SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

Each head coach is allowed one Instant Replay challenge per game, which is exercised by requesting a team timeout. A head coach may issue a challenge only if his team has one or more timeouts remaining in the half. If the challenged ruling is overturned, the timeout is not charged, but the coach has no more challenges during that game.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference, following approval by the NCAA Football Rules Committee, will implement the use of video replay on an experimental basis beginning with the 2005 football season.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - c. Touching of a kick
 - d. Number of players on field
 - e. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - f. Fourth-down/try fumble plays

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

2007 SEC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The SEC's Eastern and Western Division winners will meet in Atlanta's Georgia Dome to battle for the league championship and the right to represent the conference in the Bowl Championship Series. The 16th-annual title game is set for December 1 and will be nationally televised by CBS Sports at 4:00 p.m. ET.

The game is a result of conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Under NCAA regulations, a conference with 12 members may play a 12th football game to determine its champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The participants of the game are determined each year during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the best overall SEC winning percentage in each division.

The 1994 SEC Championship Game earned a 10.5 rating and a 26 share, the highest rated SEC Championship Game in history.

The SEC Championship Game has also drawn capacity crowds in its history. 1,120,836 fans have witnessed first-hand the pageantry of SEC Football at the 15 previous Championship Games.

Attendance at the 15 previous championship games has been 102.3 percent of stadium capacity, including 13 sellouts.

THIS WEEK IN SEC FOOTBALL HISTORY

As the Southeastern Conference celebrates its 75th anniversary, here is a look at some of the highlights during the upcoming game dates in its history:

**Sept. 22**

1962 - Ole Miss opens the campaign with a 21-7 at Memphis State. The Rebels would finish the season undefeated and claim the SEC and national championship.

1962 - Alabama sophomore quarterback Joe Namath makes his Crimson Tide debut, leading Alabama to 35-0 win over Georgia. After two running plays to open the game, Namath dropped back and hit Richard Williamson with 51-yard TD pass on his first collegiate attempt for the Crimson Tide.

1962 - #5 LSU defeats Texas A&M, 21-0, in the season opener. It is also the first game for head coach Charles McClendon at LSU.

1984 - Kentucky goes to 3-0 on the season, defeating Tulane, 30-26, in New Orleans. Kentucky LB Larry Smith sets a school record with 14 solo tackles against the Green Wave.

1990 - Georgia's John Kasay hit three field goals including a 40-yarder with 1:31 left in the game to lift the Bulldogs to a 17-16 win over Alabama in Athens.

CBS SPORTS - The 2007 season marks the 11th year for CBS as the league's national network television partner. CBS will televise up to 15 games per year throughout the season. CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 1 at 4 p.m. ET.

ESPN/ESPN2, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com (search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

LINCOLN FINANCIAL SPORTS (LFS) (Formerly Jefferson-Pilot Sports) will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send eight of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2007 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection of available SEC teams.

2008 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2007 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2007 regular season, the Allstate BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in New Orleans on Jan. 7 at 8 p.m. EST. The Allstate BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2007 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, and the Orange Bowl on Jan. 3 at 8 p.m. ET.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES

**ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE**

Alabama took a 21-0 lead Saturday against Arkansas and scored a game-winning touchdown with eight seconds left in the game for a come-from-behind win against the Razorbacks, 41-38, at Bryant-Denny Stadium. On third-and-one at the Arkansas 4-yard line, junior quarterback John Parker Wilson found senior receiver Matt Caddell in the end zone for the game-winning score for Alabama (3-0, 2-0 SEC). Wilson put up career-high numbers as he went 24-of-45 for 327 yards and four touchdowns in the win. Caddell caught a career-high nine passes for 91 yards, while DJ Hall caught six passes for 172 yards and two touchdowns. With his performance, Hall now has 2,206 career receiving yards and broke former receiver Ozzie Newsome's all-time receiving record at Alabama with a 43-yard catch on the first play of the game. Hall's 172 receiving yards set a career-high for yardage and ranks fourth on Alabama's single-game receiving yards list. Alabama's 21 points in the first quarter was the most scored by the Crimson Tide in a single quarter since against Arkansas on Sept. 21, 2003, a game that Arkansas won 34-31 in double overtime. Alabama now leads the series 10-8 over the Razorbacks, dating back to 1962.

FLORIDA GATORS

The fifth-ranked Gators opened SEC action as they defeated Tennessee 59-20 in Gainesville Saturday. The victory marked the first time in school history the Gators have opened the season scoring 45 points or more in their first three games. Quarterback Tim Tebow finished 14 for 19 with 299 yards and two touchdowns. He also rushed for 61 yards on eight carries and two touchdowns. Wide receiver Percy Harvin had nine carries for 75 yards and one touchdown and four receptions for 120 yards. Florida posted 31 unanswered points to stake the 39-point victory. The Gators received help from the defense in the scoring category as sophomore linebacker Dustin Poe scored the first defensive TD of the year when he recovered a fumble and returned it 18 yards in the third quarter. Louis Murphy recorded a career-high reception of 44-yards, while freshman quarterback Cameron Newton saw action and scored his first career rushing touchdown, a four-yard run, for Florida's final TD of the game.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS

Despite scoring 38 points and erasing two 21-point deficits, Arkansas fell short to Alabama in the final seconds of their conference opener 41-38. Now 1-1 and 0-1 in SEC action, Arkansas is 9-7 in SEC openers.



The Razorbacks are 5-5 in conference openers under Houston Nutt. Down by 21 twice in the game, Arkansas rallied and took the lead, 38-31, when quarterback Casey Dick connected with Peyton Hillis on a seven-yard pass at the 8:08 mark in the fourth quarter. However, Alabama answered back with a field goal and a touchdown within the final five minutes of the game to claim the win. Arkansas Quarterback Casey Dick completed 11 of 23 attempts for 145 yards and threw three touchdowns and an interception. Darren McFadden ran for 195 yards on 33 carries and tallied two rushing touchdowns. He also pulled down three catches for 16 yards. With his performance Saturday, he passed Cedric Cobbs' 3,018 yards and sits at No. 3 for career all-time rushing yards at Arkansas with 3,106. His 33 carries is a new single-game career high replacing his previous best of 32 carries against South Carolina in 2005.

**GEORGIA BULLDOGS**

Georgia took a break from SEC play last weekend and knocked off Western Carolina 45-16. The Bulldogs improve to 2-1 for the season. With the win, Georgia improves to 27-2 against non-conference teams under head coach Mark Richt. Also, the Bulldogs are 19-0 against non-conference opponents at Sanford Stadium dating back to 2001. Senior tailback Thomas Brown surpassed the 2,000 career rushing mark as he had 10 carries for 42 yards, giving him 2,006 yard for his career. Thomas now ranks 12th on Georgia's all-time list. Redshirt sophomore quarterback Joe Cox saw action and connected with junior Demiko Goodman for a 34-yard TD in the fourth quarter. It marked the first TD catch of Goodman's career, and it was the first for Cox since against Colorado in 2006. QB Blake Barnes also saw action, marking the first time Georgia has played three quarterbacks in the same game since 2006. Starter Matthew Stafford went 14-for-20 for 174 yards and two touchdown passes before giving way to Cox and Barnes. Knowshon Moreno scored his first career touchdown on a 23-yard run with 30 seconds left in the first half. He also had two catches for 33 yards.

**AUBURN TIGERS**

Auburn suffered a 19-14 loss to Mississippi State Saturday in their conference opener. The loss snaps a six-game win streak for the Tigers over the Bulldogs. It marks the first conference opener loss for the Tigers since 1992 against Ole Miss. Freshman quarterback Kodi Burns saw action for the first time in his career as he gave Auburn a boost. Burns scored his first career TD, a quarterback sneak on the 1-yard line, to put the Tigers ahead 14-13 at the half. Auburn is now 56-23 all-time against Mississippi State and owns a 42-15 record in the SEC since the start of the 2000 season. The Tigers have scored in 53 consecutive games since last being shut out in the 2003 opener, which is the fourth-longest streak in team history. Auburn's 216 rushing yards were a season high and the most since rushing for 220 against Tulane in 2006. The 216 rushing yards are also they most in an SEC game for the Tigers since rushing for 227 at Georgia in 2005. Ben Tate's 28-yard run in the second quarter was the longest TD run of the season by the Tigers and Tate's first rushing touchdown of 2007. Mario Fanin's 40-yard kickoff return in the first quarter was the longest of his career.

KENTUCKY WILDCATS

Kentucky improves to 3-0 for the first time since the 2002 season as they defeated No. 9 Louisville, 40-34 at Commonwealth Stadium. It is Kentucky's first victory over a top-10 ranked team in 30 years. The previous top-10 win was 24-20 over No. 4 Penn State in 1977. Kentucky had lost 46 consecutive games against top-10 opponents since then. It is the first win for Kentucky over a ranked team since 2002 when the Wildcats defeated No. 17 Louisville. The 2002 game was also the last win for the Wildcats over the Cardinals, and breaks a four-game losing streak to Louisville. Quarterback Andre Woodson became the SEC's all-time leader in consecutive passes without an interception to 257. He surpassed Georgia's David Greene, who held the previous record with 214. Woodson completed 30-of-44 passes for 275 yards, career highs in both passes completed and passes attempted and has now moved into third place on UK's list. An attendance of 70,857 was announced, marking the fourth-largest crowd in Commonwealth Stadium history. It is the largest since the 2002 Georgia game (71,017).



SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES

LSU TIGERS



LSU played Middle Tennessee Saturday without its starting quarterback and its best receiver. In a testimony to its depth, second-ranked LSU, without quarterback Matt Flynn and wide receiver Early Doucet, amassed 505 yards of offense behind quarterback Ryan Perrilloux who spread the pass catching to 10 receivers on his way to completing 20-of-25, for 298 yards, three touchdowns and the first interception of the year thrown by a Tiger. Jared Mitchell led all receivers with six grabs for 82 yards. The Tiger defense limited Middle Tennessee to just 90 yards of total offense, with almost half of those coming in the fourth quarter against second and third string players. Just a week ago, the Blue Raiders piled up 555 total yards against Louisville, the No. 8 team in the country at the time. LSU's rushing attack was spread evenly too with eight ball carriers gaining positive yards and combining for 198. The Tiger defense held Middle Tennessee to a jaw-dropping nine rushing yards. LSU has outscored its opponents 157-7 over the last 13 quarters, including the 44-0 blanking on Saturday.

SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS



Blake Mitchell threw three touchdowns and No. 17 South Carolina defeated South Carolina State 38-3 Saturday to make the Gamecocks 3-0 for the first time in six years. South Carolina won its sixth consecutive game and the defense didn't allow a touchdown for the second straight. The 19 yard first quarter interception return by Nathan Pepper was South Carolina's first return of an interception for a touchdown since 2005 when Jonathan Joseph scored on an interception against Georgia. It was the second career interception for Pepper. Three touchdown passes by Blake Mitchell gave him 31 for his career, becoming the fifth Gamecock to throw 30 or more career touchdown passes. The third quarter interception by Jasper Brinkley was the second of his career and second in two games. He had a win-clinching interception last week at Georgia. Cory Boyd rushed for 132 yards and Mike Davis for 102 against South Carolina State, the first time South Carolina has had two 100-yard rushers in a game since 2001 when Derek Watson (105) and Andrew Pinnock (106) hit triple digits against Vanderbilt. South Carolina's defense has not allowed a touchdown in 10 quarters.



OLE MISS REBELS

Despite two touchdown catches by Mike Wallace, Ole Miss could not hold off a balanced Vanderbilt offense in a 31-17 road loss in the Rebels' SEC opener. Wallace posted his second straight 100-yard receiving game with 139, including 54 yards on a fourth-quarter scoring toss from Brent Schaeffer. It was one yard short of his career-long completion of 55 yards against Alabama a year ago. Schaeffer finished 1-for-5. Ole Miss drops to 30-41-3 in SEC openers. The Rebels are now 14-26-3 in SEC openers on the road. The last league-opening win came in 2003 in Nashville, 24-21 over the Commodores. The Rebels remain five wins short of 600. The program boasts an all-time record of 595-453-35 (.566 winning percentage). Senior QB Seth Adams finished 10-for-17 for 154 yards, one TD and one interception. Wallace is the first Rebel receiver with consecutive 100-yard receiving games since Mario Hill in the first two games of 2005. Sophomore DL-WR Greg Hardy failed to catch a TD pass for the first time in four games. Junior DB Dustin Mouzon recorded career highs of 11 total tackles and 10 solos at Vanderbilt.

TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS



Senior quarterback Erik Ainge was 26-for-41 at Florida for 249 yards, one touchdown and one interception. In the process, he moved past former Vols signal caller Jeff Francis into fourth place on the school's career passing list with 5,974 passing yards to his credit. Ainge threw an interception at the 11:04 mark in the first quarter. It was his first interception of the season. Ainge now owns an 18-8 record as a starter. Florida's 59 points are the most allowed by Tennessee since Florida defeated UT 62-37 in Gainesville on Sept. 16, 1995. LaMarcus Coker's second kick return of the game went for a career-long 74 yards (and was UT's longest kick return of the season). Coker's previous long was 40 yards last season at Georgia. Tennessee set a single-game school record with 260 kickoff return yards (on nine returns). True freshman cornerback Eric Berry made his first career interception a memorable one. Berry picked off a Tim Tebow pass on Florida's first possession of the third quarter and returned it 96 yards for a touchdown. It was the first interception thrown by Tebow this season and the second of his career. Berry's 96-yard interception return tied for the third longest in the history of Tennessee football.

MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS



The Bulldogs won a conference opener for the first time since a win at Vanderbilt in 1999. State ended a six-game slide against the Auburn Tigers with Saturday's win. With the win the Bulldogs have now won their last three games in the State of Alabama (at both UAB and Alabama in 2006). The Bulldogs scored a defensive touchdown for the second time this season when Derek Pegues raced 20 yards for an interception score in the first quarter. It was his third career interception return for a touchdown, setting a new school record. Six previous players had returned two apiece. State's first field goal marked the first time the Bulldogs scored against Auburn since 2004 (eight quarters). Freshman Wesley Carroll's first pass attempt of the game was completed to himself. The quarterback grabbed a batted ball out of the air and raced forward two yards for his first career reception. Anthony Dixon finished Saturday's game with 103 yards on 29 carries. It was his fourth career 100-yard game, with all four occurring in the last six Bulldog contests.



VANDERBILT COMMODORES

Vanderbilt is now 2-1 overall, and 1-1 in the Southeastern Conference. The Ole Miss victory marks the Commodores' first victory in SEC play since defeating Georgia last season. It snaps a four-game losing streak in conference. It also marks Vanderbilt's first victory at home against an SEC opponent since Sept. 17, 2005 (Ole Miss, 31-23) and snaps an eight-game losing streak to conference members at Vanderbilt Stadium. The Commodores controlled the ball for 34:50 to the Rebels 25:10. The last time Vanderbilt had a 100 yard rusher, 100 yard receiver, and 200 yard passer in an SEC contest was Sept. 17, 2005 against Ole Miss. The Vanderbilt defense posted seven sacks. Earl Bennett caught 11 passes for 100 yards. It was Bennett's ninth game with 100 or more receiving yards and his ninth game with at least 10 receptions. Cassen Jackson-Garrison rushed for 119 yards and three touchdowns. It was his highest single-game rushing total since piling up 142 yards vs. Temple (Sept 30, 2006). It was the third 100-yard rushing performance of his career.

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last five years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 171 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 79 named to the first-team.
- During the last eleven years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award. In 2006, Alabama track & field athlete Beth Mallory was named a recipient of this award.
- Florida's Chris Leak was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last five years, the SEC has had 11 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2007-08 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama baseball player Emeel Salem and Vanderbilt track & field athlete Erika Schneble were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2006-07.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. Tennessee swimmer Brad Boswell and Florida softball player Stacey Stevens were named recipients of this award in 2006-07.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had four sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Courtney Kupets of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics, Georgia's Kara Lynn Joyce won in Swimming & Diving and Tennessee's Monica Abbott was the top athlete in softball.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 66 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- Since 1990, the SEC has won 118 team and 805 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.8 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (268 of 349). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won more team national championships than any other conference in the nation. The SEC won 50 team titles since 2000, while the Pac-10 won 45 and the Big 12 won 21. The SEC won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, also the most of any conference.

Urban Meyer is in his third season at Florida with a record of 25-4 (.862) and in his seventh season overall with a record of 64-12 (.842). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Dan Mullen and the defensive co-coordinators are Greg Mattison and Charlie Strong.

Ed Orgeron is in his third season at Ole Miss and overall with a record of 8-18 (.307). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Dan Werner and the defensive coordinator is John Thompson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

The defending national champion Gators are off to a 3-0 start after a 59-20 dismantling of No. 22 Tennessee in the SEC opener in Gainesville. The UF offense is 55.7 points and 521.3 yards per game. Sophomore QB Tim Tebow has completed 45-of-61 passes for 835 yards, eight TDs and one interception. He has also rushed for 192 yards and five scores and is averaging 342.3 yards of total offense per game. Running back Kestahn Moore has provided a team-high 217 yards on the ground with four TDs. Florida has the SEC's top ranked offense and second nationally.

Ole Miss boasts two of the SEC's top three tacklers in junior DB Jamarca Sanford and junior LB Ashlee Palmer. After recording 13 tackles in each of the last two games, Sanford now tops the league and is 17th in the nation at 11.0 per game. He also ranks sixth in the NCAA in solo stops with a 7.67 average. A JUCO transfer from Compton, Calif., Palmer is third in the SEC at 10.67 per game.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Defensively, Florida is allowing 18.0 points and 279.3 yards per game. In the line-backing corps, Brandon Spikes boasts a team-high 29 tackles and 17 solos, along with 2.5 TFLs, while Dustin Doe is credited with 22 total stops and two fumble recoveries. Preseason All-American DE Derrick Harvey has totaled eight tackles with three TFLs, two sacks and two pass break-ups.

Rebel QB Seth Adams has thrown for 660 yards and five touchdowns with two interceptions in his three starts. Junior WR Mike Wallace has turned in consecutive 100-yard receiving games, becoming the first Rebel to do so since Mario Hill in the first two games of 2005. At Vanderbilt Saturday, Wallace established career highs of 139 receiving yards and two TDs of 34 and 54 yards. Senior RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis is fourth in the SEC in rushing at 123.7 ypg.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Against Tennessee, Brandon James returned the first punt of the game for an 83-yard touchdown. Throughout the first three games, Chas Henry has punted nine times for an average of 36.1 yards. His long was 49 and he has placed four inside the 20 this year. Joey Iijas is a perfect 23-of-23 on extra points through the first three outings and is two-of-two on field goal attempts.

Sophomore K Joshua Shene handled kickoff duties for the first time this year at Vanderbilt. Ole Miss has yet to have a true punt return through the first three games. Of Vanderbilt's two punts on Saturday, one was a fair catch and the other was a touchback. e Rebels were successful on their first fake punt attempt of the year on Saturday when Jamarca Sanford rushed five yards for a first down.

SERIES/GAME NOTES**Record:** UM, 11-9-1 • **Last:** UM, 20-17 (2003 at Gainesville)

This game will be the 22nd all-time between Ole Miss and Florida, with the Rebels holding a 11-9-1 advantage. The Rebels have taken three of the last five meetings, including the last two. In the most recent encounter in 2003, Ole Miss knocked off No. 24 Florida in Gainesville en route to an SEC Western Division title. The previous year, the hometown Rebels upset the sixth-ranked Gators 17-14 in what was the first meeting between the two teams since 1995. It was the last game played in Oxford, where the Gators hold a 4-2 edge.

THE COACHES

Steve Spurrier is in his third season at South Carolina with a record of 18-10 (.643) and in his 18th season overall with a record of 160-50-2 (.759). Spurrier serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

Les Miles is in his third season at LSU with a record of 24-4 (.857) and in his 7th season overall with a record of 52-25 (.675). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is Bo Pelini.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Fifth-year senior quarterback Blake Mitchell has started the last two games, improving his record to 13-6 in 19 career starts. He has completed 65.4 percent (34-for-52) of his passes this season. Kenny McKinley has 17 catches and 182 receiving yards this season. Cory Boyd leads the team with 255 yards rushing, averaging 6.5 yards per carry with four rushing touchdowns. He is eighth in the SEC in rushing, averaging 85.0 yards per contest.

Through three games, the Tigers are ranked No. 1 in the nation in scoring (2.33 points per game), total defense (128.33 yards per game), and pass efficiency defense (54.30 rating). The Tiger defense is led by All-America DT Glenn Dorsey who has 14 tackles, 3.5 TFL and 2 sacks. LB Ali Highsmith leads the team with 21 tackles to go with 4 QB hurries. SS Craig Steltz leads the nation in interceptions with 4 to his credit.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Jasper Brinkley totaled 107 tackles in 2006. He ranks second among the returning tacklers in the SEC behind only Kentucky's Wesley Woodyard. He has led the squad in tackles in nine of the 16 games in which he's appeared, including five of the last seven. Brinkley's older brother by a minute, Casper Brinkley, has been just as impressive as his younger brother this season, logging 17 tackles in the first three games.

Matt Flynn and Ryan Perrilloux have paced the Tiger offense, combining to complete 57 of 82 passes for 757 yards, eight touchdowns and just one interception. Jacob Hester leads the Tigers in rushing with 206 yards and 1 TD, while Keiland Williams has a team-best 4 touchdowns to go with 174 yards on the ground. Early Doucet, despite missing the Middle Tennessee contest, leads the Tigers with 15 catches for 153 yards and 2 scores.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Ryan Succop drilled all three of his field goal attempts in the 16-12 win at Georgia, matching his single game high. He is 4-for-5 on the season in field goal attempts and is 20-for-27 in his career. He converted 16-of-20 field goal attempts in 2006, including a long of 55 yards against Vanderbilt. He has converted 14 of his last 17 attempts from inside 47. Succop also handles the kick off and punting duties, averaging 41.9 yards per punt.

Just three games into the season Colt Davis ranks as the Tigers' leading scorer with 35 points. He ranks third in the SEC in scoring, averaging 11.7 points per games. For the year, he is a perfect six-of-six on field goal attempts and 17-of-17 on extra points. Patrick Fisher is averaging 44.5 yards over 11 punts this season. His average ranks first in the SEC and 16th in the NCAA this year.

Rich Brooks is in his fifth season at Kentucky with a record of 19-30 (.388) and in his 23rd season overall with a record of 110-139-4 (.443). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Joker Phillips and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

Houston Nutt is in his 10th season at Arkansas with a record of 68-45 (.602) and in his 15th season overall with a record of 104-67 (.608). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is David Lee and the defensive coordinator is Reggie Herring.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Senior quarterback André Woodson enters Saturday's game with an active SEC-record and school-record streak of 257 consecutive passes without an interception, dating back to the second half of the Georgia game on Nov. 4, 2006. He also has the lowest interception ratio in SEC history (min. 400 attempts). Tailback Rafael Little has rushed for at least 100 yards in all three games this season. He ranks 13th nationally and third in the SEC in rushing yards per game with 129.3.

Arkansas returns six players on defense from 2006, including LT Ernest Mitchell, RE Antwain Robinson, LB Weston Dacus, S Matt Hewitt, FS Michael Grant and CB Matterral Richardson. Dacus leads Arkansas with 19 tackles (11 solo), one sack and 1.5 TFLs. Jerrell Norton has five pass break-ups in the secondary.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Senior linebacker Wesley Woodyard has recorded at least four tackles in 27 consecutive games. Woodyard is currently tied for the first in the SEC and is 17th nationally in tackles per game with 11.0. Jeremy Jarmon is tied for first in the SEC and tied for 13th nationally in sacks per game with 1.00. He has had at least one sack in five straight games, dating back to last season.

Darren McFadden continued to wow the country in the Razorbacks' second game of the 2007 season with 195 yards and two touchdowns on the ground. McFadden has now rushed for 346 yards and three touchdowns this season while throwing a touchdown pass, catching five passes for 46 yards and racking up 460 all-purpose yards. Fellow junior tailback Felix Jones has been just as good with 225-yards rushing (112.5 ypg) on just 28 carries (8.05 ypc) and a touchdown.

SPECIAL TEAMS

UK kicker Tim Masthay has shown his leg strength as eight of his 26 kickoffs have gone for touchbacks, the highest number of touchbacks in the SEC. UK currently leads the league in kickoff coverage, averaging 46.5 net yards per kickoff. Little is also a danger as a return specialist.

True freshman Alex Tejada is 5 for 5 on field goal attempts and 9 of 10 on PATs. Felix Jones ranks sixth nationally in kickoff returns (33.33 ypr), already returning one 90 yards for a score in Week 1. Jeremy Davis ranks second in the SEC and 23rd nationally with a 43.9-yards per punt average through the first two games this season.

Tommy Tuberville is in his ninth season at Auburn with a record of 71-31 (.696) and in his 13th season overall with a record of 96-51 (.653). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Al Borges and the defensive coordinator is Will Muschamp.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN NEW MEXICO STATE HAS THE BALL

The Aggies rank fifth in the nation in passing offense (398.7) and 11th in the country in total offense (523.3). Junior quarterback Chase Holbrook ranks fourth in the NCAA in total offense (390.0). Holbrook has 12 career 300-plus passing games and ranks second in the Aggie record books with 45 touchdown passes. Junior wideout Chris Williams had 221 yards receiving against UTEP last Saturday and has scored seven touchdowns in the first three games. Williams is tied for fifth in the nation in scoring and is sixth in receiving yards per game (129.3).

Quentin Groves is tied for third on the team with 16 tackles in the first three games, including a career-best nine against South Florida, and is tied for third the SEC in tackles for loss (1.67) and tied for fourth with two sacks. Groves also has a forced fumble and 14 quarterback hurries through three games played. Pat Sims now leads the team and ranks second in the SEC with 5.5 tackles for losses this season, and also has a sack, two pass break-ups and eight quarterback hurries.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Senior linebacker Dante Floyd leads the Aggies with 32 tackles and had 12 tackles and an interception against UTEP. Fonoti is third on the team in tackles with 19 and lead the team in tackles for a loss with four for 19 yards and two sacks. He ranks first in the WAC with 1.5 tackles-for-a-loss per game and 32nd in the nation.

All 60 of Auburn's points this season have been scored by freshmen and sophomores. True freshman Wes Byrum leads the team with 24 points, while sophomore tight end Gabe McKenzie has two touchdowns for 12 points. Auburn's other four touchdowns have been scored by true freshman Kodi Burns, redshirt freshman Mario Fannin and sophomores Ben Tate and Antonio Coleman.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Derek Dubois is hot on kick-off returns, returning three kicks for 44 yards against UTEP. On the season he leads the Aggies with six returns for 116 yards, averaging 18.8 yards return. Punter Jared Kaufman is second in the WAC in net punting.

True freshman Byrum is tied for eighth in the NCAA with six made field goals, connecting three times in each of the first two games, including a season-long 49-yard field goal against South Florida. Redshirt freshman Ryan Shoemaker was leading the SEC averaging 45.1 yards per punt before being injured against South Florida. His replacement, true freshman Patrick Tatum, has averaged 40.0 yards per punt with three of his seven punts downed inside the 20-yardline.

Steve Patton is in his 11th season at Gardner-Webb with record of 68-43 (.613) and 13th overall with a record of 80-52 (.606). The Runnin' Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Joe Pizzo and the defensive coordinator is John Windham.

Sylvester Croom is in his fourth season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 11-25 (.306). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorvey and the defensive coordinator is Ellis Johnson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GARDNER-WEBB HAS THE BALL

Sophomore back David Montgomery rushed for a career-high 145 yards and two scores on just 11 carries last week, including a career-long 74-yard scamper just seconds into the third quarter that gave GWU a 27-6 edge. Devin Campbell got the start under center for Gardner-Webb, and completed 11-of-22 attempts for 200 yards and a touchdown. Flagler finished with five catches for 113 yards to pace GWU.

State ranks fourth in the SEC in total defense, allowing just 304.3 yards per game. For the ninth-straight game, MSU did not allow an opponent rusher to reach the 100-yard plateau. DE Titus Brown has recorded 134 career tackles, including 26.5 for loss (minus 119 yards), 12.5 of which were sacks (minus 78 yards). Brown has now had at least one TFL in 10 of the last 11 games, dating to last season, and a QB sack in eight of the last 11. Brown is currently tied for fourth in the league in sacks.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

All-Americans Mario Brown (12 tackles, sack) and Brian Johnston (8 tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss, sack, 3 pressures) paced the Bulldog defensive effort last week, which held Jacksonville to just 213 total yards and allowed just 15.7 percent efficiency on third down (3-of-19). Cedric McGowan and Rent Sherrill each picked off passes and Gardner-Webb finished with 7.0 sacks and 12 tackles for loss as a team.

Anthony Dixon rushed for 103 yards on a career-high 29 carries against Auburn this past Saturday. It was the fourth time in the last six games that he had surpassed the 100-yard rushing mark. Dixon had earlier eclipsed the 100-yard plateau in MSU's win against Tulane with a career-best 131 yards. JUCO transfer Josh Riddell and freshman Wesley Carroll will battle for quarterback duties while Michael Henig recovers from a broken hand.

SPECIAL TEAMS

All-Conference punter Michael Hanna finished No. 7 nationally in punting average last season, and boomed 14 punts over 50 yards in 2006. Speedsters Tyson Petty and Kendrick Best have shown a knack for returning punts and kicks, and will join Duvaughn Flagler and Dobson Collins in competition for those roles.

Junior punter Blake McAdams boomed a 73-yard punt in the fourth quarter at Auburn. It was the longest of his career, and the longest by a Bulldog punter since Jeff Walker hit a 79-yarder against Alabama in 1999. Adam Carlson's second-quarter connection from 30 yards marked the first time he had converted two field goals in one game.

Not only has Mississippi State never faced Gardner-Webb on the gridiron, the Bulldogs have never met a current member of the Big South Conference, the league in which the Runnin' Bulldogs compete. The five-team Big South is comprised of Liberty, Coastal Carolina, Charleston Southern, and VMI, in addition to Gardner-Webb. When Mississippi State plays Gardner-Webb, the Bulldogs will be aiming for their third-straight victory. State has not won three consecutive football games since Weeks 7-9 of the 2000 season, a span of 75 games. In fact, MSU has not opened a season with a 3-1 record since that 2000 campaign.

THE COACHES

Mark Richt is in his seventh season at Georgia and overall with a record of 63-18 (.778). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinator is Willie Martinez.

Nick Saban is in his first season at Alabama and in his 14th season overall with a record of 109-59-1 (.648). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Major Applewhite and the defensive coordinator is Kevin Steele.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Georgia sophomore QB Matthew Stafford is 8-3 as a starter. Three of those wins are over ranked opponents. Sean Bailey leads the team with 11 catches for 163 yards and grabbed his first touchdown catch of the season against WCU. Knowshon Moreno leads the Bulldogs in rushing with 268 yards and ranks sixth in the SEC at 89.3 yards per game. He also ranks third on the team in receiving with 98 yards.

Alabama is fourth in the SEC in scoring defense (18.0) and passing defense (165.0) and seventh in rushing defense (144.57). DT Wallace Gilberry will play his 41st career game for the Crimson Tide this Saturday against Georgia. In 40 career games, Gilberry has 120 tackles, 32 tackles for loss and 11.5 sacks. He has also added four forced fumbles, three fumbles recovered and two pass breakups.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Dannell Ellerbe was the leading tackler for the Bulldogs in the first two games, setting and then matching his career high in tackles with seven in each game. Jeff Owens earned SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week honors for his performance in the win over WCU. He had a career-high five stops, two tackles for a loss and forced a fumble.

Junior quarterback John Parker Wilson set career highs in attempts (45), completions (24), yards (327) and touchdowns (4) in the win 41-38 win over Arkansas. Senior wide receiver DJ Hall (6-172-2 TDs) became the school's all-time leader with 2,209 career receiving yards. Redshirt freshman Terry Grant is second in the SEC and eighth nationally with 134.33 rushing yards per game through three games.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Georgia's special teams features one of the nation's top returning place kickers in senior Brandon Coutu. He was the preseason First Team All-SEC Special Teams selection by the league coaches. For his career, Coutu is 40-for-49 in FGs including 5-for-9 from 50+ yards. Also, he is a perfect 76-for-76 in PATs. This season, Coutu is 5-6 in FG attempts and 11-for-11 in PATs.

Javier Arenas leads the SEC and ranks 11th nationally with a 15.55 punt return average in three games. He has 11 returns for 171 yards. He has 42 career punt returns for 457 yards (10.9 average) and two touchdowns. Leigh Tiffin is second in the SEC and ninth nationally with two field goals made per game.

Georgia's 27-25 win in 2002 marked their first-ever win over the Crimson Tide in Tuscaloosa in eight tries. Billy Bennett's 32-yard field goal with 38 seconds left in the game provided the winning margin for the Bulldogs. Alabama and Georgia first met on Nov. 2, 1895, with the Bulldogs claiming a 30-6 win over the Crimson Tide in Columbus, Ga.

Phillip Fulmer is in his 16th season at Tennessee and overall with a record of 138-42 (.767). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is David Cutcliffe and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS STATE HAS THE BALL

Last week versus SMU, Corey Leonard finished the night with a career-high 266 passing yards and two touchdowns. He also added a career-high three rushing touchdowns, and his pair of scores through the air tied his personal best, while Reggie Arnold's 156 rushing yards tied his career best as well.

True freshman defensive back Eric Berry's first career interception was a memorable one. Berry picked off a Tim Tebow pass during last weekend's game at Florida and returned it 96 yards for a touchdown (also the first of his career). The 96-yard return tied for the third-longest ever by a Vol. Rico McCoy leads the team with 21 tackles through three games. Jerod Mayo is second on the team with 19 stops.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Tyrell Johnson, the pre-season Sun Belt Conference Defensive Player of the Year, logged a game-high 14 tackles against the Longhorns, including 10 solo stops. He also had one interception in the game, and one 6-yard tackle-for-loss. Junior defensive end Brian Flagg missed the entire 2006 season with an injury, but has now started 23 of his 24 career games at ASU.

Erik Ainge is 18-8 as a starter in his career. He has thrown only one interception through three games this season (124 att.). He has an efficiency rating of 133.6, which is the fifth-best mark in the SEC this season. Arian Foster ran for 26 yards vs. Florida after running for 125 yards and two touchdowns on 25 carries vs. USM.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Sophomore placekicker Josh Arauco hit a career-long 45-yard field goal to end ASU's first possession Sept. 1 at Texas. With three kickoff returns for 61 yards against Texas, senior Darren Toney moved into sole possession of second place at ASU for the most kick-off returns in a career (66).

Daniel Lincoln is a perfect 6-of-6 on field goal attempts and 10-of-10 on PATs through three games. Lincoln kicked a career-long 47-yard field goal vs. Southern Miss. The punt return unit gave up its second TD of the season at Florida, an 83 yard return early in the game. LaMarcus Coker posted 207 kickoff return yards at Florida, including a 74-yard scamper.

UT head coach Phillip Fulmer owns a 3-0 career mark against current members of the Sun Belt Conference, with lone wins over Louisiana-Lafayette (38-3 in 1992), Louisiana-Monroe (70-3 in 2000) and Middle Tennessee (26-3 in 2002). No Sun Belt team has ever scored more than a single field goal against a Fulmer-coached squad.
