STADIUM IMPROVEMENTS ★ SEEKING SIXTH WIN

VANDERBILT STADIUM GETS FRESH LOOK; PHASE I CONSTRUCTION WORK COMPLETE

Enthusiastic Commodore fans attending home games this season are seeing the first substantial improvements to Dudley Field and Vanderbilt Stadium in more than a decade.

Construction crews completed Phase 1 work on Vanderbilt Stadium in late August. The result is a clean, refurbished look for the stadium, built in 1981.

The completed construction is the first of five phases outlined in a \$60 million athletic facility enhancement plan. The project was announced last winter by Vanderbilt Vice Chancellor of University Affairs and Student Athletics David Williams II.

Among the football stadium improvements completed in the Phase I work are:

- New brick exterior renovation to south end of stadium facing McGugin Athletic Center and Jess Neely Drive. The work extends the brick facade included at the adjacent Hawkins Baseball Field.
- Painting of stadium exterior.
- Addition of new Vanderbilt Bookstore and Commodore Grille outlets on concourse.
- New eastside concourse artwork featuring Vanderbilt Athletics "It's Good To Be Gold" theme. The artwork includes action images of several recent Vanderbilt standouts, such as football players Jay Cutler, Earl Bennett and Chris Williams, golfer Brandt Snedeker, hoopsters Shan Foster and Chantelle Anderson, and baseball players Pedro Alvarez and David Price.
- New exterior signage and installation of large "Star V" logos on the press box structure.

Bobby Johnson's football team also benefited from the addition of FieldTurf artificial surface at its practice facility this summer.

Phase I construction also is aimed at enhancing both Memorial Gym and Hawkins Field. New men's and women's player locker rooms, and post-game press conference facilities are under construction at Memorial Gym, along with the installment of a new wooden gym floor. At Hawkins Field, work is under way to expand capacity with the addition of seating areas in left field and right field.

The facility project is expected to continue for several years. Phase II, expected to get under way after the 2008 football season, calls for total renovation of both stadium gates facing Jess Neely Drive, and the continuation of the brick exterior facade down Natchez Trace. Work on the long-anticipated Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame also is expected to start after the season.

The project also calls for future construction of new football player locker and meeting rooms, and expanded training and academic support facilities.

'DORES LOOKING FOR FOURTH SEC WIN

Vanderbilt will be looking to capture a fourth win in SEC play for the first time in 26 years when Florida invades Nashville.

The Vanderbilt record of five wins in SEC play came in the infancy of the league (5-1 in 1935). The Commodores have notched four conference wins in just five other seasons: 1982 (4-2), 1955 (4-3), 1949 (4-4), 1948 (4-2-1), 1938 (4-3) and 1937 (4-2).

The last two times Vanderbilt won four SEC games, a postseason appearance followed: the Hall of Fame Bowl in 1982 and the Gator Bowl in 1955.

The Commodores have never reached four wins in the SEC since the league went to divisional play in 1991.

Vanderbilt currently shares the SEC Eastern Division lead with Georgia after early-season victories against South Carolina (24-17, Sept. 4), Ole Miss (23-17, Sept. 20) and Auburn (14-13, Oct. 4).

COMMODORES SEEKING SIXTH WIN

Vanderbilt looks to reach six wins in a season for the first time in more than two decades Saturday when it faces Florida.

The Commodores are looking to reach six wins for the first time since going 8-3 en route to the 1982 Hall of Fame Bowl.

Last Saturday, the Commodores were unable to reach 6-1 for the first time since 1950 when they fell at Georgia 24-14. Only eight teams in Vanderbilt football history have reached 6-0 to start the season: 1928, 1921, 1916, 1915, 1912, 1904, 1903 and 1897.

SUPPORTIVE CROWDS WATCH COMMODORES

An enthusiastic homecoming crowd of 38,270 watched Vanderbilt's 10-7 loss to Duke in Nashville on Oct. 25. The crowd continuing a strong showing by Commodore fans at the admission gates.

A sellout crowd of 39,773 watched Vanderbilt's 14-13 victory over Auburn on Oct. 4. More than 36,500 fans were in attendance in two earlier home wins – vs. South Carolina on Sept. 4 and vs. Rice on Sept. 13.

Through four games, the 'Dores are averaging crowds of 38,065. The figure marks 97.2% of capacity in Vanderbilt Stadium.

The Commodores' last two home games – vs. Florida this Saturday and Tennessee on Nov. 22 – are sold out.

Capacity in Vanderbilt Stadium was reduced in 2001 when a 1,500-seat bleacher section was removed from the north end zone.

VANDERBILT-FLORIDA NOTES

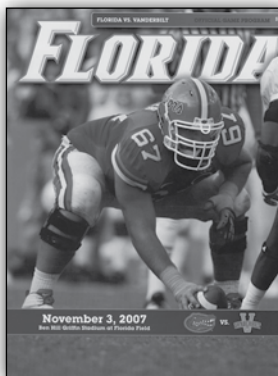
- ★ Florida has captured the last 17 games played between the schools, dating back to a 24-9 Vanderbilt victory in 1988. The Commodores are 7-13-1 all-time in games played on campus, having dropped the last eight encounters in Nashville.
- ★ Vanderbilt controlled the series in its infancy, winning five of the first seven games played between the schools from 1945-1955.
- ★ From 1974-1988, Vanderbilt captured three of six games played in the series. All three victories came in Nashville.

KEY GAMES IN THE FLORIDA SERIES

- ★ **2005** Most competitive game between teams in last decade saw Vanderbilt rally behind arm of QB **Jay Cutler**, who passed for 361 yards and four TDs in Gainesville. TV audience saw controversial celebration penalty after Cutler-to-**Earl Bennett** TD pass, negating two-point conversion chance for Commodores to win in regulation.
- ★ **2002** Trailing 21-10 at halftime on cold, windy day, **Jay Cutler** leads rally against Rex Grossman-guided Gators. The 'Dores drop 21-17 home decision by failing to score on final four possessions.
- ★ **1988** The Commodore defense, paced by LB **Bill Cunningham**, comes up big before sellout crowd, intercepting two Florida passes, forcing a fumble and limiting the Gators to 275 total yards in 24-9 Vanderbilt victory.
- ★ **1982** QB **Whit Taylor** completes 30 passes for 287 yards and three TDs, but OT **Rob Monaco** saves the day in 31-29 win over No. 14 Florida by recovering Vanderbilt fumble in endzone for score.
- ★ **1974** Reserve QB **David Lee** leads 'Dores to 24-10 victory over No. 8 Florida, hitting TE **Barry Burton** on five passes, including one for a TD. Vanderbilt defense also comes up big in early-season win.
- ★ **1955** Vanderbilt completes just three passes but rushes for 264 yards and three TDs to push regular season winning streak to six. QB **Don Orr** and RB **Charley Horton** guide the way in Commodores' 21-8 win. The team eventually returns to Florida to play Auburn in the Gator Bowl.
- ★ **1949** The only game ever played between the teams in Jacksonville started with a bang as Vanderbilt's **Lee "Long Gone" Nalley** returned the opening kick 97 yards for a TD. The lead change five times, with All-SEC back **Herb Rich** scoring the winning TD. The 'Dores capitalized on four Florida lost fumbles to notch a 22-17 victory.

GAINESVILLE, Fla. – Tim Tebow accounted for five touchdowns, Percy Harvin became the first player in school history with 100 yards rushing and receiving in the same game, as No. 18 Florida beat Vanderbilt in Gainesville.

Tebow and Harvin helped the Gators stay in the hunt for the Southeastern Conference Eastern Division title. Tebow connected on 22 of 27 passes for 281 yards and three touchdowns. He also rushed for a pair of scores in an impressive performance in front of a

sellout home crowd.

Vanderbilt looked like it might get back in the game to start the second half, recovering an onside kick to open the third quarter, but the Commodores had to settle for a field goal. They got the ball right back when Reshard Langford intercepted a pass from Tebow, but they failed to convert on fourth down.

COMMODORE NOTES

TWO 'DORE WINS VS. RANKED TEAMS

Vanderbilt faces Florida this Saturday trying to defeat a third ranked opponent in the same season for the first time in team history.

Earlier this year, the Commodores defeated ranked Auburn and South Carolina in Vanderbilt Stadium. In a third game vs. a ranked opponent, Vanderbilt lost at No. 13 Georgia 24-14.

On Oct. 4, the Commodores defeated No. 13 Auburn 14-13 in front of an ESPN national audience and capacity crowd. On Sept. 4, the 'Dores claimed a win over No. 24 South Carolina.

The victory over Auburn gave Vanderbilt two wins over ranked opponents in the same season since 1955 when No. 17 Kentucky was a 34-0 regular season victim and No. 8 Auburn fell in the Gator Bowl.

Since 2006, the Commodores are 4-7 against ranked opponents. Prior to 2006, Vanderbilt lost 51 straight games against ranked foes.

The win over South Carolina marked the first time in team history that Vanderbilt has defeated Top 25 teams in three straight seasons. The victory also was the Commodores' first home win over a ranked opponent since defeating No. 25 Ole Miss 31-9 on Sept. 19, 1992.

COMMODORE RESULTS ON ESPN

After going more than two decades without a victory on ESPN, the Commodores own a two-game win streak on the network after topping Auburn last Saturday 14-13.

Vanderbilt also opened the season on ESPN, defeating South Carolina 24-17 on Sept. 4.

While Vanderbilt was captured wins over Auburn and South Carolina this season on ESPN, the Commodores are still looking for its first victory ever on ESPN2. Vanderbilt is 0-7 all-time on ESPN2.

Before topping South Carolina, the 'Dores were winless in seven previous

ESPN appearances dating back to a 1984 game against LSU.

Vanderbilt is 3-0 this season in games aired by the family of ESPN stations. Vanderbilt defeated Miami (Ohio) 34-13 on ESPNU in its season opener on August 28.

FLORIDA RESIDENTS ON VANDERBILT ROSTER

Two likely Commodore starters – redshirt senior WR **George Smith** and junior CB **Myron Lewis** – are among 10 Florida residents on the Vanderbilt roster.

Smith, from Pembroke Pines southwest of Fort Lauderdale, is a productive Commodore receiver who carries an amazing story of achievement against the odds. Smith has recovered completely from a neurological disorder four years ago that caused temporary paralysis, severe weight loss, and months of rehabilitation. An offensive co-captain, Smith has returned to earn 30 career starts entering the Florida game.

In his second year as a starter, Lewis, from Pompano Beach, ranks among the SEC leaders in interceptions (3) and defended passes. He has 20 career starts at cornerback.

Other Floridians on the Commodore roster are WR **Andrew Diomande** (R-Sr., Miami), LB **Michael Garcia** (R-So., Jacksonville), TB **Ryan van Rensburg** (R-Fr., Jacksonville), TB **Jermaine Doster** (R-Fr., Tampa) and four first-year players: ATH **Archie Barnes** (Tampa); WR **Akeem Dunham** (Eustis); DB **Micah Powell** (Tarpon Springs); and DE **Johnell Thomas** (Orlando).

PREP TEAMMATES FACING OFF

Two Commodores – receiver/returner **Alex Washington** and defensive lineman **Johnell Thomas** – will face prep teammates when Vanderbilt and Florida Saturday.

Washington, a redshirt junior, and Gator junior starting DE **Jermaine Cunningham** were standouts at Stephenson H.S., in Atlanta. Washington returned recently just five months removed from knee surgery. Cunningham ranks among the Gators' top defensive players.

Johnell Thomas (Fr., DE) and Florida's **Jeremy Brown** (Fr., CB) were classmates at powerful Boone (Fla.) H.S., in Orlando. Thomas and Brown guided Boone to the 6A state title game. Thomas is red-shirting as a true freshman.

COMMODORE SUCCESS UNDER THE LIGHTS

Through eight games, the Commodores have enjoyed much better results playing under artificial lights than under the sun.

The Commodores are 5-0 in night games this year, including victories over SEC opponents South Carolina, Ole Miss and Auburn.

Vanderbilt is yet to win during the day, going 0-3 against Mississippi State, Georgia and Duke in consecutive weeks.

Since the 2005 opener, the Commodores are 13-4 while playing under the lights, including a 10-3 record in Vanderbilt Stadium. The team also has earned nine victories in its last 10 night games.

Other impressive Vanderbilt performances at night include road victories at Wake Forest and Arkansas in 2005, and a win over Ole Miss in 2007.

In 2005, the Commodores and Gators played a night classic in Gainesville, with Florida earning a hard-fought 49-42 double overtime victory.



COMMODORE NOTES

VANDERBILT ACTIVE CAREER LEADERS

Senior **Bryant Hahnfeldt** is the only active player to hold a Commodore career record. A four-year starter as the Commodore placekicker, Hahnfeldt became the Vanderbilt all-time scoring leader earlier this season. He has 228 points.

Other current players ranking among the team's all-time Top 10 are **Chris Nickson** (total offense, 6th; touchdown passes, 8th; pass attempts, 8th; completions, 8th; passing yards, 9th); **D.J. Moore** (kickoff return yardage, 9th); **Moore** and **Reshard Langford** (interceptions, T-7th).

COMMODORE SHOWING RED ZONE EFFICIENCY ON BOTH SIDES OF SCRIMMAGE

One key to Vanderbilt's 5-3 record is the Commodores' success in red zone situations on both sides of the line of scrimmage.

The Commodores are among the national leaders in red zone categories on both sides of the ball, just like their opponent this week, the Florida Gators.

The Commodore offense ranks second behind Florida in converting red zone opportunities into points. Through eight games, Vanderbilt has converted red zone changes at a 92 percent clip (22 of 24).

In Vanderbilt's last game, the Commodores failed to success

inside 20-yard line on its only possession against Duke.

On defense, Vanderbilt ranks second behind the Gators in red zone efficiency, limiting opponents to points at a 60% clip (15 of 25 possessions). The defense limited Duke to a lone field goal in four red-zone chances.

The Commodore success also extends to producing – and limiting – touchdowns in the red zone. The offense has notched 17 touchdowns in its 24 red zone tries. The 71% touchdown success rate including 11 rushing scores and six TD passes. Commodore opponents have scored TDs on just 10 of 25 red zone possessions (four rushing/six passing). The 40% TD success rate by opponents ranks second nationally behind Florida State.

The Commodore opponent this week is the only team in the NCAA to top Vanderbilt in red zone success. Florida leads the nation in both key categories, converting offensive possessions at a 97% rate (33 of 34) and limiting opponents to a 59% rate of success (13 of 22).

The Commodores struggled in both categories one year ago, producing points at a 70% rate, while allowing opponents to score on 83% of red zone opportunities.

LOOKING FOR FOURTH HOME WIN

The Commodores look for their fourth victory in five games this season at Vanderbilt Stadium when it hosts Florida Saturday.

Vanderbilt, 5-3 overall, captured home victories over South Carolina (24-17, Sept. 4), Rice (38-21, Sept. 13) and Auburn (14-13, Oct. 4) to open the season, marking the first time since 1982 that the Commodores won their its three home games. The 1982 squad went 6-0 in Vanderbilt Stadium enroute to the Hall of Fame Bowl, becoming the first Commodore squad to enjoy an undefeated/untied home campaign since 1955.



COMMODORE NOTES

VANDERBILT FORMULA FOR SUCCESS: OPPORTUNISTIC OFFENSE; FORCING TURNOVERS

If Vanderbilt hopes to defeat the powerful Gators for the first time since 1988, the 'Dores must return to its winning formula of stellar defense, opportunistic offense, positive turnover margin and solid special teams.

The Commodores used the formula to win five consecutive games to open the season. In its last three games, Vanderbilt has lacked one or more pieces of the formula while dropping close decisions to Mississippi State, Georgia and Duke.

Turnover margin demonstrates the

Commodores' tale of two seasons. Through five games, Vanderbilt topped the nation in turnover margin, forcing nine more turnovers than it committed. In the last three losses, the Commodores have committed four more turnovers than they have forced. Late interceptions have ended comeback threats against Mississippi State and Duke. In the three-game span, Vanderbilt has fallen from No. 1 to No. 33 nationally in a category now topped by the Gators.

A lack of turnovers in recent games has

hindered the Commodores' ability to score points. After averaging 22.6 points in the five wins, Vanderbilt is averaging just 11.7 points in its last three games.

Vanderbilt also needs to return to excellent special teams play. A unit that opened the season among the NCAA leaders in virtually every statistical category has cooled. Vanderbilt's kickoff and punt return averages have dipped and the squad's last converted field goal came more than a month ago – in the Commodores' victory at Ole Miss.

VANDERBILT DEFENSE PLAYING EFFECTIVELY

The Commodore defense has continued its excellent overall play despite the team's current three-game losing streak.

The unit performed in stellar fashion in Vanderbilt's 10-7 loss to Duke, limiting the Blue Devil offense to just 250 total yards. The Blue Devils rushed for just 28 yards, the lowest total allowed by the Vanderbilt defense this season.

The Commodore defensive effort came in the face of plenty of Duke pressure. The Blue Devils started four drives inside the Vanderbilt 35-yard line, including three possessions inside the Commodore 20-yard line. Those threats led to just three Blue Devil points – a 42-yard field goal that resulted after a four-play drive lost nine yards. Duke also lost 49 combined yards on all four of the possessions.

Duke also managed just one drive of more than 10 plays – a 13-play possession in the second quarter that netted 27 yards.

The Commodore defense also responded with five quarterback sacks and five forced fumbles, though the unit could recover just one of the Blue Devils dropped balls.

SPECIAL TEAMS STRUGGLE IN DUKE GAME

Commodore special teams performed poorly in Vanderbilt's narrow loss against Duke after being an area of strength for the squad for much of the season.

Virtually every special teams unit were involved in the disappointing performance. Placekicker Bryant Hahnfeldt, converting on nearly 80% of his field goals entering the game, missed from 34 and 43 yards. Punter Brett Upton, one of the SEC's best this season, had a punt blocked and netted just 32.2 yards on five other punts. Commodore returners averaged just 16 yards on two Duke kickoffs and totaled minus-1 yard on three Blue Devil punts.

Duke's winning three-point margin also followed a Commodore fumbled punt return.

The ineffective play on special teams caused Vanderbilt to struggle with field possession for virtually the entire game. The Commodores never started an offensive possession beyond their own 40-yard line. Seven of Vanderbilt's 14 drives began inside their own 20-yard line.

COMEBACK COMMODORES: FIVE WINS AFTER FACING DEFICITS

The Commodores' path to a 5-3 record has followed a familiar trail: to various ways to overcome deficits.

Bobby Johnson's squad has faced deficits in every game this season, yet managed to find ways to register five victories and just one loss.

After capturing five straight comeback wins, the Commodores could not duplicate the feat at Mississippi State, vs. Georgia or against Duke.

In each of Vanderbilt's five wins, the Commodores have put together a string of unanswered points to prevail. In four of the five eventual wins, Vanderbilt trailed by at least a touchdown.

- Against Auburn, the Commodores fell behind 13-0 early in the first quarter after the Tigers drove 49 yards for an early touchdown and turned Vanderbilt's only turnover of the game into a second touchdown.

After the second Auburn score, the Commodore offense came together behind reserve QB Mackenzi Adams and the defense stiffened. While Adams directed two scoring drives and accounted for more than 200 yards of total offense, the defense limited Auburn to less than 100 yards of total offense during the last three quarters.

- At Ole Miss, the Commodores twice trailed by 10 points, 10-0 and 17-7 in the first quarter before coming back to record a 23-17 victory. The Vanderbilt offense provided three possessions that resulted in Bryant Hahnfeldt field goals after the first quarter, the defense held Ole Miss without points for the final three quarters.

- On three occasions during the first half, the Rice Owls took a seven-point lead on the Commodores before Vanderbilt reeled off 24 straight points to secure a 38-21 decision.

- In its SEC opener, Vanderbilt trailed South Carolina 10-3 at halftime, then scored 21 unanswered points to take a 24-10 margin en route to an eventual 24-17 win.

- In the opener at Miami, the Commodores trailed 3-0 early before putting together a 17-0 stretch to take the lead for good.

Johnson's Commodores have also ended Vanderbilt losing streaks to numerous established coaches, including Steve Spurrier of Duke/Florida/South Carolina, Phillip Fulmer of Tennessee, Mark Richt of Georgia, and Tommy Tuberville of Ole Miss/Auburn.

'DORE HIGHLIGHTS FROM DUKE GAME

Sean Walker (R-Sr., WR) produced a career outing against the Blue Devils, catching six passes for 138 yards and one TD.

It marked Walker's first career effort of 100+ receiving yards, and the first by a Commodore receiver since Earl Bennett had 100 receiving yards vs. Ole Miss on Sept. 15, 2007.

Walker and QB Mackenzi Adams hooked up for a 79-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter. It was a career long for Walker and Adams, equal to the No. 9 in team history, and the longest pass since Jay Cutler and Brandon Smith hooked up for a 80-yard TD vs. Tennessee in 2004.

Brandon Barden (R-Fr., TE) also came up with receiving career highs, catching five passes for 53 yards.

Walker and Barden are the team top receivers with 23 and 18 catches, respectively.

Chris Marve (R-Fr., LB) played one of the finest games of his young Vanderbilt career, contributing 16 total tackles, including 10 solo stops. Marve's tackle total is a team high for the Commodores this season.

Marve also contributed 2.5 tackles for loss, a 6-yard QB sack and the team's lone forced fumble recovered by Commodore teammates. The sack and forced fumble stopped a late Duke drive inside the Vanderbilt 10-yard line.

UPSON CONTINUES STRONG PUNTING DISPLAY

Junior **Brett Upson** is performing like an All-SEC punter.

Upson has been on a roll. He was named SEC Specialist of the Week for the second time this year after his performance at Georgia. Upson averaged 44.6 yards on seven punts against Georgia. Upson also was the SEC's top specialist in September for a superb outing against Auburn.

Upson is averaging a career-high 40.2 yards. His net average of 36.9 yards ranks fourth in the SEC and 28th in the NCAA. He has eight punts of 50 yards or more, and has succeeded in pinning opponents inside their 20-yard line at an 38.8% rate.

SECOND HALF SUCCESS KEY TO 5-3 RECORD

The Commodores' 5-3 record has been keyed by scoring success after intermission.

Vanderbilt has outscored its first five opponents 79-37 in the second half. The Commodores hold a 41-17 scoring advantage over its opponents in the fourth quarter.

The Commodore defense has held three of its last five opponents – Rice, Ole Miss and Auburn – scoreless after intermission. Georgia scored 10 second half points while Mississippi State notched two TDs after halftime. Duke notched a lone field goal after intermission.

The Vanderbilt defense didn't allow a third quarter touchdown until the Mississippi State game. Prior to playing in Starkville, the only third-quarter points allowed this season was a field goal by Miami (Ohio) in the opener.

D.J. MOORE: MR. VERSATILITY

D.J. Moore (Jr., CB/KR) continues to affirm his status as one of the nation's most versatile and productive players.

Named First Team All-SEC by the Associated Press last year, Moore was all over the field at Georgia. On defense, he topped the team in tackles and intercepted a pass. On offense, Moore saw action as a wide receiver on more than a dozen plays, rushing twice for 14 yards. He also added a 25-yard kickoff return and two punt returns.

Against Duke, Moore added a new role, getting one snap at quarterback.

Moore (Broome H.S., Spartanburg, S.C.) is the SEC's only athlete this year to see action at five positions (CB, WR, QB, PR and KR) and serve as a four-way contributor (Def./Off./PR/KR).

Earlier this season, Moore singlehandedly shifted the momentum in games against Rice and Miami (Ohio) that eventually became Commodore victories. For most of the Vanderbilt win at Ole Miss, the Rebel offense decided to test other cornerbacks besides Moore. Against Auburn, Moore's versatility helped the Commodore defeat the Tigers for the first time in more than five decades.

Moore's activity on offense against Georgia was the most of his Commodore career. He was used as a rushing threat on rocket sweeps and as a receiving target, though he did not register a catch. One year ago, Moore was nearly a difference maker against Georgia, rushing twice for 48 yards, including one run for 39 yards.

Moore is the SEC's No. 3 punt returner with a 16.4-yard average.

While Commodore fans thought Moore was special in the season opener, he might have been more remarkable in the win over Rice. He accumulated 206 all-purpose yards on just seven touches against the Owls. It ranks as Moore's career high for all-purpose yardage.

Moore opened against Rice with a 39-yard kickoff return, then added 17 yards on his first punt return. One play later, Moore went 24 yards on a reverse, leading to Vanderbilt's first touchdown.

Moore took over the Rice game in the fourth quarter. After the Vanderbilt defense forced a Rice possession, Moore took the ensuing punt 67 yards to the Rice 1-yard line. On Rice's next possession, Moore stopped an Owl threat with an interception deep in Vanderbilt territory, returning the pick 31 yards.

Moore's performance at Miami was just as remarkable. In the span of 5:42 on the game clock, Moore intercepted a Miami pass attempt, forced a fumble on a quarterback sack that took the RedHawks out of field goal range, then returned the Miami punt 91 yards to the 1-yard line. The plays led to 10 points.

Against Miami, Moore contributed a 91-yard punt return – second longest in Vanderbilt history.

Moore focused on defense against South Carolina, contributing four tackles, including a 2-yard loss, and deflecting a pass that resulted in Reshard Langford's ninth career interception. In 2007, Moore was remarkable against the Gamecocks, earning National Defensive Player of the Week honors with two interceptions in a 'Dore 17-6 win.

Moore is under consideration for numerous honors, including the Jim Thorpe Award, Nagurski Trophy and Bednarik Award.

In 2007, Moore was one of the nation's top CBs, sharing the SEC lead with six INTs. He also was superb on kickoff returns, compiling a team-record 823 yards and averaging 25.7 yards a return.



COMMODORE NOTES

HAHNFELDT: TEAM'S ALL-TIME SCORER

Kicker **Bryant Hahnfeldt** (Sr., Nashville) has become the team's all-time leading scorer, earning national attention in the process.

Despite the achievements, Hahnfeldt has struggled in recent weeks, missing his last four field goal attempts.

He added a pair of PATs in the win over Auburn, but missed his only two field goal attempts, from 40 and 49 yards. Hahnfeldt's 49-yarder was blocked.

Hahnfeldt provided the winning points at Ole Miss, scoring the team's last nine points by hitting field goals from 34, 31 and 40 yards in the 23-17 victory. He was one of three kickers across the nation to earn weekly recognition from the Lou Groza Award committee after the performance against Ole Miss.

Hahnfeldt has with 228 career points, 19 more than the total accumulated by John Markham (1997-2000). Both were standout kickers at Montgomery Bell Academy, a school located 1.5 miles west of Vanderbilt.

Hahnfeldt has shared the team's Specialist of the Week honors in four of five games. He is 7-of-11 in field goals, including three beyond 40 yards. He is also 21 of 21 on extra point attempts.

Hahnfeldt holds the team record for PATs made with 108. He needs eight field goals to surpass Markham's school record of 47.

'DORES LIMITING PENALTIES

The Commodores top the SEC – and rank among the NCAA leaders – in both fewest penalties committed.

Vanderbilt is tied for ninth nationally by averaging just four penalties game. The Commodores' 35.1-yard average in penalty yardage is eighth best in the nation. In their most recent game, the 'Dores had three infractions for 33 yards against Duke.

Vanderbilt has been penalized for 37 yards or less in seven of eight games.

OFFENSE 0-3 ON FOURTH DOWN ATTEMPTS

Vanderbilt is the only NCAA FBS team that has yet to convert on a fourth down, missing on three attempts.

Vanderbilt went for just one fourth down conversion in its 5-0 start. The offense has been unsuccessful in lone attempts in recent losses to Georgia and Duke.

In 2007, the 'Dores were eight of 13 on 4th down tries through eight games).

Vanderbilt was selected as the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) on Oct. 6 after their 14-13 win over No. 13 Auburn.

It marked the second straight year that the organization has picked the Commodores as its top team of the week. In 2007, Vanderbilt was recognized after topping No. 6 South Carolina 17-6 in Columbia.

HAMILTON HAS CAREER GAME AT OLE MISS; SWEEPS NATIONAL WEEKLY DEFENSIVE HONORS

Safety **Ryan Hamilton** (R-Jr., Wycombe, Pa.) swept national defensive player of the week honors following a remarkable performance in the Commodores' 23-17 win at Ole Miss on Sept. 20.

Quite simply, Hamilton enjoyed a career of highlights in a single game, significant enough to earn him the Football Writers Association of America Bronko Nagurski and Walter Camp Foundation National Defensive Player of the Week honors. He was also named the Southeastern Conference's top defensive player, and earned similar recognition from *USA Today*.

Hamilton's performance included tying a school record with three interceptions. Hamilton was responsible for totally changing momentum in the game in the first quarter, taking his first pick 79 yards for a Commodore touchdown. It was the fourth longest interception return in team history, and the first returned for a touchdown since **D.J. Moore** accomplished the feat against Eastern Michigan in 2007.

Hamilton's third interception came as time expired and sealed Vanderbilt's first victory in Oxford, Miss., since 1999.

Hamilton's three interceptions might not be his top highlight from the outstanding performance. Early in the third quarter, Hamilton made a huge defensive play, stopping a Rebel runner inside the Vanderbilt 1-yard line on 4th and goal. Four plays later, Hamilton recovered an Ole Miss fumble near midfield following a Vanderbilt punt.

Hamilton, who became the second Vanderbilt defender to win the FWAA's weekly award this season, added a fumble recovery and had six tackles (four unassisted), including a goal-line stop that prevented a Rebel score.

Hamilton will be added to the 2008 Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List. The Bronko Nagurski Trophy will be presented to the best defensive player in college football on Dec. 7 by the FWAA and the Charlotte Touchdown Club at the Westin Hotel in Charlotte.

Florida running backs mentor **Kenny Carter** spent four years on the Vanderbilt staff prior to joining Urban Meyer's Gator staff.

Carter worked as running back coach during his tenure at Vanderbilt, working two years as the Commodores' recruiting coordinator under Bobby Johnson. He came to Johnson's staff after working at Penn State with Joe Paterno.

2008 SEASON TICKETS SOLD OUT

Vanderbilt football season ticket sales were at their highest levels in more than a decade, according to Commodore athletic officials.

Season ticket sales surpassed the 19,000-mark this season as officials announced Vanderbilt home sellouts against Auburn, Florida and Tennessee.

The total of 19,175 represents the most sold by Vanderbilt Athletics since 1996 when the home schedule included Notre Dame and Tennessee.

The 2008 sales level is well ahead of last year's final sales total of 15,191. In 2006 – the last year Vanderbilt hosted Tennessee, South Carolina and Florida on its Nashville campus – 11,367 season tickets were sold.

GRAHAM NOTCHES FIRST CAREER TD CATCHES

Jamie Graham (R-Fr., WR) made a name for himself in Memorial Gym last winter. This fall, he's quickly becoming a key Commodore on the gridiron.

Graham made two circus catches for touchdowns in Vanderbilt's 24-14 loss at Georgia on Oct. 18. The receptions, both from QB Mackenzi Adams, were the first touchdown catches for the versatile product of Whites Creek H.S. in Nashville.

Graham topped the team with four receptions and 46 receiving yards at Georgia. He added an 8-yard rush and two punt returns for 15 yards.

'08 OFFENSIVE LINE: 7 FIRST-TIME STARTERS

Vanderbilt has started eight different players along the offensive front this season – and seven have started for the first time ever.

The trend continued at Georgia when **Eric Hensley** (R-Jr., OG) and **Kyle Fischer** (R-Fr., OT) earned starting assignments.

The 'Dores entered the season with just one O-lineman (OG **Ryan Custer**) with any starting experience. He had three previous starts.

A YOUTHFUL COMMODORE STARTING SQUAD

One year after losing six players to NFL rosters, Vanderbilt Head Coach **Bobby Johnson** is playing a squad dominated by youth this season.

In Vanderbilt's loss at Duke on Oct. 25, the Commodore 22-player starting starting lineup included three seniors, 15 juniors, a sophomore and four redshirt freshmen.

JENNINGS WEARS KWANE DOSTER 'KD1' PATCH

This season, tailback **Jeff Jennings** (R-Sr.) became the second Vanderbilt player to wear the "KD1" jersey patch, one of the most significant recognitions awarded by the Commodore players.

The patch honors the memory of Kwane Doster, the only Commodore ever to receive the SEC Freshman of the Year Award. Doster was shot and killed in his hometown of Tampa, Fla., on Dec. 26, 2004. It was worn for the last two seasons by linebacker Jonathan Goff.

"It is a really big honor to wear the patch," Jennings said. "For the type of person Kwane (Doster) was, it is a real big honor to go out on the field and represent him.

"It means even more that I knew him and got to play with him. I really know what type of player and person he was, the type of work ethic he had and how much he wanted to win every game," Jennings added.

The team's Leadership Council votes on the player to wear the "KD1" patch. They recognized Jennings' leadership role and willingness to return from a serious knee injury suffered late in the 2005 season.

Jennings returned to action in the victory over Auburn after missing three games with an injury. He needs 63 yards to surpass 1,000 rushing yards for his career.

The Commodores will also be without freshman receiver **John Cole** for the rest of 2008. Cole suffered a knee injury at Miami and underwent surgery Sept. 10. He returned two punts for 23 yards against the RedHawks.

Linebacker **Brandon Bryant** (R-Jr.) will not return this season after undergoing recent surgery to correct a leg fracture that occurred during the offseason.

Senior safety **Reshard Langford** also has a pair of interceptions.

Langford and Moore leads all Commodores with 10 career interceptions each.

Junior nickelback **Darlon Speed** also is expected back against Florida after missing six games with a lower leg injury. Speed was hurt returning an interception against South Carolina.

BEHIND IN EVERY GAME

Despite carrying a 5-3 record into the Florida game, the Commodores have trailed all eight opponents this season. Teams are outscoring Vanderbilt 64-38 in the opening quarter.

FIRST-TIME COMMODORE STARTERS

Eric Hensley (OG, R-Jr.) and **Kyle Fischer** (OT, R-Fr.) became the 15th and 16th Commodore this season to earn his first career start when they were in the opening lineup at Georgia on Oct. 18.

There have been 10 first-time starters on offense and six on the Commodore defensive unit this season.

MORE ABOUT THE COMMODORES

SMITH – BEATING THE ODDS

WR **George Smith** continues to beat the odds. Vanderbilt's offensive co-captain and starting receiver was featured on ESPN.com this summer for his remarkable attitude and amazing recovery from a near-death experience in 2004.

In the last three years, the sixth-year senior from Pembroke Pines, Fla., has survived a serious ailment and gunshot attack to become a valuable starting receiver for the Black & Gold.

The fact that Smith is in uniform is remarkable. In April 2004, Smith was diagnosed with acute transverse myelitis, an illness that causing swelling of the spinal cord. For the next six weeks, Smith fought the illness in intensive care and eventually extensive rehabilitation. Smith returned to Vanderbilt the following semester, sat out the 2004 season, and finally received medical clearance during the 2005 preseason camp.

One of only three sixth-year players in the SEC this year, Smith has 81 career receptions, 1,045 career receiving yards and eight TDs.

After missing four games, Smith returned against Auburn, catching four passes for 48 yards.

JAMIE GRAHAM: TWO-SPORT STUDENT-ATHLETE

When **Jamie Graham** (R-Fr., Nashville) made his first appearance in a Commodore uniform as a WR starter against Miami, he earned the distinction of being the only SEC student-athlete who played basketball in 2007-08 to participate in football this year.

Graham continues to develop as an offensive weapon. He caught two TD passes at Georgia after posting his first career TD against Rice with a 27-yard rush. For the season, Graham has eight rushes for 59 yards and 10 receptions for 76 yards. He also averages 6.0 yards on punt returns.

Graham redshirted on the football team in 2007, but became an integral part of the Commodore men's basketball success last winter. After joining the hoops team after football ended, Graham became a fan favorite and defensive specialist in 15 appearances on the basketball court. He played important minutes down the stretch, helping the squad to a berth in the NCAA tournament.

Graham became the first Commodore to play both basketball and football since wide receiver Fred Baker did both in 1994-95.

SQUAD SERVED BY LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

Nine Commodores participate in the Leadership Council, serving as an entity that addresses team and student-athlete issues while acting as their teammates' voice in communicating with coaches.

Co-captains **Reshard Langford**, **George Smith** and **Bradley Vierling** are members of the Leadership Council.

Others voted by teammates to represent other various position groups include **Mackenzi Adams**, quarterbacks; **Steven Stone**, defensive line; **Jeff Jennings**, offensive backfield; **Jake Bradford**, receivers/tight ends; **Bryant Hahnfeldt**, specialists; and **Patrick Benoist**, linebackers.

KITCHINGS JUST THIRD CHANGE TO JOHNSON STAFF

First-year Commodore running backs mentor **Des Kitchings** represents just the third change to Coach Johnson's Vanderbilt staff in his tenure.

Johnson arrived at Vanderbilt with the belief that consistency on the coaching staff would lead to greater stability in the program and better chances for team success. He has taken the principle to heart: under Johnson, Vanderbilt has experienced the fewest coaching changes in the SEC. Both coordinators – Bruce Fowler (defense) and Ted Cain (offense) – also have the conference's longest tenures.

The coaching staff has multiple links dating back three decades to Johnson's initial year in collegiate coaching when he served as a defensive ends assistant at Furman. Johnson is just the fourth head coach in Vanderbilt football history to reach seven years of service.

COMMODORES CONTINUE ANCHOR 'UNITY' TRADITION

For the fourth straight year, Vanderbilt is traveling with an authentic anchor as a symbol of team unity. Prior to each game, two players are selected to carry the anchor to and from the Vanderbilt locker room on gameday, either at Vanderbilt Stadium or to the opponent's home stadium.

Originally, the anchor was developed by the team's Leadership Council as a way of demonstrating team unity among the squad.

Commodore players will be available upon request either Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday at the conclusion of practice.

Coach Johnson is available briefly to reporters at the conclusion of practice.

Media photographers are permitted to shoot the first 30 minutes of practice.

INAUGURAL VANDERBILT ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME CLASS

On Sept. 12, 2008, Vanderbilt Student Athletics administrators, loyal supporters and longtime friends of the program welcomed the inaugural Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame.

The distinguished 12-person class,

introduced during halftime of the Rice-Vanderbilt game on Sept. 13, was determined by a panel of Student Athletics administrators with input from various outside sources.

This winter, plans call for construction to

begin on Phase II of the Vanderbilt Athletic Facility Project, work that includes more enhancements to Vanderbilt Stadium and a Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame addition to McGugin Athletic Center.

Chantelle Anderson

Women's Basketball, 1999-2003

Chantelle Anderson is the most decorated women's basketball player in Vanderbilt history. The 6-6 Vancouver, Wash., native is the Commodores' only two-time Kodak All-American, the all-time leading scorer and was voted the school's Female Athlete of the Year three times. Anderson was a dominant inside force for the Commodores, concluding her career as the program's all-time leader scorer with 2,604 points.

Peggy Harmon Brady

Women's Golf, 1968-1972

She came to Vanderbilt after graduating from Central H.S. in Shelbyville, in an era when there was no varsity athletics for women. Out of the blue her sophomore year, Director of Athletics Jess Neely called to invite Harmon to represent Vanderbilt in the Intercollegiate. Perhaps Neely noticed she had won the USGA Junior Championship. While her pioneer story is inspiring, little did she realize that she was blazing a trail that her daughter, Chris, would follow decades later. They are the only mother-daughter All-Americans in school history.

John Hall

Football, 1951-1954

John Hall describes himself as an overachiever on and off the football field. The native of Knoxville was an under-sized defensive lineman who became Vanderbilt's first academic All-America in 1954, then enjoyed an enormously successful career that culminated as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Ashland, Inc., and president of the Vanderbilt Board of Trust.

Ryan Tolbert Jackson

Women's Track and Field, 1994-1998

A life-size photo of Ryan Tolbert Jackson dominates an entire wall of McGugin Center in recognition of her outstanding achievement as a track and field student-athlete. She is the only Commodore to ever win an individual NCAA championship., capturing the 400-meter hurdles with a meet-record 54.54 effort in 1997. She is a seven-time All-America recipient.

Roy Kramer

Director of Athletics, 1978-1990

A national champion football coach at Central Michigan, Roy Kramer arrived in Nashville in 1978. In a dozen years he energized Vanderbilt's athletic department with new facilities and popular coaches. By the time Kramer retired as SEC Conference Commissioner, many regarded him as the most powerful man in college athletics.

Clyde Lee

Basketball, 1963-1966

A tall and unpolished freshman from nearby Lipscomb High School enrolled in 1963 to play basketball for Coach Roy Skinner and Vanderbilt basketball was never the same again. Attendance boomed as fans flocked to watch "Colossal" Clyde Lee lead his team to 65 victories over three unforgettable seasons and establish himself as the standard by which all future Commodore stars would be measured. Old-timers call Memorial Gym's second and third tiers "the balconies that Clyde built."

Dan McGugin

Head Football Coach, 1904-1934

The winningest football coach in Vanderbilt history and one of college football's greatest innovators, Dan McGugin remains a legend more than seven decades after his death. When he finished his third decade as head coach of the Commodores, McGugin left behind a remarkable overall record of 197-55-10.

John Rich

Football-Baseball, 1945-1951

John Rich remembers being on the verge of expulsion from Vanderbilt University in the late 1940's and being given an unexpected second chance by the Dean of Students. He never forgot that golden opportunity and through the years as his coal business grew, he says he has tried to repay his beloved University with his time, by sharing his resources and lending his expertise. Rich also served the university for many years as a valuable member of the Vanderbilt Board of Trust.

Fred Russell

Baseball, 1925-1926; Nashville Banner Sports Editor, 1929-1998

Fred Russell was one of the great sports journalists of the 20th Century. Many admiring readers knew that. Fewer realized that he had played baseball at Vanderbilt. Mr. Russell covered and rubbed elbows with the legendary athletes of his day: his 25th anniversary at the paper was celebrated with appearances by Jack Dempsey, Bobby Jones and Red Grange. The press boxes of Vanderbilt Stadium (1982) and Hawkins Field (2002) are named in his honor.

June Stewart

Athletics Administration, 1973-1991

June Stewart joined the Vanderbilt athletic department in 1973 as a secretary in the sports information and National Commodore Club offices. By the time she retired 28 years later she was one of the most influential women in the Southeastern Conference. She also became the first female president of the College Sports Information Director of America (CoSIDA) organization.

Bill Wade

Football, 1949-1951

Bill Wade was Nashville's All-American boy. He was a prep legend, president of his Vanderbilt freshman class, a whiz on the gridiron where he became the No. 1 pick in the NFL Draft, a *Look Magazine* coverboy while a Commodore, and later quarterback of the world champion Chicago Bears. He was honored many times by many organizations, including the NCAA with its prestigious Silver Anniversary Award in 1976. Five decades after blazing a legacy on campus, Wade remains one of the school's most treasured student-athletes.

Perry Wallace

Men's Basketball, 1966-1970

Perry Wallace would have become a premiere Hall of Fame candidate even if he didn't make Southeastern Conference history by becoming the SEC's first African-American basketball player. Wallace was a star student-athlete, and left Vanderbilt as one of the greatest rebounders in team history. who went on to an outstanding career in law and education.
