2009-10 Cowboy Basketball

Schedule Announced: The 2009-10 University of Wyoming men's basketball schedule features 19 games in the Arena-Auditorium, which will be the second most home games in school history.

On the season, the Cowboys will play nine teams that played in the postseason a year ago. Tennessee, Northern Iowa, Akron, BYU and Utah all played in the NCAA Tournament. San Diego State, New Mexico and UNLV reached the NIT, while Boise State played in the CBI.

Of the 19 home games, 11 will be played against non-conference opponents. Highlighted non-conference home games include matchups with Akron and Boise State. The Cowboys will also host a Thanksgiving weekend tournament, the World Vision Challenge hosted by Basketball Travelers, Inc., with Pepperdine, Hampton and Monmouth. In all, Wyoming will play eight of its first nine games in the Arena-Auditorium.

The Mountain West Conference home schedule is highlighted by Saturday home games against BYU, San Diego State, New Mexico and TCU.

The only other seasons in which the Pokes have played 19 or more home games were 2005-06 (19 home games), 1990-91 (20 home games) and 1985-86 (20 home games).

The Cowboys' non-conference road schedule is highlighted by a trip to Knoxville, Tenn., for a game with Tennessee on Dec. 15. Last season, Tennessee won a share of the regular-season SEC Title and earned a No. 8 seed in the NCAA Tournament. UT welcomes back 11 letterwinners from that team and are ranked in the top-15 of the nation in numerous preseason polls.

The Cowboys will also play at Northern Iowa in the inaugural MWC/Missouri Valley Challenge. Last season, the Pokes beat the Panthers 74-65 in Casper, Wyo. UNI went on the win the Missouri Valley Conference and play in the NCAA Tournament.

The World Vision Challenge over the Thanksgiving holiday will feature round-robin style play with two games being played each day in the Arena-Auditorium. The Pokes will play Monmouth on the opening day, Hampton on Saturday and Pepperdine on Sunday. Pepperdine made their last trip to Laramie during the 2001 postseason NIT.

The Cowboys open league play on Wed., Jan. 6 against arch rival Colorado State. The Pokes will play four of their first six MWC games in Laramie. During the conference slate, 15 of UW's 16 games will be televised. Of those TV games, 14 will air on The Mtn., the road game at New Mexico will be televised on CBS College Sports and UW's game at UNLV will be seen on VERSUS.

Heath Schroyer's Contract Extended Through 2014:

University of Wyoming Athletics Director Tom Burman announced on Wednesday, May 6 that head basketball coach Heath Schroyer's contract has been extended for two years, through April 30, 2014. Schroyer's base salary was also increased from \$150,000 to \$160,000. His original contract was a five-year deal that was due to end after the conclusion of the 2011-12 season.

"In his first two years, Heath (Schroyer) has done an excellent job of turning our men's basketball program in a positive direction both from a competitive standpoint and in the classroom," said Burman. "He guided the Cowboys back into postseason play for the first time in six seasons, while at the same time raising the expectations and the performance of our student-athletes academically. I get excited when I see the young players in our program, not only because of their athletic abilities but because of the fine young men they are.

"I believe that what Coach Schroyer has been able to accomplish in his first two seasons is a sign of bigger and better things to come. This contract extension is both a reward for those accomplishments, as well as a display of the commitment we are making to build our men's basketball program into one that can compete for conference championships and make our fans proud."

"I'm excited about being here at Wyoming, and I'm excited about the commitment level that the administration and the University has shown me, my family and my staff," said Schroyer. "I'm thankful every morning I get up and go to work that I'm the basketball coach here -- it's a great place.

"I believe we are on the verge of accomplishing something special here in a short amount of time. The nice thing about receiving this extension is it assures me that I will be able to stay here and see the freshman and sophomore classes through to the end of their college careers. I'm really proud of the two classes we've been able to recruit, and I believe those two classes together have a chance to bring Wyoming Basketball back to the top."

Afam Muojeke Named Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year:

University of Wyoming sophomore **Afam Muojeke** was selected as the 2008-09 Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year following the 2009-10 regular season. Muojeke was selected by a voting panel that consisted of MWC head coaches and media members.

Mujojeke, a Jamaica, Queens, N.Y. native, is the second Cowboy to be named the MWC's Freshman of the Year. Jay Straight, who played for the Cowboys from 2002-05, was selected as the MWC's Co-Freshman of the Year following the 2001-02 season.

Mujojeke Breaks MWC's Freshman Scoring Record-- Also Ranks Seventh on MWC's Freshman Rebounding List:

Afam Muojeke's numbers during his freshman season are among the best in the history of the Mountain West Conference, in terms of both scoring and rebounding. As a freshman, he scored 454 points and pulled down 175 rebounds. He is the MWC's all-time leading freshman in scoring and is seventh in rebounding.

Mujojeke Was the MWC's Top-Freshman in Both Scoring and Rebounding During 2008-09 Season:

Afam Muojeke put together a fabulous freshman season for the Cowboys and led the MWC's freshmen class in both scoring and assists. He averaged 13.8 points and 5.3 rebounds a game.

Mujojeke Named Honorable Mention All-Freshman by Collegehoops.net:

Following the 2008-09 season, **Afam Muojeke** was selected as an Honorable Mention All-Freshman by Collegehoops.net. Muojeke was one of 34 freshmen to be honored nationally by Collegehoops.net and their voting panel of 10 staff writers.

This marked the second major award for Muojeke, as he was also selected as the MWC's Freshman of the Year.

Division I Transfers JayDee Luster and Boubacar Sylla Become Eligible for 2009-10 Season:

After sitting out of competition during the 2008-09 season to satisfy NCAA transfer rules, **JayDee Luster** and **Boubacar Sylla** will become eligible for the 2009-10 season. Both student-athletes used a redshirt season and will be redshirt sophomores during the 2009-10 season.

Luster, a San Diego, Calif. native, transferred to Wyoming from New Mexico State. Sylla, who is from Paris, France, transferred from Auburn.



Boubacar Sylla is the Tallest Player in Wyoming Basketball

History: Measuring 7'2" in height, redshirt sophomore **Boubacar Sylla** is the tallest player in Wyoming basketball history. He is also just the sixth player in school history to eclipse seven feet in height. Four of those seven-footers have played at UW during this decade.

"Fox & Friends": Early in the second half of Wyoming's CBI game against Northeastern, **Adam Waddell** made a steal, dunked on the fast break and flipped after the dunk. That highlight gave Waddell a great deal of media exposure.

Waddell and UW head coach Heath Schroyer traveled to New York City and were in-studio guests on NBC's "The Today Show". Waddell also did telephone interviews on ESPN's "First Take" and Fox News' "Fox and Friends".

The dunk also became very popular on the internet. In fact, the highlight has been viewed over 350,000 times on YouTube.

Afam Muojeke Greatly Improves Rebounding Down the Stretch of 2008-09: Afam Muojeke's

rebounding drastically improved over the final 14 games of the season. During UW's final 14 games, Muojeke pulled down 98 rebounds for an average of 7.0 per game. In UW's first 19 games of the season, Muojeke had 77 rebounds for an average of 4.1 per game.

JayDee Luster Selected as Team Captain for 2009-10:

On May 18, University of Wyoming redshirt sophomore point guard **JayDee Luster** received one of the most prestigious honors an individual athlete can earn in a team sport as he was announced as a team captain for the 2009-10 Cowboy basketball team.

"I believe that great leaders are born and not made. JayDee Luster is a born leader," UW head coach Heath Schroyer said. "JayDee has an infectious personality and has an innate ability to make everyone around him a better player and a better person. He leads both vocally and by example. He has a great relationship with everyone in our program, regardless of their background. We couldn't be happier to have JayDee as a member of this program, but also as the new captain of this team."

Luster, a San Diego, Calif. native, transferred to Wyoming from New Mexico State University prior to last season. He spent the 2008-09 academic year at Wyoming, where he used his redshirt season and sat out of competition to satisfy NCAA transfer rules. With the exception of games, he was able to participate in virtually all team activities including practices, work outs, team meetings and study sessions.

"While JayDee had to sit out last season, he was still able to take on a leadership role within our team," Schroyer added. "He led our scout team in practice, spent a lot of time watching film with our staff and did an exceptional job in the classroom. This past year allowed him to gain a deep understanding of our team and our system. He was also able to go against a four-time All-MWC player (Brandon Ewing) in practice every day and that really helped him grow as a player."

"JayDee is everything you want a point guard to be, but most importantly he is a winner," added Schroyer. "He helped lead Hoover to the CIF San Diego Championship as a junior and to a pair of Central League Championships. What I believe makes JayDee a winner is his ability to get the players around him to work at a higher level. He not only does this on the floor, but also in the weight room and in virtually everything he does."

Cowboys Achieve Highest Annual APR:

On Wednesday, May 6, the NCAA released the Academic Progress Rate (APR) Public Report for the 2007-08 academic year and the University of Wyoming men's basketball team received its highest annual score in the history of the APR. By achieving an annual score of 935 during the 2007-08 academic year, the Cowboys improved their multiyear score to 884.

Due to the Cowboys' academic improvement and a favorable comparison based on other academic and institutional factors, the Cowboys will be allotted 13 scholarships for the 2009-10 season. That is the maximum number of scholarships allowed by the NCAA for men's basketball programs.

The 2007-08 season marked the first under head coach Heath Schroyer. In his first full season at the helm of the Cowboy basketball program, the team's annual APR score improved 164 points from an historic low of 771 during 2006-07 to a 935 for 2007-08.

"Correcting the APR issue was a major area of emphasis when we hired Heath (Schroyer), and we are extremely pleased about the improvement that has been made," Wyoming Director of Athletics Tom Burman said. "The strides that this program has made on the floor were made evident in the team's play this past season. Now it is great to see evidence of the progress that is being made off of the floor."

"I am extremely happy with what we have been able to do in addressing our APR," Schroyer said. "We have made improvements on the floor, as well as in the classroom. This is exciting progress as we look to the future of our program."

"When I was hired, addressing the APR issue was a major priority. I am pleased with the progress we have made, while also setting a standard of how things need to be done in the future."

Each academic year every Division I team calculates its APR. A team's APR is based on eligibility, retention and graduation of each student-athlete on scholarship. The multiyear APR scores date back four academic years to the 2004-05 season.



MWC Welcomes Back Just Five of the Top-20 Scorers from 2008-09--Afam Muojeke is the MWC's Third Highest Returning Scorer:

Of the top-20 scorers in the MWC during the 2008-09 season, only five are returning to their respective schools for the 2009-10 season.

University of Wyoming sophomore **Afam Muojeke** is the third leading scorer returning for the 2009-10 season. Muojeke ranked 12th in the MWC in 2008-09 with an average of 13.8 points per game.

The Wyoming-Ohio Recruiting Pipeline:

In UW head coach **Heath Schroyer's** first two seasons as the head coach of the Wyoming basketball program, the Cowboys have developed a pipeline with Ohio High School Basketball. In fact, three current Cowboys hail from the Buckeye State--sophomore **A.J. Davis** (Columbus--Linden-McKinley HS) and freshmen **Daylen Harrison** (Akron--St. Vincent-St. Mary's HS) and **Desmar Jackson** (Warren--Warren G. Harding HS).

Wyoming assistant coach **Anthony Stewart**, who was raised in Akron, is largely responsible for creating the Wyoming-Ohio pipeline.

New York City to Wyoming:

Under head coach **Heath Schroyer**, New York City and Wyoming basketball have merged.

Under Schroyer, three NYC natives have joined the Wyoming basketball program. Those Cowboys include former all-conference player **Tyson Johnson** (Long Island), and current players **Afam Muojeke** (Jamaica, Queens) and **Thomas Manzano** (Brooklyn).

New York Post columnist Kevin Kernan featured these Cowboys from New York in a full page article in the Post on Sunday, Nov. 30, 2008.

Heath Schroyer is "Five for Five":

In his coaching career, University of Wyoming head coach **Heath Schroyer** has guided all five of the Division I teams that he has coached to either the postseason, a conference championship or both.

Those coaching stops include head coaching jobs at Wyoming (2007-present) and Portland State (2002-05), as well as assistant coaching jobs at Fresno State (2005-07), Wyoming (2001-02) and BYU (1997-01).

Wyoming Ranked as the No. 42 Best College Basketball Program of All Time by Street & Smith's:

In the fall of 2004, Street & Smith's published a special college basketball magazine entitled: **Greatest College Basketball Programs of All Time.**

In those rankings, the **University of Wyoming was ranked No. 42.** There are currently 330 NCAA Division I men's basketball programs in the country.

The rich history of Wyoming Basketball includes: the 1943 NCAA Championship team led by the inventor of the jump shot Kenny Sailors and Basketball Hall of Fame coach Everett Shelton; the 1987 Wyoming squad led by Fennis Dembo and Eric Leckner that earned its way to the Sweet 16; and the 2002 Cowboy squad that advanced to the Second Round of the NCAA Tournament after upsetting No. 6 ranked Gonzaga.

Wyoming Has Played in the Postseason Four Times in the MWC Era:

Wyoming has appeared in postseason tournaments in four out of the 10 previous seasons, since joining the Mountain West Conference.

Wyoming is 2-4 in postseason games during the MWC era -- 1-1 in NCAA Tournament games, 1-2 in NIT games and 0-1 in CBI games.

In Ten Seasons of MWC Basketball, the Wyoming Cowboys have Produced the League's Top Scorer Four Times:

In ten seasons of Mountain West Conference basketball, a Wyoming Cowboy has led the league in scoring four times.

That mark of four individual scoring titles is tied with New Mexico for the most in MWC history. While Wyoming and New Mexico have produced the league's top scorer four times each, amazingly no other school has done so more than once. In fact, Utah and San Diego State are the only other schools to produce the MWC's scoring leader and each did so only once.

Former Cowboy **Brandon Ewing** is the only player in the 10-year history of the MWC to lead the league in scoring three times. **Ewing averaged 18.5 points per game in 2008-09, 17.2 per game in 2007-08 and 19.9 in 2006-07.**

The first Cowboy to lead the MWC in scoring was former Cowboy great **Marcus Bailey**. **Bailey led the league in scoring during the 2000-01 season, averaging 17.4 points per game.**

Former Cowboy Great Kenny Sailors Recognized as the Oldest Living MVP of the NCAA Tournament:

Wyoming living legend **Kenny Sailors** was featured in an online story by USA Today.com during the 2009 NCAA Tournament as the oldest living MVP of the NCAA Tournament. The story, written by Mike Lopresti of Gannett, features Sailors' recollections of his playing days, his creation of the jump shot and his days after basketball.

Sailors won the NCAA Tournament MVP award in 1943 when the Cowboys captured the NCAA Championship. He now lives in Laramie where he regularly attends University of Wyoming games, Cowboy and Cowgirl Basketball practices and Cowboy Football practices.

At the beginning of this past college basketball season, Sailors #4 jersey became the first jersey in University of Wyoming history to be honored by hanging a replica of it from the rafters in Wyoming's Arena-Auditorium.





Strength and Conditioning

Notes: During the summer of 2009, nearly the entire Cowboy basketball was

in Laramie working out and preparing for the upcoming season. Following are some notes on the team's progress in the weight room:

The following weight increases in numbers are from March '09 to July '09.

Team- Eight guys on the team can bench press 225 lbs. or more, nine can front squat 225 lbs. or more and eight can hang clean 100 kg (220 lbs.) or more. As part of the NBA Pre-Draft Camp, six Cowboys can bench press 185 lbs. for 10 or more reps.

Ryan Dermody- Increased his front squat 15 lbs, hang clean 2.5 kg (5.5 lbs.) and his chin up reps from nine to 14.

Adam Waddell- Waddell broke his own Cowboy basketball all-time record in the hang clean by increasing from 140 to 145 kgs. (308 lbs. to 319 lbs.). He also increased his front squat from 315 to 320 lbs., and his chin ups from 14 to 23 reps.

Afam Muojeke- Muojeke increased his bench press from 215 to 225 lbs., his hang clean from 92.5 kg to 102.5 kg (203 lbs. to 225 lbs.), and his chin ups from 20 to 26 reps. Finally, he increased his 185 lb. bench press reps from four to 10.

Djibril Thiam- Between May 1 and Aug. 20, he increased his lean body mass 10 lbs. he increased his front squat from 250 to 270 lbs., his bench press from 240 to 255 lbs., and his chin up reps from 25 to 30.

A.J. Davis- Between May 1 and Aug. 20, he increased his lean body mass eight lbs. In the weight room, he increased his front squat from 225 to 270 lbs., his hang clean from 92.5 kg to 110 kg (203 lbs. to 242 lbs.), his 185 lb. bench press reps from 3 to 7 and his chin ups from 16 to 18.

JayDee Luster- Luster increased his back squat 90 lbs. and his hang clean 20 kg (44 lbs.).

Arthur Bouëdo- Bouëdo increased his lean body mass seven lbs. between May 1 and Aug. 20.

Boubacar Sylla- Sylla increased his bench press from 215 lbs. to 235 lbs. He has changed his body composition by losing approximately 15 lbs. of body fat and increasing his lean body mass by 20 lbs.

Thomas Manzano- Manzano increased his lean body mass 18 lbs. between May 1 and Aug. 20. He increased his bench press by 35 lbs., his hang clean by 20 kg (44 lbs.), and increased his front squat 25 lbs.

By ending the 2008-09 season with an overall record of 19-14, the Wyoming Cowboys concluded their best finish to a season since 2002-03. They advanced to the College Basketball Invitational, marking UW's first postseason berth since that 2002-03 season.

The Cowboys finished the 2002-03 season with a 21-11 record. That Cowboy team advanced to the second round of the NIT, where they fell on the road to North Carolina.

With CBI Bid, Cowboys Play in the Postseason for the First Time Since 2002-03 and for the 23rd Time in School History:

After posting a 19-14 record in 2008-09, the Cowboys were rewarded with an invitation to play in the College Basketball Invitational.

That postseason bid was the first by a Wyoming team since the 2002-03 season, when the Pokes played in the NIT.

This CBI bid was the 23rd postseason tournament in Wyoming basketball history. The Cowboys have played in the NCAA Tournament 14 times, the NIT eight times, and now the CBI once.

Brandon Ewing Named First Team All-MWC and Afam Muojeke Named Freshman of the Year--Johnson and Ogirri Named Honorable Mention:

The Mountain West Conference announced its 2008-09 Men's Basketball All-Conference team and awards on Monday, March 9. Wyoming Cowboy senior Brandon Ewing was named First Team All-MWC while redshirt freshman Afam Muojeke was selected as the Freshman of the Year, in a vote by MWC head coaches and media members.

For Ewing, a native of Chicago, Ill., this marks the first time in his career that he has been named to the MWC's First Team. As a freshman, he was a Third Team All-MWC selection and was then a second team selection as a sophomore and junior. He is the first player in MWC history to earn all-conference honors four times.

Mujojeke is the second Cowboy to earn MWC Freshman of the Year honors, as Jay Straight received the honor in 2001-02.

2008-09 Season in Review

The 2008-09 season was a very special one for the Cowboy basketball program. Not only did the Cowboys reach at least 19 wins for the 25th time in school history, they also had the best season by a Wyoming team since 2002-03 and reached the postseason for the 23rd time in school history.

The Cowboys concluded the 2008-09 season with a 19-14 (.576) overall record. The season was highlighted by a trip to the semifinals of the Mountain West Conference tournament, as well as an invitation to the postseason and the College Basketball Invitational.

The Cowboys earned their spot in the MWC semifinals with an upset win over New Mexico, one of the Mountain West Conference's Tri-Champions, in the first round of the MWC Tournament. That marked the sixth time in 10 years that the Cowboys have advanced to at least the semifinals of the conference tournament. In MWC regular-season play, the Cowboys won seven games and matched the most wins in league play by a Wyoming team since the conference expanded to nine teams prior to 2005-06.

On the year, the Cowboys beat four different teams that advanced to the postseason. In addition to their MWC tournament win over NIT-bound New Mexico, the Cowboys beat Northern Iowa on a neutral floor in Casper, Wyo. UNI won the Missouri Valley Conference and received an automatic NCAA Tournament berth where they gave Sweet-16 bound Purdue all they could handle in a 61-56 first round loss. The Cowboys also beat San Diego State and UNLV at home, each of whom advanced to the National Invitation Tournament. The Aztecs reached the Semifinals of the NIT in Madison Square Garden.

In looking toward the future, the Cowboys are poised to continue where they left off as the Wyoming program enters its third season under head coach Heath Schroyer.

"This season was obviously a big step for our program both on and off of the floor, which is evident in our postseason bid," Schroyer said. "We are very excited about the things we have accomplished during our first two years, but we are more excited about what is on the horizon."

The Cowboys will welcome back two starters and three other significant contributors from that 19-win team. Led by the 2008-09 MWC Freshman of the Year, Afam Muojeke, the Cowboys return a core of talented players. Included in that mix will be senior Ryan Dermody, junior Djibril Thiam and two sophomores, A.J. Davis and Adam Waddell.

The Cowboys will also receive a nice boost as two transfers will be eligible in 2009-10. Sophomores JayDee Luster and Boubacar Sylla, who each sat out and redshirted this past season, are two very talented young players. Luster, who will assume the point-guard reigns, transferred to UW from New Mexico State. Sylla, a 7-2 center with a 7-5 wingspan, came to Wyoming from Auburn.

Another player that the coaching staff is excited to get into the mix is guard Arthur Bouëdo. Bouëdo was sidelined in 2008-09 due to a preseason ankle injury.

The Cowboys signed four student-athletes to its 2009-10 signing class including Daylen Harrison, Desmar Jackson, Thomas Manzano and Amath M'Baye.

"When you look at our roster for next year, we will potentially have one senior, two juniors and 11 underclassmen," Schroyer added. "I believe the key to winning in this conference is to assemble a group of guys that will be together for three to four years, and we have done that. With that, we have been able to balance our short-term needs and our long-term goals. I believe this is the way to build a program for the long term, and I am very excited about what we have done."



Wyoming Reaches 19 Wins in 2008-09, Marking the 25th Time a Cowboy Team has Reached 19-Win Total: The Cowboys finished the 2008-09 season with a 19-14 overall record. That marks the 23rd time in school history that a UW team has reached 19 wins in a season.

Cowboys Open Season with a 5-0 record for the First Time since 1997-98: By beating Denver on Nov. 29, the Cowboys opened a season 5-0 for the first time since the 1997-98 season. That year, the Cowboys finished 19-9 and advanced to the National Invitational Tournament. The season was UW's only under head coach Larry Shyatt.

Cowboys Start 9-1 For the First Time Since the 1990-91 Season: The Cowboys opened the 2008-09 season with a 9-1 record, prior to falling at UCLA on Dec. 23. That marked UW's best start since the 1990-91 season. In 1990-91, the Cowboys finished 20-12 (.625). They advanced to the second round of the National Invitational Tournament that season.

14 Games to Satisfy NCAA**

Rules Regarding Amateurism:

University of Wyoming head basketball coach **Heath Schroyer** announced Friday, Sept. 25 that Cowboy basketball player **Arthur Bouëdo** must sit out of UW's first 14 games of the 2009-10 season to satisfy NCAA rules regarding amateurism. The NCAA determined that Bouëdo played on a team in France that had a professional player on its roster.

"We are disappointed that Arthur will miss games but we understood this was a possibility when we recruited him," Schroyer said. "Arthur is a tremendous young man and a very good basketball player. While we will miss him during the first 14 games, he will become an integral part of this team when he returns. We are excited about having a quality player like Arthur for the next three years."

Bouëdo, a native of Aix en Provence, France, joined the Cowboy roster for the 2008-09 season as a walk-on. He was then placed on scholarship prior to the 2009-10 season. He will be a sophomore in 2009-10.

Bouëdo will be eligible to play when the Cowboys open Mountain West Conference play on Jan. 6, 2010. The Pokes will host Colorado State that day.

Cowboys Nearing 300th Win in the Arena-Auditorium: The Wyoming Cowboy basketball team is nearing a major milestone, the program's 300th win in the Arena-Auditorium. **The Cowboys are just six wins away from their 300th win in the Double A.**

The Pokes recorded their **294th victory in the Arena-Auditorium** on Saturday, Feb. 21, 2009, in a 61-56 home victory over TCU.

The Double A opened on Feb. 20, 1982, with a 59-29 win over Air Force in the final home game of the 1981-82 season.

Currently, the Pokes have posted **294 wins** against just **97 losses** for a **winning percentage of 75.2 percent** in the Double A.

Wyoming Has Won 77 Percent of Its Home Games During the Ten Seasons of the MWC:

The Wyoming Cowboys have enjoyed great home success in the ten years they have been members of the Mountain West Conference.

Wyoming has built a **109-35 (.757) home record over the past ten seasons**, and in games against non-conference opponents, the home record is even more outstanding.

The Wyoming Cowboys have played **71 non-conference home games** in the ten seasons. Over that span, only nine non-conference opponents have been able to win in Wyoming's Arena-Auditorium. UW holds an amazing **62-9 (.873) home record versus non-conference opponents** during that span.

Against conference opponents during that ten-year era, the Pokes have posted an impressive conference home record of **47-26 (.644)**.

Wyoming Cowboys' Championship History: The Wyoming Cowboys have won two Mountain West Conference Championships in the ten seasons UW has been a member of the Mountain West Conference.

Wyoming won its 18th conference championship, capturing the 2001-02 Mountain West Conference title outright. It was Wyoming's 16th regular-season championship in men's basketball. UW's other two conference championships came in the form of conference tournament titles in 1987 and '88. The Cowboys also tied for the MWC regular-season title in the 2000-01 season with Brigham Young and Utah.

Basketball Hall of Fame coach **Everett Shelton** won the most conference titles for the Cowboys. Shelton captured eight conference titles in his 19 seasons as head coach from the 1939-40 season through the 1958-59 campaign. Coach Shelton also guided Wyoming to its one NCAA National Championship in 1943. **Jim Brandenburg** ranks next among Poke coaches with four conference titles in the '80s. **Bill Strannigan** won two Western Athletic Championships in 1967 and '69. **Steve McClain** also captured two titles in 2001 and 2002. **Benny Dees** (1988) and **Willard Witte** (1932) are the other UW head coaches to win conference titles. They each won one conference championship apiece.

Current Wyoming head coach Heath Schroyer was a vital part of that 2001-02 MWC outright regular-season championship. Schroyer was an assistant coach for the Cowboys that season.

Wyoming Has Had Great Success Against Nationally-Ranked Teams in Laramie, Defeating Six of the Last Seven Top 25 Teams in the Arena-Auditorium:

Wyoming has enjoyed a great deal of success at home against nationally-ranked teams over the past 13 seasons. In fact, UW has posted a 6-1 record at home against the last seven nationally-ranked opponents to play in the Double A.

From the 1995-96 season through the 2006-07 season, the Wyoming Cowboys had won six consecutive games at home versus Top 25 ranked teams. UW's string was broken on Jan. 13, 2007, when the No. 15 ranked Air Force Falcons defeated the Cowboys 58-56 on a shot at the buzzer.

Prior to that loss to Air Force, the last nationally-ranked team to defeat UW in the Dome of Doom was the Cincinnati Bearcats on Dec. 17, 1994, in a game that saw LaZelle Durden hit three free throws with no time left on the clock for a one-point victory (81-80). Cincinnati was ranked No. 17 in the nation at the time.

Heath Schroyer, Head Basketball Coach University of Wyoming

When Heath Schroyer was hired as the 20th head coach in Cowboy Basketball history on March 23, 2007, he had a vision of returning the Cowboys to the top of the Mountain West Conference and back into the national spotlight. Now entering his third season at Wyoming, Schroyer believes the foundation has been laid to do exactly that.

During his coaching career, Schroyer has been involved in winning three league championships at three different NCAA Division I programs. He has also guided all five Division I teams that he has coached to a league championship, the postseason or to both.

Throughout his career, Schroyer has had great success with building programs. At both his stops as a head coach, Wyoming and Portland State, he has worked on successful rebuilding efforts. As an assistant coach, he helped rebuild both BYU and Fresno State.

After taking over as the head coach of the Wyoming Cowboys, Schroyer led the Pokes to a 12-win season in his first campaign. However, it was during his second season that the Cowboys saw a vast improvement.

During the 2008-09 season, the Cowboys won 19 games, earned their first postseason bid since 2002-03 and advanced to the semifinals of the Mountain West Conference Tournament. On the year, the Cowboys beat four different teams that advanced to postseason play-- Northern Iowa, New Mexico, San Diego State and UNLV. The Cowboys finished 19-14 and 7-9 in the MWC.

That two-year turnaround, from a 12-18 record to a 19-14 mark, matched the 44th best in the nation. Following the season, Schroyer's contract was extended through 2014.

"I think we have laid a solid foundation in our first two years and I am excited about the future of Cowboy Basketball," said Schroyer. "With our success, we have been able to attract very good, young players to our program. The best part is that these young players will be together for the next three to five years. I believe this is the mold for building a successful program."

The 2008-09 Cowboy team was one of the best free throw shooting teams in the nation. Entering postseason play, the Pokes led the nation in made free throws and ranked second in attempts. They made 72.7 percent of their free throws during the season, which ranked 57th in the nation.

In his time at Wyoming, Schroyer's Cowboys have received a great deal of individual attention. In just two years, a Cowboy has been named All-MWC four times. Brandon Ewing was named First Team All-MWC in 2009 and Second Team All-MWC in 2008, after leading the league in scoring both years. Both Tyson Johnson and Sean Ogirri were named Honorable Mention in 2009.

Afam Muojeke was also selected as the MWC Freshman of the Year in 2009, while also receiving numerous other awards honoring the top freshmen in the nation.

Ewing was selected as an Honorable Mention All-American among high-major schools by *Collegehoops.com* following the 2008-09 season. He was also named All-District VIII by the United States Basketball Writers Association and Second Team All-District 17 by the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 2008, Ewing was named Second Team All-District VII by the USBWA and Second Team All-District 13 by the NABC.

An area that Schroyer placed a great deal of emphasis on during his first two years at UW was improving the Cowboys' Academic Progress Rate. During the 2007-08 season, Schroyer's first at UW, the Cowboys achieved their highest APR score ever and regained a full 13 scholarships for the upcoming 2009-10 season.

During his first season at the helm of the Cowboys, Schroyer began a rebuilding process that was highlighted by regular season sweeps of MWC rivals Utah and Colorado State, a trip to the championship game of the 2007 UTEP Sun Bowl Tournament and a December non-conference win over Colorado. The Cowboys finished that year with a 12-18 record, despite playing with only eight scholarship players due to injuries and APR restrictions.

Prior to accepting the Wyoming job, Schroyer served as the associate head coach at Fresno State University under Steve Cleveland during the 2005-06 and 2006-07 seasons. The Bulldogs posted a 22-10 record during the 2006-07 season and placed third in the Western Athletic Conference. Fresno State advanced to first round of the 2007 National Invitation Tournament (NIT), despite playing with scholarship restrictions due to a pre-existing probation.

Schroyer also coached with Cleveland at Fresno City College (1996-97) and BYU (1997-01). At BYU, he was part of a resurgence that saw the Cougars improve from a 1-25 record in 1996, the year prior to the coaching staff's arrival, to an NIT appearance in 2000, and a league championship and an NCAA Tournament appearance in 2001.

After leaving BYU in 2001, Schroyer joined the staff at Wyoming for the 2001-02 season. The Cowboys won the MWC Regular Season Championship, earned their first trip in 14 years to the NCAA Tournament and upset Gonzaga, the sixth ranked team in the nation, in the tournament's first round. With Schroyer in charge of the defense, the Cowboys led the MWC in field-goal-percentage defense, defensive rebounding and rebound margin.

Schroyer left Wyoming to become the second youngest Division I head coach (age 30) when he was hired at Portland State in April of 2002. In his three seasons at Portland State, he led the Vikings to steady and marked improvement. In his first season (2002-03), the Vikings won five games. In his second year, they won 11. His final season of 2004-05, he directed PSU to a 19-9 record, an 11-3 Big Sky Conference record and the first Division I conference championship by a Portland State team. PSU was one of the top three turnaround programs in the nation in 2004-05 as ranked by *CollegeInsider.com*. The program was also ranked as one of the top-25 turnarounds by *CollegeInsider.com* following the 2003-04 season. In his first year at Portland State, the Vikings were restricted to six scholarship players and in his second season, that scholarship total increased to nine. Finally, in his final season at Portland State the Vikings had a full set of scholarships. Those scholarship restrictions were due to the NCAA's 5/8 rule at the time.

Not only did that '04-'05 Viking team set a school record for consecutive conference wins (seven), but it was the only team in the Big Sky to boast a winning road record. The Vikings were ranked 10th in the nation in field goal percentage (.492) and 15th in assists per game (16.8). In addition, Schroyer coached the nation's assist leader, Will Funn, and the country's 16th-best scorer, Seamus Boxley.

With the hiring of Schroyer at Wyoming, he and UW Athletics Director Tom Burman renew a professional relationship that began when Burman hired Schroyer as the head men's basketball coach at Portland State.

"I am honored to be the head basketball coach at Wyoming," Schroyer said. "I believe that this basketball program has unlimited potential. This is a special place with tremendous support from some great fans. It is my goal to make this program something that every Cowboy fan can be proud of. The future is very bright for the Wyoming basketball program."

A native of Walkersville, Md., Schroyer played high school basketball at DeMatha High School in Hyattsville, Md., under Hall of Fame coach Morgan Wootten. Schroyer was an All-Conference performer at Kings River Community College (Reedley, Calif.), and led his team to the California Junior College Final Four in 1991-92. He finished his collegiate career at Armstrong Atlantic State (Savannah, Ga.) where, as a senior, he was a team captain and led his team to the NCAA Division II Sweet 16.

Schroyer will enter the 2009-10 season at the age of 37 (March 15, 1972). He earned his bachelor's degree in liberal studies from Armstrong Atlantic State in 1995, and his master's in institutional leadership from National University (Fresno, Calif.) in 1996.

Schroyer and his wife, Karen, have one son, Hayden, who is eight years old.

Assistant Coaching Staff



Fred Langley is entering his third season as the associate head coach of the Wyoming basketball program.

As associate head coach with the Cowboys, Langley is directly involved in every aspect of the Wyoming basketball program. He maintains extensive coaching responsibilities, while also leading and implementing recruiting for the Cowboys. He is directly responsible for expanding the Cowboys' recruiting efforts in the United States as well as many countries within Europe and Africa. Those efforts have resulted in the 2009-10 Cowboy roster featuring four international players.

During Langley's coaching career, he has worked at all levels of the game including Division I, junior college, high school and AAU, giving him a wealth of knowledge on and off the basketball floor.

Langley and UW head coach Heath Schroyer have a long-standing relationship that dates back to the mid-1990's when they were each assistant coaches in the Central Valley Conference for California Community Colleges. Prior to the 2004-05 season, Langley joined Schroyer's staff at Portland State, helping guide the Vikings to a 19-9 (.679) record and the first Big Sky Conference Championship in school history.

During the 2005-06 and 2006-07 seasons, Langley served as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Fresno State, while Schroyer served as the associate head coach. During the 2006-07 season, the Bulldogs finished 22-10 (.687), won seven of their last nine games, and advancing to the NIT.

During the mid-1990's, Langley was an assistant coach to Steve Cleveland (the current head coach at Fresno State) at Fresno City College. While at Fresno City College, the Rams made their first trip to the Elite Eight of the California Community College State Playoffs since 1968. Langley also served as the head coach at Central High School in Fresno, Calif. where he led the Grizzlies to the California Sectional Title for the first time since 1943.

Langley co-founded the Elite Basketball Organization (EBO) with Darren Matsubara in 1991. EBO is recognized as one of the most respected AAU basketball programs in the country. He also coached the Colorado Pump-and-Run AAU team for David and Dana Pump, two very prominent names in college basketball.

"I've known Fred for 15 years now," said UW head coach Heath Schroyer. "I feel extremely fortunate to have someone of his talent with me as we continue to build this program. I rely on Fred daily in all aspects of the program. Without question, Fred is the total package as a coach. We are lucky to have him at the University of Wyoming."

Langley graduated from Fresno State in 1987. Langley and his wife, Christine, have one son, Payton, and one daughter, Kayla.



Shaun Vandiver has spent six seasons as a member of the Cowboy basketball family. He is entering his fifth season in his current capacity as a full-time assistant coach with the Cowboys.

Vandiver returned to the University of Wyoming basketball program in the summer of 2005 in a full-time coaching role. He was originally a graduate assistant at Wyoming during the 2002-03 season.

After his original time at Wyoming, Vandiver moved on to Bowling Green State University in Bowling Green, Ohio. Vandiver served as a full-time assistant coach for one season, 2003-04, with the Falcons. Immediately prior to returning to Laramie, Vandiver was an assistant coach at the University of Northern Colorado during the 2004-05 season.

Vandiver was an outstanding player at the University of Colorado from the 1988-89 season through the 1990-91 campaign. While at CU, Vandiver earned Big 8 Newcomer of the Year honors his first season, and was named First Team All-Big 8 Conference for both the 1989-90 and 1990-91 seasons. His senior season, he led the Buffs to the National Invitation Tournament finals in New York City, where they finished third.

He was the first round draft choice of the Golden State Warriors in the 1991 NBA Draft -- the No. 25 overall pick.

After his collegiate career, Vandiver enjoyed a nine-year professional playing career in Europe. He played for teams in: Bologna, Italy (1991-92); Bilbao, Spain (1992-93); Girona, Spain (1993-94); Reggio Calabria, Italy (1994-95); Las Palmas, Spain (1995-97); and Madrid, Spain (1997-2001).

Vandiver is 41 years old (born June 15, 1968), and is a native of Bolingbrook, Ill. He and his wife, the former Danielle Dodgion, have five children: Aubrey (age 20), Amber (16), Garin (14), Alessandra (6) and Gage (5).

His daughter Aubrey is entering her fourth season as a scholarship student-athlete on the Cowgirl Basketball team. She was a key contributor in the Cowgirls' run to the 2007 WNIT Championship and the 2008 NCAA Tournament.

"Shaun is as good of a human being as I have come to know in this business," said UW head coach Heath Schroyer. "His loyalty to the University of Wyoming and to the players in this program has been very, very apparent to me over the past two years. As a former great college and pro player himself, I believe Shaun has a unique perspective to offer young people about what it takes to succeed at this level on and off the court.

"Shaun has a great basketball mind, and is a valued asset to this program."



Anthony Stewart is entering his third season as an assistant at the University of Wyoming and his eighth overall season as a college coach.

As a recruiter at Wyoming, Stewart has focused on recruiting the Midwest and especially his home state of Ohio. Stewart, a native of Akron, Ohio, has kept Ohio basketball in the family and has helped bring three Ohio natives to the Cowboy basketball program. Those Ohio natives include A.J. Davis (Columbus), Daylen Harrison (Akron) and Desmar Jackson (Warren).

Stewart has four years of experience as an NCAA Division I coach, serving as an assistant at Long Beach State for the 2004-05 and 2005-06 seasons before joining the Wyoming staff prior to the 2007-08 season. Before returning to coaching, Stewart returned to graduate school in 2006 to complete his master's degree in business administration.

As an assistant coach at Long Beach State, Stewart recruited Aaron Nixon, who was the No. 1 ranked junior college player in the country as ranked by the Sporting News. Nixon went on to earn Big West Conference Player of the Year honors for the 2006-07 season, and was also named an Honorable Mention All-American by the Associated Press.

Prior to coaching at Long Beach, Stewart was the top assistant at Columbus State Community College in Columbus, Ohio.

While at Columbus State, he helped develop that program into one of the top Division II junior college programs in the country. In his final season as an assistant coach at CSCC, the Cougars posted a 29-2 record, and were ranked No. 1 in the country before losing to eventual national champion Cuyahoga Community College. Stewart recruited three All-Americans and five First Team All-Conference selections while at Columbus State. The Cougars posted an 86-36 (.705) record in his time at CSCC.

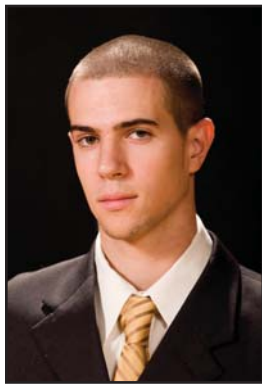
A native of Akron, Ohio, Stewart was a two-sport star at Mount Union College in Alliance, Ohio. He was twice named Most Valuable Player of the Mount Union basketball team, and concluded his college career ranked on Mount Union's all-time scoring list. 2009-10: After gaining a great deal of experience as a true freshman in 2008-09, Davis looks to be a major factor in the Cowboy lineup as a sophomore. He is a multidimensional guard that can really get to the basket. Standing 6-6, Davis brings good size to the guard position. He also does a great job of rebounding from his guard position.

2008-09: As a true freshman, Davis was an integral part of the Cowboy lineup and provided a spark off of the bench. He played in 30 games, starting three. He showed his ability to electrify a crowd with some big dunks during the course of the season. In fact, he finished the year with 13 dunks, which were the fourth most on Wyoming's roster. His most memorable game came against Johnson & Wales, as he started his first career game and responded with a career high 14 points and a career high seven rebounds. He provided a big spark in numerous conference wins, scoring six points in a home win over Air Force and five apiece in home wins over UNLV and TCU. In that big home win over UNLV, Davis brought the Arena-Auditorium crowd to its feet twice, with a pair of big dunks in the first half. Two of his best games came during UW's final two games of the season. In the semifinals of the MWC Tournament against Utah, he scored seven points. He then scored six in the first round of the CBI against Northeastern. On the year, Davis averaged 2.8 points, 2.3 rebounds and 12.1 minutes per game.

Before Wyoming: Davis came to Wyoming from Harmony Community School in Cincinnati, Ohio where he spent the 2007-08 academic year. Prior to that, Davis attended Linden-McKinley High School in his hometown of Columbus, Ohio.

Davis was a standout high school basketball player at Linden-McKinley and received numerous honors during his career. He was a First Team All-City and All-District performer following his senior year of 2006-07. That season, he averaged 21.0 points, nine rebounds and six assists a game. As a junior, Davis averaged 16.7 points a game and earned Honorable Mention All-District honors. During his sophomore season, he helped lead Linden-McKinley to the Ohio Division II state semifinals while averaging 11 points a game. He was ranked as the No. 2 wing and the No. 8 overall player in the state of Ohio by *PrepSpotlight.com* coming out of high school.

At Harmony Prep, Davis averaged 18 points, five rebounds and three assists a game.

Davis was also recruited by Toledo, Akron, Virginia Tech and South Florida.

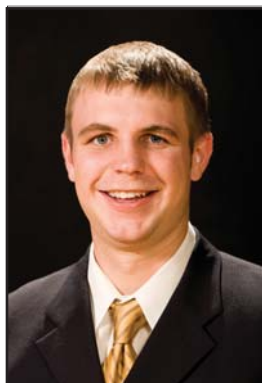

2009-10: Now entering his senior season, Ryan Dermody looks to rebound from an injury plagued junior year. Dermody is a very intelligent player, who has a great understanding of the game of basketball. He can hurt an opponent in many ways, both offensively and defensively.

2008-09: Dermody had an injury plagued junior season. To begin the year, he dislocated his left elbow in practice on Nov. 11, right between UW's exhibition game against the Colorado School of Mines and their season opener. That elbow injury forced Dermody to miss the first 21 games of the season. He returned to the floor on Feb. 3 as the Cowboys faced New Mexico on the road. Over the next six games, he averaged over 11 minutes per game. During that sixth game back, Dermody had his best performance of the season. He scored seven points in nine minutes to key a big road win over arch-rival Colorado State. However, he sprained his left ankle toward the end of that game and was forced back to the sideline. From that point on, he only played in one more game. On the year, Dermody played in seven games, starting one. He averaged 1.6 points and 1.9 rebounds in 10.4 minutes per game.

2007-08: Ryan Dermody was Wyoming's third leading scorer and rebounder during his sophomore season, averaging 9.3 points and 5.3 rebounds a game. He was also second on the Wyoming squad in blocked shots, and ranked No. 4 in the Mountain West Conference with 1.13 blocks per game. He also ranked No. 12 in the league in rebounding (5.3 rpg), No. 4 in minutes played (33.57 mpg) and No. 10 in defensive rebounding (4.13 rpg). The sophomore scored in double figures 13 times during the season, including a career high 24 points against New Mexico in Laramie. Against his former team, Colorado, he scored 18 points and pulled down nine rebounds in a 73-64 Wyoming win. Dermody also recorded two double-doubles as a sophomore (14 points and 11 rebounds versus CU-Colorado Springs and 15 points and 10 rebounds against Arkansas-Pine Bluff).

2006-07: Dermody became eligible for the Wyoming Cowboys at the beginning of the 2007 spring semester after satisfying NCAA transfer rules. He played in 16 of 18 games during the spring semester, averaging 15.1 minutes per game. Dermody averaged 2.9 points and 1.9 rebounds, while shooting 44.7 percent from the field. He had one double-figure scoring game on the season, with 10 versus San Diego State in Laramie on Feb. 17. His best rebounding game was at UNLV on Feb. 10, where he pulled down six rebounds. Dermody started one game -- at Air Force on Feb. 3.

2005-06: Dermody transferred to Wyoming in the spring semester of 2006 after originally walking onto the University of Colorado basketball team in the fall of 2005. Dermody redshirted during the 2005-06 season.

High School: Dermody earned All-State and All-Area Player of the Year honors both his junior and senior years at Loveland High School in Loveland, Colo. He averaged 19 points, nine rebounds, two blocks, 1.5 assists and 1.5 steals per game his senior season. He tied a state of Colorado single-game record with 12 blocks. He also had one triple-double in high school, scoring 21 points, pulling down 13 rebounds and blocking 12 shots.

As a junior, Dermody averaged 18 points, eight rebounds and two blocks. His sophomore season, he scored 14 points per game, grabbed five rebounds per contest and blocked 2.5 shots per game.

He was elected a team captain as a senior, and his Loveland High teams qualified for the state playoffs all four years during his high school career.

Dermody lettered four years in basketball at Loveland where he played for head coach Shawn Pitts.

Personal: Born Jan. 13, 1987, he is the eldest of three children of Leslie and Shon Dermody. Coming out of high school, Dermody was recruited by Cal Poly, Hawaii, SMU and Vermont. He is majoring in communications.

"We are very excited about adding Desmar to the Cowboy basketball family," Schroyer said. "He has unlimited potential and a chance to be a very special player. He is a versatile combination guard who can play the point or either wing

position. He can also defend all three guard positions. He is a good, young player who, when added to our current guys, will help build a great core for the future.

Before Wyoming: Jackson began his high school career at Warren Kennedy High School but transferred to Warren G. Harding prior to his junior season, following a coaching change at Warren Kennedy. In two years at Warren G. Harding, Jackson helped lead his school to a combined record of 46-5.

As a senior, Jackson was named to the Associated Press All-Ohio First Team for Division I, the highest classification in Ohio. While he was a great scorer and averaged 20.5 points a game, Jackson was far from just a scorer. He also averaged 4.0 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.3 steals per game.

2009-10: After sitting out of competition during the 2008-09 season, JayDee Luster is anxious to make an impact on the floor for the Wyoming basketball program. While he has yet to play a game for the Brown and Gold, Luster received one of the most prestigious honors a player can earn as he was selected as the Cowboys' team captain in May.

Luster is a true point guard with a great skill set on both ends of the floor. Offensively, his quickness allows him to create numerous opportunities for his teammates. He also has the ability to score the ball himself both off of the dribble and from the perimeter. Defensively, he will create problems for opponents' ball handlers with his quickness. Coach Schroyer calls him a "born leader who makes everyone around him a better player".

2008-09: After transferring to UW from New Mexico State University, Luster had to sit out of competition during the 2008-09 season to satisfy NCAA transfer rules. He used his redshirt year and therefore did not lose a year of eligibility. He was able to practice with the Cowboys and participate in virtually all team activities, with the exception of games. He also led Wyoming's scout team in practice and was able to go against former Cowboy Brandon Ewing every day. That experience allowed Luster to greatly improve his game.

Before Wyoming: Luster, a native of San Diego, Calif., transferred to the University of Wyoming from New Mexico State where he spent the 2007-08 season. In his only season with the New Mexico State Aggies, Luster appeared in 27 games as a true freshman. On the year, he shot 40 percent from the field while dishing out 30 assists and recording nine steals.

Luster had a tremendous high school career at Hoover High School in San Diego, Calif., where he played for coach Ollie Goulston. At Hoover, Luster became San Diego's all-time assists and steals leader with 857 and 559, respectively.

Entering his senior season, Luster had hopes of joining Jason Kidd as only the second high school player in history to score 2,000 points, dish out 1,000 assists and record 500 steals in a

career. However, Luster played in just 11 games before an injury forced him to the sidelines for the remainder of the season. Despite missing a majority of his senior season, his 559 career steals ranked him third all-time nationally and second in his home state of California. He also finished with 1,890 career points and 857 assists.

As Hoover's starting point guard for all four years of his career, Luster averaged 19.5 points, 8.8 assists, 5.8 steals and 4.3 rebounds. Prior to the injury his senior year, he was averaging 23.3 points a game, 7.7 assists and 7.1 steals.

In his time at Hoover High School, Luster received numerous career honors. He was selected as a *Student Sports Magazine* All-American three times, was a three-time All-State selection, was the Central League Player of the year twice and an All-Central League selection all four years of his career. As a junior, he helped lead Hoover to the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) San Diego Championship, the school's first in 44 years. Hoover also posted a school record 28 wins and closed the season 28-6. In his career, Hoover won two Central League Championships and appeared in the CIF finals twice.

Personal: Luster was born on Jan. 14, 1989 in San Diego, Calif. He is the son of Laini Patton and has a younger sister. He is majoring in communications.

the leading scorer in the 2009 NJCAA National Tournament. With his junior college experience, he should make an immediate impact for the Cowboys as only a sophomore.

"Thomas is a very good acquisition for our program and we are thrilled that he is going to be a Cowboy," UW head coach Heath Schroyer said. "He brings college experience to the table, but will also be able to be a three-year player for the Cowboys. With losing two guards like Brandon (Ewing) and Sean (Ogirri), we knew we needed to add a punch to our perimeter and Thomas is that punch. He is a talented guard who can score in a variety of ways."

Before Wyoming: Manzano, a Brooklyn, N.Y. native, comes to Wyoming after spending his freshman season at Garden City Community College in Garden City, Kan.

Manzano had a terrific freshman season at Garden City, as he helped guide his team to a sixth place finish in the NJCAA National Tournament in Hutchinson, Kan. The Broncbusters won the Region VI Championship for the first time since 1956 and Manzano was the MVP of the Region VI Tournament. He averaged 18.5 points a game in the Region VI Tournament.

Manzano had a terrific showing at the NJCAA National Championships and was named to the All-Tournament Team after averaging 26.0 points a game in the tournament. By scoring 104 total points in the tournament, he led all players in scoring. That included a 38-point performance in Garden City's opening round win.

Following the season, Manzano was selected as an NJCAA Honorable Mention All-American. He led Garden City in both scoring and rebounding with respective averages of 16.2 and 6.0 per game.

2009-10: Afam Muojeke, the reigning MWC Freshman of the Year, is poised for a stellar sophomore season at Wyoming. He is the Cowboy's top returning scorer and rebounder, after averaging 13.8 points and 5.3 rebounds a game as a redshirt freshman.

2008-09: Muojeke's tremendous freshman season was highlighted by his selection as the Mountain West Conference's Freshman of the Year, which was voted on by the league's head coaches and media members. He was also selected as an Honorable Mention All-Freshman by *Collegehoops.net*, one of only 34 freshman recognized nationally. Finally, he was also named an All-Freshman by *Rivals.com* for all conferences outside the ACC, Big East, Big Ten, Big XII, Pac 10 and SEC.

Mujoeke was the top freshman in the MWC in both scoring and rebounding, averaging 13.8 points and 5.3 rebounds a game. Those averages were the 12th and 10th best overall in the MWC. By scoring 454 points on the season, Muojeke turned in the best scoring season by a freshman in MWC history. He broke Brandon Ewing's record of 420 points, which was set during the 2005-06 season. Muojeke's 175 season rebounds are the seventh most by a freshman in MWC history. Muojeke's rebounding drastically improved over the final 14 games of the season, as he pulled down 98 rebounds for an average of 7.0 per game during that stretch. In UW's previous 19 games, Muojeke had 77 rebounds for an average of 4.1 per game. In the Cowboys' homewin over Air Force, Muojeke recorded his first career double-double with 16 points and 10 rebounds. In UW's home win over Colorado State, Muojeke had the second best scoring performance of his career with 25. He also blocked a career high two shots. He set the tone for his spectacular freshman season right out of the blocks, as he scored a career high 31 points in UW's season opening win over Cal State Bakersfield, which was his first career college game. Those 31 points against CSUB tie for the 15th best individual scoring performance in Arena-Auditorium history. In the game, he made 15 free-throws which are the fourth most in a single game in Arena-Auditorium history and a tie for the ninth most in school history. Those free throws also set an MWC record for most free throws made by a freshman. On the season, Muojeke played in all 33 games and started 31. He scored in double figures 22 times.

2007-08: Muojeke redshirted his true freshman season of 2007-08.

Before Wyoming: Muojeke attended Genesis One Preparatory School in Mendenhall, Miss. where he averaged 23.7 points, 5.0 rebounds and 3.0 assists per game. He helped lead Genesis One to a 21-14 record in 2006-07. Genesis One was ranked as high as No. 8 in the nation among prep schools by *HoopsUSA.com*. It included the 2006-07 season as the consolation champion at the National Association of Christian Athletes (NACA) National Tournament in Dayton, Tenn. His first season at Genesis One, Muojeke averaged 21 points, six rebounds and six assists. His prep school coach was Vic Evans.

Prior to attending Genesis One Prep, Muojeke played his high school basketball at Monsignor McClancy High School in East Elmhurst, N.Y., and John Bowne High School in Flushing, N.Y. In the summers, he played AAU basketball for the New York Sky Riders, participating for the Sky Riders in the Adidas 64 Tournament in Las Vegas, Nev., in the summer of 2006.

Personal: Born July 7, 1988, Muojeke is originally from Jamaica, N.Y. His parents are Eucharia and John Muojeke. Muojeke was also recruited by Colorado, Minnesota, New Mexico, Ole Miss, Pepperdine and Tennessee. He is majoring in social sciences.

2009-10: While Djibril Thiam has only played 22 career games in a Wyoming uniform, he will be looked to as a veteran leader in 2009-10. As a junior in 2009-10, Thiam is one of only two upper classmen on UW's roster, along with senior Ryan Dermody. However, that leadership role sits just fine with Thiam. He is an extremely athletic forward who can fill up a stat sheet in numerous ways. As a sophomore, he averaged 5.2 points, 5.1 rebounds, 0.96 blocks and 0.92 assists per game.

2008-09: After sitting out during the 2008 fall semester due to transfer rules, Thiam made a major impact for the Cowboys during UW's final 26 games. On the season, he averaged 5.1 rebounds per game, which was the 13th best rebounding average in the MWC. He also ranked fourth in the MWC in blocked shots, blocking 25 shots for an average of 0.96 per game. He averaged 5.2 points a game, including three double-figure scoring games. He scored a career high 12 points in UW's home loss to New Mexico on March 7. He then scored 10 against the Lobos, all in the second half, in UW's MWC Tournament Quarterfinal win. In the Cowboys' road win over Colorado State on Feb. 25, Thiam scored nine points, had five rebounds and played a career high 32 minutes. In UW's win over UNLV on Feb. 18, Thiam also scored nine points. It was an especially impressive performance considering he partially dislocated high left shoulder the previous Saturday at San Diego State.

On the season, Thiam pulled down double-digit rebounds in three games, including a career high 11 in UW's win over Houston Baptist. Thiam recorded his first career double-double, in just his third career game, in UW's win over Sacramento State with 11 points and 10 rebounds. In his first career game at Wyoming, Thiam helped lead the Pokes to a win over Northern Iowa, who played in the 2009 NCAA Tournament. In the game, Thiam pulled down seven rebounds, blocked two shots and scored three points.

Before Wyoming: Thiam transferred to UW from Baylor University prior to the 2008 spring semester. Thiam practiced with the Cowboys throughout the second half of the 2007-08 season.

Thiam played in the first seven games of the 2007-08 season for Baylor before deciding to transfer. He was averaging 2.7 points, 4.1 rebounds and 17.3 minutes per game, while shooting 60.0 percent from the field (9 of 15 field goals) as a redshirt freshman. He also was a perfect 1 of 1 from three-point range.

Thiam played a career high 27 minutes in a 68-64 Baylor win over Notre Dame in the semifinals of the 2007 Paradise Jam in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands on Nov. 18. In that victory over the Irish, he grabbed four rebounds, scored two points and blocked one shot. He scored a career high five points in a 64-55 opening round win over Wichita State in the '07 Paradise Jam.

Baylor went on to win the Paradise Jam Championship, defeating Winthrop in the Championship Game, 62-54. Twice during the 2007-08 season, Thiam pulled down a career best seven rebounds -- versus Centenary, in an 85-62 Baylor win, and against Mississippi Valley State in an 82-50 Baylor Bear victory.

Thiam began his college career at Baylor in the 2006-07 season, but suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee on Nov. 20, 2006, versus Texas Southern. He was averaging 1.8 points and 1.3 rebounds per game in his first four games before suffering the season-ending injury. The NCAA granted Thiam a medical hardship for the season, giving him his freshman season back. As a freshman in 2006-07, he earned Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll during the spring of '07. His season bests in the '06-'07 season were five points, three rebounds and 17 minutes in a win over Angelo State on Nov. 11, 2006.

Thiam attended the BSBS Basketball school in his native Senegal, before playing one year of high school basketball at Stoneridge Preparatory School in Tarzana, Calif. He was ranked as the No. 81 national recruit by *HoopScoop.com* during his senior season at Stoneridge Prep. *Rivals.com* rated him as the No. 93 top recruit nationally. Thiam helped lead Stoneridge to a high ranking of No. 14 by *PrepStars.com* during his senior season.

Personal: Born July 6, 1986, Thiam is the son of Amadou Lamine Thiam and Ndeye Sar. Both of his parents played basketball for the Senegalese National Team. Thiam can speak three languages including English, French and Wolof (Senegal). He is studying communications at the University of Wyoming.

2009-10: Though only a sophomore, Adam Waddell has a great deal of experience and looks to continue to improve as he begins his sophomore season in 2009-10. After a medical redshirt freshman season, Waddell became Wyoming's starting center as only a redshirt freshman. Waddell is very athletic and brings a great deal of energy to the floor. He looks to team with fellow sophomore Boubacar Sylla to form one of the top front courts in the Mountain West Conference.

2008-09: Waddell was Wyoming's starting center for the final 21 games of the season and for 23 of UW's final 24 games. On the season, he averaged 5.1 points, 3.9 rebounds and 0.64 blocks per game. His 21 blocked shots gave him the ninth best average in the MWC. In UW's win over Texas State, Waddell scored a career high 16 points, pulled down a then career high eight rebounds, and had a career high two steals. He pulled down a career high 10 rebounds at Boise State. In the First Round of the CBI, Waddell had one of his best games of the season, scoring 11 points and pulling down seven rebounds. With just under 15 minutes remaining in that CBI game, Waddell had a steal and, following his fast break dunk, flipped backwards off of the rim. That highlight gave Waddell a great deal of media exposure. Waddell traveled to New York City and was a live guest on "The Today Show" on NBC. He also did national phone interviews on ESPN's "First Take" and Fox News' morning show "Fox and Friends". Waddell handed out a career high four assists in UW's home win over TCU on Feb. 21. In UW's loss at TCU, Waddell scored a conference career high 10 points. He matched that total with 10 points in UW's win over UNLV on Feb. 18.

2007-08: Adam Waddell played in the first six games of the 2007-08 season before suffering a stress fracture to his left foot. He sat out the remainder of the season, and was granted a medical hardship ruling from the NCAA to get his freshman season back. In his first six games of the season, Waddell averaged 4.0 points, 1.7 rebounds and 11.7 minutes. He scored a career best 12 points in a 75-71 Wyoming road win at Lamar. Waddell's best rebounding game prior to his injury came against Arkansas-Pine Bluff, when he pulled down six rebounds.

Before Wyoming: As a senior at Cody High School in Cody, Wyo., he earned All-State and All-North Conference honors. He led the state in rebounding in Class 4A, averaging 9.5 rebounds per game (3.1 offensive rebounds per game and 6.4 defensive boards per game). He ranked second in the state in blocked shots (2.1 blocks per game), and was fourth in the state in field-goal percentage (61.6 percent). He also ranked second in the North Conference in scoring, averaging 18.0 points per game. His season highs included a 35-point game versus Lyman, Wyo., and a 15-rebound performance against Kelly Walsh High School of Casper, Wyo. His senior season he played in 23 games, scored 414 total points, pulled down 218 rebounds (70 offensive and 148 defensive), blocked 49 shots and shot 61.6 percent from the field (making 167 of 271 field-goal attempts).
