HUSKY SWIMMING THROUGH THE YEARS



Peter Powlison garnered All-America honors in both 1943 and 1947 in the 50 and 100 freestyle and 400 freestyle relay.

The 2004-2005 season marks the 73rd year of the Husky swimming program.

Beginning in 1932-1933, under legendary coach Jack Torney, the Huskies went a perfect 5-0 in dual meet competition, setting the stage for what became a training ground for the nation's and the world's top swimmers.

Below are just some of the highlights of 72 years of Husky swimming.

All-American - The Husky swimming tradition boasts over 80 All-Americans in its rich 72-year-history. The total includes five men and four women who have earned All-American honors at least 10 times in their UW careers. The school's All-America success dates back as early as 1934 when future Olympian Jack Medica earned honors in three events and teammate Pete Dix was an All-American in the 150 back. Most recent honorees include Phil Davis in the 200 breaststroke (2004), Justin Adrian in the 100 butterfly (2004), Derek Rose, Davis, Adrian and Luke Ekhoft in the 400 medley relay (2004). The women's 200 freestyle relay, Kim Harada, Sharon Olson, Annette Vayo and Melody Staubitz (2003) earned All-America status as did Harada in the 50, 100 and 200 freestyle (2003).

All-Academic - A tradition just as rich as the All-American one, the UW has excelled both in and out of the pool. Since the Pac-10 Conference began its all-academic teams in 1990-91, over 90 Huskies have been named first, second and honorable mention honorees.

Last season, five women and seven men earned Pac-10 All-Academic honors.



Jody Braden's third-place finish in the 400 IM at the 1991 NCAA meet was the highest finish by a UW swimmer since 1975.

Academic All-American - Washington has earned three Academic All-America awards in the last four years. Last year John Lyssand was a first team selection with a 3.62 grade-point average. David Moilanen earned the award in both 2001 and 2002 to become the first Husky to receive the award since 1991. A double major in physics and chemistry, Moilanen had a 3.96 grade-point average and is a three-time school record-holder.

Arden, Irene - One of the most decorated women's swimmers in school history, Irene Arden set the standard for excellence by earning 19 All-American certificates from 1973-1976. Arden, a future Husky Hall of Fame Member (1985), also excelled on the international level, capturing gold at the 1973 World University Games in Moscow in the 100 butterfly and the 400 medley relay.

Backhaus, Robin - A two-time NCAA champion and Husky Hall of Fame member (1991), Robin Backhaus earned All-America honors 11 times in just two seasons at Washington. A 1972 Olympic bronze medalist, he captured back-to-back NCAA titles in the 200-yard butterfly during the 1974 and 1975 campaigns and still holds the school records in the 500 freestyle (4:22.91) and the 200 butterfly (1:47.04).

Backhaus also was ranked first in the world in the 200-meter butterfly in 1973 (2:03.32), which he set in winning the event at the world championships in Belgrade, Yugoslavia.

Baxley, Mary - Mary Baxley achieved All-America status 15 times in her Husky career, which spanned from 1975-1978. Baxley was honored six times individually in both

sprint freestyle and butterfly events, while she earned All-America honors nine times as a member of the Husky relay squads.

Braden, Jody - A silver medalist in the 400 IM at the 1991 Pan Am Games, Jody Braden swam to All-America status four times at the NCAA championships from 1988-1991. The Seattle native's third-place finish in the 400 IM in 1991 was the highest finish by a UW swimmer since 1975.

Braden still holds UW records in the 200 (1:47.39) and the 400 (3:48.67) IM, while ranking in the all-time top 10 in three other events.

Buckley, Bob - A perfect dual-meet record of 4-0 highlighted the short head coaching career of Washington graduate Bob Buckley. Buckley took over for head coach Jack Torney (military service) for a brief stint in 1943, leading the team to a first-place finish in the Pacific Coast Conference (North). Buckley served as the team's diving coach from 1938-43 and then again beginning in 1946.

Carper, Stan - A 14-time All-American, Stan Carper (1972-1975) was a standout freestyle and individual medley swimmer, who still ranks among the top-10 all-time in the school's history in two events. Carper, a two-time team MVP and team captain in 1975, posted the second-fastest time in the world in 1973 in the 200 IM (2:08.43), earning a silver medal at the 1973 world championships in Belgrade, Yugoslavia.

Colella - To say that swimming runs in their blood might just be an under statement for the most well-known and accomplished family in Husky swimming history,

the Colella's. Siblings Rick, Lynn, Pete and Steve Colella all earned All-America honors while at UW from 1969-1990.

Lynn Colella (1969-72), the eldest of the four, won a silver medal at the 1972 Olympics in Munich, Germany, in the 200 butterfly, the same year she won All-America certificates in five events for the Huskies. The nine-time U.S. national champion also earned bronze medals for her third-place finishes in the 200-meter breaststroke and 200 butterfly at the 1973 world championships.

Two-time Olympian Rick Colella (1970-73) followed closely in his sister's footsteps, grabbing a bronze medal at the 1976 Olympics in Montreal in the 200 breaststroke after finishing fourth in the same event in 1972. At UW, Rick Colella was one of three men's swimmers to earn All-America honors in the same event all four years (200 breaststroke), while attaining All-America status 15 times. The seven-time U.S. national champion also won 10 medals, five of which were gold, at the world championships (1973, 1975), Pan American (1971, 1975) and World University Games (1970).

While not as successful as their siblings on the international level, Steve (1972-1976) and Pete (1985-1990) Colella both earned All-America honors once during their Washington careers. Steve Colella was a member of the All-America 400 medley relay in 1974, while Pete Colella was tabbed for the same honor in the 100 breaststroke in 1989.

Ellis, Earl - A cornerstone of the Husky program for 30 years, head coach Earl Ellis' (1970-98) name became synonymous with swimming in the Pacific Northwest. At UW, Ellis led the men's squad to a 215-45 (.827) dual-meet record, while coaching the women's team since its inception in 1976, finishing at 203-27-2 (.879).

During his tenure, Ellis trained seven Olympians, three of whom were medalists, and six national champions. He also coached nearly 60 swimmers to All-America status, including 19-time honoree Irene Arden and 15-time All-American Rick Colella.

The Ellis family name does not stop there, however, as all three of his children - Robin, Duffy and Jana - are former Husky swimming letterwinners. Jana Ellis, who was a seven-time All-American in her two years at UW, also served as an assistant coach for four years.

Gold Medals - Two former Huskies have won one of athletics greatest honors - an Olympic gold medal. Jack Medica, a nine-time NCAA champion, earned the first at the Games in Berlin, Germany, returning as the only American swimmer to win a gold medal (400 freestyle) at the 1936 Olympics.

Some 36 years later, Rick DeMont won a gold medal at the 1972 games in Munich, Germany, in the 400-meter freestyle. Demont, now an assistant coach at Arizona, was later stripped of the medal after it was discovered that he had unknowingly taken an asthma medication containing the banned drug ephedrine.

Hall of Famers - Seven former swimmers and the Huskies first head coach, Jack Torney, have been inducted into the Husky Hall of Fame. Lynn Colella Bell was the first to be inducted in the 1980 class, while Jack Medica and Torney followed in 1981. Other inductees include: Rick Colella (1982), Irene Arden (1985), Peter Salmon (1990), Robin Backhaus (1991) and Steve Power (1995).

Hislop, Jo - Jo Hislop earned 15 All-America certificates from 1974-76, tying her for second most in Husky women's swimming history with teammate Mary Baxley. A force in the middle distance freestyle, Hislop was a key member of nine relay teams that went onto achieve All-America status. Hislop also served as team captain in 1976 and 1977, earning the team's first Most Inspirational Award given in 1976.

Husky Pool - The home of the UW swim program, Husky Pool served as the Northwest's premier swim complex until the Weyerhaeuser King County Aquatic Center was built for the 1990 Goodwill Games. The pool, which was partly constructed with funds gained from Washington's share in the 1937 Rose Bowl, was the site of two NCAA championships in 1947 and 1961. The original cost of the pool was \$206,000, and it officially opened for the 1938-1939 season.

Hodges, Merrill - One of three divers to ever earn All-America honors for the Huskies, Merrill Hodges (1950-53) did so on both the one and three-meter boards from 1951 to 1953. A two-time Nebraska state high school champion, Hodges earned team rookie MVP honors as a freshman in 1950 and went undefeated in dual competition all four seasons.

International - Over the program's 71-year history a number of UW swimmers have made their marks in the international arena. Nine different Husky swimmers have earned medals at international competitions (other than the Olympics) including the Pan American Games, the world championships and the World University Games.

Kirkland, Eric - Eric Kirkland became the Huskies' third head coach in program history, leading the 1944 team to a 5-1 record in a season that was shortened due to

World War II. Kirkland had been a former Husky swimmer himself on the first freshmen swimming team in 1933, swimming the 100 and 220-yard freestyle events Kirkland coached until the return of coach Jack Torney from military service in October 1945. Kirkland later went on to become the swimming coach at the University of Idaho from 1947-58.

Lautman, Scott - A six-time All-American, Scott Lautman's (1972-75) swimming career took him across the globe for some of the world's top meets. Lautman's travels took him to the 1973 Tilt International meet in Paris, the 1974 Komsomolskya Invitational in Leningrad, USSR and the 1975 Grand Prix Circuit in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

Washington's most inspirational swimmer as a senior, Lautman made the most of his unique experiences, taking away six medals, including two golds, two silvers and two bronze medals at the three meets.

McIntyre, Mike - The team's Most Improved swimmer as a freshman in 1972, Mike McIntyre kept improving so much that by the end of his stay at Washington in 1975, he finished as an 11-time American.

A team captain as a senior, mcintyre earned All-America honors four times in both the 100 backstroke, a specialty in which he still ranks sixth in the UW record books, and as a member of the team's 400 medley relay.

Medica, Jack - Washington's first All-America swimmer, Jack Medica (1934-36) was one of the most dominant swimmers in the world during the mid-1930s. Medica won three medals at the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin, earning a gold medal in the 400-meter freestyle and a silver in both the 1500 freestyle and as a part of the 4 x 200 freestyle relay.

A future Husky Hall of Fame honoree (1981), Medica claimed nine of Washington's 12 individual national championships, winning the 220 freestyle, the 440 freestyle and the 1500 freestyle three years in a row. His nine titles ties him for the third most career individual titles, trailing only Olympic greats Pablo Morales (11) and John Naber (10). Medica also won 12 U.S. National titles from 1933-39.

Medica was said to have been defeated only once during his three-year career and broke five world records and four national collegiate records at his first National Swimming Championship in 1934. In his second national competition, Medica set two world records and one national record (220 freestyle), earning him the title "greatest college swimmer" by the National Coaches Association.

Mitchell, Barbi - A 1972 Olympian in the 200 breaststroke, Barbi Mitchell starred for the Huskies from 1978-1979, gaining All-America honors four times. Mitchell still ranks as the 10th-fastest Husky in the 200 breaststroke in 2:22.31.

Olympians - The Washington swimming program boasts seven former Olympians, including six medal winners. All-time great Jack Medica was the first UW swimmer to participate in the Olympics, winning three medals, including a gold, at the 1936 games in Berlin.

Six Huskies were members of the 1972 U.S. team in Munich, with five coming away with medals. Rick DeMont, who was later stripped of his medal (see "Gold Medals" glossary item), won the 400 freestyle race. Seattle native Lynn Colella then brought home a silver in the 200 butterfly, while Doug Northway (1500 freestyle) and Robin Backhaus (200 butterfly) earned bronzes.

Barbara Mitchell and Rick Colella both competed in the 200 breaststroke at the 1972 Games, but neither finished among the medal winners. Rick Colella, however, later redeemed himself with a bronze medal in the 200 breaststroke at the 1976 Olympics in Montreal.

Pac-10 - One of the toughest swimming conferences in the nation, the Pac-10 Conference annually fields some of the top collegiate teams in the nation, as well as many of the world's best swimmers.

The Huskies can claim three Pac-10 men's titles to their credit from 1976-78 and have had 28 swimmers earn at least one conference individual title.

Last season, Phil Davis captured Pac-10 titles in the 100 and 200 breaststroke events, setting a conference record in the 200 breaststroke.

Power, Steve - A future Husky Hall of Fame member (1995), Steve Power excelled in the distance freestyle and individual medley events, earning All-America honors 11 times.

A finalist in 10 individual NCAA events over his four-year career (1969-73), Power also was a finalist in the 400 IM at the 1972 U.S. Olympic Trials.

Salmon, Peter - The Victoria, British Columbia, native achieved All-America status in 1949 as a member of the 300-yard medley relay team before leaving school in 1950 to compete in the British Empire Games.

Returning a year later, Salmon became the school's 10th individual nation champion in the 150-yard IM. He also was tabbed an American the next two seasons in the 50 freestyle and 150-yard IM.

Tallman, John - A former UW swimmer and assistant coach under legend Jack Torney, John Tallman was the Huskies' fourth head coach from 1963-69.

Tallman, who graduated in 1951, led the UW to a pair of third place and five fifth-place finishes at the conference meet. His 1966-67 squad also placed 25th at the national meet.

Torney, Jack - A letterwinner in three sports during his undergraduate days, Jack Torney turned his attention to the UW swimming program, building it from scratch and serving as head coach for 26 years (1932-62).

Torney, who helped the Huskies to 19 Pacific Coast Conference titles, took only a two-year break from 1943-44 in the midst of World War II. Under his tutelage, 18 UW swimmers earned All-American honors, including Husky Hall of Famers Jack Medica and Peter Salmon.

Torney also served as the UW tennis coach for nine years, leading them to eight conference titles.

Wender, Mickey - On June 29, 1998, a new energy was brought into the Husky swimming program - that of current head coach Mickey Wender.

The sixth head coach in UW history, Wender has helped the team break at least 10 school records in each of his five seasons. The men's and women's programs have also boasted top 25 national rankings.

Wender's squads have had great success out of the pool. In 2001, David Moilanen became the first Husky to earn first team Academic All-America honors since 1991 and received the award again in 2002. The men's team has also been honored with the athletic department's

community service award, while the women's squad was tabbed for having the most school spirit.

Weyerhaeuser - The Weyerhaeuser King County Aquatic Center, the Huskies home away from home, is the site of a number of meets, including the Husky Relays, the Husky Invitational and the Washington Open.

Located in Federal Way, approximately 26 miles south of the UW campus, the Aquatic Center was built to accommodate the 1990 Goodwill Games swimming and diving events. The facility features eight nine-foot lanes 25-yards in length. Seating for up to 2,500 spectators and ample deck space for athletes and coaches, along with an Omega electronic timing device, makes this one of the finest aquatic arenas in the nation.

Women - Started as an intramural program in 1962, under head coach Earl Ellis, the women's team did not become an official varsity sport until 1975.

With All-Americans like Lynn Colella and Irene Arden setting the stage, the Huskies first official women's squad placed 16th overall at the national meet and claimed the first of seven consecutive conference titles from 1975-82.

Overall, 30 women have earned All-America honors for the Huskies.



Mickey Wender led both the men's and women's squads to top 25 national rankings last year. He also coached four All-Americans, including Kim Harada, Sharon Olson, Melody Staubitz and Annette Vayo.

W SWIMMING FACILITIES

HUSKY POOL

Husky Pool served as the Northwest's premier swim complex from 1937 until the Weyerhaeuser King County Aquatic Center was built for the 1990 Goodwill Games. The venerable Husky Pool, located on the east wing of Edmundson Pavilion, has hosted many significant competitions, including the 1947 and 1961 NCAA Championships.

Prior to 1937, the Husky men's swim team practiced and held meets at Hutchinson Hall on upper campus as far back as 1932. The UW, committed to providing the finest swimming pool of its kind, constructing Husky Pool with funds gained from Washington's share in the 1937 Rose Bowl game, augmented by state and federal grants. The official dedication took place Mar. 24, 1937, when the Huskies swept through all opposition to win their first Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division swimming title.

The ample spectator seating (1,000), functional locker rooms, intricate cleaning system, and standard pool dimensions made Husky Pool the toast of the swim world. It still is among the best dual-meet facilities in the Northwest.

The pool has changed with the times and now utilizes a computerized, electronic timing system that ensures accurate, instantaneous race results.



WEYERHAEUSER KING COUNTY AQUATICS CENTER

Serving as a second home for the Husky swimmers is a world-class facility, the Weyerhaeuser King County Aquatic Center.

Located in Federal Way, approximately 26 miles south of the UW campus, the Aquatic Center was built to accommodate the 1990 Goodwill Games swimming and diving events. The facility features eight nine-foot lanes 25-yards in length. Seating for up to 2,500 spectators and ample deck space for athletes and coaches, along with an Omega electronic timing device, makes this one of the finest aquatics arenas in the nation.

Washington utilizes this alternate venue for several meets each season, including the Husky Relays, Husky Invitational and Washington Open.
