12).

## YOUNG LINEUP

To put USC's youthfulness in perspective, the Trojans start just 4 seniors (3 on offense, 1 on defense) in 2006. And just 3 backups are seniors. Plus, 15 first-year freshmen have seen action in 2006.

## LOOKING TO 2007

On USC's current 48-man 2-deep (including the punter and kicker), 41 players (18 offense, 19 defense, 4 specialists) are non-seniors, including 17 starters (8 offense, 10 defense, 2 kickers). And that does not include 3 underclass potential starters who are injured. Here's the schedule those returnees will play in 2007:

## LAST GAME

UCLA used a suffocating, aggressive defensive effort to knock No. 2 USC out of a third consecutive BCS Championship Game appearance with a 13-9 upset victory over the Trojans in front of a sold-out Rose Bowl crowd of 90,622 and a national ABC-TV audience. The win snapped Troy's 7-game winning streak over the Bruins and ended USC's NCAA record of 63 consecutive games scoring at least 20 points. It also was USC's fewest points since scoring just 6 in a loss to Utah in the 2001 Las Vegas Bowl and its fewest against UCLA since a 7-7 tie in 1971. The loss sent the Trojans to their 31<sup>st</sup> Rose Bowl berth. UCLA held USC scoreless in the second half (the first time that happened against the Trojans since the 2000 California contest). Although USC had 329 total yards, the Bruins limited Troy to just 55 rushing yards and 15 first downs (USC's fewest since the 2004 California game, when it had 41 and 12, respectively). USC managed to convert just 6-of-17 third downs and 1-of-3 fourth downs, and the Trojans were penalized 9 times. USC

punted a season-high 7 times. UCLA scored first, on a 1-yard run by QB Patrick Cowan late in the first quarter than capped a 12-play 91-yard drive (the longest drive by UCLA and surrendered by USC in 2006). On UCLA's next possession, the Bruins were called for holding in their own end zone, getting USC on the board with a safety early in the second quarter (it was the first safety against UCLA since 1998 and USC's first since 2003). The Trojans then took the lead on a 1-yard scoring run by TB **C.J. Gable** late in the half. But UCLA PK Justin Medlock hit a 22-yard field goal late in the third quarter and then a 31-yarder midway through the fourth quarter to provide the winning margin. The Trojans got to UCLA's 18-yard line late in the game, but LB Eric McNeal tipped and then intercepted QB **John David Booty's** pass to seal the victory with 1:10 to go. Booty was 23-of-39 for 274 yards despite being under constant pressure from UCLA's blitzing defense. Gable ran for 52 yards on 19 carries and TE **Fred Davis** (68 yards) and WR **Steve Smith** (66 yards) each had 6 receptions (both were career highs for Davis). UCLA had only 235 total yards (the first time in the **Pete Carroll** era that an opponent won with less than 300 total yards) and 14 first downs, and was just 4-of-13 on third down conversions. Cowan completed 12-of-21 passes for 114 yards and added a game-best 55 rushing yards on 10 tries, TB Chris Markey had 51 yards on 20 carries and WR Marcus Everett caught 5 passes for 72 yards. LBs **Dallas Sartz** (8 tackles) and **Rey Mauluga** (7 tackles) led the Trojan defense (each had a sack). It was UCLA's first victory over a No. 2-ranked team since a win over Washington in 1990.

## SCHEDULE

USC played a challenging schedule that features 5 foes ranked in the current AP poll and 11 teams that were bowl eligible in 2006 (9 are playing bowls). USC currently plays the nation's second most difficult schedule according to the Sagarin ratings and eighth per the NCAA. In 2006, USC beat the champions of the SEC West Division (Arkansas) and the Big 12 North Division (Nebraska), plus the nation's top independent team (Notre Dame) and the Pac-10 co-champion (California). USC is the only team in the nation to have played all its non-conference games against BCS schools. Troy opened its 2006 campaign at Arkansas on Labor Day weekend, then returned home after a bye to meet Nebraska for the first time since 1970. Then, because of the new Pac-10 round robin scheduling format, the Trojans embarked on a full slate of Pac-10 games for the first time ever. USC faced Washington, Arizona State, Oregon and California at home and traveled to Arizona, Washington State, Oregon State and Stanford. USC then concluded its regular season with back-to-back games against annual rivals Notre Dame in the Coliseum on Thanksgiving weekend and UCLA in the Rose Bowl on Championship Saturday (Dec. 2). USC plays 7 night games, tying the school record first set in 2004. Tickets to Trojan games were hard to come by in 2006, as all home games (and most road games) were sold out. For the third straight season, USC set school records for home sellouts (6), regular season sellouts (10) and season sellouts (11).

## PETE CARROLL

It didn't take long for sixth-year USC head football coach Pete Carroll to return the Trojan football program to national prominence. He is 64-12 (84.2%) in 6 years (2001-2006) as a college head coach (all at USC), the best winning percentage of any current Division I coach with at least 5 years of experience. He got to 50 career USC wins faster than any head coach in Trojan history. His losses have been by a total of 51 points (4.3 average) and only 1 was by more than a touchdown (it was by 11 points). After starting off his Trojan career 2-5, he has gone 62-7 (89.9%) with a pair of national championships (2003-04). He is 42-7 in Pac-10 games, giving him an 85.7% winning mark (a league record). He is 20-0 in November. His teams have been ranked in the AP Top 10 for the past 56 games. His teams have won an unprecedented 5 consecutive Pac-10 titles. USC's 13, 25 and 37 wins over the previous 1, 2 and 3 years represent the winningest periods in Trojan history. Under Carroll, USC is riding winning streaks in a Pac-10 record 33 consecutive home games, a Pac-10 record 23 consecutive league home games, 20 November games, 10 September games, 10 non-conference home games and 6 non-conference road games (not including 3 neutral site contests). His USC teams also had a number of since-broken other winning streaks: a Pac-10-record 34 overall games, a Pac-10-record 27 Pac-10 games, a school-record 18 road games (not including 4 neutral site contests), 18 October games, 16 non-conference games, 16 games against AP Top 25 teams and a school-record 13 Pac-10 road games. His Trojans also set a no-longer-active NCAA record by scoring at least 20 points in 63 consecutive games. He was named the 2006 Pac-10 Coach of the Year (for the third time in his 6 years at USC) and was 1 of 15 semifinalists for the 2006 George Munger Award (given to the nation's top coach). USC was AP's No. 1 team for a national-record 33 straight polls (including 2 pre-season polls). In 2005, his team earned a trip to a fourth consecutive BCS bowl (including a second straight BCS Championship Game). Under Carroll, USC is the first school to have 3 Heisman Trophy winners in a 4-year span. Carroll has produced 24 All-American first teamers and 27 NFL draft picks (including 7 first rounders, with a No. 1 selection in Carson Palmer and a No. 2 in Reggie Bush). His last 4 recruiting classes have been ranked in the Top 5 nationally (including first each year by some experts). He also served as USC's defensive coordinator in his first 5 seasons at Troy.

## OFFENSIVE OVERVIEW

Four starters returned on offense in 2006: wide receivers **Dwayne Jarrett** and **Steve Smith**, tackle **Sam Baker** and center **Ryan Kalil**. Others back with starting experience were wide receiver **Chris McFoy**, tight ends **Fred Davis** and **Dale Thompson**, guard **Jeff Byers**, fullback **Brandon Hancock** and tailback **Hershel Dennis**. USC's top 2 pass catchers from 2005 were back, but the Trojans lost their top 2 rushers and their leading passer. The Trojans were hard-pressed to equal last season's record-setting offense—coordinated by wide receivers coach **Lane Kiffin**, with the aid of quarterbacks coach **Steve Sarkisian**—that ranked in the nation's Top 6 in every stat category: tops in total offense (a school-record 579.8), second in scoring offense (a USC-record 49.1), fifth in passing (319.8) and sixth in rushing (260.0). USC set Pac-10 records for total offense yardage (7,537), first downs (376), points scored (638), touchdowns (83) and PATs (83) in 2005. Troy hit the 600-yard mark in total offense 5 times last fall (including 3 games of 700 yards) and averaged a school-record 7.5 yards per play (including a Pac-10 mark 6.4 yards per rush). USC's 4,157 passing yards last season was a school record. The Trojans had a scoring average of 26.2 points in 2005 and scored 50-plus points a USC record 7 times. In 2005, USC became the first school to have a 3,000-yard passer, a pair of 1,000-yard runners and a 1,000-yard receiver in a season.

## QUARTERBACKS

All eyes were on the quarterback position in 2006 as a successor filled in for 2004 Heisman winner and NFL first round pick Matt Leinart, USC's second-ever 3-time All-American. It was a daunting challenge, as Leinart was 37-2 as a starter while setting 16 school records, including Pac-10 career marks for touchdown passes (99) and completion percentage (64.8). He threw for 10,693 yards in his career, including 3,815 yards with 28 TDs in 2005. But it was not unlike USC's 2003 season when Leinart emerged from a group of relatively untested signalcallers to become the replacement to 2002 Heisman winner Carson Palmer. The only experienced quarterback on the 2006 roster was junior **John David Booty** (242-of-391, 61.9%, 2,956 yds, 25 TD, 9 int in 2006, plus 1 tac), who entered this season as the starter despite missing all but the first day of 2006 spring practice with a herniated disk in his back that required surgery in late March (he was healthy throughout 2006 fall camp). He currently is tied for 19<sup>th</sup> nationally in total offense (242.3, first in Pac-10). He made the 2006 All-Pac-10 first team, ESPN.com All-Pac-10 first team, Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 first team. He is 1 of 11 finalists for the Manning Award (given to the nation's top quarterback) and was 1 of 15 semifinalists for the 2006 Maxwell Award (nation's top player) and 1 of 18 semifinalists for the Davey O'Brien Award (nation's top quarterback). His 242 completions in 2006 is sixth on USC's season passing list and his 276 career completions is 10<sup>th</sup> on the USC all-time chart. His 2,907 yards of total offense in 2006 is seventh on USC's season ladder and his 3,303 career yards of total offense is 16<sup>th</sup> on USC's all-time list. His 25 TD passes in 2006 is tied for 21<sup>st</sup> on the Pac-10 season list (sixth at USC). He has thrown a TD pass in 11 of his 12 starts in 2006 (all but UCLA), including 8 games with at least 2 TD throws and 6 with 3

TDs. He has thrown for at least 200 yards in 10 of USC's games in 2006, including the last 6 in a row. Booty, the first prep football player to graduate a full year early from high school and enroll at a major university when he did so at USC in 2003, appeared in 10 games last fall as Leinart's backup, completing 64.3% (27-of-42) of his passes for 327 yards and 2 TDs. He also played briefly in 5 games in 2003, but sat out 2004 while injured. In Booty's absence in the spring, redshirt freshman **Mark Sanchez** (3-of-7, 42.9%, 63 yds in 2006)—who was the national high school player of the year in 2004—ran the offense and had an impressive showing. He backs up Booty in 2006. Also in the fray is junior **Michael McDonald** (1-of-1, 100.0%, 20 yds, 1 TD in 2006), the son of ex-USC All-American and NFL standout Paul McDonald (his only 2 career passes were touchdowns), plus a pair of walk-on freshmen in **Tyler Davis** and left-handed **Duron Sylvester**.

—Booty was impressive in his debut as a starter, as he completed 68.6% of his passes (24-of-35) for 261 yards and 3 second-half touchdowns at Arkansas (by comparison, his predecessor, 2004 Heisman winner Matt Leinart was 17-of-30 for 192 yards and a TD in his first start in 2003), while Sanchez hit 1-of-2 passes for 19 yards.

—Booty was 25-of-36 for 257 yards and 3 TDs versus Nebraska.

—Booty was 24-of-39 for 179 yards and a short TD toss at Arizona, but threw his first interception of the season after 78 attempts.

—Booty was 23-of-32 for 269 yards and 3 TDs (with a pick) at Washington State.

—Booty hit 23-of-40 passes for 243 yards and a TD (with an interception) against Washington, while McDonald threw a 20-yard touchdown pass off a fake field goal attempt (his second career TD pass in as many attempts).

—Booty was 12-of-25 for 148 yards and 2 TDs against Arizona State, but threw an interception that was returned for a score.

—Booty hit 24-of-39 passes for a career-high 406 yards (the fifth most passing yards in USC history; only Carson Palmer 3 times and Mike Van Raaphorst once threw for more) with 3 TD passes and an interception at Oregon State.

—Booty was 12-of-21 for 203 yards with 3 second-quarter TDs (21, 7 and 2 yards) at Stanford, while Sanchez played the entire fourth quarter and was 2-of-4 for 44 yards and also ran for a 4-yard TD.

—Booty was 17-of-26 for 213 yards with a TD and an interception against Oregon, while Sanchez's only pass was picked off.

—Booty hit 18-of-31 passes for 238 yards and a pair of fourth-quarter TDs (25 and 37 yards) against California.

—Booty threw 3 TD passes (9, 5 and 43 yards) while going 17-of-28 for 265 yards (with 2 interceptions) against Notre Dame and also ran for a 1-yard score (his first career rushing TD).

—Booty was 23-of-39 for 274 yards (with an interception) at UCLA.

## WHAT THEY'RE SAYING ABOUT JOHN DAVID BOOTY

Craig James, ESPN: "I'm just amazed at the way he controls games. With all those new players, he's kept this thing together. Even though the games are closer, they're still winning. I just didn't expect him to play as well as he has. His footwork, his poise in the pocket, his arm strength, it looks like he's been doing this for three years."

## TAILBACKS

Perhaps even more difficult for USC than fielding a new quarterback, a tailback (or tailbacks) had to emerge in 2006 to take over for Reggie Bush and LenDale White, who both departed early for the NFL (Bush was the draft's second overall selection and White was a second rounder). In their time at Troy, the duo accounted for 6,328 rushing yards and an NCAA teammate record 97 touchdowns. They were the first pair of

Trojans to eclipse 1,000 yards rushing in the same season when Bush had 1,740 yards and White added 1,302 yards in 2005 (for another NCAA teammate record of 3,042 yards). The 2-time All-American Bush, who won the 2005 Heisman Trophy and Doak Walker Award, topped the nation last fall in all-purpose running (222.3) while getting a Pac-10 record 2,890 yards, including an amazing 513 against Fresno State. He also was fourth nationally in rushing (133.9). He averaged nearly a first down every rush (8.7 yards) and had 8 100-yard rushing outings in 2005. His 19 touchdowns in 2005 averaged 31.6 yards each. In his career, he had 6,617 all-purpose yards (3,169 rushing) and had 99 plays of 20-plus yards. White was second nationally in scoring (12.0) in 2005. His 24 rushing TDs and 26 overall scores last year were Pac-10 records. He had 6 100-yard rushing games in 2005. In his career, he ran for 3,159 yards, scored a USC record 342 points and set Pac-10 standards for rushing (52) and overall (57) touchdowns. Junior **Chauncey Washington** (155 tcb, 736 yds, 4.7 avg, 9 TD in 2006, plus 9 rec, 93 yds, 10.3 avg and 1 tac), who was a backup in 2003 (he ran for 65 yards in brief appearances in 7 games), looked to start, but he was nagged early in the 2006 season with a hamstring injury. He started 4 mid-season games in 2006 (Arizona State, Oregon State, Stanford, Oregon) when finally healthy, but a knee sprain has bothered him since. He missed the past 2 seasons and this past spring while academically ineligible. His style is a mix between Bush and White. He was challenged by a quartet of talented freshmen who were 2005 prep All-Americans: **Emmanuel Moody** (78 tcb, 459 yds, 5.9 avg, 2 TD in 2006, plus 3 rec, 39 yds, 13.0 avg), **C.J. Gable** (98 tcb, 409 yds, 4.2 avg, 4 TD in 2006, plus 7 rec, 93 yds, 13.3 avg and 14 KOR, 383 yds, 27.4 avg), **Allen Bradford** (9 tcb, 23 yds, 2.6 avg, 1 TD in 2006, plus 2 rec, 29 yds, 14.5 avg, 1 TD and 3 tac and 1 KOR, 9 yds, 9.0 avg and 1 tac), who also can play safety, and **Stafon Johnson** (3 tcb, 17 yds, 5.7 avg in 2006). Gable started the 2006 opener and the last 3 games, while Moody started 4 early contests. Moody was USC's rushing leader in its first 3 games of 2006, while Washington topped the team in the next 6 contests and Gable was the leader in the last 3 games. Moody has 5 runs and 1 reception of 20-plus yards in 2006. Gable (at Arkansas) and Moody (versus Nebraska) became USC's first true freshmen to start at tailback in consecutive games. Moody made 2006 The Sporting News Freshman All-American honorable mention and was named the The Sporting News Pac-10 Offensive Freshman of the Year. Gable made 2006 Rivals.com Freshman All-American second team (as a kickoff returner). The Sporting News Freshman All-American honorable mention (as a tailback and kickoff returner). All-Pac-10 honorable mention (as a kickoff returner) and The Sporting News Pac-10 All-Freshman first team (as a tailback and kickoff returner). Junior **Desmond Reed** (7 tcb, 12 yds, 1.7 avg in 2005, plus 5 rec, 51 yds, 10.2 avg, plus 16 PR, 95 yds, 5.9 avg and 2 KOR, 42 yds, 21.0 avg and 1 tac), who has Bush-like skills, has recovered from torn knee ligaments in last season's Notre Dame game, although he still is bothered by subsequent nerve damage in his foot (he missed 2006 spring practice). Still, he has made an impact as a punt returner in 2006. He won USC's Chris Carlisle Award. He had 331 all-purpose yards in 2005,

averaging 13.8 yards per touch. Sophomore **Michael Coleman**, who is in the White mold, missed 2006 spring drills while recovering from a 2005 hip injury and is redshirting this fall. He had 95 yards and a TD on 20 carries last year. Also available is little-used walk-on junior **John Griffin**. Senior **Hershel Dennis**, who started in 2003, appeared ready to re-assume his starting tailback job after redshirting last season because of torn knee ligaments suffered prior to the 2005 Orange Bowl. But he re-tore those ligaments midway through 2006 spring practice and will be sidelined again in 2006 (he likely will petition for a sixth year of eligibility in 2007). He has 968 career rushing yards, including 661 on 137 carries (4.8 avg) with 4 TDs in 2003.

—In the opener at Arkansas, Moody rushed for a game-high 58 yards on 7 carries with a 9-yard TD. Washington added 55 yards on 8 tries, Gable—who became the first USC true freshman to start an opener at tailback—had 51 yards on 12 attempts with a 3-yard TD, Bradford had 13 yards on 5 carries with a 1-yard score and Reed had 7 yards on 4 ties and also had a 6-yard reception.

—Moody started versus Nebraska and ran for a game-best 70 yards on 9 carries, while Washington added 52 yards on 12 tries and scored his first career TD (a 7-yarder), Gable had 22 yards on 6 rushes and Reed caught 2 passes for 13 yards, returned a punt 4 yards and had a tackle.

—Moody ran for a game-high 130 yards on 21 carries as the starter at Arizona, with a 9-yard TD run and other runs of 40 and 30 yards (he also lost a yard on a reception) to earn Rivals.com National Freshman of the Week honors, while Gable added 34 yards on 5 carries and had a 5-yard reception, Washington had 33 yards on 10 tries and a 4-yard catch, Bradford had a 3-yard carry and Reed returned 3 punts for 19 yards and lost 5 yards while sacked on an attempted reverse pass.

—Washington had a game-high 71 yards on 18 carries, with a 3-yard TD, at Washington State. Moody added 69 yards on 8 carries (including a 48-yard run) and Gable rushed for 6 yards on 3 tries and returned 4 kickoffs for 127 yards (including a 55-yarder).

—Washington had a team-high 81 yards on 17 carries and caught 2 passes for 17 yards versus Washington. Moody added 67 yards on 15 rushes, Gable returned 4 kickoffs for 98 yards and Reed had a 2-yard punt return.

—Washington had a game-best 108 yards on 22 carries, both career bests, with the game-winning 2-yard scoring run with 4:29 to play (he had 64 yards on 10 carries on the decisive 74-yard scoring drive) and added a 29-yard reception against Arizona State in his first career start, while Moody had 29 yards on 6 carries, Gable had 26 yards on 5 rushes with a 2-yard TD and also returned a kickoff 20 yards, Bradford caught a 17-yard TD pass and made a tackle, and Reed had 2 receptions for 32 yards, a 23-yard kickoff return and a 7-yard punt return.

—Washington led USC with 81 yards on 18 carries, with a 2-yard TD run and a 2-point conversion run, and also added 3 catches for 32 yards at Oregon State, while Moody had 8 yards on 3 carries, Gable had a 5-yard run and 2 kickoff returns for 40 yards and Reed had a 19-yard kickoff return, a punt return for no yards and a rush for a 1-yard loss.

—Washington ran for a game-best 74 yards on 12 carries (with a 15-yard TD run on fourth down) at Stanford, while Moody had 26 yards on 9 rushes and 40 yards on 2 receptions, Johnson ran for 17 yards on his first 3 carries of 2006, Bradford caught a 12-yard pass, Gable had 1 yard on 2 tries and Reed returned 4 punts for 18 yards.

—Washington ran for 3 touchdowns (5, 3 and a career-long 43 yards) and gained a career-high 119 yards on 15 carries (a 7.9 average per carry) against Oregon (he also caught a 7-yard pass), while Gable gained 14 yards on 6 tries and scored a 2-yard TD (he also had a 41-yard kickoff return), Bradford added 3 yards on 2 carries and Moody had a 2-yard carry before spraining his ankle.

—Gable started against California and ran for a game-best and career-high 91 yards on 19 carries (he also had a career-long 35-yard reception and returned a kickoff 33 yards for 159 all-purpose yards) to earn Rivals.com National Freshman of the Week honors, while Washington added 29 yards on 12 carries, Reed had a 1-yard punt return and Bradford started at fullback to make him and Gable the second-ever USC true freshman fullback/tailback combo to start a game together.

—Gable had a game-best 107 yards on 20 carries (both career highs) while starting against Notre Dame, and he also caught a 21-yard pass, while Washington added 24 yards on 6 rushes, Reed had an 11-yard run and returned a pair of punts 44 yards (with a 43-yarder) and Bradford had a 4-yard run and a tackle.

—Gable had a team-best 52 yards on 19 carries (with a 1-yard TD), caught 3 passes for 32 yards and returned a kickoff 24 yards while starting at UCLA, while Washington added 9 yards on 5 carries.

## FULLBACKS

There also is a new fullback in 2006, as David Kirtman graduated. He was a strong blocker, dangerous receiver (22 catches for 281 yards in 2005) and limited but effective runner (26 yards in 2005) who was a fifth round NFL draft pick. Emerging as the starter was senior **Ryan Powdrell** (3 tcb, 9 yds, 3.0 avg in 2006, plus 4 rec, 72 yds, 18.0 avg, 1 TD), a converted linebacker who was moved to offense this past spring. Because of a dearth of tailbacks available last spring, Powdrell was even used at tailback then and was a pleasant surprise. But he suffered a dislocated and fractured ankle against Nebraska, ending his season. So freshman **Stanley Havili** (4 rec, 24 yds, 6.0 avg in 2006), who was a 2005 prep All-American, took over the starting job at Arizona, but broke his leg in that game and has been sidelined ever since. Havili and tailback Emmanuel Moody became the first USC true freshmen fullback/tailback combo to start a game together when they did so at Arizona. Junior **Thomas Williams** (18 tcb, 1.5 for loss, 1 sack, 1 int, 1 FF in 2006), USC's utility linebacker the first half of 2006 (in 2005, he started 6 times on the outside and twice in the middle) and a key special teams performer, was moved to fullback in midseason of 2006. He made his first appearance at the position blocking on Chauncey Washington's game-winning 2-yard touchdown run late in the Arizona State game. Also competing now for time at fullback are senior **Mike Brittingham** (1 tcb, 4 yds, 4.0 avg in 2006, plus 1 rec, 4 yds, 4.0 avg and 2 tac), who is a key special teams performer, junior **Jody Adewale** (2 rec, 16 yds, 8.0 avg in 2006), who has yet to carry the ball at USC, and sophomore **David Buehler** (1-of-1 FG in 2006), who also can play safety and placekicker (he has attempted 1 field goal and kicked off once in 2006). Senior **Brandon Hancock**, the 2003 starter and Kirtman's backup last fall (he redshirted in 2004 with injuries), was set to start in 2006, but tore knee ligaments during fall camp and is sidelined this season.

—Powdrell ran for 9 yards and caught 4 passes for 72 yards (including a 44-yarder where he juked several defenders) with a 1-yard TD at Arkansas, while Brittingham had a tackle.

—Powdrell's only carry against Nebraska was for no yards and resulted in a season-ending dislocated and fractured ankle.

—Havili started at Arizona and caught 4 passes for 24 yards before breaking his leg, while Brittingham had a 4-yard run and a 4-yard reception.

—Adewale caught a 6-yard pass against Washington.

—Adewale caught a 10-yard pass against Oregon.

## JARRETT AND SMITH

The strength of USC's offense is its wide receivers, as both starters returned—they are the best pair of starting wideouts in the nation—and there is undeniable depth. The Trojans' marquee player is 2005 unanimous All-American and Biletnikoff Award finalist **Dwayne Jarrett** (59 rec, 810 yds, 13.7 avg, 10 TD in 2006, plus 1 tcb, -3 yds, -3.0 avg and 0-of-1 passing, 0.0%, 0 yds, 1 int). The big (6-5), athletic junior was 12<sup>th</sup> nationally in receptions (7.0) and 13<sup>th</sup> in receiving yards (98.0) in 2005 when he caught 91 passes for 1,274 yards and his school-record tying 16 touchdown grabs (1 short of the league standard) led the nation. The 2-time All-American made the 2006 AP, Walter Camp All-American, SI.com and Scout.com first teams (making him USC's first-ever 2-time All-American first team wide receiver), The Sporting News and Rivals.com All-American second teams, Collegefootballnews.com All-American third team, Pro Football Weekly All-American honorable mention, All-Pac-10 first team (for the second year in a row), ESPN.com All-Pac-10 first team, Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 first team. He won USC's Player of the Game versus Notre Dame Award. He was ninth in the voting for the 2006 Heisman Trophy. He currently is 24<sup>th</sup> nationally in receptions (5.4, second in Pac-10). He is second on USC's career receptions chart with 205 (11<sup>th</sup> on the all-time Pac-10 ladder) and needs just 2 catches to equal Trojan leader Keary Colbert. His 39 career TD catches are a Pac-10 record, as the old standard was 26 years old (the NCAA record is 50 by Louisiana Tech's Troy Edwards, 1996-98). His 59 catches in 2006 is 14<sup>th</sup> on the USC season chart. His 10 TD catches in 2006 are tied for 22<sup>nd</sup> on the Pac-10 season list. His 2,933 career receiving yards is fourth on USC's all-time list (14<sup>th</sup> on the Pac-10 career chart). He has 12 100-yard receiving games in his career (including 3 in 2006 and 5 in 2005) and he has caught a pass in all 37 games he has played in his career (he sat out the 2006 Washington State game with a shoulder injury), with a TD reception in 24 of those contests. On the other side is steady, speedy senior **Steve Smith** (64 rec, 975 yds, 15.2 avg, 8 TD in 2006). He had 60 catches for 957 yards and 5 scores in 2005. He made 2006 CBS Sportsline.com All-American first team, SI.com All-American honorable mention and Collegefootballnews.com All-American honorable mention, as well as the All-Pac-10 first team, Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 second team. He was USC's team MVP. He currently is 17<sup>th</sup> nationally in receiving yards (81.3, fourth in Pac-10) and 25<sup>th</sup> in receptions (5.3, third in Pac-10). In his career, he has 183 receptions (fifth on Troy's list and 18<sup>th</sup> on the Pac-10 ladder) and 8 100-yard receiving outings (2 in 2006). His 64 catches in 2006 is 11<sup>th</sup> on USC's season list. His 2,911 career receiving yards is fifth on USC's all-time list (15<sup>th</sup> on the Pac-10 career chart). His 21 career TD catches is fifth on the USC chart (tied for 24<sup>th</sup> on the Pac-10 list). He was a Biletnikoff semifinalist last fall. In 2006, Jarrett and Smith became the first pair of USC wide receivers to be named All-American first teamers in the same season. In their careers, Jarrett and Smith have 60 TD receptions and have caught a touchdown pass in the same game 9 times. Both were among 14 semifinalists for the 2006 Biletnikoff Award.

—Smith (67 yards) and Jarrett (35 yards) each had a game-best 5 receptions at Arkansas.

—Jarrett caught a career high-equalling 11 passes for 136 yards versus Nebraska, with TDs of 12 and 5 yards to give him the USC career touchdown reception record and help him earn Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week honors, while Smith added 6 catches for 53 yards with a 3-yard scoring grab.

—Jarrett caught 4 passes for 36 yards at Arizona, including a 3-yard TD, before sitting out most of the second half with a sprained shoulder, while Smith had a 9-yard reception.

—Smith was named Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week as he caught 11 passes for 186 yards (both career highs), including a pair of second-half touchdowns (7 and 11 yards), at Washington State, stepping up for Jarrett, who missed the game with a shoulder injury (10 of Smith's catches were for first downs, including 2 on third downs and another pair on fourth downs).

—Smith caught 5 passes for 96 yards against Washington, including a 20-yard TD off a fake field goal attempt, and Jarrett had a 5-yard reception (Smith sat out the fourth quarter with a sprained ankle and Jarrett sat out the second half when his sore shoulder flared up).

—Jarrett had a game-best 6 receptions for 60 yards, with a 14-yard TD to break the Pac-10 career touchdown reception record (33), against Arizona State, while Smith caught a 12-yard pass before sitting out the second half with a sore foot.

—Smith equaled his career high with 11 receptions at Oregon State for a career-best 258 yards (2 shy of the USC game record, the eighth best showing in Pac-10 history and setting Oregon State opponent and stadium records) and a pair of fourth quarter touchdowns (37 and 2 yards), while Jarrett added 4 grabs for 63 yards.

—Jarrett had a game-best 5 receptions for 118 yards, with a 21-yard TD, at Stanford, while Smith had 2 grabs for 17 yards, including a 7-yard TD.

—Jarrett (91 yards) and Smith (88 yards) each had a game-best 7 catches against Oregon, with Jarrett getting a 12-yard TD.

—Smith had a game-high 6 catches for 88 yards (with a 37-yard TD) against California, while Jarrett added 5 grabs for 66 yards (with a 25-yard score).

—Jarrett earned Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week honors against Notre Dame as he caught 3 TD passes (9, 5 and 43 yards, the last after bouncing off a defender and outracing 4 others) to equal a career best while grabbing 7 passes for 132 yards (both game highs), including an amazing one-handed grab, while Smith added 3 catches for 35 yards.

—Smith had 6 catches for 66 yards at UCLA and Jarrett added 4 receptions for 68 yards.

### WHAT THEY'RE SAYING ABOUT DWAYNE JARRETT

Nebraska head coach **Bill Callahan**: "Dwayne Jarrett is an outstanding wide receiver. He's a monster. He physically dominates. He can make plays on the perimeter and the edge and really becomes a factor in the red zone."

Desmond Howard, ESPN: "Dwayne Jarrett is the best receiver in college."

Former Washington head coach **Keith Gilbertson**: "That's not Mike Williams? That's not Lynn Swann? That's not Keyshawn Johnson? Jarrett is the next great one. He's tremendous. He's a lot like Keyshawn and Mike—tall and rangy and really, really good."

USC head coach **Pete Carroll**: "Dwayne is a big, strong, acrobatic receiver with great hands and he's so difficult to defend. He has a knack for making big plays...He is extremely talented. If you watch him on the field, you see he is just so natural and so gifted. He is all we could have hoped for...He really is one of the most natural catchers you can find now. He has marvelous hand-eye coordination, exceptional confidence and also great creativity to come up with plays...He is at a whole different level than others. And he is an extraordinary practice player. He works every day, every route. He makes big plays every day, which is the standard he lives by now. He has done things in practice that I have never seen before. He does it gracefully and consistently. And he does it every week...He can do more things with the ball than anybody we have had...His one-handed touchdown catch at Washington (in 2005, with one foot inbounds) was a routine grab for him. He does that all the time."

Former USC Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback **Matt Leinart**: "He's reminiscent of Mike Williams in the height, the athleticism and just the way they make plays and create mismatches. But Dwayne might be more athletic...What he's done at USC so far is pretty unbelievable. And he's going to get even better."

USC quarterbacks coach **Steve Sarkisian**: "Dwayne runs every pattern perfectly. He just keeps getting faster, and better."

### WHAT THEY'RE SAYING ABOUT DWAYNE JARRETT AND STEVE SMITH

Oregon head coach **Mike Bellotti**: "They both have the capacity to take a game over. The scary thing to me is the quarterbacks just throw the ball up and trust that they are going to go get it. They have speed, size, range, and they are tremendous. They are probably the best one-two punch in the nation at wide receiver."

### OTHER WIDE RECEIVERS

Providing more-than-solid depth at wideout are senior **Chris McFoy** (15 rec, 158 yds, 10.5 avg, 1 TD in 2006), who has 55 career clutches (17 in 2005) and 17 starts but didn't snag a touchdown until the fourth game of his 2006 fifth-year senior season, sophomore **Patrick Turner** (29 rec, 272 yds, 9.4 avg, 2 TD in 2006, plus 0-of-1 passing, 0.0%, 0 yds and 2 tac), who has a promising future (he had 12 catches with 2 TDs in 2005), and junior walk-on **Brad Walker** (1 tac in 2006). McFoy missed 6 mid-season games in 2006 (Washington, Arizona State, Oregon State, Stanford, Oregon, California) with a shoulder injury. Supplementing this group are 4 supremely-talented freshmen who were 2005 prep All-Americans: **Vidal Hazelton** (1 rec, 8 yds, 8.0 avg in 2006, plus 1 tcb, 7 yds, 7.0 avg), **Travon Patterson** (3 rec, 63 yds, 21.0 avg in 2006, plus 1 tcb, 1 yds, 1.0 avg), **David Ausberry** and **Jamere Holland** (he was sidelined in 2006 with a shoulder injury). Ausberry won USC's Service Team Offensive Player of the Year Award. Then there are freshmen walk-ons **Sean Calcagnie**, **Scott Stephens** and **Spencer Vigoren**, plus senior walk-on **Ben Malcolmson**.

—Turner had 2 catches for 15 yards (including a 14-yard TD) at Arkansas, while McFoy added 2 catches for 7 yards and Patterson had a 19-yard grab.

—McFoy had 3 receptions for 39 yards versus Nebraska, while Turner threw an incomplete pass on a reverse and had a tackle.

—McFoy caught 3 passes for 41 yards at Arizona. Turner had 2 receptions for 13 yards and Patterson gained a yard on a reverse.

—Turner caught 5 passes for 25 yards at Washington State, while McFoy had 2 grabs for 12 yards, including a 7-yarder for his first career TD.

—Turner started in place of Dwayne Jarrett (slowed with an injury) and had a game-best 12 catches for 116 yards (both career highs) with a 17-yard TD against Washington (the most receptions by a Trojan since Mike Williams had 13 at Oregon in 2002), while Hazelton caught an 8-yard pass.

—Turner caught 2 passes for 33 yards at Oregon State and Hazelton had a 7-yard run on a reverse.

—Patterson had 2 catches for 44 yards at Stanford and Turner added a 14-yard reception.

—Turner had a 17-yard reception against Oregon.

—Turner had 2 catches for 21 yards against California.

—McFoy had 2 catches for 24 yards against Notre Dame in his first game back after sitting out 6 contests with an injury, while Turner had a 20-yard reception.

—McFoy had 3 catches for 35 yards at UCLA.

## TIGHT ENDS

Tight end is another position where a new starter had to develop to replace a reliable veteran who departed. In this case, gone was Dominique Byrd and his 81 career receptions. He had 29 catches in 2005. He was an adept blocker and dangerous receiver (especially as a deep threat) who was a third round pick in the NFL draft. Junior **Fred Davis** (35 rec, 313 yds, 8.9 avg, 3 TD in 2006), who started 3 times last year and caught 13 passes with 2 TDs, emerged as the starter. He made the 2006 Scout.com All-Pac-10 second team. Behind him are junior **Dale Thompson** (3 rec, 19 yds, 6.3 avg in 2006), who started once in 2005 and 3 more times this year, sophomore **Jimmy Miller**, who caught 2 touchdowns in 2005, senior **Nick Vanderboom**, freshman **Anthony McCoy** (a 2005 prep All-American) and junior **Gerald Washington**, a 2005 junior college All-American who enrolled at USC this past spring. Vanderboom won USC's Howard Jones/Football Alumni Club Award. Then there's freshman walk-on **Cooper Stephenson**.

—Davis had a game-best 5 catches for 59 yards, with a 9-yard TD, at Arkansas.

—Davis had 2 catches for 16 yards against Nebraska.

—Davis had a team-best 5 catches for 38 yards at Arizona, while Thompson had a 6-yard reception.

—Davis had 5 catches for 46 yards at Washington State.

—Davis caught 2 passes for 15 yards versus Washington State.

—Davis caught 4 passes for 20 yards at Oregon State, including a 4-yard TD.

—Davis had a 2-yard TD reception at Stanford.

—Davis had 2 catches for 16 yards against California, while Thompson had an 8-yard grab.

—Davis caught 3 passes for 33 yards against Notre Dame.

—Davis had 6 catches for 68 yards (both career highs) at UCLA, while Thompson added a 5-yard catch.

## OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

Originally, the offensive line appeared it would be a strong, experienced unit in 2006, despite the loss of graduated 2005 consensus All-American left guard Taitusi Lutui, who was an NFL second round draft choice. But then right guard Fred Matua and right tackle Winston Justice, both 3-year starters, decided to test the NFL waters after their junior campaigns (Matua was a seventh round pick and Justice a second rounder), leaving USC with just a pair of returning starters up front. But both of those returnees are good ones and they are starting for their third seasons, so the line is still in good shape. Junior 2-time All-American left tackle **Sam Baker**, who earned All-American first team

notice in 2005 after winning Freshman All-American honors in 2004, made the 2006 Football Writers, The Sporting News and CBS Sportsline.com All-American first teams, the AP, Walter Camp, Rivals.com, Scout.com and Collegefootballnews.com All-American second teams and Pro Football Weekly and SI.com All-American honorable mention. He also won USC's Co-Offensive Lineman of the Year Award and USC's Co-Lifter of the Year Award. Senior center **Ryan Kalil** (1 tac in 2006) was named to the 2006 Pro Football Weekly All-American first team, AP, Walter Camp, The Sporting News and Rivals.com All-American second teams, Collegefootballnews.com All-American third team, and SI.com All-American honorable mention. Kalil won the 2006 Pac-10 Morris Trophy (for the league's top offensive lineman, as voted by the league's defensive linemen). He was 1 of 6 finalists for the Rimington Trophy (nation's top center). He also won USC's Most Inspirational Player Award and Co-Offensive Lineman of the Year Award. Baker and Kalil made the 2006 All-Pac-10 first team for the second consecutive year (Kalil was a unanimous selection in 2006), ESPN.com All-Pac-10 first team, Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 first team. Senior **Kyle Williams** and sophomore **Chilo Rachal**, who both saw significant action in 2005, emerged in 2006 as the starters on the right side at Justice's and Matua's tackle and guard spots, respectively. Rachal made 2006 Collegefootballnews.com Sophomore All-American second team, All-Pac-10 honorable mention and Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team. Junior **Drew Radovich** (2 tac in 2006), who missed last fall with a hip injury, which limited him in 2006 spring practice, emerged as the starter at Lutui's left guard opening over sophomore **Jeff Byers**, a starter in 2004 who missed last season with a hip injury. Byers, who also can play center, has been sidelined since early in 2006 with a back injury. Sophomore **Travis Draper**, a converted defensive tackle, and redshirt freshman **Nick Howell** are backups at center (Draper also might work at guard and Howell at tackle). Competing for action as backups at guard are junior **Alatini Malu** (he started against Washington in 2006 for an injured Rachal), who is USC's utility lineman, plus freshman **Zack Heberer** (a 2005 prep All-American) and senior walk-ons **Dominique Wise** and **Jonathan Richert**, while pressing for time at tackle are redshirt freshmen **Charles Brown** and **Thomas Herring** (a knee injury sidelined him last year) and freshman **Butch Lewis**, a 2005 prep All-American. Junior guard-tackle **Matt Spanos** sat out the 2006 season while academically ineligible, but could return for the Rose Bowl.

—Baker, Radovich, Kalil, Rachal and Williams started versus Arkansas, Nebraska, Arizona, Washington State, Arizona State, Oregon State, Stanford, Oregon, California, Notre Dame and UCLA, while Malu started in place of an injured Rachal against Washington.

## DEFENSIVE OVERVIEW

Six defensive starters returned from 2005: end **Lawrence Jackson**, linebackers **Oscar Lua**, **Keith Rivers** and **Thomas Williams**, safety-cornerback **Josh Pinkard** and tackle **Sedrick Ellis**. Others back with starting experience are linebackers **Dallas Sartz**, **Brian Cushing** and **Kaluka Maiava**, cornerback **Terrell Thomas** and tackle **Fili Moala**. Three of USC's top 5 tacklers from 2005 returned, as did its leaders in sacks, deflections and fumble

recoveries. Although the Trojans were second nationally in turnover margin (+1.6) in 2005 to continue an upward trend in that statistic since Carroll's arrival in 2001, new coordinator **Nick Holt** (also the defensive line coach) has had to shore up a 2005 defense that gave up the school's highest averages in total yards since 1999 (360.9), in points since 2000 (22.8) and in rushing yards since 2001 (130.5) and its second highest average in passing yards since 1999 (230.4).

## DEFENSIVE LINEMEN

USC lost a couple good defensive linemen from 2005, but the Trojans also returned a couple good ones here. Gone are All-Pac-10 first team end **Froste Rucker**, who had 25.5 career tackles for a loss (including a team-best 14 among his 56 tackles in 2005), and tackle **LaJuan Ramsey** (40 tackles in 2005). Rucker was selected in the NFL draft's third round and Ramsey went in the sixth round. But junior end **Lawrence Jackson** (42 tac, team-high 11 for loss, 4 sack, 3 dfl, 1 FF, 2 BLK FG in 2006) returned for his third season as a starter after winning All-Pac-10 first team honors in 2004. He led USC in sacks (10), forced fumbles (4) and fumble recoveries (2) last fall while also posting 46 tackles (13 for loss) and 6 deflections. Jackson made the 2006 All-Pac-10 second team, Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 first team. He won USC's Defensive Lineman of the Year Award. In his career, Jackson has 35 tackles for loss and 20 sacks. Also back as a starter is underrated junior nose tackle **Sedrick Ellis** (28 tac, 6 for loss, 3.5 sack, 2 FR, 1 FF, 1 BLK FG, 2 dfl in 2006), who had 50 tackles (8 for loss, including 4.5 sacks, in 2005). Ellis made the 2006 Collegefootballnews.com All-American first team, All-Pac-10 first team, ESPN.com All-Pac-10 first team, Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 second team. He won the 2006 Pac-10 Morris Trophy (for the league's top defensive lineman, as voted by the league's offensive linemen). A knee injury sidelined him for 3 games in 2006 (Nebraska, Arizona, Washington State). Sophomore **Kyle Moore** (4 tac, 1 dfl in 2006) and junior **Jeff Schweiger** (2 tac in 2004) are fighting for a key role at end, although sophomore linebacker **Brian Cushing** (50 tac, 9.5 for loss, 2 sack, 1 dfl, 1 BLK P in 2006, plus 1 KOR, 42 yds, 42.0 avg, 1 TD and 1 PR, 21 yds, 21.0 avg) has been starting there as USC plays a hybrid 3-4 defense. Cushing made the 2006 Collegefootballnews.com Sophomore All-American third team, All-Pac-10 second team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 second team. He also won USC's John McKay Award (competitive spirit). Also available to play end is junior **Alex Morrow** (2 tac, 1 dfl in 2006). Junior **Chris Barrett** (13 tac, 2 for loss, 1 sack in 2006), a converted end, and sophomore **Fili Moala** (18 tac, 5 for loss, 2 sack, 1 FR, 4 dfl in 2006), who started twice in 2005, have pushed each other for Ramsey's tackle job (Moala also can play nose tackle, where he started 3 times in 2006 for an injured Ellis). Moala made 2006 Collegefootballnews.com Sophomore All-American honorable mention and All-Pac-10 honorable mention. Also in the hunt at the tackle spots are experienced senior **Travis Tofi** (2 tac in 2006), redshirt freshman **Averell Spicer** (3 tac, 2 for loss, 1 sack, 1 dfl in 2006), freshman **Walker Lee Ashley** (1 tac in 2006), who enrolled at USC this spring after originally signing with the Trojans in 2005 (he did not qualify for admission then) as a 2004 prep

All-American, and freshmen **Alex Parsons** and **Derek Simmons** (he also can play end), who both were 2005 prep All-Americans. Parsons won USC's Service Team Defensive Player of the Year Award. There also is senior walk-on tackle **Mike Davis**. A pair of ends—senior **Rashaad Goodrum**, who missed 2006 spring drills while recuperating from a back and rib injury, and sophomore **Lawrence Miles**, a converted defensive tackle who missed 2006 spring practice while recovering from shoulder surgery—have missed this season while injured.

—Ellis had 3 tackles (with a sack) and a forced fumble at Arkansas, while Jackson added 2 stops, and Moala (for a loss), Ashley, Morrow and Barrett each had 1 tackle.

—Barrett had 4 tackles versus Nebraska, Moala added 4 stops (0.5 for a loss) while starting at nose tackle for an injured Ellis and Jackson had 3 tackles and a deflection.

—Barrett had 3 tackles, with a sack, at Arizona, while Jackson blocked a field goal.

—Jackson had 3 tackles (0.5 for loss) at Washington State, while Barrett had 1 for a loss and both Moore and Moala had a tackle.

—Ellis returned from a 3-game hiatus because of an injury and had 5 tackles against Washington, while Jackson added 3 stops (1 for a loss), Barrett had 1 tackle and Moala had a deflection.

—Ellis had 5 tackles, including 2 for a loss (with 0.5 sack), versus Arizona State, while Jackson had 5 tackles (including 1 for a loss) and Moala and Barrett each had 1 stop.

—Ellis had 5 tackles, including 2 for losses (with a sack), at Oregon State, while Jackson had 2 tackles, a blocked field goal and a deflection, Moala had 2 stops (including a sack) and Barrett had 1 tackle.

—Spicer had 2 tackles (1 for a loss) and a deflection at Stanford, while Moore also had 2 tackles, Ellis had a tackle and blocked a field goal that USC returned for a TD, Jackson had a tackle for a loss and Moala had a tackle (0.5 for loss).

—Jackson had a game-best 10 tackles, including 4 for losses (with 3 sacks), against Oregon, while Schweiger had 2 stops, Spicer had a sack, Moore had a tackle and deflection and Barrett, Morrow and Ellis each had a tackle.

—Jackson had 5 tackles, including 1.5 for a loss (with a sack), plus he forced a fumble and had a deflection against California, while Ellis added 4 tackles, a fumble recovery and a deflection, Moala had 3 stops and a deflection and Morrow had a deflection.

—Moala had 5 tackles, including 2 for losses (with a sack), plus a fumble recovery and a deflection against Notre Dame, while Ellis added 2 tackles (with a sack) and Jackson had a tackle for a loss.

—Jackson had 6 tackles (1 for a loss) at UCLA, Ellis had 2 tackles, a fumble recovery and a deflection and Tofi added 2 stops.

## LINEBACKERS

USC is linebacker heavy, as 6 players who started at the position last year returned in 2006. This unit is the heart of the Trojan defense and the competition for playing time is fierce. Senior **Oscar Lua** (31 tac, 2 for loss, 3 dfl in 2006), USC's tackle leader (66) in 2005, returned as the starter in the middle. He won USC's Co-Lifter of the Year Award. But he has been supplanted there by promising sophomore **Rey Mauluga** (team-high 76 tac, 5 for loss, 2 sack, 1 int, 3 dfl, 1 FF in 2006), a 2005 Freshman All-American when he had 37 tackles. Mauluga made 2006 Pro Football Weekly All-American honorable mention, Collegefootballnews.com Sophomore All-American first team, All-Pac-10 first team, ESPN.com All-Pac-10 first team, Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 first team, plus was 1 of 10 semifinalists for the 2006 Butkus Award. Junior **Keith Rivers** (team-high 76 tac, 7.5 for loss, 2 sack, 1 FR, team-best 3 FF, 2 dfl in 2006)

is back as the weakside starter after getting 52 tackles in 2005. Rivers made 2006 Pro Football Weekly All-American honorable mention, All-Pac-10 first team, ESPN.com All-Pac-10 first team, Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 second team. He won USC's Bob Chandler Award. Four players started on the strong side last year. Senior **Dallas Sartz** (66 tac, 8.5 for loss, team-high 6 sack, 2 FR, 1 FF, 5 dfl in 2006), who began 2005 starting for his third season at the position, suffered a shoulder injury in the second game and was sidelined the rest of the way. He re-assumed his starting role in 2006. Sartz made 2006 All-Pac-10 honorable mention, USC is 31-2 in games that Sartz has started (the losses were at Oregon State and UCLA in 2006). Junior **Thomas Williams** (18 tac, 1.5 for loss, 1 sack, 1 int, 1 FF in 2006) started most of the remainder of 2005 there after Sartz's injury (he even started twice in the middle) and notched 27 tackles, but a late season knee injury forced him to miss USC's final 3 outings last year. He is USC's utility linebacker, available to play any spot in 2006 (by mid-season of 2006, he was moved to fullback), and is also a key special teams performer. Williams' replacement last year with 4 starts was precocious sophomore **Brian Cushing** (50 tac, 9.5 for loss, 2 sack, 1 dfl, 1 BLK P in 2006, plus 1 KOR, 42 yds, 42.0 avg, 1 TD and 1 PR, 21 yds, 21.0 avg), who had post-season shoulder surgery. He had 23 stops in 2005. He'll be used in a variety of defensive roles in 2006, primarily as a stand-up defensive end (in a hybrid 3-4 defense that Pete Carroll calls the "Elephant defense"). Cushing made the 2006 Collegefootballnews.com Sophomore All-American third team, All-Pac-10 second team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 second team. He also won USC's John McKay Award (competitive spirit). Sophomore **Kaluka Maiava** (34 tac, 3.5 for loss in 2006) even started once on the strong side in 2005, but is Rivers' backup on the weak side in 2006 (he had 20 tackles in 2005). He won USC's Co-Special Teams Player of the Year Award. Sophomore **Clay Matthews** (13 tac, 1.5 for loss, 1 sack in 2006), a one-time walk-on who earned a scholarship this fall, redshirt freshman **Luthur Brown** (4 tac in 2006), who missed the 2005 season with a back injury and was limited in 2006 spring drills, and freshmen **Michael Morgan** and **Joshua Tatum** (both were 2005 prep All-Americans) also look to make an impression, as do a pair of walk-ons: redshirt freshman **Nick Garratt** and freshman **Dan Deckas**. Matthews won USC's Co-Special Teams Player of the Year Award.

Tatum is out with a knee injury. Senior walk-on **Lou Ferrigno Jr.** is missing the 2006 season after suffering a knee injury this past spring.

—Rivers had a team-best 8 tackles, with a fumble recovery and forced fumble, at Arkansas to earn Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week honors, while Mauluga added 6 stops, Cushing and Sartz each had 5 tackles with 1 for a loss (Sartz also forced a fumble), Williams had 2 tackles and an interception and Brown had 1 stop.

—Mauluga had a game-high and personal-best 11 tackles (1 for a loss) versus Nebraska, while Rivers and Cushing each had 5 stops (Rivers had 1 tackle for a loss and Cushing had 0.5), Williams (with a sack) and Sartz each added 4 tackles, Maiava had 2 tackles and Matthews had a tackle.

—Mauluga had 4 tackles, including 2 for a loss (with a sack), and an interception at Arizona, while Cushing added 4 tackles (1 sack), Rivers had 3 stops (1 sack), Sartz had 3 tackles and recovered a fumble (that led to a USC TD), Lua had a tackle for loss and Matthews had a tackle.

—Mauluga had a team-best 9 tackles with a deflection at Washington State, Cushing added 7 stops (1.5 for loss), Sartz (with a deflection) and Rivers each had 5 tackles, Lua had 3 (0.5 for loss), Maiava had 3 and Williams had 1.

—Rivers had a game-best 12 tackles (1 for a loss), plus 2 deflections, against Washington. Sartz added 6 stops, Cushing had 5 tackles (1.5 for a loss) and blocked a punt to set up a USC field goal, Mauluga had 5 tackles and a deflection, Lua had 2 tackles (0.5 for a loss) and a deflection, Maiava had a tackle for a loss and Matthews had a tackle.

—Rivers and Mauluga each had a team-best 8 tackles against Arizona State (Rivers had 1 for a loss), while Williams and Cushing each added 4 stops (Cushing had 0.5 for a loss) and Sartz and Maiava each had 3 tackles.

—Three of Sartz's 8 tackles were sacks at Oregon State (his first loss in 28 games as a starter), while Maiava also had 8 tackles (0.5 for loss), Mauluga added 7 stops, Rivers and Lua had 5 tackles (Rivers had a sack), Williams had 4 tackles (0.5 for loss), Cushing had 2 tackles and Matthews had 1.

—Lua had a team-best 7 tackles at Stanford, Maiava added 6 stops, Mauluga had 5 tackles (0.5 for loss), Rivers had 5 tackles and forced a fumble that USC recovered, Cushing had 5 stops (1 for a loss), Matthews had 4 tackles (including 1.5 for loss, with a sack), Sartz had 3 tackles, and Brown and Williams each had 1 tackle.

—Rivers had a game-best 10 tackles against Oregon. Sartz had 9 tackles, including 1.5 for a loss (with a sack), and also recovered a fumble (to set up a USC TD) and had a deflection, Mauluga had 6 stops and a forced fumble, Maiava had 6 tackles (1 for a loss), Cushing had 4 tackles and a deflection and Lua and Matthews each had 3 tackles.

—Rivers and Cushing each had 6 tackles (0.5 for loss) against California, Lua and Sartz each added 4 stops and a deflection, Mauluga had 4 tackles (0.5 for loss), Brown and Matthews both had a tackle and Maiava had a sack.

—Sartz had a team-high 8 tackles, including 2 for losses (with a sack), and a deflection against Notre Dame, while Lua added 6 tackles and a deflection, Rivers had 4 stops (1 for a loss) and forced a fumble that USC recovered, Mauluga had 3 tackles and a deflection, Maiava had 2 stops, Cushing had a tackle and returned an onside kick 42 yards for a TD, and Matthews and Brown each had a tackle.

—Sartz had a team-high 8 tackles (with a sack), plus a deflection, at UCLA, while Mauluga added 7 tackles (with a sack), Rivers had 5 tackles (1 for a loss), Cushing had 2 tackles for a loss (with a sack) and Maiava had 2 tackles.

## WHAT THEY'RE SAYING ABOUT REY MAULUGA

Washington State head coach **Bill Doba**: "Mauluga has my vote for All-American right now. He is a super linebacker."

Steve Dilbeck, Los Angeles Daily News: "It's so early, there will be an effort made here to keep things in perspective, but have you seen the play of USC linebacker Rey Mauluga? If you watched the Trojans play, could your eyes possibly avoid him?...Does this look like Superman in cardinal and gold or what? He flies to the ball and then hits like a locomotive...Isn't this obviously USC's next superstar?...It's so easy to get carried away, to jump games and years ahead. But if that feels irresponsible, the play of Mauluga argues against logic and patience and the value of experience. Mauluga has given every indication of becoming the ideal middle linebacker. He has the natural size. He has incredible burst. He is powerful and aggressive and uncommonly fast. More than all that, he is also amazingly athletic. He can be a sledgehammer or a ballerina. Dazzle with power or agility. Play with fury and control."

Lou Holtz, ESPN Magazine: "He's the next great Trojans linebacker, very physical, always lining up big hits. He reminds me of (ex-Ohio State All-American) A.J. Hawk. Mauluga's athletic ability is similar to Hawk's, but the infectiousness of his free spirit makes him even more valuable to his team."

## DEFENSIVE BACKS

Three-fourths of last year's secondary left, so this unit had to be rebuilt. But there is quality and depth throughout. All-American strong safety Darnell Bing was USC's only defensive player to leave early for the NFL last year (he was a fourth round selection). He recorded 182 tackles and 4 interceptions in his career as a 3-year starter, including 50 stops and 4 picks last year. His running mate at free safety, Scott Ware (he had 51 tackles and 1 interception in 2005), graduated, as did 2-year starting cornerback Justin Wyatt, who posted 94 tackles and 4 interceptions in his career (including 34 stops and 1 pick last season). Sophomore **Kevin Ellison** (63 tac, 6 for loss, 1.5 sack, 1 FF, 1 int, 5 dfl in 2006), who opened eyes in 2005 before an early-season knee injury sidelined him, emerged from 2006 spring practice as the starter at strong safety. [Ellison made 2006 Collegefootballnews.com Sophomore All-American second team and All-Pac-10 honorable mention. He won USC's Jack Oskie "Rise and Shine" Award \(biggest hit\).](#) Aggressive junior **Josh Pinkard** (6 tac in 2006) began last season as a safety (even starting once at strong safety), but started the year's last 6 games at cornerback and made quite an impression. He had 54 tackles, 7 deflections and 2 interceptions in 2005. He was the starting free safety in the 2006 opener, but suffered a knee injury and is sidelined for 2006. So freshman **Taylor Mays** (58 tac, team-best 3 int, 3 dfl in 2006), a 2005 prep All-American, took over the starting free safety job in 2006. [He made the 2006 The Sporting News All-American second team, Collegefootballnews.com Defensive Freshman of the Year, The Sporting News, Rivals.com and Scout.com Freshman All-American first teams, was named a Pac-10 Co-Freshman of the Year, The Sporting News Pac-10 Defensive Freshman of the Year and Rivals.com Pac-10 Freshman of the Year and made the Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team.](#) Also battling for time at safety is freshman **Antwine Perez** (3 tac in 2006), a 2005 prep All-American who got a head start on the competition after graduating a semester early from high school and enrolling at USC this past spring, plus freshmen **Garrett Green** (1 tac in 2006)—a 2005 prep All-American who also can play quarterback—and **Alfred Rowe**. Sophomore **David Buehler** (1-of-1 FG in 2006) also can play safety, in addition to fullback and placekicker. There also are 5 walk-on safeties: senior **Brent Yoshida**, junior **Chase McWhorter**, sophomore **Jim Abbott**, redshirt freshman **Justin Hart** and freshman **Robert Erickson**. Sophomore safety **Will Harris**, who missed some of 2006 spring practice while recuperating from a knee injury suffered early in 2005, is missing the 2006 campaign after tearing knee ligaments this past off-season. The cornerbacks have limited experience, but are talented. The most veteran of the group is junior **Terrell Thomas** (46 tac, 2 for loss, 2 sack, 2 int, team-high 12 dfl, 2 FF, 1 TD on BLK FG return in 2006), who started the first 2 games of 2005 at cornerback before a knee injury struck him down. [He made the 2006 All-Pac-10 second team, Rivals.com All-Pac-10 first team and Scout.com All-Pac-10 second team.](#) Sophomores **Cary Harris** (41 tac, 1.5 for loss, 1 int, 1 FR, 2 dfl in 2006, plus 6 KOR, 93 yds, 15.5 avg) and **Kevin Thomas** (10 tac, 1 FR, 1 dfl in 2006) competed to start at the other spot, but Thomas missed the Nebraska and Arizona games with an ankle injury and then was sidelined the rest of the regular season

after breaking his foot against Arizona State. Behind them are sophomore **Mozique McCurtis** (4 tac, 1.5 for loss, 1 int, 1 dfl in 2006), who is USC's nickel back (he redshirted last fall with a sports hernia), and a pair of freshmen who were 2005 prep All-Americans in **Vincent Joseph** (2 tac in 2006, plus 2 KOR, 32 yds, 16.0 avg) and **Shareece Wright** (14 tac, 2 FR in 2006), plus junior walk-on twins **Jamel Williams** and **Jerry Williams** and walk-on redshirt freshman **Matthew Jordan**.

—Pinkard had 6 tackles at Arkansas before suffering a season-ending knee injury late in the game, while Cary Harris had 3 tackles, an interception and 3 kickoff returns for 50 yards, Terrell Thomas added 2 stops and an interception, Wright, Mays and Ellison also had 2 tackles (Ellison also had a deflection) and Kevin Thomas had a tackle and an interception.

—Mays had 5 tackles against Nebraska while starting for the first time at free safety, while Terrell Thomas added 4 stops and a forced fumble, Ellison had 2 tackles and a deflection, Cary Harris had a tackle, a fumble recovery and returned 3 kickoffs for 43 yards and McCurtis had a tackle for a loss.

—Terrell Thomas had a team-high 6 tackles (1 sack) at Arizona, Cary Harris added 5 stops, Mays had 3, Ellison had 2 with a deflection and Joseph and McCurtis each had a tackle.

—Terrell Thomas had a team-best 9 tackles with 2 deflections at Washington State, while Ellison added 7 tackles (0.5 for loss), Cary Harris had 6 stops, Mays had 4 tackles, a deflection and an interception near the goal line on the game's last play, and Kevin Thomas had 2 tackles and a deflection.

—Ellison had 9 tackles against Washington, Mays added 8 stops with a deflection, Kevin Thomas had 3 tackles, Cary Harris had 2, Terrell Thomas had a tackle and 4 deflections and Perez and Wright each had a tackle.

—Ellison had 4 tackles, including 1.5 sacks, versus Arizona State, while Kevin Thomas had 4 tackles before breaking his foot, Cary Harris had 3 stops, Wright had 2 tackles and recovered a fumble, Terrell Thomas had a tackle and deflection and Mays had a tackle.

—Mays had a game-best 11 tackles (with a deflection) at Oregon State, while Ellison had 6 stops (1 for a loss) and a deflection, Cary Harris had 4 tackles, Terrell Thomas had 3 stops and a deflection and Wright had a tackle.

—Ellison had 6 tackles and an interception at Stanford, while Mays added 4 stops, Cary Harris had 3, Wright had 2 tackles and recovered a fumble, McCurtis had 2 tackles (0.5 for loss) and a deflection, Terrell Thomas had a sack, an interception and returned a blocked field goal 71 yards for a TD and Perez had a tackle.

—Cary Harris had a team-high 10 tackles (0.5 for loss) against Oregon, while Ellison had 7 stops (1 for a loss) and a forced fumble, Terrell Thomas had 6 tackles and a deflection, Mays had 4 tackles and returned an interception 38 yards, Wright had 2 tackles, and Perez and Green each had a stop.

—Ellison had a team-best 7 tackles with a deflection against California, while Terrell Thomas had 6 stops and a deflection, Mays had 6 tackles and an interception, Cary Harris had 2 tackles and a deflection, Wright had a tackle and McCurtis had an interception.

—Mays had 7 tackles against Notre Dame, Ellison had 5 tackles (1 for a loss), Terrell Thomas had 4 stops and 2 deflections, Cary Harris had 3 tackles (1 for a loss) and 2 deflections, Wright also had 3 stops and Joseph had a tackle and returned 2 kickoffs for 32 yards.

—Ellison had 6 tackles (1 for a loss) at UCLA, Terrell Thomas and Mays each added 3 stops and Cary Harris had 2.

## SPECIAL TEAMS OVERVIEW

USC's placekicker (**Mario Danelo**), kickoff man (**Troy Van Blarcom**) and snapper (**Will Collins**) returned in 2006, but a new punter, holder and returners had to be developed. The Trojans put up commendable numbers on punts and placekicks in 2005, but needed to improve across the board on special

teams, especially in punt and kickoff coverage. For instance, opponents averaged 17.0 yards per punt return in 2005, with a pair of scoring runbacks, and USC was 115<sup>th</sup> nationally in net punting (29.1).

## SPECIALISTS

USC had to replace the only All-American punter in its history, 4-year starter Tom Malone. His 44.0 career punting average was just 0.1 short of the USC record and 0.6 off the Pac-10 mark. A true weapon, 56 of his 185 career punts went at least 50 yards and 95 pinned opponents within the 20-yard line. The candidates to succeed Malone were a pair of walk-on sophomores: **Greg Woidneck** (38.65 avg in 2006, plus 1 tac), who ended up winning the job in fall camp after coming to USC via Arizona State and then a junior college, and **Taylor Odegard**, whose only collegiate experience was 1 punt late in the Hawaii opener last fall. The placekicking task is on solid footing. Accurate junior **Mario Danelo** (13-of-14 FG, 42-of-44 PAT in 2006) handles the placement kicks for his second season. Last year, he set NCAA season records for PATs (83) and PAT attempts (86). [He made 2006 All-Pac-10 honorable mention. He had a string of 15 consecutive successful field goal tries after missing his first career attempt in 2005 until missing at Arizona in 2006.](#) He was 20<sup>th</sup> nationally in scoring (8.9) in 2005. [In his career, he is 24-of-26 on field goals and 125-of-130 on PATs.](#) Handling the kickoff job for the second season is sophomore **Troy Van Blarcom** (3 tac in 2006), backed by sophomore **David Buehler** (1-of-1 FG in 2006), a fall junior college transfer who also can play fullback and safety (he has attempted 1 field goal and kicked off once in 2006). [Of Van Blarcom's 69 kickoffs in 2006, 47 have pinned opponents within the 20-yard line \(with 37 touchbacks\).](#) In 2005, 51 of Van Blarcom's 110 kickoffs kept opponents within the 20-yard line, including 31 touchbacks. Junior **Will Collins** (1 tac in 2006) returned for his third year as the snapper, a role he has filled flawlessly. His backup is untested senior fullback **Mike Brittingham**. There is a new holder after the graduation of Tom Malone, who performed that assignment perfectly the previous 4 years. Junior QB **Michael McDonald** assumed the job, backed by sophomore punter **Greg Woidneck**. USC had to get used to new punt and kickoff returners in 2006. Departed tailback Reggie Bush handled kickoffs the last 3 seasons and punts the past 2 years. In 2005, he averaged 17.6 yards on kickoffs and 9.9 yards (with a TD) on punts. He ended his career second on USC's all-time kickoff return chart (1,523 yards with 1 TD) and fifth on punt returns (559 yards with 3 TDs). Junior tailback **Desmond Reed** (16 PR, 95 yds, 5.9 avg in 2006, plus 2 KOR, 42 yds, 21.0 avg) returns punts and kickoffs, while freshman tailback **C.J. Gable** (14 KOR, 383 yds, 27.4 avg in 2006), freshman cornerback **Vincent Joseph** (2 KOR, 32 yds, 16.0 avg in 2006) and even sophomore cornerback **Cary Harris** (6 KOR, 93 yds, 15.5 avg in 2006) have been tried as the kickoff returner, with Reed also deep. [Gable made 2006 Rivals.com Freshman All-American second team \(as a kickoff returner\), The Sporting News Freshman All-American honorable mention \(as a tailback and kickoff returner\), All-Pac-10 honorable mention \(as a kickoff returner\) and The Sporting News Pac-10 All-Freshman first team \(as a tailback and kickoff returner\).](#)

—Danelo hit all 3 of his field goal tries (35, 38 and a career-long 44 yards at the first half gun) and 5-of-6 PATs at Arkansas, while Van Blarcom had touchbacks on 8 of his 9 kickoffs and Woidneck pinned the Razorbacks within the 20 on 2 of his 3 punts while averaging 35.7 yards.

—Against Nebraska, 4 of Van Blarcom's 5 kickoffs pinned the Cornhuskers within the 20-yard line (with 3 touchbacks), Woidneck averaged 41.8 yards on his 4 punts and Danelo hit all 4 of his PATs.

—Danelo hit 2 of his 3 field goal attempts (35 and 33 yards), with the miss snapping a streak of 15 consecutive successful attempts, and both of his PATs at Arizona, while Woidneck averaged 44.5 on his 2 punts and Van Blarcom pinned the Wildcats within the 20-yard line on 4 of his 5 kickoffs (with 3 touchbacks).

—All 5 of Van Blarcom's kickoffs were touchbacks at Washington State, Woidneck averaged 44.2 yards on his 4 punts (with a 59-yarder) and Danelo hit all 4 of his PATs.

—Danelo hit all 4 field goals (34, 25, 32 and 21 yards), a career best, and both PATs he attempted versus Washington, including 3 field goals in the second half as his final 2 proved to be the game's decisive points, to earn Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week honors, while 5 of Van Blarcom's 7 kickoffs were touchbacks and Woidneck averaged 43.0 yards on his 2 punts.

—Woidneck averaged 42.6 yards on 5 punts versus Arizona State, while 3 of Van Blarcom's 5 kickoffs pinned the Sun Devils within the 20 (with 2 touchbacks) and Danelo hit all 4 of his PATs.

—Danelo hit a 29-yard field goal and both of his PATs at Oregon State, while Woidneck averaged 37.5 yards on his 4 punts and 1 of Van Blarcom's 5 kickoffs was a touchback.

—Danelo hit all 6 of his PATs at Stanford, 4 of Van Blarcom's 6 kickoffs pinned the Cardinal within the 20 (with a touchback) and Woidneck averaged 34.0 on his 4 punts.

—Five of Van Blarcom's 6 kickoffs kept Oregon within the 20 (with 3 touchbacks), while Danelo hit all 5 of his PATs and Woidneck averaged 41.5 yards on his 2 punts.

—Against California, Buehler nailed his first-ever field goal attempt (49 yards, the longest by a Trojan since Adam Abrams had a 49-yarder at Oregon in 1998), Danelo added a pair of field goals (19 and 32 yards) and PATs, 4 of Van Blarcom's 6 kickoffs were touchbacks and Woidneck averaged 30.2 yards on his 5 punts (with a pair within the 20 and a 59-yarder).

—Danelo hit a 34-yard field goal and made 5 of his 6 PAT tries against Notre Dame, Woidneck averaged 33.5 yards on his 2 punts (and he had another blocked) and 1 of Van Blarcom's 8 kickoffs pinned the Irish within the 20.

—Woidneck averaged 38.7 yards on his 7 punts at UCLA, with 4 pinning the Bruins inside the 20, while both of Van Blarcom's kickoffs were touchbacks and Danelo connected on his only PAT attempt.

## ASSISTANT COACHES

USC's coaching staff stayed reasonably intact after last season, welcoming back an old face, adjusting the responsibilities of a few others and adding a new staffer. Idaho head coach **Nick Holt**, who had spent 3 seasons under Carroll as USC's linebackers coach, returned as the defensive coordinator (a role Carroll held for his first 5 seasons) and defensive line coach. **David Watson**, who was a graduate assistant working with the offensive line last year, became a full-time coach and works with Holt on the defensive line. **Rocky Seto**, who shared the linebackers job with **Ken Norton** in 2005, moved to the secondary. Former junior college assistant **Demetrice Martin**, who played on the collegiate and pro level, joined the Trojan staff in a graduate assistant role, helping Seto with the defensive backs. USC's other holdovers maintained their same job responsibilities as in 2005: **Steve Sarkisian** (assistant head coach/quarterbacks), **Lane Kiffin** (offensive coordinator/wide receivers/recruiting coordinator), **Pat Ruel** (offensive line), **Todd McNair** (running backs), **Brennan Carroll** (tight ends) and **Sam Anno** (special teams graduate assistant).

## STATS OF NOTE

### WINS

\*\*\*USC has won 44 of its last 47 games, 55 of its last 59, 56 of its last 61, 58 of its last 64 and 62 of its last 69.

\*\*\*USC has won at least 10 games in each of the past 5 seasons, a school record.

### OFFENSE

\*\*\*Offensively in 2006, USC currently is 17<sup>th</sup> nationally in passing offense (253.3, third in Pac-10) and 20<sup>th</sup> in scoring offense (30.3, third in Pac-10).

\*\*\*Of USC's 58 offensive scoring drives in 2006, 26 took less than 3 minutes (including 18 under 2 minutes, with 7 of those less than a minute), while 18 consisted of 5 plays or less and 14 went 80-plus yards.

\*\*\*Three USC wide receivers—**Patrick Turner** (12 versus Washington), **Steve Smith** (11 at both Washington State and Oregon State) and **Dwayne Jarrett** (11 versus Nebraska)—have each caught at least 11 passes in a game in 2006, a first in a season in Trojan history.

### SCORING

\*\*\*USC has scored at least 30 points in 46 of its last 59 games.

\*\*\*USC has scored at least 40 points 34 times under Pete Carroll (including 13 times of at least 50 points).

\*\*\*USC has scored at least 50 points in 6 of the last 17 games.

\*\*\*USC had scored at least 20 points in an NCAA record 63 consecutive games, a streak that was snapped in the 200 UCLA game, and in 65 of its past 67 contests.

\*\*\*USC had a streak of scoring 77 unanswered points in 2006 (the last 21 points at Oregon State and all 42 at Stanford).

\*\*\*Since trailing late in the third quarter at Oregon State, 33-10, USC has outscored its opponents, 174-56, in 2006.

\*\*\*USC has a knack for scoring 20 or more unanswered points (5 times in 2006, 13 times in 2005, 12 times in 2004 and 11 times in both 2003 and 2002).

\*\*\*During the Pete Carroll era, USC has more than doubled the score of its opponents in the second half of games (1,408 to 651 points).

\*\*\*Since 2003, USC has scored touchdowns of 20-plus yards 100 times.

\*\*\*USC won 5 consecutive games in 2006 by scoring less than 30 points each outing (Nebraska, Arizona, Washington State, Washington, Arizona State), the first time that happened since the first 5 contests of 2001 in Pete Carroll's first year at Troy.

\*\*\*USC won 3 consecutive games by a touchdown or less in 2006 (Washington State, Washington, Arizona State), the first time that happened since 1968.

### DEFENSE

\*\*\*Defensively in 2006, USC currently is 12<sup>th</sup> nationally in scoring defense (14.9, first in Pac-10), 17<sup>th</sup> in rushing defense (97.7, second in Pac-10), 20<sup>th</sup> in pass efficiency defense (107.9, first in Pac-10) and 23<sup>rd</sup> in total defense (293.8, first in Pac-10).

\*\*\*USC has allowed just 28 points in the first quarter in 2006.

\*\*\*USC has held 7 opponents to 14 points or less in 2006.

\*\*\*USC has scored 73 points following turnovers gained in 2006 (following 11 of the 20 times it has come up with a turnover).

\*\*\*USC has not allowed an offensive touchdown longer than 10 yards in 2006.

\*\*\*USC has intercepted a pass in 48 of the last 61 games.

\*\*\*USC's turnover margin of +0.3 in 2006 is below the upward trend from each previous year under Pete Carroll (+1.3 in 2001, +1.4 in 2002, +1.5 in both 2003 and 2004 and +1.6 in 2005).

\*\*\*USC has held 38 of its last 63 opposing teams to less than 100 rushing yards (5 times in 2006, 5 times in 2005, 8 times in 2004, 10 games in 2003 and 10 times in 2002).

\*\*\*Only 6 opposing runners have rushed for 100 yards against USC in the past 58 games (California's Adimchinobe Echemandu did so in 2003 with 147, breaking a streak of 16 consecutive games without a 100-yard rusher, Cal's J.J. Arrington in 2004 with 112, Washington State's Jerome Harrison in 2005 with 147, Fresno State's Wendell Mathis in 2005 with 109, Texas' Vince Young in 2005 with 200 and Oregon State's Clinton Polk in 2006 with 100).

\*\*\*Under Pete Carroll, USC is 33-1 when holding opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense (the loss was to UCLA in 2006).

\*\*\*Since allowing a 69-yard TD pass in the third quarter of the BYU game in 2004, USC has not allowed a pass completion longer than 45 yards (a span of 125 quarters).

### MISCELLANEOUS

\*\*\*USC in 2006 broke its Pac-10 record home average attendance record (91,480) for the fourth consecutive year and its Pac-10 record home total attendance record (548,880) for the second straight season.

\*\*\*USC in 2006 broke the school record for the third straight year for home sellouts (6), regular season sellouts (10) and season sellouts (11).

\*\*\*USC has kicked off to start each of its 12 games in 2006.

\*\*\*USC has played before crowds of at least 85,000 in 22 of its past 41 games.

\*\*\*USC's last 10 home games have been sold out, a school record.

\*\*\*USC had a streak of 12 consecutive games—home, road or neutral site—that were sellouts (from Washington State in 2005 to Arizona State in 2006).

\*\*\*USC's last 12 home games (and 14 of its past 16) have been in front of 90,000-plus crowds.

\*\*\*USC is 33-3 in the final 6 regular-season games in each of head coach Pete Carroll's 6 years (the losses were to Notre Dame in 2001 and Oregon State and UCLA in 2006).

\*\*\*Eleven of the 12 losses in the Pete Carroll era at USC were by a touchdown or less (the other was by 11 points).

## TAKEAWAYS

Until this season, USC was effective in the takeaway department during head coach Pete Carroll's tenure. USC's +1.5 turnover margin over Carroll's first 5 seasons was the best in the nation and its 189 takeaways during that span also were the most. In Carroll's 6 seasons at USC, Troy is +97 overall (209 takeaways and 112 giveaways). USC was second nationally in turnover margin in 2005 (+1.6, first in Pac-10), getting 22 interceptions and 16 fumbles (while giving up only 10 interceptions and 7 fumbles) to continue an upward trend in its margin figure. In 2004, Troy led the nation with a +1.5 turnover margin by getting 22 interceptions and 16 fumbles (while giving up only 7 interceptions and 12 fumbles). In 2003, USC was +1.5 in turnover margin (second in the U.S. and first in the Pac-10) by getting 22 interceptions and 20 fumbles (and yielding only 9 interceptions and 13 fumbles). In 2002, the Trojans had 36 takeaways (19 fumbles and 17 interceptions) with only 18 turnovers and ranked fifth nationally in turnover margin (+1.4). In 2001, Troy had 35 takeaways (20 picks, 15 fumbles) with just 19 turnovers and ranked fifth in the nation in turnover margin at +1.3.

## RANDOM NOTES

\*\*\*USC's 2006 captains, as elected by their teammates during fall camp, are: QB **John David Booty**, C **Ryan Kalil**, LB **Dallas Sartz** and LB **Oscar Lua**. Sartz, who also was a captain in 2005, is only the seventh two-time Trojan captain ever, and just the fourth since 1902-03 (along with Chad Morton in 1998-99, Troy Polamalu in 2001-02 and Matt Leinart in 2004-05).

\*\*\*Former USC All-American tailback **Anthony Davis** was enshrined into the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind., this August. Davis, a unanimous All-American on the Trojans' 1972 and 1974 national championship squads and the runnerup for the 1974 Heisman Trophy, was the first player in Pac-8 history to rush for 1,000 yards in three different seasons. He is long remembered for scoring 11 touchdowns in three games against Notre Dame, including six as a sophomore in the 1972 contest and four in the famous 55-24 comeback victory in 1974. He set an NCAA record with six scoring kickoff returns in his career (including three in 1974). USC has 27 former players, 2 ex-head coaches, 4 one-time assistant coaches and a former athletic director in the College Football Hall of Fame.

\*\*\*The 2006 season marks the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of USC's 1931 national championship team, which posted a 10-1 record (including a victory over Tulane in the Rose Bowl) under head coach Howard Jones, and the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of tailback **Marcus Allen's** 1981 Heisman Trophy campaign, when he became college football's first 2,000-yard runner (2,427 rushing yards).

\*\*\*Head coach **Pete Carroll** has made it a practice to play first-year freshmen at USC. During Carroll's 6 years at Troy, 66 first-year freshmen have seen action at USC (7 in 2001, 12 in 2002, 13 in 2003, 8 in 2004, 11 in 2005 and 15 in 2006).

\*\*\*QB **John David Booty**, who enrolled at USC in the fall of 2003, is believed to be the first football player to graduate a full year early from high school and enroll at a major Division I-A university.

\*\*\*USC also currently has 5 players who graduated a semester early from high school and enrolled at USC in the spring. FB **Brandon Hancock** came to USC in the spring of 2002. TE **Fred Davis** did so in the spring of 2004. TB **Michael Coleman** and S **Kevin Ellison** enrolled at USC in the spring of 2005. And S **Antwine Perez** enrolled at USC this past spring.

\*\*\*Yes, LB **Lou Ferrigno Jr.** is the son of bodybuilder/actor Lou Ferrigno, perhaps best known as The Incredible Hulk on television and for winning a pair of Mr. Universe titles.

\*\*\*Here are some of USC's more unusual multi-sport athletes. LB **Kaluka Maiava** participated in boxing in high school. TE **Gerald Washington** played tennis as a youth and competed in juniors tournaments. FB **Brandon Hancock** has been featured in various body building magazines, including Muscle Magazine International.

\*\*\*C **Ryan Kalil** might be the Trojans' most musically-inclined player. He likes to sing, particularly Frank Sinatra tunes.

\*\*\*Who's the fastest among the 2006 Trojans? It might be WR **Jamere Holland**, with bests of 10.36 in the 100 meters and 20.92 in the 200. He won the 100 and 200 at the 2005 California state meet (and he was second in the 100 in 2006). Right behind Holland is WR **Travon Patterson** (bests of 10.44 and 21.41), who was fourth in the 2006 California state 100.

\*\*\*Three Trojans have received their bachelor's degrees from USC in the spring of 2006 and are currently working on another degree. FB **Brandon Hancock** received his bachelor's in communication (business administration minor) and is now working on his master's degree in communication management, WR **Chris McFoy** received his bachelor's in economics and is now working on another bachelor's degree in political science and TE **Nick Vanderboom** received his bachelor's in business administration and is now working on his master's degree in real estate development.

\*\*\*In April of 2006, FB **Brandon Hancock** accompanied the USC Debate Squad to South Bend, Ind., to formally debate Notre Dame's forensics team on the topic of who will win the 2006 Trojan-Irish football game.

\*\*\*OT **Kyle Williams** and his fiancée, former USC All-American swimmer Jana Krohn, are parents to a daughter, Kylie, who was born this past May 19.

\*\*\*Not only has head coach **Pete Carroll** produced numerous NFL draft picks (27) from his USC teams, but 9 of his Trojan assistant coaches went on to the NFL from USC: Norm Chow, Kennedy Pola, Greg Burns, Tim Davis, Jethro Franklin, **Steve Sarkisian** (he has since returned to USC), Carl Smith, DeWayne Walker and Kirby Wilson. Franklin, Smith, Walker and Wilson all previously had NFL experience before coming to USC (as do current assistants **Pat Ruel**, **Todd McNair** and **Lane Kiffin**). And **Nick Holt** (Idaho) and Ed Orgeron (Mississippi) both left USC to become collegiate head coaches (Holt now is back at USC after a couple days' detour to the NFL).

\*\*\*USC is ranked No. 2 in Street & Smith's "50 Greatest College Football Programs of All Time (published in 2005)," behind only Notre Dame.

\*\*\*Head coach **Pete Carroll** has his own website, [PeteCarroll.com](http://PeteCarroll.com). The site features a variety of Carroll-related information, multimedia and merchandise, as well as fan club membership that includes exclusive benefits. All proceeds benefit "A Better L.A.," the non-profit organization the Carroll founded to help reduce gang violence in Los Angeles. Carroll also is partnering with Lou Tice of the Pacific Institute on a book—"Leadership Is A Performance Art"—that will be available on the site. Proceeds from the book also will go to "A Better L.A."

\*\*\*In 2003, head coach **Pete Carroll** helped develop "A Better L.A." a non-profit group consisting of a consortium of local agencies and organizations working to reduce gang violence by empowering change in individuals and communities.

\*\*\*FB **Brandon Hancock** also has a website, [www.brandanhancock.com](http://www.brandanhancock.com). He is chronicling his life during the 2006 season. Now that he is sidelined with torn knee ligaments, he'll be part of USC's radio broadcast team on KSPN-AM in hopes of advancing his sports broadcasting aspirations.

\*\*\*Before TE **Gerald Washington** entered junior college in 2004, he spent the previous 4 years in the U.S. Navy as a helicopter mechanic.

\*\*\*Talk about Walter Mitty. WR **Ben Malcolmson** was a sportswriter for the Daily Trojan, USC's campus newspaper, who tried out for—and made—the USC football team in the spring of 2006. He chronicled his tryout quest in a series of stories in the D.T., attracting national attention. He separated his shoulder during spring practice, but got healthy and rejoined the Trojans in late September as a walk-on.

\*\*\*USC played 7 night games in 2006, tying the school record first set in 2004.

\*\*\*"Fight On! The Colorful Story of USC Football" (Cumberland House Publishing), by longtime Southern California sports columnists Steve Bisheff and Loel Schrader, hit the bookstores this summer. The book comprehensively details the Trojan football program, including profiles on great coaches and players and a look at the best rivalries and games throughout USC history.

\*\*\*"The Trojan Ten: The Ten Thrilling Victories That Changed the Course of USC History" (New American Library), by former FSN and CNN sportscaster Barry LeBrock, was published in the summer of 2006. The book covers 10 games that helped establish USC as a football dynasty.

\*\*\*"Game Day USC Football: The Greatest Games, Players, Coaches and Teams in the Glorious Tradition of Trojan Football" (Triumph Books), produced by sportswriters and photographers of Athlon Sports, came out this summer. As the title implies, the book looks back at USC's gridiron history through text and photos.

\*\*\*"USC Trojans: College Football's All-Time Greatest Dynasty" (Taylor Trade Publishing), by Steven Travers, will be published this fall. The book argues the premise that the Trojan program under head coach Pete Carroll is the greatest in college football history.

\*\*\*Two former Trojan halfbacks recently published their autobiographies. First is "Autobiography Of A California Pioneer" (Beech River Books), by 1947-48 letterman Jack Kirby. Kirby led the Trojans in scoring in their 1947 Rose Bowl campaign and then played with the Green Bay Packers in 1949. After his playing days, he became a real estate developer (including communities such as Tahoe Donner), golf club manufacturer and inventor (including fairway distance markers for golf courses).

Then there's "106 Yards" (C&C Publishing), by 1950-51-52 letterman Al "Hoagy" Carmichael. USC's rushing leader in 1950, he caught the game-winning touchdown passes against UCLA in 1952 and Wisconsin in the 1953 Rose Bowl. He was the seventh pick of the 1953 NFL draft, playing for the Packers (1953-58) and Denver Broncos (1960-61). He was one of pro football's top returners during his time, setting an NFL record with a 106-yard kickoff return in 1956 and scoring the first touchdown in the newly-formed AFL in 1960. He also appeared in Hollywood movies and was a successful businessman.

\*\*\*Former USC defensive coordinator Chris Allen (1987-92) has written a novel, "Give Me The Football Life!" (\$16.95, PublishAmerica). It's the fictional account of a football coach's life, mixing an instructional guide about the sport between chapters.

\*\*\*This is the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Trojan Football Alumni Club. Founded in 1956 by former USC players who felt discontented because they only saw each other at funerals, they banded together and formed a social club with a charitable purpose. Now, about 1,000 former Trojan players maintain their special relationships with teammates from all eras and also, in partnership with the John Wayne Family, they have awarded scholarships in excess of \$1.5 million to graduate football players and other recipients. Among TFAC's many activities are the 50- and 25-year team reunions at the annual pre-season "Salute To Troy" kickoff banquet, fully-catered tailgates before every home game and the "Alumni Victory Tunnel" formed on the Coliseum field for the senior introductions before the last home game of the year. \*\*\*This year, the Trojan Marching Band moves from its seats behind the USC bench (north sideline) to the end zone at the east side of the Coliseum, improving the acoustics by ensuring that the entire stadium—not just the visitor's side—will hear the band. The east end zone will become a new spirit zone, the "Trojan Nation," that will include hundreds of student seats and will feature promotional giveaways, food, and other special spirit activities. All of the seats previously occupied by the band will be dedicated to student seating. Having bands in the end zone is a long-standing tradition among some premiere programs, including Notre Dame, Michigan, Penn State, Florida, Nebraska, Miami and Florida State. "We are psyched to be positioned as such an important catalyst of spirit for the Trojan football experience," said Dr. Arthur C. Bartner, the Trojan Marching Band's director since 1970. "I am inspired by this move, as both the band and all Trojan football ticket holders will reap the benefits. We plan to become the *ultimate* in spirit sections across the country."

\*\*\*To make the Los Angeles Coliseum more family-friendly, USC and the Coliseum Commission in 2005 ended the sale of alcohol inside the Coliseum on USC game days. This move has received near-unanimous praise from the public and the media. Said USC President Steven Sample: "All across the country, universities are

promoting a clean, safe and family-friendly environment in which fans can enjoy their team's games...(Our policy was) developed because of a noticeable rise in recent years of incidents involving the use of alcohol and of rude behavior of fans that is almost always exacerbated by alcohol consumption. This deterioration in fan behavior is a nationwide trend, not a USC phenomenon." Fans possessing alcohol inside the Coliseum, acting in a drunken or disorderly way, or using threatening or obscene language will be evicted and will permanently lose USC ticket buying privileges. USC will reimburse the Coliseum for lost revenue because of this stoppage of alcohol sales.

\*\*\*Trojan Fan Fest, a free fun-filled celebration outside the Coliseum at every USC home football game, debuted in 2005. Beginning 3 hours before every home kickoff just east of the Coliseum peristyle, it features food, activities and live entertainment for young and old alike. It enhances the USC game experience and provides an alternative (or addition) to tailgating in Exposition Park. Adjacent to the Trojan Fan Fest near the Sports Arena is the Miller Lite Great Taste Zone (open to fans at least 21 years old), featuring Miller beverages and a bank of televisions showing live college football games.

\*\*\*Strength and conditioning coach **Chris Carlisle** has beaten cancer. He learned he had Hodgkin's Disease in December of 2000, began radiation treatments in Tennessee (where he was still the Volunteers' associate strength and conditioning coach), was hired by USC in February of 2001, kept his illness a secret except to Trojan head coach Pete Carroll, continued treatments in Tennessee and at USC/Norris Comprehensive Cancer Center and Hospital, then doctors told him in the summer of 2001 that the cancer was in remission. He informed the USC players of his ordeal at the start of fall 2001 camp. He was 1 of 17 nominees for the 2003 Most Courageous Award presented by the Football Writers Association of America and 1 of 11 nominees for the 2005 award.

\*\*\*Five Trojans have relatives who played on national championship USC football squads: SNP **Will Collins** (uncle, Joe Collins, was on the 1974 team), C-OT **Nick Howell** (father, Pat Howell, was an All-American on the 1978 team), LB **Clay Matthews** (father, 1977 All-American Clay Matthews, was on the 1974 team and brother, Kyle Matthews, was on the 2003 team), QB **Michael McDonald** (father, 1979 All-American Paul McDonald, was on the 1978 team) and WR **Brad Walker** (cousin, Norm Katnik, was on the 2003 team and cousin, Kurt Katnik, was on the 2003 and 2004 teams).

\*\*\*Several Trojans have other relatives with USC football connections. SNP **Will Collins'** brother, Rob Collins, was a walk-on at USC in the 1980s. Two Trojans have uncles who were Trojan footballers: LB **Clay Matthews** (Bruce Matthews, 1980-82, 1982 All-American) and WR **Brad Walker** (John Katnik, 1986-87). S-QB **Garrett Green's** cousin is former Trojan quarterback Brandon Hance (2003-04). P **Greg Woideck's** brothers, Brian and Rob, were managers with the USC football team (2001-02).

\*\*\*Speaking of genes: DT **Walker Lee Ashley's** father, Walker Lee Ashley, was an All-American defensive end on Penn State's 1982 national championship team who then played in the NFL as a linebacker with the Vikings (1983-88, 1990) and Kansas City Chiefs (1988-89). OT **Sam Baker's** father, David, formerly played basketball at UC Irvine and then professionally in Europe, while his brother, Ben, was an offensive lineman at Duke. QB **John David Booty's** father, Johnny, played quarterback at Arkansas, Louisiana Tech and Mississippi State, while his brother, Josh, played quarterback at LSU for 2 seasons (1999-2000) following a 5-year (1994-98) baseball career as an infielder in the Florida Marlins organization (he then played with the NFL's Cleveland Browns) and another brother, Abram, was a wide receiver at LSU (1997-99) and Valdosta State (2001). FB **Mike Brittingham** has 5 relatives with athletic backgrounds: sister, Kristine, lettered on UCLA's women's soccer team in 2000 and 2001, cousins Jack and Robert Brittingham were 3-year (1933-35) football lettermen at California, great uncle Richard Munroe lettered in football at both Stanford (1942) and California (1943), and great great grandfather Louis Sumner lettered in football at Wisconsin (1889, 1891-92). PK **Mario Danelo's** father, Joe, was a placekicker at Washington State (1972-74) before playing in the NFL with the Green Bay Packers (1975), New York Giants (1976-82) and Buffalo Bills (1983-84). TB **Hershel Dennis'** father, Hershel Sr., played tailback at North Carolina A&T. S **Kevin Ellison's** brother, Chris, was a defensive back at BYU in 1997 and 1998 and another brother, Keith, was a linebacker at Oregon State in 2004 and 2005 (he also played at San Diego State in 2002) who now plays with the NFL's Buffalo Bills, while his cousin, Donnic Ellison, played basketball at Washington State and New Mexico State. DE **Rashaad Goodrum's** brother, Nuru, is a senior running at The Citadel. DE **Lawrence Jackson's** brother, Keith, was an offensive tackle at Arizona. WR **Dwayne Jarrett's** cousin, Desmond Belton, is a junior wide receiver at Idaho. C **Ryan Kail's** father, Frank, was a center at Arizona (1980-82) and with the USFL's Arizona Wranglers (1983) and Houston Gamblers (1984). LB **Kaluka Maiava's** grandfather is ex-pro wrestler Neff Maiava and his uncle is pro wrestler/actor "The Rock" (Dwayne Johnson, who played football at Miami). S **Taylor Mays'** father, Stafford Mays, was a defensive lineman at Washington in 1978 and 1979 who then played in the NFL with the St. Louis Cardinals (1980-86) and Minnesota Vikings (1987-88). WR **Chris McFoy's** brother, Ryan, is a freshman safety at Arizona State. TE **Jimmy Miller's** brother, Jeff, is a freshman defensive end at UCLA. DT **Fili Moala's** cousin is former Oregon defensive lineman Haloti Ngata, now with the NFL's Baltimore Ravens. LB **Michael Morgan's** brother, Steve, was a defensive tackle at UCLA from 1999 to 2002. DT **Alex Parsons'** brother, B. Jay Parsons, was a defensive end at Kentucky (2004-05). OG **Drew Radovich's** father, Mark, was a linebacker at Arizona State (1974-76). QB **Mark Sanchez's** brothers—Nick (Yale in 1992-93-94) and Brandon (DePauw in 1997)—played football in college. LB **Dallas Sartz's** father, Jeff, played safety at Oregon State and his grandfather, also named Dallas, was a Golden Gloves boxer at Washington State and a professional hydroplane racer. DT **Travis Tofi's** cousin, Suaese "Pooch" Taase,

played football at Louisiana Tech. WR **Brad Walker's** uncle, Norman Katnik, was a 2-year starting center at Arizona (1978-79). OT **Kyle Williams'** father, Scott, played college basketball, while an uncle, Eric Williams, was a defensive lineman with the Detroit Lions (1984-89) and Washington Redskins (1990-93, including on the 1991 Super Bowl champs) after earning 1983 All-Pac-10 first team honors in his 3 years (1981-83) at Washington State; his grandfather, Roy Williams, played for the Detroit Lions and San Francisco 49ers, another uncle played professional basketball in Europe, while his other grandfather played 3 sports at Lehigh in the 1960. Head coach **Pete Carroll's** wife, Glenna, played volleyball at Pacific, while his son, Brennan, was a tight end at Delaware and Pitt (he currently is an assistant football coach at USC) and his daughter, Jaime, played on the 2000 USC women's volleyball team. WR coach **Lane Kiffin's** father, Monte, is the defensive coordinator of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (he is a longtime NFL and collegiate assistant coach who also served as North Carolina State's head coach in the early 1980s), while his brother, Chris, was a defensive lineman at Colorado State. DB coach **Rocky Seto's** wife, Sharla, played soccer at USC. TE coach **Brennan Carroll** is the son of USC head coach Pete Carroll. LB coach **Ken Norton Jr.** is the son of Ken Norton Sr., the former world heavyweight boxing champion who played football at Northeast Missouri State. DL coach **Nick Holt** is the grandson of Clarence "Buster" Crabbe, USC's first All-American swimmer (1931) who was a 1931 NCAA freestyle titlist and 1932 Olympic gold medallist (he won a bronze in 1928) before starring in Hollywood as Tarzan, Flash Gordon and Buck Rogers. DB graduate assistant coach **Demetrice Martin's** brother, Jason, is a junior cornerback at Idaho.

\*\*\*How about these names: OG **Alatini Malu**, who answers to "Tiny" (he's 6-4 and 330 pounds). TB **Chauncey Washington**. DT **Travis Tofi** (his real first name is Tupula). DT **Fili Moala**. CB **Mozique McCurtis**. LB **Kaluka Maiava**. LB **Rey Mauluga**. FB **Jody Adewale**. FB **Stanley Havili**. TE **Nick Vanderboom**. CB **Shareece Wright**. #### ON TV

USC is one of America's most televised teams. The Trojans have appeared on live national, regional or local telecasts 359 times, including 225 of the past 227 games (USC's last 66 games have been televised). In fact, USC had an amazing streak of 111 consecutive games on some form of live television from 1988 to 1997 (snapped against Oregon State) and another streak of 48 in a row from 1997 to 2001 (broken against California).

#### IN THE NFL

USC is always well-represented in the NFL. At the start of training camp this summer, there were 41 ex-Trojans on NFL rosters. Last year, there were 24 Trojans on opening day NFL rosters, including players such as LBs Lofa Tatupu and Chris Claiborne, DLs Willie McGinest and Kenechi Udeze, WRs Keyshawn Johnson and Johnnie Morton, QB Carson Palmer and DBs Troy Polamalu, Sammy Knight, Brian Kelly and Daylon McCutcheon. Five NFL head coaches have USC ties (either as former players or assistants): Washington's Joe Gibbs, Jacksonville's Jack Del Rio, Tennessee's Jeff Fisher, Seattle's Mike Holmgren and Detroit's Rod Marinelli. Eleven current USC players have relatives with NFL playing backgrounds: DT **Walker Lee Ashley** (father, Walker Lee Ashley), QB **John David Booty** (brother, Josh Booty), PK **Mario Danelo** (father, Joe Danelo), S **Kevin Ellison** (brother, Keith Ellison), C-OT **Nick Howell** (father, Pat Howell), LB **Clay Matthews** (grandfather, Clay Matthews Sr.; father, Clay Matthews; uncle, Bruce Matthews), S **Taylor Mays** (father, Stafford Mays), QB **Michael McDonald** (father, Paul McDonald), DT **Fili Moala** (cousin, Haloti Ngata), WR **Brad Walker** (cousin, Norm Katnik) and OT **Kyle Williams** (uncle, Eric Williams; grandfather, Roy Williams). Five assistant coaches played professionally: **Sam Anno**, **Ken Norton Jr.** and **Todd McNair** were in the NFL, while **Steve Sarkisian** was in the CFL and **Demetrice Martin** was in NFL Europe and the Arena Football League.

#### ACADEMICS

Among the top scholars on the 2006 Trojan squad are: FB **Brandon Hancock** (team-high 3.91, communication/communication management), TE **Nick Vanderboom** (3.60, business administration/real estate development), CB **Matthew Jordan** (3.25, communication), QB **Mark Sanchez** (3.20), OG **Jeff Byers** (3.17, business administration), OG **Jonathan Richert** (3.13, history), LB **Clay Matthews** (3.10, international relations), LB **Lou Ferrigno Jr.** (3.05, communication), S **Jim Abbott** (2.83), CB **Cary Harris** (2.81), FB **Mike Brittingham** (2.79, business administration), FB **Jody Adewale** (2.81, psychology) and LB **Nick Garratt** (2.75, history). Matthews made the 2006 Pac-10 All-Academic second team. Hancock, Vanderboom and WR Chris McFoy have received their bachelor's degrees and are working on another degree. In 2005, Hancock made the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District VIII first team and the Pac-10 All-Academic first team (Vanderboom made Pac-10 All-Academic honorable mention. Vanderboom made 2004 Pac-10 All-Academic honorable mention. Hancock, a member of Phi Beta Kappa (the nation's oldest honor society), was a 2003 CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII first team and Pac-10 All-Academic first team selection. In its history, USC football has produced 22 Academic All-American first teamers (tops in the Pac-10 and sixth in the nation), 20 NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners, 12 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athletes, 5 NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winners, 4 NCAA Today's Top Six winners, 1 Rhodes Scholar and 1 Academic All-American Hall of Famer.

## USC IS THE PLACE TO BE

Based on several national accolades it has received in recent years, USC can stake its claim as one of the nation's premier schools. USC was named the "College of the Year" by the 2000 edition of the Time/Princeton Review College Guide because of the remarkable bonds it has forged with the local community. The editors said USC has one of the most ambitious social-outreach programs of any university in the nation and cited the school's model of service learning (applying academic theory to real-life situations through public service). They also pointed out that USC's undergraduate applications have nearly doubled over the last few years and it is enrolling the most academically accomplished freshman classes in its history. Troy also was selected as one of America's nine "hottest schools" by the 2001 edition of the Newsweek/Kaplan College Guide because it lives up to its reputation as a top-notch institution of higher education. Students quoted in the guide said that what attracted them to the university was Los Angeles' ethnic diversity, the offer of scholarships, the small classroom sizes and USC's standing in academe. Also in 2001, the Association of American Colleges and Universities picked USC as one of 16 "Leadership Institutions" for providing stimulating educational experiences both inside and outside of the classroom. USC was cited for emphasizing a campus culture featuring new learning techniques, curriculum and organizational structure and for demonstrating a strong commitment to liberal arts education relevant to the contemporary world. The organization said USC not only linked liberal arts and pre-professional study, but offered students the opportunity to learn by doing through off-campus work in community projects and internships. Also, USC was lauded for stressing critical thinking, effective communication and contributing to a diverse society.

## SCOUTING MICHIGAN

Under 12<sup>th</sup>-year head coach **Lloyd Carr**, Michigan—making its 32<sup>nd</sup> consecutive bowl appearance—won its first 11 games of 2006 and rose to No. 2 in the ranking before falling to No. 1 Ohio State in its regular season finale. The Wolverine offense, which is 11<sup>th</sup> nationally in rushing offense (189.2) and 22<sup>nd</sup> in scoring offense (30.2), is directed by junior QB **Chad Henne** (177-of-287, 61.7%, 2,199 yds, 20 TD, 7 int in 2006), who is 25<sup>th</sup> nationally in passing efficiency (144.2). The 3-year starter is second on Michigan's career pass completions (640) and yardage (7,468) lists and third in passing TDs (68). All-American junior TB **Mike Hart** (301 tcb, 1,515 yds, 5.0 avg, 14 TD in 2006, plus 15 rec, 127 yds, 8.5 avg), a Doak Walker Award finalist, is seventh nationally in rushing (128.3) and 18<sup>th</sup> in all-purpose running (136.8). He is seventh on Michigan's career rushing chart (3,632 yards) and has run for at least 90 yards in every game in 2006. There's a trio of dangerous WRs in sophomore **Mario Manningham** (32 rec, 624 yds, 19.5 avg, 9 TD in 2006), junior **Adrian Arrington** (36 rec, 510 yds, 14.2 avg, 7 TD in 2006) and senior **Steve Breaston** (51 rec, 555 yds, 10.9 avg, 1 TD in 2006, plus 29 PR, 332 yds, 11.5 avg, 1 TD and 17 KOR, 415 yds, 24.4 avg), 22<sup>nd</sup> nationally in punt returns (11.5). Senior OT **Jake Long** is an All-American first teamer and senior C **Mark Bihl** was a Rimington Award finalist. Michigan's defense is among the game's finest. It is

ranked first nationally in rushing defense (43.0), sixth in total defense (254.1), eighth in scoring defense (14.6) and 18<sup>th</sup> in pass efficiency defense (106.8), as well as first in third down conversion defense (27.0) and second in turnover margin (+1.3). All-American senior DE **LaMarr Woodley** (33 tac, 15.5 for loss, 11 sack, 4 FR, 4 FF in 2006), who is seventh nationally in sacks (0.9) and 20<sup>th</sup> in tackles for a loss (1.3), was the Lombardi Award and Hendricks Award winner and the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year. He has helped Michigan rank third nationally in sacks (3.4) and tied for 10<sup>th</sup> in tackles for a loss (7.3). Senior LBs **David Harris** (95 tac, 15 for loss, 4 sack, 1 int, 2 dfl, 1 FF in 2006) and **Prescott Burgess** (48 tac, 6.5 for loss, 3 sack, 2 int, 5 dfl in 2006) lead the Wolverines in tackles. Junior DT **Alan Branch** (23 tac, 5 for loss, 2 sack, 1 int, 2 dfl, 2 FR, 2 FF in 2006) earned All-American honors. All-American senior CB **Leon Hall** (41 tac, 2 for loss, 1 sack, 3 int, 18 dfl, 2 FR in 2006), who has 12 career interceptions, was a finalist for the Thorpe and Nagurski Awards. Senior PK **Garrett Rivas** (16-of-19 FG, 41-of-43 PAT in 2006), who is 19<sup>th</sup> nationally in field goals (1.3), is the school's career leader in scoring (350) and field goals (63).
