NO. 5 USC FOOTBALL GOES TO CROSSTOWN FOE UCLA WITH ROSE BOWL ON LINE

FACTS

USC (10-1 overall, 7-1 Pacific-10) vs. UCLA (4-7 overall, 3-5 Pacific-10), Saturday, Dec. 6, 1:30 p.m. PST, Rose Bowl, Pasadena, Calif.

THEMES

No. 5 USC travels to the Rose Bowl to face crosstown rival UCLA in the regular-season finale for both teams. It's the 78th game of the famous crosstown rivalry. A Trojan victory would give USC its 33rd berth into the Rose Bowl (and fourth in a row)...unless it somehow moves up into the BCS Championship Game (Troy is fifth in the BCS standings). But a Bruin victory would likely bump the Trojans into the Holiday Bowl. It's the 37th Trojan-Bruin game in which the Rose Bowl has been on the line for at least 1 of the schools. USC surely will be wary of UCLA, remembering that its last foray to Pasadena to face the Bruins resulted in a stunning upset in 2006 that knocked Troy out of a third consecutive BCS Championship Game. USC has won its past 8 games, including throwing a defensive masterpiece on Notre Dame at home last Saturday that guaranteed the Trojans at least a share of an unprecedented seventh straight Pac-10 title. A win over UCLA would extend USC's NCAA record streaks of BCS bowl berths and 11-win seasons to 7 consecutive. Also at stake are year-long city bragging rights, possession of the Victory Bell and key points in the Lexus Gauntlet standings. The Rose Bowl is USC's second home, as this will be the 49th time the Trojans have played in Pasadena. It's a rare Irish-Bruin back-to-back scenario for the Trojans. There is some unique connectivity between the teams. There are coaches with earlier allegiances to the "other" school (uh-huh, **Ken Norton**), including some Bruin assistants who once worked for Trojan head coach **Pete Carroll** (hello **Norm Chow**, **DeWayne Walker** and **Wayne Moses**). Two sets of brothers will share opposing sidelines and USC has players whose fathers and brothers once wore the Blue and Gold. And, heck, new UCLA head coach **Rick Neuheisel** even earned his law degree at USC. Carroll is college football's winningest active coach (85.1%). This is the 90th straight game that USC, a winner in 84 of its last 94 contests, has been in the AP Top 25. Troy remains in the Top 25 in almost every national offensive and defensive statistical category, including first in total defense, scoring defense, pass efficiency defense and pass defense. In fact, USC's scoring defense average (7.8) is its best in 56 years, its total defense mark (210.6) is its finest in 41 years and its pass defense (124.0) is its best in 34 years. USC has surrendered just 10 touchdowns in 2008. Standout Trojan defenders include Butkus Award finalists **Rey Mauluga** (he's also a Lombardi Award and Nagurski Trophy finalist) and **Brian Cushing** at linebacker and 2007 All-American first teamer **Taylor Mays** at safety (he's a Thorpe Award semifinalist), plus **Fili Moala** at tackle and **Kevin Ellison** at safety. On offense, QB **Mark Sanchez** continues to be the Pac-10's passing efficiency and total offense leader. The Trojan running game is led by a trio of career 1,000-yard rushers: TBs **Stafon Johnson**, **C.J. Gable** and **Joe McKnight**. USC's leading receivers include WRs **Patrick Turner** (he is 10th among the school's career pass catchers and he has 9 TD grabs this year), **Damian Williams** and **Ronald Johnson**. Veteran OG-C **Jeff Byers**, in his second year in the M.B.A. program, and C **Kristofer O'Dowd** anchor the offensive line. UCLA lost at Arizona State last Friday and is now eliminated from bowl consideration. The Bruin offense features such performers as QB **Kevin Craft**, WR **Terrence Austin** (who doubles as a dangerous return man), TE **Ryan Moya** and TB **Kahlil Bell**. UCLA's defense, which is second nationally against the pass, includes such talented players as LB **Reggie Carter**, CB **Alterraun Verner** and DT **Brigham Harwell**. P **Aaron Perez** and PK **Kai Forbath** are Top 10 nationally in punting and field goals. The game will air live nationally on ABC-TV.

RANKINGS

USC is ranked fifth by AP and USA Today. UCLA is not ranked.

SERIES

USC leads the series with crosstown rival UCLA, 42-28-7 (dating to 1929, a 76-0 Trojan win). It has been a series of streaks recently: until Troy won last season and the Bruins were victorious the year before that, the Trojans had won the previous 7 games (Troy's longest streak in the series) after UCLA's 8-game winning stretch (the longest streak by either team in the series), with 6 of those Trojan losses in that streak coming by a touchdown or less, and before that USC had a 4-game unbeaten run over the Bruins. In games against UCLA in the Rose Bowl, the Trojans are 5-8.

Last year in the Coliseum, No. 8 USC—which rushed for 231 yards and limited UCLA to just 168 total yards, including only 12 on the ground, while forcing 4 turnovers—clinched its unprecedented sixth consecutive Pac-10 title and its third straight Rose Bowl berth by dominating crosstown rival UCLA, 24-7. It was head coach **Pete Carroll's** 75th victory as Trojan coach. The Trojans opened up a 17-0 lead in the first half behind a 5-yard scoring run by TB **Joe McKnight** midway through the first quarter after LB Keith Rivers forced and recovered a fumble, and then a 10-yard TD run by TB Chancey Washington midway through the second quarter and a 46-yard field goal by PK **David Buehler** late in the half. UCLA scored with 7 seconds to go in the half on TE Dominique Johnson's spectacular one-handed leaping grab of a 9-yard pass from QB Pat Cowan. Following CB Terrell Thomas' interception, USC scored its final TD early in the fourth quarter on a 12-yard pass from QB John David Booty to TE Fred Davis, who set the USC career record for receptions by a tight end. USC held the ball for 37:50 and rolled up 437 total yards and 26 first downs on 85 plays while allowing UCLA just 10 first downs and 0-of-11 third down conversions on 54 plays. The Bruins punted 11 times (the most by a Trojan opponent since San Diego State had 11 in 1998) and went 3-and-out on 7 series. Booty completed 21-of-36 passes for 206 yards, McKnight had a game-best 89 yards on 13 carries, TB **Stafon Johnson** added 73 yards on 15 attempts and Washington had 66 yards on 13 carries. Davis caught 6 passes for 41 yards, WR **Vidal Hazelton** added 5 receptions for 47 yards and **FB Stanley Havili** caught 4 passes for 66 yards. LB **Rey Mauluga** led USC with 8 tackles, DT **Fili Moala** had 1.5 sacks and DT Sedrick Ellis and S **Taylor Mays** each recovered fumbles. For UCLA, Cowan completed 13-of-24 passes for 156 yards, TB Chris Markey ran for 49 yards on 17 carries and S Dennis Keyes had 19 tackles.

In 2006 in the last meeting in the Rose Bowl, UCLA used a suffocating, aggressive defensive effort to knock No. 2 USC out of a third consecutive BCS Championship Game appearance with a 13-9 upset victory over the Trojans. The win snapped Troy's 7-game winning streak over the Bruins and ended USC's NCAA record of 63 consecutive games scoring at least 20 points. It also was USC's fewest points since scoring just 6 in a loss to Utah in the 2001 Las Vegas Bowl and its fewest against UCLA since a 7-7 tie in 1971. The loss sent the Trojans to their 31st Rose Bowl berth. UCLA held USC scoreless in the second half (the first time that happened against the

Trojans since the 2000 California contest). Although USC had 329 total yards, the Bruins limited Troy to just 55 rushing yards and 15 first downs (USC's fewest since the 2004 California game, when it had 41 and 12, respectively). USC managed to convert just 6-of-17 third downs and 1-of-3 fourth downs, and the Trojans were penalized 9 times. USC punted a season-high 7 times. UCLA scored first, on a 1-yard run by QB Patrick Cowan late in the first quarter that capped a 12-play, 91-yard drive (the longest drive by UCLA and surrendered by USC in 2006). On UCLA's next possession, the Bruins were called for holding in their own end zone, getting USC on the board with a safety early in the second quarter (it was the first safety against UCLA since 1998 and USC's first since 2003). The Trojans then took the lead on a 1-yard scoring run by TB **C.J. Gable** late in the half. But UCLA PK Justin Medlock hit a 22-yard field goal late in the third quarter and then a 31-yarder midway through the fourth quarter to provide the winning margin. The Trojans advanced to UCLA's 18-yard line late in the game, but LB Eric McNeal tipped and then intercepted QB John David Booty's pass to seal the victory with 1:10 to go. Booty was 23-of-39 for 274 yards despite being under constant pressure from UCLA's blitzing defense. Gable ran for 52 yards on 19 carries and TE Fred Davis (68 yards) and WR Steve Smith (66 yards) each had 6 receptions (both were career highs for Davis). UCLA had only 235 total yards (the first time in the **Pete Carroll** era that an opponent won with less than 300 total yards) and 14 first downs, and was just 4-of-13 on third down conversions. Cowan completed 12-of-21 passes for 114 yards and added a game-best 55 rushing yards on 10 tries, TB Chris Markey had 51 yards on 20 carries and WR Marcus Everett caught 5 passes for 72 yards. LBs Dallas Sartz (8 tackles) and **Rey Mauluga** (7 tackles) led the Trojan defense (each had a sack). It was UCLA's first victory over a No. 2-ranked team since a win over Washington in 1990.

USC POST-SEASON SCENARIOS

A USC win over UCLA will send the Trojans to the Rose Bowl for the fourth consecutive year (Troy also went to Pasadena 4 times in a row from 1967 to 1970) and fifth time in the past 6 seasons. Ohio State (1973-76) is the only other team to appear in 4 straight Rose Bowls. (Because USC is ranked fifth in the BCS standings, there's an outside chance that USC could get bumped up into the BCS Championship Game). A USC loss to UCLA likely will send the Trojans to their first-ever Holiday Bowl (although a BCS at-large berth and a Sun Bowl visit would also be slim possibilities).

USC IN ROSE BOWL STADIUM

USC is 30-18 in regular and post-season games it has played in the Rose Bowl, including 23-9 in the Rose Bowl game, 5-8 versus UCLA and 2-1 in the 1922 regular season. Incidentally, USC played the first-ever football game in the Rose Bowl, a 12-0 loss to California in 1922.

VERSUS PAC-10

USC has won 70.8% (404-158-29) of its games against Pac-10 opponents.

IN DECEMBER

USC has a 38-23-7 (.610) all-time record while playing in the month of December.

FUN FACT I

USC is 5-2-2 against UCLA in December games. Troy's wins came in 1937-45-2004-05-07, the losses were in 1942 and 2006 and the ties were in 1939 and 1941.

FUN FACT II

USC is 22-12-5 against unranked UCLA teams. When a ranked USC team played an unranked UCLA squad, the Trojans are 11-6-2.

FUN FACT III

USC head coach **Pete Carroll** and new UCLA head coach **Rick Neuheisel** are 1-1 against each other while Neuheisel was the head coach at Washington. Neuheisel's Huskies won in 2001 in Seattle (27-24 on a field goal at the gun), while Carroll's Trojans were victorious in 2002 in Los Angeles (41-21).

FUN FACT IV

This is only the fourth time that USC has played UCLA immediately following the Notre Dame game. The other times were in 1937 (when Troy lost to the Irish and then beat the Bruins), 2004 (when USC swept its main rivals) and 2006 (when the Trojans beat Notre Dame, then were upset by UCLA).

USC is riding a streak of 7 consecutive Pac-10 crowns (a league record), as well as 6 consecutive AP Top 4 finishes (including national championships in 2003 and 2004) and BCS bowls (an NCAA record) and 11-win seasons (also an NCAA record).

HIGH RANKING

USC has been ranked in the AP Top 25 for its past 89 games, a school record. Troy has been in the AP Top 10 for 77 of its past 81 games, including a since-snapped school record of 62 consecutive games. The Trojans have been in the AP Top 5 in 56 of the last 77 games.

WIN STREAKS

USC owns several active winning streaks:
—overall games (8);
—non-conference home games (13);
—non-conference road games (9, not including 5 neutral site wins and 1 neutral site loss);
—non-conference games (11);
—home night games (28);
—November games (27).

USC'S PAST 7 YEARS UNDER CARROLL

Eighth-year USC head coach **Pete Carroll** has a system in place that, after going 6-6 in his 2001 debut season, has made the past 7 years (since 2002) glorious ones for the Trojans:

—Six AP Top 4 finishes, including national championships in 2003 and 2004;

—Six BCS bowl appearances (an NCAA record);

—Seven Pac-10 championships (a Pac-10 record);

—Six seasons with at least 11 victories (an NCAA record);

—A winning record of 89.8% (79-9), including 12-1 against traditional rivals Notre Dame and UCLA;

—An AP Top 25 ranking for the past 89 games, a school record;

—77 wins in the last 84 games, with the losses coming by just 26 points (by 3 points in triple overtime at California in 2003, by 3 points in the final 19 seconds to Texas in the 2006 Rose Bowl's BCS Championship Game to fall just short of an unprecedented third consecutive national championship, by 2 points on a failed 2-point conversion pass with 7 seconds to play at Oregon State in 2006, by 4 points at UCLA in 2006 to deny Troy an appearance in a third straight BCS Championship Game, by 1 point at home to Stanford, by a TD at No. 5 Oregon and by 6 points at Oregon State in 2008);

—Thirty victories over AP Top 25 teams (30-4 overall, 88.2%);

—No-longer-active win streaks for home games (35), overall games (34), Pac-10 games (27), Pac-10 home games (24), road games (18), non-conference games (16), games against AP Top 25 teams (16), September games (15) and Pac-10 road games (13);

—A no-longer-active national-record 63 straight 20-point games;

—A no-longer-active national-record 33 consecutive weeks as AP's No. 1-ranked team;

—A no-longer-active school record 63 consecutive games ranked in the AP Top 10;

—Twenty-nine All-American first teamers;

—Three Heisman Trophy winners;

—Forty NFL draft picks, including 11 first rounders;

—Seven Top 10 recruiting classes.

USC'S WINNINGEST SPANS

USC's 70 wins during the previous 6 years (11 in 2002, 12 in 2003, 13 in 2004, 12 in 2005, 11 in 2006 and 11 in 2007) is the winningest 6-year span in school history. Its 59 wins during the 5-year periods of 2003-07 and 2002-06 are tied for its best 5-year runs. Its 48 wins during the 4-year spans of both 2002-05 and 2003-2006 tied for its best 4-year spans. Troy's 37 wins from 2003-05 represented the winningest 3-year period in Trojan history. Also, USC's 25 wins during the 2-year spans of both 2003-04 and 2004-05 tied for its best 2-year spans. And USC posted its first 13-win season in 2004, its eighth perfect (unbeaten, untied) season ever.

USC'S PAC-10 TITLES

After sharing the Pac-10 championship in 2002, USC won the 2003 Pac-10 title outright (its first outright crown since 1989) and again in 2004 and 2005 before sharing it in 2006 and 2007 and, depending on the outcome of its UCLA game, either winning it outright or sharing it in 2008. Those 7 consecutive conference titles are unprecedented in Pac-10 history. USC has won the league title 38 times, more than twice as much as any other school.

VICTORY BELL

The winner of the annual USC-UCLA football game gets year-long possession of the Victory Bell, a 295-pound bell off a freight locomotive. Originally given to UCLA in 1939 as a gift from the UCLA Alumni Association, several USC students took the bell in 1941 and hid it in a variety of locations for more than a year. A controversy ensued and school administrators had to intercede. In 1942, the bell resurfaced and, by agreement, became the trophy given to the game's winner. However, tradition calls for the Victory Bell to spend most of the year in storage...or, rather appropriately, in hiding.

LEXUS GAUNTLET

The winner of the USC-UCLA football game scores 10 points toward the Lexus Gauntlet, a trophy awarded annually to the school with the most successful athletic year against the other. Points will be awarded to the winner of each Trojan-Bruin head-to-head contest and the Lexus Gauntlet will be awarded to the school with the most points at year's end (57.5 points is the magic number). The Southern California Lexus Dealer Association is the title sponsor of every USC-UCLA athletic competition. USC captured the inaugural trophy in 2001-02, UCLA won it in 2002-03, USC recaptured it in 2003-04, UCLA won it back in 2004-05, USC claimed it in 2005-06, UCLA was victorious in 2006-07 and, holding true to the pattern, USC won it last year. Currently, USC leads this season's Lexus Gauntlet competition, 15-10.

LAST GAME

No. 5 USC's defense turned in a masterpiece and its offense put the game out of reach by halftime in a 38-3 victory over Notre Dame before 90,689 fans in the sold-out Coliseum and an ESPN national cable audience. The win was USC's seventh in a row over the Irish (its longest victory streak in the series) and came in the rivalry's 80th meeting. It was also USC's 28th straight win in a home night game, 13th in a row in a non-conference home game and 11th consecutive in a non-conference game while extending Trojan head coach **Pete Carroll's** November record to 27-0. It was the Coliseum finale for USC's 18 seniors. The Trojans, coming off a bye, limited Notre Dame to just 91 total yards (the fewest by a USC opponent since Colorado had 61 in 2002) and only 4 first downs (converting just 2-of-14 third downs). The Irish didn't get a first down until the final play of the third quarter and didn't cross into USC territory until the fourth quarter. Notre Dame had only 6 total yards at halftime while trailing 24-0. USC TB **Stafon Johnson** had a 2-yard touchdown run late in the first quarter, then the Trojans scored on 3 consecutive possessions in the second quarter: TB **Joe McKnight** zig-zagged 55 yards for a TD on the first play following LB **Kaluka Maiava's** interception, then QB **Mark Sanchez** hit WR **Damian Williams** for a 12-yard score and PK **David Buehler** added a 35-yard field goal late in the half. TB **C.J. Gable** had a 1-yard TD run late in the third quarter before Notre Dame got on the board on a 41-yard field goal by PK Brandon Walker early in the final quarter. USC responded with an 84-yard drive, capped by Sanchez's 17-yard TD pass to WR **Patrick Turner**. USC amassed 449 total yards and 22 first downs while holding the ball 34:01 and running off 66 plays (Notre Dame had just 49 plays). Sanchez was 22-of-31 for 267 yards, but had 2 interceptions to snap a streak of 96 consecutive passes without a pick dating back to the first quarter of the Arizona game. Williams caught 7 passes for 86 yards and Turner had 6 for 83 yards. McKnight ran for 63 yards on 4 carries and TB **Marc Tyler** added 58 yards on 7 tries (all in the fourth quarter). Maiava led USC with 5 tackles, CB **Cary Harris** had an interception and LB **Michael Morgan** recovered a fumble. For Notre Dame, Jimmy Clausen was 11-of-22 for 41 yards, but threw 2 interceptions and was sacked 4 times, and TB James Aldridge gained 58 yards on 12 carries.

SCHEDULE

USC's 2008 schedule features 7 teams that were in bowls last season. The Trojans faced a challenging start, as their first 5 foes all were bowl teams and won at least 9 games in 2007. USC opened its campaign at Virginia in the first-ever meeting between the schools. Troy then hosted Ohio State—which played in the last 2 BCS Championship Games—in the first battle between the teams since 1990 and the Buckeyes' first visit to the Coliseum in 19 years. USC then began its quest for a seventh consecutive Pac-10 crown when it played a Thursday night game at Oregon State. Troy's other Pac-10 road games are at Washington State, Arizona, Stanford and the Dec. 6 season-ender versus UCLA, while the Trojans hosted Oregon, Arizona State, Washington and California. USC extended its 6-game winning streak over Notre Dame when the Irish visited the Coliseum on Nov. 29. The Trojans remained

a popular attraction. During head coach **Pete Carroll's** tenure, USC has set school attendance and sellout records, including Pac-10 marks for home total and average attendance. In 2007, USC's overall total (1,056,685) and average (81,283) attendance figures were school records. All 6 of USC's home games in 2008 were sold out (the games sold out by Aug. 4, 2008).

PETE CARROLL

Eighth-year USC head football coach Pete Carroll has returned the Trojan football program to national prominence. He is 86-15 (85.1%) in 8 years (2001-2008) as a college head coach (all at USC), the best winning percentage of any current Division I coach with at least 5 years of experience. He reached 50 career USC wins faster than any head coach in Trojan history. His losses have been by a total of just 65 points (4.3 average) and only 1 was by more than a touchdown (it was by 11 points). After starting off his Trojan career 2-5, he has gone 83-10 (89.2%) with a pair of national championships (2003-04). He is 56-10 in Pac-10 games, giving him an 84.8% winning mark (a league record). His teams have been ranked in the AP Top 25 for the past 89 games, a school record. He is 27-0 in November. He has 31 victories over AP Top 25 teams (31-7 overall, 81.6%). His teams have won an unprecedented 7 consecutive Pac-10 titles and appeared in an NCAA record 6 consecutive BCS bowls (including a pair of BCS Championship Games). His teams have recorded at least 11 victories in each of the past 6 seasons, an NCAA record, and finished ranked in the AP Top 4 in each of those seasons. USC's 13, 25, 37, 48, 59 and 70 wins during 1-, 2-, 3-, 4-, 5- and 6-year spans represent the winningest periods in Trojan history. Under Carroll, USC is riding winning streaks in 28 home night games, 27 November games, 13 non-conference home games, 11 non-conference games, 9 non-conference road games (not including 5 neutral site contests) and 8 overall games. His USC teams also had a number of other since-broken winning streaks: a Pac-10 record 35 consecutive home games, Pac-10-record 34 overall games, a Pac-10-record 27 Pac-10 games, a Pac-10 record 24 consecutive league home games, a school-record 18 road games (not including 4 neutral site contests), 18 October games, 16 non-conference games, 16 games against AP Top 25 teams, 15 September games and a school-record 13 Pac-10 road games. His Trojans also set a no-longer-active NCAA record by scoring at least 20 points in 63 consecutive games. USC was AP's No. 1 team for a national-record 33 straight polls (including 2 pre-season polls) and was ranked in the AP Top 10 for a school-record 63 consecutive games. He was named the 2003, 2005 and 2006 Pac-10 Coach of the Year. Under Carroll, USC is the first school to have 3 Heisman Trophy winners in a 4-year span. Carroll has produced 30 All-American first teamers and 42 NFL draft picks (including 11 first rounders, with a No. 1 selection in Carson Palmer and a No. 2 in Reggie Bush). His last 6 recruiting classes have been ranked in the Top 10 nationally (including first 5 times by some experts). He also served as USC's defensive coordinator in his first 5 seasons at Troy.

OFFENSIVE OVERVIEW

Only 4 starters returned on offense in 2008: wide receivers **Patrick Turner** and **Vidal Hazelton**, fullback **Stanley Havili** and guard-center **Jeff Byers**. Others back with starting experience are quarterbacks **Mark Sanchez** and **Mitch Mustain**, tailbacks **C.J. Gable** and **Allen Bradford**, wide receivers **David Ausberry**, **Ronald Johnson** and **Damian Williams**, center **Kristofer O'Dowd**, guard **Zack Heberer** and tackles **Butch Lewis** and **Charles Brown**. Mustain and Williams had their starts while at Arkansas. Although USC's top rusher, passer and receiver from 2007 are gone, its next 4 most productive runners, its next most productive passer and its next 5 most productive receivers returned in 2008. The Trojans aim to rev up an offense that—although much improved over the 2006 model—last year did not rank in the national Top 25 in any offensive statistical category for the first time since coach Pete Carroll's debut season in 2001.

QUARTERBACKS

Much like coach Pete Carroll and crew had to do—and did quite well—in 2003 (replacing Carson Palmer) and in 2006 (replacing Matt Leinart), USC again had to replace one of the top quarterbacks in school history in 2008. John David Booty is gone along with his 20-3 record as a starter (including 9-0 against Top 25 teams). He ended up ranked in USC's all-time Top 6 in passing completions (fifth with 518), passing yardage (fifth with 6,125), passing touchdowns (fourth with 55) and total offense (sixth with 5,945 yards). In 2007, the 62.3% career passer hit 215-of-340 (63.2%) of his throws for 2,361 yards and 23 TDs with just 10 interceptions. He was an NFL fifth round draft pick. Several players with outstanding pedigrees competed this past spring to replace Booty in 2008, with junior **Mark Sanchez** (195-of-298, 65.4%, 2,525 yds, 28 TD, 9 int in 2008, plus 2 rush TD) emerging as the starter. He currently is ranked 10th nationally in passing efficiency (161.6 first in Pac-10). In his career, Sanchez has thrown 35 touchdowns, with at least 2 TD passes in 11 starts, plus he has at least 3 TD passes in a game 6 times (including 5 outings in 2008) and at least 1 TD pass in all 14 of his career starts. His 195 completions in 2008 ranks him 15th on USC's season passing list and his 2,501 yards of total offense is 12th on USC's season ladder. He was among 13 semifinalists for the 2008 Davey O'Brien Award (top quarterback) and is among 15 semifinalists

for the Maxwell Award (top player). When Booty missed 3 mid-season games (Arizona, Notre Dame and Oregon) with a broken finger in 2007, Sanchez stepped in and not only performed well, but gained valuable experience. He guided Troy last year to victories in his first 2 career starts (including a 38-0 shutout in South Bend) and had the Trojans positioned to come back at No. 5 Oregon before falling just a touchdown short of victory. In his time at USC, Sanchez has appeared in 25 games, with 14 starts. He is 11th on USC's career passing chart (267 completions) and 17th on USC's career total offense list (3,276 yards). Behind Sanchez are sophomore **Mitch Mustain** (11-of-16, 68.8%, 157 yds, 2 TD, 2 int in 2008), who sat out the 2007 season after transferring from Arkansas, and untested redshirt freshman **Aaron Corp** (2-of-4, 50.0%, 14 yds in 2008), who guided his high school team to the California state championship in 2006. Mustain was 8-0 as a true freshman starter for the Razorbacks in 2006 and, in fact, has a 61-2 record as a starting quarterback dating back to eighth grade. While appearing in 10 games for Arkansas in 2006, he completed 69-of-132 passes (52.3%) for 894 yards, 10 scores and 9 picks. Mustain (in 2005), like Sanchez (in 2004), was named the national prep player of the year as a high school senior. Corp possibly is the most mobile of the quarterbacks and brings another dimension to the Trojan offense. In case of emergency, junior **Garrett Green** (6 tac in 2008), who came to USC in 2006 as a quarterback before being moved to safety and then spending last year as a wide receiver (he was moved back to quarterback in 2008 fall camp), is available. He will long be remembered for his 34-yard scoring toss off a lateral early in last year's Rose Bowl. New to the quarterback ranks this fall are walk-on redshirt freshman **Chris McCaffrey**, who was a reserve pitcher on the USC baseball team this past spring, and walk-on freshman **John Manoogian**.

—Sanchez threw for a career-best 338 yards (the most by a Trojan in a season opener) with 3 TDs on 26-of-35 passing (tying his career high for completions) with an interception at Virginia, including hitting on 12 straight passes at one point and completing 16-of-19 passes in the first half (he was named Rivals.com National Player of the Week, O'Brien National Quarterback of the Week and Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week for his performance), while Corp played 1 series (1-of-2 for 2 yards), Mustain also played a series (he threw a 10-yard TD on his only pass) and Green took 1 snap.

—Sanchez tied a career high by throwing 4 TD passes while completing 17-of-28 passes for 172 yards with an interception against Ohio State to earn Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week honors, while Corp was 1-of-2 for 12 yards in 1 series and Mustain played 2 plays (but did not throw a pass).

—Sanchez completed 18-of-29 passes for 227 yards and 3 TDs with an interception at Oregon State.

—Sanchez hit 19-of-28 passes for 332 yards and 3 TDs (all in the second quarter) against Oregon to earn Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week honors, while Mustain was 5-of-8 for 111 yards and a score (with an interception) off the bench.

—Sanchez was 13-of-26 for 179 yards and a TD (but he threw 3 interceptions) and also had a 1-yard scoring sneak against Arizona State, while Mustain was 2-of-3 for -2 yards.

—Sanchez tied a USC game record by throwing 5 TD passes (all in the first half; no Trojan had thrown that many in a half) at Washington State and hitting 15-of-20 throws (75.0%) for 253 yards (all in the first half) while playing only through the first series of the second half, Mustain completed his only pass (for 10 yards) in 3 series of action and Corp and Green both played for a series (but did not throw a pass).

—Sanchez was 21-of-36 for 216 yards with a TD and an interception at Arizona.

—Sanchez hit 78.9% of his passes (15-of-19) for 167 yards and 2 TDs with no interceptions while playing only through the first series of the second half against Washington (he also had a 1-yard scoring sneak), while Mustain completed his only pass (a 21-yarder) while playing 2 series, Corp played 1 series but did not attempt a pass and Green had 3 tackles on special teams.

—Sanchez was 18-of-29 for 238 yards, with 2 TDs and no interceptions, against California.

—Sanchez hit 11-of-17 passes for 136 yards and 2 TDs with no interceptions at Stanford.

—Sanchez was 22-of-31 for 267 yards and 2 TDs against Notre Dame, but threw 2 interceptions to snap a streak of 96 consecutive passes without a pick that extended back to the first quarter of the Arizona game, while Mustain was 1-of-2 for 7 yards with an interception and Corp played a snap.

TAILBACKS

Although Chauncey Washington, USC's leading rusher the past 2 seasons (he had 969 yards and 10 TDs in 2007), finished his Trojan career in 2007 after piling up 1,778 yards and 19 scores (he was an NFL seventh round draft pick), there are plenty of returning tailbacks to fill in for him. This might be the best running back corps in America. Troy's 2008 tailback stable includes: junior **Stafon Johnson** (107 tcb, 595 yds, 5.6 avg, 8 TD in 2008, plus 6 rec, 43 yds, 7.2 avg and 27 PR, 260 yds, 9.6 avg), a consistent, dependable runner who has 1,296 career rushing yards (40th on USC's career list) and 5 career 100-yard games (he had a trio last fall, at Nebraska and Washington and in the Rose Bowl versus Illinois); sophomore **Joe McKnight** (69 tcb, 547 yds, 7.9 avg, 1 TD in 2008, plus 19 rec, 171 yds, 9.0 avg, 1 TD and 9 PR, 53 yds, 5.9 avg), the exciting all-purpose breakaway back who can strike as a runner (he has 1,090 career rushing yards and 3 career 100-yard rushing games, including 2 in 2008), receiver and returner (he has 2 career games with at least 100 all-purpose yards, including 4 in 2008 after having 3 in 2007, topped by 206 in the Rose Bowl); soph **C.J. Gable** (98 tcb, 601 yds, 6.1 avg, 8 TD in 2008, plus 5 rec, 42 yds, 8.4 avg and 6 KOR, 178 yds, 29.7 avg, 1 TD), who has 17 starts, 1,190 rushing yards and 4 100-yard games in his career, including the first 2 contests of 2007 before being sidelined the rest of the way with abdomen surgery; junior **Allen Bradford** (14 tcb, 57 yds, 4.1 avg, 1 TD in 2008, plus 4 rec, 44 yds, 11.0 avg and 1 tac), a hard-charging runner who is particularly adept catching passes out of the backfield and who also shines on special teams (a hip injury has sidelined him in 2008); and redshirt freshman **Marc Tyler** (27 tcb, 162 yds, 6.0 avg, 1 TD in 2008, plus 1 rec, 10 yds, 10.0 avg, 1 TD and 1 tac), who was sidelined with a leg injury in 2007. Redshirt freshmen **Broderick Green** (32 tcb, 168 yds, 5.2 avg, 3 TD in 2008), with 1 career 100-yard game, announced in mid-November that he will transfer from USC following the fall semester in order to

be closer to his ill grandmother and has stopped practicing with the team. Joining this group this fall as a freshman was prep All-American **Curtis McNeal**.

—Gable had a game-best 73 yards on 9 carries, with a 33-yard TD, at Virginia, while McKnight had 112 all-purpose yards (60 on 6 carries, 24 on 4 receptions with a 10-yard TD and 28 on 3 kickoff returns), Bradford added 41 yards on 9 carries with a 2-yard score and also caught 2 passes for 15 yards, Johnson had 29 yards on 9 rushes with a 2-yard TD, Tyler caught a 10-yard TD pass (to become USC's fifth tailback to score in the game) to go along with an 8-yard run and Green had a rush for no yards.

—McKnight rushed for 105 yards on 12 carries (the second 100-yard game of his career) and a 5-yard punt return for 110 all-purpose yards against Ohio State, while Johnson added 23 yards on 4 carries, Gable had 18 yards on 4 carries, 13 yards on 3 receptions and an 18-yard kickoff return, Bradford had 16 yards on 5 rushes and 29 yards on 2 receptions, Tyler had a 2-yard run and Green gained 1 yard on 2 carries.

—Johnson ran for 48 yards on 7 carries at Oregon State, while Gable added 19 yards on 3 ties and also had a 13-yard kickoff return and McKnight rushed for 10 yards on 7 carries, caught 3 passes for 29 yards and returned 2 punts for 13 yards.

—Gable ran for a game-high 49 yards on 10 carries (he also had a 23-yard reception and 22-yard kickoff return) against Oregon, while Johnson added 43 yards on 7 rushes, with an amazing 22-yard zigzagging TD run (he also had 19 yards on 3 punt returns), McKnight had 114 all-purpose yards (27 yards on 9 carries, 86 yards on 5 catches and a 1-yard punt return), Tyler had a 7-yard rush and Green had 3 yards on 3 carry.

—McKnight had a career-high and game-best 143 yards on 11 rushes (including 68 yards on 4 carries in the fourth quarter and 50 yards on 2 tries in the first quarter) to average 13.0 yards per carry, plus had a 7-yard reception, against Arizona State, while Gable added 30 yards on 7 carries and a 6-yard catch, Johnson had 17 yards on 9 carries with a TD (along with 7 yards on 2 punt returns) and Green had 20 yards on 3 attempts.

—Green had a game-high and career-best 121 yards on 18 carries with 2 TDs (1 and 18 yards) at Washington State, while Johnson added 112 yards on 11 tries (he also returned 5 punts for 52 yards) and Gable ran for a career-high 109 yards on 16 attempts with 3 TDs (17, 3 and 4 yards) at Washington State to become the first USC trio to each eclipse the 100-yard rushing barrier since 1977 (Charles White, Dwight Ford and Mosi Tatupu).

—Johnson had 184 all-purpose yards at Arizona (83 on 19 rushes with a TD, 88 on 3 punt returns, including a 54-yarder to set up a field goal, and 13 on 3 receptions) and he also made a key block on a blitzing Wildcat on the Trojans' decisive scoring pass play, while McKnight added 16 yards on 5 carries and Gable had 4 yards on 5 tries.

—Gable ran for 108 yards and a pair of touchdowns (9 and 6 yards) against Washington, while Tyler added 85 yards with a 6-yard scoring run on 16 carries, Johnson had 113 all-purpose yards (40 on 8 rushes with a 1-yard TD, 21 on 2 receptions and 52 on 4 punt returns) and Green ran for 23 yards on 5 carries (with a 5-yard TD).

—Gable ran for a game-best 79 yards on 10 carries and had a 20-yard kickoff return versus California, while Johnson added 60 yards on 14 carries and had 4 punt returns for 23 yards and McKnight rushed for 51 yards on 7 carries and caught 3 passes for 25 yards.

—Johnson ran for a game-high 115 yards on 14 carries with 2 TDs (7 and 3 yards) at Stanford and had 2 punt returns for 1 yard, while Gable had 190 all-purpose yards (85 on 14 carries with a 3-yard TD and 105 on 2 kickoff returns with a 93-yard TD) to earn Pac-10 Special Teams Co-Player of the Week honors, McKnight rushed for 72 yards on 8 tries and Tyler had a 2-yard run.

—McKnight had a game-best 63 yards on 4 carries (with a 55-yard zig-zagging TD run) against Notre Dame, plus caught 3 passes for no yards and returned 2 punts for 6 yards, while Tyler added 58 yards on 7 carries (all in the fourth quarter), Gable had 27 yards on 10 tries and Johnson had 26 yards on 5 attempts, caught a 9-yard pass and returned 4 punts for 18 yards.

FULLBACKS

Sophomore **Stanley Havili** (13 tcb, 71 yds, 5.5 avg in 2008, plus 24 rec, 324 yds, 13.5 avg, 3 TD) returned as the fullback and is among the best in the nation. He has proven to be not only a fine blocker, but an effective runner and receiver. Behind him are a couple of untested players. Junior **Adam Goodman** (1 tcb, 1 yd, 1.0 avg in 2008, plus 1 rec, 0 yds, 0.0 avg and 1 KOR, 13 yds, 13.0 avg and 3 tac) was Havili's backup last fall and saw brief action (the one-time walk-on earned a scholarship this past spring). Then there's senior **Matt Hillier**, a one-time walk-on who earned a scholarship this fall and who also was on the USC men's volleyball team. Prep All-American **D.J. Shoemate** (1 tac in 2008), who enrolled in the fall as a first-year freshman wide receiver, is also available at fullback.

—At Virginia, Havili had a 5-yard run and a 14-yard catch, while Goodman had a tackle.

—Havili caught 5 passes for 49 yards, including a 35-yard TD, and added 9 yards on 2 carries against Ohio State, while Goodman made 2 tackles.

—Havili had a 2-yard run at Oregon State.

—Havili had 10 yards on 2 carries and 9 yards on 2 receptions versus Oregon.

—Goodman had a reception for no yards against Arizona State.

—Havili had 5 receptions for 60 yards and an 11-yard run at Washington State, while Goodman had a 1-yard run.

—Havili caught a team-best 5 passes for 67 yards, including a 30-yard TD that proved decisive, and also ran for 17 yards on 3 carries at Arizona.

—Havili had 13 yards on 2 carries against Washington.

—Havili caught 3 passes for 27 yards and had a 4-yard run versus California.

—Havili caught 2 passes for 59 yards (with a 50-yard TD) at Stanford.

—Havili caught a 39-yard pass against Notre Dame, while Goodman returned a short kickoff 13 yards.

WIDE RECEIVERS

USC's entire corps of scholarship wide receivers from 2007 (except for 1 reserve) returned this season. They're being counted on to up their production in 2008, as they accounted for less than half of USC's 286 receptions last year. Both starters—senior split end **Patrick Turner** (40 rec, 586 yds, 14.6 avg, 9 TD in 2008, plus 3 tac) and junior flanker **Vidal Hazelton** (6 rec, 38 yds, 6.3 avg in 2008)—are back. **Turner's 129 career grabs puts him 10th on USC's career pass catching chart.** He had 5 games with 5-plus receptions in 2007, including 9 versus Stanford, and 3 more in 2008. Hazelton caught a pass in every game last year. But hot on their heels are the likes of sophomores **David Ausbery** (5 rec, 80 yds, 16.0 avg, 1 TD in 2008), who had 5 starts last fall, **Ronald Johnson** (25 rec, 431 yds, 17.2 avg., 6 TD in 2008, plus 11 KOR, 322 yds, 29.3 avg and 5 tcb, 39 yds, 7.8 avg and 0-of-1 passing, 0 yds, 0.0% and 3 tac), who started once and also was Troy's top kickoff returner in 2007, and **Damian Williams** (45 rec, 639 yds, 14.2 avg, 7 TDs in 2008, plus 4 tcb, 43 yds, 10.8 avg and 1 PR, -1 yd, -1.0 avg), who sat out the 2007 campaign after transferring from Arkansas (where he started 5 times and caught 19 passes with 2 TDs as a true freshman in 2005). Also in the mix are sophomore **Travon Patterson** (3 rec, 25 yds, 8.3 avg in 2008), who missed most of last fall with a foot injury, and redshirt freshman **Brandon Carswell** (1 rec, 7 yds, 7.0 avg in 2008, plus 3 PR, 20 yds, 6.7 avg and 5 PR, 31 yds, 6.2 avg and 1 tac). Then there are 6 walk-ons who have yet to catch a pass:

sophomores **Sean Calcagnie**, **Preston Cavignac**, **Scott Stephens** (1 tac in 2008), **Duron Sylvester** and **Spencer Vigoren** and redshirt freshman **Drew Ness**. A pair of talented freshmen enrolled this fall—prep All-Americans **Brice Butler** and **D.J. Shoemate** (1 tac in 2008), who is also available at fullback—along with junior college transfer **Jordan Cameron**, a sophomore, and walk-on freshman **Robbie Boyer**.

—Williams had 7 receptions for 91 yards (both game highs) at Virginia, Hazelton added 5 grabs for 33 yards, Johnson had 3 catches for 78 yards (with a 49-yard TD) and returned 2 kickoffs for 25 yards for 103 all-purpose yards, Turner had 2 catches for 62 yards with a 20-yard score and Carswell had a 14-yard punt return.

—Turner had 4 catches for 43 yards against Ohio State, while Williams caught 2 third-quarter TDs (24 and 17 yards) and ended up with 4 receptions for 43 yards, while Carswell returned 2 punts for 6 yards.

—Williams had a game-best 6 catches for 94 yards (with a 29-yard TD) at Oregon State, Turner had 4 receptions for 44 yards (with a 14-yard TD) and Johnson had 3 catches for 44 yards (with a 26-yard TD) and returned 3 kickoffs for 76 yards.

—Against Oregon, Turner had 5 catches for 77 yards (with an 11-yard TD), Williams added 4 grabs for 76 yards (with a 34-yard score), Ausbery had 3 receptions for 74 yards (with a 59-yard TD), Johnson had 2 catches for 78 yards (with a 63-yard TD) along with an 18-yard kickoff return and a 14-yard rush on an end-around and Patterson had a 17-yard catch.

—Johnson (71 yards) and Turner (38 yards) each caught 3 passes against Arizona State, while Williams added 23 yards on 2 receptions and another 23 yards on 2 runs and Patterson had a catch for -2 yards.

—Johnson caught 5 passes for 94 yards with a career-best 2 TDs at Washington State, while Turner added 3 catches for 46 yards for a career-high 2 TDs, Williams had a 32-yard grab and Patterson had a 10-yarder.

—Williams had 5 catches for 77 yards and also ran a reverse 6 yards at Arizona, Turner (23 yards) and Ausbery (6 yards) each had 2 receptions (Turner also made a tackle) and Johnson had a 9-yard catch, a 26-yard kickoff return and a tackle.

—Turner had 6 receptions for 100 yards, including touchdowns of 4 and 32 yards, against Washington, while Johnson added 4 receptions for 25 yards, a 13-yard run on a reverse and a 43-yard kickoff return and Williams had 2 grabs for 9 yards.

—Williams had 4 receptions for 67 yards versus California, Turner had 2 catches for 35 yards (including a diving 19-yard TD) and Johnson caught a 6-yard TD.

—Williams had 4 receptions for 35 yards (with a 5-yard TD) and also had a 14-yard run on a reverse at Stanford, while Turner had 3 receptions for 35 yards, Hazelton had a 5-yard catch and Johnson had 2 kickoff returns for 125 yards (75 and 50 yards), a 7-yard run on a reverse, a 2-yard reception and threw an incomplete pass.

—Williams had 7 catches for 86 yards (both game highs) with a 12-yard TD against Notre Dame, Turner added 6 receptions for 83 yards with a 12-yard TD, Johnson had 2 catches for 24 yards, returned a kickoff 9 yards and gained no yards on a reverse, and Carswell had a 7-yard grab.

TIGHT ENDS

USC is hard-pressed to replace Fred Davis, the most prolific tight end in Trojan history. Davis, Troy's first-ever Mackey Award winner, set school tight end records for career catches (117), receiving yardage (1,408) and touchdowns (13). His 2007 All-American first team showing also produced USC season tight end standards: a team-best 62 receptions for 881 yards and 8 TDs. He was drafted in the NFL's second round. Looking to fill his shoes are junior **Anthony McCoy** (13 rec, 158 yds, 12.2 avg, 1 TD 2008, plus 0 tcb, 23 yds), redshirt freshman **Rhett Ellison** (3 rec, 58 yds, 19.3 avg in 2008), the son of ex-USC

and NFL linebacker Riki (Gray) Ellison (a foot injury has slowed him), and senior **Jimmy Miller** (1 rec, -1 yds, -1.0 avg in 2008), who missed most of 2007 with a back injury (he has 2 touchdowns among his 4 career receptions), plus redshirt freshman **DaJohn Harris** (1 tac, 0.5 for loss, 0.5 sack in 2008), who is also available at defensive tackle, and soph **Cooper Stephenson**, who also will be a long snapper (the one-time walk-on earned a scholarship this past spring). Getting an instant look at the position is **Blake Ayles** (6 rec, 41 yds, 6.8 avg, 1 TD in 2008), a prep All-American who came aboard this fall as a freshman.

—*McCoy had 2 catches for 21 yards at Virginia, while Ayles added a 2-yard reception.*

—*Ayles caught a 1-yard TD against Ohio State.*

—*At Oregon State, Ayles had an 11-yard catch and McCoy had a 5-yard reception.*

—*Ayles had a 3-yard catch against Oregon.*

—*Ayles had 2 catches for 24 yards against Arizona State, while McCoy added a 10-yard reception.*

—*McCoy caught a 21-yard TD pass at Washington State, making a nice spin move and escaping 2 tacklers to score.*

—*McCoy caught 2 passes for 22 yards at Arizona and also picked up a fumble late in the fourth quarter deep in USC territory and advanced it 23 yards, while Miller had a reception for minus 1 yard.*

—*Ellison had 2 catches for 33 yards versus Washington.*

—*McCoy caught 4 passes for 53 yards versus California and Ellison had a 25-yard reception.*

—*McCoy had 2 receptions for 26 yards against Notre Dame.*

OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

The Trojan offensive line has undergone a near-complete reconstruction in 2008, as only 1 starter returned. That veteran is left guard **Jeff Byers**, the line's only senior. He also has seen time at center. Now in his second year working on his M.B.A., he is an Academic All-American candidate. He is 1 of 10 finalists for the 2008 Lowe's Senior Class Award (given to top college football senior student-athlete) and a semifinalist for the Draddy Trophy (top senior football scholar-athlete). Departed are 3-time All-American first team left tackle Sam Baker (a first round NFL draft pick), 2007 All-Pac-10 first team right guard Chilo Rachal (he opted out after his junior season to enter the NFL draft, where he was a second rounder), center Matt Spanos and right tackle Drew Radovich, a 2-year starter. But things aren't as bleak as might be imagined. Because injuries forced all the 2007 starters but Byers to miss some games, a number of younger offensive linemen acquired valuable playing time last fall. That experience propelled them into starting jobs in 2008. Sophomore **Butch Lewis** (1 tac in 2008) started 3 mid-season games at left tackle for Baker last year (he's now at right tackle). Fellow sophomore **Zack Heberer** started twice in mid-2007 at right guard for Rachal. Soph **Kristofer O'Dowd**—a 2007 Freshman All-American first team selection—started 3 early contests at center for Spanos, becoming the first USC true freshman to start at center (as well as only the third Trojan true freshman to start a post-World War II opener on the offensive line). Junior **Charles Brown** (1 tac in 2008) started the 2007 opener at right tackle for Radovich, but he's now at left tackle. Also vying for playing time are 3 previously little-used juniors—guard **Thomas Herring**, tackle **Nick Howell** (his father, Pat, was a USC All-American and NFL star guard), who has been starting lately at right tackle, and tackle-

center-guard **Alex Parsons**, who has emerged at right guard—plus redshirt freshmen **Martin Coleman**, a guard-tackle who has been sidelined with an ankle injury, and tackle-center **Michael Reardon** (he's been out with a hip injury). Sophomore **Derek Simmons** (2 tac in 2007) was moved this fall from defensive tackle to offensive guard, and appears to have a bright future. Freshman guard **Matt Meyer**, a prep All-American who graduated a semester early from high school, enrolled at USC this past spring and participated in spring drills (a toe injury has sidelined him this fall). So did junior walk-on center-guard **Garrett Nolan**, an All-State junior college transfer who previously played at Holy Cross. Joining the fray this fall as freshmen was a trio of prep All-Americans: guard **Khaled Holmes** and tackles **Matt Kalil** and **Tyron Smith**. The older brothers of Holmes (Alex) and Kalil (Ryan) played football recently for the Trojans and then in the NFL. Also new this fall were a pair of walk-ons in junior center-tackle **Steve Gatena**, who started at UC Davis in 2007, and freshman center **Abe Markowitz**.

—*Brown, Byers, O'Dowd, Heberer and Lewis started against Virginia, Ohio State and Oregon State.*

—*Brown, Byers, O'Dowd, Parsons and Lewis started against Oregon and Arizona State.*

—*Brown, Byers, O'Dowd, Parsons and Howell started at Washington State, Arizona, Washington, California, Stanford and Notre Dame.*

DEFENSIVE OVERVIEW

Seven defensive starters returned from 2007: linebackers **Rey Mauluga** and **Brian Cushing**, safeties **Taylor Mays** and **Kevin Ellison**, cornerback **Cary Harris**, tackle **Fili Moala** and end **Kyle Moore**. Others back with starting experience are safety-cornerback **Josh Pinkard**, linebackers **Kaluka Maiava** and **Clay Matthews**, end **Everson Griffen**, cornerbacks **Kevin Thomas** and **Shareece Wright** and safety **Shane Horton** (while at UNLV). The 2008 Trojans are looking to replicate the stinginess of last year's unit, which was second nationally in both total defense (273.2) and scoring defense (16.0), as well as fourth in rushing defense (84.2) and sixth in pass efficiency defense (102.1). USC also was third nationally in sacks (3.5), 11th in tackles for a loss (7.7) and 15th in pass defense (189.0). Troy allowed a national-low 9 TD passes in 2007. Opponents averaged just 4.1 yards per play (including only 2.5 per rush) last fall. But performing at that level could be a challenge this year, as 5 of USC's top 9 tacklers from 2007 are gone, as are last year's leaders in interceptions, sacks, tackles for losses, fumble recoveries, forced fumbles and deflections. Most importantly, the Trojans are aiming to get back to the hallmark of coach Pete Carroll defenses: a high positive number in turnover margin (for the second year in a row, USC was just mediocre in this area in 2007).

DEFENSIVE LINEMEN

The biggest area of concern on defense in 2008 is rebuilding the line, which lost 2 of the best defensive linemen in school history: nose tackle **Sedrick Ellis** and end **Lawrence Jackson**. Ellis, a 2-time All-American who was the 2007 Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year and a 2-time Morris Trophy recipient, posted 28.5 tackles for a loss and 17.5 sacks in his career. Jackson, who owns the USC game records for tackles for a loss (5.5) and sacks (4), was a 4-year starter who had 52 tackles for a loss and 30.5 sacks in his career. Both

were NFL first round draftees. Two starting linemen did return and both are steady seniors: tackle **Fili Moala** (27 tac, 9 for loss, 4.5 sack, 1 FR, 2 BLK FG, 1 dfl in 2008), who is in the lineup for his third season, and end **Kyle Moore** (28 tac, 9.5 for loss, 5 sack, 1 FR, 2 dfl in 2008). Competing for time at the open nose tackle spot are junior **Averell Spicer** (8 tac, 1 for loss in 2008) and sophomore **Christian Tupou** (8 tac, 3 for loss in 2008). Both have loads of potential but entered 2008 with minimal experience. Redshirt freshman **DaJohn Harris** (1 tac, 0.5 for loss, 0.5 sack in 2008) is available at tackle and also at tight end. Sophomore **Everson Griffen** (17 tac, 6 for loss, 4.5 sack in 2008), a 2007 Freshman All-American first team choice, had the inside track at the vacant end job. He started twice last year and was the first USC true frosh defensive lineman to start an opener since 1986. Other ends looking to get in the mix are senior **Gerald Washington** (3 tac, 0.5 for loss, 0.5 sack, 2 FR in 2008) and redshirt freshman **Trey Henderson** (he can also play tackle, but he has been sidelined with a knee injury), plus senior **Andrew Weiss** (1 tac in 2008), a one-time walk-on who earned a scholarship this fall (he's a converted offensive tackle). Also, senior linebacker **Clay Matthews** (48 tac, 9 for loss, 4.5 sack, 2 FR, 2 FF, 2 dfl, 1 BLK FG in 2008) has been used primarily as a stand-up starting end in 2008. Coming aboard this fall as freshmen were tackles **Armord Armstead** (10 tac, 3 for loss, 1 sack in 2008) and **Jurrell Casey** (12 tac, 2 for loss, 1 FF in 2008) and ends **Wes Horton**, **Malik Jackson** (4 tac, 2 tac for loss, 2 sack, 1 FF, 1 dfl in 2008) and **Nick Perry**. Armstead, Horton and Perry were prep All-Americans.

—*At Virginia, Matthews had 2 fumble recoveries and a forced fumble to go with his game-best 6 tackles (with a sack), while Jackson had 2 tackles (with a sack) and forced a fumble, Griffen also had 2 tackles, Armstead had 1 stop and Washington recovered a fumble.*

—*Moore had 8 tackles (2 for a loss, with a sack) and a fumble recovery against Ohio State, while Matthews added 6 tackles (1.5 for losses, with a sack), a forced fumble and a deflection, Moala had 4 tackles (with a sack), Griffen had 2 stops (with a sack), Spicer also had 2 tackles, Armstead had a sack and Casey had a tackle.*

—*Moala had 5 tackles (2 for a loss, with 0.5 sack) at Oregon State, while Matthews added 5 tackles and blocked a field goal, Moore had 3 tackles (0.5 for a loss), Griffen had 3 tackles, Spicer had 2 tackles (1 for a loss), and Tupou and Casey each had 1 tackle.*

—*Against Oregon, Matthews had 5 tackles (0.5 for a loss), Moala had 5 tackles, Moore had 3 (with 1 for a loss), Griffen had 2 (with a sack), Jackson had a sack, Washington and Harris each had a tackle (0.5 sack) and Armstead and Casey each had a tackle.*

—*Against Arizona State, Matthews had 5 tackles and a deflection, while Moala had 3 tackles, a fumble recovery and blocked a pair of third-quarter field goals to tie an NCAA record for most blocked field goals in a quarter (he was named Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance), Moore had 2 tackles (including a sack) and a deflection, Tupou had 2 tackles (1 for a loss) and Griffen had a tackle (with 0.5 sack).*

—*Armstead had 4 tackles (2 for a loss) at Washington State, while Matthews had 2 tackles, Washington had a tackle and fumble recovery (it led to a USC TD) and both Casey and Moore had a tackle for a loss.*

—*Matthews had 5 tackles (with 1.5 sacks) at Arizona, while Moala had 3 tackles (including 2.5 for a loss, with 0.5 sack), Moore, Spicer and Casey each had 2 tackles (Moore had 0.5 for a loss) and Griffen had a sack.*

—Against Washington, Matthews had 4 tackles (1.5 for losses, with 0.5 sack), Casey had 2 tackles, Moore had 1 (with 0.5 for a loss) and Armstead and Weiss each had 1.

—Matthews had 4 tackles (1 for a loss) versus California, Tupou (with a tackle for a loss) and Griffen (with a sack) each had 3 tackles, Moore had 2 tackles for a loss (with a sack), Armstead had 2 tackles, and Moala had a tackle and a deflection.

—Moala had 3 tackles, including 2 for losses (with a sack), at Stanford, while Moore had 3 tackles and a deflection, Matthews had 3 tackles (0.5 for a loss), 1.5 of Griffen's 2 tackles were for losses, Spicer had 2 tackles, and Jackson and Casey each had a tackle.

—Matthews (1.5 for a loss, with 0.5 sack), Moala (with 1.5 sacks), Moore (with a sack) each had 3 tackles against Notre Dame, while Casey had 3 tackles and a forced fumble, Tupou had 2 tackles (1 for a loss), Griffen and Washington both had a tackle and Jackson had a deflection.

LINEBACKERS

Once again, USC is loaded at every linebacker spot. That's saying a lot considering the Trojans lost 2007 All-American Keith Rivers, a 3-year starter on the weak side who had 240 career tackles, and utility man Thomas Williams, who made 14 career starts while playing every linebacker position. Rivers was chosen in the NFL draft's first round, while Williams was a fifth rounder. Headlining the linebacker corps are 2-time All-Pac-10 first teamer **Rey Mauluga** (68 tac, 2.5 for loss, 2 dfl, 2 int with 1 TD in 2008) in the middle and **Brian Cushing** (63 tac, 9 for loss, 2.5 sack, 5 dfl, 1 FF, 1 int in 2008) on the strong side. Both seniors have been honored as Rose Bowl Defensive MVPs (Mauluga last season and Cushing the previous year) and both are All-American and Butkus Award candidates in 2008. Mauluga is among 4 finalists for the 2008 Lombardi Award, 3 finalists for the Bednarik Award, 5 finalists for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and 12 finalists for the Butkus Award. Cushing is among 12 finalists for the 2008 Butkus Award and was among 20 quarterfinalists for the 2008 Lott Trophy and 12 semifinalists for the 2008 Lombardi Award. Mauluga, USC's tackle leader in 2007, has 262 career stops. Senior **Kaluka Maiava** (58 tac, 6.5 for loss, 2 dfl, 1 int in 2008), who has started 12 times in his career, assumed Rivers' spot on the weak side. Pushing for time is junior **Luthur Brown**, who is able to play any linebacker position (he has a lingering back injury and has yet to be cleared to play in 2008). Fellow senior **Clay Matthews** (48 tac, 9 for loss, 4.5 sack, 2 FR, 2 FF, 2 dfl, 1 BLK FG in 2008), the son of the former Trojan All-American and NFL star of the same name, started twice last year for an injured Cushing and is versatile enough to play any spot. But so far in 2008 he has been used primarily as a stand-up starting end. Other linebackers fighting to see action are junior **Nick Garratt** (4 tac, 0.5 for loss in 2008), a one-time walk-on who earned a scholarship this fall, sophomores **Michael Morgan** (21 tac, 5 for loss, 1 sack, 1 FR in 2008) and **Malcolm Smith** (17 tac, 0.5 for loss in 2008), the brother of ex-Trojan All-American wide receiver and Super Bowl champion Steve Smith, and redshirt freshmen **Chris Galippo** (12 tac, 2 for loss, 1 int, 1 dfl in 2008), who missed most of 2007 with a back injury, and converted fullback **Jordan Campbell** (6 tac in 2008). Also available is sophomore walk-on **Dan Deckas**. Galippo and Deckas are middle linebackers, while the others play on the outside. Freshman prep All-American **Uona Kaveinga** (3 tac, 1 for loss in 2008) and frosh walk-on **Ross Cumming** (2 tac in 2008) also got thrown into the mix this fall.

—At Virginia, Maiava had 6 tackles (1 for a loss), Smith added 3 stops, Mauluga and Cushing each had 2 tackles (Cushing had 0.5 for a loss), Kaveinga had a tackle for a loss and Campbell and Garratt each had a tackle.

—Cushing had a team-best 10 tackles (1 for a loss) against Ohio State, while Mauluga had 5 stops and returned an interception 48 yards for a TD to earn Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week honors, Maiava had 3 tackles (1.5 for losses), Morgan had 2 tackles (1 for a loss) and Campbell and Smith each had 1 tackle.

—Mauluga had a game-high 12 tackles at Oregon State, while Maiava added 11 stops (1 for a loss) and a deflection, Cushing had 8 tackles (1 for a loss) and a deflection and Campbell had a tackle.

—Morgan had 8 tackles (1 for a loss) while making his first start against Oregon, Maiava also had 8 tackles, Cushing added 6 stops (2 for a loss, with a sack) and 2 deflections while starting on the inside for an injured Mauluga, Galippo had a tackle (0.5 for a loss) and Garratt and Campbell each had a stop.

—Mauluga had a game-best 8 tackles against Arizona State, while Cushing added 7 tackles (with 0.5 sack), Morgan had 5 tackles, Maiava had 3 stops, Campbell and Galippo each had 2 and Smith had 1.

—At Washington State, Mauluga had a team-best 5 tackles (1 for a loss) with a deflection, while Galippo (1.5 for a loss), Maiava (1 for a loss) and Smith (0.5 for a loss) each added 4 tackles, Cushing had 3 stops (0.5 for a loss) and a forced fumble that USC recovered, Morgan had 2 tackles (1 for a loss) and Kaveinga and Cumming each had a tackle.

—Mauluga had a team-high 9 tackles (0.5 for a loss) at Arizona, while Cushing added 6 tackles, Maiava had 4 stops and Smith had 1.

—Against Washington, Mauluga had 6 tackles and an interception, Smith also had 6 stops, Maiava had 5 tackles (1 for a loss), Cushing had 3 tackles, Galippo had 2 stops and returned an interception 50 yards, Garratt had 1 tackle (0.5 for a loss) and Kaveinga, Cumming and Morgan each had 1 stop.

—Mauluga had a game-best 10 tackles versus California, Cushing added 9 stops (including 2 for a loss, with a sack), Maiava had 2 tackles and a deflection and Galippo had a tackle.

—Mauluga had a team-best 9 tackles (1 for a loss) at Stanford, Maiava added 7 stops, Cushing had 6 tackles (0.5 for a loss) and an interception, Galippo had 2 tackles, and Campbell and Garratt each had 1 stop.

—Maiava had a team-best 5 tackles (1 for a loss) and an interception against Notre Dame, Cushing added 3 tackles (1 for a loss) and a deflection, Morgan had 3 tackles (2 for a loss, with a sack) and recovered a fumble, Mauluga had 2 tackles and a deflection and Smith had a tackle.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

The Trojan secondary is in good shape in 2008, despite losing lockdown cornerback Terrell Thomas, who had 8 career interceptions (he was chosen in the second round of the NFL draft). Seven defensive backs have starting experience. Both safeties are starting for their third seasons and could earn All-American and Thorpe Award acclaim in the fall: 2007 All-American first team free safety **Taylor Mays** (48 tac, 2 for loss, 7 dfl in 2008), a junior, and 2007 All-Pac-10 first team strong safety **Kevin Ellison** (45 tac, 2.5 for loss, 1 int, 7 dfl in 2008), a senior. Mays is among 3 finalists for the 2008 Thorpe Award. Dependable senior **Cary Harris** (31 tac, 3 for loss, 1 FF, 2 int, 5 dfl in 2008) returned at a cornerback spot. Junior **Shareece Wright** (8 tac in 2008), who started once last year, won the vacant corner job, but he has been sidelined most of the 2008 season with a neck injury. Two others coming off injuries are challenging for time either starting or at nickel back: senior **Josh Pinkard** (32 tac, 1 for loss, 3 dfl, 2 FR, 2 FF, 1 int in 2008), a 2005

starter (primarily at cornerback) who started the 2006 opener at free safety before knee injuries sidelined him since then (he can also play safety), and junior **Kevin Thomas** (14 tac, 2 for a loss, 2 sack, 3 int with 1 TD, 6 dfl in 2008), who started twice in 2006 but hadn't played the rest of that season and all of 2007 because of foot, ankle and shoulder injuries. There are also 3 walk-on cornerbacks in junior **Matthew Jordan**, sophomore **Omari Crittenden** and redshirt freshman **Daniel Harper** (4 tac in 2008). Other safeties battling for action are junior **Will Harris** (31 tac, 4 for loss, 1 int, 3 dfl in 2008) and soph **Marshall Jones** (5 tac in 2008), plus walk-ons **Justin Hart**, a junior, sophomore **Robert Erickson** (1 tac in 2008) and redshirt freshman **Spencer Spiegel**. Sophomore safety **Shane Horton**, the older brother of Trojan defensive end Wes Horton, transferred to USC this past spring from UNLV, but he has to sit out the 2008 season because of NCAA transfer rules. He started 6 games for the Rebels as a first-year freshman last year, getting 35 tackles and an interception. This fall, **Brian Baucham** and prep All-American **T.J. Bryant** (7 tac, 2 dfl, 1 int in 2008) at cornerback and **Drew McAllister** (14 tac, 2 int in 2008, plus 1 KOR, 21 yds, 21.0 avg) at safety entered the competition as freshmen, along with walk-on freshman safety **Ryan McMahon**.

—At Virginia, Mays had a game-high 6 tackles (1.5 for losses) and a deflection, Wright added 5 tackles, Cary Harris had 3 tackles (1 for a loss), Ellison had 2 tackles and 2 deflections, Pinkard had 2 stops, Thomas had a tackle and an interception and Jones had a tackle.

—Ellison had a team-best 10 tackles and an interception against Ohio State, while Mays added 8 stops, Wright had 3 tackles, Thomas had 2 tackles and a deflection, Pinkard had a tackle and deflection and Cary Harris and McAllister each had a stop.

—At Oregon State, Ellison had 9 tackles (0.5 for a loss) and 2 deflections, Cary Harris had 7 tackles, Mays added 6 stops, Will Harris had 5 tackles, Jones and Pinkard (starting for an injured Wright) each had 1 tackle and Thomas had a deflection.

—Ellison had a career-high and game-best 12 tackles (1 for a loss) against Oregon, while Mays and Cary Harris each added 6 tackles, Pinkard started again and had 5 tackles, 1 deflected and forced a fumble that he recovered, Thomas and Will Harris each had 2 tackles and McAllister intercepted a late pass.

—Against Arizona State, Ellison had 7 tackles (1 for a loss) and 2 deflections, Cary Harris added 6 tackles, an interception, a forced fumble and a deflection, Will Harris had 4 tackles, Bryant had 2 tackles, 2 deflections and an interception (he returned it 55 yards), Thomas had 2 tackles (with a sack), 2 deflections and returned an interception 46 yards for a touchdown, Mays had 2 tackles and Pinkard had a tackle.

—Pinkard had 4 tackles, plus a fumble recovery and a forced fumble (USC recovered it and turned it into a TD), at Washington State, while Cary Harris had 3 tackles (1 for a loss), Harper also had 3 stops, Will Harris had 2 tackles and an interception that he returned 28 yards to set up a USC TD, Mays had 2 tackles (0.5 for a loss), McAllister had 2 tackles and Ellison, Jones and Bryant each had a tackle.

—Mays had 4 tackles at Arizona, Ellison had 4 tackles and a deflection, Cary Harris added 3 stops (1 for a loss), Pinkard had 2 tackles, Thomas had a tackle and an interception.

—Against Washington, Will Harris started in place of an injured Ellison and had 6 tackles (2.5 for losses) and a deflection, McAllister also had 6 stops and returned an interception 35 yards, Mays had 3 tackles and a deflection, Bryant had 3 tackles, Jones, Harper, Erickson and Pinkard each had a tackle, Thomas had 2 deflections and Cary Harris had a deflection.

—Mays had 5 tackles and 4 deflections versus California to earn Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week honors, Will Harris added 5 stops (1 for a loss) and 2 deflections, Pinkard had 4 tackles and an interception, Thomas had 3 tackles with a sack and Cary Harris had a tackle and a deflection.

—Pinkard had 8 tackles (1 for a loss) and a deflection at Stanford, while Will Harris added 6 tackles (0.5 for a loss), Mays had 5 tackles, McAllister had 2 tackles, Cary Harris had a tackle and a deflection and Thomas and Bryant each had 1 tackle.

—Pinkard and McAllister both had 3 tackles against Notre Dame, Mays and Thomas both had 2 tackles, Will Harris and Jones both had 1 stop and Cary Harris had an interception.

SPECIAL TEAMS OVERVIEW

USC's punter (**Greg Woidneck**), placekicker (**David Buehler**) and top kickoff (**Ronald Johnson**) and punt (**Joe McKnight**) returners from last year are back in 2008, but there is a new snapper and holder. Troy is looking to improve in all facets of special teams, as none were exceptionally "special" in 2007. The Trojans were decent on kick returns and placekicking last year, but were in the nation's bottom 20 in net punting (partly because 3 punts were blocked) and punt returns and yielded a scoring kickoff return.

SPECIALISTS

Senior **Greg Woidneck** (36.4 avg in 2008, plus 1 tac) returned for his third season as USC's punter. Although 40% of his punts pinned opponents within the 20-yard line last fall, he is looking to improve his distance and eliminate blocked punts (he's had 4 in his career, including 3 last year). In 2008, 18 of his 41 punts (43.9%) have pinned foes within the 20. Backing him is sophomore walk-on **Billy O'Malley**. Strong-legged senior placekicker **David Buehler** (56-of-57 PAT and 8-of-9 FG in 2008, plus 2 tac) is handling all the kicks again this year and could be among the top kickers in the nation. He has hit 25-of-29 field goals in his career, including 6-of-8 of 40-plus yards. In 2008, 43 of his 76 kickoffs were touchbacks (56.6%) and 55 pinned foes within the 20-yard line (73.8%). Last season, 18 of his 84 kickoffs were touchbacks (including 5 in the Rose Bowl) and 35 pinned foes within the 20-yard line. Behind him are walk-ons **Jordan Congdon**, a junior who was Nebraska's kicker in 2004 and 2005, and sophomore **Joe Houston**. Believe it or not, a crucial position that USC needed to fill in 2008 was at long snapper now that 4-year starter Will Collins, who performed flawlessly in his career, is gone. Sophomore tight end **Cooper Stephenson** (the one-time walk-on earned a scholarship past this spring) emerged from spring practice with the job snapping to the punter. Enrolling this fall as a freshman was **Chris Pousson** and he snaps on placekicks. Like at snapper, USC is breaking in a new holder on placekicks in 2008 after the graduation of 2-year holder Michael McDonald. Senior punter **Greg Woidneck** takes over, backed by junior quarterback-wide receiver **Garrett Green**. USC's top returners from last season are back in 2008. Sophomore wide receiver **Ronald Johnson** (11 KOR, 322 yds, 29.3 avg in 2008) topped Troy in kickoffs last year and already ranks fifth on the all-time Trojan kick return list (942 yards). Soph tailback **Joe McKnight** (9 PR, 53 yds, 5.9 avg in 2008) led the team in punt returns in 2007 and was employed whenever punts were expected to reach midfield, although gone is sure-handed tailback Desmond Reed, who was used when punts had to be fielded deep in Trojan territory (he also returned some kickoffs and ended up ranked 17th on that USC career list). Also experienced on kickoffs is sophomore tailback **C.J. Gable** (6 KOR, 178 yards, 29.7 avg, 1 TD in 2008), who is 12th on the Trojan career kickoff return ladder (644 yards). Junior tailback **Stafon Johnson** (27 PR, 260 yds, 9.6 avg in 2008) and redshirt freshman wide receiver **Brandon Carswell** (5

PR, 31 yds, 6.2 avg in 2008) are also available to return punts.

—At Virginia, Buehler hit all 7 of his PATs and a 20-yard field goal, plus 5 of his 9 kickoffs pinned the Cavaliers within the 20-yard line (with 3 touchbacks), while Woidneck averaged 36.0 yards on his 2 punts (1 pinning the Cavs within the 20).

—Buehler hit all 5 of his PATs and 5 of his 6 kickoffs pinned the Buckeyes within the 20 (with 3 touchbacks) against Ohio State, while Woidneck averaged 35.2 yards on his 5 punts (with 3 pinning the Buckeyes within the 20).

—Buehler hit all 3 of his PATs and 2 of his 4 kickoffs pinned the Beavers within the 20-yard line at Oregon State, while Woidneck averaged 39.3 yards on his 6 punts (with a 50-yarder).

—Buehler scored 14 points against Oregon by hitting all 5 of his PATs and all 3 of his field goals (21, 36 and 42 yards) and also had touchbacks on 6 of his 9 kickoffs, while Woidneck had a 27-yard punt.

—Buehler hit all 4 of his PATs and 4 of his 5 kickoffs were touchbacks against Arizona State, while Woidneck averaged 37.8 yards on his 5 punts (including a 53-yarder), with 2 pinning the Sun Devils within the 20.

—Buehler had 9 touchbacks on his 11 kickoffs (with another pinning the Cougars within the 20) and hit 9-of-10 PATs at Washington State, while Woidneck averaged 49.0 yards on his 2 punts (both pinned WSU within the 20), with a 56-yarder.

—Buehler had touchbacks on 3 of his 4 kickoffs while also hitting both PATs and 1-of-2 field goals (a 43-yarder) at Arizona (he also had a touchdown saying tackle on a kickoff) and Woidneck averaged 34.3 yards on his 6 punts (with 2 pinning the Wildcats within the 20).

—Against Washington, Buehler hit all 8 of his PATs and 7 of his 9 kickoffs pinned the Huskies within the 20 (with 4 touchbacks) to earn Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week honors, while Woidneck's only punt was a 50-yarder the pinned UW within the 20.

—Buehler hit a 27-yard field goal and both of his PATs against California, plus 3 of his 4 kickoffs pinned the Golden Bears within the 20 (with 2 touchbacks), while Woidneck averaged 27.6 yards on his 5 punts, with 2 pinning Cal within the 20.

—Buehler hit a 37-yard field goal and all 6 of his PATs at Stanford, plus 5 of his 8 kickoffs pinned the Cardinal within the 20 (with 4 touchbacks), while Woidneck averaged 42.5 yards on his 4 punts, with 2 pinning the Cardinal within the 20.

—Against Notre Dame, Buehler hit a 35-yard field goal and all 5 of his PATs, plus 5 of his 7 kickoffs pinned the Irish within the 20 (with 4 touchbacks), while Woidneck averaged 32.2 yards on his 4 punts, with 1 pinning the Irish within the 20.

TAKEAWAYS

In head coach Pete Carroll's 8 seasons at USC, Troy is +106 overall (264 takeaways and 158 giveaways). Those 264 takeaways since 2001 are the most in the nation. USC has been effective in the takeaway department during Carroll's tenure, although Troy has not been as dominant the past 3 seasons. Troy is +0.6 in turnover margin in 2008 (getting 16 interceptions and 9 fumbles while giving away 11 interceptions and 8 fumbles).

***USC has won 66 of its last 72 games, 77 of its last 84, 78 of its last 86, 80 of its last 89 and 84 of its last 94.

***USC has won 44 of its past 45 home games.

***USC has won at least 11 games in each of the past 6 seasons, an NCAA record.

OFFENSE

***Offensively, USC is ranked 12th nationally in passing efficiency (159.8, first in Pac-10), 13th in scoring offense (38.4, second in Pac-10), 16th in total offense (450.8, second in Pac-10) and 18th in rushing offense (205.7, second in Pac-10) in 2008.

***Of USC's 59 offensive scoring drives in 2008, 34 have taken 3 minutes or less (including 17 under 2 minutes), while 11 have gone 80-plus yards and 21 have taken 5 plays or less.

***USC's top 9 rushers of 2008 are all averaging at least 4.1 yards per carry.

SCORING

***USC scored 138 unanswered points in 2008, dating from the second quarter of the Oregon game to the second quarter of the Arizona contest.

***USC has scored at least 20 points in 88 of its past 92 contests (including a since-broken NCAA record 63 consecutive games, a streak that was snapped in the 2006 UCLA game).

***USC has scored at least 30 points in 60 of its last 81 games.

***USC has scored at least 40 points 43 times under Pete Carroll (including 16 times with at least 50 points).

***In the second half in 2008, USC is outscored its foes, 184-22 (including 87-7 in the third quarter).

***Since trailing late in the third quarter at Oregon State in 2006, 33-10, USC has outscored its opponents by nearly triple, 1,049-358.

***USC has a knack for scoring 20 or more unanswered points in a game (9 times in 2008, 8 times in 2007, 5 times in 2006, 13 times in 2005, 12 times in 2004 and 11 times in both 2003 and 2002).

***During the Pete Carroll era, USC has more than doubled the score of its opponents in the second half of games (1,818 to 792 points).

***Since 2003, USC has scored touchdowns of 20-plus yards 133 times.

DEFENSE

***Defensively in 2008, USC is ranked first nationally in total defense (210.6, first in Pac-10), scoring defense (7.8, first in Pac-10), pass efficiency defense (81.8, first in Pac-10) and pass defense (124.0, first in Pac-10), third in tackles for a loss (8.3, first in Pac-10), sixth in rushing defense (86.6, first in Pac-10) and 25th in sacks (2.6, fifth in Pac-10) in 2008.

***USC's total defense in 2008 (210.6) is its best since 1967 (201.8).

***USC's scoring defense in 2008 (7.8) is its best since 1952 (4.3).

***USC's pass defense in 2008 (124.0) is its best since 1974 (117.1).

***USC has allowed just 10 total touchdowns (only 3 passing touchdowns) in 2008.

***USC has allowed just 22 second-half points in 2008.

***USC has allowed only 86 points in its 11 games in 2008.

***USC allowed just 19 points at home in 2008, its fewest since also surrendering 19 in 1962.

***USC did not allow a point in 11 consecutive quarters in 2008 from the third quarter of the Oregon game through the first quarter of the Arizona game, its longest such stretch since 12 straight scoreless quarter in 1959 (and it did not allow a touchdown in 12 consecutive quarters, from the second quarter of the Oregon game through the first quarter of the Arizona game, and 10 consecutive quarters from the third quarter of the Arizona game to the fourth quarter of the California game).

***USC's back-to-back shutouts in 2008 (28-0 over Arizona State and 69-0 over Washington State) were its first since 1971.

RANDOM NOTES

***USC's 3 shutouts in 2008 are its most since 1982 (also 3) and its most against conference opponents since 1965's 4.

***USC has held 19 of its last 31 opponents to 14 points or less, dating back to mid-2006 (including 9 times in 2008).

***In 141 drives against USC in 2008, opponents have only 15 drives of 50-plus yards.

***In USC's last 7 games of 2008, opponents have scored just 4 touchdowns and 7 field goals in a combined 91 drives (only 8 of those drives were over 50 yards).

***USC has held 5 its last 6 opponents in 2008 (including 4 in a row) to less than 200 total yards.
***USC has intercepted a pass in 68 of the last 86 games.

***USC has 2 touchdowns on interception returns in 2008.

***USC has blocked 3 field goals in 2008.

***USC is allowing opponents to convert just 27.5% of third downs (44-of-160) in 2008

***USC has scored 84 points following opponent turnovers in 2008 (after 13 of the 25 times it came up with a turnover); conversely, opponents have scored 24 points following Trojan turnovers (after 4 of the 19 times the opponents came up with a turnover).

***After having turnover margins of +0.3 in 2006 and +0.2 in 2007, USC's margin of +0.6 in 2008 is leaning more towards the positive trend from each previous year under Pete Carroll (+1.3 in 2001, +1.4 in 2002, +1.5 in both 2003 and 2004 and +1.6 in 2005).

***USC has held 58 of its last 88 opposing teams to 100 rushing yards or less (9 times in 2008, 10 times in 2007, 6 times in 2006, 5 times in 2005, 8 times in 2004, 10 games in 2003 and 10 times in 2002).

***Only 11 opposing runners have rushed for 100 yards against USC in the past 84 games (California's Adimchinobe Echemandu did so in 2003 with 147, breaking a streak of 16 consecutive games without a 100-yard rusher, Cal's J.J. Arrington in 2004 with 112, Washington State's Jerome Harrison in 2005 with 147, Fresno State's Wendell Mathis in 2005 with 109, Texas' Vince Young in 2005 with 200, Oregon State's Clinton Polk in 2006 with 100, Oregon's Jonathan Stewart in 2007 with 103, Cal's Justin Forsett in 2007 with 164, Illinois' Rashard Mendenhall in 2007 with 155, Oregon State's Jacquizz Rodgers in 2008 with 186 and Stanford's Toby Gerhart in 2009 with 101).

***Under Pete Carroll, USC is 50-2 when holding opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense (the losses were at UCLA in 2006 and Stanford in 2007).

MISCELLANEOUS

***USC is first nationally in kickoff returns (28.1, first in Pac-10).

***All 6 of USC's home games in 2008 were sold out (they did so by Aug. 4, 2008).

***For the fourth consecutive year, USC ranked last in the Pac-10 in opponent penalty yardage average (44.7) in 2007 and it is last in 2008 (42.6).

***USC has played before crowds of at least 85,000 in 32 of its past 66 games.

***Nineteen of USC's last 28 home games (including a since-broken streak of 14 in a row) have been played in front of 90,000-plus crowds.

***USC is 43-4 in the final 6 regular-season games in head coach Pete Carroll's 8 years (the losses were to Notre Dame in 2001, Oregon State and UCLA in 2006 and Oregon in 2007).

***Fourteen of the 15 losses in the Pete Carroll era at USC were by a touchdown or less (the other was by just 11 points).

ON TV

USC is one of America's most televised teams. The Trojans have appeared on live national, regional or local telecasts 384 times, including 250 of the past 252 games (USC's last 91 games have been televised live). In fact, USC had an amazing streak of 111 consecutive games on some form of live television from 1988 to 1997 (snapped against Oregon State) and another streak of 48 in a row from 1997 to 2001 (broken against California).

***USC's 2008 team captains, as selected by their teammates at the end of fall camp, are: S **Kevin Ellison**, QB **Mark Sanchez**, LB **Brian Cushing** and OG-C **Jeff Byers**.

***The 2008 season marks the 80th anniversary of USC's first national championship team (1928) and the 30th anniversary of the 1978 national championship squad (USC's last title prior to the Pete Carroll era). The 1928 team went 9-0-1 (the blemish was a scoreless tie at California) under coach Howard Jones, posted Troy's first-ever win over Notre Dame and was led by the likes of All-Americans Jess Hibbs and Don Williams. Coach John Robinson's 1978 Trojans were 12-1 (losing at Arizona State), recorded victories over Top 10 teams Alabama, Notre Dame and Michigan and featured players such as All-Americans Charles White and Pat Howell, plus Paul McDonald, Brad Budde, Anthony Munoz, Dennis Johnson, Rich Dimler, Ronnie Lott and Marcus Allen.

***USC is 182-53-10 (.763) in seasons that the Summer Olympics have been held. The Trojans won 4 national championships (1928-32-72-2004) and played in 10 bowls (winning 7) during those Olympic seasons. Incidentally, 40 current and former USC athletes participated in the 2008 Beijing Olympics and they won 21 medals (9 golds).

***USC is 198-60-14 (.754) during presidential election years. The Trojans are 118-26-5 (.809) in years when Republicans won the White House and 80-34-9 (.687) when Democrats won. USC has won 4 national championships (1928-32-72-2004) during presidential election years. Since 1929, USC has played in the Rose Bowl during the term of every U.S. President.

***Head coach **Pete Carroll** has made it a practice to play first-year freshmen at USC. During Carroll's 8 years at Troy, 87 first-year freshmen have seen action at USC (7 in 2001, 12 in 2002, 13 in 2003, 8 in 2004, 11 in 2005, 15 in 2006, 8 in 2007 and 12 in 2008).

***USC currently has 3 players who graduated a semester early from high school and enrolled at USC in the spring. S **Kevin Ellison** enrolled at USC in the spring of 2005, OG-OT **Martin Coleman** enrolled in the spring of 2007 and OG **Matt Meyer** enrolled in the spring of 2008. Since 1999, 12 Trojans have graduated at least a semester early from high school and come to USC (including 1 who graduated a full year early).

***DE-DT **Trey Henderson** is believed to be the first Canadian player offered a scholarship to play football at USC.

***FB **Adam Goodman** is USC's only married player. Goodman and wife Jessica—she's the daughter of former USC and NFL tight end Mark Boyer—were married in the summer of 2007.

***Three current Trojans played against USC in 2006 as members of opposing teams. QB **Mitch Mustain** (4-of-6 passing for 47 yards and an interception, plus a 4-yard TD run) and WR **Damian Williams** (4 catches for 61 yards) played for Arkansas in Troy's 50-14 season-opening road win. PK **Jordan Congdon** (38-yard field goal and a PAT) was on Nebraska's team that lost at USC, 28-10.

***Who's the fastest among the 2008 Trojans? It might be WR **Travon Patterson** (best of 10.44 in the 100 meters and 21.41 in the 200 meters), who was fourth in the 2006 California state 100. TB **Joe McKnight** has been clocked at 10.4 in the 100 (he was the 2006 Louisiana state 100 champ and was second in 2007).

***Speaking of track and field, DE-DT **Trey Henderson**, who set a Canadian youth record in the hammer throw while in high school, recorded a personal-best mark of 196-3 while competing for USC in the event at the 2008 NCAA West Regional meet (he placed 13th). S **Taylor Mays** was a 2-time (2004-05) Washington state 3A champion in the 100 and 200 meters. CB **Brian Baucham** won the 300-meter intermediate hurdles title at the 2008 California state meet (his best was 37.26) despite taking up the event in just the final 6 weeks of his senior season. TE **Blake Ayles** was second at the 2008 California state meet in the discus throw (he also won the 2008 CIF Division III meet), posting a best of 193-6 (he also had a best of 51-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ in the shot put). C **Abe Markowitz** was second at the 2008 Hawaii state meet in the shot put and discus.

***Besides the previously-mentioned Henderson, there are several other multi-sport USC football players who have participated on other Trojan sports teams. WR **Travon Patterson** sprinted on the USC track team, FB **Matt Hillier** was an opposite hitter on the men's volleyball team and QB **Chris McCaffery** pitched on the baseball team.

***LB **Kaluka Maiava** participated in boxing in high school. DE **Gerald Washington** played tennis as a youth and competed in juniors tournaments. OG-OT **Martin Coleman**, who grew up on the Tongan island of Vavau, played rugby as a youth.

***Before DE **Gerald Washington** entered junior college in 2004, he spent the previous 4 years in the U.S. Navy as a helicopter mechanic.

***OG-C **Jeff Byers** already has received his bachelor's degree (in business administration in the summer of 2007). In fact, the Academic All-American candidate is in the second year of working on his M.B.A.

***OG-OT **Martin Coleman** enjoys art and had one of his sculpture pieces displayed at the 2008 "Arletics" on-campus exhibit that featured the works of USC student-athletes.

***PK **Jordan Congdon** wears his normal-sized 10.5 cleated shoe on his left (non-kicking) foot, but a very tight 7.5-sized cleat on his right foot.

***In 2008, **Pete Carroll** was picked as the nation's top head coach and **Pat Ruel** as the nation's top offensive line coach by CBSsports.com.

***USC offensive administrative assistant **Albert Dorsey** spent part of the summer of 2008 serving a coaching internship with the Oakland Raiders as part of the NFL's Minority Fellowship program.

*****Noboru Hamabe**, the quarterbacks coach at Tokyo's Waseda University, is spending the season at USC observing the Trojan football program.

***Not only has head coach **Pete Carroll** produced numerous NFL draft picks (42) from his USC teams, but 10 of his Trojan assistant coaches have gone on to the NFL from USC: Lane Kiffin, Norm Chow, Kennedy Pola, Greg Burns, Tim Davis, Jethro Franklin, **Steve Sarkisian** (he has since returned to USC), Carl Smith, DeWayne Walker and Kirby Wilson. Kiffin, Franklin, Smith, Walker and Wilson all previously had NFL experience before coming to USC (as do current assistants **Pat Ruel**, **Todd McNair** and **John Morton**). And **Nick Holt** (Idaho) and Ed Orgeron (Mississippi) both left USC to become collegiate head coaches (Holt now is back at USC after a couple days' detour to the NFL, while Oregon is now in the NFL).

***Seating capacity in the Coliseum has been upped from 92,000 to 93,607 with the addition of seats in the lower northeast (Sections 27 and 28) and southeast (Sections 1 and 2) areas of the stadium.

***The latest book about USC football is "Trojans Essential: Everything You Need To Know To Be A Real Fan" (Triumph Books) by Steven Travers. It was published in August of 2008.

***The newly-redesigned USCTrojans.com features live game broadcasts, replays of classic contests, exclusive behind-the-scenes video, blogs and original programming about USC athletics. It covers all 19 of USC's men's and women's sports, with an emphasis on football and basketball. Nearly all of USC's home sporting events are shown live, and include pre- and post-game shows. Most home and road football, basketball and other games that are aired live on commercial or cable television networks, and thereby protected contractually from live coverage elsewhere, are replayed almost immediately upon their conclusion on Trojans All-Access. Also featured on Trojans All-Access are daily post-practice reports, live coverage of head football coach Pete Carroll's Tuesday and post-game press conferences and video blogs (USCTrojans.com/blogs) centered around key USC athletes and teams, as well as coverage of breaking news pertaining to Trojan athletics. A vault of historic USC football games, dating to the 1930s, is available for viewing, as is other archived Trojan sports programming. There is live "GameTracker" statistical coverage of many USC's events. USCTrojans.com also continues to feature extensive historical material and an online athletic merchandise store and ticket office.

***USC president **Steven Sample** has issued the following message to Trojan fans regarding good sportsmanship in the Coliseum: "Dear Friends of Trojan Football: The Coliseum is 'our house' on game days. I hope you are as committed as I am to being good hosts. You set the example: The way you cheer our team and show respect to your fellow fans (including those of the opposing team) has a powerful influence on everyone around you. Only a small number of fans—most of them *not* USC students or alumni—cause trouble at games. However, those being subjected to boorish behavior or abusive language certainly don't take the time to discover the offenders' affiliation to USC. Crass fans sully the game for everyone. The best way for us to be good hosts is, first, to model good sportsmanship and civility

and, second, to refuse to tolerate other spectators' bad or unruly behavior. If you see someone disrupting others' enjoyment of the game, please alert a Coliseum usher or security staff. You also can report inappropriate behavior by calling 213-765-8525. Let's enjoy the games and show our true Trojan spirit by setting a tone of sportsmanship and civility. Fight On!"

***Head coach **Pete Carroll** has his own website, PeteCarroll.com. It offers an exclusive window into the Trojan football program, complete with an hour-by-hour blog and behind-the-scenes photos and stories. Run by former Daily Trojan sportswriter-turned-USC walk-on wide receiver **Ben Malcolmson**, PeteCarroll.com features a variety of Carroll-related information, multimedia, merchandise, and fan club memberships that include exclusive benefits. Proceeds benefit "A Better LA," the non-profit organization the Carroll helped found to help reduce gang violence in Los Angeles.

***In 2003, head coach **Pete Carroll** helped develop "A Better L.A.," a non-profit group consisting of a consortium of local agencies and organizations working to reduce gang violence by empowering change in individuals and communities. For more information, go to ABetterLA.com. In the fall of 2008, he helped organize "LA LivePeace 08," a march and rally at the Coliseum to promote gang intervention and non-violence in Los Angeles.

***USC's current head coaches in football (**Pete Carroll**) and baseball (**Chad Kreuter**) both attended the same high school (Redwood High in Larkspur, Calif.).

***Strength and conditioning coach **Chris Carlisle** has beaten cancer. He learned he had Hodgkin's Disease in December of 2000, began radiation treatments in Tennessee (where he was still the Volunteers' associate strength and conditioning coach), was hired by USC in February of 2001, kept his illness a secret except to Trojan head coach Pete Carroll, continued treatments in Tennessee and at USC/Norris Comprehensive Cancer Center and Hospital, then doctors told him in the summer of 2001 that the cancer was in remission. He informed the USC players of his ordeal at the start of fall 2001 camp. He was 1 of 17 nominees for the 2003 Most Courageous Award presented by the Football Writers Association of America and 1 of 11 nominees for the 2005 award.

***Six Trojans have relatives who played on national championship USC football squads: TE **Rhett Ellison** (father, Riki Gray Ellison, was on the 1978 team), OG **Khaled Holmes** (brother, Alex, was on the 2003 and 2004 teams), OT **Nick Howell** (father, Pat Howell, was an All-American on the 1978 team), OT **Matt Kalil** (brother, Ryan was on the 2003 and 2004 teams), LB-DE **Clay Matthews** (father, 1977 All-American Clay Matthews, was on the 1974 team and brother, Kyle Matthews, was on the 2003 team) and LB **Malcolm Smith** (brother, 2006 All-American Steve Smith, was on the 2003 and 2004 teams).

***Several Trojans have other relatives with USC football connections. LB-DE **Clay Matthews'** uncle, Bruce Matthews played on the offensive line at USC in 1980 to 1982 (he was a 1982 All-American). QB-WR **Garrett**

Green's cousin is former Trojan quarterback Brandon Hance (2003-04). P **Greg Woidneck's** brothers, Brian and Rob, were managers with the USC football team (2001-02). FB **Adam Goodman's** father-in-law is former Trojan tight end Mark Boyer (1982-84). C **Abe Markowitz's** grandfather, Larry, played football at USC in the early 1950s, while his cousin is former USC offensive lineman Faaesha Mailo (1997-99, 2000, 2002).

***Speaking of genes: WR **David Ausberry's** cousin is Tommie Smith, the 1968 Olympic gold medalist in the 200 meters who is long remembered for giving the "Black Power" salute (with John Carlos) on the medal stand. PK **David Buehler's** father, John, was a 3-year (1969-71) letterman on USC's track team as a shot putter, while his uncle, George Buehler, lettered in football at Stanford for 3 years (1966-68) and then played guard with the Oakland Raiders (1969-78) and Cleveland Browns (1978-79) and another uncle, Charles, lettered in football at Stanford for 3 years (1960-62). WR **Brice Butler's** father, Bobby, was a 1980 All-American cornerback at Florida State who then played 12 years (1981-92) with the Atlanta Falcons, while his brother, Brenton, is a junior on Fordham's basketball team. WR **Jordan Cameron's** sister, Brynn, is a senior guard on USC's women's basketball team, while his grandfather, Jack Cravens, played basketball and baseball at BYU (1957-59). QB **Aaron Corp's** father, Chris, lettered at wide receiver for 2 years (1980-81) at Idaho State and was a member of the Bengals' NCAA Division I-AA championship team (he caught a TD pass in the title game), while his mother, Mary, played volleyball at Idaho State. LB **Brian Cushing's** father, Frank, was a member of Seton Hall's baseball team that played in the 1964 College World Series. S **Kevin Ellison's** brother, Chris, was a defensive back at BYU in 1997 and 1998 and another brother, Keith, was a linebacker at Oregon State in 2004 and 2005 (he also played at San Diego State in 2002) who now plays with the NFL's Buffalo Bills, while his cousin, Donminic Ellison, played basketball at Washington State and New Mexico State. TE **Rhett Ellison's** father, Riki (Gray) Ellison, lettered at linebacker for 4 seasons (1978-80, 1982) at USC, where he was a member of the 1978 national championship team and earned All-Conference honors in 1979, then played in the NFL with the San Francisco 49ers (1983-89), where he appeared in the 1985 and 1989 Super Bowls, and Los Angeles Raiders (1990-92), while his sister, Wesley, played water polo at Michigan for 4 years (2004-07). TB **Broderick Green's** half-brother is Kansas City Chiefs safety Greg Wesley. DE **Everson Griffen's** cousin is Arizona State tailback Keegan Herring. S **Shane Horton** and DE **Wes Horton** are the sons of Myke Horton, who lettered 2 years (1973-74) as an offensive tackle at UCLA, was drafted by the New England Patriots in 1975, played professionally in the USFL (with Washington and Memphis) and the CFL (with Calgary), then was one of the original members of the syndicated TV show "American Gladiators" (he was Gemini from 1989 to 1992). OT **Matt Kalil's** father, Frank, was a center at Arkansas (1978) and Arizona (1980-81-82), then was drafted by the Buffalo Bills in 1982 before playing for the USFL's Arizona Wranglers in 1983 and Houston Gamblers in 1984. LB **Kaluka Maiava's** grandfather is ex-pro wrestler Neff Maiava, his father, Scott Mahoney, was an offensive lineman at

Colorado (1969-71), his uncle is pro wrestler/actor "The Rock" (Dwayne Johnson, who played football at Miami) and his brother, Kai, is a junior offensive lineman at UCLA (he formerly played at Colorado). C **Abe Markowitz's** father, Barry, lettered as a linebacker at UCLA in 1974 and his cousins include former Hawaii and San Francisco 49er offensive lineman Jesse Sapolu and Colorado freshman offensive lineman Max Tuioti-Mariner. LB-DE **Clay Matthews'** brother, Casey, is a sophomore linebacker at Oregon, his cousin, Ashley Nick, is a senior on the USC women's soccer team (the 2007 NCAA champions) and another cousin, Kevin Matthews, is a junior center at Texas A&M. S **Taylor Mays'** father, Stafford Mays, was a defensive lineman at Washington in 1978 and 1979 who then played in the NFL with the St. Louis Cardinals (1980-86) and Minnesota Vikings (1987-88). S **Drew McAllister's** father, Ken, lettered as a defensive back at California in 1976 and 1977 (he led the team in punt returns both season and in kickoff returns in 1976), while his mother was a Golden Bears cheerleader. TB **Joe McKnight's** sister, Johanna, is a senior on the basketball (guard) and track (sprints/jumps) teams at Richmond. TE **Jimmy Miller's** brother, Jeff, is a sophomore defensive tackle at UCLA. DT **Fili Moala's** father, Fili Sr., was a heavyweight boxer in the 1970s who sparred with Ken Norton and lost a 1979 fight to Ron Lyle, while his cousin is former Oregon defensive lineman Haloti Ngata, now with the NFL's Baltimore Ravens. LB **Michael Morgan's** brother, Steve, was a defensive tackle at UCLA from 1999 to 2002. C **Kristofer O'Dowd's** grandfather, Jack, lettered in football at Arizona for 3 years (1930-32). OT-C-OG **Alex Parsons'** brother, B. Jay Parsons, was a defensive end at Kentucky (2004-05). QB **Mark Sanchez's** brothers—Nick (Yale in 1992-93-94) and Brandon (DePaul in 1997)—played football in college. SNP-TE **Cooper Stephenson's** father, Curt, was a 3-year (1975-77) letterman wide receiver at Michigan (the 1976 Wolverine squad lost to USC in the Rose Bowl), where he twice made the Big Ten All-Academic team, while his cousin, Joe Robles, is a sophomore placekicker/punter at California. DT **Christian Tupou's** brother, Fenuki, is a senior offensive tackle at Oregon. TB **Marc Tyler's** father, Wendell Tyler, was a running back at UCLA (1973-76) who led the Bruins in rushing in 1975 (they won the Rose Bowl that season), earned All-Conference first team honors in 1976 and is fifth on the school's career rushing list, then was an All-Pro with the Los Angeles Rams (1977-82) and San Francisco 49ers (1983-86), appearing in the Super Bowl in 1980 and 1985. Head coach **Pete Carroll's** wife, Glenna, played volleyball at Pacific, while his son, Brennan, was a tight end at Delaware and Pitt (he currently is an assistant football coach at USC) and his daughter, Jaime, played on the 2000 USC women's volleyball team. DB coach **Rocky Seto's** wife, Sharla, played soccer at USC. TE coach **Brennan Carroll** is the son of USC head coach Pete Carroll; his wife, Amber played volleyball at North Carolina, in Europe and on the AVP beach tour. LB coach **Ken Norton Jr.** is the son of Ken Norton Sr., the former world heavyweight boxing champion who played football at Northeast Missouri State. DL coach **Nick Holt** is the grandson of Clarence Buster Crabbe, USC's first All-American swimmer (1931) who was a 1931 NCAA freestyle titlist and 1932 Olympic gold medalist (he won a bronze in 1928) before starring in Hollywood as Tarzan, Flash Gordon and Buck Rogers.

***OT **Butch Lewis'** real first name is Wendell, DE-DT **Trey Henderson's** is Nolan and offensive line coach **Pat Ruel's** is Golden. TB **C.J. Gable's** initials stand for Carl Jr., while FB-WR **D.J. Shoemate's** stand for Dennis Jr.

ASSISTANT COACHES

USC's continuity in 2008 should be helped because the coaching staff remained intact from 2007, except for the loss of secondary graduate assistant Demetrice Martin (he was replaced by former Trojan and NFL cornerback **Kris Richard**). USC's holdovers maintained their same job responsibilities as in 2007: **Steve Sarkisian** (assistant head coach/offensive coordinator/quarterbacks), **Nick Holt** (defensive coordinator/defensive line), **Todd McNair** (running backs/special teams coordinator), **Pat Ruel** (offensive line), **Brennan Carroll** (tight ends/recruiting coordinator), **Ken Norton Jr.** (linebackers), **Rocky Seto** (secondary), **David Watson** (defensive line), **John Morton** (passing game coordinator/wide receivers) and **Yogi Roth** (quarterbacks graduate assistant). Holt is among 5 finalists for FootballScoop.com's 2008 Defensive Coordinator of the Year Award.

IN THE NFL

USC is always well-represented in the NFL. At the start of training camp this summer, there were 44 ex-Trojans on NFL rosters. Last year, there were 27 Trojans on opening day NFL rosters, including players such as RB Reggie Bush, Justin Fargas and LenDale White, LBs Junior Seau and Lofa Tatupu, DLs Willie McGinest, Shaun Cody, Mike Patterson and Kenechi Udeze, QBs Carson Palmer and Matt Leinart, WR Steve Smith and Keary Colbert, DBs Troy Polamalu, Sammy Knight and Brian Kelly and OL Taitusi Lutui and Ryan Kalil. Five NFL head coaches have USC ties (either as former players or assistants): Jacksonville's Jack Del Rio, Tennessee's Jeff Fisher, Seattle's Mike Holmgren, San Diego's Norv Turner and Detroit's Rod Marinelli. Also, there's a former Trojan as head coach in the Arena League (Pat O'Hara of the Los Angeles Avengers). Fifteen current USC players have relatives with NFL playing backgrounds: PK **David Buehler** (uncle, George Buehler), WR **Brice Butler** (father, Bobby), S **Kevin Ellison** (brother, Keith Ellison), TE **Rhett Ellison** (father, Riki Gray Ellison), TB **Broderick Green** (half-brother, Greg Wesley), OG **Khaled Holmes** (brother, Alex), OT **Nick Howell** (father, Pat Howell), OT **Matt Kalil** (brother, Ryan), C **Abe Markowitz** (cousin Jesse Sapolu), LB **Clay Matthews** (grandfather, Clay Matthews Sr.; father, Clay Matthews; uncle, Bruce Matthews), S **Taylor Mays** (father, Stafford Mays), DT **Fili Moala** (cousin, Haloti Ngata), LB **Malcolm Smith** (brother, Steve Smith), SNP-TE **Cooper Stephenson** (father, Curt) and TB **Marc Tyler** (father, Wendell Tyler). Myke Horton, father of S **Shane Horton** and DE **Wes Horton**, played in the USFL and CFL, while OT **Matt Kalil's** father, Frank, played in the USFL. Additionally, head coach **Pete Carroll** was an NFL head coach and assistant coach, and assistants **Todd McNair**, **John Morton**, **Pat Ruel** and **Steve Sarkisian** were NFL assistants. Five assistant coaches played professionally: **Ken Norton Jr.**, **Todd McNair** and **Kris Richard** were in the NFL, while **Steve Sarkisian** was in the CFL and **John Morton** was in the CFL and NFL Europe.

ACADEMICS

Among the top scholars on the 2008 Trojan squad are: PK **Jordan Congdon** (3.48, American studies and ethnicity), QB-WR **Garrett Green** (3.43, business administration), OG-C **Jeff Byers** (3.27, business administration), QB **Mark Sanchez** (3.14, communication), LB **Clay Matthews** (3.06, international relations), FB **Adam Goodman** (3.05, public policy, management and planning), DT **Christian Tupou** (3.02), C-OG **Garrett Nolan** (3.00, public policy, management and planning), TE **Rhett Ellison** (2.97, international relations), PK **Joe Houston** (2.95, sociology), CB **Matthew Jordan** (2.93, communication), CB **Daniel Harper** (2.92, business administration), LB **Nick Garratt** (2.90, history), OT-C **Michael Reardon** (2.88), WR **Spencer Vigoren** (2.85), S **Robert Erickson** (2.83, business administration), SNP-TE **Cooper Stephenson** (2.81, public policy, management and planning), C **Kristofer O'Dowd** (2.80), PK **David Buehler** (2.76, public policy, management and planning), P **Greg Woideck** (2.76, business administration) and LB **Dan Deckas** (2.76, public policy, management and planning). Byers made the 2007 Pac-10 All-Academic second team and Sanchez made honorable mention. Matthews made the 2006 Pac-10 All-Academic second team. In its history, USC football has produced 22 Academic All-American first teamers (tops in the Pac-10 and among the Top 10 in the nation), 20 NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners, 12 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athletes, 5 NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winners, 4 NCAA Today's Top Six winners, 1 Rhodes Scholar and 1 Academic All-American Hall of Famer.

Austin is 12th nationally in all-purpose running (163.8, second in Pac-10). Senior TB **Kahlil Bell** (126 tcb, 358 yds, 2.8 avg, 7 TD in 2008, plus 9 rec, 44 yds, 4.9 avg) is the top ground-gainer, joined by frosh TB **Derrick Coleman** (52 tcb, 285 yds, 5.5 avg, 2 TD in 2008, plus 4 rec, 13 yds, 3.2 avg). The Bruins' defense, which ranks second nationally in pass defense (158.5, second in Pac-10), is led by the likes of junior LB **Reggie Carter** (76 tac, 4.5 for loss, 3 FF in 2008), junior CB **Alterraun Verner** (67 tac, 2.5 for loss, 2 int, 16 dfl, 1 FF in 2008), senior S **Bret Lockett** (59 tac, 3 for loss, 2 dfl, 1 FR, 1 FF in 2008), senior DT **Brigham Harwell** (52 tac, 6 for loss, 1 sack, 2 dfl, 1 FR, 1 FF in 2008) and freshman S **Rahim Moore** (52 tac, 3 int, 4 dfl, 2 FR in 2008). UCLA's specialists are nationally ranked: senior P **Aaron Perez** (44.5 avg in 2008) is seventh in punting (44.5, first in Pac-10) and soph PK **Kai Forbath** (20-of-21 PAT, 19-of-22 FG in 2008) is fifth in field goals (1.7, first in Pac-10).
