SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

Each head coach is allowed one Instant Replay challenge per game, which is exercised by requesting a team timeout. A head coach may issue a challenge only if his team has one or more timeouts remaining in the half. If the challenged ruling is overturned, the timeout is not charged, but the coach has no more challenges during that game.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference, following approval by the NCAA Football Rules Committee, will implement the use of video replay on an experimental basis beginning with the 2005 football season.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - c. Touching of a kick
 - d. Number of players on field
 - e. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - f. Fourth-down/try fumble plays

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

2007 SEC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The SEC's Eastern and Western Division winners will meet in Atlanta's Georgia Dome to battle for the league championship and the right to represent the conference in the Bowl Championship Series. The 16th-annual title game is set for December 1 and will be nationally televised by CBS Sports at 4:00 p.m. ET.

The game is a result of conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Under NCAA regulations, a conference with 12 members may play a 12th football game to determine its champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The participants of the game are determined each year during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the best overall SEC winning percentage in each division.

The 1994 SEC Championship Game earned a 10.5 rating and a 26 share, the highest rated SEC Championship Game in history.

The SEC Championship Game has also drawn capacity crowds in its history. 1,120,836 fans have witnessed first-hand the pageantry of SEC Football at the 15 previous Championship Games.

Attendance at the 15 previous championship games has been 102.3 percent of stadium capacity, including 13 sellouts.

THIS WEEK IN SEC FOOTBALL HISTORY

As the Southeastern Conference celebrates its 75th anniversary, here is a look at some of the highlights during the upcoming game dates in its history:



Oct. 27

1951 -- Vanderbilt hosts #3 Georgia Tech in a rain-soaked contest and takes the Yellow Jackets to the limit before falling, 8-7. Georgia Tech goes on to win a share of the SEC title while the Commodores finish the season 6-5.

Tennessee hosts Tennessee Tech in its first game of the season as the top-ranked team in the nation. The Vols come away with a 68-0 win and a share of the SEC title and a berth in the Sugar Bowl.

1990 -- Auburn's Darrel Crawford blocked Mississippi State's Joel Logan's conversion kick with 2 1/2 minutes to play, preserving No. 2 Auburn's 17-16 win at Mississippi State.

1973 -- Auburn sophomore Mitzi Jackson, recovered from a knee injury that has kept him on the bench for most of the season, ran for 112 yards on 21 carries as the Tigers defeated #12 ranked Houston.

2001 -- Ole Miss goes into Tiger Stadium and comes away with a 35-24 victory. The Tigers would not lose another game the rest of the season and are Western Division and SEC Champions. Ole Miss finishes the season 7-4.

CBS SPORTS - The 2007 season marks the 11th year for CBS as the league's national network television partner. CBS will televise up to 15 games per year throughout the season. CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 1 at 4 p.m. ET.

ESPN/ESPN2, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com (search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

LINCOLN FINANCIAL SPORTS (LFS) (Formerly Jefferson-Pilot Sports) will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send eight of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2007 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection of available SEC teams.

2008 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2007 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2007 regular season, the Allstate BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in New Orleans on Jan. 7 at 8 p.m. EST. The Allstate BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2007 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, and the Orange Bowl on Jan. 3 at 8 p.m. ET.

2007 SEC DIVISIONAL TIE-BREAKER

In the event of a tie for the division championship, the following procedures will be used to break all ties to determine the SEC Football Championship Game representative. All Conference versus Conference Games (both division and non-division) will be counted in the Conference Standings.

TWO-TEAM TIE. In the event two teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order:

- A. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams;
- B. Records of the tied teams within the division;
- C. Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference record, and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall record against non-divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional or non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- G. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game.

THREE-TEAM TIE (OR MORE). If three teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order: (Note: If one of the procedures results in one team being eliminated and two remaining, the two-team tiebreaker procedure as stated in No. 1 above will be used):

- A. Combined head to head record among the tied teams;
- B. Record of the tied teams within the division;
- C. Head to head competition against the team within the division with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall Conference record against non divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through other common non divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- G. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest-ranked tied team. In this case, the head-to-head results of the top two ranked tied teams shall determine the representative in the SEC Championship Game.

1992 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida and Georgia (6-2 in the SEC) were co-champions in the Eastern Division. The Gators won the tie-breaker by virtue of a 26-24 win over the Bulldogs earlier in the season. Alabama (8-0) was the outright Western Division champion, even with a game against Auburn in the final weekend, which the Tide won, 17-0.

1993 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division and Alabama won the Western Division. The Gators finished 1/2 game ahead of Tennessee (UT tied Alabama, 17-17). Alabama, at 5-2-1, finished two games ahead second-place Arkansas. Auburn was 8-0 in the SEC, but was ineligible for the conference title.

1994 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, two games ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with an 8-0 SEC mark, three games ahead of Miss. State.

1995 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 8-0, one game ahead of Tennessee. Arkansas won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, one game ahead of Auburn and Alabama.

1996 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 8-0, one game ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, tying LSU. However, the Tide defeated the Tigers, 26-0, earlier in the year to win the tie-breaker.

1997 - Eastern Division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Tennessee defeated Vanderbilt, 17-10, to win the division on the final weekend. Tennessee, at 7-1 in the SEC, finished one game ahead of Georgia and Florida. Auburn had won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, tying LSU. However, Auburn defeated LSU, 31-28, earlier in the year to win the tie-breaker.

1998 - Western Division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Miss. State defeated Ole Miss, 28-6, on Thanksgiving night, to win the division on the final weekend. Arkansas and Miss. State finished in a tie for the division title. However, Miss. State defeated Arkansas, 22-21, earlier that season to win the tie-breaker. Arkansas defeated LSU 41-14 on the final weekend, but when State defeated Ole Miss, the chase for the Championship Game had been won. Tennessee had clinched the Eastern Division before the final weekend and defeated Vanderbilt, 41-0, to finished the SEC at 8-0.

1999 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, one game ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with a 7-1 SEC mark, one game ahead of Miss. State.

2000 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, two games ahead of South Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee. Auburn won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, one game ahead of LSU. LSU lost to Arkansas in the final weekend, 14-3. Even if the Tigers would have beaten the Razorbacks, Auburn would have won the tie-breaker over LSU due to a 34-17 win earlier in the season.

2001 - Both races go down to the final weekend. Due to game postponements on Sept. 15, games were reschedule for Dec. 1. On that weekend, Tennessee defeated Florida, 34-32, in Gainesville, and LSU defeated Auburn, 27-14, in Baton Rouge, to clinch berths in the SEC Championship Game. The Vols won the East with a 7-1 mark while LSU had a 5-3 mark and tied with Auburn for the West, but won the head-to-head tiebreaker.

2002 - Western division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Georgia clinched the Eastern Division championship on Nov. 16 after defeating Auburn, 24-21, in Auburn. The 7-1 Bulldogs finish one game ahead of Florida, which was 6-2. Arkansas wins the Western Division on the season's final weekend, defeating LSU, 21-20, in Little Rock on Nov. 29. The Razorbacks, LSU Tigers and Auburn Tigers are tied at 5-3 but Arkansas wins the head-to-head tiebreakers.

2003 - Both races decided on final weekend. Tennessee defeats Kentucky, 20-7, to force a three-way tie for the Eastern Division championship between the Vols, Georgia and

Florida. Using a tie-breaker involving the BCS standings, Georgia has the highest BCS ranking and has defeated Tennessee (next highest ranking) during regular season to secure SEC Championship Game berth. LSU defeats Arkansas, 55-24, and Ole Miss beats Mississippi State, 31-0, to force a tie for the Western Division championship. LSU's 17-14 win over Ole Miss the week before earns the Tigers the Western Division berth.

2004 - Auburn clinches berth in the SEC Championship Game on Oct. 30, tying the earliest since the game began in 1992 (Alabama, 1993). The Tigers (8-0) finish two games ahead in the standings of second-place LSU (6-2). Tennessee clinches berth as Eastern Division representative with 38-33 win against Vanderbilt on Nov. 20. The Vols (7-1) would win their next game on the following weekend against Kentucky to claim the division title outright. Georgia was second in the Western Division with a 6-2 mark.

2005 - Georgia (6-2) clinched the Eastern Division Championship with a 45-13 win over Kentucky on Nov. 19. The Bulldogs finish one full game ahead of South Carolina and Florida in the standings. LSU clinched the Western Division title with a 19-17 win over Arkansas on Nov. 25. The Tigers finished tied for the Western Division title (7-1), but defeated Auburn, 20-17, on Oct. 22, to win the tie-breaker.

2006 - Florida (7-1) clinched Eastern Division Championship and berth in the SEC Championship Game on Nov. 4, by defeating Vanderbilt, 25-19. Arkansas clinched the Western Division title and SEC Championship Game berth with a 28-14 win over Mississippi State on Nov. 18.

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME RACE RECAP

The earliest a berth has been clinched in the SEC Championship Game is Oct. 30 (Auburn, 2004, & Alabama, 1993).

In eight of the 30 divisional races prior to 2007, a championship game berth has not been decided until the weekend prior to the SEC Championship Game. That occurred in 1997 (Tennessee), 1998 (Mississippi State), 2001 (Tennessee and LSU), 2002 (Arkansas), 2003 (Georgia and LSU) and 2005 (LSU).

SEC DIVISIONAL STANDINGS HISTORY RECAP

Going into Week 9, 2007 marks the third year since conference expansion that each team has had at least loss inside the conference. It also occurred going into Week 9 in 1997 and 2000.

Going into week 9, 2007 also marks the second time since conference expansion where every team in one division has at least two conference losses (2007 - Eastern Division; 2000 - Western Division).

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last five years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 171 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 79 named to the first-team.
- During the last eleven years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award. In 2006, Alabama track & field athlete Beth Mallory was named a recipient of this award.
- Florida's Chris Leak was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last five years, the SEC has had 11 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2007-08 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama baseball player Emeel Salem and Vanderbilt track & field athlete Erika Schneble were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2006-07.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. Tennessee swimmer Brad Boswell and Florida softball player Stacey Stevens were named recipients of this award in 2006-07.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had four sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Courtney Kupets of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics, Georgia's Kara Lynn Joyce won in Swimming & Diving and Tennessee's Monica Abbott was the top athlete in softball.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 66 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- Since 1990, the SEC has won 118 team and 805 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.8 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (268 of 349). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won more team national championships than any other conference in the nation. The SEC won 50 team titles since 2000, while the Pac-10 won 45 and the Big 12 won 21. The SEC won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, also the most of any conference.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES



ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

Quarterback John Parker Wilson threw for 363 yards and three touchdowns as the Alabama Crimson Tide defeated the Tennessee Volunteers 41-17 at Bryant-Denny Stadium. Wide Receiver DJ Hall set an Alabama single-game record for catches as he caught 13 passes for 185 yards and had two touchdowns in the Tide victory. Hall's receiving yards ranked as the third-most receiving yards in a game in Alabama history behind David Palmer (217 in 1993) and David Bailey (187 in 1969). Hall moved into second on the career TD receptions chart with 16 and is tied with Ozzie Newsome (1974-77). Wilson completed 32 of 46 passes without an interception and his number of completions tied the Alabama single-game record set in 1989 by Gary Hollingsworth. He also set new single-game career highs for completions and yards and has improved to 12-9 as the starting quarterback. Redshirt freshman running back Terry Grant set the freshman rushing yards and attempts record as he recorded 104 yards and a touchdown on 26 attempts. Through eight games, he leads Alabama with 127 rushing attempts, 697 yards and seven touchdowns. Kicker Leigh Tiffin set a single-game career high four field goals.

FLORIDA GATORS



Florida quarterback Tim Tebow posted five touchdowns, including a career high four passing, and one rushing, as he guided the Florida Gators to a 45-37 victory over the Kentucky Wildcats Saturday in Lexington. With the win, the Gators keep their SEC Title hopes alive and are now in a three-way tie for first in the East with Georgia and South Carolina. This also marks the Gators' 21st consecutive win over the Wildcats. Tebow accounted for 254 passing yards on 16 completions, in addition to 78 yards rushing, for a total of 334 offense yards. Florida took the lead in the first quarter when Tebow registered his longest completion of his career, a 66-yard pass to Louis Murphy as the Gators took a 14-7 lead. The reception was also Murphy's longest of his career. Murphy led the Gators in reception yards with 91 on four catches. Andre Caldwell led in catches with six for 73 yards and also had a touchdown. Joe Haden led the defense in tackles with 13 (10 solo, 3 assists), while Jermaine Cunningham recorded 2.5 sacks.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS



Arkansas recorded their first SEC win of the season as they defeated the Ole Miss Rebels 44-8 at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium. Quarterback Casey Dick recorded a career-high tying three touchdowns on 11-of-17 passes. He threw for 96 yards and had one interception. The Razorbacks scored in every quarter, including 14 points in the first and 16 in the fourth. Darren McFadden and Felix Jones both rushed for 100 yards for the fifth time in seven games this season, and the ninth time in their careers. McFadden led the Razorbacks in rushing with 110 yards on 22 carries, while Jones had 101 yards on 15 carries. Arkansas picked off four interceptions, the most since they nabbed five from Louisiana-Monroe in 2006. Peyton Hillis led the team in receptions with four for 60 yards and one touchdown. Andrew Davie registered two catches for 15 yards and two touchdowns. They marked his second and third touchdowns of the season. Jamar Love recorded his first career sack in the first quarter and added another in the third. Sophomore quarterback Nathan Emert saw action in the fourth quarter and connected with Chris Baker for his first career touchdown pass, a 48-yard completion.

GEORGIA BULLDOGS



The Georgia Bulldogs had a bye last week and will return to action this Saturday when they play the Florida Gators in Jacksonville, Fla. This will mark the 85th annual Florida vs. Georgia Football Classic. It will be the 75th time the game has been played in Jacksonville. The Gators have won the last 15 of 17 meetings and Georgia is 1-5 against Florida under Coach Mark Richt. The Bulldogs defeated Vanderbilt 20-17 in their last outing and are currently tied with Florida and South Carolina for first in the SEC East. In total offense the Bulldogs are seventh (362.7) and fourth in defense (319.6) in the SEC. The Bulldogs rank seventh (28.1) in scoring offense, fifth (19.7) in scoring defense and first in punting (38.3) in the league. Georgia is third in the league in red-zone touchdown rankings with 70.83 percent (17/24) only behind Florida, 76.32 (29/38) and Kentucky, 72.50 (29/40) respectively. Senior tailback Gregg Lumpkin is out for the remainder of the regular season after undergoing an arthroscopic procedure to treat a torn lateral meniscus and a sprained posterior lateral complex in his left knee last week. Gregg injured his knee in the Vanderbilt game and could possibly return in a bowl game.

AUBURN TIGERS



As the clock ticked down to the final second of the game, LSU's Matt Flynn connected with Demetrius Byrd for a 22-yard pass in the endzone to hand Auburn the heartbreaking 30-24 loss. Auburn now trails the series 21-20-1 with LSU and the last four Auburn-LSU games have been decided by a total of 14 points. Auburn is now 4-1 under Tommy Tuberville in games against teams ranked in the top five of the AP poll. Auburn is now 2-1 in road games this season and had its school record eight consecutive road game win streak broken dating back to Auburn's last appearance in Tiger Stadium in 2005. Individually, Quentin Groves tied the Auburn record for career sacks with 26 as he recorded one in the second quarter. Brandon Cox went 18-for-28 for 199 yards and two touchdowns. His performance moved him past Dameyune Craig into fourth in Auburn history in career passing yardage. He also is tied for fourth with Craig for career touchdown passes with 39 and is one behind Stan White for a tie for third. Montez Billings recorded his first career touchdown with a 17-yard reception on Auburn's opening drive. Billings led the game with a career-high 78 yards on six catches.

KENTUCKY WILDCATS



Kentucky suffered its second loss of the season as they fell in a 45-37 shootout to the Florida Gators Saturday. Before a crowd of 71,024, the largest ever in the history of Commonwealth Stadium, Andre Woodson recorded a season high 415 yards and tied his career high of five touchdowns. Woodson finished 35-of-50 and had more than 200 yards passing for the 14th consecutive game. Both Woodson's 35 completions and 50 attempts set career highs. For the first time this season, UK had two receivers record more than 100-yards as Steve Johnson posted 128 yards on eight catches, a career best, and Dicky Lyons tallied 124 yards on eight receptions. Kentucky gained the most yards (512) allowed by the Florida defense this season, the most passing yards (415), and the most points (37) allowed by Florida this season. The 512 yards of total offense is the 13th consecutive game that UK has gone over the 300-yard total offense mark. This marks the second game this season the Wildcats have gained over 500 yards. Tight End Jacob Tamme caught a season high six passes for 68 yards and a touchdown, his fourth of the season. The loss also marked the first loss at home for UK, snapping an eight-game home win streak.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES

LSU TIGERS



LSU's 30-24 win over Auburn on Saturday propelled the Tigers to No. 3 in the Bowl Championships Series Standings, which were released on Sunday evening. The Tigers, who are also ranked No. 3 in both the Associated Press Top 25, USA Today Coaches Poll and the Harris Interactive Poll, have a BCS average of .9114. The winner of the LSU-Auburn game has now gone to the home team for the eighth straight contest. LSU extended several streaks with the Auburn win: The Tigers won their 18th straight home game, which is now the longest streak in school history. The 18 straight home wins overtook the old mark of 17 consecutive victories set between 1935-3. LSU has won 25 straight Saturday night home games. The Tigers have won 10 straight SEC home games. The Tigers improved to 5-0 under head coach Les Miles following a loss. LSU's 488 total yards of offense are the most by the team in an SEC game since tallying 478 yards at Tennessee on Nov. 4, 2006. Matt Flynn set career-highs in attempts (34), completions (22) and passing yards (319). His three touchdown passes tied a career high. LSU returns to action on Saturday, Nov. 3 when they travel to face Alabama in Tuscaloosa.

SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS



South Carolina failed to score a touchdown for the first time in 19 games. The Gamecocks were last held without a touchdown on Sept. 9, 2006 at Georgia, when the Bulldogs won 18-0. Seventeen points by Vanderbilt in the first quarter were the most allowed by South Carolina in the opening period this season. The previous high was seven points (three times). The loss to Vanderbilt ended a seven-game win streak by the Gamecocks against the Commodores. Before today, South Carolina's last loss to Vanderbilt was by an 11-10 score in 1999. South Carolina now leads the series 14-3. Coach Steve Spurrier lost to Vanderbilt for the first time. Spurrier's career coaching record against Vanderbilt is now 14-1. The two second-quarter field goals by Ryan Succop (35 & 32 yards) were his eighth and ninth of the season in 12 attempts. Succop tied his career long with a 58-yard punt in the third quarter. Kenny McKinley caught four passes for 79 yards against Vanderbilt, extending to 29 the number of consecutive games that McKinley has caught at least one pass. For the season McKinley has caught 41 passes for 525 yards. His career total is 117 receptions for 1,696 yards.

OLE MISS REBELS



Ole Miss' Greg Hardy is among 37 candidates on the mid-season watch list for the 2007 Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award. A sophomore from Millington, Tenn., Hardy currently leads the SEC in TFLs with 16.0, sacks with 8.0 and forced fumbles with three. He is the reigning SEC Player of the Week following a career performance against Alabama with 13 total tackles, nine solos, five TFLs, three sacks, two forced fumbles and two QB hurries. Hardy received First Team Freshman All-American honors at end a year ago. Rebel starting quarterback Seth Adams was pulled in the third quarter Saturday after throwing his fourth interception. Fellow senior signal-caller Brent Schaeffer saw his second action of the year and connected with Mike Wallace on a 37-yard scoring strike with 6:26 left for the lone Ole Miss score of the day. BenJarvus Green-Ellis led Ole Miss (2-6, 0-5 SEC) with 84 yards rushing and Wallace caught four passes for 57 yards. The Rebels finished with 182 yards passing, the second lowest output of the season.

TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS



Senior quarterback Erik Ainge now owns a 21-9 record as a starter, including a 10-4 mark on the road. Ainge Saturday moved into a tie for 18th place on the SEC's all-time passing touchdowns list. He now has 54 touchdown passes in his career and is tied in league annals with former Florida signal caller John Reaves (1969-71). Junior tailback Arian Foster put the Vols on the scoreboard with a two-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. It was his second career touchdown against Alabama. Foster is UT's active career leader with 19 touchdowns. Foster also moved into 16th place on Tennessee's career rushing list with 1,826 yards. Foster hauled in a 53-yard pass in the first quarter that marked the longest reception of his career and quarterback Erik Ainge's longest completion of the season. Foster also finished with a career-high 74 receiving yards. Tennessee's offense has allowed no quarterbacks sacks since the second game of the season and has allowed just two on the year. The Vols lead the FBS in sacks allowed. Starting quarterback Erik Ainge has been sacked just once this year. He has attempted 253 straight passes without being sacked.

MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS



West Virginia scored 28 first-quarter points and the ninth-ranked Mountaineers never looked back in a 38-13 victory over visiting Mississippi State Saturday afternoon in the second meeting ever between the teams, the first on the Morgantown campus. The opening minute of the game set the tone for the afternoon. West Virginia fumbled the opening kickoff and MSU recovered deep in WVU territory, but the play was called back due to an offsides penalty against the Bulldogs. Despite the tough opening quarter, State's defense would step up the rest of the way, limiting the Mountaineers to just 10 points the final three quarters. State was led by Anthony Dixon, who was limited to just 59 yards and one score by West Virginia. Wes Carroll had another clean outing under center, completing 18-of-35 passes for 169 yards. He threw no touchdowns or interceptions in the contest. The true freshman has now thrown 109 passes without a pick, breaking Derrick Taite's single season school record of 96 set in 1996. Tony Burks led the Bulldog receiving effort with six catches for 41 yards. Dixon's 11 touchdowns leads the SEC.

VANDERBILT COMMODORES



Vanderbilt's 17-6 win over No. 6 South Carolina tied for the highest-ranked opponent Vanderbilt has ever defeated. The Commodores defeated No. 6 LSU 7-6 in Nashville in 1937. Prior to today, Vanderbilt's last win over a top 10 team was over No. 8 Auburn in the 1955 Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla. The win was VU's first true road win over a top 10 opponent. Vanderbilt's last regular season win over a top 10 opponent was a 24-10 win in Nashville over No. 8 Florida in 1974. Vanderbilt's defense was sensational, holding South Carolina without a touchdown on 282 yards of offense. The Commodores also tied a school record with seven sacks, intercepted three passes and forced three fumbles, recovering one. At one point in the second quarter, VU had out gained USC 169-35. The win ended a seven-game skid against South Carolina and put an end to Steve Spurrier's perfect 14-0 career record against Vanderbilt. The Commodores last win over South Carolina was an 11-10 victory in Columbia in 1999.

Sylvester Croom is in his fourth season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 13-28 (.317). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorvey and the defensive coordinator is Ellis Johnson.

Rich Brooks is in his fifth season at Kentucky with a record of 22-32 (.407) and in his 23rd season overall with a record of 113-141-4 (.446). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Joker Phillips and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Anthony Dixon has now rushed a SEC-high 184 times for 755 yards, good for fifth in the league in rushing. His 11 rushing touchdowns this season are a league best, and he ranks second in the conference (8.6, Tim Tebow, Florida) in scoring TDs per game (8.2 points per game). Wes Carroll has now begun his collegiate career with 109 pass attempts without an interception, a new single season MSU record.

Linebacker Wesley Woodyard leads the SEC and currently ranks tied for 19th nationally in tackles, averaging 10.5 per game. He is the only SEC player to average double-figure tackles this season. Defensive end Jeremy Jarmon ranks third in the SEC and is tied for 24th nationally in sacks with 6.5 on the year. The sophomore has recorded at least one sack in seven of the last 10 games.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Titus Brown, who has recorded 152 career tackles, including 33.5 for loss (minus 152 yards), 16.5 of which were sacks (minus 97 yards), stayed among the SEC leaders in both hit-behind-the-line categories. Brown, who has recorded at least one tackle for loss in seven of the season's first eight games, is fifth in the league with 1.25 TFL per game. His 0.75 sack-per-game average is fourth best in the SEC. His 16.5 sacks are good for seventh place all-time at Mississippi State in that category.

André Woodson threw for 415 yards and charted a career-high tying five touchdowns vs. Florida. The senior leads the SEC in passing yards per game, averaging 275.1 ypg and has throw for at least 200 yards in 14 straight games. Woodson also has thrown at least two touchdown passes in nine straight games. He ranks second in the SEC and 14th nationally in passing efficiency (153.8). Two different players (Steve Johnson - 128, Dicky Lyons Jr. - 124) tallied over 100-yards receiving vs. UF.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Derek Pegues has also been a threat in the return game, despite also playing regularly on defense and in kick coverage. Pegues had two kickoff returns for 74 yards against West Virginia this past Saturday and now ranks second on the school's all-time kick return (70) and yardage (1,548) lists. He also returned three punts for 22 yards against the Mountaineers, and now ranks fifth on the all-time punt returns list (53) and sixth on the all-time yardage ranking (514).

Tim Masthay is averaging a career-best 42.9 yards per punt and UK ranks fourth in the SEC in net punting, averaging 36.7 net yards per punt. UK has allowed only 19 punt return yards this season, the second-lowest in the SEC. Masthay leads the SEC with 16 touchbacks and UK ranks third in the SEC in net kickoff coverage.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL HAS THE BALL

FIU is coming off a 28-14 loss at Louisiana at Monroe last Saturday that saw the team fall behind for the second-straight game after grabbing a first-quarter lead. FIU's offense is led by dual-threat redshirt freshman QB Wayne Younger, who has thrown for 954 yards this season and leads the team with 245 yards rushing. Sophomore WR Jeremy Dickens returned from a five-game absence due to injury to post the team's best receiving performance of the season with six receptions for 87 yards.

The Razorback defense is led by Matt Hewitt's 63 tackles and Jerrell Norton's four interceptions. Marcus Harrison racked up 11 total tackles for the Hogs against Ole Miss. Seven of his 11 stops were solo tackles, including two tackles for loss (-4 yards) and a sack. Michael Grant is tied for the NCAA lead with 1.86 passes defended per game. The mark also leads the SEC outright.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

The FIU defense, led by LB Scott Bryant's 50 tackles, ranks 29th in the NCAA with 7.0 tackles for loss per game. Senior DB Lionell Singleton leads the Sun Belt with three fumble recoveries. Converted wide receiver Ashlyn Parker led the team with 10 tackles and a forced fumble at safety.

Darren McFadden and Felix Jones rushed for 211 yards against the Rebels and averages nearly 225 yards per game on the ground combined, with McFadden ranking seventh in the NCAA (133.14) and Jones 21st (110.57) in rushing yards per game, compiling a majority of the team's 293.1 rushing yards per game (fourth in NCAA). Two of Casey Dick's three touchdown passes against Ole Miss went to tight end Andrew Davie.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Singleton ranks second in the conference with 23.53 yards per kick return. Singleton became the program's all-time leader in kickoff return yardage last week with five returns for 143 yards against Monroe to run his career total to 894 yards. Sophomore P Chris Cook became the program's single-season leader in punt yardage, running his season totals to 2,115 yards on 51 punts.

Jones has two kickoff returns for touchdowns this season on 90-yard and 82-yard bursts. He ranks fourth nationally in kickoff return average at 31.58 ypr. He currently leads the SEC in career kickoff return average at 28.4 yards per on 52 career returns. Alex Tejada is 11 for 14 on field goal attempts and 31 of 33 on PATs. Tejada is 27th nationally in scoring at 9.14 points per game. He also ranks tied for 20th in the NCAA in field goals per game at 1.57.

Jonathan Goff contributed his second interception of the season, six total tackles and pair of defensed passes in the win over South Carolina. He ranks fifth in the SEC in tackles and among the team leaders in virtually every defensive category. D.J. Moore was credited with eight total tackles, two interceptions and a pass deflection in Vanderbilt's 17-6 win at #6 South Carolina. Moore leads the SEC with five interceptions this year.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Clayton Mullins is tied for 33rd place on the NCAA tackles list with 9.88 tackles per game. He leads the RedHawks with 79 tackles, including a team-best 40 solo stops this season. Jeff Thompson continues to be one of Miami's best defensive backs, and is the RedHawks' co-leader with two interceptions. Caleb Bostic ranks second among Miami players with 69 tackles.

Earl Bennett needs just two receptions to become the SEC all-time leader. Through seven games, Bennett leads the SEC with 46 receptions and ranks fifth with 554 receiving yards. He is also among the SEC leaders with four touchdown catches. In his first career start, Mackenzi Adams directed the Commodores to a victory over No. 6 South Carolina. Adams compiled 207 total yards – 123 passing and 84 rushing – in the win. He set career highs with two TD passes and rushing yardage.

Harvey has had a tackle for a loss in six of the last seven games and a sack in three of the last four outings. Over the last eight games, Derrick Harvey has totaled nine and a half sacks.

Knowshon Moreno makes his second straight start after a career-high 157 rushing yards against Vandy and seniors Brown and Lumpkin out injured. Matthew Stafford is 11-4 as the starting quarterback. Starting for the third straight game, freshman DB Johnny Brown notched the first interception of his career with his second-quarter pick and 35-yard return against the Razorbacks. Brown posted a career-high seven total stops for the second straight game.

Phillip Fulmer is in his 16th season at Tennessee and overall with a record of 141-44 (.762). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is David Cutcliffe and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Kenny McKinley caught four passes for 79 yards against Vanderbilt, extending to 29 the number of consecutive games that McKinley has caught at least one pass. For the season McKinley has caught 41 passes for 525 yards. His career total is 117 receptions for 1,696 yards. McKinley moved into seventh place on South Carolina's career list with 117 catches, passing Stanley Pritchett (1992-95) by one. Chris Smelly was 12-of-20 for 145 yards and two interceptions, while Blake Mitchell was 3-of-8 for 19 yards.

Jerod Mayo and Ryan Karl led the team with 11 stops each at Alabama. Ryan Karl posted five tackles and broke up three passes at Miss. St. Rico McCoy and Mayo led the team with 11 tackles apiece vs. Georgia. Mayo leads the team with 51 tackles this season. Jonathan Hefney as started 43 consecutive games after not starting the first game of his career in 2004 against UNLV. Hefney is fourth on the team with 36 tackles.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

The fourth-quarter recovery of a Vanderbilt fumble by Eric Norwood last week was the third of the season for Norwood. He returned the first two for touchdowns against Kentucky. Seventeen points by Vanderbilt in the first quarter were the most allowed by South Carolina in the opening period this season. The previous high was seven points (three times).

Erik Ainge is 21-9 as a starter in his career. He has an efficiency rating of 138.6, which is the third-best mark in the SEC this season. Ainge has thrown for 369 yards and five touchdowns in three career games vs. South Carolina. Arian Foster has 328 yards rushing and five touchdowns in his last three games, including a 91-yard effort at Alabama. Lucas Taylor leads the team with 43 catches for 633 yards.

SPECIAL TEAMS

The two second-quarter field goals by Ryan Succop vs. Vandy (35 & 32 yards) were his eighth and ninth of the season in 12 attempts. For his career Succop has made 25 field goals in 34 attempts. Succop tied his career long with a 58-yard punt in the third quarter. The 46-yard punt return in the second quarter by Captain Munneryn was a career long for him.

Daniel Lincoln is 13-of-14 on field goal attempts and 26-of-26 on PATs through six games. Lincoln kicked his career-long 47-yard field goal vs. Southern Miss. LaMarcus Coker is fourth in the SEC in kickoff return average (25.61). Britton Colquitt is third in the SEC in punting (43.10 yards per att).
