## STEVE SHURINA

**WESTERN CAROLINA HEAD COACH • 5TH SEASON • ST. JOHN'S, 1988**

Steve Shurina, who signed a contract extension through the 2005-06 season this past February, is entering his fifth season as Western Carolina's head men's basketball coach. If the 2004-05 campaign is anything like last season, the Catamount faithful will be in for a fun ride.

Last year, the Catamounts started the season with a near upset in the season opener at Georgia, then nearly upset Big East member Virginia Tech. While those two losses were tough, it set the stage for an exciting run to the new year. Western would go on to win nine of its next 11 games, including an upset at Arkansas. Western's win over the Razorbacks marked the second Catamount win over a Southeastern Conference team in 28 chances. It was also the first win by a SoCon team over an SEC team since the 1996-97 season, a span of 73 games. However, already down one post player for the year as Rans Brempong was injured in the season opener, Western suffered another setback when junior Lunzaya Nlandu was lost for the season with an injury prior to the conference season.

While the Catamounts' season did not end as it started, there were still positives from the season. Most notably, Kevin Martin put Western on the map by ranking first or second nationally in scoring the entire season. Martin would end the year with his third All-Southern Conference selection in three years and second consecutive league scoring title. He also compiled 1,838 points through three seasons to rank fourth on the WCU all-time list, while ranking as the Catamounts' leading scorer since the school joined the NCAA Division I ranks for the 1976-77 season. Thanks to his impressive campaign, Martin entered the NBA draft and later became the first Catamount to be drafted in the first round of the NBA, NFL or Major League Baseball.

While Martin made headlines last season, redshirt senior Rans Brempong will leave his mark in the Southern Conference this season as he is on pace to shatter the league all-time record for blocked shots.

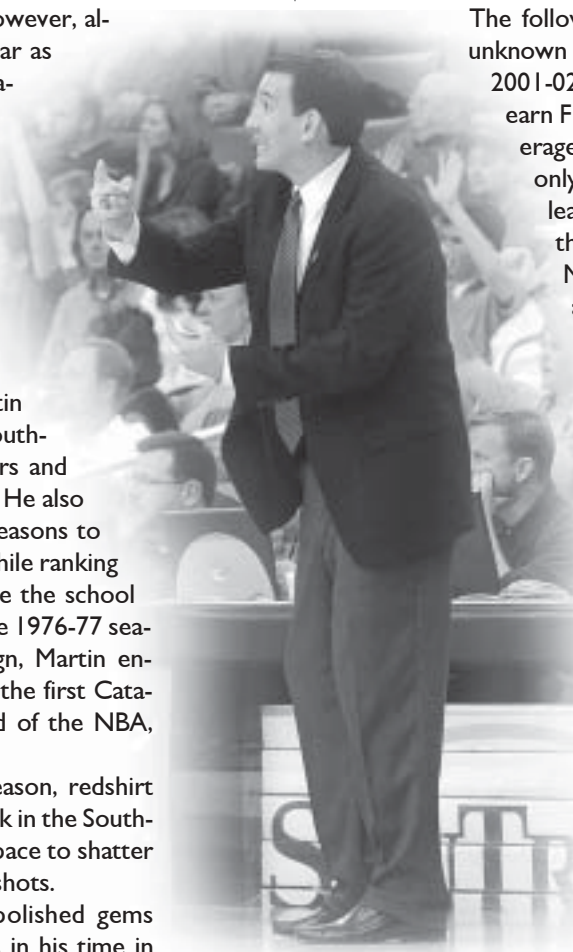
Martin was just one of several unpolished gems Shurina has developed into rare jewels in his time in

Cullowhee. First, then freshman and unknown to most, Brempong burst onto the national scene, ending the season ranked 13th nationally in blocked shots and being one of only two freshman among the NCAA's top 15 in the category. The 6-8 center additionally tied a Southern Conference freshman record with 93 blocked shots, ended the season tied for second on the league's single-season blocked shots list and set a school record for blocks in a season. Brempong, who went on to represent his native Canada at the World University Games in 2001, tallied 66 blocked shots in his sophomore season to become Western's all-time leader in the category. He once again led the SoCon in blocked shots as a junior, ranking 20th nationally, to move into third on the league's all-time list.

The following year, Shurina came across another unknown named Kevin Martin, who would finish the 2001-02 season 11th in the nation in scoring and earn Freshman All-American honors. Martin averaged over 22 points per game and was the only player in the SoCon to rank among the league leaders in field goal percentage, free throw percentage and 3-point percentage. Martin backed that performance up with another solid year in 2002-03, leading the SoCon and making 10th nationally in scoring. He also set a WCU single-season record for free throw percentage (88.3) to rank 20th in the NCAA for the season.

In 2001-02, the program doubled its win total both overall and in the Southern Conference, had breakthrough wins at Florida State and Kansas State, proved it could play with the league's best with wins versus co-champions Davidson and UNC Greensboro and ended an 11-game losing streak to Appalachian State.

In his first season at the helm, Shurina made a favorable impression. Under his direction, Cory Largent went from obscurity to star, earning All-Southern Conference honors, which was WCU's first such honor since 1998. Largent,





who only scored 497 points in his first two years combined, tallied 490 points in his junior season alone and ranked among the league leaders in scoring, rebounding and 3-point shooting.

The 38-year old Shurina brings a lot of experience, enthusiasm and energy to his position.

Prior to arriving in Cullowhee, Shurina served as an assistant coach at Vanderbilt University. Shurina helped the Commodores to a 19-11 overall record and a National Invitational Tournament (NIT) appearance. He worked extensively with Southeastern Conference Player-of-the-Year Dan Langhi.

Shurina is well versed in the high-caliber of play the Southern Conference has to offer, serving as an assistant coach at Davidson College for seven years — the last three seasons as Associate Head Coach (1996-99). While at Davidson, the Wildcats captured the 1998 Southern Conference championship, made one NCAA and two NIT tournament appearances, while winning three consecutive North Division titles. Davidson won 129 games, an average of 18 games per season, during Shurina's tenure.

He began his coaching career at Brooklyn College, where he received a master's degree in physical education and sports management in 1992.

As a player at St. John's during the mid-1980s, Shurina went to four NCAA tournaments, including the 1985 Final Four, as the Chris Mullin led Redmen lost to Georgetown in the national semi-final. He also was a member of St. John's 1986 Big East championship team and was captain of the 1988 squad as a senior.

A 1988 graduate of St. John's with a bachelor of science degree in criminal justice, Shurina was selected to the All-Big East Basketball Academic team in 1987 and '88. He also received the St. John's University McSwiney Award, which is presented annually to the senior male student-athlete that best typifies a St. John's man.

Following graduation, he played professionally for two years in the United States Basketball League (USBL), World Basketball League (WBL) and Continental Basketball Association (CBA). Shurina played under current Milwaukee Bucks head coach George Karl with the Albany Patroons in 1989.

Shurina and his wife, Mary-Kim, have three daughters, Alessandra (11), Gabriella (9) and Marianna Grace (6).

## MIKE CRAFT

**WESTERN CAROLINA ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH**  
**5TH SEASON • WINGATE, 1990**

This past summer, Western Carolina head men's basketball coach Steve Shurina announced that Mike Craft had been promoted to associate head coach. Craft, a native of Hickory, N.C., came to Western when Shurina joined the program in 2000 and the two begin their fifth season with

the Catamounts.

"Mike has been the rock in this program over the past four years," Shurina said. "He has done an excellent job in every facet, especially this past year as the recruiting coordinator. Also, we should have one of the best front courts in the league this coming year and the development of our post players can be directly attributed to Mike. He has been tremendously loyal to the University and the program and it will not be long before Mike is a head coach himself."

Prior to this past year, Craft was named Shurina's top assistant and took on added responsibilities, serving as the recruiting coordinator and coaching the post players. Under Craft's instruction, David Berghoefer became one of the top centers in the Southern Conference. After averaging just 2.7 rebounds and 3.5 points as a freshman, Berghoefer finished his sophomore year this past season leading the team and ranking fourth in the SoCon in rebounds (7.6 avg.). He additionally ranked second on the team and 18th in the league in scoring (12.4 avg.), while ranking 11th in the SoCon in field goal percentage (.522). Also, Western Carolina posted a 10-2 record with power forward Lunzaya Nlandu in the starting lineup, including an upset win at Arkansas, before Nlandu missed the second half of the season with an injury.

Craft came to Western in 2000, starting as the third assistant on the staff. Prior to instructing the post player, Craft worked with the Catamount guards, including NBA first-round pick Kevin Martin. Over the past four years, Craft has handled everything from film exchange, to team academics, to community service and camps to name a few. According to Shurina, "Mike has worn every hat an assistant coach can wear and done them all with excellence making his promotion an easy decision for me as well as well deserved for him."

In addition to his role on the Catamount basketball staff, Craft serves on the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Assistant Coaches Committee.

Craft was a four-year letterman at Wingate and graduated from the University in 1990. Upon graduation, Craft immediately became involved in coaching at the collegiate level.

He obtained his first coaching position as a graduate assistant at Appalachian State in 1990. He served in that capacity for two seasons before being promoted to restricted earnings coach in 1992. As restricted earnings coach his responsibilities included scouting, film exchange, travel and overseeing the ASU Mountaineer Basketball Camp. During his time in Boone, Craft worked with Billy Ross, who led the SoCon in scoring in 1992-93, and Junior Braswell, who is playing professionally in Spain. In all, Craft worked on the basketball staff at Appalachian State for four years (1990-94) before returning to his alma mater as an assistant coach for six seasons from 1994-2000.

Craft helped Wingate record its best season in school history during 1999-2000. Wingate, who led the nation in team scoring defense, finished the 1999-2000 season ranked seventh nationally in Division II, posting a 26-4 overall record, claiming the South Atlantic Conference tournament championship and advancing to the NCAA Tournament. In his last two seasons at Wingate, the team compiled a record of 49-10, reeled off a school-record 27-straight home wins, made two NCAA Tournament appearances and won a pair of regular-season conference titles, compiling a 27-1 home record over the span. Craft also helped bring to Wingate the likes of Lorinza Harrington, who now plays for the Denver Nuggets, and Paul Talbot, a Division II All-American.

Craft played his high school ball for his father, the late David W. Craft, who coached basketball at Hickory High for 13 years. During his high school career, Craft was a three-sport letterman and set the North Carolina state high school single-season free throw record, shooting 91 percent. This past summer, Craft married the former Crystal Hewett and the couple reside in Asheville.

## ANQUELL McCOLLUM

**WESTERN CAROLINA ASSISTANT COACH  
1ST SEASON • WESTERN CAROLINA, 2000**

In the summer of 2004, the Western Carolina basketball program welcomed back one of its all-time greats when head coach Steve Shurina announced the hiring of Anquell McCollum as assistant coach. McCollum, the consensus 1996 Southern Conference Men's Basketball Player of

the Year, enters his first season as an assistant coach.

"I am very excited to have Anquell be a part of our staff," Shurina said. "Obviously, he brings a wealth of experience in this region, being a former player and assistant director of admissions at Western Carolina. He was also part of a Southern Conference Championship. When I had a vacancy this past summer, there was no hesitation; Anquell was who I wanted to hire."

McCollum moves to the Catamount athletics department after spending the past year (2003-04) working as the assistant director of admissions for Western Carolina University. Prior to that, he worked one year as a computer skills teacher at Spring Lake (N.C.) Middle School and played professional basketball abroad from 1996-2000.

"This is a dream come true as far as being given the opportunity to come back to my foundation," McCollum said. "I am excited to be back here at Western Carolina University, as well as here in the Western part of North Carolina, as an assistant coach for the team which I truly love with all my heart. Most importantly, I am excited to mold and develop young student-athletes as champions both on and off the court."

McCollum, a native of Fayetteville, N.C., and a product of E.E. Smith High School, led Western Carolina to one of its most successful seasons in school history. After a 3-10 start to the 1995-96 season, including a loss to Division II Coker, the McCollum-led Catamounts rallied to win 11 of their final 13 regular season games to finish with a 10-4 league mark and the SoCon South Division Championship, the program's first-ever SoCon title. Then, Western won three games in the SoCon Tournament, including an upset over Davidson that ended the Wildcats' 19-game winning streak, to capture the Catamounts' only tournament championship. McCollum's team-high 21 points in the first round of the 1996 NCAA Championship helped the 16th-seeded Catamounts pull off a near upset over top-seed Purdue, falling 73-71 to the Boilermakers in the West Regional. (The game was tied at 71-71 with under three minutes to play.)

McCollum, a member of WCU's 12-man, All-20th Century Team, was a two-time, first team All-SoCon selection and finished his career as the WCU and SoCon all-time leader in both 3-pointers made (245) and attempted (670). He currently ranks third on both league lists for treys, while ranking sixth on the WCU all-time scoring list with 1,777 career points. McCollum additionally ranks eighth on the WCU career list for field goals made (622), 10th on the WCU career 3-point field goal percentage list (.366), 10th on the WCU career assists list (315) and fifth on the WCU career steals list (147). He appears on the WCU single-season lists a total of seven times, including his WCU single-season record of 99 3-pointers made, and owns WCU single-game records for best free throw percentage (18-of-18 versus Marshall in 1996).

McCollum's career got off to an impressive start as he was named to the SoCon All-Freshman team for the 1992-93 season, starting 13 of the team's final 14 games at point guard. As a sophomore (1993-94), he dished out 3.5 assists per game against SoCon competition to rank fifth in the league, feeding the conference's Player of the Year Frankie King, while ranking second in minutes played (34.5) and 18th in scoring (12.1 ppg). Also, he earned the first of three SoCon All-Tournament honors. As a junior (1994-95), he earned both first team All-SoCon and SoCon All-Tournament honors, ranking fourth in the conference in scoring (17.8 ppg) and ranking among the top 10 in five other categories. He and King, who won his second Player of the Year honor, helped the Cats reach the 1995 SoCon Tournament final, falling 63-61 to Chattanooga in the title game.

As a senior, McCollum made it three straight SoCon Player of the Year honors for Western as he was tabbed the league's top player after leading the league and ranking fifth nationally in scoring 25.0 ppg. He additionally ranked 16th nationally in 3-pointers made and earned 1996 SoCon Tournament MVP honors. McCollum scored a total of 751 points in 1995-96, which ranks fifth on the school's single-season list.

After his career at Western (1992-96), McCollum spent four seasons playing basketball professionally. His first stop was playing in France for the 1996-97 season. From 1997-99 he played professionally in Venezuela. Also during that span he played in Columbia (1998) and Hong Kong (1998). He additionally played one season (2000) in the Dominican Republic, while playing in the United States Basketball League for the Treasure Island Tropics as well.

He returned to Cullowhee in 2000 when he completed his B.S. in Computer Information Systems at Western. He is married to the former Marie White. The couple have two daughters, Jhimya (6) and Aaliyah (4).

## **BRIAN PEABODY**

**WESTERN CAROLINA ASSISTANT COACH**  
**1ST SEASON • ARIZONA, 1987**

In August of 2004, Western Carolina head coach Steve Shurina announced the addition of Brian Peabody as assistant basketball coach. A basketball coach since 1982, Peabody comes to Western after one year as head coach at Pima (Ariz.) Community College.

"I've always thought about Brian being a part of my staff, but the timing was never right until now," Shurina said. "I have recruited a number of his players over the years and consider him one of the smartest basketball minds I've been around. He was an extremely successful high school coach. A number of his players went on to Division I schools, so he has a feel for what it takes to be successful at this level. He is a tremendous asset to the staff and he rounds out one of the best staffs I've ever worked with."

Prior to his stint at Pima CC, Peabody was a highly decorated high school coach in Southern Arizona. During his 13 years as a head high school coach, his teams won a state championship (1991), had three state runner-up finishes (1992, '97 and '99) and won 11 region titles. Peabody, who sent 26 of his athletes to play collegiately, was a five-time Southern Arizona Coach of the Year selection and coach of the 1992 Southern Arizona All-Star team.

His most recent high school job was at Tuscon's Salpointe Catholic High School, coaching the Lancers from 1993-2003. Over that 10-year span, he had the most wins of any high school coach in the state of Arizona, led Salpointe Catholic to two state runner-up finishes (1997 and '99) and won three of his five coach of the year honors (1997, '99 and 2003). Peabody had two other stints as a high school head coach prior to his time at Salpointe Catholic, including one year at St. Gregory College Preparatory School (1992-93) and Green Fields Country Day School (1990-92). At Green Fields Country Day, Peabody won a state title (1991), was a state runner-up (1992) and won two of his coach of the year honors (1991 and '92).

Peabody's introduction to coaching came as an assistant coach at Sahuaro High School from 1982-90 under legendary coach Dick McConnell, who is the all-time winningest coach in Arizona high school history. While coaching at Sahuaro, Peabody also served as a physical education teacher at Emily Gray Junior High from 1988-96. In addition to his high school coaching duties, Peabody worked with Just Hoops Basketball Leagues from 1990-2004, serving as senior partner from 2000-04. The group organized and hosted fall, spring and summer basketball leagues and tournaments for adults, high schools and youth.

A 1987 graduate of Arizona with a B.S. in Education, Peabody is married to the former Kristine De La Ossa and the couple have two children: daughter Payton (3) and son Carson (2).

## **ALI TON**

**WESTERN CAROLINA GRADUATE MANAGER  
1ST SEASON • DAVIDSON, 1999**

After one year as an assistant at his alma mater, former Davidson Wildcat standout Ali Ton joined the Western Carolina basketball program this past summer, serving as a graduate manager and completing his Master of Business Administration. Ton, his school's all-time assist leader, coached one year at Davidson, helping the Wildcats to the 2004 Southern Conference South Division regular-season title.

Prior to his coaching career, Ton played four years of professional basketball in his native Turkey. He started his professional career in the first division's Mydonose Kolej in Ankara. After being among the league's top 10 in assists and steals, Ton remained in Ankara, but moved to another team, Turk Telekom. After the team placed ninth the previous year, Ton led Turk Telekom to the championship game of the Turkish Cup and moved on the semifinals in the first division. The next season, Turk Telekom placed fourth and reached the semifinals of the Turkish Cup. Ton's final year of professional basketball was spent with Galatasaray, one of the biggest sports clubs in the world. There, he had the opportunity to participate in the European tournaments, such as the Korac and Saporta Cups. He played against teams from numerous countries, challenging former NBA players like David Rivers, Keith "Mister" Jennings and J.R. Reid.

As a player, Ton was recruited by former Davidson assistant and current WCU head coach Steve Shurina to play for the Wildcats. He left Davidson with 646 career assists to rank as the school's all-time leader and third on the SoCon all-time list. Ton was the starting point guard in three of his four seasons, ranking among the nation's top 10 in assists twice and the SoCon annual assist leader three times. As a senior, Ton dished out 7.6 assists per game to rank third in the country. He also finished his career with 222 steals to rank second on the Davidson career list and fifth on the SoCon all-time list. Ton's steals total was bolstered by registering a SoCon single-game record with 11 steals versus Tufts during the 1997-98 season.

Ton led the Wildcats to an NIT berth in 1996 as well as a Southern Conference Tournament crown and subsequent NCAA Championship appearance in 1998. A first team All-SoCon selection by the coaches as a senior (second team by the media), Ton was honored by Davidson by receiving the Tommy Peters Award, which goes to that school's top senior male athlete.



## **MYLES CHRISTIAN**

3RD SEASON • ALABAMA, 2001**

Myles Christian, who became a full-time employee of the Athletics Department in 2003, enters his third season as Western Carolina's Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach. Christian, a Cottondale, Ala., native, comes to WCU after having served as a teacher and assistant softball coach at Holy Spirit High School in Tuscaloosa, Ala. He has also worked as a football and strength coach at Tuscaloosa Christian School and as a trainer at a fitness club in Tuscaloosa.

Christian is currently working on his Master's in Education at Western Carolina. He completed his Bachelor's degree at the University of Alabama in the spring of 2001. While there, Christian was a walk-on for the Crimson Tide football team, which played in the Outback Bowl, Music City Bowl and Orange Bowl during his time there. He also played on the 1999 Southeastern Conference Championship team.



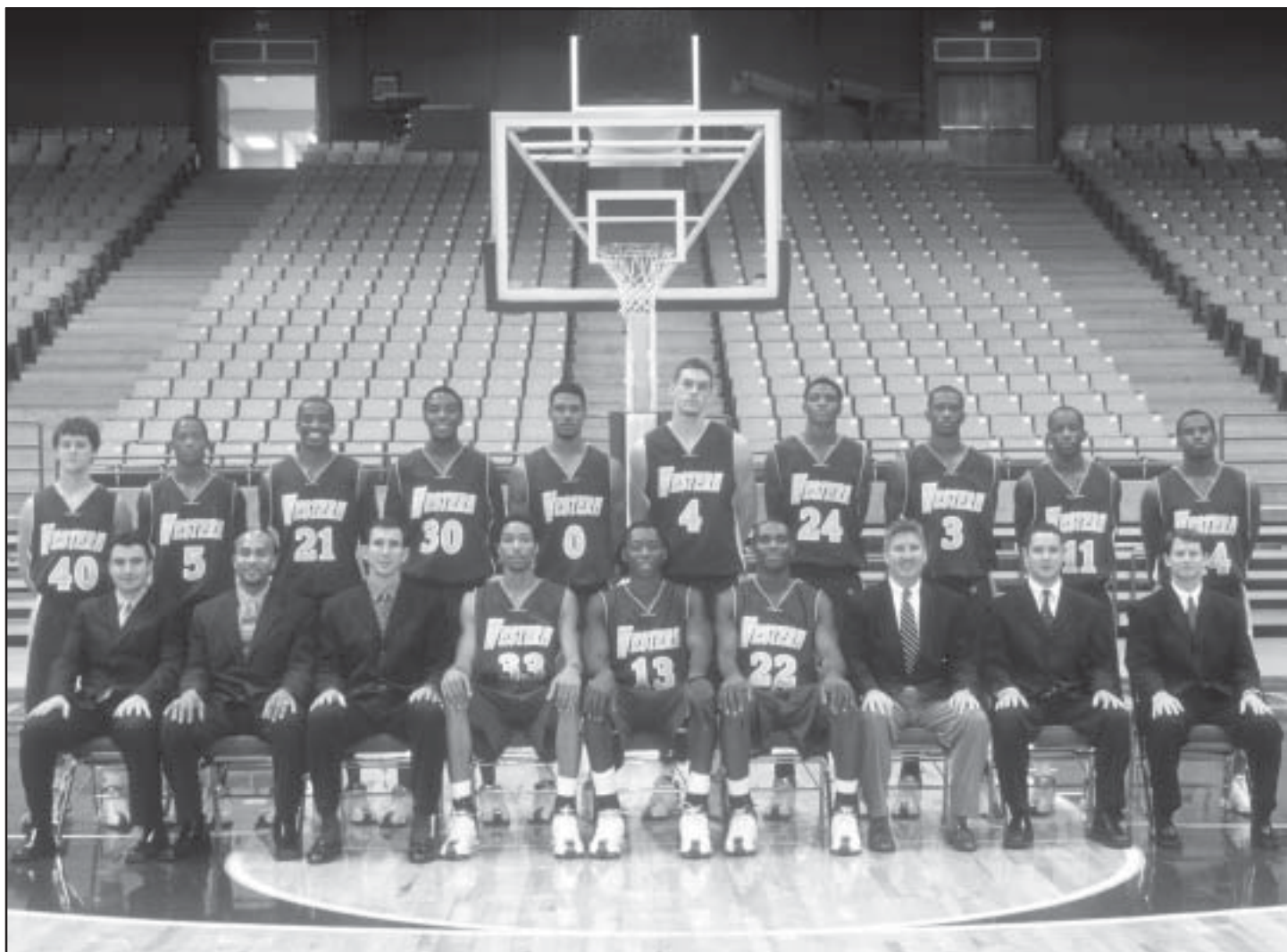
## **MARK MANCEBO**
