SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

Each head coach is allowed one Instant Replay challenge per game, which is exercised by requesting a team timeout. A head coach may issue a challenge only if his team has one or more timeouts remaining in the half. If the challenged ruling is overturned, the timeout is not charged, but the coach has no more challenges during that game.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference, following approval by the NCAA Football Rules Committee, will implement the use of video replay on an experimental basis beginning with the 2005 football season.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - c. Touching of a kick
 - d. Number of players on field
 - e. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - f. Fourth-down/try fumble plays

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

2007 SEC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The SEC's Eastern and Western Division winners will meet in Atlanta's Georgia Dome to battle for the league championship and the right to represent the conference in the Bowl Championship Series. The 16th-annual title game is set for December 1 and will be nationally televised by CBS Sports at 4:00 p.m. ET.

The game is a result of conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Under NCAA regulations, a conference with 12 members may play a 12th football game to determine its champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The participants of the game are determined each year during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the best overall SEC winning percentage in each division.

The 1994 SEC Championship Game earned a 10.5 rating and a 26 share, the highest rated SEC Championship Game in history.

The SEC Championship Game has also drawn capacity crowds in its history. 1,120,836 fans have witnessed first-hand the pageantry of SEC Football at the 15 previous Championship Games.

Attendance at the 15 previous championship games has been 102.3 percent of stadium capacity, including 13 sellouts.

THIS WEEK IN SEC FOOTBALL HISTORY

As the Southeastern Conference celebrates its 75th anniversary, here is a look at some of the highlights during the upcoming game dates in its history:

**Sept. 29**

1923 - Wallace Wade begins his Alabama head coaching career with a 12-0 win against Union College in Tuscaloosa. Wade would coach eight seasons at the Capstone and post a 61-13-3 record.

1951 - Ralph "Shug" Jordan began his Auburn head coaching career with a 24-14 win against Vanderbilt on the Plains. Jordan would go on to become Auburn's winningest all-time coach with a 176-83-6 record in 25 seasons.

1984 - Galen Hall serves as Florida's head coach for the first time and the Gators defeat Mississippi State, 27-12, in Gainesville. Hall would coach 5+ seasons at Florida and account for a 40-18-1 record.

1984 - Unranked LSU goes to #15 Southern California and defeats the Trojans, 23-3. Bill Arnsparger's Tigers would go on to an 8-3-1 record including a Sugar Bowl berth.

1990 - Alabama's Gene Stallings gets his first win as the Tide coach in a 59-28 win over Vanderbilt in Tuscaloosa.

2001 - Mark Richt gains his first Southeastern Conference victory with a 34-23 win over Arkansas in Athens.

2001 - In a battle of two Top 15 SEC teams, #7 Tennessee outlasts #14 LSU, 26-18, in Knoxville. The teams combined for more than 660 passing yards while the Vol defense held LSU to 29 rushing yards.

CBS SPORTS - The 2007 season marks the 11th year for CBS as the league's national network television partner. CBS will televise up to 15 games per year throughout the season. CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 1 at 4 p.m. ET.

ESPN/ESPN2, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com (search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

LINCOLN FINANCIAL SPORTS (LFS) (Formerly Jefferson-Pilot Sports) will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send eight of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2007 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection of available SEC teams.

2008 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2007 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2007 regular season, the Allstate BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in New Orleans on Jan. 7 at 8 p.m. EST. The Allstate BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2007 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, and the Orange Bowl on Jan. 3 at 8 p.m. ET.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES



ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

Alabama (3-1, 2-1 SEC) saw its win streak snapped as they fell short in a battle with Georgia (3-1, 1-1 SEC) Saturday night. Leigh Tiffin kicked a 42-yard field goal to give Alabama the 23-20 lead in overtime, but when the Bulldogs took over on their possession, Georgia's Matt Stafford threw a 25-yard pass to Mikey Henderson to hand the Tide the 26-23 loss. This marked the 10th time an Alabama team has played in an overtime game and the Tide has a record of 3-7 since 1996. Senior receiver DJ Hall had three catches for 46 yards, extending his school-record streak of games with at least one reception to 22 consecutive games, dating back to Oct. 15, 2005. He now has a school record 2,255 receiving yards for his career. Hall also has 143 receptions and 13 touchdowns. Sophomore linebacker Prince Hall led both teams with the game-high 12 tackles, one short of his single-game his of 13. Freshman linebacker Rolando McClain had 11 tackles, a new single-game high for McClain. Defensively, Lionel Mitchell recorded his fifth career interception, while Rashad Johnson recorded his first. Alabama will take a break in conference play as they travel to Jacksonville, Fla. for a meeting with Florida State.

FLORIDA GATORS



In their first conference road game of the season, Florida (4-0, 2-0 SEC) held off Ole Miss (0-2, 1-3 SEC) as they defeated the Rebels 30-24 Saturday. Quarterback Tim Tebow accounted for four touchdowns and 427 yards of total offense including a quarterback school record 166 yards rushing. The previous rushing high by a quarterback was Larry Rentz who had 109 yards against Tulane in 1967. His efforts are now the sixth highest total offense output in school history. The sophomore QB rushed for two touchdowns and completed 20 of 34 passes to throw for 261 yards and two touchdowns. For the second straight week, receiver Percy Harvin recorded 100 receiving yards and set career highs in receptions with 11 and yards with 121. The Gators have registered four consecutive 500-yard offensive games. The Gator defense halted Ole Miss to 80 yards of net rushing and held BenJarvus Green-Ellis to 37 yards on 11 carries. With the win, Florida has an 11-game win streak, tied for second-longest active streak in the country with LSU.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS

Arkansas (1-2, 0-2 SEC) dropped its SEC home opener as the Kentucky Wildcats (4-0, 1-0 SEC) posted a 42-29 win over the Razorbacks. Felix Jones had a school record, 82-yard kickoff for a touchdown, which also tied Tennessee's Willie Gault for the SEC record. The Razorbacks registered their first defensive touchdown of the season in the first quarter when Antwain Robinson recovered an Andre Woodson fumble and ran it in for 16 yards. It was Robinson's second career touchdown and the first for Arkansas since he intercepted Florida's Chris Leak in the 2006 SEC Championship Game. True freshman kicker Alex Tejada continued his perfect streak as he made two field goals and is 7-of-7 for the season. Heisman Trophy candidate Darren McFadden ran for 173 yards on 29 carries and tallied one rushing touchdown. He had a 56-yard touchdown in the second quarter, marking his longest run of the season, the seventh-longest of his career. The rushing touchdown was McFadden's 29th career rushing TD and he ranks fourth on Arkansas' all-time list. He is eight touchdowns away from making the SEC's top ten list for most career touchdowns scored.



GEORGIA BULLDOGS



Quarterback Matthew Stafford connected with receiver Mikey Henderson for a 25-yard touchdown pass in overtime to life the Georgia Bulldogs (3-1, 1-1 SEC) to a 26-23 victory over Alabama (3-1, 2-1 SEC) in Tuscaloosa Saturday night. The catch was Henderson's first of his career, to go with two punt return TD's in his career. Alabama had first possession in the overtime and took a 23-20 lead when Leigh Tiffin kicked a 42-yard field goal. UGA answered quickly with the TD pass coming on its only play in the overtime. Georgia is now 4-2 all-time in overtime and is 2-0 under head coach Mark Richt. Also with the win, under Coach Richt, Georgia is 23-3 in an opponent's stadium, including 2-0 in Tuscaloosa, and is 9-2 against ranked foes. Senior running back Thomas Brown had 74 rushing yards and moved up to ninth in Georgia history with 2,080 yards. He entered the game ranked 12th. Redshirt freshman Knowshon Moreno tied Brown with 74 yards rushing and did it on 17 carries plus had two catches for 22 yards. Junior middle linebacker Marcus Washington made his first career start and tallied a career-high eight tackles. Up next, Georgia plays host to Ole Miss Saturday at 1 p.m. (ET).

AUBURN TIGERS



Auburn (2-2, 0-1 SEC) stepped out of SEC action last week as they defeated New Mexico State 55-20. The 55 points scored by Auburn is a season high and the most since scoring 63 vs. Ball State in 2005. Freshman quarterback Kodi Burns started for the Tigers and is the first true freshman QB to start at Auburn since Gabe Gross in 1998. He is the first true freshman QB to start for Tommy Tuberville in his 13-year coaching career. With Burn's start, it snapped a 24-game starting streak for Brandon Cox. Burns recorded his first career TD pass when he connected with Rod Smith on a 58-yard pass. Mario Fannin rushed for 103 yards on 15 carries and had three touchdowns, including a 67-yarder in the fourth quarter. His three touchdowns were the most by an Auburn player since 2005. After holding a slim 21-20 lead at halftime, Auburn exploded and outscored the Aggies 34-0 in the second half. Defensively, Auburn created six turnovers (three fumbles/three interceptions) against new Mexico State after forcing four total in the first three games. It was the most turnovers by an AU opponent since Tennessee had six in 2004.

KENTUCKY WILDCATS



Kentucky (4-0, 1-0 SEC) produced its second consecutive fourth-quarter comeback to knock off Arkansas (1-2, 0-2 SEC) 42-29 in Fayetteville Saturday to keep its perfect record intact. Off to a 4-0 start, its best start since 2002, Kentucky is one of three teams in the league still undefeated. The last time Kentucky opened the season 4-0, including at least one conference win was 1950. The Wildcats had three different rushers record a touchdown against Arkansas and now has 14 rushing TD's on the season. UK only had 12 rushing TD's in all of the 2006 season. Quarterback Andre Woodson recorded two touchdown passes and tied Babe Parilli (50) for third place on Kentucky's career touchdown list. In the second quarter, Woodson broke the NCAA record for consecutive passes without an interception. The previous record was 271 by Trent Dilfer of Fresno State. He entered the game with 257 consecutive throws without a pick and has now thrown 296 successful tosses. Keenan Burton's TD catch in the third quarter gave him 19 career TD receptions and is now second in UK history in that category. He scored his 20th TD in the fourth quarter to give UK the lead.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES

LSU TIGERS



LSU has converted 25 straight (including 3-3 Saturday) red zone opportunities (17 TD, 8 FG) dating back to the second quarter of the 2007 Sugar Bowl vs. Notre Dame. South Carolina became the first team since Alabama (Nov. 11, 2006) to score a point on LSU in the first quarter in Tiger Stadium. South Carolina is also just the second team to score on the Tigers in the first quarter in Tiger Stadium under head coach Les Miles (17 games, 174-14 point differential). LSU has outscored its opponents 174-14 in the first quarter in the 17 home games under head coach Les Miles, including the 7-7 score today. South Carolina joined Alabama as the only teams to score on the Tigers in the first quarter during that stretch. LSU has outscored its opponents 185-23 over the last 16 quarters, including the 28-16 score on Saturday. The Tigers extended their overall winning streak to 11 games. LSU stretched its home winning streak to 16 games and five straight against teams ranked in the Top 25. The 16 consecutive home wins are just one shy of the school record of 17 set between 1935-37. The overall winning streak of 11 games ties for the third longest win streak in school history.

SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS



With his six-yard reception in the first quarter at LSU, junior wide receiver Kenny McKinley secured his 25th straight game with at least one catch. Entering Saturday's contest, his mark was the eighth longest streak in the nation. McKinley caught six passes for 25 yards, also scoring the final Gamecock touchdown in the fourth quarter, his third receiving touchdown of the season. With his blocked punt in the first quarter, freshman DE Cliff Matthews became the first Gamecock to block a punt since the 2000 season when Derek Watson was credited with a block against Florida. The Carolina offense entered the red zone on three occasions against LSU, scoring on all three of those trips (two touchdowns; one field goal). For the season, the Gamecocks are a perfect 14-14 on trips to the red zone. In his first kickoff return of the season, freshman WR Chris Culliver returned an LSU kickoff 44 yards in the third quarter, marking the longest Carolina kick return this season. In his first appearance since the season opener against UL-Lafayette, freshman quarterback Chris Smelley threw for a season high 174 yards, against LSU, including a long pass of 45 yards to Mike Davis in the fourth quarter.

OLE MISS REBELS



Over the last two years, Ole Miss' average margin of defeat against top-10 opponents is 5.0 points (four games, including one in overtime). The Rebels are averaging 22.3 points per game, which is a 6.6 point increase from last year's 15.7 scoring clip. Senior QB Seth Adams notched his second 300-yard passing performance of the season and career, finishing 18-of-31 for 302 yards with two TDs and one interception versus Florida. Adams has thrown for 200 or more yards in three of four games this year. Junior WR Mike Wallace hauled in a career-long 77-yard pass for a TD versus Florida, his team-high fourth of the year. The reception was the longest by a Rebel since a 77-yard touchdown throw from Eli Manning to Chris Collins in the 2002 Mississippi State game. It marked Wallace's third catch of the year of 50 or more yards, and all three have resulted in TDs. The Rebel defense held the nation's No. 2 scoring offense to 26 points below its season average. In his first career start, sophomore LB Jamie Phillips topped the team in tackles for the first time with a career-high 11 tackles, including five solos.

TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS



Senior quarterback Erik Ainge finished the Arkansas State game 27-of-39 for 334 yards, four touchdowns and one interception. The 334 passing yards sets a new career-high and the four touchdown passes ties his career-high. This marks the fourth time Ainge has passed for over 300 yards in his career and his third four-touchdown game of his career. Ainge's 25-yard touchdown pass to LaMarcus Coker in the second quarter marked Ainge's 50th career touchdown pass. Sophomore running back LaMarcus Coker had 15 carries for 101 yards and one touchdown. He also had two receptions for 49 yards and one touchdown. This is Coker's first 100-yard rushing game since rushing for 126 yards at Vanderbilt last season. Lucas Taylor caught his first career touchdown pass on UT's opening drive of the game on a 17-yard strike from Ainge. Taylor caught all three of UT's passes for 45 yards on the first drive of the game. The junior finished with seven receptions for 104 yards and two touchdowns. Taylor has now had over 100 yards receiving in both of UT's home games this season. Taylor now has 24 receptions this season for 382 yards and two touchdowns.

MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS



Mississippi State won its third straight football game Saturday night, downing non-conference visitor Gardner-Webb 31-15 at Davis Wade Stadium at Scott Field. It marks the first time since the 2000 season the Bulldogs have won three consecutive gridiron contests. State (3-1) amassed 379 yards of total offense in the game, led by another solid rushing effort from running back Anthony Dixon. Dixon tallied 86 yards on 16 carries while scoring two of the Bulldogs' early touchdowns in the affair. For the third straight week, Mississippi State ended the opponent's opening drive on an interception returned for touchdown (De'Mon Glanton's 60 yard return vs. Gardner-Webb, Derek Pegues' 20-yard return vs. Auburn and Gabe O'Neal's 47-yard return against Tulane). With his two sacks, Titus Brown moves into eighth place on the all-time list with 14.5. He passes Keith Joseph (14.0 sacks from 1989-92). Josh Riddell's second quarter touchdown pass to Tony Burks was Riddell's first career touchdown pass. Mario Bobo tallied a career-high eight tackles. Bobo also had two forced fumbles to bring his career tally to four.

VANDERBILT COMMODORES



The win over Ole Miss prior to the off-week marks the Commodores' first victory in SEC play since defeating Georgia 24-22 in Athens on Oct. 14, 2006. It snapped a four-game losing streak in conference. It also marked Vanderbilt's first victory at home against an SEC opponent since Sept. 17, 2005 (Ole Miss, 31-23) and snapped an eight-game losing streak to conference members at Vanderbilt Stadium. Last week, senior offensive tackle Chris Williams was named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week. Williams, a two-year starter and All-SEC performer as a junior, was part of an offensive line that helped the Commodores gain 383 total offensive yards. It marks the second time SEC officials have recognized Williams' abilities on the offensive line. Last year, he earned similar honors after Vanderbilt's 24-22 win at Georgia. Against Ole Miss, Earl Bennett caught 11 passes for 100 yards. It was Bennett's ninth game with 100 or more receiving yards and his ninth game with at least 10 receptions. He moved from 13th to 7th all-time in the SEC with 189 receptions.

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last five years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 171 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 79 named to the first-team.
- During the last eleven years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award. In 2006, Alabama track & field athlete Beth Mallory was named a recipient of this award.
- Florida's Chris Leak was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last five years, the SEC has had 11 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2007-08 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama baseball player Emeel Salem and Vanderbilt track & field athlete Erika Schneble were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2006-07.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. Tennessee swimmer Brad Boswell and Florida softball player Stacey Stevens were named recipients of this award in 2006-07.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had four sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Courtney Kupets of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics, Georgia's Kara Lynn Joyce won in Swimming & Diving and Tennessee's Monica Abbott was the top athlete in softball.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 66 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- Since 1990, the SEC has won 118 team and 805 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.8 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (268 of 349). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won more team national championships than any other conference in the nation. The SEC won 50 team titles since 2000, while the Pac-10 won 45 and the Big 12 won 21. The SEC won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, also the most of any conference.

Les Miles is in his third season at LSU with a record of 25-4 (.862) and in his 7th season overall with a record of 53-25 (.679). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is Bo Pelini.

Bob Toledo is in his first season at Tulane and in his 14th season overall with a record of 79-64 (.552). The Green Wave's offensive coordinator is Dan Dodd, and the defensive coordinator is Thom Kaumeyer.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Quarterback Matt Flynn has started three games this season, but has been slowed by an ankle injury. Flynn has completed 37-of-65 pass attempts for 415 yards and three scores. Running back Jacob Hester has rushed for 294 yards and two scores, while Keiland Williams is second in rushing with 207 yards and four scores. Early Doucet leads LSU with 15 receptions (153 yds), while Brandon LaFell leads the team in receiving yardage with 203 yards.

Senior Antonio Harris has started every game of his career and will make his 38th consecutive start in this week's game against the Tigers. Harris posted career highs in tackles (11), tackles for loss (4.0 for 16 yards lost) and sacks (3.0 for 15 yards lost) last week vs. SE Louisiana. His three sacks eclipsed his previous high of one and a half. Senior Joe Goosby posted a career-high with 16 tackles (10 solo, six assists) vs. SE Louisiana.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TULANE HAS THE BALL

Senior RB Matt Forte was named Walter Camp National Offensive Player of the Week, the Walter Camp Football Foundation announced Sunday afternoon, after he reestablished the Tulane record books with 303 rushing yards and five touchdowns on 40 carries, and completed the game with 312 yards of total offense (nine receiving yards). His rushing total set a Tulane and Conference USA record.

Ali Highsmith leads the Tigers in tackles with 31, while Craig Steltz has a team-best four interceptions. Glenn Dorsey had another solid game for the Tigers in their 28-16 win over 12th-ranked South Carolina at Tiger Stadium. The senior recorded eight tackles, including seven solo stops. He also added a sack for a seven-yard loss and batted down a pass at the line of scrimmage.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Ross Thevenot has served as team's punter and kicker in each game so far in 2007, connecting on 2-of-3 field goal attempts and all eight PAT tries while averaging 38.6 yards on 19 punts. For his career, nailed 31-of-36 PATs and 11-of-17 field goal tries (64 points), while tallying 770 yards on 20 punts (38.5 avg.)

PK Colt David of LSU took a no-look over the shoulder pass from Matt Flynn and walked in 15-yards untouched for a score that upped LSU's halftime margin to 21-7 over South Carolina. It was the first career touchdown for David and then he kicked the extra point for what is believed to mark the first time since Doug Moreau back in the 1960s that a player scored the touchdown and then remained on the field to kick the PAT.

Riddell connected with Tony Burks on a 30-yard scoring pass with 1:18 left in the first half to give State a 28-0 halftime lead. It was Riddell's first career TD pass and Burks' sixth scoring catch. Anthony Dixon recorded his third and fourth touchdowns of the season during the first half of Saturday's game. It was also the second two-touchdown game of the year for the running back.

Safety Chris Hampton made his first start of the season and responded with six tackles, a forced fumble and an interception, the third of his career. Safety Emanuel Cook had a strong showing against LSU, logging a team-high 11 tackles with two pass breakups. He entered the game with 10 tackles on the season. Middle linebacker Jasper Brinkley is out for the season with a knee injury suffered at LSU last weekend.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Senior DE Titus Brown, who has recorded 140 career tackles, including 29.5 for loss (minus 133 yards), 14.5 of which were sacks (minus 88 yards), had a career night against Gardner-Webb this past Saturday. Brown, who has recorded at least one tackle for loss in each of the season's first four games, had three tackles for loss (minus 14 yards) against GWU (second-most in his career). He matched his career best with two quarterback sacks (minus 10 yards) against the Runnin' Bulldogs.

Mike Davis scored his first rushing touchdown of the season and the 12th of his career at LSU. Davis also caught three passes for a team-best 77 yards. Junior Kenny McKinley is the top receiving threat for the Gamecocks. He has 23 catches and 207 receiving yards this season, nearly twice as many catches and yards as any other Gamecock. Cory Boyd leads the team with 272 yards rushing, averaging 4.8 yards per carry with four touchdowns. He is averaging 68.0 yards per contest.

SPECIAL TEAMS

On top of being a danger in the secondary, Derek Pegues has also been a threat in the return game. He ranks third on the school's all-time kick return (67) and yardage (1,456) lists. With 27 yards in punt returns against Gardner-Webb, he moved into eighth all-time at the school in that category (409 yards).

Ryan Succop has been successful on each of his last five field goal attempts after missing his first attempt (a 47-yarder) of the season. He was the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week against Georgia after drilling all three of his field goal attempts in the 16-12 win. He is 21-for-28 in field goal attempts in his career.

A JUCO transfer from Compton, Calif., Palmer has also posted 4.5 TFLs and a team-high three pass break-ups. He finished with 12 tackles in each of the first two games. Sanford recorded a career-high 13 stops against both Missouri and Vanderbilt. With a team-best 25 solos, he also ranks second in the conference at 6.3 per game.

QB Matthew Stafford has completed 70-of-123 passes for 569 yards with six TDs and three interceptions. WR Sean Bailey has been his primary target with 16 catches for 237 yards and one touchdown, while fellow senior Mikey Henderson has 11 grabs for 113 yards and a score. Redshirt freshman RB Knowshon Moreno tops the team in rushing with 342 yards on 64 carries with two TDs, while senior Thomas Brown has 213 yards on 54 attempts with three scores.

Senior linebacker Wesley Woodyard is making the most of his final campaign. The LaGrange, Ga., native is the SEC's leading tackler with 50 stops (12.5 pg) this season and is only one of five players in the nation to record 50 or more tackles so far this year. He has recorded double-figure tackles in 14 career games, including three consecutive contests. Woodyard has an active streak of 28 consecutive games with at least four tackles and now has 306 tackles in his career.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

LB linebacker Cergile Sincere was named Sun Belt Conference Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in Saturday's 30-20 win over North Texas. The senior linebacker had a career high 15 tackles and eight solo tackles in the win. Sincere also recorded a crucial sack in the fourth quarter right after the Owls scored to take the lead. Tavious Polo had two interceptions for the Owls, including one in the end zone early in the fourth quarter, after he tied a school record with three against Minnesota.

QB André Woodson broke the NCAA record for consecutive passes without interception during the Arkansas game. Woodson has an active streak of 296 consecutive passes without a pick, surpassing the previous mark of 271 by Trent Dilfer of Fresno State. Woodson has looked impressive in Kentucky's first four games as he has completed 64.1 percent of his passes (86-of-134). Woodson, who has completed at least 66.7 percent of his attempts in nine of the last 10 games, ranks second in the SEC and 19th nationally in passing efficiency with a 154.5 rating.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Warley Leroy nailed all three of his field goal attempts in last week's victory at North Texas. Keegan Peterson has six punts for a 40.3 yard average, including a long of 49. Dilvory Edgecomb is a danger on kickoff returns for the Owls.

Punter Tim Masthay significantly helped the Wildcats in the battle for field position against Arkansas. The junior from Murray, Ky., averaged 43.1 yards per punt and pinned one kick inside the 20-yard line. Arkansas started five of its possessions inside their own 25-yard line, which included a drive starting on the eight-yard line. All-America candidate Tony Carter picked off two Colorado passes raising his career total to five. He is tied with Roger Williams for the most career interceptions on the team. Neefy Moffett is second among the defensive line in tackles (11), he leads the team in tackles for loss (5), sacks (2.5) and forced fumbles (1).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA STATE HAS THE BALL

Alabama ranks sixth in the SEC in rushing defense (146.75), sixth in passing defense (179.75) and seventh in scoring defense (20.0) through four games. In 41 career games, Wallace Gilberry has 126 tackles, 33 tackles for loss and 11.5 sacks. He has also added four forced fumbles, three fumbles recovered and three pass breakups. In four games this season, Gilberry has 18 tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss, one forced fumble and one PBU.

Antone Smith is on pace to become the first Seminole to account for more than 30% of the Seminoles' offensive plays (runs and receptions) since 1977 when Larry Key accounted for 33% of the offensive plays. Preston Parker leads the Seminoles with 361 total yards. He is averaging 120 yards a game and he has accounted for 25% of the team's total yardage. Meager broke the North Texas single-game records for passing attempts with 64, passing completions with 46 and passing yards with 601. His passing yardage also ranks as the 12th-best single-game performance in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history. Fitzgerald broke the North Texas and Sun Belt Conference records for single-game receptions with 18 and receiving yards with 327.

Weston Dacus is second on the team in tackles through the first three games of his senior season with 26 total tackles. He has 17 solo stops, 1.5 TFLs (-7) and one sack. The middle linebacker has made 14-straight starts when the Hogs aren't in a dime package. Matt Hewitt has been a force and a playmaker at strong safety this season for the Hogs in 2007. He leads the team with 27 tackles in three games, including back-to-back double-digit tackle games. Hewitt also has a sack, interception, a forced fumble and four pass breakups.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Aaron Weathers is looking to become the only Mean Green player in history to lead the team in tackles for three consecutive seasons. Weathers led the team with 113 tackles in 2005 and 78 last season. He becomes only the seventh player to lead their team in consecutive seasons since North Texas starting keeping tackles as a stat in 1977.

Darren McFadden continued his ground assault early in the 2007 season with 173 yards and a touchdown last Saturday. He leads the country with 173.0 rushing yards per game average, while ranking third nationally in all-purpose yards with 222.67 per game. Fellow junior tailback Felix Jones has been spectacular as well with 374-yards rushing (119.3 ypg) on just 40 carries and a touchdown. His 8.95 ypc average ranks third nationally.

Junior all-conference punter Truman Spencer has turned in living up to his pre-season billing as a Ray Guy Award candidate as one of the top punters in the nation. EMU junior linebacker Daniel Holtzclaw (Enid, Ok.-Enid) came up with his single-game best for tackles with a whopping 19 stops last weekend, Sept. 22, against Howard University. The 19 tackles were not only a career best for Holtzclaw but also marked the 12th double-digit tackle effort in his three year career.

After producing three new records and earning SEC Offensive Player of the Week honors in a sensational season-opening performance against Richmond, Earl Bennett caught 11 passes for 100 yards in another excellent effort in Vanderbilt's 31-17 victory over Ole Miss on Sept. 15. QB Chris Nickson hit 17 of 25 passes for 200 yards and rushed for 57 additional yards and a touchdown in the last outing vs. Ole Miss.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Zach Johnson has been one of the top punters in the nation for the past two years. He was one of 10 finalists for the 2006 Ray Guy Award which goes to the nation's top punter. Now handling place kicking as well, he punted six times for 251 yards and a 41.8 yard average, had four punts inside the 20-yard line, and had just two returned for two yards. Johnson made a 22-yard field goal in his only attempt, booted all five PAT kicks and also handled the kickoff duties last week.

Bryant Hahnfeldt is 4-6 on field goals and 10-10 on extra points to lead Vanderbilt in scoring. Brett Upson is averaging 36.4 yards per punt with a long of 51 yards. D.J. Moore is a dangerous returner, averaging over 25 yards per kickoff return.

SERIES/GAME NOTES**Record:** First Meeting

Vanderbilt and Eastern Michigan will play for the first time when the teams meet this Saturday in Nashville...When the Commodores face EMU on Saturday, they will be looking to win consecutive games for the first time in nearly a year...The last time Vanderbilt had consecutive wins was last September when they defeated Tennessee State (38-9, Sept. 23) and Temple (43-14, Sept. 30)... The Commodores have enjoyed consecutive victories on just four occasions in the last eight years: three times during a four-game win streak to open the 2005 season (at Wake Forest, at Arkansas, vs. Ole Miss., and vs. Richmond) and last year. The Commodores are 8-3 all-time versus members of the Mid-American Conference (MAC).

THE COACHES

Tommy Tuberville is in his ninth season at Auburn with a record of 72-31 (.699) and in his 13th season overall with a record of 97-51 (.655). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Al Borges and the defensive coordinator is Will Muschamp.

Urban Meyer is in his third season at Florida with a record of 26-4 (.867) and in his seventh season overall with a record of 65-12 (.844). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Dan Mullen and the defensive co-coordinators are Greg Mattison and Charlie Strong.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Auburn had its biggest rushing game of the season vs. New Mexico State last Saturday, accumulating 229 yards on the ground. Both Ben Tate (111 yards) and Mario Fannin (103 yards) went over the century mark, marking the first time since 2005 at Kentucky that Auburn had two 100-yard rushers in the same game. Junior wide receiver Rodgeriquis Smith had his first two touchdowns of the season last Saturday against New Mexico State.

This season, Brandon Spikes and Dustin Doe rank as Florida's leading tacklers with 36 and 25, respectively. Defensive end Derrick Harvey recorded a sack in UF's last game against Ole Miss to bring his career total to 15. Harvey needs just one and one third more to enter Florida's career chart (Ellis Johnson, 16.3, 1991-94).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Quentin Groves leads the team with six tackles for losses, which is tied for third in the SEC, and has 18 tackles, including a career-best nine against South Florida. Groves also has two sacks, a forced fumble and 17 quarterback hurries through four games played. Jonathan Wilhite picked off two passes last week, becoming the first Auburn player to intercept multiple passes in one game since 2004.

Florida is ranked sixth in the nation in scoring offense (49.3) and 11th in total offense (517.8). The Gators are 24-of-26 in the red zone with 21 touchdowns. Tim Tebow is ranked third nationally in passing efficiency (197.96), fifth in total offense (363.5) and 46th in rushing (89.5). Percy Harvin has had over 100 yards receiving each of the last two weeks.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Auburn freshman punter Patrick Tatum was named the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week on Monday. Tatum punted four times during Auburn's 55-20 victory over New Mexico State last Saturday for a 45.5-yard average. None of his four punts were returned, and all four were placed inside the 20-yard line. He also ran for a first down on a fake punt.

Brandon James had his third return of 50-plus yards on the year with a 55-yard kick return at Ole Miss. He had a 59-yard kickoff return against Troy and 83-yard punt return for a touchdown in the Tennessee game. Last season, James had just one kick return over 50 yards.

The losing team has been held to 10 points or fewer in 13 of the last 21 meetings ... Ten of the last 24 matchups have been decided by seven points or fewer.
