## HEAD COACH BO RYAN

In eight seasons as head coach at Wisconsin, Bo Ryan has unquestionably established himself and the Badger program among the elite in all of college basketball. Under his direction, Wisconsin has compiled five Big Ten titles, the five winningest seasons in school history and an NCAA tournament appearance every season.

With a career mark of 193-73 (.726), Ryan already ranks third on Wisconsin's all-time wins list (behind basketball hall of famers Bud Foster and Walter Meanwell).

In 2002, Ryan's first season, Wisconsin earned a share of the Big Ten title for the first time since 1947. The next year, UW won the title outright, securing back-to-back championships for the first time since 1923 and 1924. Not to be outdone, Ryan led the Badgers to their first Big Ten tournament title in 2004. In 2008, Ryan and UW doubled up, winning the regular-season and tournament crowns in the same season for the first time in school history.

He is the first coach in conference history to lead a team to at least 11 Big Ten wins in each of his first four seasons. Prior to his arrival in 2001, UW had won at least 11 conference games just seven times, and only once since 1941. The Badgers have at least 10 conference wins in seven of his eight seasons, including a school-record 16 in 2008.

With Ryan at the helm, the Badgers have posted an above .500 conference record in every season and have never finished outside the top four in the Big Ten standings.

### 500-WIN CLUB

In 2006-07, Ryan joined the exclusive 500-win club, making him one of 18 active Division I head coaches with at least 500 wins. With a



career record of 576-176 (.766), Ryan is second only to North Carolina's Roy Williams in terms of winning pct. among coaches with at least 500 victories.

### WINNING AT WISCONSIN

During Ryan's first eight seasons he has led UW to the five winningest seasons in school history, including back-to-back school-records with 30 wins in 2006-07 and 31 victories in 2007-08. Prior to Ryan's arrival in Madison, Wisconsin had never won more than 22 games in a season. Ryan's teams have averaged 24.1 wins in his eight seasons.

The Badgers have appeared in the NCAA tournament in each of Ryan's eight seasons, advancing to three Sweet 16s and the Elite Eight in 2005. In 2006-07, UW earned a No. 2 seed, the highest in school history, followed by a No. 3 seed in 2007-08. Ryan's 11 NCAA tournament wins are a school record and he is the first UW coach to lead a team to multiple Sweet 16 appearances.

Last season Ryan helped engineer one of the greatest turnarounds in recent memory. Wisconsin became the first team in history to bounce back from a six-game conference losing streak to make the NCAA tournament as an at-large selection. As a 12th-seed, the Badgers upset No. 5 seeded Florida State before falling to No. 4 Xavier in round two.

### HOME DOMINANCE

In Ryan's eight seasons, the Kohl Center has become one of the toughest places to play in America. The Badgers have compiled a 120-10 (.923) home record under Ryan, including a 61-5 mark in Big Ten games. Over the last eight seasons, that is the fifth-best home record in the country. From Dec. 7, 2002 to Jan. 24, 2005 Wisconsin did not lose a home game, setting a school record with 38 consecutive wins, a streak that was the longest in the country at the time.

### REPRESENTING TEAM USA

In the spring of 2009 Ryan was humbled and honored to be selected as the head coach of Team USA at the World University Games in Serbia. Appointed by the USA Basketball Men's Junior National Team Committee, chaired by Syracuse's Jim Boeheim, Ryan led some of college basketball's top players into international play in the July of 2009. The team brought home the bronze medal after posting a 6-1 record. Ryan's Team USA defeated gold medal-winning Serbia in the second round, but a one-point loss to Russia in the semifinals forced the U.S. into a third-place finish.

Held in high esteem by colleagues, Ryan has previously won two gold medals as an assistant coach, first with Virginia head coach Pete Gillen and the gold medal-winning North squad at the 1993 U.S. Olympic Festival, and also with former Atlanta Hawks coach Lon Kruger and the United States gold medal winner at the 1995 World University Games.

# WISCONSIN BASKETBALL NOTES

## NCAA REGULARS

- UW made its 15th appearance in the NCAA tournament in 2009, advancing to the second round. The Badgers are now 20-14 all-time in the Big Dance.
- The Badgers made their 11th consecutive NCAA tournament appearance. UW is one of just seven schools that have an active NCAA tournament streak of at least 11 years. The others are: Arizona (25 years), Kansas (20), Duke (14), Michigan State, (12), Gonzaga (11) and Texas (11).
- Wisconsin has qualified for the NCAA tournament in each of Bo Ryan's eight seasons in Madison, posting an 11-8 record over that span. Under Ryan, UW has won at least one game in seven of the eight NCAA appearances.
- UW earned a No. 12 seed in the East Region of the 2009 NCAA Tournament at Taco Bell Arena in Boise, Idaho. The Badgers upset No. 5 seed Florida State in the first round, 61-59 (OT), before falling to No. 4 Xavier, 60-49, in round two.
- The Badgers won 20 games in 2008-09, their sixth time reaching that milestone in Ryan's eight seasons at UW. Illinois (seven) is the only Big Ten team to post more 20-win seasons since 2001-02. Ryan's teams have won at least 19 games in each of his eight seasons. Prior to Ryan taking over at UW in 2001-02, the Badgers had just four 19-win seasons in 103 years.

## BIG TEN, BIG RESULTS

- Wisconsin finished with a 10-8 Big Ten record in 2008-09, marking the ninth-consecutive season the Badgers have won at least nine conference games. Wisconsin also posted an above .500 conference record for the 11th-straight season.
- Over the last three seasons, Wisconsin has accumulated a 39-13 (.750) record in Big Ten play, the best in the conference. Purdue, Ohio State and Michigan State (35-17, .673) are all tied for the second-best record over that time. The Badgers finished fourth in the Big Ten this season. In eight seasons under Bo Ryan, the Badgers have never finished lower than fourth in the conference standings.
- Over the last three seasons, UW has a combined 81-24 (.771) record overall. According to STATS, Inc., that is the seventh-best winning percentage in the country over that span.
- In eight seasons under Ryan, Wisconsin teams have earned a combined five Big Ten championship rings, equaling the most of any school in the conference. Illinois and Ohio State (5 each) are the only other schools with more than one championship since Ryan arrived on the scene.

## TAKING ON ALL COMERS

- The Badgers' 2009-10 schedule features at least 14 games against teams who participated in the 2009 NCAA Tournament. Wisconsin will face 11 2009 NCAA Tournament teams in the Big Ten portion of its schedule as well as Arizona, Duke and Marquette in the non-conference slate.

## STAT STUFFERS

- Wisconsin allowed just 59.0 points per game last season, second only to Illinois (57.2) in the Big Ten and 10th nationally. During conference play, the Badgers also ranked second in the Big Ten, allowing just 58.4 points per game.
- The Badgers held seven opponents to 50 or fewer points in a game in 2008-09: Ohio St. (50), Illinois (50), San Diego (49), Milwaukee (46), Coppin St. (46), Northwestern (45) and Penn St. (44). UW is 51-1 all-time under Bo Ryan and has won 20-straight games when limiting opponents to 50 or less.
- Wisconsin went 16-4 when out-rebounding its foes last season, including 12-0 at home. Overall, UW owned a +2.4 rebounds-per-game advantage in 2008-09, which ranked third in the Big Ten. The Badgers also led the Big Ten in rebounding defense, allowing opponents 28.5 total boards per game. Those 28.5 rebounds allowed per game is Wisconsin's lowest season total in the modern era. The previous low was 29.5 in 1989-90.
- Wisconsin is 21-12 (.636) in true road games over the last three seasons, which ranks 11th in the nation. Only five schools from BCS conferences: North Carolina, Louisville, Kansas, UCLA and Washington St. have posted better road records over that span.

- Wisconsin led the Big Ten and ranked fourth in the nation with an average of just 10.0 turnovers per game, which ties the 2003-04 team for the lowest mark in school history. The Badgers set a Big Ten single-season record for fewest turnovers during conference play, with just 9.3 per game. The previous UW record was 10.4 set in 2003 and 2004 and the previous Big Ten mark was 9.8 by Northwestern in 2004. Wisconsin turned the ball over 10 or fewer times in 23 games this year. UW owns a 30-7 (.811) record when committing 10 or fewer turnovers over the last two seasons.

- Wisconsin tied for the Big Ten's best team free throw percentage, connecting on 75.0% (216-for-288) during conference play. Individually, the Badgers had six players shoot over 70% from the charity stripe in 2008-09: Joe Krabbenhoft (.846), Keaton Nankivil (.821), Jason Bohannon (.810), Trévon Hughes (.766), Tim Jarmusz (.750) and Rob Wilson (.720).

## 2009-10 INDIVIDUAL OUTLOOK

Wisconsin returns three starters from a year ago -- guards Jason Bohannon and Trévon Hughes and forward Jon Leuer. The Badgers bring back .641 pct. of their scoring, .607 pct. of their rebounding and .626 pct. of their assists from last season. Here is a look at some of the returning letterwinners:

**JASON BOHANNON** - Has played in 102 career games (35 starts), including 85 consecutive ... owns 36 career double-digit scoring efforts, including 17 in 2008-09 ... ranks 10th in Wisconsin history with 144 made 3-pointers and 384 3-point attempts ... led UW with an average of 33.1 minutes per game a year ago ... needs 215 points to become a member of UW's 1,000-point club.

**TRÉVON HUGHES** - 2009 All-Big Ten honorable mention ... Has appeared in 99 games (67 starts) ... owns eight career 20-point games ... needs 166 more points to become UW's 34th 1,000-point scorer ... ranks 10th on UW's all-time steals list with 122 career thefts ... has 191 career assists and needs 83 more to crack Wisconsin's all-time top-10 list in that category ... hit a pair of game-winning shots, scoring with 0.9 seconds left at Virginia Tech and with 0:02 left in OT to beat Florida St. in the opening round of the NCAA tournament ... led UW in scoring 11 times and scored in double figures in 12 of 18 Big Ten games in 2009.

**TIM JARMUSZ** - Has played in 45 straight games ... owns 55 games of experience in his career ... has made 40-of-81 (.494) career field goals ... averaged 16.1 minute per game on the year in 2008-09 ... connected on 11 of last 22 (.500) 3-pointers over the final 14 games last season.

**JON LEUER** - Has seen duty in 65 career games (12 starts) ... owns 15 double digit scoring games in his career ... came off the bench in first 21 games of last season, but started the final 12 with UW going 8-4 in those contests ... led the Badgers in terms of scoring efficiency a year ago, averaging a point every 2.4 minutes of action ... had 13 double-digit scoring games in 2008-09, including five of his last 10 regular season games.

**KEATON NANKIVIL** - Has appeared in 50 games (20 starts) ... started first 20 games of 2008-09 season ... has scored in double figures four times ... made 9-of-14 (.643) 3-point attempts on the season ... shot .821 (23-of-28) from the free throw line ... scored a career-best 21 points in a career-high 32 minutes vs. Purdue, connecting on 5-of-5 3-pointers in the game.

**JORDAN TAYLOR** - Participated in all 33 of Wisconsin's games a year ago, averaging the most minutes among UW freshmen with 13.2 per game ... led the Badgers with a 2.2-to-1 assist-to-turnover ratio ... point guard only turned the ball over in five of 18 Big Ten games, finishing with a 2.6-to-1 assist-to-TO ratio in conference play ... posted career bests with 10 points, three assists and two steals at Iowa ... also drained his first career 3-pointer with 0:01 remaining to send the game into overtime.

**ROB WILSON** - Saw action in 28 games last year as a true freshman ... saw most extensive action in game at Marquette, posting career highs with seven points and five rebounds in 20 minutes of action.
