OLE MISS QUICK HITTEES

Ole Miss is 0-5 in the SEC for the first time since 1984 ... The Rebels' 44-8 loss last Saturday to Arkansas marked the first time this season Ole Miss did not score at least 17 points ... Turnovers have been a problem for the Rebels, who rank last in the SEC in turnover margin at -8 ... Ole Miss has allowed only 24 first-quarter points all year ... Greg Hardy leads the SEC in sacks (eight) and tackles for loss (15.5, fifth nationally) ... Senior RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis ranks fourth in the SEC in rushing (98.1) and has seven 100-yard games in his two seasons at Ole Miss ... Senior QB Seth Adams has thrown for more than 200 yards five times this season ... Junior WR Mike Wallace is third in the SEC averaging 81.8 receiving yards per game, and leads the league in yards per reception (21.8) ... Junior LB Ashlee Palmer is second in the SEC in tackles (9.5) ... Junior LB Tony Fein had a career-high 13 tackles last Saturday vs. Arkansas.

AUBURN-OLE MISS SERIES NOTES

This is the 18th consecutive year that the two schools have faced each other ... Nine of the last 14 games have been decided by 10 points or less ... The two teams have split the last four games played in Auburn ... The two teams have combined to score at least 30 points in 17 of the last 20 games, including eight in a row, and at least 40 points in nine of the last 12 contests ... The largest margin of victory in the series is 41 points when the Tigers defeated the Rebels, 41-0, in 1985 ... Auburn has scored a rushing touchdown in 24 of the last 25 meetings (1999 the only exception) in the series ... The Tigers have thrown for at least 230 yards in each of the last four meetings ... Auburn has had 18 rushing touchdowns in the last seven games against Ole Miss ... The Tigers have held Ole Miss to less than 100 yards rushing in eight of the last 10 meetings, including an average of 54.5 yards over the last two seasons ... The Rebels have been shut out by the Tigers three times in the last 31 years.

MISSISSIPPI TIGERS

Auburn's current roster includes two players who hail from the state of Mississippi. Senior DE Quentin Groves hails from Greenville and freshman OL Chaz Ramsey is from Madison.

OLE MISS CONNECTIONS

Auburn head coach Tommy Tuberville was the head coach at Ole Miss from 1995-1998 before arriving at Auburn. Tuberville tallied a 25-20 record in Oxford, including three winning seasons.

Five Auburn assistant coaches and an administrative staff member were on Tuberville's staff at Ole Miss. The coaches and staff include: Don Dunn (defensive tackles), Eddie Gran (running backs), Greg Knox (wide receivers), Hugh Nall (offensive line), Terry Price (defensive ends) and Andy Lutz (asst. to

head coach). Each were at Ole Miss from 1995-98 during Tuberville's era, with the exception of Gran, who was at Ole Miss from 1994-98.

Head coaches Tommy Tuberville and Ed Orgeron coached together at Miami (Fla.) from 1988-92. Tuberville was a volunteer assistant in 1988 before coaching the linebackers from 1989-92. Orgeron started at Miami in 1988 as a graduate assistant before coaching the defensive line from 1989-92.

Ole Miss assistant head coach/offensive line coach Art Kehoe coached with Tuberville and Orgeron at Miami, having worked with the Hurricane's offensive line from 1981-2005.

Auburn running backs/special teams coach Eddie Gran was also on that Miami staff from 1990-91. Gran was a graduate assistant coach working with the linebackers (1990) and quarterbacks (1991).

Ole Miss offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Dan Werner served as an offensive consultant to Tuberville on the Auburn staff in 1999, and previously worked with Tuberville and Orgeron at Miami from 1988-89 as an offensive graduate assistant.

Auburn tight ends coach Steve Ensminger coached with Orgeron at McNeese State in 1985, when Orgeron was a graduate assistant coach.

Ole Miss defensive coordinator John Thompson held that same position at Louisiana Tech in 1990 during Ensminger's last season as Tech's offensive coordinator.

Auburn Chaplaincy Training and Development Program Director Wes Yeary was an FCA Campus Director at Ole Miss from 1996-2005.

ON THIS DATE

Auburn owns an all-time record of 10-6 in games played on Oct. 27, including a 4-0 mark in games played in Auburn. The Tigers' biggest victory on Oct. 27 came in 1973, when an unranked Auburn team knocked off 12th-ranked Houston, 7-0, in Auburn.

IN OCTOBER

Auburn is 286-144-18 (.658) all-time in the month of October, including a 22-13 mark under Tommy Tuberville. The Tigers are 22-7 in their last 29 games in October.

JORDAN-HARE STADIUM

Now in its 68th year as home to the Auburn football team, Jordan-Hare Stadium is the nation's ninth-largest on-campus stadium, with a capacity of 87,451 fans. The Tigers are 258-64-7 (.795) at Jordan-Hare Stadium, including a 44-10 (.815) mark over the past eight years. AU went 7-0 at home in both 2000 and 2004, and posted a 6-1 mark in 2005.

2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

CAPTAIN COMEBACK

Brandon Cox has led Auburn on scoring drives that gave Auburn the lead with less than four minutes left in the game five times in eight games this season.

In the season opener against Kansas State, Cox capped a six-play, 57-yard drive with a 3-yard touchdown pass to Gabe McKenzie with just 2:01 left to give Auburn a 16-13 lead, before a defensive score made the final 23-13. The next Saturday against South Florida, a nine-play, 51-yard drive set up a 46-yard field goal with just 2:54 left that gave the Tigers a 20-17 lead, but the Bulls rallied to win in overtime.

Cox took Auburn 35 yards in 10 plays to set up the winning 43-yard field goal on the game's final play during a 20-17 victory at Florida Sept. 29. At Arkansas Oct. 13, he drove Auburn 50 yards on eight plays to set up the winning 20-yard field goal with 21 seconds left in a 9-7 victory.

Last Saturday at LSU, Cox drove Auburn 83 yards on nine plays before hitting Rodgericus Smith with a 3-yard touchdown pass that put Auburn ahead 24-23, although LSU would score with one second left for a 30-24 victory.

CARDIAC KIDS

Auburn games have not been lacking for excitement this season, as six of the first eight games were decided in the final two minutes. Wes Byrum's field goal on the game's final play gave Auburn a 20-17 win at No. 4 Florida Sept. 29, and his 20-yarder with 21 seconds left lifted Auburn to a 9-7 win at Arkansas Oct. 13. In Auburn's victory over Kansas State, the Tigers were clinging to a three-point lead before a fumble return for a touchdown with just 1:11 left sealed the victory.

All three of Auburn's losses have been close calls. Auburn lost to LSU 30-24 when LSU scored on a 22-yard pass play with just one second left. Against Mississippi State Sept. 15, Auburn had a potential game-winning drive stall at the Bulldog 9-yard line with just 48 seconds left. The Tigers' other loss against South Florida ended in overtime.

STARTING STRONG

Auburn has started each of its last four games with a lengthy scoring drive. At Florida Sept. 29, the Tigers marched 86 yards on 14 plays and took 7:32 off the clock before scoring on a 6-yard run by Kodi Burns. Against Vanderbilt Oct. 6, Auburn went 80 yards on nine plays in 4:19 before Ben Tate scored from 4 yards out.

On Oct. 13 at Arkansas, Wes Byrum's 22-yard field goal capped a 14-play, 67-yard drive that consumed 6:12. Last Saturday at LSU, Brandon Cox's 17-yard scoring strike to Montez Billings capped an 11-play, 63-yard scoring drive that took 4:50.

In the last four games, Auburn's opening drive has averaged 12.0 plays for 74.0 yards while taking 5:49 off the clock.

FOUR-YEAR DOMINATION

Auburn's senior class has had almost as much success as any in the country. Since the start of the 2004 season, Auburn is tied for the fifth-best record in the NCAA. The Tigers are 38-8 (.826) over the last four seasons. The top teams since the 2004 season are as follows:

FANTASTIC FIRST HALVES

Auburn has allowed just seven total points in the first half of the last four games, outscoring Florida, Vanderbilt, Arkansas and LSU by a combined score of 62-7. In the last four games, Auburn has gained 797 yards of offense in the first half, to just 431 yards for its opponents.

SECOND QUARTER SUPERB

The second quarter has been Auburn's best quarter this season, as the Tigers have outscored their opponents 72-16 during the period. Auburn has outgained its opponents 780-451 in the second quarter and has scored during the second quarter in seven of eight games, while shutting out its opponents during the quarter six times.

TURNOVERS PROVE CRUCIAL

Turnovers have played a big role in determining Auburn's success this season. Auburn committed five turnovers in losses to South Florida and Mississippi State while forcing just one total in the two games, and has a -7 turnover margin in its losses. In the five victories, Auburn has committed just six total turnovers while forcing 13 (+7 margin). Against New Mexico State on Sept. 22, Auburn forced six turnovers, which was the most by the Tigers since forcing six against Tennessee in 2004.

Auburn scored just 14 points off turnovers in its three losses, but has 51 points off turnovers in its five wins.

OVERCOMING INJURIES

The Auburn defense has performed admirably, despite a rash of injuries. The Tigers have played games this season without defensive starters Tray Blackmon (four missed games), Merrill Johnson (four), Aairon Savage (four), Quentin Groves (two) and Jonathan Wilhite (one), and yet still rank 15th in the nation in total defense (305.1) and scoring defense (17.4).

SEC SUCCESS

Auburn has won 24 of its last 29 Southeastern Conference games and 25 of its last 30 games against SEC schools, including the 2004 SEC Championship game victory over Tennessee. Auburn's success against conference schools dates back to more than just the past four seasons, as since the start of the 2000 season, the Tigers are tied with LSU for the best record among the 12 league schools in regular season conference games. The following are the combined conference records of the 12 SEC schools from 2000-07.

NO PASSING ZONE

Despite playing non-conference games against New Mexico State (No. 7 in the NCAA in pass offense, 316.9 yards per game) and Kansas State (No. 21 in NCAA, threw 58 passes vs. AU), Auburn ranks 23rd nationally in pass defense, allowing just 188.4 yards per game, and is ranked No. 21 in pass efficiency defense (108.31). The Tigers, whose defense ranks seventh nationally in yards per completion (9.9), held both Mississippi State (41 yards) and Vanderbilt (88 yards) to less than 100 yards passing this season.

COX TURNS THE CORNER

After a rough start to the season, senior QB Brandon Cox has excelled during Auburn's last five games. After three games, Cox had completed 37-of-75 (.493) passes for 436 yards, two touchdowns and six interceptions for a quarterback rating of 90.97. In the last five weeks, Cox has completed 75-of-113 (.664) passes for 827 yards, four scores and just one interception, for a quarterback rating of 137.76. With 6142 career passing yards, Cox is now just 142 yards behind Pat Sullivan for third on Auburn's all-time passing yardage list.

COX LEADS ALL SEC QBs IN WINS

Brandon Cox earned his 23rd career victory as a starting quarterback during Auburn's 9-7 win at Arkansas Oct. 13. Cox, who is 23-8 as a starter, leads all SEC quarterbacks in career victories. Tennessee's Erik Ainge is second with 21, followed by Kentucky's Andre Woodson (17).

LESTER'S MIDAS TOUCH CONTINUES

Brad Lester's ability to reach the end zone continued during his first game of the season against Vanderbilt Oct. 6, as he scored twice on just 14 touches. For his career, Lester has now scored 19 career touchdowns (16 rushing, two receiving, one kickoff return) on only 247 touches. His rate of one touchdown for every 13.0 touches easily tops Auburn's top TD scorers such as Bo Jackson (one TD every 15.3 touches), Stephen Davis (15.4), Carnell Williams (18.3), Ronnie Brown (19.3) and Joe Cribbs (21.6).

RUSHING GAME IMPROVING

The return of junior RB Brad Lester has benefitted an already improving running game for Auburn. The Tigers averaged just 93.5 yards rushing in their first two games, but have averaged 178.2 in their last six, with 14 touchdowns and three games over 200 yards rushing. Four different players (Ben Tate, Mario Fannin, Brad Lester, Kodi Burns) have rushed for at least 87 yards in a game during the last six games.

SUSTAINED DRIVES

One of the keys to Auburn's offensive success the past four weeks has been the Tigers' ability to control the ball. Entering the Florida game,

Auburn had just one scoring drive of at least 10 plays, but against the Gators, all four of Auburn's scoring drives reached double digits in plays. The Tigers' opening drive of 14 plays for 86 yards in 7:32 set new season highs in plays, yards and time.

Against Vanderbilt, the Tigers had three scoring drives of at least seven plays and 74 yards, including a season-long 92-yard scoring drive that took 10 plays. Against Arkansas, all three scoring drives were at least eight plays long, including another 14-play drive, and three of the four scoring drives last Saturday at LSU used at least nine plays.

Auburn has averaged 32:25 in time of possession the last four weeks, and now ranks second in the SEC for the season with an average of 31:00.

HOT ROD

Junior wide receiver Rodgeriqu Smith, who leads Auburn with 33 catches for 453 yards and four touchdowns, surpassed the 1,000-yard mark for his career last Saturday at LSU and cracked the top 20 for career receiving yards at Auburn. Smith now has 1,014 career receiving yards.

Smith had a career night against Florida Sept. 29, setting career highs with nine catches for 102 yards. It marked the second straight game in which he set a career high in receiving yards, after totaling 86 yards and two touchdowns Sept. 22 against New Mexico State. Smith became the first Auburn player to catch two touchdown passes in one game since Ben Obomanu against Louisiana Tech in 2004.

Smith's 58-yard touchdown pass from Kodi Burns against the Aggies was the longest pass play of the season for Auburn, and Smith also has the team's second- and third-longest pass receptions of the season, with a 55-yard catch against Kansas State and a 36-yard reception against Mississippi State.

TOP BILLINGS

Sophomore Montez Billings has emerged as a steady complimentary receiver to Rodgeriqu Smith. Billings had just one catch in the first four games, but has 16 in the last four, including 11 catches in the last two games, which is two more than he had in his career prior to that point. Billings set career highs in catches (six) and receiving yards (78) and scored his first career touchdown on a 17-yard grab from Brandon Cox last Saturday at LSU.

20 OR LESS

Since Will Muschamp took over as defensive coordinator prior to the 2006 season, Auburn has held 17 of its 21 opponents to 20 points or less. The Tigers, who have allowed just 15.2 points per game since Muschamp's arrival, are 16-1 in games in which they hold their opponents to no more than 20 points.

Since the 2004 season, Auburn has held 36 of its 46 opponents to 20 points or less.

2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

FRESH MEAT

Auburn has had 26 freshmen (15 true, 11 redshirt) play this season. The starting lineup has included four true freshmen on offense, including right tackle Lee Ziemba, right guard Chaz Ramsey, left tackle Ryan Pugh and quarterback Kodi Burns. Redshirt freshmen Craig Stevens and Zac Etheridge have been regulars in the defensive starting lineup, while redshirt freshman Mike Berry started the first three games at right guard. The kicking game features true freshman placekicker Wes Byrum as well as a redshirt freshman (Ryan Shoemaker) and a true freshman (Patrick Tatum) sharing punting duties.

On Sept. 22 vs. New Mexico State, Burns became the first true freshman to start at quarterback for the Tigers since Gabe Gross in 1998. In his 13 years as a head coach, Tommy Tuberville had never before started a true freshman at quarterback.

In addition, redshirt freshman running back Mario Fannin is second on the team in rushing, while true freshman safety Mike McNeil has collected 26 tackles.

YOUNG BLOOD

Auburn has a lot of young talent on the squad this season, and to illustrate this point, one need look no further than the scoring column on the statistics sheet. Of Auburn's 203 points scored, 149 (73.4 percent) have been scored by freshmen and sophomores. True freshman Wes Byrum leads the team with 59 points, while redshirt freshman Mario Fannin is second with 30 points and sophomore Ben Tate is tied for third with 24 points. True freshman Kodi Burns and sophomore Gabe McKenzie have two touchdowns each, while sophomores Montez Billings and Antonio Coleman reached the end zone once each.

FRESHMAN KICKERS SHINE

Auburn was forced to replace perhaps the nation's top kicking trio after all three kickers from last season graduated. The Tigers lost Lou Groza finalist John Vaughn, the team's all-time leading scorer with 312 career points; Kody Bliss, who ranked third in the nation in punting with a 45.7-yard average; and Matt Clark, who led the nation last season with 51 touchbacks on 66 kickoffs (77 percent). But the newcomers have excelled in the first five games.

True freshman Wes Byrum has made 12 field goals in 16 attempts, including game winners from 43 yards on the final play at No. 4 Florida Sept. 29 and 20 yards with 21 seconds at Arkansas Oct. 13. He had a season-long 49-yard field goal against South Florida and has had seven touchbacks on kickoffs.

Redshirt freshman Ryan Shoemaker is third in the SEC in punting, averaging 43.7 yards per punt, while true freshman Patrick Tatum has averaged 42.2 yards per punt with

eight of his 15 punts downed inside the 20-yard line. Tatum was named SEC Special Teams Player of the Week against New Mexico State Sept. 22 after placing all four of his punts inside the 20-yard line and running for a first down on a fake punt.

GROVES EQUALS SACKS RECORD

Quentin Groves tied the Auburn record for career sacks with a second-quarter sack last Saturday at LSU. Groves now has 26 career sacks, tying the record set by Gerald Robinson (1982-85). He had two sacks in the opener vs. Kansas State, and the second came with just over a minute left and Auburn clinging to a 16-13 lead, resulting in a fumble that was returned 34 yards for a touchdown by Antonio Coleman, to seal the victory.

GROVES LEADS NCAA IN CAREER SACKS

Senior Quentin Groves is the NCAA's leader among active players in career sacks with 26, despite missing two games this season with an injury. USC's Lawrence Jackson is second nationally with 24 sacks.

FILLING IN ADMIRABLY

Junior linebacker Chris Evans, who leads Auburn with 47 tackles this season, earned his first career start against South Florida Sept. 8. The result was the highest tackles total by an Auburn player in almost five years. Evans tallied 14 tackles (five solo, nine assists), which was the most by an Auburn player since Karlos Dansby had 14 tackles at Florida on Oct. 19, 2002. He posted a team-high eight tackles in the following game against Mississippi State, becoming the first Auburn player since Dansby in 2002 to have at least 22 tackles in two games.

WINNING IN WHITE

Auburn has won its last 15 games when wearing all white following a 9-7 win at Arkansas Oct. 13. Auburn has not lost when wearing white jerseys since the final road game of the 2003 season at Georgia. The Tigers went 5-0 in all white uniforms in 2004, 3-0 in 2005, 4-0 in 2006 and are 3-0 in 2007 including a 20-17 victory at then-No. 4 Florida and a 35-7 home victory over Vanderbilt, when the team wore all white to honor Auburn's 1957 national championship team. Also included in that streak is the 2004 SEC Championship game against Tennessee and a 2007 AT&T Cotton Bowl Classic victory over Nebraska. Auburn also has road wins at Alabama (twice), Ole Miss (twice), Arkansas (twice), Georgia, Tennessee, South Carolina, Kentucky and Mississippi State during that span.

TUBERVILLE HITS THE CENTURY MARK

Tommy Tuberville recorded his 100th career victory as a head coach during Auburn's 35-7 win over Vanderbilt. Tuberville currently owns a career record of 101-52 in 13 seasons as a head coach. He became the fifth active SEC coach to have 100 career victories, joining Steve Spurrier, Phillip Fulmer, Rich Brooks and Houston Nutt, and just the third to earn 100 victories while coaching at an SEC school (Spurrier and Fulmer).

TUBERVILLE IN NINTH SEASON

Tommy Tuberville is in his ninth season at Auburn in 2007 and his 13th as a head coach in the Southeastern Conference. Tuberville has the third-longest tenure in the SEC (second-longest active streak) behind Phillip Fulmer of Tennessee and Steve Spurrier of South Carolina, who are both coaching in their 15th seasons in the league this year.

Tuberville has amassed a record of 76-32 during his tenure at Auburn and has led the Tigers to seven straight bowl appearances.

Tuberville is fourth all-time at Auburn in wins, and is the fifth-longest tenured coach in school history.

13 AND COUNTING

In his 13th year as a head coach, Tommy Tuberville has five assistant coaches who have been with him all 13 years. That group includes: defensive tackles/noseguard coach Don Dunn, running backs/special teams coach Eddie Gran, wide receivers coach Greg Knox, offensive line coach Hugh Nall and defensive ends coach Terry Price.

IMPRESSIVE PERFORMANCES

Auburn defense was impressive in its first two road games, holding two of the SEC's top offenses far below their season averages. Sept. 29 in Gainesville, Auburn held Florida to 17 points, 312 yards of offense and 14 first downs, which

was more than 32 points below their scoring average of 49.2 points per game, more than 200 yards below their average of 517.8, and 11 first downs below their average of 25 per game.

At Arkansas Oct. 13, Auburn held the Razorbacks to just seven points, 193 yards including 67 rushing, and 11 first downs, which was over 35 points below their scoring average of 42.6 points per game, 314 yards below their average of 507.6 (271 yards below their rushing average of 338.4) and 12 first downs below their average of 23.4. Auburn held the nation's top rushing duo of Darren McFadden and Felix Jones to a combined 85 yards, which was 197 yards below their combined averages.

In addition, Auburn held Florida scoreless in the first half, becoming the first team to shut out the Gators in the first half since South Carolina led 3-0 at the break on Nov. 14, 1992 in Gainesville.

TIGERS TOUGH ON TOP TEN

Auburn has won nine of its last 11 games against teams ranked in the *Associated Press* top 10, including a 20-17 win Sept. 29 against No. 4 Florida, and wins last season against then-No. 2 Florida and then-No. 6 LSU. The Tigers have won five of their last six against top-ten teams and six straight at home. The only losses against top-10 teams since the 2004 season have come at LSU, in overtime in 2005 by a 20-17 score and this season by a 30-24 score when LSU scored on a 22-yard pass play with just one second left.

Also in 2005, Auburn posted victories at No. 9 Georgia (31-30) and against No. 8 Alabama (28-18). In 2004, Auburn defeated No. 5 LSU (10-9), No. 10 Tennessee (34-10), No. 8 Georgia (24-6) and No. 9 Virginia Tech (16-13) in the NOKIA Sugar Bowl.

During the Tommy Tuberville era, Auburn is 15-11 in games played against top 10 teams, and has won 15 of its last 21 games dating back to a 23-20 upset of No. 1-ranked Florida Oct. 13, 2001.

Dating back to the 2002 season, Auburn has played 20 games against top 10 teams.

2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

TOPPLING THE TOP TEN

Auburn's 20-17 victory at No. 4 Florida Sept. 29 allowed the Tigers to keep an impressive streak alive, as the Tigers have now beaten at least one *Associated Press* Top 10 team every year for the last seven years, which is the longest streak in school history. The Tigers have 14 victories over Top 10 foes in those seven seasons.

The streak started in 2001 with a 23-20 victory over No. 1 Florida. In 2002, Auburn beat No. 10 LSU (31-7) and won at No. 9 Alabama (17-7). In 2003, the Tigers beat No. 7 Tennessee (28-21), then beat the new No. 7 team, Arkansas, the following week (10-3).

In 2004, Auburn defeated No. 5 LSU (10-9), No. 10 Tennessee (34-10), No. 8 Georgia (24-6) and No. 9 Virginia Tech (16-13). The 2005 season included wins against No. 9 Georgia (31-30) and No. 8 Alabama (28-18), and in 2006 Auburn beat No. 6 LSU (7-3) and No. 2 Florida (27-17).

NO SHUTOUTS ALLOWED

Auburn has scored in 58 consecutive games, which is tied for the second-longest streak in school history. The Tigers have not been shut out since a 23-0 loss to USC to open the 2003 season. It will be a while before Auburn could challenge the school record. The Tigers scored in 149 straight games from Oct. 4, 1980 through Nov. 14, 1992.

UNPRECEDENTED VICTORY

Auburn achieved a new school first with its 20-17 victory at No. 4 Florida Sept. 29. It marked the first time in school history that an unranked Auburn team won a road game against a team ranked in the *Associated Press* Top 5. The Tigers had been 0-8 in those games prior to the victory over the Gators.

Including neutral site games, it was Auburn's first win as an unranked team over an AP Top 5 team away from Auburn since defeating No. 4 Tennessee, 10-6, in Birmingham, in 1972.

Including neutral site games and road games, prior to Saturday's win, Auburn was 2-21 all-time when unranked and playing an AP Top 5 team.

IN A RUSH

Auburn's rushing accomplishments during a victory over New Mexico State Sept. 22 echoed those from a 2005 victory over Kentucky. Both Ben Tate (111 yards) and Mario Fannin (103 yards) went over the century mark against the Aggies, marking the first time since that game at Kentucky that Auburn had two 100-yard rushers in the same game. In the game at Lexington, Tristan Davis rushed for 162 yards and Kenny Irons had 103.

In addition, Fannin rushed for three touchdowns, becoming the first Auburn back since Irons in that same game at Kentucky to rush for three scores in one game. Fannin had a 67-yard touchdown run late in the game, which was the longest play from scrimmage for Auburn since

Davis raced 75 yards for a score in that same game at Kentucky.

SENIOR SIGNAL CALLER = SUCCESS

With senior Brandon Cox back for his third season as Auburn's starting quarterback, history would suggest that the Tigers would have a successful season. The last 10 seasons that Auburn has had a senior returning as the starter at quarterback, the Tigers have won at least eight games every year, averaging 9.7 wins per season during those campaigns. Auburn's combined record during those 10 seasons is 97-22-2, and the Tigers won SEC Championships in 1983, 1987, 1989 and 2004 and SEC Western Division Championships in 1997 and 2000.

Incidentally, Auburn went 10-0 against Georgia during those 10 seasons, and 8-2 against Alabama with seven straight wins.

ELDER STATESMAN

Senior quarterback Brandon Cox is not only the oldest player on the Auburn team, he's older than 18 quarterbacks currently on NFL rosters. Cox, who will turn 24 on Oct. 31, is nearly two full years older than the No. 1 pick in last year's NFL draft, JaMarcus Russell, who was born Aug. 9, 1985. Cox is the fourth-oldest starting quarterback in the Football Bowl Subdivision, being younger than only Ben Olsen of UCLA (2/23/83 DOB), Colt Brennan of Hawaii (8/16/83) and Adam Tafralis of San Jose State (8/30/83).

50-YEAR ANNIVERSARY

Auburn honored its 1957 national championship team during last Saturday's game against Vanderbilt. The team wore their white road uniforms and helmets with no AU logos and gray facemasks, similar to those worn during the 1957 championship season.

The 2007 season marks the 50-year anniversary of Auburn's 1957 National Championship team. The '57 Tigers finished with a perfect 10-0 record, including a 7-0 mark in the SEC, and was selected as the national champion following the season by the *Associated Press*. Auburn outscored its opponents that season by a combined score of 207-28, posting six shutouts and ending the season with a 40-0 whitewashing of Alabama.

2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

THE SENIOR CLASS

Head Coach Tommy Tuberville has a senior class that includes 17 players this season. The Tigers' group of 17 seniors is the third most during the Tuberville era, falling behind the group of 21 from last season and the 2004 group that had 18. During Tuberville's tenure, Auburn's other senior classes have consisted of: 15 in 2005, 13 in 2003, 15 in 2002, 10 in 2001, 14 in 2000 and 14 in 1999.

The 2007 seniors include: TE Cole Bennett, SS Eric Brock, QB Brandon Cox, OT King Dunlap, DT Tez Doolittle, DB Zach Gilbert, DE Quentin Groves, DE Brandon Haley, OL Leon Hart, DB Josh Hebert, CB Patrick Lee, H Matthew Motley, RB Danny Perry, WR Prechae Rodriguez, RB Carl Stewart, DT Josh Thompson and CB Jonathan Wilhite.

IRON MEN

Of Auburn's 17 seniors, 10 have seen time in more than 35 games during their careers, including eight with at least 40 games played. Cole Bennett and Eric Brock lead the group with 47 career games played, followed by Quentin Groves (46), while King Dunlap, Josh Thompson and Patrick Lee have seen action in 44 games. Zach Gilbert is next with 43 games played, followed by Carl Stewart (42), Brandon Cox (39) and Leon Hart (38).

STARTS STREAK

Brandon Cox had a streak of 24 consecutive starts at quarterback snapped Sept. 22 against New Mexico State. He had started every game since a 2005 contest against Western Kentucky.

The longest active starting streaks now for Auburn belong to three players who started all 13 games last year and the first eight games this season. Senior Josh Thompson, junior Rodgeriquis Smith and sophomore Sen'Derrick Marks all have started the last 21 games.

SENIORS GO FOR NEW MARK

Each of Auburn's last two senior classes have established new school records for victories in a four-year period, and this year's class has a chance to extend that streak. The 2005 senior class tied the old mark of 39 wins in four years, before last year's class finished with a new record of 41 victories in the last four years. With 33 of those wins coming in the last three seasons, this year's class needs eight wins to tie that record and nine to become the winningest senior class in Auburn history.

WINNING THE CLOSE ONES

Auburn has had a knack for winning close ball games since Tommy Tuberville arrived as the Tigers' head coach. In his nine seasons at the helm, Auburn is 26-13 in games decided by seven points or less and has won 14 of its last 19, including all five games last season.

FATHERS AND SONS

Senior fullback Danny Perry is the son of Director of Football Operations Jimmy Perry. The younger Perry is the first Tiger to have his father on the football staff since Joe Whitt, Jr., played wide receiver from 1998-99 while Joe Whitt, Sr., who coached at Auburn from 1981-2005, was a linebackers coach.

Previously, Gene Lorendo, an assistant coach from 1951-75, saw his son, Mac, letter at offensive tackle from 1970-72, earning All-SEC honors as a senior, and Paul Davis, an assistant coach from 1967-80 and 1987-90, watched his son, Rhett, letter at split end from 1972-73.

In addition, Auburn freshman linebacker Adam Herring is the son of Arkansas defensive coordinator Reggie Herring.

TIGER GRADS

Auburn begins the season with 10 graduates on the roster, which is the third most of any Football Bowl Subdivision team.

The Tiger graduates include: TE Cole Bennett (business administration), SS Eric Brock (public administration), QB Brandon Cox (business administration), DT Tez Doolittle (criminology), DB Zach Gilbert (public administration), DE Quentin Groves (criminology), CB Patrick Lee (criminology), H Matthew Motley (exercise science), RB Carl Stewart (political science) and NG Josh Thompson (physical education).

TIGERS GO HIGH DEFINITION

The most notable change to Jordan-Hare Stadium for the 2007 season is a new high definition video board above the south end zone. The \$2.9 million board is the first true HD video display in the SEC and makes Auburn just the second NCAA member institution to invest in true high definition LED video capabilities. The display measure approximately 30 feet high by 74 feet wide, and exceeds 2,200 square feet. It has the capability to show a single, wide screen image, and can also be split into multiple windows to show lineups, game statistics, out-of-town game information and much more.

TIGER PROS

Auburn has demonstrated a proficiency for placing players in the National Football League. As of Aug. 21, 38 former Auburn Tigers were listed on NFL rosters. The Seattle Seahawks have the most former Tigers, with five former Auburn players on the roster, while the Washington Redskins and Atlanta Falcons have four each.

WHEN SCORING 20+ POINTS

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 65-6 when scoring 20 or more points in a game, including a 63-5 mark in the regular season. Dating back to 1995, Auburn is 86-13 when scoring 20 or more points in a game.

30+ POINTS EQUALS VICTORY

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 42-0 when scoring 30 or more points in a game. Auburn has won 47 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points.

The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49, four overtime loss to Georgia in 1996.

In the last 22 years, Auburn is 116-2 when scoring 30 points.

TIGERS ON CSS

Comcast/Charter Sports Southeast (CSS) will broadcast encore presentations of Auburn football every Sunday at 6 p.m. ET/5 p.m. CT with Andy Burcham handling play-by-play duties and Cole Cubelic doing color commentary. CSS will also air the Auburn Football Review every Tuesday at 5 p.m. ET/4 p.m. CT and the Auburn Football Preview every Friday at 4:30 p.m. ET/3:30 p.m. CT.

CSS is a 24-hour regional sports network serving approximately 5.8 million households across 12 Southeastern states.

Quarterback Brandon Cox completed 21-of-34 passes for a season-high 253 yards and a touchdown as No. 7 Auburn won its seventh-straight game in Oxford, 23-17, over Ole Miss.

Cox found Rodgeriquis Smith on a 13-yard touchdown in the first quarter and completed eight passes to Courtney Taylor, who finished with a season-high 108 yards. Taylor was just three yards off tying his career high of 111 set in the 2004 SEC Championship Game against Tennessee.

John Vaughn connected on three field goals, including a 20-yarder with 7:35 to play in the game, which broke a 17-17 deadlock and proved to be the game winner. Tristan Davis had returned an Ole Miss kickoff 45 yards to the Tigers' 45 to help set up Vaughn's field goal.

The field goal also marked the 46th of Vaughn's career, which set a new Auburn career record. The Brentwood, Tenn., native iced the game with 35 seconds to play, connecting on a 29-yard field goal, giving Auburn its final 23-17 lead.

The Auburn defense shut down Ole Miss in the second half, allowing the Rebels just 117 total yards on their last seven possessions of the game after giving up 158 yards in the first three possessions. Aairon Savage teamed with Eric Brock to intercept passes on consecutive Ole Miss series in the third quarter. Brock picked off Brent Schaeffer first, getting the ball at Ole Miss' 29 and setting up a Brad Lester 6-yard touchdown.

Savage was next, intercepting the ball off at the Rebels' 33, setting up Vaughn's first field goal of the game.

Kenny Irons had his third 100-yard rushing game of 2006, averaging 4.6 yards per carry. He finished with 106 yards rushing, including 65 in the second half.

Ole Miss opened the game's scoring less than three minutes in when Mico McSwain ran for a 27-yard touchdown. Cox and Smith, however, evened it up less than eight minutes later, capping a 15-play drive that lasted 7:46 and accumulated 69 yards. The touchdown tied the game at 7, where it stood until the third quarter.

Ole Miss briefly took the lead again on a Joshua Shene 29-yard field goal at the 10:26 mark of the third quarter. That was the last time Auburn trailed, with Lester punching one into the end zone on a 6-yard run at the 5:50 mark, giving the Tigers a 14-10 lead.

Vaughn extended that lead with less than a minute left in the third quarter, splitting the uprights for a 31-yard field goal.

Lawrence Lilly evened the score at 17 on a 3-yard touchdown reception from Schaeffer three minutes into the fourth quarter. Vaughn,

though, was solid from that point on, scoring the game's final six points.

Josh Thompson and Savage both had six tackles to pace the Tiger defense, which limited the Rebels to just 86 yards rushing and 170 yards passing.

Has directed Auburn to 76 overall wins, good for fourth in school history. Auburn has won 70 percent of its games under Tuberville, ranking him eighth in school history.

Directed Auburn to a 45-16 mark in the league since 2000, which is tied for the best mark in the Southeastern Conference.

Won 100th career game on Oct. 6, 2007 in 35-7 win over Vanderbilt.

Has won 25 of last 30 SEC games and 26 of last 31 against SEC opponents.

Led last six teams to bowl games, including New Year's Day bowl in three of the last four years.

Led Auburn to its best season ever in 2004 as the Tigers won a school-record 13 games and captured the Southeastern Conference and NOKIA Sugar Bowl titles.

Named the 2004 AFCA, Associated Press, Paul "Bear" Bryant, Walter Camp and SEC Coach of the Year. Was also named the 1997 Associated Press SEC Coach of the Year.

Guided Auburn to the 2004 Southeastern Conference Championship. Tuberville has led Auburn to at least a share of the Western Division title in five of his seven seasons.

Directed Auburn to 15 wins over AP Top 10 teams since the start of the 2002 season.

Led Auburn to 45 wins in last 57 games (79 percent) and 40 of the last 48 (83 percent), which included 15 straight from 2003-04.

Auburn's 15-game win streak from 2003-04 marked Tuberville's longest winning streak as a head coach.

Directed the Tigers to seven SEC road wins of 20-plus points in the previous four years, including three in 2004.

In 21 previous years coaching at the Division I level, has been part of 19 winning seasons, including three national championships.

Led AU to at least one victory against an AP top 10 team in a school-record seven consecutive seasons.

Coached 57 players that have been drafted in the NFL, including 28 at Auburn.

Coached 14 first-round NFL Draft picks, including the 1991 first overall pick, Russell Maryland, and four 2004 first-round draft picks (Ronnie Brown, Carnell Williams, Carlos Rogers and Jason Campbell).

Eight former players have played in the NFL Pro Bowl, including Jessie Armstead, Jerome Brown, Rudi Johnson, Ray Lewis, Russell Maryland, Marcus McNeill, Warren Sapp and Marcus Washington.

Is 17-5 in his career in games decided by three points or less.

Auburn is 9-2 in its last 11 games against top 10 opponents in the AP poll.

Won a school-record eight straight SEC road games from 2005-07, and currently has won 14 of its last 16 games against SEC opponents outside of Auburn with both losses coming at LSU.

Has won 71 of last 76 regular-season games when scoring 20 points or more.

Finished in AP top 10 in two of the last three years and only team in country to defeat 2006 National Champion Florida and only coach to defeat two teams in final top five in country (No. 1 Florida, No. 3 LSU).

First AU coach to win five straight over Alabama since Ralph "Shug" Jordan from 1954-58.

Only coach ever to win four consecutive games at Bryant-Denny Stadium in Tuscaloosa.

No. 18 Auburn scored two touchdowns a mere 50 seconds apart in the final 2:01 to come back for a stunning 23-13 season-opening victory over Kansas State before a Jordan-Hare Stadium crowd of 86,439, the most ever to see the Wildcats play.

Trailing 13-9 with 2:01 remaining, Brandon Cox connected on the Tigers first touchdown of the game, a 3-yard pass to tight end Gabe McKenzie, to give Auburn a 16-13 lead. Fifty seconds later, defensive end Quentin Groves sacked K-State quarterback Josh Freeman and forced a fumble that was scooped up by end Antonio Coleman and returned 34 yards for his first career touchdown to seal the victory.

Groves finished the game with two sacks to mark his 25th career sack and move within one sack of the Auburn career record held by Gerald Robinson (1982-85).

The Wildcats took the opening kickoff and drove 61 yards to the Auburn 2 before settling for a Brooks Rossman 20-yard field goal to give Kansas State a 3-0 lead.

A 55-yard Cox-to- Rodgeriqu Smith pass to the K-State 18 set up the first of freshman Wes Byrum's three field goals, a 20-yarder with 14:07 to go in the half, to tie the game at 3. Byrum closed out the first half scoring with a 39-yard field goal with 6:22 to give Auburn its first lead at 6-3.

After allowing Kansas State 91 yards offense in its first two drives, the Tigers defense allowed the Wildcats just 34 yards over their final five drives of the first half.

With Auburn starting the second half on their own 46 after a K-State face mask penalty on the second half kickoff return, Cox threw an interception on the first play at the Wildcat 31. Kansas State then used a 6-play, 69-yard drive that was capped off by a trick play in which wide receiver Jordy Nelson threw a 21-touchdown pass to tailback Leon Patton for a 10-6 lead less than two minutes into the third quarter.

K-State lengthened its lead to 13-6 on a Rossman 40-yard field goal with 7:31 left in the third. Byrum brought Auburn to within 13-9 with a 31-yard field goal with 1:46 left in the third.

After missing four field goal attempts in the second half, South Florida made sure its fate was left in the hands of Grothe.

Auburn gained just 2 yards in its overtime possession before Byrum took the field for his third field goal of the game and sixth of the season.

Auburn committed five turnovers, including three inside its own 25-yard line, in the game, but the Bulls did not turn any of those opportunities into points.

South Florida jumped on the board early, scoring 14 points in the first quarter off a 1-yard run by Grothe and a 2-yarder by Mike Ford. Byrum put up Auburn's only points in the first quarter, a career-best 49-yard field goal.

Auburn would regroup in the second quarter, matching the Bulls offensive total from the first period. The Tigers pulled within four early in the second quarter as Mario Fannin ran four yards for the score.

The Tigers took their first lead of the game with 29 seconds remaining in the half when Gabe McKenzie grabbed a 3-yard pass from Cox.

Missed opportunities were the story of the third quarter for South Florida as kicker Delbert Alvarado missed a 21-yarder and three other field goals, including one that was blocked by Sen'Derrick Marks on the final play of the third quarter.

South Florida evened the ledger at 17 with 7:28 left to play in regulation after a 38-yard field goal by Alvarado.

A mere nine yards separated Auburn from victory in its SEC opener versus Mississippi State. The Tigers drove the ball 67 yards and found themselves nine yards from the endzone, but four missed opportunities left the 82,129 Tiger fans stunned as Auburn fell 19-14 to the Bulldogs.

Christian Ducre scored the go-ahead touchdown with 5:15 remaining in the game to put the Bulldogs up 19-14.

It was a game of quarterbacks as Auburn and Mississippi State used a combined five different QB's during the game. Tiger fans got a glimpse of the future as true freshman Kodi Burns saw action early in the game after two quick Brandon Cox interceptions.

Mississippi State got on the board fast even after losing starting quarterback Michael Henig on the first drive. Adam Carlson booted a 32-yarder to put the Bulldogs up 3-0.

Derek Pegues intercepted Cox's first pass and returned it 20 yards for a touchdown less than a minute later, giving MSU an early 10-0 lead.

After Anthony Johnson intercepted Cox's second pass on Auburn's next offensive drive, Burns would take over the reins for the majority of the game.

The Bulldogs extended their lead to 13-0 on an Adam Carlson 30-yard field goal early in the second quarter.

Auburn responded at the 4:18 mark in the second quarter as Ben Tate put the Tigers on the board with a 28-yard touchdown run, marking the first TD run of the season for AU.

Burns' running game was effective as he put the Tigers up 14-13 on a one-yard sneak to the endzone.

The teams traded punts for most of the second half. Mississippi State's running game dominated, featured by Anthony Dixon and Ducre who combined for 44 yards on the 10-play scoring drive in the fourth quarter. Dixon finished the game with 103 yards on 29 carries, while Ducre had 63 yards on 10 carries.

Cox returned to the game in the fourth quarter and drove the Tigers 67 yards, most of which came on passes of 12 and 23 yards to Rodgeriqu Smith and a 17-yard run by Tate.

On fourth down with 53 seconds to play, Cox's pass fell short of Smith in the end zone giving Mississippi State earned its first win over Auburn since 2000.

Burns threw for 65 yards, while racking up 87 yards on the ground and a touchdown. Cox completed 4-of-10 passes for 42 yards.

The Auburn defense allowed the Bulldogs' trio of quarterbacks only 41 total yards in the air.

Auburn out gained the Bulldogs 323 to 213, but five costly turnovers thwarted the Tigers offensive efforts.

The Tigers tallied a season-best 216 yards on the run, marking the most in an SEC game since rushing for 227 at Georgia in 2005.

Auburn created six turnovers and Brandon Cox led the Tigers to 41 consecutive points to finish off New Mexico State 55-20 in front of a rowdy 83,012 fans at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Coming off the bench after 24 starts at quarterback, Cox passed for 135 yards (13-of-19) and a touchdown and rushed for another to help even Auburn's record at 2-2 on the season.

Defense put Auburn on the board in the first quarter when Zac Etheridge caused a fumble by the Aggies' A.J. Harris and Pat Sims recovered and returned it 21 yards for a score at the 7:33 mark.

The Aggies retaliated when Chase Holbrook drove 80 yards on 10 plays, including a 44-yard completion over the middle to Nick Cleaver. Holbrook turned in the Aggies' first score on a 1-yard sneak with 3:51 remaining in the opening quarter.

The Tigers didn't waste any time as Kodi Burns, who became the first freshman quarterback to start for Auburn since 1998, connected with Rodgeriqu Smith on a 58-yard touchdown pass. New Mexico State knotted the score at 14 on a 5-yard pass from Holbrook to Brandon Allen in the second quarter.

Two plays later, the Aggies took the lead for the first and final time of the night when Holbrook hit Chris Williams with a 25-yard pass. Holbrook finished the first half connecting on 20-of-23 pass attempts for 207 yards and two touchdowns.

On the next possession, Cox led a 9-play, 62-yard drive that was capped off by a 1-yard touchdown run by Mario Fannin, giving Auburn a lead that it would not relinquish.

Auburn took over in the second half. Jonathan Wilhite intercepted his first of two passes on New Mexico State's first series, which led to an 18-yard touchdown pass from Cox to Smith. A minute later, Sen'Derrick Marks intercepted a Holbrook pass with the help of Josh Thompson and returned it to the 2. Cox came in and finished the deal from a yard out to put the Tigers up 35-20.

New Mexico State would have its hopes of adding a score dashed late in the third quarter when Wilhite snagged his second interception that led to a Ben Tate 2-yard score to open the fourth quarter.

Holbrook ended the game completing 29-of-40 pass attempts for 254 yards, but was intercepted three times.

Freshman Wes Byrum kicked the game-winning 43-yard field goal as time expired to lift Auburn to a 20-17 victory over No. 4 Florida in front of 90,685 stunned fans at Ben Hill Griffin Stadium. Byrum actually made the final field goal twice, but his first attempt was nullified by a timeout called just before the snap.

The Tigers snapped the defending national champion's 11-game winning streak and gave Florida coach Urban Meyer his first home loss since he took over the program in 2005. Auburn was the last team to defeat the Gators as the Tigers won 27-17 last season in Auburn.

With 3:38 remaining, the Tigers used up as much time as possible on the game clock as Brandon Cox led a 10-play, 35-yard game-winning drive that included Ben Tate running for 19 yards and Rodgericus Smith and Prechae Rodriguez combining for 16 yards through the air.

Cox finished the game completing 17-of-26 passes for 227 yards.

The Auburn defense was the difference maker, as it held Florida to just 17 points, 312 yards of offense and 14 first downs. Entering the contest, Florida was averaging 49.2 points, 517.8 yards and 25 first downs per game.

In addition, Auburn shut out Florida in the first half, becoming the first team to hold Florida scoreless during the opening half since South Carolina on Nov. 14, 1992. The Tiger defense allowed just one play over 25 yards and held Florida without a first down on five of 10 offensive possessions.

The Tigers got on the board on their first possession as Cox took Auburn on its longest drive of the year. With the help of Tate and Mario Fannin's 42 yards on the ground and 35 yards in the air by Smith and Montez Billings, Kodi Burns was able to come in at quarterback and dart up the middle for a six-yard touchdown to cap the 14-play, 86-yard drive that consumed 7:32.

Auburn totaled 113 yards and eight first downs in the first quarter. Cox hit all five of his passes on Auburn's first drive that ended with Burns' score.

In the second quarter, Cox completed a 7-yard pass to Gabe McKenzie, a 22-yard pass to Carl Stewart and a 25-yarder to Montez Bilings to set up a fourth-and-1 on the Florida 4 that the Tigers converted. On the next play, Tate ran for three yards and gave Auburn a 14-0 lead with 6:21 remaining in the half.

Florida opened the third quarter with Tim Tebow connecting on a 52-yard pass to Percy Harvin that put the Gators on the Auburn 3. Auburn's defense stepped up and the Gators settled for a 23-yard Joey Iijas field goal.

After a Patrick Lee interception, Byrum put Auburn up by two touchdowns as he connected on a 30-yard field goal.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Tebow threw a 6-yard pass to

Scoring on its first three possessions en route to a 35-7 victory over Vanderbilt, head coach Tommy Tuberville earned his 100th career victory in front of 82,657 fans at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

On the opening drive, the Tigers marched 80 yards on nine plays and finished with a 4-yard touchdown by Ben Tate. The Commodores had to settle for three-and-out on their second drive, giving the Tigers the ball back less than a minute after the score.

Auburn responded with a 74-yard, seven-play drive that ended with Brandon Cox connecting with Rodgericus Smith in the end zone, putting the Tigers up 14-0 with 3:07 remaining in the first quarter. Cox finished the quarter 7-of-7 for 58 yards and a TD.

The Tigers opened the second quarter with the ball on the Vanderbilt 43. It only took two plays for Auburn to score again as Mario Fannin ran for 21 yards and a 22-yard touchdown on back-to-back carries.

Less than five minutes later, Brad Lester, who returned to the lineup for the first time this season, rushed over the Vanderbilt defense for a 17-yard score. The Tigers ended the half up 28-0 and outgained Vanderbilt 324-66 in the half. Auburn's defense allowed the Commodores just five first downs in the half.

Patrick Lee intercepted a tipped pass early in the third quarter and returned it to the Vanderbilt 10-yard line. Two plays later, Lester leaped across the goal line from 5 yards out, making it 35-0.

Cox completed 14 of 17 passes for 165 yards with a touchdown and an interception in three quarters. Kodi Burns took over the reins in the fourth quarter.

Playing against Auburn's reserve defenders, Vanderbilt took up half of the fourth quarter on a 15-play scoring drive that ended with Cassen Jackson-Garrison's 1-yard touchdown run. It was the only score by either team in the fourth quarter.

The Tiger trio of tailbacks finished the game with 227 yards on the ground and three touchdowns. Tate led the charge with 96 yards and a score, while Lester had 77 yards and two TDs. Fannin finished with 54 yards and a TD on the ground and 26 yards on three catches in the air.

The Commodores used three quarterbacks during the game. Starter Chris Nickson finished the first half completing just five of 16 passes for 38 yards and was replaced by backup Mackenzi Adams. Brandon Cox marched Auburn 50 yards in a minute and 15 seconds and handed over the reigns to Wes Byrum in what seemed a *deja vu* moment for the Tigers. Byrum booted a 20-yard field goal with 21 seconds remaining to give Auburn a 9-7 win in front of a stunned 72,463 Arkansas fans in Razorback Stadium.

Two weeks ago Byrum drilled a 43-yard field goal as time expired to beat then-No. 4 Florida, 20-17, in Gainesville.

Auburn improved to 5-2 overall and 3-1 in the SEC, including a first-place tie in the SEC Western Division with LSU and Alabama.

Defense was the story of the game as the Tigers held the nation's best running duo - Darren McFadden and Felix Jones - to a mere 85 yards on the ground. It was their lowest combined total since Nov. 25, 2005.

Arkansas' running game averaged 338 yards per game entering the contest, but finished with a net of 67. McFadden brought with him the nation's third-ranked rushing game, averaging 155.8 yards, but was held to 43 total yards on 17 carries against the AU defense.

The Razorbacks were No. 10 in the nation in scoring at 42.6 points a game, but the Tigers limited Arkansas to seven points, which were not scored until 1:36 left in the fourth quarter.

After trailing most of the game, the Razorbacks were given new life when Byrum missed a 46-yard field goal with 4:19 left, keeping the score 6-0. A pass interference call against Auburn started the drive, and after 15-yard pass from Robert Johnson to Peyton Hills and a 17-yard run from Jones, Arkansas took the lead 7-6 when Casey Dick hit Lucas Miller with a 13-yarder in the end zone.

Brad Lester returned the ensuing kick 22 yards to the Auburn 47 and Cox came in and took over. He hit Rodgeriqu Smith for eight yards and Montez Billings for three before connecting with Robert Dunn for a 30-yard gain, the longest play of the game for either team. Ben Tate ran three straight times and set up Byrum for the game-winning kick.

Arkansas took possession after the Byrum kick and had 21 seconds to win the game, but Jerraud Powers ended any hope for the Razorbacks when he intercepted a Dick pass as the game clock expired.

For the third straight game, Auburn scored on its opening drive. The Tigers moved 67 yards on 14 plays and settled for a 22-yard Byrum field goal. Arkansas' best chance of scoring in the first half ended quickly when Alex Tejada missed a 41-yard field goal attempt with 10:51 left in the second quarter.

Auburn had two other scoring opportunities in the second half, but Byrum missed on a 36-yard field goal attempt on the last play of the third quarter and on the 46-yarder with 4:19 left in regulation.

Auburn finished with 290 total yards and held Arkansas to 193. Tate and Lester combined for 180 yards on the ground.

Cox was 13-for-23 and tallied 101 yards. Dick was 12-for-26 for 111 yards and an interception.

It was Auburn's eighth straight win on the road and 14th out of the last 15 against SEC opponents, dating back to the start of the 2004 season.

With one second remaining in the game, LSU's Matt Flynn tossed a 22-yard touchdown pass to Demetrius Byrd in the back of the endzone, lifting fifth-ranked LSU to a 30-24 victory over No. 18 Auburn in front of 92,630 fans in Tiger Stadium.

Just minutes earlier it looked as if Brandon Cox had done it again as he led Auburn on an 83-yard touchdown drive that ended on a 3-yard pass to Rodgeriqu Smith with 3:21 remaining to give Auburn a 24-23 lead.

After a squibbed Auburn kickoff put LSU on its own 42, Flynn scrambled twice for 17 yards, and a 10-yard run by Jacob Hester gave LSU a first down at the Auburn 25. Two plays and three yards later it looked as if a game-winning field goal attempt for Colt David was on the horizon. Instead, LSU opted for game-winning Flynn pass to Byrd.

Hester gave LSU a 20-17 lead, its first of the game, early in the fourth quarter on a 5-yard touchdown catch and run just inside the pylon. Minutes later, LSU pushed its lead to 23-17 after David connected on a 33-yard field goal.

Auburn opened the game with an 11-play, 63-yard drive that ended in a 17-yard touchdown pass from Cox to Montez Billings. It marked the fourth straight game that Auburn has started with a lengthy scoring drive.

LSU tied it seven minutes later when Flynn found Keiland Williams for a 46-yard touchdown reception.

In the second quarter, Auburn forced its first of two game-changing turnovers, when Zac Etheridge caused LSU backup quarterback Ryan Perrilloux to fumble. Jerraud Powers recovered the ball and nearly reached the endzone on a 38-yard run to the 3-yard line.

Auburn's offense entered the game and moments later, Carl Stewart leaped into the endzone for the 1-yard score. After the Wes Byrum extra point, Auburn led 14-7.

Auburn entered halftime with a 17-7 lead after moving 90 yards in 12 plays to set up Byrum for a 22-yard field goal.

LSU inched with seven early in the third quarter after Flynn hit Early Doucet with a 33-yard pass, leading to a David 29-field goal. On its next drive, Flynn found a wide-open Brandon LaFell on the sideline, but LaFell bobbled the ball and it bounced into the hands of Patrick Lee.

Auburn was unable to take advantage of the turnover and a 58-yard pass from Flynn to Byrd positioned David for a 26-yard field goal to make it 17-13 with 2:03 left in the third quarter.

LSU finished with 488 total yards, including 319 through the air.

Auburn managed 296 total yards, 199 of which came in the air.

Flynn completed 22-of-34, finishing with 319 passing yards and three touchdowns. Cox was 18-for-28 for 199 yards and two touchdowns.

Brad Lester led the ground attack with 68 yards on 16 runs. He also caught five passes for 56 yards. Billings caught six passes for 78 yards, while Smith accumulated 56 yards on six catches.

With the win, LSU extended its winning streak in Death Valley to 18.
