- SEC Players of the Week for games of Aug. 30-Sept. 1: Earl Bennett, WR, Vanderbilt (Offense), Dustin Mouzon, DB, Ole Miss (Defense), Felix Jones, RS/RB, Arkansas (Special Teams), Fernando Velasco, C, Georgia (Offensive Lineman), Quentin Groves, DE, Auburn (Defensive Lineman) and Terry Grant, WR, Alabama (Freshman).
- SEC enters its 75th season of play in 2007.
- The SEC posted a 9-1 non-conference mark in Week 1, tops in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision.
- The SEC has six teams ranked in the pre-season Top 25 polls, the most of any conference.
- Since the inception of the Bowl Championship Series, the SEC leads all conferences with three national championships (Tennessee-1998; LSU-2003; Florida-2006).
- Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC and Big 12 are tied for the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with five each. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (Florida-1996,2006; LSU-2003; Tennessee-1998; Alabama-1992).
- Since 2000, the SEC has had more teams ranked in the final USA Today coaches poll than any other conference (34).
- Since 2000, the SEC has the nation's top non-conference winning percentage (including bowl games) since 2000 (247-95, 72.2 percent).
- In Week 1, SEC stadiums were filled to 98.05 percent of capacity. The SEC has led the nation in total attendance for 26 straight seasons.
- Using current conference alignments, SEC teams have appeared in more bowl games (352) than any other conference. Since 2000, the SEC has more bowl appearances (52) and bowl wins (29) than any other conference.

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

Each head coach is allowed one Instant Replay challenge per game, which is exercised by requesting a team timeout. A head coach may issue a challenge only if his team has one or more timeouts remaining in the half. If the challenged ruling is overturned, the timeout is not charged, but the coach has no more challenges during that game.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference, following approval by the NCAA Football Rules Committee, will implement the use of video replay on an experimental basis beginning with the 2005 football season.

THE PLAYS

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line

2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver

 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - c. Touching of a kick
 - d. Number of players on field
 - e. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - f. Fourth-down/try fumble plays

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

2007 SEC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The SEC's Eastern and Western Division winners will meet in Atlanta's Georgia Dome to battle for the league championship and the right to represent the conference in the Bowl Championship Series. The 16th-annual title game is set for December 1 and will be nationally televised by CBS Sports at 4:00 p.m. ET.

The game is a result of conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Under NCAA regulations, a conference with 12 members may play a 12th football game to determine its champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The participants of the game are determined each year during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the best overall SEC winning percentage in each division.

The 1994 SEC Championship Game earned a 10.5 rating and a 26 share, the highest rated SEC Championship Game in history.

The SEC Championship Game has also drawn capacity crowds in its history. 1,120,836 fans have witnessed first-hand the pageantry of SEC Football at the 15 previous Championship Games.

Attendance at the 15 previous championship games has been 102.3 percent of stadium capacity, including 13 sellouts.

CBS SPORTS - The 2007 season marks the 11th year for CBS as the league's national network television partner. CBS will televise up to 15 games per year throughout the season. CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 1 at 4 p.m. ET.

ESPN/ESPN2, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com (search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

LINCOLN FINANCIAL SPORTS (LFS) (Formerly Jefferson-Pilot Sports) will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send eight of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2007 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection of available SEC teams.

2008 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2007 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2007 regular season, the Allstate BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in New Orleans on Jan. 7 at 8 p.m. EST. The Allstate BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2007 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, and the Orange Bowl on Jan. 3 at 8 p.m. ET.

THIS WEEK IN SEC FOOTBALL HISTORY

As the Southeastern Conference celebrates its 75th anniversary, here is a look at some of the highlights during the upcoming game dates in its history:

Sept. 8

1979 - Defending National Champion and #3 ranked Alabama kicked off its run to a second straight National Championship season with a 30-6 win at Georgia Tech.

1984 - Kentucky registered its largest opening day shutout in 26 seasons, defeating Kent State, 42-0, in Lexington. (1958, 51-0 vs. Hawaii).

1984 - LSU and Florida tied 21-21 at Florida Field in the first ever SEC Football Game of the Week. Bob Neal and Tim Foley called the game for WTBS. Since the formation of the SEC Football Game of the Week, it has been carried on WTBS and Jefferson-Pilot, which is currently named Lincoln Financial Sports.

1984 - Vanderbilt opened its 1984 season with a 26-14 win against Kansas State. The win was the first of four straight in 1984 for the Commodores.

1990 - In his collegiate debut, Stan White tied a school record with four touchdown passes and threw for 324 yards as #3 Auburn defeated Cal State Fullerton, 38-17.

1990 - Florida kicked off the Steve Spurrier era in Gainesville with a 50-7 win over Oklahoma State before a record crowd of 75,428 in "The Swamp."

2001 - #21 South Carolina scored in the last 1:22 to defeat #24 Georgia, 14-9, in Athens. It was the Gamecocks' first win in Athens since 1993.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES

**ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE**

The Crimson Tide kicked off the Nick Saban Era with a 52-6 victory over the Western Carolina Catamounts last weekend. The 52 points scored by Alabama is the second-highest point total ever accumulated by a Crimson Tide head coach in his first game (record: 56 for head coach E.B. Beaumont in the first game in Alabama history vs. Birmingham AC on November 11, 1892). The 52 points scored is also the most points by Alabama on opening day since a 66-0 win over Cal at Legion Field to open the 1973 season. The 46-point margin of victory is the largest by an Alabama team in a season opener since the 1973 Cal game as well. The Alabama offense recorded 35 first downs, which breaks the previous mark of 34, set against Penn State in a 34-28 loss in 1983. Alabama will step into conference action this week when they travel to Nashville, Tenn. for an 11:30 a.m. (CT) kick-off against the Vanderbilt Commodores.

FLORIDA GATORS

Florida Head Coach Urban Meyer is now 7-0 in season openers, including a 3-0 mark at Florida as the Gators defeated Western Kentucky 49-3. The Gators crossed the goal line in each of their first four possessions and went on to score touchdowns in seven of their 10 possessions. For the third straight year, Florida started a true freshman under Urban Meyer. For the first time in school history, Florida started two true freshmen (Joe Haden and Maurkice Pouncey). The Gators continue a three-game homestand and will host Troy for the first time. Florida enters the game on an eight-game win streak, which matches its longest under Coach Urban Meyer. UF's last nine-game win streak came during the 1996 season, when UF won 10 straight games. The longest win streak in school history was 12 games during the 1995 season. The Gators have one 16 straight home games. The current streak is one short of those set from 1973-77 and 1981-84, which stand tied for fourth on UF's all-time chart.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS

Darren McFadden and Felix Jones combined for 280-yards and four touchdowns as the Razorbacks handled Troy 46-26 in the season opener. With his 151-yard performance against Troy, McFadden sits fourth on Arkansas' all-time career rushing list with 2,911 yards. Also, his touchdown in the second quarter moved him into a tie with Cedric Cobbs for fourth with 26 career rushing touchdowns. McFadden also caught two 30-yard passes, and threw a 42-yard pass to Crosby Tuck for his first career touchdown reception. Jones is the first player in school history to have three kickoff returns for touchdowns of 90-plus yards. Arkansas is now 25-3 in non-conference games under head coach Houston Nutt. The Hogs will take a bye week before returning to action on Sept. 15. Arkansas will begin SEC play and travel to Tuscaloosa, Ala. for a 5:45 kickoff against Alabama.

**GEORGIA BULLDOGS**

The Georgia Bulldogs opened its season with a 35-14 victory over the Oklahoma State Cowboys last week, as the Bulldogs improved to 26-2 in non-conference opponents under head coach Mark Richt. Sophomore quarterback Matthew Stafford was 18-for-24 for 234 yards and 2 touchdowns, completing passes to nine different Bulldogs. At the half, he was 8-for-11 for 123 yards. The Bulldogs were 5-for-6 inside the Red Zone (five touchdowns). The only time they failed to score was late in the fourth quarter while running clock. Senior center Fernando Velasco helped Georgia's offense compile 376 total yards against Oklahoma State. Georgia will open SEC action this weekend when they host the South Carolina Gamecocks at 5:45 p.m. (ET).

AUBURN TIGERS

The Auburn Tigers survived a thriller in their season opener as they rallied from a 13-9 deficit and trailed for three quarters, to defeat Kansas State 23-13. Auburn scored two touchdowns, including the go-ahead pass from Brandon Cox to tight-end Gabe McKenzie with 2:01 left in the game for the victory. Next up for Auburn is South Florida. This will be the first meeting between the two teams and both teams are 1-0 heading into the weekend. The Bulls are in the Big East and this marks only the second Big East team Auburn has met during the Tommy Tuberville era. Auburn went 1-1 against Syracuse in 2001 and 2002. The Bulls defeated Elon 28-13 in their season opener. Coach Tommy Tuberville needs just three more victories to become the fifth coach in the SEC with 100 career coaching victories. Senior defensive end Quentin Groves had two sacks in the season-opening victory against Kansas State, pushing his career sacks total to 25. Groves needs just one more sack to tie the Auburn all-time record of 26 sacks held by Gerald Robinson (1982-85).

KENTUCKY WILDCATS

Kentucky opens the season 1-0 after upending Eastern Kentucky 50-10. The 50 points is the most scored by a Kentucky team since 2004 when they put up 51 against Indiana. Dating back to last season, Kentucky has won six of its last seven games. The last time this was accomplished by a Kentucky team was 1984-85. Kentucky has won four in a row in Commonwealth Stadium, the first time that has happened since a four-game home win streak in 1996-97. Rafael Little (2,118 career rushing yards) became the sixth player in school history to reach 2,000 rushing yards. He moved past Artose Pinner (2,105) to take over fifth place on the UK career rushing yardage chart and is now 530 yards behind fourth-place George Adams (2,648). André Woodson extended his school-record streak of consecutive passes without an interception to 191. That is the third-longest streak in SEC history, trailing just David Greene of Georgia (214 in 2004) and Stewart Patridge of Ole Miss (1997). The Wildcats will continue their three-game season opening homestand and host Kent State this weekend. Kickoff is set for 6:00 p.m. (ET) at Commonwealth Stadium.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES

LSU TIGERS

LSU's defense recorded seven interceptions in last week's game, marking the first time to collect seven in one game since the 42-6 victory over Tulane on Nov. 22, 1975 in the Superdome. LSU did not record its seventh interception until the fourth game of the season last year. LSU has recorded at least one sack in 20 straight games after a third quarter sack by Al Woods at Mississippi State. The last time LSU's defense did not record a sack was against North Texas last season. With the win over State, LSU moves to 14-3 in SEC games under Les Miles. With the win LSU moves to 81-28-5 in season openers, including five straight wins. The Tigers are now 3-0 in opening game under Les Miles. The win at MSU marks LSU's eighth straight victory (six of the eight have come over SEC opponents) and the third straight SEC road victory. Last week's game is the fourth time LSU has opened the season on the road against an SEC opponent in its history and the first win for the Tigers. S Craig Steltz recorded the sixth, seventh and eighth interceptions of his career at MSU. It was his first career multi-interception game. Steltz became the seventh player to record three interceptions in one game and the first since Corey Webster against Florida in 2002. QB Matt Flynn tossed two touchdowns versus MSU for his fourth career multi-touchdown game. Flynn has now thrown 12 career passing touchdowns. Flynn's 42 rushing yards marks a career-high single-game total.



SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS



South Carolina scored on its first possession of the season for the second time in the three-year history of the "Steve Spurrier Era." Redshirt-freshman Chris Smelley started and directed South Carolina's opening drive, 64 yards, seven plays. Sophomore Tommy Beecher quarterbacked the second drive, 50 yards in five plays, ending in a 19-yard touchdown pass to Kenny McKinley. Both Smelley and Beecher threw TD passes on their first series. Smelley and Beecher combined to complete 21 passes for 238 yards and two touchdowns. Beecher was 11-for-15 for 137 yards. Smelley was 10-for-14 and threw the only Carolina interception of the night. The new rule moving kickoffs back five yards to the 30 yard line had little effect on Gamecock kicker Ryan Succop. Four-of-five kickoffs were in the end zone for touchbacks. Louisiana-Lafayette returned one for 14 yards. Succop was successful on four extra-point attempts, increasing his career total to 41-of-43. He punted three times for a 45 yard average. He missed a 47 yard field goal attempt. Sixth-year senior Andy Boyd caught three passes for 48 yards and one touchdown, a two yard pass from Chris Smelley. Boyd nearly doubled his career reception total. He has seven career receptions, including four touchdowns. South Carolina is now 74-36-4 in season openers.

OLE MISS REBELS



Ole Miss had 13 players make their Rebel debuts at Memphis, including four true freshmen. The win last week gives the Rebels 11 wins in their last 12 season openers, including three straight all against Memphis. The lone blemish was the

20-13 loss to Memphis in 2004. Of Ole Miss' three TDs last week, one was on offense, one on defense and one on special teams. The Rebels' 20-0 halftime lead was their largest since a 24-0 edge on Mississippi State in 2003. Ole Miss was 1-3 when leading at halftime a season ago. Ole Miss' 92-yard scoring drive in the first quarter was its longest since the 2004 Cotton Bowl, when Eli Manning's 1-yard run capped a 97-yard drive. Making his first career start, senior QB Seth Adams turned in the Rebels' first 200-yard passing performance since Micheal Spurlock in the 2005 Alabama game (210). Adams finished 19-of-30 for 201 yards with one TD and no interceptions. The Rebels intercepted four passes for the first time since the 2004 Wyoming game. Junior DB Dustin Mouzon tied the third-longest interception return in school history with a 99-yard TD at the end of the first half. It was the longest since Louis Guy's 103-yard return in a 19-6 win over Tennessee en route to Ole Miss' only undefeated season in 1962. The Rebels' last interception return for a score was Trumaine McBride's 48-yarder in the 2004 LSU game.

TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS



Vols senior quarterback Erik Ainge, playing with a fractured little finger on his right (throwing) hand, was 32-for-47 versus Cal for 271 yards and three TDs. His 32 completions marked a new career high, breaking his old mark of 28 vs. Alabama in 2006. Ainge completed his first 10 passes for 91 yards and a TD. Last year, he had streaks of 15 straight completions vs. Air Force and 11 straight at Vanderbilt. With his performance today, Ainge moved past former Vols quarterback Tee Martin (1996-99) into fifth place on UT's career offense list. Ainge now boasts 5,249 career yards of total offense. Ainge is now 17-7 as a starter, including a 9-2 record on the road. Cal's 45 points were the most scored against Tennessee since Florida handed the Vols a 62-37 loss in Gainesville, Fla., on Sept. 16, 1995. The Golden Bears' 31 first-half points marked the most by a UT opponent since Auburn scored 31 on Oct. 2, 2004 in Knoxville. The only other time a Fulmer-era UT team allowed at least 31 first-half points was vs. Florida on Sept. 21, 1996 (35 points). Adrian Foster had the two longest kickoff returns of his career, posting returns of 23 and 68 yards. His 68-yard return following Cal's first-quarter, 1-yard TD run was the longest kickoff return by a Vol since Mark Jones ran one back 82 yards for a TD vs. Alabama on Oct. 26, 2002. Tennessee's longest kickoff return last season was 40 yards.

MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS

The last time MSU lost back-to-back shutout season openers was 1929 (L, 0-7 to Henderson Brown) and 1930 (L, 0-14 to Southwestern). State's last time to record back-to-back season opener losses to conference opponents came in 1966 (Georgia, 17-20) and 1967 (at Georgia, 0-30). Junior quarterback Michael Henig's six interceptions vs. LSU tied Max Stainbrook's individual school record (vs. Cincinnati, 1949). It also ties the modern game team record (vs. Cincinnati, 1949 and vs. Arkansas, 2003). MSU's longest reception of the game last week was a 45-yard pass to senior wide receiver Tony Burks from Henig. With his 86 yards recorded on kickoff returns this evening, junior returner Derek Pegues moves into fifth on the MSU career list for kickoff return yardage. He passes Fred Reid who tallied 1,303 yards from 2001-04. Pegues is now tied with Reid for fifth on the all-time list with 61 career kickoff returns. In addition to eight first-time starters versus LSU, eight other Bulldogs saw action in their first career game for the Maroon and White last week. Dominic Douglas, making his first career start, led the team with nine tackles last week. He, along with Jimmie Holmes and preseason all-SEC defensive end Titus Brown, accounted for one sack apiece.



VANDERBILT COMMODORES



Two-time All-SEC wide receiver Earl Bennett collected 13 catches for a school-record 223 yards while scoring three touchdowns in the opener. His three TDs were the most since he scored five against Kentucky in 2005. The 223 receiving yards was also the ninth-most in SEC history. Bennett now needs just 35 catches and 848 yards to become the SEC's all-time leader in career receptions and receiving yardage. After being outgained 117-29 in total yardage in the first quarter, Vanderbilt totaled 417 yards through the final three quarters, while holding the Spiders to just 193 yards from that point on. Quarterback Chris Nickson began the game by completing 9-of-9 pass attempts for 117 yards and one touchdown. He did not throw an incompleteness until the 1:11 mark of the first half. Nickson went on to complete 19-of-26 passes for 284 yards and a career-best four-touchdown passes. The 41 points scored by the Commodores was the most in a season opener since scoring 47 against Middle Tennessee State in 1950. Sophomore cornerback D.J. Moore returned a kickoff for 63 yards and also had a dazzling interception return for 22 yards. The interception was also the second of his career.

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last five years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 171 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 79 named to the first-team.
- During the last eleven years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award. In 2006, Alabama track & field athlete Beth Mallory was named a recipient of this award.
- Florida's Chris Leak was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last five years, the SEC has had 11 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2007-08 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama baseball player Emeel Salem and Vanderbilt track & field athlete Erika Schneble were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2006-07.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. Tennessee swimmer Brad Boswell and Florida softball player Stacey Stevens were named recipients of this award in 2006-07.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had four sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Courtney Kupets of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics, Georgia's Kara Lynn Joyce won in Swimming & Diving and Tennessee's Monica Abbott was the top athlete in softball.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 66 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- Since 1990, the SEC has won 118 team and 805 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.8 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (268 of 349). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won more team national championships than any other conference in the nation. The SEC won 50 team titles since 2000, while the Pac-10 won 45 and the Big 12 won 21. The SEC won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, also the most of any conference.

Nick Saban is in his first season at Alabama and in his 14th season overall with a record of 107-59-1 (.644). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Major Applewhite and the defensive coordinator is Kevin Steele.

Bobby Johnson is in his sixth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 16-43 (.271) and in his 14th season overall with a record of 76-79 (.490). The Commodores' offensive coordinator is Ted Cain and the defensive coordinator is Bruce Fowler.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Terry Grant's 134 rushing yards is the fourth-best rushing total in a season opener in Alabama history. The 134 yards are the most by an Alabama back on opening day since Sherman Williams ran for 153 yards against UT Chattanooga on September 3, 1994. The Crimson Tide offense opened the Nick Saban era with a bang as Grant scored a 47-yard touchdown on the first play from

One of the league's top performers at linebacker for the past two seasons, Jonathan Goff is the SEC's third leading active career leader in total tackles and solo tackles. Goff opened the season with seven tackles and an interception vs. Richmond. Curtis Gatewood had four tackles, including one for a loss, vs. Richmond

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Earl Bennett earned SEC Offensive Player of the Week honors by catching 13 passes, good for 223 receiving yards and three touchdowns. He also added 62 yards in punt returns in the opener. Redshirt junior quarterback Chris Nickson was stellar in the opener against Richmond, connecting on his first nine passing attempts en route to an outstanding performance. Nickson concluded with 19 completions in 25 attempts for 284 yards and four touchdowns. Nickson's touchdown passing total marks a single-game career high for the second-year starter.

Bama held Western Carolina to six points in the season opener, the lowest point total by an opponent on opening day since a 41-3 win over Temple on September 7, 1991. Alabama is 16th in scoring defense (6.0) and 12th in turnover margin (+2). True freshman linebacker Rolando McClain started at middle line-backer and true freshman defensive back Kareem Jackson started at nickel back for the Tide, the eighth and ninth true freshmen defenders to start a game at Alabama since freshmen were made eligible to play again in 1972.

SPECIAL TEAMS

The Tide ranks second in the SEC and 14th nationally with 30.67-yard kickoff return average. Alabama is fifth in the SEC and 39th nationally with a 12-yard punt return average.

Bryant Hahnfeldt was successful on two of three field goal attempts last week, and had two touchbacks on kickoffs. Brett Upson enjoyed a net punting average of 41.0 yards, and did not have any of three punts returned. Vanderbilt returners averaged 31.9 yards and 20.7 yards on kickoffs and punts, respectively. D.J. Moore set a career best with a 63-yard kickoff return while Earl Bennett topped his previous best punt return on two occasions.

Steve Spurrier is in his third season at South Carolina with a record of 16-10 (.615) and in his 18th season overall with a record of 158-50-2 (.757). Spurrier serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

Mark Richt is in his seventh season at Georgia and overall with a record of 62-17 (.785). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinator is Willie Martinez.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Cory Boyd rushed for two touchdowns on runs of two and four yards, his ninth and tenth career rushing touchdowns. Boyd also has four career touchdowns on pass receptions. Sixth-year senior Andy Boyd caught three passes for 48 yards and one touchdown, a two yard pass from Chris Smelley. Boyd nearly doubled his career reception total. He has seven career receptions, including four touchdowns.

Out of Georgia's top five tacklers in 2006, only senior safety Kelin Johnson is returning to the Bulldogs in 2007. Johnson, who has appeared in 39 games, is one of the leaders of this year's unit. He finished second on the team with five tackles in the season-opening win over the Cowboys and had one interception. In his first career start coming against Oklahoma State, Dannel Elerbe, playing MLB, led the Bulldogs with a career-high seven tackles, one sack and 1.5 tackles for a loss of 11 yards.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Georgia sophomore QB Matthew Stafford is 7-2 as a starter. He led Georgia to three consecutive wins over ranked opponents to close the 2006 campaign. He was efficient in his 2007 debut on 18-of-24 passing with 234 yards and two TDs during the Bulldogs' 35-14 win over Oklahoma State. Senior center Fernando Velasco was named the SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week.

Defensive end Eric Norwood was a first team Freshman All-American by The Sporting News and earned second team Freshman All-America honors by Rivals.com. Linebacker Rodney Paulk was named to The Sporting News' second team Freshman All-America squad. Senior middle linebacker Jasper Brinkley is an All-America candidate after earning first team All-SEC honors a year ago.

SPECIAL TEAMS

The new rule moving kickoffs back five yards to the 30 yard line had little effect on Gamecock kicker Ryan Succop. Four-of-five kickoffs were in the end zone for touchbacks. Louisiana-Lafayette returned one for 14 yards. Succop was successful on four extra-point attempts, increasing his career total to 41-of-43. He punted three times for a 45 yard average. He missed a 47 yard field goal attempt.

Georgia's special teams features one of the nation's top returning place kickers in senior Brandon Coutu. He was the preseason First Team All-SEC Special Teams selection by the league coaches. Overall he is 35-for-43 in FGs including 5-for-9 from 50+ yards. He is 12 of his last 15 from 40 yards or more. He is a perfect 70-for-70 in PATs for his career.

Gary Pinkel is in his seventh season at MU with a record of 38-35 (.521) and overall with a record of 111-72-3 (.605). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Dave Christensen and the defensive coordinator is Matt Eberflus.

Ed Orgeron is in his third season at Ole Miss and overall with a record of 8-16 (.333). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Dan Werner and the defensive coordinator is John Thompson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSOURI HAS THE BALL

Despite getting off to a somewhat slow start, for his standards, in MU's season-opening win over Illinois, junior QB Chase Daniel eventually found his stride, and picked up where he left off late last season. Daniel completed 37-of-54 passes for a career-high 359 yards against Illinois, while throwing 3 TDs with no interceptions as Mizzou claimed a hard fought 40-34 win in St. Louis, Mo.

Junior DB Dustin Mouzon was named SEC Defensive Player of the Week on Monday. Against Memphis Saturday, Mouzon intercepted two passes and returned the second 99 yards for his first career TD. He became the first Rebel with two interceptions in the same game since Von Hutchins against Arkansas State in 2002. Mouzon had only one pick previously in his career.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Making his first career start on Saturday, senior QB Seth Adams turned in the Rebels' first 200-yard passing performance since Micheal Spurlock in the 2005 Alabama game (210). Adams finished 19-of-30 for 201 yards with one TD and no interceptions. He had been announced as the starter just eight days before. Sophomore WR Marshay Green posted career highs of five catches for 59 yards.

Ziggy Hood had a huge opener Saturday, as he looked like the disruptive force he showed when healthy a year ago. He had 5 tackles in all, including 1.5 QB sacks, and also added 2 forced fumbles and 1 QB pressure. Darnell Terrell returned to his hometown of St. Louis for the Tigers' season opener, recording 3 tackles against Illinois. He is MU's active career leader with 13 PBUs and 3 INTs.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Jeff Wolfert made his first 2 FG attempts and converted on 4 extra points to extend his consecutive combined kicks made to 59 before barely missing left on a 49-yard field-goal attempt in the 4th quarter against Illinois. His 2 field goals made were from distances of 27 yards and 32 yards, with the latter coming in the pressure-packed 4th quarter that extended MU's lead to 40-34 with 8:32 left in the game.

Ole Miss had its streak of 35 consecutive PATs made dating back to the 2005 Vanderbilt game come to an end Saturday at Memphis. It also marked the first career miss for sophomore K Joshua Shene. He was 2-3 on extra points on the day and is 22-for-23 for his career. Shene was 1-for-2 on FGs, connecting from 30 yards and missing from 28 yards on a deflected kick.

Mizzou and Ole Miss will take to the field for the 6th time when they meet Saturday in Oxford, Miss., as the schools will play the last of a home-and-home series that began last season. The game last year in Columbia saw Mizzou claim a 34-7 victory, with the win pushing Mizzou to a 4-1 series edge overall. Mizzou has never played in Oxford, but played in nearby Jackson, Miss. in both 1974 and 1979, splitting the games by losing 10-0 in '74 and claiming the return trip in '79 by a 33-7 count.

THE COACHES

Larry Blakeney is in his 17th season at Troy and overall with a record of 128-65-1 (.662). The Trojans' offensive coordinator is Tony Franklin and the defensive coordinator is Jeremy Rowell.

Urban Meyer is in his third season at Florida with a record of 23-4 (.852) and in his seventh season overall with a record of 62-12 (.838). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Dan Mullen and the defensive co-coordinators are Greg Mattison and Charlie Strong.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TROY HAS THE BALL

Settling the situation up front on offense should open the door for Omar Haugabook, the returning Sun Belt Player of the Year, to expand on his successes last year. As a junior, Haugabook completed 61.3 percent of his pass attempts for 2,401 yards and 21 touchdowns. He also rushed for 313 yards and five scores.

The Florida defense held Western Kentucky to just three points in the 2007 season opener. No opponent has scored a touchdown against the Gators in "The Swamp" in the last eight quarters and UF has not given up a passing touchdown in the last 15 quarters (last allowed in the first quarter of the 2006 LSU game). Brandon Spikes had a team and career-high 11 tackles (seven solo) against Western Kentucky.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Florida's Tim Tebow made his first career start at quarterback against Western Kentucky and finished 13-of-17 for 300 yards and three touchdowns (all career highs). He also added eight rushing attempts for 38 yards and finished with 338 yards of total offense on the day. Shane Matthews was the last Florida quarterback to pass for 300-or-more yards in his first career start (332).

The headliners for Troy are the two senior corners. Leodis McKelvin (Waycross, Ga.) is known more for his exploits as a kickoff and punt returner, but became a legitimate shutdown corner last season while also finishing second on the team in tackles (66), along with those of fellow senior Elbert Mack (Wichita, Kan.).

SPECIAL TEAMS

The only major question mark, other than the offensive line, entering the fall is at punter. Senior Adrian Vera (Houston, Tx.) has the best leg, but has struggled with consistency. Senior place kicker Greg Whibbs (Pensacola, Fla.) could challenge for the job in the fall, but so could freshman signee Will Goggans (Douglas, Ga.).

Florida opened the 2007 season with a new punter (Chas Henry) and placekicker (Joey Ijjas). Henry punted three times for an average of 38.3 yards. His long was 49 yards and he placed two of the three inside the 20-yard line. Ijjas was 7-of-7 on extra points.

Doug Martin is in his fourth season at Troy and overall with a record of 13-22 (.371). Martin serves as the Golden Flashes' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Pete Rekstis.

Rich Brooks is in his fifth season at Kentucky with a record of 17-30 (.362) and in his 23rd season overall with a record of 108-39-4 (.438). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Joker Phillips and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENT STATE HAS THE BALL

Junior quarterback Julian Edelman had his seventh multi-touchdown game in 12 career starts, tossing his 11th career TD while rushing for his eighth score in the upset of Iowa State. He registered a career-high three touchdowns (2 pass, 1 rush) last season against Akron (Sept. 30). Sophomore Eugene Jarvis registered his fourth career 100-yard rushing game, finishing with 113 yards.

The Wildcats' third-down defense currently ranks first in the Southeastern Conference, allowing opponents to convert only 14.3 percent on third down. UK allowed Eastern Kentucky just 2-of-14 tries on third-down (1-of-8 in the first half and 1-of-6 in the second half). Kentucky held ECU to just 202 yards, the fewest for a UK foe since Murray State had 189 total yards in 2003. Wesley Woodyard headlines the defense at linebacker.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Senior quarterback André Woodson continues to look impressive as he completed 69 percent of his passes (20-of-29) vs. Eastern Kentucky, the seventh-straight game he has completed at least 67 per-cent of his attempts. He threw for 250 yards (his fifth consecutive game of at least 250) and three touchdowns vs. ECU and extended his school-record streak of consecutive passes without an interception to 191.

Secondary play will be key for Kent State. Senior defensive back Fritz Jacques' second quarter interception last week was the second of his career. Redshirt freshman defensive back Brian Lainhart made his first career interception in the third quarter, returning it 50 yards.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Senior defensive back Jack Williams' 57-yard kickoff return in the second quarter was the longest of his career. It was also the longest return by the Flashes since Antonio King's 64-yard jaunt against Akron on Nov. 23, 2002.

Kentucky's kicking game, which was adequate a year ago, could get even better in 2007 with the return of both starting booters. Punter Tim Masthay is a two-year regular in that role, averaging 39.2 yards per punt a year ago. Sophomore Lones Seiber made 11-of-19 field goals last year. Each of them are being pushed, however, by talented freshman Ryan Tydlacka.

Kentucky and Kent State meet for the sixth time in school history ... The Wildcats lead the all-time series between the two schools 5-0 ... The two teams last met on Sept. 4, 1993 when Kentucky claimed a 35-0 season-opening victory against the Golden Flashes ... Prior to this season, the 1993 lid-lifter against Kent State marked the last time the Wildcats opened against a team other than Louisville in its season opener ... The Wildcats are 24-7-1 all-time vs. teams in the current alignment of the Mid-American Conference, including 16-7-1 all-time against members of Kent's Eastern Division ... The Wildcats have posted two shutouts in the history of the series and have won the five meetings by an average of 28.8 points.

THE COACHES

Sylvester Croom is in his 4th season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 9-25 (.265). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorney and the defensive coordinator is Ellis Johnson.

Bob Toledo is in his first season at Tulane and in his 14th season overall with a record of 78-62 (.557). The Green Wave's offensive coordinator is Dan Dodd, and the defensive coordinator is Dan Dodd.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

The Bulldogs are led by senior WR Tony Burks, who caught 35 passes for 850 yards, a 24.3-yard per catch average, and five touchdowns in his first season at State. RB Anthony Dixon rushed 169 times for 668 yards, a 4.0-yard per carry average, and nine touchdowns during his true freshman season. His rushing attempts, yards gained, and touchdowns all marked true freshman records at State. Junior college transfer quarterback Josh Riddell could see his first action under center for MSU at Tulane.

The Wave's linebacker corps returns five players who played in 10 or more games last season. Leading the charge will be returning starters, juniors Evan Lee (6-2,232) and James Dillard (6-2,230) at middle and weakside linebacker, respectively, and the return of sophomore Cody Sparks (6-4,247) at strongside linebacker. Lee started seven of 12 games last season and tallied 45 tackles, 3.5 stops for lost yardage, one sack, forced one fumble and one interception.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TULANE HAS THE BALL

The backfield is quite possibly the deepest and most talented spot on this year's team. Tulane returns a majority of its rushing attack from last season, including the senior trio of leading rushers Matt Forté (6-2,225) with 859 yards, Ray Boudreaux (5-10,204) with 175 yards and Ade Tuyo (6-0,219) with 123 yards. All three backs started at least one game last year.

Titus Brown has recorded 131 career tackles, including 22.5 for loss (minus 101 yards), 11 of which were sacks (minus 67 yards). Brown began his senior campaign by making four tackles, including one for loss (minus 2 yards) and a quarterback sack. He has now had at least one tackle for loss in eight of the last nine games, dating to last season and a QB sack in seven of the last nine. Dominic Douglas camped the Bulldogs with nine tackles against the Tigers in the opener.

SPECIAL TEAMS

MSU's Derek Pegues returns as one of the league's top specialists. He returned 25 punts for 350 yards, a 14-yard per return average, second best in the SEC and 10th nationally. He also brought back 29 kickoffs for 687 yards, a 23.7-yard average, good for fifth in the league.

Returning to handle the Wave's place-kicking chores is sophomore Ross Thevenot (6-0,186). Last season as a true freshman, Thevenot earned the starting nod, and despite a slow start, he connected on 9-of-15 field goal attempts, including five straight at one point during the season, and converted 23-of-28 point-after-attempts. Thevenot's 60 points ranked second on the team, and he recorded six touchbacks on kickoffs.

Mississippi State has posted a 46-54-6 (.462) record in road openers during its previous 107 seasons of college football. The Bulldogs won its first game on enemy soil last fall, a 16-10 overtime win at UAB, head coach Sylvester Croom's first true road triumph at the helm of the program. State is an impressive 5-2 in the Superdome. MSU has posted an impressive 81-61-3 (.569) record against teams that currently comprise Conference-USA. State has played C-USA member schools more frequently than any other non-SEC league.

Jeff Bower is in his 17th season at Southern Miss and overall with a record of 113-77-1 (.594). The Golden Eagles' offensive coordinator is Jay Johnson and the defensive coordinator is Jay Hopson.

Phillip Fulmer is in his 16th season at Tennessee and overall with a record of 137-41 (.770). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is David Cutcliffe and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTHERN MISS HAS THE BALL

With a 38-yard carry in the second quarter against UTM, sophomore running back Damion Fletcher went over the 1,500-yard mark for rushing yardage in just his 14th game as a Golden Eagle. That carry also marked his longest career rush, beating his previous-best of 36 yards against Houston in the C-USA Championship. Fletcher also recorded his eighth 100-yard rushing game with his 156-yard performance against the Skyhawks.

Junior linebacker Jerod Mayo led the Vols with 10 tackles at Cal. Mayo reached a career milestone, logging his 100th career tackle. Freshman defensive back Eric Berry became the first defensive player—and just the third player overall—in the Phillip Fulmer era to start a Tennessee season-opener as a true freshman. Cal's 45 points were the most scored against Tennessee since Florida handed the Vols a 62-37 loss in Gainesville, Fla., on Sept. 16, 1995.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Redshirt sophomore Gerald McRath is setting a pace for his tackling numbers in the 2007 season, and he's starting in the double-digits. The linebacker notched 11 total tackles against Tennessee-Martin, including five solo stops and a tackle for loss. The performance marked his third consecutive game with 10 or more stops, as well as the fourth of the past five and six of the last eight.

Vols senior quarterback Erik Ainge, playing with a fractured little finger on his right (throwing) hand, was 32-for-47 today for 271 yards and three TDs. His 32 completions marked a new career high, breaking his old mark of 28 vs. Alabama in 2006. Ainge completed his first 10 passes for 91 yards and a TD. Last year, he had streaks of 15 straight completions vs. Air Force and 11 straight at Vanderbilt. Ainge is now 17-7 as a starter, including a 9-2 record on the road.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior kicker Britt Barefoot got off to a good start last Saturday against UTM with a 46.5 punting average over four punts. He landed his seventh career 50-plus yard punt with a 55-yarder in the third quarter. His longest career punt came in the form of a 68-yard boot in the 2007 GMAC Bowl against Ohio.

Redshirt freshman Daniel Lincoln performed well last Saturday at California in his debut as Tennessee's new placekicker. The Ocala, Fla., native made his lone field-goal attempt—hitting a 41-yarder to provide UT's only fourth-quarter points—and was a perfect 4-for-4 on extra-point tries.

Tennessee owns a perfect 4-0 record in its all-time gridiron series with Southern Mississippi, which dates to 1950. All four meetings took place in Knoxville, and two of the four wins were shutouts. The Vols posted a 56-0 triumph in 1950, and the three most recent clashes all have come during the Phillip Fulmer era. Fulmer's Vols defeated the Eagles 42-0 in 1995, 44-20 in 1997 and 19-16 in 2000. Fulmer is 13-1 all-time against current members of Conference USA (1-0 vs. East Carolina, 1-0 vs. Houston, 2-0 vs. Marshall, 6-1 vs. Memphis, 1-0 vs. Southern Miss and 2-0 vs. UAB) and has never lost to a C-USA team at Neyland Stadium. In all-time home-openers, the Big Orange have compiled an 87-18-5 (.790) record.

For his efforts last year Grothe has been named to the Manning and Maxwell Award watch lists.

Senior defensive end Quentin Groves had two sacks in the season-opening victory against Kansas State, pushing his career sacks total to 25. His second sack with just over a minute left and Auburn clinging to a 16-13 lead forced a fumble that was returned 34 yards for a touchdown by Antonio Coleman, sealing the victory.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Brandon Cox is the winningest quarterback in the SEC, with a 20-5 career record as a starting quarterback. Cox has started Auburn's last 22 games at quarterback and 25 of the last 26. Cox is not only the oldest player on the Auburn team, he's older than 18 quarterbacks currently on NFL rosters. Cox, who will turn 24 on Oct. 31, is nearly two full years older than the No. 1 pick in last year's NFL draft, JaMarcus Russell, who was born Aug. 9, 1985.

Ben Moffitt is the lone returnee out of USF's stellar trio of line-backers from last season. Last year Moffitt led the team in tackles with 112 and was third in tackles for a loss with 11 including four sacks ... During the summer Moffitt was named to the Bronko Nagurski Award watch list. One of the potential strengths of this year's USF football team is the return of defensive backs Trae Williams and Mike Jenkins. One of the most experienced DB combos in college football, the two combined for 59 career starts over their careers.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Placekicker Delbert Alvarado hit 5-9 FGs in 2006, including a BIG EAST record 56 yarder. Justin Teachey handles both punting and kickoffs. He had 45 punts and an average of 38.3 in 2006. Also had 15 touchbacks in 2006, will be challenged with new kickoff line.

Auburn's freshmen kickers had solid debuts, as Wes Byrum kicked three field goals and Ryan Shoemaker averaged 42.7 yards on six punts against Kansas State. Byrum made his first two extra point attempts against Kansas State, pushing Auburn's streak of consecutive PATs to 109.

Auburn plays its second straight nationally-televised game when the Tigers host South Florida Saturday night at 8 p.m. CT on ESPN2. Flynn finished 12 of 19 for 128 yards and a pair of scores. He also rushed for 42 yards on 11 carries. Flynn's top target in the opener was that of WR Early Doucet, who hauled in a career-best 9 receptions for 78 yards and a TD. Senior RB Jacob Hester led the Tigers on the ground with 68 yards on 14 carries.

The linebacking duo of Vince Hall and Xavier Adibi team up to give Tech "the best LB uo in the country," according to ESPN's Chris Spielman. Hall has started the last 39 games at the mike position and was named a first-team All-ACC linebacker last year. Adibi started all 13 games last year at the backer position and has started 27 ames in a row.
