SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

Each head coach is allowed one Instant Replay challenge per game, which is exercised by requesting a team timeout. A head coach may issue a challenge only if his team has one or more timeouts remaining in the half. If the challenged ruling is overturned, the timeout is not charged, but the coach has no more challenges during that game.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference, following approval by the NCAA Football Rules Committee, will implement the use of video replay on an experimental basis beginning with the 2005 football season.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - c. Touching of a kick
 - d. Number of players on field
 - e. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - f. Fourth-down/try fumble plays

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

2007 SEC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The SEC's Eastern and Western Division winners will meet in Atlanta's Georgia Dome to battle for the league championship and the right to represent the conference in the Bowl Championship Series. The 16th-annual title game is set for December 1 and will be nationally televised by CBS Sports at 4:00 p.m. ET.

The game is a result of conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Under NCAA regulations, a conference with 12 members may play a 12th football game to determine its champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The participants of the game are determined each year during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the best overall SEC winning percentage in each division.

The 1994 SEC Championship Game earned a 10.5 rating and a 26 share, the highest rated SEC Championship Game in history.

The SEC Championship Game has also drawn capacity crowds in its history. 1,120,836 fans have witnessed first-hand the pageantry of SEC Football at the 15 previous Championship Games.

Attendance at the 15 previous championship games has been 102.3 percent of stadium capacity, including 13 sellouts.

THIS WEEK IN SEC FOOTBALL HISTORY

As the Southeastern Conference celebrates its 75th anniversary, here is a look at some of the highlights during the upcoming game dates in its history:



Nov. 3

1951 -- #1 Tennessee went on the road to Chapel Hill and defeated North Carolina, 27-0. The Volunteers finished the season as the SEC and national champions.

1962 -- #6 ranked Ole Miss goes into Tiger Stadium and defeats #4 LSU, 15-7. It is the first time in history that a top-five ranked LSU team has lost at home.

1973 -- Georgia defeated #11 Tennessee, 35-31, in Knoxville. Georgia scored a touchdown with 2:27 left after holding Tennessee on a fourth-and-two fake punt from the UT 28-yard line.

QB Don Gaffney leads Florida past Auburn 12-8 for the program's first victory at Auburn's Jordan-Hare Stadium, setting up the Gator consecutive wins against Auburn, Georgia, Kentucky and Miami.

2001 -- Following a 35-24 loss to Ole Miss the week prior, LSU goes to Tuscaloosa and defeats Alabama, 35-21. The Tigers roll off four straight wins to capture the Western Division title and then win the SEC Championship game.

CBS SPORTS - The 2007 season marks the 11th year for CBS as the league's national network television partner. CBS will televise up to 15 games per year throughout the season. CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 1 at 4 p.m. ET.

ESPN/ESPN2, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com (search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

LINCOLN FINANCIAL SPORTS (LFS) (Formerly Jefferson-Pilot Sports) will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send eight of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2007 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection of available SEC teams.

2008 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2007 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2007 regular season, the Allstate BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in New Orleans on Jan. 7 at 8 p.m. EST. The Allstate BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2007 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, and the Orange Bowl on Jan. 3 at 8 p.m. ET.

In the event of a tie for the division championship, the following procedures will be used to break all ties to determine the SEC Football Championship Game representative. All Conference versus Conference Games (both division and non-division) will be counted in the Conference Standings.

TWO-TEAM TIE. In the event two teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order:

- A. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams;
- B. Records of the tied teams within the division;
- C. Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference record, and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall record against non-divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional or non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- G. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game.

THREE-TEAM TIE (OR MORE). If three teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order: (Note: If one of the procedures results in one team being eliminated and two remaining, the two-team tiebreaker procedure as stated in No. 1 above will be used):

- A. Combined head to head record among the tied teams;
- B. Record of the tied teams within the division;
- C. Head to head competition against the team within the division with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall Conference record against non divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through other common non divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- G. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest-ranked tied team. In this case, the head-to-head results of the top two ranked tied teams shall determine the representative in the SEC Championship Game.

UK'S TAMME NAMED NFF NATIONAL SCHOLAR-ATHLETE

Kentucky tight end Jacob Tamme has been chosen as one of the 2007 National Scholar-Athletes by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame and will receive an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship.

Tamme is one of 15 players from around the nation, including all classifications of collegiate football, to be recognized. He is now a finalist for the prestigious Draddy Award, which goes to the NFF's top scholar-athlete in the country. The Draddy will be announced, and Tamme will receive his National Scholar-Athlete Award, at the annual NFF Awards Dinner on Dec. 4 in New York City.

GEORGIA'S JOHNSON AND OLE MISS' COOK NAMED TO AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM

Georgia defensive back Kelin Johnson and Ole Miss fullback Jason Cook have been named to the American Football Coaches Association Good Works Team for community service activities.

The AFCA has been selecting the Good Works Team since 1997. From 1992-1996, the Good Works Team was chosen by the College Football Association. When the CFA disbanded in 1997, the AFCA began selecting the teams.

Johnson and Cook have also been named to the SEC Community Service Team for football already this season.

VANDERBILT'S BENNETT BREAKS SEC RECEPTION MARK

Vanderbilt junior wide receiver Earl Bennett became the SEC's career reception leader against Miami (Ohio).

The Birmingham, Ala. native, now has 215 career receptions for 2,661 yards and 19 TDs. Bennett's average of 6.9 receptions per game is currently tied for 19th in NCAA history. This season, Bennett leads the SEC in receptions per game with 54 for 639 yards and four TDs, an average of 6.75 catches per contest.

SIX SEC TEAMS ALREADY BOWL ELIGIBLE

Six Southeastern Conference teams have already earned the six-win benchmark to be eligible for post-season play in 2007. Five other teams have five wins and need one more win to reach the six-win total.

The most bowl-eligible teams for the SEC in its history in one season was nine,

which was during the 2000, 2001 and 2006 seasons. In eight other seasons, the SEC has had eight bowl-eligible teams, the latest coming in 2002.

While six wins is the basic eligibility to participate in post-season bowl games, NCAA rules state that a "deserving winning team" be eligible for bowl-season play.

The SEC has agreements to send eight of its teams to post-season bowls.

NCAA Rule 30.9.2 states, "A contest (bowl game) shall be licensed only if it serves the purpose of providing a national contest between deserving winning teams. A "deserving winning team" shall be defined as wone that has won a minimum of six games against football bowl subdivision opponents and that has more wins than losses."

Exceptions to NCAA Rule 30.9.2 exist. Those are:

"An institution with a record of six wins and six losses may be selected for participation in a bowl game under the following circumstances:

(a) The institution or its conference has a primary contractual affiliation, which existed prior to the first contest of the applicable season, with the sponsoring bowl organization. In the case of a conference contractual affiliation, all conference teams with winning records must be placed in one of the contracted bowl games before any institution with a record of six wins and six losses may be placed in a contracted bowl game.

There shall be no contingency agreements with other sponsoring bowl organizations intended to enable an institution with a record of six wins and six losses to become eligible for those contests; or

(b) All contractual affiliations per Bylaw 30.9.2.1-(a) have been fulfilled and all institutions with winning records

30.9.2.2 Exception—Football Bowl Subdivision Opponent. [FBS] Each year, a football bowl subdivision institution may count one victory against a football championship subdivision opponent toward the six-win minimum, provided the opponent has averaged 90 percent of the permissible maximum number of grants-in-aid per year in football over a rolling two-year period.

30.9.2.2.1 Waiver. [FBS] The Football Issues Committee may approve a waiver of the 90 percent requirement to permit a football bowl subdivision institution to count a victory against a football championship subdivision opponent in football toward meeting the six-victory requirement when a unique or catastrophic situation affects the Division I-AA institution's ability to average 90 percent of the permissible maximum number of grants-in-aid per year in Division I-AA football over a rolling two-year period.

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME RACE RECAPS

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME RACE RECAPS

1992 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida and Georgia (6-2 in the SEC) were co-champions in the Eastern Division. The Gators won the tie-breaker by virtue of a 26-24 win over the Bulldogs earlier in the season. Alabama (8-0) was the outright Western Division champion, even with a game against Auburn in the final weekend, which the Tide won, 17-0.

1993 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division and Alabama won the Western Division. The Gators finished 1/2 game ahead of Tennessee (UT tied Alabama, 17-17). Alabama, at 5-2-1, finished two games ahead second-place Arkansas. Auburn was 8-0 in the SEC, but was ineligible for the conference title.

1994 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, two games ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with an 8-0 SEC mark, three games ahead of Miss. State.

1995 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 8-0, one game ahead of Tennessee. Arkansas won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, one game ahead of Auburn and Alabama.

1996 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 8-0, one game ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, tying LSU. However, the Tide defeated the Tigers, 26-0, earlier in the year to win the tie-breaker.

1997 - Eastern Division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Tennessee defeated Vanderbilt, 17-10, to win the division on the final weekend. Tennessee, at 7-1 in the SEC, finished one game ahead of Georgia and Florida. Auburn had won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, tying LSU. However, Auburn defeated LSU, 31-28, earlier in the year to win the tie-breaker.

1998 - Western Division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Miss. State defeated Ole Miss, 28-6, on Thanksgiving night, to win the division on the final weekend. Arkansas and Miss. State finished in a tie for the division title. However, Miss. State defeated Arkansas, 22-21, earlier that season to win the tie-breaker. Arkansas defeated LSU 41-14 on the final weekend, but when State defeated Ole Miss, the chase for the Championship Game had been won. Tennessee had clinched the Eastern Division before the final weekend and defeated Vanderbilt, 41-0, to finished the SEC at 8-0.

1999 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, one game ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with a 7-1 SEC mark, one game ahead of Miss. State.

2000 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, two games ahead of South Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee. Auburn won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, one game ahead of LSU. LSU lost to Arkansas in the final weekend, 14-3. Even if the Tigers would have beaten the Razorbacks, Auburn would have won the tie-breaker over LSU due to a 34-17 win earlier in the season.

2001 - Both races go down to the final weekend. Due to game postponements on Sept. 15, games were reschedule for Dec. 1. On that weekend, Tennessee defeated Florida, 34-32, in Gainesville, and LSU defeated Auburn, 27-14, in Baton Rouge, to clinch berths in the SEC Championship Game. The Vols won the East with a 7-1 mark while LSU had a 5-3 mark and tied with Auburn for the West, but won the head-to-head tiebreaker.

2002 - Western division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Georgia clinched the Eastern Division championship on Nov. 16 after defeating Auburn, 24-21, in Auburn. The 7-1 Bulldogs finish one game ahead of Florida, which was 6-2. Arkansas wins the Western Division on the season's final weekend, defeating LSU, 21-20, in Little Rock on Nov. 29. The Razorbacks, LSU Tigers and Auburn Tigers are tied at 5-3 but Arkansas wins the head-to-head tiebreakers.

2003 - Both races decided on final weekend. Tennessee defeats Kentucky, 20-7, to force a three-way tie for the Eastern Division championship between the Vols, Georgia and

Florida. Using a tie-breaker involving the BCS standings, Georgia has the highest BCS ranking and has defeated Tennessee (next highest ranking) during regular season to secure SEC Championship Game berth. LSU defeats Arkansas, 55-24, and Ole Miss beats Mississippi State, 31-0, to force a tie for the Western Division championship. LSU's 17-14 win over Ole Miss the week before earns the Tigers the Western Division berth.

2004 - Auburn clinches berth in the SEC Championship Game on Oct. 30, tying the earliest since the game began in 1992 (Alabama, 1993). The Tigers (8-0) finish two games ahead in the standings of second-place LSU (6-2). Tennessee clinches berth as Eastern Division representative with 38-33 win against Vanderbilt on Nov. 20. The Vols (7-1) would win their next game on the following weekend against Kentucky to claim the division title outright. Georgia was second in the Western Division with a 6-2 mark.

2005 - Georgia (6-2) clinched the Eastern Division Championship with a 45-13 win over Kentucky on Nov. 19. The Bulldogs finish one full game ahead of South Carolina and Florida in the standings. LSU clinched the Western Division title with a 19-17 win over Arkansas on Nov. 25. The Tigers finished tied for the Western Division title (7-1), but defeated Auburn, 20-17, on Oct. 22, to win the tie-breaker.

2006 - Florida (7-1) clinched Eastern Division Championship and berth in the SEC Championship Game on Nov. 4, by defeating Vanderbilt, 25-19. Arkansas clinched the Western Division title and SEC Championship Game berth with a 28-14 win over Mississippi State on Nov. 18.

2007 -- As of Week 9, no team has clinched a berth in the SEC Championship Game. As of Week 9, all six teams in the Eastern Division and five of the six teams in the Western Division remain mathematically alive for SEC Championship Game berths.

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME RACE RECAP

The earliest a berth has been clinched in the SEC Championship Game is Oct. 30 (Auburn, 2004, & Alabama, 1993).

In eight of the 30 divisional races prior to 2007, a championship game berth has not been decided until the weekend prior to the SEC Championship Game. That occurred in 1997 (Tennessee), 1998 (Mississippi State), 2001 (Tennessee and LSU), 2002 (Arkansas), 2003 (Georgia and LSU) and 2005 (LSU).

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last five years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 171 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 79 named to the first-team.
- During the last eleven years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award. In 2006, Alabama track & field athlete Beth Mallory was named a recipient of this award.
- Florida's Chris Leak was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last five years, the SEC has had 11 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2007-08 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama baseball player Emeel Salem and Vanderbilt track & field athlete Erika Schneble were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2006-07.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. Tennessee swimmer Brad Boswell and Florida softball player Stacey Stevens were named recipients of this award in 2006-07.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had four sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Courtney Kupets of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics, Georgia's Kara Lynn Joyce won in Swimming & Diving and Tennessee's Monica Abbott was the top athlete in softball.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 66 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- Since 1990, the SEC has won 118 team and 805 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.8 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (268 of 349). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won more team national championships than any other conference in the nation. The SEC won 50 team titles since 2000, while the Pac-10 won 45 and the Big 12 won 21. The SEC won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, also the most of any conference.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES



ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

Alabama is coming off a bye week as they prepare for their upcoming highly anticipated match against LSU on Saturday. The Tide is coming off of a 41-17 win over Tennessee two weeks ago. Both Alabama and LSU are 4-1 in SEC action and are tied for first in the Western Division. The winner of this game will control its own destiny for the SEC Championship game. This will mark the first time Alabama head coach Nick Saban will face his former team since returning to the college game. The Tide is 8-2 in their last 10 games following a bye week. Alabama has scored on 13 of their last 23 offensive drives and they are 6-0 when scoring first this season. Leading the way for the Tide is receiver DJ Hall who is first in the conference in receiving yards with 95.5. Hall leads the receiving corps with 50 receptions, 764 yards and five touchdowns. The offense has flowed for Alabama as they have scored in five consecutive quarters, seven of their last eight. Terry Grants leads Alabama in rushing with 697 yards on the season, 127 carries and seven touchdowns. Quarterback John Parker Wilson has 1,876 passing yards and 11 touchdown passes, averaging 234.5 yards per game.

FLORIDA GATORS



Florida came up short in the 86th meeting against Georgia as the Bulldogs recorded a 42-30 victory over the Gators. The Gators now trail in the series, 47-37-2. Tim Tebow rushed for two touchdowns on 13 carries, despite finishing -15 yards on the ground. In passing, he completed 14 of 22 passes for 236 yards and one touchdown. Tebow has now rushed for a touchdown in nine consecutive games to extend his school record. He now has 12 rushing scores this season. The 42 points given up by the Gators were the most given up by the Florida defense in a regulation game under Urban Meyer. Wondy Pierre-Louis' recorded his first career interception and his second career touchdown. His touchdown was the second defensive score for the Gators in 2007. Percy Harvin led the Gators in rushing yards as he scrambled 97 yards on 10 carries. The 10 attempts are a career high for Harvin. Andre Caldwell led the Gators in receptions with a career-high four, and registered 56 yards. Louis Murphy caught the Gators only TD pass, a 40-yarder, in the first quarter.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS

Arkansas is now 50-32-4 in homecoming games after defeating Florida International 58-10 Saturday. Darren McFadden rushed for a career-high four TDs and had 61 yards on 19 carries. Fullback Peyton Hillis was awarded the Crip Hall Award, which goes to the senior with the most outstanding performance in the Homecoming game, finishing with six receptions and 77 yards and rushed twice for 15 yards. Nathan Emert entered the game in the second quarter for injured quarterback Casey Dick. Emert completed 13 of 25 passes and threw for 154 yards and one score. Marcus Monk started his first game of the season vs. FIU and had two catches for 19 yards and one touchdown. His touchdown was a 13-yard pass from Emert in the first half. It was the 25th touchdown catch of the senior's career, extending his school record. He is also six away from matching the SEC record. The Arkansas defense had a season-high five interceptions with Rashaad Johnson's two and one each by Jerell Norton, Michael Grant and Kevin Woods. Arkansas' final score of the game came in the fourth quarter on a career-long, 81-yard touchdown run by Michael Smith.



GEORGIA BULLDOGS

Redshirt freshman Knowshon Moreno gained a career-high 188 yards on 33 carries with three rushing touchdowns as the Georgia Bulldogs defeated the Florida Gators 42-30 in Jacksonville Saturday. It marked the most yards by a Bulldog since 2001 and he became the first Bulldog since 2004 to have back-to-back 100+ rushing yard games. Quarterback Matthew Stafford also had a big day as he went 11-for-18 with three touchdowns for 217 yards. The biggest TD play was an 84-yard pass to Mohamed Massaquoi for a 14-7 lead. The pass marked a career-long for both Bulldogs and the longest TD pass since 2003. Stafford also connected with Mikey Henderson for a 53-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter. Defensively, Georgia allowed just 13 points and had a season-high six sacks. Senior defensive end Marcus Howard had two sacks while junior Dannel Ellerbe led the team with seven tackles. Georgia also capitalized on Florida miscues and got seven points as Rod Battle forced a fumble in the opening possession of the game and Ellerbe recovered a fumble in the fourth. Georgia's 42 points was the most against the Gators since 1982 when the Bulldogs won 44-0 in Jacksonville.

AUBURN TIGERS



Brad Lester rushed for a career-high 96 yards to help Auburn to a 17-3 win over Ole Miss in Auburn Saturday and earn their sixth win to become bowl eligible. The Tigers secured the win in the final minutes when Brandon Cox completed a 34-yard touchdown pass to Rod Smith. The drive came off of an interception from Patrick Lee as Ole Miss was threatening to score. Smith finished the game with a career-high 111 yards on eight catches. He moved up two spots to 18th in Auburn history with 1,125 career receiving yards. Cox completed 16 of 26 passes for 189 yards. Cox passed Pat Sullivan for third on Auburn's career passing yardage list. He has 6,331 career yards passing. Cox also tied Stan White for third in Auburn history with 40 career touchdown passes. Auburn outgained Ole Miss 420-193 and held the Rebels to just eight yards of total offense and no first downs on nine plays in the first quarter. AU outrushed the Rebels 231-70 and held BenJarvis Green-Ellis to 62 yards on 13 carries. The Tigers also dominated the possession in the first quarter as Auburn held the ball for 11:28 to 3:32 for Ole Miss.

KENTUCKY WILDCATS



Kentucky falls to 6-3 overall and 2-3 in the SEC after losing to Mississippi State 31-14 Saturday. Kentucky's 14 points was its lowest scoring output since last season. This year, the Wildcats have scored 20 or more points in each of its previous eight games this year. Kentucky finished with 319 yards of total offense, its lowest total since the 2006 LSU game, however, it did mark the 14th consecutive game the Wildcats have accumulated 300 or more total offensive yards. Quarterback Andrew Woodson finished 24-for-42 for 230 yards with two touchdown passes. He has thrown at least two touchdown strikes in 10 consecutive contests. Woodson threw a season-high and career high-tying three interceptions. Senior tight end Jacob Tamme caught six passes for 46 yards. His six receptions tied his career high, set last week vs. Florida. Tamme has caught a pass in each of UK's nine games this season. With his efforts, he moved into sole possession of eighth place on UK's all-time career pass receptions list. He now has 111 career pass receptions and needs one more to tie Quentin McCord for seventh-place all-time.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES

LSU TIGERS



The week off didn't have any effect on LSU's standing in the Bowl Championship Series as the Tigers came in at No. 3 in this week's edition of the BCS, which was released on Sunday. LSU returns to action on Saturday, traveling to face 17th-ranked Alabama. LSU goes into the Alabama game with a 7-1 overall mark, while the Crimson Tide stands at 6-2. Both teams are 4-1 in league play. Ohio State is No. 1 in the BCS with a .9756 average, followed by Boston College at No. 2 with a .9559 average. LSU holds the No. 3 spot with a .8879 average. LSU quarterback Matt Flynn was rewarded last week for playing the best game of his career in the Tigers' 30-24 win over Auburn as he was named the SEC's Offensive Player of the Week. Flynn, a senior from Tyler, Texas, set career highs for completions (22), attempts (34) and passing yards (314) and tied another career-best with three touchdown passes, including the game-winner with one second left, in the LSU victory. Flynn also rushed for 34 yards, including runs of 10 and seven yards, on LSU's game winning drive. The honor is the first of Flynn's career, who improved to 7-1 as LSU's starting quarterback with the victory.

SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS



South Carolina's 24 second-half points against Tennessee were the most for since the Gamecocks tallied 27 in the first half of their Liberty Bowl win over Houston on Dec. 28, 2006. Kenny McKinley caught a school-record tying 14 passes for 151 yards. Six of his catches came in the first half for 51 yards. His total tied that of Zola Davis against Vanderbilt on Oct. 24, 1998. He also became the first Gamecock to amass 150 receiving yards since Sidney Rice went for 161 vs. Florida Atlantic in 2006. McKinley extended his string of consecutive games with a reception to 30, putting him in sole possession of fourth place in USC history in that category. Senior Cory Boyd netted a career-high 160 yards on 20 carries, the fifth 100-yard game of his career. The last 100-yard contest was against S.C. State on Sept. 15 when he rushed for a then-career high 132 yards. Ryan Succop's 49-yard field goal was his longest since a 50-yard strike against then-No. 8 Tennessee on Oct. 28, 2006. The Gamecocks' helmets this week will have stickers reading "Forever to Thee," the closing words to the school's alma mater, in tribute to the seven victims of the North Carolina beach house fire. Six were Carolina students.

OLE MISS REBELS



Defensively, Ole Miss contained No. 23 Auburn but was unable to cash in on offense in a 17-3 defeat Saturday at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Joshua Shene connected on a 51-yard field goal in the final ticks of the first half for a 7-3 Tiger lead at the break. Senior RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis rushed for 62 yards on 13 carries. Senior QB Seth Adams completed 11-of-24 passes for 89 yards with no interceptions. Junior WR Mike Wallace led the team with five catches for 39 yards. Senior QB Brent Schaeffer saw second-half action for the third time this season and second straight game and finished 3-of-4 for 34 yards and an interception. For the second straight, junior LB Tony Fein led the team and established a career high in tackles, totaling 16, which was the most by a Rebel this year. It marked Fein's second straight double-digit tackle performance and third of his debut season in the Red and Blue. Freshman DB Johnny Brown was credited with a career-best 11 tackles. Brown is averaging 7.8 tackles per game over the last four. After missing the last two games, junior DB Jamarca Sanford returned with his third double-figure tackle game of the year with 11.

TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS



Senior quarterback Erik Ainge finished the South Carolina game 26-of-44 for 216 yards, one touchdown and one interception. Ainge's first eight completions went to eight different receivers. For the game, Ainge connected with ten different Vols. With a 3-yard reception today in the first quarter, senior tight end Chris Brown extended his streak of games with at least one catch to 11. That is the second-longest streak by a Vols tight end during the Fulmer era. Adrian Foster rushed 19 times for 75 yards and one touchdown. The junior running back is now in 13th place on Tennessee's career rushing list with 1,901 yards. Tennessee allowed its first quarterback sack in the fourth quarter since the second game of the season and has allowed just three on the year. The Vols lead the FBS in sacks allowed. Ainge has been sacked just twice this year in 300 pass attempts. The Vols average one sack allowed for every 102.7 pass attempt this season. The Vols had six different players record double-digit tackles. Sophomore linebacker Rico McCoy had 14 tackles to lead the Vols and go over 100 tackles for his career.

MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS



Two critical turnovers by Kentucky early in the second half led to 10 Mississippi State points and helped the Bulldogs upset the 14th-ranked Wildcats 31-14 on the road Saturday afternoon. The victory upped State's record to 5-4 overall, 2-3 in the SEC. The win also marked the highest-ranked opponent Mississippi State had beaten since the 2004 season when they knocked off No. 21 Florida in Starkville. It was the first road victory over a ranked club since defeating No. 11 Auburn 20-0 in 1997. After a week off next Saturday, Mississippi State returns home to host Alabama on Nov. 10 at Davis Wade Stadium at Scott Field. State moves to 3-0 on the season when holding an opponent under 100 yards rushing. The Bulldogs are now 4-0 on the year when scoring at least 25 points. Sophomore Christian Ducre set a new career best of 119 yards rushing on 19 carries. His previous highs were 15 carries for 68 yards at South Carolina earlier this season. Ducre's 34-yard touchdown rush was the longest run of his career and longest of the season for State, and put him over the century mark for the first time in his career.

VANDERBILT COMMODORES



Junior wide receiver Earl Bennett broke the SEC record for career receptions with his second catch of the game and 209th of his career at the 13:34 mark of the first quarter. Bennett's record-breaking reception came on third down and went for seven yards and a first down to Vanderbilt's 47-yard line. The previous SEC record was 208 receptions by Kentucky's Craig Yeast and had been held since 1998. Bennett finished the day with a team-high 8 catches for 85 yards. The Commodores held Miami to 238 yards of total offense, including 86 yards in the second half. The 238 yards of offense marked the fourth time this season and second straight game that Vanderbilt has held its opponent to less than 300 yards of total offense. The Commodores also limited Miami to a season-low 26 yards on 27 carries. Leading the charge defensively was senior Jonathan Goff, who recorded his third double-digit tackle output of the season with 11 stops, including one sack and two tackles for loss. With its win over Miami, the Commodores picked up their fifth win by the end of October for the first time since 1999.

Bobby Johnson is in his sixth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 20-46 (.303) and in his 14th season overall with a record of 80-82 (.494). The Commodores' offensive coordinator is Ted Cain and the defensive coordinator is Bruce Fowler.

Urban Meyer is in his third season at Florida with a record of 27-7 (.794) and in his seventh season overall with a record of 66-15 (.815). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Dan Mullen and the defensive co-coordinators are Greg Mattison and Charlie Strong.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Through eight games, Earl Bennett leads the SEC with 54 receptions and ranks third with 639 receiving yards. He is also among the SEC Top 10 with four touchdown catches. Bennett is trying to lead the SEC in receiving for the third consecutive year. As a freshman and sophomore, he became the only player in league history to post two seasons of at least 75 receptions. Bennett broke the Southeastern Conference record for career receptions three plays into the Miami (Ohio) game.

Brandon Spikes and Dustin Doe rank as Florida's leading tacklers with 74 and 59, respectively. Over the last nine games, Derrick Harvey has totaled nine and a half sacks. Harvey did not get his first sack of the 2006 season until the fourth game. He ended last year with a team-leading 11. Against Georgia, Wondy-Pierre Louis made the first interception of his career. He was the sixth different Gator to have an interception this season.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Jonathan Goff posted a Goff-like performance vs. Miami (Ohio) – 11 total tackles, two tackles for loss, a QB sack and one QB hurry. He ranks among the SEC leaders in tackles. Marcus Buggs leads the 'Dores with 8.5 tackles for loss and shares the team lead with three QB sacks. D.J. Moore ranks among SEC leaders in numerous categories, including interceptions, solo tackles, defended passes and kickoff return yardage.

Tim Tebow's passer rating of 176.5 is the highest in the nation. He has completed 65.8 percent of his passes, which is the 16th-highest mark in the country and is the best in the SEC. During the Georgia game, Tim Tebow scored his 12th rushing touchdown of the year to build on the single-season record for a quarterback. Percy Harvin is first on the team with 933 all-purpose yards and is averaging 116.6 yards per game. He has a team-leading 36 catches for 604 yards.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Bryant Hahnfeldt ranks third all-time among Commodore placekickers in with 173 career points. He kicked his 30th career field goal and three extra points in Vanderbilt's win over Miami. Hahnfeldt has converted 10 of 14 field goals this season. For his career, Hahnfeldt has converted on 62.5% of his field goal attempts (30/48) and 80 of 83 PATs.

Brandon James had his fifth return of 50-plus yards on the year with a 52-yard kick return against Georgia. Throughout the first eight games, Chas Henry has punted 25 times for an average of 38.8 yards. He has placed eight inside the 20-yard line this season. Joey Ijjas is 40-of-40 on extra points through the first seven outings and is seven-of-nine on field goals.

Vanderbilt's lone win in Gainesville came in 1945 – its first appearance in Florida Field... Vanderbilt controlled the series in its infancy, winning five of the first seven games played between the schools from 1945-1955... From 1974-1988, Vanderbilt captured three of six games played in the series. All three victories came in Nashville.

THE COACHES

Larry Blakeney is in his 17th season at Troy and overall with a record of 134-66-1 (.669). The Trojans' offensive coordinator is Tony Franklin and the defensive coordinator is Jeremy Rowell.

Mark Richt is in his seventh season at Georgia and overall with a record of 67-19 (.779). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinator is Willie Martinez.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TROY HAS THE BALL

Senior receiver Gary Banks enters play having recorded at least one reception in 27 consecutive games, which is the 14th longest such streak in the nation. Senior quarterback Omar Haugabook surpassed the 3,000-yard mark for career passing in the OSU game and the 4,000-yard mark in the FIU game. He has now completed 440-of-722 attempts for 4,482 yards and 33 touchdowns in his career.

Dannell Ellerbe, who leads the team with 60 tackles, had a career high 12 in the loss to Tennessee. He has been the leading tackler for the Bulldogs in five games this year and is the only Bulldog linebacker to start every game. Reshad Jones set a career high against Tennessee with seven tackles and matched that total during the Bulldogs' 42-30 win over No. 9 Florida. Currently, he ranks second on the team with 43 tackles.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Sherrod Martin was named Sun Belt Defensive Player of the Week for his performance against North Texas. Martin had 11 tackles in the game, including two sacks and three total tackles for loss. He also was credited with two forced fumbles. Boris Lee earned honors for his efforts against Louisiana-Monroe on Sept. 29. In that game Lee had 12 total tackles and an interception he returned 28 yards for a touchdown.

Redshirt freshman running back Knowshon Moreno aims to become the first Bulldog with three straight 100-yard games since Musa Smith in 2002. In the past two games, Moreno has established career highs in yards and carries. Against ninth-ranked Florida, Moreno rushed for 188 yards on 33 carries. Through eight games and just two starts, Moreno leads the Bulldogs with 807 rushing yards.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Senior kicker Greg Whibbs' 45-yard field goal in the fourth quarter last week was his longest of the season. He was also good from 40 yards earlier in the game and averaged 45.2 yards on five punts. Leodis McKelvin earned his third Sun Belt Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts against North Texas on October 20. His seventh career POW award came after he returned five punts for 103 yards, including one for 52 yards and a touchdown, and two kickoffs for 59 yards.

For his career, Brandon Coutu is 45-for-58 in FGs including 5-for-11 from 50+ yards. Also, he is a perfect 94-for-94 in PATs. This season, Coutu is 10-15 in FG attempts (two of those attempts were from more than 50 yards). Georgia ranks second in the SEC in net punting at 38.1 yards. Redshirt sophomore Brian Mimbs is third in the SEC with an average of 43.3 yards on 36 punts, placing 13 inside the 20-yard line.

Fresh off a 42-30 triumph over ninth-ranked Florida, the Bulldogs (6-2) return home for their first-ever meeting against the Troy Trojans (6-2)... THE COACHES

Scott Stoker is in his sixth season at Northwestern State and overall with a record of 35-31 (.530). The Demons' offensive coordinator is Slade Nagle and the defensive coordinator is Kurt Corbin.

Ed Orgeron is in his third season at Ole Miss and overall with a record of 9-23 (.281). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Dan Werner and the defensive coordinator is John Thompson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN NORTHWESTERN STATE HAS THE BALL

The Demon offense is averaging 19.6 points and 328.9 yards per game and is led by sophomore quarterback Germayn Edmond, who has completed 63-of-129 passes for 793 yards with seven TDs and eight interceptions. Edmond has also run for six TDs and ranks second on the team in rushing with 323 yards. Junior RB Byron Lawrence has rushed for a team-high 917 yards and three TDs, while junior WR Dudley Guice is the top receiver with 22 catches for 300 yards and three scores.

Ashlee Palmer is third in the SEC in tackles (8.9 per game) and turned in a 15-stop performance against Louisiana Tech. Palmer has posted 12 or more tackles in three games, and he leads the team with six pass break-ups. He has recorded at least eight tackles in all but two games this year. Junior DL Peria Jerry has been a force of late, totaling 8.5 TFLs and 24 total tackles in the last five games and a sack in three straight. Jerry is now tied for sixth in the SEC in TFLs with 11.0.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

The Northwestern State defense is surrendering 36.9 points and 381.9 yards per outing. Junior LB Mack Dampier has posted 69 tackles and 7.5 TFLs, while sophomore LB Blake Delcambre has 64 stops and five for loss. In the secondary, junior S Justin Perry has notched five pass break-ups, and sophomore CB Kasey Brown has four break-ups and three interceptions.

Despite a pair of tough games, senior Seth Adams remains among the SEC's top quarterbacks, ranking fifth in passing average (201.0 ypg) and sixth in total offense (197.9 ypg). Senior RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis rushed for 62 yards on 13 carries at Auburn. Green-Ellis ranks fourth in the SEC rushing at 94.1 yards per game. He boasts three 100-yard performances, giving him seven in his career. Junior WR Mike Wallace has hauled in 10 passes of 30 or more yards and three of 50-plus this year. Wallace tops the SEC in yards per catch (19.8) and is third in yards per game (77.0).

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior K Robert Weeks has connected on 4-of-6 field goals and 13-of-14 PATs. He set school records in 2006 in most FGs made in a game (4 at Kansas, Sept. 2); most FGs made in a season (18); most FGs attempted in a season (24); and most points in a season by kicking (69).

Sophomore K Joshua Shene booted a 51-yard FG in the final seconds of the first half at Auburn, which was one yard short of his career long. Sophomore WR Dexter McCluster handled punt return duties for the first time this year with two returns for nine yards. McCluster got involved in kickoff returns the previous weeks against Arkansas and has three for 64 yards over the last two games.

Three former Rebels (Tim Henderson (OL), Rogers Loche (LB) and Gary Riggs (DB)) will be suiting up for Northwestern State ... Ole Miss is 38-10 versus non-conference opponents dating back to a 38-0 win over Tulane on Nov. 12, 1994 ... The Rebels are 28-6 in their last 34 non-conference games in Oxford.

THE COACHES

Watson Brown is in his first season at Miami and 13th overall with a record of 102-160-1 (.390). The Golden Eagles' offensive coordinator is Brown and the defensive coordinator is John Palermo.

Tommy Tuberville is in his ninth season at Auburn with a record of 77-32 (.706) and in his 13th season overall with a record of 102-52 (.662). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Al Borges and the defensive coordinator is Will Muschamp.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE TECH HAS THE BALL

Senior Derek White averages 116.8 yards per game, and with 1,051 yards this season, is the first Golden Eagle with more than 1,000 yards rushing since 1995. Senior Larry Shipp has caught at least one pass in all 41 games during his career, and needs 55 yards to break the school's all-time receiving record. Shipp caught seven balls for 191 yards and two scores against Samford.

Antonio Coleman took over a starting spot at defensive end after senior Quentin Groves was injured Sept. 29 at Florida, but the sophomore has played like a starter all season long. Coleman leads the team and is tied for 17th nationally in tackles for loss with 12.5, and also leads the Tigers in sacks (six). His 12.5 tackles for loss are already more than anyone on the squad had last season. Patrick Lee has been on an interception binge lately, picking off four passes in the last five games.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Each week it seems that somebody new steps up to lead the Golden Eagle defense. Against Tennessee State it was junior linebacker Corey Reed with 15 total tackles and four tackles-for-loss. Senior Maurice Smith leads the team and ranks second in the OVC with 87 tackles this season. He had 12 last week and 11 against Austin Peay and has had double figures in tackles in six of Tech's games.

Junior wide receiver Rodgeriquis Smith leads Auburn with 41 catches for 564 yards and five touchdowns. All three of those totals surpass what he accumulated during his first two seasons combined. Smith had his second 100-yard receiving game last Saturday against Ole Miss, catching eight balls for 111 yards and a score. He had a career-high nine catches for 102 yards Sept. 29 at Florida. In the last six weeks, Brandon Cox has completed 91-of-139 (.655) passes for 1,016 yards, five scores and just one interception, for a quarterback rating of 137.30.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Shipp had 301 all-purpose yards in the thr 59-52 loss to Samford, the second-best all-purpose game in school history. His total included two kickoff returns for 110 total yards, as he returned one kick for 88 yards for his school-record third kickoff for a touchdown this season. The three kickoff returns for a touchdown this season is most in the nation.

True freshman Wes Byrum has made 13 of 17 field goals, including game winners from 43 yards on the final play at No. 4 Florida Sept. 29 and 20 yards with 21 seconds at Arkansas Oct. 13. Redshirt freshman Ryan Shoemaker is second in the SEC in punting, averaging 43.6 yards per punt, while true freshman Patrick Tatum has averaged 42.2 yards per punt with eight of his 15 punts downed inside the 20-yard line.

Michael Desormeaux is averaging 110.4 rushing yards per game this season, which ranks 25th in the NCAA. In 12 career starts at quarterback, he has 1,234 yards on 199 carries (6.2 yards per carry/102.8 yards per game). Tyrell Fenroy is the first player in school history to post two 1,000-yard rushing seasons. On the year, Fenroy has 540 yards on 95 carries (5.7 yards per carry/67.5 yards per game). Derrick Smith leads the team with 35 receptions for 583 yards (16.7 yards per catch).

Eric Berry has started all eight games this season and is currently fifth on the team with 45 tackles after setting a career-high last weekend against South Carolina with 12. Dan Williams posted three TFLs for 11 yards vs. South Carolina. Three linebackers made at least 10 tackles vs. South Carolina, led by Rico McCoy with 14. Ryan Karl and Jerod Mayo had 12 and 11 stops, respectively, vs. South Carolina. McCoy leads the team with 64 tackles this season. Mayo is second with 62.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Brent Burkharter or Antwyne Zanders have led the team in tackles in every game with the only exception coming at UCF. Jarrett Jones recovered a blocked kick against Florida Atlantic and returned it for 53 yards for a touchdown. Daylon McCoy had four tackles, one TFL and his first career interception in the Troy game. McCoy scored on a 40-yard fumble return at ASU.

Erik Ainge is 22-9 as a starter in his career. He has an efficiency rating of 133.4, which is the third-best mark in the SEC this season. Ainge is third in Tennessee history in career passing yards with 7,191 and third in total offense with 6,977 yards. Arian Foster has 403 yards rushing and six touchdowns in his last four games, but gained just 75 yards vs. South Carolina. Lucas Taylor leads the team with 47 catches for 690 yards, including 4 grabs for 57 yards vs. South Carolina.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Drew Edmiston is 8-for-10 this season in field goal attempts with a long of 40 yards. His only misses have come from 44 yards against McNeese State and 41 yards at UCF. Derrick Smith leads the team with 16 kickoff returns for 364 yards—a 22.8-yard average—ranking him 86th in the nation.

Fulmer, now in his 16th season at the Big Orange reins, boasts a 4-0 career record against current members of the Sun Belt Conference, including a 48-27 win over Arkansas State earlier this season... Fulmer is 7-3 all-time against teams from the state of Louisiana... In the 14 Homecoming games that Phillip Fulmer has coached, Tennessee is 13-1 with an average margin of victory of 24.2 points... The only Homecoming loss in the Fulmer era came at the hands of Miami (Fla.), 26-3, in 2002.

Les Miles is in his third season at LSU with a record of 29-5 (.853) and in his 7th season overall with a record of 57-26 (.687). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is Bo Pelini.

Nick Saban is in his first season at Alabama and in his 14th season overall with a record of 112-61-1 (.647). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Major Applewhite and the defensive coordinator is Kevin Steele.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

QB Matt Flynn brings a 7-1 overall mark as a starter into the contest. In seven games this year, Flynn has thrown for 1,266 yards and 8 TDs and he's rushed for another 138 yards and a score. RB Jacob Hester leads the Tigers with 544 yards and 5 scores, while Brandon LaFell (30 rec., 412 yards, 1 TD) and Early Doucet (22 rec., 246 yards, 2 TDs) are LSU's top receivers.

Wallace Gilberry is the Tide's third-leading tackler this season with 45 stops, including 19 in his last three games. He also leads UA with four sacks, 10 quar-terback pressures and 12 tackles for loss. Rolando McClain is second on the team with 47 tackles. He has added 4.5 TFLs, two pass breakups and one sack. Simeon Castille leads the team with seven pass breakups.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

S Craig Steltz leads the team with 59 tackles, while DT Glenn Dorsey 39 tackles, 6.5 TFL and 4 sacks. In seven games this year, Highsmith ranks second on the squad in tackles with 56 tackles, which includes 6.0 tackles for losses and a 1.5 sacks. Highsmith is first on the team in pass breakups with six and he's also recorded a team-best six quarterback hurries to go with a forced fumble.

John Parker Wilson is 12-9 (.571) as the starting quarterback. In 26 career games, Wilson has completed 396 of 689 (.575) passes for 4,681 yards, with 30 touchdowns and 15 interceptions. Javier Arenas has four returns (3 punts and 1 kick-off) or more than 50 yards this season. Arenas is second in the SEC and 11th nationally with a 16.1 yard punt return average this season. Leigh Tiffin is 15-of-22 on field goal attempts this season and has been successful on seven of his last nine attempts.

Wide receiver Kenny McKinley tied a school record set by Zola Davis against Vanderbilt in 1998 by catching 14 passes for 151 yards.

Michael Grant is having an outstanding senior season at cornerback for the Razorbacks. He is second in the NCAA with 1.75 passes defended per game. The mark also leads the SEC outright. Jerrell Norton has five interceptions and nine pass breakups this season. The sophomore ranks tied for fifth nationally in interceptions and is tied for fourth in passes defended (1.63). Weston Dacus is the Hogs' leading returning tackler and is second on the tackles chart as a senior with 69 stops in eight games.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Sophomore defensive end Eric Norwood has performed at an all-league level for the Gamecocks along the defensive line. A Freshman All-American last season, Norwood is second on the squad with 51 tackles this season, including 14.0 tackles for loss, second in the SEC. He has 5.0 sacks this season, which places him seventh in the league, and 12.0 sacks in his career in the Garnet & Black. He also has been credited with a team-high six quarterback hurries and three pass break ups.

Darren McFadden ranks 11th nationally in rushing with 124.13 yards per game. That mark also leads the conference. He is averaging 153.38 all-purpose yards per game, which ranks 26th nationally and second in the SEC. McFadden needs seven yards to become the second player in the SEC to rush for 1,000 yards as a freshman, sophomore and junior. Felix Jones ranks 30th nationally and second in the SEC in rushing with 107.88 yards per contest. He has 863 yards rushing on the season with 10 touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Ryan Succop is 10-for-14 in field goal attempts this season. Three of his four misses have come from at least 47 yards out (47, 48 and 50). He was the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week against Georgia after drilling all three of his field goal attempts in the 16-12 win. He is 26-for-36 in field goal attempts in his career. He has converted 19 of his last 23 attempts from inside 47.

Jones has two kickoff returns for touchdowns this season on 90-yard and 82-yard bursts. He ranks sixth nationally in kickoff return average at 31.58 ypr. He currently leads the SEC in career kickoff return average at 28.4 yards per on 52 career returns. Alex Tejada is 14 for 17 on field goal attempts and 38 of 40 on PATs.
