2007 Wyoming Coaches

Cowgirl Soccer Head Coach

Anne Moore (North Carolina State, '93)

Anne Moore enters her ninth season as the head soccer coach at the University of Wyoming after leading the program to the four best seasons in school history, over the past four years. Over that four year span, the Cowgirls have won 35 games and placed ten Cowgirls on the Mountain West Conference First and Second Teams.

Moore is just the second head soccer coach in Wyoming history as she became UW's coach on Jan. 14, 1999.

Last season, Moore guided the Cowgirls to an overall record of 7-9-3, and a fifth place tie with San Diego State in the Mountain West Conference and helped place one Cowgirl on the MWC Second Team.

Following the 2003 season, Moore was named the MWC Coach of the Year. That season, she led the Cowgirls to a record of 10-9, the best finish in the program's history at the time. The Cowgirls finished the MWC regular season in a second place tie with BYU with a conference mark of 4-2, Wyoming's best conference finish ever.

Prior to accepting the position at Wyoming, Moore gained experience with another young soccer program. As the first women's soccer coach in East Tennessee State University history, she helped start the program in 1997 and coached the Buccaneers for two years before coming to Wyoming. She also served as a graduate assistant for two years at Virginia Tech before becoming their first full-time assistant coach from 1993-97.

Moore had an outstanding collegiate soccer career at North Carolina State, where she was a four-year letterwinner from 1989-93. While playing at N.C. State, Moore's teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament every season, including two trips to the Elite Eight and a Final Four berth 1989.

Moore earned her undergraduate degree in 1993 from North Carolina State with a bachelor of arts in communications degree. She then earned a master's of education degree with a concentration in sports management from Virginia Tech in 1995.

Besides her university coaching experience, Moore has also served as the Director of Coaching, in both Virginia and Tennessee for club programs, and has been actively involved in the Olympic Development programs in both Tennessee and Wyoming. She received her United States Soccer Federation "B" License in 2001 and her NSCAA Advanced National License in 1998.

In her time at Wyoming, Moore has guided a Cowgirl on to the MWC first team five times and individuals onto the second team nine times. Her teams have also seen much success in the classroom as a Cowgirl has been selected academic all-conference 79 times and selected as a scholar athlete 31 times. She also helped guide Lori Scheider onto the Academic All-America Third Team following the 2003 season.

A Springfield, Va. native, Moore and her husband Curt, a police officer in Laramie, have two sons; Blake (8) and Kyle (5).

Cowgirl Soccer Associate Head Coach

Kim Whisenant (North Carolina State, '96)

Kim Whisenant enters her fourth season as a Wyoming soccer assistant coach. She returned to Wyoming in 2004 for a second tenure as assistant coach, as she was also a coach at UW during the 1999 and 2000 seasons. She was promoted to Associate Head Coach prior to the 2006 season. In her first season back with the Cowgirls, she helped guide UW to the second best finish in school history as they finished with a record of 9-7-4 and placed a record four players on the Mountain West Conference first and second teams. In her second season, the Cowgirls finished 9-7-3, the best winning percentage in school history, and placed two players on the MWC All-Conference teams. In 2006 she helped lead the Cowgirls to a 7-9-3 record.

Whisenant spent the 2001 and 2002 seasons as an assistant coach at Tulane University. While with Tulane, she helped guide the Green Wave to their first winning season in six years as they went 9-8 in 2001.

Before initially joining the Cowgirl staff in 1999, Whisenant served as a graduate assistant coach at East Tennessee State University, under UW head coach Anne Moore, during the 1997 and 1998 seasons.

Whisenant played four seasons at North Carolina State where she helped lead the Wolfpack to three NCAA tournament appearances. During her senior season, North Carolina State reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament and was at one time ranked as high as sixth nationally. Following college, she played in the U.S.W.I.S.L for the Baltimore Lady Bays, the Maryland Pride and the Fort Collins Force.

Whisenant earned her bachelor's degree in communication from North Carolina State in 1996. She holds an Advanced National Diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association and an USSF "A" license from the United States Soccer Federation.

The former Kim Murphy, she is married to UW Associate Athletics Director Matt Whisenant. The couple has a son, Landon Thomas, who will turn four in December and daughter Chloe Ann, who turned one in April.

Cowgirl Soccer Assistant Coach

Lori Scheider (Wyoming, '04)

Scheider, a Littleton, Colo. native, enters her second season as a Wyoming soccer assistant coach at her alma mater. During her playing career, she was one of the most outstanding goalkeepers in Wyoming soccer history as she played for the Cowgirls from 2001-03, after transferring to UW from Portland State in 2001.

After graduating from Wyoming in the spring of 2004 with a B.A. in Criminal Justice, Scheider was hired as an assistant coach at Idaho University where she coached the Vandals during the 2004 season. At Idaho, she coached Idaho's starting goalkeeper to the team's most valuable player award after recording the most saves in a single season in Idaho history. Idaho's back-up goalkeeper was selected as the team's most improved player.

Scheider spent the 2005 season at the Colorado School of Mines as an assistant women's soccer coach and a volunteer assistant men's coach. While in Denver, she also coached for the Douglas County Soccer Association. Scheider holds a USSF National "D" License.

During her playing career at Wyoming, Scheider set numerous career and single season records in the Cowgirl goal. She compiled 324 career saves, the second most in UW history, and had the highest career goals against average at the end of her career. She ranks near the top of three single-season records including the most goalkeeper minutes played in a single season (1707), the third most saves in a season (133) and the fourth best goals against average in a season (1.32).

During her senior season, Scheider was a team captain and helped lead the Cowgirls to the program's best ever conference finish, a tie for second in the Mountain West. That year, the Cowgirls finished with an overall record of 10-9 and a MWC mark of 4-2, the best finish in UW history at the time. Scheider led the MWC in saves (133), saves per game (7.39) and recorded a league high seven shutouts as a senior.

Along with Mercy Adetoye and Kristen Stangl, she was one of the first Cowgirls to be named to the MWC First Team, as she received the honor in 2003. She was also a Second Team All-MWC selection as a junior.

Scheider was an excellent student at Wyoming. She was named Third Team Scholar All-American by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America and Adidas in 2003, was an MWC Academic All-Conference selection in 2003 and a three-time member of the Arts and Sciences Dean's List.

2006 Season in Review

Cowgirls fall short in '06

The Cowgirls got off to a rocky start in 2006 losing four of their first six games. However, they never gave up and came storming back winning their next four straight games to reach the mid-point of the year with a 5-4-1 record heading into conference action.

After their big mid-season push, the Cowgirls came up just short in conference play finishing in fifth place with a 2-3-2 record. The Cowgirls only gave up seven goals in conference play, their second best goals against average in history.

The end of the season proved to be a tough one for the Cowgirls as they lost four of their last six games including a 1-0 loss at the buzzer to UNLV in the MWC Tournament. The Cowgirls have yet to win a MWC Tournament game, eight of those ten losses have come by just one goal and the last six have all been one goal losses.

The Cowgirl defense had a spectacular season as they allowed an average of just 1.07 goals a game for the second best goals against average in UW history. The defense also shutout its opponents five times and allowed just one goal in eight other games.

2006 Post Season Notes

* The Cowgirls have won 35 games over the past four seasons, and finished the 2006 season with an overall record of 7-9-3. In 2005, the Cowgirls finished with a 9-7-3 record, the best winning percentage (.553) in UW history. The Cowgirls finished 9-7-4 in 2004 for the second best winning percentage (0.55) in UW history.

* The Cowgirls finished the 2006 regular season in fifth place in the MWC, the third best finish in school history. That marked the third time an Anne Moore coached team has finished fifth. The Cowgirls best conference finish came in 2003 as they tied with BYU for second place. Moore's teams have also finished third and fourth during her career.

* Sophomore Amanda Lathrop was named to the MWC Championships All-Tournament team. Lathrop finished the season with one goal and one assist for the Cowgirls.

* The Cowgirls had a fantastic freshman class which played in a combined 104 games in 2006. The Cowgirl freshman class scored six of UW's 16 goals on the season.

* Cowgirl seniors Kristen Stangl, Christina Best and Carolyn Clarke helped lead the Cowgirl defense in allowing just 1.07 goals a game last season, the second best goals against average in school history. They also shutout their opponents five times and allowed just one goal on eight other occasions.

* The Cowgirls lost their tenth postseason game as they lost to UNLV in the 2006 MWC Tournament. The Cowgirls are now 0-10 all-time and 0-8 in MWC postseason history. Eight of those ten losses have come by just one goal and the last six have all been one goal losses.
