2007 SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

December 1, 2007 • 4:00 p.m. ET
Georgia Dome (71,500) • Atlanta, Ga. • CBS Sports

The SEC's Eastern and Western Division winners will meet in Atlanta's Georgia Dome to battle for the league championship and the right to represent the conference in the Bowl Championship Series. The 16th-annual title game is set for December 1 and will be nationally televised by CBS Sports at 4:00 p.m. ET.

The game is a result of conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Under NCAA regulations, a conference with 12 members may play a 12th football game to determine its champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The participants of the game are determined each year during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the best overall SEC winning percentage in each division.

The 1994 SEC Championship Game earned a 10.5 rating and a 26 share, the highest rated SEC Championship Game in history.

The SEC Championship Game has also drawn capacity crowds in its short history. 1,120,836 fans have witnessed first-hand the pageantry of SEC Football at the 15 previous Championship Games.

Attendance at the 15 previous championship games has been 102.3 percent of stadium capacity, including 13 sellouts.

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

Each head coach is allowed one Instant Replay challenge per game, which is exercised by requesting a team timeout. A head coach may issue a challenge only if his team has one or more timeouts remaining in the half. If the challenged ruling is overturned, the timeout is not charged, but the coach has no more challenges during that game.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference, following approval by the NCAA Football Rules Committee, will implement the use of video replay on an experimental basis beginning with the 2005 football season.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds

2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones

3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - c. Touching of a kick

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

2007 SEC DIVISIONAL TIE-BREAKER

In the event of a tie for the division championship, the following procedures will be used to break all ties to determine the SEC Football Championship Game representative. All Conference versus Conference Games (both division and non-division) will be counted in the Conference Standings.

TWO-TEAM TIE. In the event two teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order:

- Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams;
- Records of the tied teams within the division;
- Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference record, and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- Overall record against non-divisional teams;
- Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional or non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game.

THREE-TEAM TIE (OR MORE). If three teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order: (Note: If one of the procedures results in one team being eliminated and two remaining, the two-team tiebreaker procedure as stated in No. 1 above will be used):

- Combined head to head record among the tied teams;
- Record of the tied teams within the division;
- Head to head competition against the team within the division with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- Overall Conference record against non divisional teams;
- Combined record against all common non divisional teams;
- Record against the common non divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through other common non divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest-ranked tied team. In this case, the head-to-head results of the top two ranked tied teams shall determine the representative in the SEC Championship Game.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE BOWLS

TEN SEC TEAMS ALREADY BOWL ELIGIBLE

Ten Southeastern Conference teams, the most the SEC has ever had, have already earned the six-win benchmark to be eligible for post-season play in 2007. Vanderbilt has five wins and needs one more win to reach the six-win total.

The most bowl-eligible teams for the SEC in its history in one season prior to 2007 was nine, which was during the 2000, 2001 and 2006 seasons. In eight other seasons, the SEC has had eight bowl-eligible teams, the latest coming in 2002.

While six wins is the basic eligibility to participate in post-season bowl games, NCAA rules state that a "deserving winning team" be eligible for bowl-season play.

The SEC has agreements to send eight of its teams to post-season bowls.

NCAA Rule 30.9.2 states, "A contest (bowl game) shall be licensed only if it serves the purpose of providing a national contest between deserving winning teams. A "deserving winning team" shall be defined as wone that has won a minimum of six games against football bowl subdivision opponents and that has more wins than losses."

Exceptions to NCAA Rule 30.9.2 exist. Those are:

"An institution with a record of six wins and six losses may be selected for participation in a bowl game under the following circumstances:

(a) The institution or its conference has a primary contractual affiliation, which existed prior to the first contest of the applicable season, with the sponsoring bowl organization. In the case of a conference contractual affiliation, all conference teams with winning records must be placed in one of the contracted bowl games before any institution with a record of six wins and six losses may be placed in a contracted bowl game. There shall be no contingency agreements with other sponsoring bowl organizations intended to enable an institution with a record of six wins and six losses to become eligible for those contests; or

(b) All contractual affiliations per Bylaw 30.9.2.1-(a) have been fulfilled and all institutions with winning records

30.9.2.2 Exception—Football Bowl Subdivision Opponent. [FBS] Each year, a football bowl subdivision institution may count one victory against a football championship subdivision opponent toward the six-win minimum, provided the opponent has averaged 90 percent of the permissible maximum number of grants-in-aid per year in football over a rolling two-year period.

30.9.2.2.1 Waiver. [FBS] The Football Issues Committee may approve a waiver of the 90 percent requirement to permit a football bowl subdivision institution to count a victory against a football championship subdivision opponent in football toward meeting the six-victory requirement when a unique or catastrophic situation affects the Division I-AA institution's ability to average 90 percent of the permissible maximum number of grants-in-aid per year in Division I-AA football over a rolling two-year period.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send eight of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2007 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection of available SEC teams.

2008 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2007 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2007 regular season, the Allstate BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in New Orleans on Jan. 7 at 8 p.m. EST. The Allstate BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2007 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, and the Orange Bowl on Jan. 3 at 8 p.m. ET.

SEC DIVISIONAL RACE SCENARIOS

Georgia and Tennessee are mathematically alive for the Eastern Division berth in the SEC Championship Game.

LSU has already clinched a berth in the SEC Championship Game as the Western Division champion.

Should Tennessee defeat Kentucky on Saturday, the Vols would be the Eastern Division representative.

Should Kentucky defeat Tennessee on Saturday, Georgia would be the Eastern Division representative.

Georgia has already clinched a share of the Eastern Division championship but lose a tie-breaker to Tennessee for the SEC Championship Game berth since the Bulldogs fell to the Vols earlier this season.

STATE OF THE SEC

Georgia has the SEC's best record during the last ten seasons. The Bulldogs are 105-32 (.766) with ten bowls, ten Top 25 AP appearances and two SEC championships during the last ten seasons. LSU has the best 5-year mark with a 62-14 record (81.6 percent). Below is a look at how each SEC team has fared during the last five and ten seasons:

THIS WEEK IN SEC FOOTBALL HISTORY

As the Southeastern Conference celebrates its 75th anniversary, here is a look at some of the highlights during the upcoming game dates in its history:



Nov. 23-24

1945-46 - Unranked Ole Miss goes to Starkville and beats #15 Mississippi State, 7-6, in 1945. The following year, State goes to Oxford and defeats the Rebels, 20-0.

1951 - #1 Tennessee defeats #9 Kentucky, 28-0, in Lexington to hold on to its #1 AP ranking. The Vols would defeat Vanderbilt the next week to win the National Championship.

1957 - #2 Auburn goes on the road to Florida State and defeats the Seminoles, 29-7. The Tigers vault to #1 in the AP poll the following week. Auburn would defeat Alabama and finish the season as AP National Champions.

1984 - Kentucky defeats Tennessee, 17-12, in Knoxville and finishes the regular season 8-3 and goes to the Hall of Fame Bowl. It is the last time that the Wildcats have defeated the Volunteers.

1996 - Needing a win for a berth in the SEC Championship Game, #15 Alabama needed a Freddie Kitchens to Dennis Riddle touchdown pass with 26 seconds left to defeat Auburn, 24-23.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

1992 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida and Georgia (6-2 in the SEC) were co-champions in the Eastern Division. The Gators won the tie-breaker by virtue of a 26-24 win over the Bulldogs earlier in the season. Alabama (8-0) was the outright Western Division champion, even with a game against Auburn in the final weekend, which the Tide won, 17-0.

1993 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division and Alabama won the Western Division. The Gators finished 1/2 game ahead of Tennessee (UT tied Alabama, 17-17). Alabama, at 5-2-1, finished two games ahead second-place Arkansas. Auburn was 8-0 in the SEC, but was ineligible for the conference title.

1994 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, two games ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with an 8-0 SEC mark, three games ahead of Miss. State.

1995 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 8-0, one game ahead of Tennessee. Arkansas won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, one game ahead of Auburn and Alabama.

1996 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 8-0, one game ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, tying LSU. However, the Tide defeated the Tigers, 26-0, earlier in the year to win the tie-breaker.

1997 - Eastern Division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Tennessee defeated Vanderbilt, 17-10, to win the division on the final weekend. Tennessee, at 7-1 in the SEC, finished one game ahead of Georgia and Florida. Auburn had won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, tying LSU. However, Auburn defeated LSU, 31-28, earlier in the year to win the tie-breaker.

1998 - Western Division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Miss. State defeated Ole Miss, 28-6, on Thanksgiving night, to win the division on the final weekend. Arkansas and Miss. State finished in a tie for the division title. However, Miss. State defeated Arkansas, 22-21, earlier that season to win the tie-breaker. Arkansas defeated LSU 41-14 on the final weekend, but when State defeated Ole Miss, the chase for the Championship Game had been won. Tennessee had clinched the Eastern Division before the final weekend and defeated Vanderbilt, 41-0, to finished the SEC at 8-0.

1999 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, one game ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with a 7-1 SEC mark, one game ahead of Miss. State.

2000 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, two games ahead of South Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee. Auburn won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, one game ahead of LSU. LSU lost to Arkansas in the final weekend, 14-3. Even if the Tigers would have beaten the Razorbacks, Auburn would have won the tie-breaker over LSU due to a 34-17 win earlier in the season.

2001 - Both races go down to the final weekend. Due to game postponements on Sept. 15, games were reschedule for Dec. 1. On that weekend, Tennessee defeated Florida, 34-32, in Gainesville, and LSU defeated Auburn, 27-14, in Baton Rouge, to clinch berths in the SEC Championship Game. The Vols won the East with a 7-1 mark while LSU had a 5-3 mark and tied with Auburn for the West, but won the head-to-head tiebreaker.

2002 - Western division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Georgia clinched the Eastern Division championship on Nov. 16 after defeating Auburn, 24-21, in Auburn. The 7-1 Bulldogs finish one game ahead of Florida, which was 6-2. Arkansas wins the Western Division on the season's final weekend, defeating LSU, 21-20, in Little Rock on Nov. 29. The Razorbacks, LSU Tigers and Auburn Tigers are tied at 5-3 but Arkansas wins the head-to-head tiebreakers.

2003 - Both races decided on final weekend. Tennessee defeats Kentucky, 20-7, to force a three-way tie for the Eastern Division championship between the Vols, Georgia and

Florida. Using a tie-breaker involving the BCS standings, Georgia has the highest BCS ranking and has defeated Tennessee (next highest ranking) during regular season to secure SEC Championship Game berth. LSU defeats Arkansas, 55-24, and Ole Miss beats Mississippi State, 31-0, to force a tie for the Western Division championship. LSU's 17-14 win over Ole Miss the week before earns the Tigers the Western Division berth.

2004 - Auburn clinches berth in the SEC Championship Game on Oct. 30, tying the earliest since the game began in 1992 (Alabama, 1993). The Tigers (8-0) finish two games ahead in the standings of second-place LSU (6-2). Tennessee clinches berth as Eastern Division representative with 38-33 win against Vanderbilt on Nov. 20. The Vols (7-1) would win their next game on the following weekend against Kentucky to claim the division title outright. Georgia was second in the Western Division with a 6-2 mark.

2005 - Georgia (6-2) clinched the Eastern Division Championship with a 45-13 win over Kentucky on Nov. 19. The Bulldogs finish one full game ahead of South Carolina and Florida in the standings. LSU clinched the Western Division title with a 19-17 win over Arkansas on Nov. 25. The Tigers finished tied for the Western Division title (7-1), but defeated Auburn, 20-17, on Oct. 22, to win the tie-breaker.

2006 - Florida (7-1) clinched Eastern Division Championship and berth in the SEC Championship Game on Nov. 4, by defeating Vanderbilt, 25-19. Arkansas clinched the Western Division title and SEC Championship Game berth with a 28-14 win over Mississippi State on Nov. 18.

2007 -- LSU (5-1) clinches Western Division berth in the SEC Championship Game on Week 11 after Alabama and Auburn both lose. Georgia and Tennessee remain alive for the Eastern Division berth going into Week 13.

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME RACE RECAP

The earliest a berth has been clinched in the SEC Championship Game is Oct. 30 (Auburn, 2004, & Alabama, 1993).

In nine of the 32 divisional races (counting 2007), a championship game berth has not been decided until the weekend prior to the SEC Championship Game. That occurred in 1997 (Tennessee), 1998 (Mississippi State), 2001 (Tennessee and LSU), 2002 (Arkansas), 2003 (Georgia and LSU), 2005 (LSU) and 2007 (Georgia or Tennessee).

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last five years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 171 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 79 named to the first-team.
- During the last eleven years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award. In 2006, Alabama track & field athlete Beth Mallory was named a recipient of this award.
- Florida's Chris Leak was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last five years, the SEC has had 11 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2007-08 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama baseball player Emeel Salem and Vanderbilt track & field athlete Erika Schneble were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2006-07.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. Tennessee swimmer Brad Boswell and Florida softball player Stacey Stevens were named recipients of this award in 2006-07.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had four sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Courtney Kupets of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics, Georgia's Kara Lynn Joyce won in Swimming & Diving and Tennessee's Monica Abbott was the top athlete in softball.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 66 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- Since 1990, the SEC has won 118 team and 805 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.8 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (268 of 349). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won more team national championships than any other conference in the nation. The SEC won 50 team titles since 2000, while the Pac-10 won 45 and the Big 12 won 21. The SEC won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, also the most of any conference.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES



ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

Alabama couldn't hold an early 7-0 lead over Louisiana-Monroe Saturday, turning the ball over four times in a 21-14 loss to the Warhawks at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

The loss drops Alabama's record to 6-5 (4-3 SEC) with one regular season game to go. Alabama will travel to Jordan-Hare Stadium in Auburn next Saturday. Kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m. and will be televised on ESPN. Saturday's 21-14 loss to ULM is Alabama's first to any current member of the Sun Belt Conference. Alabama is 15-1 against schools that are currently members of the Sun Belt Conference. Junior running back Jimmy Johns made his first career start for the Crimson Tide, starting the game at fullback. Johns rushed three times for 28 yards in the game, but committed a crucial turnover late in the game when he lost a fumble at the ULM 13 with 4:41 remaining in the fourth period ended Alabama's last scoring chance. Senior wide receiver Keith Brown had his most productive day of the 2007 season today with six catches for 97 yards and one touchdown. Terry Grant's 2007 season totals to 851 yards and eight touchdowns on 180 rushes, building on freshman records in all three categories.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS

Junior quarterback Casey Dick threw a career-high four touchdowns and the Razorbacks scored 24 unanswered points in the first half as Arkansas defeated Mississippi State, 45-31, in front of 55,185 fans at War Memorial Stadium. Dick finished the game completing 14-of-17 passes for 199 and the career-best four touchdowns. With the four touchdown passes, Dick moves into a tie for third place on the UA all-time list for touchdown passes (33) with Barry Lunney, Jr. Arkansas has now won nine-straight games vs. Mississippi State and 12 of their last 13. UA has now completed its seventh sweep of both Mississippi State and Ole Miss. Darren McFadden finished with 88 yards rushing and 162 all-purpose yards (88 rushing, 50 receiving and 24 returning). McFadden hauled in his second career touchdown pass on a 57-yard reception from Casey Dick in the third quarter. He caught a career-high four passes for 50 yards and a touchdown. McFadden also completed his third pass for his third touchdown of the season with a 24-yard TD strike to Robert Johnson in the third quarter. He is now 3 for 5 this season for 89 yards and three touchdowns.



FLORIDA GATORS

Tim Tebow threw for a career-high 338 yards and was 25 for 34 with three touchdowns in the No. 14 Gators' 59-20 victory over Florida Atlantic on Saturday. Tebow rushed for 31 yards and one touchdown in the victory. He became the only player in NCAA history to rush for more than 20 touchdowns and pass for more than 20 touchdowns in a season. Tebow has also rushed for more touchdowns, with 20, than any player in SEC history. Tebow was named one of 15 semifinalists for the Walter Camp Player of the Year Award last week by the Walter Camp Foundation. The honor is the fourth-oldest individual college football award in the nation. In a day filled with highlights, senior receiver Andre Caldwell had a career-high 13 receptions for 164 yards and surpassed Carlos Alvarez's school record (172) to become the all-time leader in receptions. The Gators will conclude their regular season when Florida State travels to The Swamp for a 5 p.m. meeting next Saturday. The game will air nationally on CBS.



AUBURN TIGERS

Auburn and Alabama meet Saturday, Nov. 24, in Jordan-Hare Stadium in the Iron Bowl. The two teams enter the game tied for second in the SEC West, with the winner earning a winning SEC record for the season as well as a second-place finish in the division. The Tigers will be attempting to win for the sixth straight time against Alabama, which would be the longest winning streak against the Crimson Tide in school history. The game will be nationally televised by ESPN. Auburn's five-game winning streak against Alabama matches the longest in school history. The Tigers previously won five in a row from 1954-58. In the last meeting between the teams at Jordan-Hare Stadium in 2005, Auburn set a school record with 11 quarterback sacks. Auburn is 6-2 all-time in games against Alabama in Jordan-Hare Stadium. * Auburn leads the SEC in scoring defense (17.3, seventh nationally) and is second in total defense (305.0, 11th nationally). During Will Muschamp's two seasons as defensive coordinator, Auburn has held 19 of its 24 opponents to 20 points or less.



GEORGIA BULLDOGS

Using 21 unanswered points in the second and third quarters, Georgia rallied for a 24-13 victory over Kentucky on Saturday at Sanford Stadium. The Bulldogs improved to 9-2 overall and finished 6-2 in the SEC. With the victory, Georgia's Mark Richt became only the 8th coach in NCAA Division IA history to record 70 or more wins in his first seven seasons as a head coach. The victory clinched at least a share of the SEC Eastern Division title., the fourth under Richt. He is now 70-19. Current coaches on the "70 in their first 7" list include Oklahoma's Bob Stoops (75-16) and USC's Pete Carroll (73-14). The Bulldogs need a Tennessee loss today or next week at UK to be outright Eastern Division champs. Georgia limited Kentucky to a season-low 13 points and surrendered just three points after four Bulldog turnovers. Coming in, the Wildcats were averaging 37.7 points a game. Georgia's leading tackler was freshman linebacker Rennie Curran with a career-high 13 followed by senior Thomas Flowers with a career-high seven. Redshirt freshman Knowshon Moreno registered his fifth consecutive 100-yard rushing game after tallying 124 yards on 22 carries and one touchdown.



KENTUCKY WILDCATS

Lones Seiber broke the single-season school record for most points by a kicker with 86. The old record was 81 by Seth Hanson in 1998. The Kentucky defense got a fourth turnover in the third quarter when Wesley Woodyard caused and recovered a fumble. Woodyard has caused three fumbles and recovered one this season. Quarterback André Woodson threw for 268 yards Saturday and moved past Tim Couch for second place on the UK career passing yardage list. Woodson has thrown for 8,572 yards as a Wildcat. Woodson has thrown for 200 yards and at least one touchdown in 17 consecutive games. Wesley Woodyard had 12 tackles, his fifth double-figure game of the season and 16th of his career. Woodyard has made at least four tackles in 35 consecutive games. Jacob Tammé had six pass receptions, giving him 121 in his career and moving him past James Whalen (120) for sixth place on the UK career receiving list. Tammé also became UK's all-time leading pass-catching tight end when he moved past Whalen.



SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES

LSU TIGERS



LSU remained No. 1 in the Bowl Championship Series Standings on Sunday, a day after the top-ranked Tigers shook off a pesky Ole Miss team for a 41-24 victory in Oxford. It's the second straight week in which the Tigers have occupied the top spot in the BCS Standings. The victory over Ole Miss ran LSU's record to 10-1 overall as the Tigers claimed the school's first outright Southeastern Conference Western Division title with the win over the Rebels. LSU goes into Friday's regular season finale against Arkansas with a 6-1 league record, one win shy tying the school-record for conference victories in a season. By recording its 10th win of the season against Ole Miss, the Tigers have now won at least 10 games for three straight years, a first in the history of the program. After this week's game against Arkansas, the Tigers will face either Georgia or Tennessee in the SEC Championship Game on Dec. 1 in the Georgia Dome. LSU needs wins in its next two games to advance to the BCS National Championship Game for the second time in four years. In this week's BCS Standings, the Tigers accumulated an average of .9904, which puts LSU ahead of second-place and undefeated Kansas, who has a .9488.

SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS



The South Carolina Gamecock football team (6-5, 3-5 SEC) took its annual team picture at Williams-Brice Stadium then worked out at the Bluff Road practice fields for about 90 minutes on Wednesday afternoon. The Gamecocks are enjoying their lone bye week of the season this week and are preparing for the regular season finale against Clemson. The annual Palmetto State football game between the University of South Carolina and Clemson University has been set for a 7 p.m. kick off at Williams-Brice Stadium on Nov. 24. The game will be televised nationally on ESPN2. Coach Steve Spurrier seemed to be pleased with how the team has practiced during the bye week. Coach Spurrier indicated he would keep tabs on the other football games being played this weekend. On the injury front, Mike Davis (concussion) and Carlos Thomas (right shoulder) wore yellow jerseys and were limited in their participation, while Kenny McKinley practiced for the first time this week following a right big toe injury. The Gamecocks will return to the practice fields on Thursday before taking the rest of the weekend off.

OLE MISS REBELS



Behind second-half heroics by Brent Schaeffer, Ole Miss outgained No. 1 LSU 466 to 396 in total offense but fell short on the scoreboard, 41-24, Saturday at a packed Vaught-Hemingway Stadium. Senior QB Schaeffer posted a career-high 208 passing yards on 13-of-28 attempts with a 33-yard TD to Shay Hodge and two interceptions. Schaeffer also rushed for a career-high 94 yards on eight attempts with his second career TD run in the fourth quarter from 38 yards out. Rebels tailback BenJarvus Green-Ellis earned his second-straight 1,000-yard season, with 53 yards rushing for a total of 1,020 with a game to go. The crowd of 61,118 was the fourth-largest in Vaught-Hemingway Stadium history. Sophomore WR Shay Hodge hauled in four passes for 90 yards with his fifth TD of the year. Sophomore WR Dexter McCluster topped the team in receptions with five for 73 yards. Marshay Green returned a punt 44 yards for a TD in the first quarter today. It marked Green's second career punt return for score (Mississippi State, 2006). Junior DB Jamarca Sanford led the unit with 10 total tackles. He has 34 stops in the last three games and has reached double-digit stops in five games.

TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS



Tennessee head coach Phillip Fulmer's record now stands at 145-44 (.767) in 16 seasons with the Vols. Fulmer owns a 58-18 record against the SEC East. Today marked the 100th home game for Fulmer, he is 84-16 inside Neyland Stadium. Tennessee finished the season 7-0 at home this season to go undefeated in Neyland Stadium for the first time since 1999. Under Fulmer, Tennessee has gone undefeated at home six times. (1993, 1995, 1997, 1998, 1999, 2007). Tennessee outscored Vanderbilt 16-0 in the final quarter to overcome a Vanderbilt 24-9 lead. The 15-point comeback is the second largest fourth quarter comeback in UT history. Tennessee overcame a 17-point deficit to LSU on Sept. 26, 2005. (UT trailed 24-7 entering the final quarter before going on to win 30-27 in overtime.) Senior quarterback Erik Ainge was 12-of-15 for 107 yards and two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to lead UT back from a 15-point deficit. Ainge finished the game 29-of-43 for 245 yards and three touchdowns. Junior tailback Arian Foster rushed 19 times for 106 yards. He now has career totals of 455 attempts for 2,190 yards. Tennessee did not allow a quarterback and has allowed just three on the year.

MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS



Despite Mississippi State's largest offensive day in five years, an equally-potent Arkansas offensive output, coupled with Bulldog turnovers, led the Razorbacks to a 45-31 victory over visiting Mississippi State Saturday afternoon at War Memorial Stadium. State fell to 6-5, 3-4. It marked the ninth consecutive win in the series for the Razorbacks who now own a 12-5-1 advantage over the Bulldogs all-time. The Razorbacks built a 24-7 halftime lead Saturday and though State never gave in - outscoring UA 24-21 in the second half - those three Arkansas touchdowns were enough to preserve the victory. For the game, the Bulldogs outgained the Razorbacks offensively, 501 yards to 429. Jamayel Smith and Wesley Carroll would both end the afternoon with career numbers. Smith grabbed 10 receptions for 208 yards (most by a Bulldog since 1982) and two scores. The true freshman Carroll completed 29-of-51 attempts for 421 yards (most by a Bulldog since 1994) and four scores, but would also suffer four interceptions.

VANDERBILT COMMODORES



Trailing 9-7 with 47 seconds to play in the first half, a 19-yard touchdown catch by Jeff Jennings led to 17 unanswered points by the Commodores. With Vanderbilt holding a 24-9 advantage entering the fourth quarter, Tennessee scored 16 unanswered points to end the game. Senior linebacker Jonathan Goff tied a career high with 14 tackles, including seven solo stops. Goff's 14 stops marked the fourth time in his career and second time this season (Georgia) that he has made 14 tackles. When Mackenzi Adams connected with Brad Allen for the Commodores' first touchdown of the game, it capped a 17-play, 78-yard drive that spanned 9:02. The drive marked a season-high for plays and time. The previous long was a 15-play drive that spanned 8:47 against Auburn. Thrust into action with Sean Walker and Earl Bennett both suffering injuries on consecutive plays in the second quarter, sophomore Alex Washington had a career day as a receiver. Washington led the team with three catches for 45 yards. Included were two third-down receptions on Vanderbilt's scoring drive to open the second half.

Ed Orgeron is in his third season at Ole Miss and overall with a record of 9-25 (.265). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Dan Werner and the defensive coordinator is John Thompson.

Sylvester Croom is in his fourth season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 15-29 (.341). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorvey and the defensive coordinator is Ellis Johnson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Senior RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis has topped the 1,000-yard rushing mark for the second straight year. Brent Schaeffer came off the bench vs. LSU to rush for 94 yards and throw for 208 — both career highs. He completed 13-of-28 passes with two interceptions and a 33-yard TD toss to Shay Hodge, making consecutive games for the duo to hook up for a score. He is averaging 92.7 yards per game with four 100-yard games.

The Bulldogs rank fifth in the conference in both total defense (343.3 ypg) and pass defense (188.3 ypg). Jamar Chaney is the top tackler with 73 total stops, while fellow junior LB Dominic Douglas has recorded 69 tackles with eight TFLs. Senior DL Titus Brown is among the SEC leaders with 12 TFLs and eight sacks, and sophomore DB Anthony Johnson boasts three interceptions and eight pass break-ups.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Greg Hardy notched two sacks against LSU, giving him three games this year with multiple QB sacks, 10.0 total sacks and 18.0 tackles for loss. Hardy tops the SEC and ranks third in the NCAA in both sacks (1.11 pg) and TFLs (2.00 pg) and is also the conference leader in forced fumbles (0.33 pg). Junior DL Peria Jerry has been a force of late, totaling 10.0 TFLs and 39 total tackles in the last seven games. He is fifth in the SEC in TFLs with 13.5.

The MSU offense averages 140.3 rushing yards and 168.0 passing yards per game. Sophomore RB Anthony Dixon directs the ground game with 954 yards and an SEC-high 13 TDs. True freshman QB Wesley Carroll has settled in at signal-caller and completed 113-of-209 passes for 1,223 yards with eight TDs and five interceptions. Senior Tony Burks and junior Jamayel Smith lead the receiving corps with 30 catches for 418 yards and 28 for 455, respectively.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Ole Miss had a return for a TD for the second consecutive game. After Mike Wallace took a kickoff back 77 yards for a score against Northwestern State, Marshay Green returned a punt 44 yards for a TD in the LSU game. It marked Green's second career punt return for score (Mississippi State, 2006). Joshua Shene has connected on 11-of-16 FGs this year and leads the team in scoring with 55 points.

Junior K Adam Carlson has converted 8-of-11 field goals and 30-of-31 PATs. Derek Pegues is now tied for first on the school's all-time kick return (78) chart and is nearing the top of the school's kick return yardage (1,753) list as well. Pegues' kickoff returns are tied for the sixth most in SEC history and his yardage is ninth-most ever in the league.

Les Miles is in his third season at LSU with a record of 32-5 (.865) and in his 7th season overall with a record of 60-26 (.698). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is Bo Pelini.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Darren McFadden ranks fourth nationally in rushing with 138.1 yards per game. That mark also leads the conference. He is averaging 174.27 all-purpose yards per game, which ranks 14th nationally and tops in the SEC. Casey Dick tied an Arkansas record with four touchdown passes while completing 14-of-17 passes for 199 yards in Arkansas' 45-31 win over Mississippi State. Dick's 82.4 completion percentage ranks third on the Arkansas single-game record list.

Defensively, S Craig Steltz leads the Tigers with 73 tackles and 6 interceptions. Steltz has been named the SEC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Tigers' 41-24 win over Ole Miss. Steltz recorded five tackles and intercepted a pair of passes in the win over the Rebels. Glenn Dorsey has managed to accumulate 55 overall tackles this year, despite being double and triple-teamed on just about every snap. In addition to his 55 tackles, he has recorded 11.5 tackles for losses and six sacks.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Michael Grant is tied for eighth in the NCAA with 1.45 passes defended per game. The mark is also tied for the SEC outright lead with LSU's Chevis Jackson. UA coaches' film has Grant credited with 15 this season, which is the second-most in school history. Jerrell Norton has five interceptions and 10 pass breakups this season. He ranks tied for 20th nationally in interceptions and is tied for 26th in passes defended (1.27).

RB Jacob Hester leads the Tigers in rushing with 771 yards and 9 TDs, while QB Matt Flynn has thrown for 2,024 yards and 14 TDs. When Flynn threw for a career-best 353 yards against Alabama on Nov. 3, he became only the seventh quarterback in LSU history to throw for 300 or more yards in two games in the same season. During his LSU career, Hester has 60 receptions from the running back position, a figure that ranks just outside of the top six in LSU history.

SPECIAL TEAMS

True freshman PK Alex Tejada is making a big impact early in his Razorback career. Tejada is 17 for 21 on field goal attempts and 51 of 53 on PATs. Tejada is tied for 24th nationally in field goal made (1.55) and also tied for 20th in scoring 9.27 points per game. Tejada's 51 PATs is a school record, while his 102 points is tied for the most in school history with Kendall Trainor's 1988 season.

LSU junior PK Colt David has kicked his way into the LSU record books as he now holds the school's single-season record for field goals (21) and points (122). With a pair of field goals against Ole Miss, David moved past David Browndyke (19 field goals in 1988) for first place in LSU history for field goals in a season.

Rich Brooks is in his fifth season at Kentucky with a record of 23-34 (.404) and in his 23rd season overall with a record of 114-143-4 (.444). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Joker Phillips and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Erik Ainge is 24-9 as a starter in his career. He has an efficiency rating of 132.7, which is the third-best mark in the SEC this season. He is third in the conference in passing yardage as well (228.3 yds/gm). Arian Foster has 692 yards rushing and nine touchdowns in his last seven games after rushing for 106 yards vs. Vanderbilt. Foster is third in the SEC in rushing touchdowns with 12 and fifth in yards per game with 89.9. Lucas Taylor leads the team with 65 catches for 872 yards, including nine grabs for 90 yards and a score vs. Vanderbilt.

Linebacker Wesley Woodyard leads the SEC in tackles, averaging 10.3 per game. Woodyard has recorded at least four tackles in 35 consecutive games, every game since the start of the 2005 season. He ranks ninth in school history with 370 stops in his career. Defensive end Jeremy Jarmon is second in the SEC and 17th nationally in sacks with 9.0 on the year.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Jerod Mayo led the team with a career-high 15 stops vs. Vanderbilt. Rico McCoy posted 11 tackles and Ryan Karl posted six. Three linebackers made at least 10 tackles vs. South Carolina, led by McCoy with 14. Mayo leads the team with 93 tackles, followed by McCoy with 89 and Karl with 70. Jonathan Hefney led the unit with eight stops vs. Vanderbilt. Eric Berry has 11 tackles and two interceptions in the last two games.

Quarterback André Woodson leads the SEC in passing yards per game, averaging 265.5 ypg. He has thrown for at least 200 yards and one touchdown in 17 straight games. He ranks second in the SEC and 19th nationally in passing efficiency (143.9). Tight end Jacob Tamme became Kentucky's all-time reception leader giving him 121 for his career, after snagging six balls in the loss to Georgia.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN WAKE FOREST HAS THE BALL

Quarterback Riley Skinner completed 20 of 29 passes for 208 yards Saturday. It was the sixth time this season Skinner has eclipsed the 200-yard mark passing. Skinner's 62-yard touchdown pass to Jordan Williams was the Deacons' longest pass play of the year. Wide receiver Kenneth Moore set the school record for receptions in a season. He caught eight passes vs. NC State to give him 78 on the season.

Senior LB Jonathan Goff posted 14 total tackles vs. Tennessee, giving him a single-season career high of 100 tackles this year. His previous high was 93 tackles last year. Goff has notched at least 11 tackles in four of his last six games. Playing hurt, D.J. Moore contributed four total tackles and a defensed pass while making virtually every defensive snap. Moore is tied for third in the SEC with five interceptions.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Aaron Curry's fourth-quarter interception return for a touchdown was Wake's 10th non-offensive touchdown of the season. The Deacons are one shy of the ACC record set by Georgia Tech in 1998. Curry has returned three interceptions for touchdowns this season which ties the NCAA season record for a linebacker. Cornerback Alphonso Smith had the first two-interception game of his career. Smith now has six picks on the season, three of which have been returned for touchdowns.

Through 11 games, Bennett is tied for the SEC lead with with 69 receptions and ranks 7th with 765 receiving yards. He also has four touchdown catches. He has 22 more catches than any other receiver in SEC history. Bennett is on pace to reach 75 receptions for the third consecutive year. He is the only receiver in SEC history to post consecutive seasons of 75 receptions. Bennett is also trying to lead the SEC in receiving for the third consecutive year.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Sam Swank has kicked a field goal in eight straight games this season. Swank has converted 99 straight PATs. Swank was named 1st Team All-American by Sports Illustrated last season and voted ACC Championship Game's Most Valuable Player. He was both a Lou Groza and Ray Guy Award semifinalist.

Vanderbilt special teams were solid for most of the Tennessee game. Brett Upson enjoyed his finest punting effort of the season, Bryant Hahnfeldt was converting on field goals, and coverage teams were limiting Volunteer yardage. With Vanderbilt holding a 24-22 lead, the Vols returned an Upson punt 45 yards to the Vanderbilt 25, setting up the go-ahead field goal. Moore also ranks third with a 28.0-yard average on kickoff returns.

Mark Richt is in his seventh season at Georgia and overall with a record of 70-19 (.787). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinator is Willie Martinez.

Chan Gailey is in his sixth season at Georgia Tech with a record of 44-31 (.587) and ninth overall with a record of 68-42 (.618). The Yellow Jackets' offensive coordinator is John Bond and the defensive coordinator is Jon Tenuta.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Senior Sean Bailey leads the team with 34 receptions for 512 yards and four TDs. Junior Mohamed Massaquoi ranks second on the team in receptions (21 for 363) and TD catches with three including the longest in the SEC this year, an 84-yarder from Matthew Stafford against #9 Florida. Knowshon Moreno leads the Bulldogs in rushing with 1,228 yards, which is the seventh-best total in school history. His rushing total ranks at the fifth best ever by an SEC freshman.

Individually, three Yellow Jackets rank in the top 45 nationally in tackles-for-loss -- senior defensive end Darrell Robertson (14th), junior tackle Vance Walker (37th) and senior linebacker Gary Guyton (45th). Walker (8.5 sacks), Robertson (6.5) and senior linebacker Philip Wheeler (6.0) all rank in the top 10 in the ACC, and in the top 70 nationally, in sacks.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA TECH HAS THE BALL

The two most consistent performers have been junior Dannell Ellerbe and freshman Rennie Curran. Ellerbe leads the team with 77 tackles. He has been the leading tackler for the Bulldogs in six games this year. Curran had his most impressive performance of the season, after registering a team-high 13 tackles (12 solo) against #22 Kentucky. Kelin Johnson returned to the lineup against #18 Auburn and responded with a pair of interceptions.

Tashard Choice (117.6 ypg), who has battled knee and hamstring injuries, leads the ACC and ranks 20th nationally in rushing. Choice has rushed for 100 yards seven times this season and 17 times in his career, including a 142-yard effort last week against North Carolina. Over the last two games, quarterback Taylor Bennett has produced a pass efficiency rating of 141.9.

SPECIAL TEAMS

For his career, Brandon Coutu is 50-for-63 in FGs including 5-for-11 from 50+ yards. Also, he is a perfect 108-for-108 in PATs (third in the nation for active kickers). This season, Coutu is 15-20 in FG attempts (two of those attempts were from more than 50 yards).

All you need to know about Georgia Tech senior punter Durant Brooks is that he has the highest career punting average in the ACC -- ever. Brooks ranks sixth in the nation in punting despite handling nearly all of Tech's pooch-punt situations. He had punts of 77 and 63 yards last week against North Carolina. Senior kicker Travis Bell, who leads the ACC in scoring (8.8 ppg), kicked the game-winning field goal against North Carolina last week.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Georgia and Georgia Tech will meet for the 100th time since 1883 with the Bulldogs leading the series 58-36-5... The winner of the game receives the Governor's Cup Trophy... Georgia has won all six games in the Mark Richt era... Prior to his arrival, the Yellow Jackets had a three-game win streak... Last season, the Bulldogs rallied for a 15-12 victory after trailing 3-0 at the half... Georgia became the first unranked Bulldog squad to defeat a ranked Georgia Tech squad in the series history... The Yellow Jackets were ranked 16th at the time and they were 8-0 in this type of matchup.

THE COACHES

Bobby Bowden is in his 32nd season at FSU with a record of 300-85-4 (.776) and in his 42nd season overall with a record of 373-117-4 (.759). The Seminoles' offensive coordinator is Jimbo Fisher and the defensive coordinator is Mickey Andrews.

Urban Meyer is in his third season at Florida with a record of 30-7 (.811) and in his seventh season overall with a record of 68-15 (.819). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Dan Mullen and the defensive co-coordinators are Greg Mattison and Charlie Strong.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA STATE HAS THE BALL

Drew Weatherford's streak of passes without an interception is at 197 entering the game versus Florida. This season the redshirt junior QB has one pick in 233 attempts. Weatherford, who now has nine career 300-yard passing games, has thrown for at least 300 yards in two of the last four games. Preston Parker showed just how valuable and versatile he is this past week when he moved from wide receiver to tailback and went for 133 yards versus Maryland.

This season, Brandon Spikes and Dustin Doe rank as Florida's leading tacklers with 108 and 72, respectively. Against South Carolina, Tony Joiner made his second interception of the season, which is tied for the top total on the squad (Wondy Pierre-Louis). Defensive end Derrick Harvey recorded one and a half sacks at Kentucky to bring his career total to 18.5. With the effort, Harvey improved to ninth on Florida's all-time career list.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Patrick Robinson's interception in the first quarter versus Maryland was his team-leading sixth of the season. Robinson is now tied for fourth in the nation in interceptions per game and he is tied for the ACC lead as well. Nearly one of every four of junior linebacker Geno Hayes' tackles this season has been for minus yardage. He has 71 total tackles with 17.5 (.246) coming behind the line of scrimmage.

With his rushing touchdown against Florida Atlantic, Tim Tebow became the first player in NCAA Division I-A history to run and pass for 20-or-more touchdowns in the same season (20 rush, 26 pass). Tim Tebow's passer rating of 177.5 is the second-highest in the nation. Andre Caldwell had 13 catches for 164 yards against Florida Atlantic to establish the new UF career record for receptions (177).

SPECIAL TEAMS

Gary Cismesia tied his career-high, which is also a FSU single-game record, with five field goals versus UM. Junior punter Graham Gano averaged 46.0 yards on three punts against Maryland to mark the eighth time in 11 games he has averaged more than 40 yards per kick this season.

On the season, Chas Henry has punted 32 times for an average of 38.9 yards. His season-long (53 yards) came in UF's outing against Georgia. He has placed 12 inside the 20-yard line this season. Joey Ijjas is 61-of-62 on extra points on the year and is nine-of-12 on field goals. Brandon James is averaging 29.0 yards per kickoff return (112th nationally, second in the SEC).

THE COACHES

Tommy Bowden is in his ninth season at Clemson with a record of 68-41 (.624) and in his 11th season overall with a record of 86-45 (.656). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Rob Spence and the defensive coordinator is Vic Koenning.

Steve Spurrier is in his third season at South Carolina with a record of 21-15 (.583) and in his 18th season overall with a record of 163-55-2 (.745). Spurrier serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN CLEMSON HAS THE BALL

Cullen Harper leads the ACC in passing efficiency with a 148.9 figure. Harper also leads the ACC in touchdown passes with year with 26, one more than Boston College quarterback Matt Ryan. James Davis gained 166 yards rushing at NC State, the second best performance of his career. He added 129 in the win over Maryland, and 118 more at Duke, so he has three 100-yard games in ACC road games this year.

A Freshman All-American last season, Eric Norwood is third on the squad with 60 tackles this season, including 16.0 tackles for loss, fourth in the SEC. He has 5.0 sacks this season, which places him 10th in the league, and 12.0 sacks in his career. He also has been credited with a team-high seven quarterback hurries and three pass break ups. Despite missing one game and most of a second, Emanuel Cook leads the team with 83 tackles, including 68 solo stops.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Phillip Merling was named ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week for the third time this year when he won the award for his performance against Boston College on November 17. Merling had six tackles in the game, including two quarterback sacks and three quarterback pressures. Nick Watkins has had six double figure tackle games with his 15 tackles against Wake Forest serving as his season high. He now has 112 tackles for the season, 34 more than any other Tiger.

Cory Boyd has rushed for a career-high 829 yards this season and has a chance to become the Gamecocks first 1,000-yard rusher since Derek Watson ran for 1,066 in 2000. He ran for 823 rushing yards last year. Over the past three games, Mitchell has completed 84-of-138 passes (60.9 percent) for 970 yards and four touchdowns. The LaGrange, Ga. native is 13-9 in 22 career starts.

SPECIAL TEAMS

For the season, Clemson is now second in the ACC in kickoff return average. C.J. Spiller, who had an 84-yard kickoff return for a score at Duke, has a 32.8 average per return, but is not nationally ranked because he does not have enough attempts. He returned a kickoff for a touchdown in consecutive weeks against Duke and Wake Forest, the first player in Clemson history to do that.

True freshman Chris Culliver is seventh in the SEC in kickoff returns, averaging 25.2 yards per return, with three 44-yard returns. Ryan Succop has scored 158 points in his career, tying Jeff Grantz for 10th on the USC career list for points scored. Captain Munnerlyn is fifth in the SEC in punt returns, averaging 9.2 yards per return.

This will be the 105th meeting between the two in-state rivals in a series that dates back to 1896... Clemson holds the all-time lead in the series, 63-37, while four games have ended in a tie... CU has won four of the last five contests and eight of the last 10 meetings, but the Gamecocks posted a 31-28 win in Clemson last season... THE COACHES

Nick Saban is in his first season at Alabama and in his 14th season overall with a record of 112-64-1 (.636). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Major Applewhite and the defensive coordinator is Kevin Steele.

Tommy Tuberville is in his ninth season at Auburn with a record of 78-33 (.703) and in his 13th season overall with a record of 103-53 (.660). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Al Borges and the defensive coordinator is Will Muschamp.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

DJ Hall leads the SEC averaging 83.5 receiving yards per game. Hall needs one touchdown reception to tie Dennis Homan's school record of 18 career TD catches. John Parker Wilson has 15 career 200-yard passing games, which is a new school record. In 29 career games, Wilson has completed 447 of 794 (.563) passes for 5,282 yards, with 34 touchdowns and 20 interceptions.

Antonio Coleman leads the team and is tied for 10th nationally in tackles for loss with 17, and also leads the Tigers in sacks (seven), which ranks sixth in the SEC. His 17 tackles for loss are the most by an Auburn player since 1995 and tied for fourth best by a Tiger since tackles for loss began being charted in 1981. Patrick Lee has picked off four passes in the last seven games. Senior Quentin Groves ranks second among among active NCAA players in career sacks with 26.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Rashad Johnson is tied for the SEC lead and tied for fourth nationally with six interceptions. Alabama leads the SEC averaging 7.1 tackles for loss per game. Wallace Gilberry is the Tide's second-leading tackler this season with 69 stops. He also leads UA with nine sacks, 12 quarterback pressures and 22 tackles for loss. He has 17 TFLs in his last six games for the Tide.

Junior wide receiver Rodgeriquis Smith leads Auburn with 45 catches for 614 yards and five touchdowns. Brandon Cox has led Auburn on scoring drives that gave Auburn the lead with less than four minutes left in the game five times this season. Cox is now third on Auburn's all-time passing yardage list with 6,631 yards. Montez Billings had just one catch in the first four games, but has 23 in the last seven, including 11 catches combined at Arkansas and LSU.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Javier Arenas is second in the SEC and 12th nationally in punt returns, averaging 15.4 yards per return. Leigh Tiffin's 21 field goals are tied for the most in the SEC this season, and he has made his last nine in a row.

Auburn leads the nation in net punting, averaging 39.7 net yards per punt. Redshirt freshman Ryan Shoemaker, who leads the SEC averaging 44.2 yards per punt and has had just one touchback with 12 punts inside the 20-yard line. True freshman Patrick Tatum has also punted 16 times this season, averaging 43.7 yards per punt with nine of his 16 punts landing inside the 20-yard line.
