THE GAME

Auburn makes its eighth straight bowl appearance and 34th overall when the Tigers meet Clemson in the 2007 Chick-fil-A Bowl. It will be the fourth trip to the Atlanta-based bowl for Auburn and first since 2001 when North Carolina defeated Auburn, 16-10. The last time Auburn and Clemson played was also in the Peach Bowl (now the Chick-fil-A Bowl), with Auburn claiming a 21-17 victory on Jan. 2, 1998.

AUBURN HEADLINES

- ▶ Auburn's 34 bowl games are the 16th-highest total of any school. The Tigers are tied for 13th in bowl victories with 18.
- ▶ Since the 1974 Gator Bowl, Auburn is 13-6-1 in bowl games, with three winning streaks of at least three games.
- ▶ Tommy Tuberville has led Auburn to eight straight bowl games, which is the second-longest streak in school history.
- ▶ Auburn's senior class has a chance to set the school record for victories in a four-year period with a win in the Chick-fil-A Bowl. A victory would be Auburn's 42nd in the last four years.
- ▶ Auburn's record during the past four seasons of 41-9 (.820) ranks the Tigers sixth out of all Football Bowl Subdivision teams during that span.
- ▶ Auburn leads the SEC in scoring defense (16.7, sixth nationally) and is second in total defense (298.3, eighth nationally).
- ▶ During Will Muschamp's two seasons as defensive coordinator, Auburn has held 20 of its 25 opponents to 20 points or less.
- ▶ Antonio Coleman is tied for 17th nationally with 17 tackles for loss, which is the most by an Auburn player since 1995, and also leads the team with seven quarterback sacks.
- ▶ Brandon Cox is tied with Pat Sullivan for third on Auburn's career victories list by a starting quarterback with 26.
- ▶ Auburn has led at the half in 11 of its 12 games, and after three quarters in 10 of the 12 contests.
- ▶ Auburn has scored on its opening drive in six of its last eight games, averaging 11.3 plays and 70.8 yards on those six scoring drives.
- ▶ Auburn has a turnover ratio of +10 in its eight victories and -9 in its four losses.
- ▶ Of Auburn's 292 points scored this season, 202 (69.2 percent) have been scored by underclassmen.

AUBURN'S BOWL HISTORY

This season's bowl appearance marks the 34th time that the Tigers have played in a bowl game, which is the 16th-highest total of any school. Auburn has an 18-13-2 record in its previous 33 bowl games, and has played in a bowl game in 20 of the last 26 years.

The Tigers are appearing in a bowl game for the eighth straight year, which is the second-longest streak in school history. Auburn had a streak of nine straight bowl appearances from 1982-90 as well as a streak of seven straight from 1968-74.

Since the 1974 Gator Bowl, Auburn is 13-6-1 in bowl games, winning four consecutive from 1974-84 ('74 Gator, '82 Tangerine, '83 Sugar, '84 Liberty) and three straight from 2003-05 ('03 Capital One, '03 Music City, '05 Sugar). The Tigers also won last year's bowl game, defeating Nebraska, 17-14, in the 2007 AT&T Cotton Bowl Classic.

TUBERVILLE IN BOWL GAMES

Tommy Tuberville is 5-3 all-time in bowl games as a head coach, including a 4-3 mark at Auburn. Tuberville guided the Tigers to three consecutive bowl wins, defeating Virginia Tech, 16-13, in the 2005 NOKIA Sugar Bowl, Wisconsin, 28-14, in the 2003 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl, and Penn State, 13-9, in the 2003 Capital One Bowl. He also led Auburn to a 17-14 victory over Nebraska in last season's AT&T Cotton Bowl Classic.

Tuberville also guided the Tigers to the 2006 Capital One Bowl (24-10 loss to Wisconsin), 2001 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl (16-10 loss to North Carolina) and 2001 Capital One Florida Citrus Bowl (31-28 loss to Michigan). As head coach at Ole Miss, Tuberville led the Rebels to a 34-31 win in the 1997 Motor City Bowl.

As both a head coach and an assistant coach, Tuberville is 10-6 in bowl games. While an assistant at Miami, Tuberville was 5-3 in bowl games, including five straight wins from 1988 to 1992 and three national championships.

IN THE CHICK-FIL-A BOWL

Auburn has made three previous appearances in the Chick-fil-A Bowl (formerly the Peach Bowl), with all three appearances coming since the 1990 season. In 1990, the Tigers beat Indiana, 27-23, and Auburn earned a 21-17 victory over Clemson to end the 1997 season. In Auburn's last appearance, the Tigers fell to North Carolina, 16-10, in 2001.

RECORDS SET AT CHICK-FIL-A BOWL

Auburn's previous appearances in the Chick-fil-A Bowl have resulted in some record-setting performances in the passing and kicking games. Stan White completed 31 passes in the 1990 Peach Bowl, which is an Auburn bowl record, and his 48 attempts is tied for the school

bowl record, as is the 48 attempts by Dameyune Craig in the 1998 Peach Bowl. Herbert Casey's 159 yards receiving in 1990 game ties an Auburn bowl record, while Karsten Bailey ranks fifth with 119 yards receiving in the 1998 game. Victor Hall had nine catches in the 1990 game, which ranks second best in Auburn bowl history.

Jaret Holmes' 52-yard field goal in the 1998 contest is tied for the longest in Auburn bowl history and Chick-fil-A Bowl history, while Damon Duval's 67-yard punt in 2001 is a Chick-fil-A Bowl record.

TIGERS' BOWL NOTABLES

Auburn is 16th in the NCAA all-time in bowl appearances (34) and tied for 13th all-time in bowl victories (18) ... The Tigers are 10-3-2 in bowl games when scoring first ... Auburn is 12-2 in bowl games when scoring 20 or more points ... Auburn has been held to fewer than 20 points in five of its last six bowl games, but is 3-2 in those five contests ... Auburn has never been shut out in a bowl game ... The Tigers have worn blue jerseys in 11 of their last 14 bowl games, going 5-5-1 in those 11 games.

AUBURN IN DOMES

Auburn has played 11 games in its history in domed stadiums, including seven bowl games. The Tigers are 4-6-1 all-time in domes, including a 3-3-1 mark in bowl games. Auburn owns a 2-3 record in the Georgia Dome, including a 1-2 mark in the SEC Championship Game and a 1-1 record in the Peach Bowl. The Tigers are also 2-1-1 in the Sugar Bowl (Superdome), 0-1 in the Astro/Bluebonnet Bowl (Astrodome) and 0-1 at Syracuse (Carrier Dome).

CLEMSON QUICK HITTEES

Clemson finished tied for second in the Atlantic Division of the ACC with a 5-3 record, one game behind Boston College ... Clemson will be making its 30th bowl game appearance, including the Tigers' third in a row ... Nine of Clemson's 12 games were decided by double digits ... Clemson ranks sixth in the nation in total defense (297.1) and 10th in scoring defense (18.3) ... The Tigers are tied for ninth nationally in turnover margin at +12 ... Clemson led the ACC and ranks 23rd nationally in scoring offense (34.2) ... James Davis ranks second in the conference and 51st nationally in rushing at 82.7 yards per game, and needs just eight yards to go over 1,000 for the season ... Cullen Harper leads the ACC in passing efficiency (146.90) and is second in total offense (233.4) ... Harper's 27 touchdown passes are a Clemson single-season record ... Aaron Kelly tops the ACC in receiving yards per game (87.1) and is second in receptions per game (7.0) ... C.J. Spiller ranks eighth nationally in kick-off returns (29.6) ... Auburn and Clemson will meet during the 2010 (at Auburn) and 2011 (at Clemson) seasons.

2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

CLEMSON CONNECTIONS

- ▶ Clemson head coach Tommy Bowden was the offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach at Auburn from 1991-96 and the running backs coach in 1980. The Tigers were 40-26-2 during his stint as offensive coordinator.
- ▶ Auburn tight ends coach Steve Ensminger was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Clemson from 1997-98.

AUBURN-CLEMSON HISTORY

Auburn and Clemson have met 45 times, with Auburn holding a 32-11-2 edge in the series. The teams last met in the 1998 Peach Bowl following the 1997 season, with Auburn scoring 15 unanswered points in the fourth quarter for a 21-17 victory. Prior to that, the teams played each year from 1967-71, with Auburn winning all five games. In fact, Auburn has won the last 12 games in the series dating back to a 34-0 Clemson victory in 1951. The first meeting was in 1899, with Auburn winning at home, 34-0.

HEISMAN CONNECTION

Perhaps the most famous name in college football - John Heisman - has connections to both Auburn and Clemson. Heisman was the head coach at Auburn from 1895-99, accumulating a career record of 12-4-2 record. In 1900, he left Auburn for Clemson, where he served as head coach from 1900-03, posting a 19-3-2 record. He even brought his 1902 Clemson squad to Auburn, earning a 16-0 victory.

AGAINST THE ACC

Auburn has played 200 games against current members of the ACC over the years, and has played every member at least twice. Auburn owns a record of 118-75-7 (.608) against the ACC schools and has a winning record against seven schools (Clemson - 32-11-1; Florida State - 13-4-1; Georgia Tech - 47-41-4; Maryland - 2-1; Miami - 7-4; Virginia Tech - 3-1-1; Wake Forest - 6-2), a .500 record against three schools (Duke - 3-3; NC State - 1-1; Virginia - 1-1) and a losing record against only two schools (Boston College - 1-2; North Carolina - 2-4). The Tigers have played five bowl games against current members of the ACC, alternating wins and losses for a 3-2 all-time record.

TUBERVILLE VS. THE ACC

The Chick-fil-A Bowl match-up against Clemson will mark Tommy Tuberville's fifth game against an ACC opponent as a head coach. Tuberville is 1-3 against ACC teams, winning in his last opportunity against Virginia Tech in the

2005 Sugar Bowl, 16-13. He lost to North Carolina, 16-10, in the 2001 Peach Bowl, and to Georgia Tech in the 2003 and 2005 regular seasons.

ASSISTANTS IN BOWLS

Auburn's post-season appearance will mark at least the third bowl appearance as a player or coach for each Auburn assistant coach. Tight ends coach Steve Ensminger will be going to his 13th bowl game, while offensive line coach Hugh Nall and defensive ends coach Terry Price will be going to their 12th bowl. Ensminger played in three bowls at LSU as did Price while at Texas A&M. Nall and defensive coordinator Will Muschamp both played in two bowl games while at Georgia.

FINAL GAME FOR TIGER SENIORS

The Chick-fil-A Bowl will mark the final game for Auburn's senior class, which can make history with one more victory to become the winningest senior class in school history. The Tigers' group of 17 seniors has posted a 41-9 record over the past four seasons, equaling last year's senior class for the most wins in a four-year period in Auburn history. The group has also been part of the the 2004 SEC Championship and the 2005 SEC Western Division Co-Championship.

The 2007 seniors include: TE Cole Bennett, SS Eric Brock, QB Brandon Cox, OT King Dunlap, DT Tez Doolittle, DB Zach Gilbert, DE Quentin Groves, DE Brandon Haley, OL Leon Hart, DB Josh Hebert, CB Patrick Lee, H Matthew Motley, RB Danny Perry, WR Prechae Rodriguez, RB Carl Stewart, DT Josh Thompson and CB Jonathan Wilhite.

FOUR-YEAR DOMINATION

Auburn's senior class has had almost as much success as any in the country. Since the start of the 2004 season, Auburn has the sixth-best record in the NCAA. The Tigers are 41-9 (.820) over the last four seasons. The top teams since the 2004 season are as follows:

Auburn has won 26 of its last 32 Southeastern Conference games and 27 of its last 33 games against SEC schools, including the 2004 SEC Championship game victory over Tennessee. Auburn's success against conference schools dates back to more than just the past four seasons, as since the start of the 2000 season, the Tigers are have the second-best record among the 12 league schools in regular season conference games. ON THIS DATE

Auburn is 3-3 all-time in games played on Dec. 31, including a 28-14 win over Wisconsin in the 2003 Music City Bowl. The Tigers also won on this date in 1996 (32-29 vs. Army in the Independence Bowl) and in 1954 (33-13 vs. Baylor in the Gator Bowl). Auburn's losses came in 2001 (16-10 vs. North Carolina in the Peach Bowl), 1969 (36-7 vs. Houston in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl) and 1955 (25-13 vs. Vanderbilt in the Gator Bowl).

VS. TEAMS RANKED 15th

Auburn has an all-time record of 4-6 against teams ranked 15th in the Associated Press poll. The last time the Tigers played a 15th-ranked team was in the 2004 SEC Championship game when Auburn beat No. 15 Tennessee, 38-28. Auburn has the same record when playing against a No. 15-ranked team when the Tigers are not ranked (2-5) as it does when Auburn is ranked.

ANOTHER WINNING SEASON

With eight victories so far this year, Auburn will finish with another winning season. It marks the eighth consecutive winning season for Auburn, and the 77th in school history. Auburn has now had just three losing seasons in the last 26 years.

SIX IN A ROW

Auburn capped its regular season with a 17-10 victory over Alabama in Jordan-Hare Stadium, marking the sixth consecutive season that the Tigers have beaten Alabama. The six straight wins in the series is a school record for Auburn, surpassing the previous best of five victories in a row from 1954-58.

STARTING STRONG

Auburn has started six of its last eight games with a lengthy scoring drive (five touchdowns, one field goal), with only a pair of turnovers keeping Auburn from scoring on its first possession. Auburn's six opening-possession scoring drives have averaged 11.3 plays and 70.8 yards while taking 5:14 off the clock. Here are the results of Auburn's last eight opening drives:

DEFENSE EXCELS DESPITE INJURIES

The Auburn defense has excelled this season, despite a rash of injuries. The Tigers have played games this season without defensive

starters Aairon Savage (five missed games), Tray Blackmon (four), Merrill Johnson (four), Craig Stevens (three), Quentin Groves (two), Zac Etheridge (one) and Jonathan Wilhite (one), and yet still rank first in the SEC and sixth in the nation in scoring defense (16.7) and second in the SEC and eighth nationally in total defense (298.3).

NO PASSING ZONE

Despite playing non-conference games against New Mexico State (No. 5 in the NCAA in pass offense, 331.9 yards per game) and Kansas State (No. 20 in NCAA in pass offense, threw 58 passes vs. AU) in addition to the tough SEC schedule, Auburn ranks eighth nationally in pass defense, allowing just 179.0 yards per game, and is ranked No. 13 in pass efficiency defense (107.51). The Tigers, whose defense ranks ninth nationally in yards per completion (10.28), held both Mississippi State (41 yards) and Vanderbilt (88 yards) to less than 100 yards passing this season.

COLEMAN DOMINATING DEFENSIVELY

Antonio Coleman took over a starting spot at defensive end after senior Quentin Groves was injured in the fifth game Sept. 29 at Florida, but the sophomore has played like a starter all season long. Coleman leads the team and is tied for 17th nationally in tackles for loss with 17, and also leads the Tigers in sacks (seven), which ranks sixth in the SEC. His 17 tackles for loss are the most by an Auburn player since 1995 and tied for fourth best by a Tiger since tackles for loss began being charted in 1981. (Note: Prior to 2000, sacks and tackles for loss were kept as separate statistics. For purposes of this list, the two stats were combined as they have been since 2000):

TURNOVERS PROVE CRUCIAL

Turnovers have played a big role in determining Auburn's success this season. Auburn committed 14 turnovers in its four losses, including five turnovers each against South Florida and Mississippi State and four at Georgia, and has a -9 turnover margin in its losses. In its eight victories, Auburn has committed just nine total turnovers while forcing 19 (+10 margin). Against New Mexico State on Sept. 22, Auburn forced six turnovers, which was the most by the Tigers since forcing six against Tennessee in 2004.

20 OR LESS

Since Will Muschamp took over as defensive coordinator prior to the 2006 season, Auburn has held 20 of its 25 opponents (80 percent) to 20 points or less, including eight in single digits. The Tigers, who have allowed just 15.3 points per game since Muschamp's arrival, are 19-1 in games in which they hold their opponents to no more than 20 points.

Since the 2004 season, Auburn has held 39 of its 50 opponents to 20 points or less.

SUSTAINED DRIVES

Over its past eight games, Auburn has done an excellent job of controlling the ball, winning the time of possession battle seven times, including each of the last six games. In the first four games, Auburn had just one scoring drive of at least 10 plays, but in the last eight games, the Tigers have had 14, plus nine more scoring drives that lasted at least eight plays.

Auburn currently ranks tied for second in the SEC for the season with an average time of possession of 31:26.

CAPTAIN COMEBACK

Brandon Cox has led Auburn on scoring drives that gave Auburn the lead with less than four minutes left in the game five times this season.

In the season opener against Kansas State, Cox capped a six-play, 57-yard drive with a 3-yard touchdown pass to Gabe McKenzie with just 2:01 left to give Auburn a 16-13 lead, before a defensive score made the final 23-13. The next Saturday against South Florida, a nine-play, 51-yard drive set up a 46-yard field goal with just 2:54 left that gave the Tigers a 20-17 lead, but the Bulls rallied to win in overtime.

Cox took Auburn 35 yards in 10 plays to set up the winning 43-yard field goal on the game's final play during a 20-17 victory at Florida Sept. 29. At Arkansas Oct. 13, he drove Auburn 50 yards on eight plays to set up the winning 20-yard field goal with 21 seconds left in a 9-7 victory.

On Oct. 20 at LSU, Cox drove Auburn 83 yards on nine plays and found Rodgeriqu Smith for a 3-yard touchdown pass that put Auburn ahead 24-23, although LSU would score with one second left for a 30-24 victory.

CARDIAC KIDS

Auburn games have not been lacking for excitement, as six of the first eight games were decided in the final two minutes. Wes Byrum's field goal on the game's final play gave Auburn a 20-17 win at No. 4 Florida Sept. 29, and his 20-yarder with 21 seconds left lifted Auburn to a 9-7 win at Arkansas Oct. 13. In Auburn's victory over Kansas State, the Tigers were clinging to a three-point lead before a fumble return for a touchdown with just 1:11 left sealed the victory.

Three of Auburn's four losses have been close calls. Auburn lost to LSU 30-24 when LSU scored on a 22-yard pass play with just one second left. Against Mississippi State Sept. 15, Auburn had a potential game-winning drive stall at the Bulldog 9-yard line with just 48 seconds left. The Tigers' other loss against South Florida ended in overtime.

FRESHMEN HONORED

Several Auburn freshmen have been honored since the conclusion of the regular season, as the Tigers had more members of the SEC All-Freshman team (six) than any other school. Offensive linemen Ryan Pugh, Chaz Ramsey and Lee Ziemba were named to the squad, as were defensive end Antoine Carter, safety Zac Etheridge and punter Ryan Shoemaker.

Ziemba has been named a First Team Freshman All-American by multiple sources, while Shoemaker earned first-team Freshman All-American honors from Rivals.com. Etheridge, Pugh and kicker Wes Byrum have all been listed on Freshman All-America second teams, while Ramsey and linebacker Craig Stevens have earned Honorable Mention Freshman All-American recognition.

NATION'S NUMBER THREE NET

Auburn ranks third in the nation in net punting, averaging 39.3 net yards per punt. Much of the success can be attributed to a pair of first-year punters. Redshirt freshman Ryan Shoemaker ranks second in the SEC averaging 43.2 yards per punt and has had just one touchback with 14 punts inside the 20-yard line. True freshman Patrick Tatum has punted 16 times this season, averaging 43.7 yards per punt with nine of his 16 punts landing inside the 20-yard line.

FEELING FINE IN FIRST HALF

Auburn has had the lead at the half in 11 of its 12 games this season. The Tigers were the only team in the nation to lead at the half in each of their first 10 games. In addition, Auburn has allowed just 37 total points in the first half of the last eight games (4.6 ppg), outscoring Florida, Vanderbilt, Arkansas, LSU, Ole Miss, Tennessee Tech, Georgia and Alabama by a combined score of 110-37.

SECOND QUARTER SUPERB

The second quarter has been Auburn's best quarter this season, as the Tigers have outscored their opponents 86-33 during the period. Auburn has outgained its opponents 988-760 in the second quarter and has scored during the second quarter in nine of 12 games, while shutting out its opponents during the quarter seven times.

HOT ROD

Junior wide receiver Rodgeriqu Smith leads Auburn with 48 catches for 660 yards and five touchdowns. All three of those totals surpass what he accumulated during his first two seasons combined. Smith had his second 100-yard receiving game Oct. 27 against Ole Miss, catching eight balls for 111 yards and a score. He had a career-high nine catches for 102 yards Sept. 29 at Florida, and now ranks 15th in Auburn history with 1,221 career receiving yards. His 48 receptions are tied for eighth most in a single season in Auburn history.

Smith's 58-yard touchdown catch from Kodi Burns against New Mexico State was the longest pass play of the season for Auburn, and had a 55-yarder against Kansas State, which is tied for second-longest on the team this year.

TOP BILLINGS

Sophomore Montez Billings has emerged as a steady complimentary receiver to Rod Smith. Billings had just one catch in the first four games, but has 26 in the last eight, including 11 catches combined at Arkansas and LSU, which was two more than he had in his career prior to that point. Billings set career highs in catches (six) and receiving yards (78) and scored his first career touchdown on a 17-yard grab from Brandon Cox Oct. 20 at LSU.

DYNAMIC DUO

Smith and Billings have taken charge in the Auburn passing game over the past seven games, getting the bulk of the catches. In the first five games, Smith had 11 catches for 253 yards and two scores, while Billings had just one catch for five yards. In the last seven games, Smith has 37 catches for 407 yards and three touchdowns, while Billings has 26 catches for 303 yards and a score.

Conversely, the other receivers and tight ends have seen a drop in their production. In the first four games, they combined for 33

catches for 303 yards, but in the last eight games have combined for only 23 catches for 303 yards.

INTERCEPTION BINGES

Two Auburn players have gone through interception binges this season. In his first 41 career games, senior Patrick Lee had just one interception, grabbing a pick last season against Arkansas State. But Lee picked off four passes in a five-game span beginning Sept. 29 at Florida. He also had interceptions against Vanderbilt, LSU and Ole Miss.

Jerraud Powers, whose first career interception came Oct. 13 at Arkansas, has picked off a pass in three consecutive games, tying him with Lee for the team lead. He is the first Auburn player to collect an interception in three straight games since Karlos Dansby in the 2001-02 seasons.

The four interceptions by Lee and Powers are the most in a season by a Tiger since Junior Rosegreen had six in 2004.

STELLAR SECONDARY

Auburn has picked off at least one pass in nine consecutive games, grabbing 12 interceptions during that span. Patrick Lee and Jerraud Powers have four picks each, while Johnathan Wilhite has two. Walter McFadden's 93-yard interception return for a score against Tennessee Tech Nov. 3 was the third-longest interception return in school history.

COX TURNS THE CORNER

After a rough start to the season, senior QB Brandon Cox excelled during a seven-game stretch from the Sept. 22-Nov. 3. After three games, Cox had completed 37-of-75 (.493) passes for 436 yards, two touchdowns and six interceptions for a quarterback rating of 90.97. In the next seven weeks, Cox completed 100-of-150 (.667) passes for 1,183 yards, six scores and just one interception, for a quarterback rating of 144.78. Cox is now third on Auburn's all-time passing yardage list with 6,748 yards.

COX TIES SULLIVAN FOR THIRD IN WINS

Brandon Cox earned his 26th career victory as a starting quarterback during Auburn's 17-10 win against Alabama Nov. 24. Cox, who is 26-9 as a starter, is now tied with Pat Sullivan (1969-71) for third for the most victories by an Auburn starting quarterback. Jason Campbell (2001-04) won 31 games and Stan White (1990-93) won 29. The victory over Alabama also allowed Cox to join Campbell as the only Auburn starting quarterbacks to beat Alabama three times.

Cox is also tied for the lead among all active SEC quarterbacks in career victories. Tennessee's Erik Ainge also has 26 wins, while Kentucky's Andre Woodson is third with 18.

RUSHING GAME IMPROVING

The return of junior running back Brad Lester from academic suspension after the fifth game benefitted an already improving running game for Auburn. The Tigers averaged just 93.5 yards rushing in their first two games, but have averaged 166.3 in their last 10, with 20 touchdowns and four games over 200 yards rushing. Four different players (Ben Tate, Mario Fannin, Brad Lester, Kodi Burns) have rushed for at least 87 yards in a game during the last 10 games.

GROVES EQUALS SACKS RECORD

Quentin Groves tied the Auburn record for career sacks with a second-quarter sack Oct. 20 at LSU. Groves now has 26 career sacks, tying the record set by Gerald Robinson (1982-85). He had two sacks in the opener vs. Kansas State, and the second came with just over a minute left and Auburn clinging to a 16-13 lead, resulting in a fumble that was returned 34 yards for a touchdown by Antonio Coleman, to seal the victory.

GROVES NO. 2 IN NCAA IN CAREER SACKS

Senior Quentin Groves ranks second among active NCAA players in career sacks with 26, despite missing two games this season with an injury. UCLA's Bruce Davis leads the country with 26.5, followed by Groves, USC's Lawrence Jackson (25.5) and Fresno State's Tyler Clutts (23).

YOUNG BLOOD

Auburn has a lot of young talent on the squad this season, and to illustrate this point, one need look no further than the scoring column on the statistics sheet. Of Auburn's 292 points scored, 202 (69.2 percent) have been scored by freshmen and sophomores. True freshman Wes Byrum leads the team with 81 points, while sophomore Ben Tate is second with 42 points and redshirt freshman Mario Fannin is third with 36 points. True freshman Kodi Burns and sophomore Gabe McKenzie have two touchdowns each, while sophomores Montez Billings, Antonio Coleman and Walter

McFadden have reached the end zone once each. Sophomore Zack Kutch has an extra point.

FRESH MEAT

Auburn has had 29 freshmen (15 true, 14 redshirt) play this season. The starting lineup has included four true freshmen on offense, including right tackle Lee Ziemba, right guard Chaz Ramsey, left tackle Ryan Pugh and quarterback Kodi Burns. Redshirt freshmen Craig Stevens and Zac Etheridge have been regulars in the defensive starting lineup, while redshirt freshman Mike Berry started the first three games at right guard. The kicking game features true freshman placekicker Wes Byrum as well as a redshirt freshman (Ryan Shoemaker) and a true freshman (Patrick Tatum) sharing punting duties.

On Sept. 22 vs. New Mexico State, Burns became the first true freshman to start at quarterback for the Tigers since Gabe Gross in 1998. In his 13 years as a head coach, Tommy Tuberville had never before started a true freshman at quarterback.

In addition, redshirt freshman running back Mario Fannin is third on the team in rushing, while true freshman safety Mike McNeil is 11th on the team with 34 tackles.

FRESHMAN KICKERS SHINE

Auburn was forced to replace perhaps the nation's top kicking trio after all three kickers from last season graduated. The Tigers lost Lou Groza finalist John Vaughn, the team's all-time leading scorer with 312 career points; Kody Bliss, who ranked third in the nation in punting with a 45.7-yard average; and Matt Clark, who led the nation last season with 51 touchbacks on 66 kickoffs (77 percent). But the newcomers have excelled this season.

True freshman Wes Byrum has made 16 field goals in 21 attempts, including game winners from 43 yards on the final play at No. 4 Florida Sept. 29 and 20 yards with 21 seconds at Arkansas Oct. 13. He had a season-long 49-yard field goal against South Florida and his 16 field goals is tied for fourth best in a single season in Auburn history.

Redshirt freshman Ryan Shoemaker ranks second in the SEC and 16th nationally in punting, averaging 43.2 yards per punt, while true freshman Patrick Tatum has averaged 43.4 yards per punt with nine of his 16 punts downed inside the 20-yard line. Tatum was named SEC Special Teams Player of the Week against New Mexico State Sept. 22 after placing all four of his punts inside the 20-yard line and running for a first down on a fake punt.

TIGERS TOUGH ON TOP TEN

Auburn has won nine of its last 12 games against teams ranked in the *Associated Press* top 10, including a 20-17 win Sept. 29 against No. 4 Florida, and wins last season against then-No. 2 Florida and then-No. 6 LSU. The Tigers have won five of their last seven against top-ten teams and six straight at home. Two of the three losses against top-10 teams since the 2004 season have come in close calls at LSU, in overtime in 2005 by a 20-17 score and this season by a 30-24 score when LSU scored on a 22-yard pass play with just one second left.

Also in 2005, Auburn posted victories at No. 9 Georgia (31-30) and against No. 8 Alabama (28-18). In 2004, Auburn defeated No. 5 LSU (10-9), No. 10 Tennessee (34-10), No. 8 Georgia (24-6) and No. 9 Virginia Tech (16-13) in the NOKIA Sugar Bowl.

During the Tommy Tuberville era, Auburn is 15-12 in games played against top 10 teams, and has won 15 of its last 22 games dating back to a 23-20 upset of No. 1-ranked Florida Oct. 13, 2001.

Dating back to the 2002 season, Auburn has played 21 games against top 10 teams.

TOPPLING THE TOP TEN

Auburn's 20-17 victory at No. 4 Florida Sept. 29 allowed the Tigers to keep an impressive streak alive, as the Tigers have beaten at least one *Associated Press* Top 10 team every year for the last seven years, which is the longest streak in school history. The Tigers have 15 victories over Top 10 foes in those seven seasons.

The streak started in 2001 with a 23-20 victory over No. 1 Florida. In 2002, Auburn beat No. 10 LSU (31-7) and won at No. 9 Alabama (17-7). In 2003, the Tigers beat No. 7 Tennessee (28-21), then beat the new No. 7 team, Arkansas, the following week (10-3).

In 2004, Auburn defeated No. 5 LSU (10-9), No. 10 Tennessee (34-10), No. 8 Georgia (24-6) and No. 9 Virginia Tech (16-13). The 2005 season included wins against No. 9 Georgia (31-30) and No. 8 Alabama (28-18), and in 2006 Auburn beat No. 6 LSU (7-3) and No. 2 Florida (27-17).

WINNING IN WHITE

Auburn has won 15 of its last 16 games when wearing all white, including three victories in four tries this season. Auburn had not lost when wearing white jerseys since the final road game of the 2003 season at Georgia, until the Bulldogs broke the streak in Athens Nov. 10.

FOUR OF FIVE IN SINGLE DIGITS

Auburn held four of five opponents to single digits in games played from Oct. 6-Nov. 3, as Vanderbilt (seven points), Arkansas (seven), Ole Miss (three) and Tennessee Tech (three) each posted just one score against the Tigers. It

marked the first time that Auburn held four of five opponents to single digits since 1988, when the Tigers kept five straight opponents in single figures, falling at LSU (7-6) before beating Akron (42-0), Mississippi State (33-0), Florida (16-0) and Southern Miss (38-8).

TUBERVILLE HITS THE CENTURY MARK

Tommy Tuberville recorded his 100th career victory as a head coach during Auburn's 35-7 win over Vanderbilt on Oct. 6. Tuberville currently owns a career record of 104-53 in 13 seasons as a head coach. He became the fifth active SEC coach to have 100 career victories, joining Steve Spurrier, Phillip Fulmer, Rich Brooks and Houston Nutt, and just the third to earn 100 victories while coaching at an SEC school (Spurrier and Fulmer).

TUBERVILLE IN NINTH SEASON

Tommy Tuberville is in his ninth season at Auburn in 2007 and his 13th as a head coach in the Southeastern Conference. Tuberville has the third-longest tenure in the SEC (second-longest active streak) behind Phillip Fulmer of Tennessee and Steve Spurrier of South Carolina, who are both coaching in their 15th seasons in the league this year.

Tuberville has amassed a record of 79-33 during his tenure at Auburn and has led the Tigers to eight straight bowl appearances.

Tuberville is fourth all-time at Auburn in wins, and is the fifth-longest tenured coach in school history.

TUBERVILLE ELECTED TO HALL OF FAME

In October, Tommy Tuberville was elected into the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame, and will be inducted on Feb. 28 as part of the Class of 2008. A native of Camden, Ark., Tuberville graduated from Southern Arkansas University in 1976. He started his coaching career at Hermitage High School in Arkansas, serving as an assistant coach (1976-77) and head coach (1978-79), before starting his collegiate coaching career at Arkansas State, where he was an assistant coach from 1980-84.

13 AND COUNTING

In his 13th year as a head coach, Tommy Tuberville has five assistant coaches who have been with him all 13 years. That group includes: defensive tackles/noseguard coach Don Dunn, running backs/special teams coach Eddie Gran, wide receivers coach Greg Knox, offensive line coach Hugh Nall and defensive ends coach Terry Price.

2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

IMPRESSIVE PERFORMANCES

Auburn defense was impressive in its first two road games, holding two of the SEC's top offenses far below their season averages. Sept. 29 in Gainesville, Auburn held Florida to 17 points, 312 yards of offense and 14 first downs, which was more than 32 points below their scoring average of 49.2 points per game, more than 200 yards below their average of 517.8, and 11 first downs below their average of 25 per game. Florida quarterback Tim Tebow, who averaged 335.8 yards of total offense and 4.5 passing/rushing touchdowns this season against all other opponents, was held to 276 yards of total offense and two scores by the Tigers.

At Arkansas on Oct. 13, Auburn held the Razorbacks to just seven points, 193 yards including 67 rushing, and 11 first downs, which was over 35 points below their scoring average of 42.6 points per game, 314 yards below their average of 507.6 (271 yards below their rushing average of 338.4) and 12 first downs below their average of 23.4. Auburn held the nation's top rushing duo of Darren McFadden and Felix Jones to a combined 85 yards, which was 197 yards below their combined averages.

In addition, Auburn held Florida scoreless in the first half, becoming the first team to shut out the Gators in the first half since South Carolina led 3-0 at the break on Nov. 14, 1992 in Gainesville.

IN A RUSH

Auburn accomplished some rare feats in a victory over New Mexico State Sept. 22 that echoed a 2005 victory over Kentucky. Both Ben Tate (111 yards) and Mario Fannin (103 yards) went over the century mark, marking the first time since that game at Kentucky that Auburn had two 100-yard rushers in the same game. In the game at Lexington, Tristan Davis rushed for 162 yards and Kenny Irons had 103.

In addition, Fannin rushed for three touchdowns, becoming the first Auburn back since Irons in that same game at Kentucky to rush for three scores in one game. Fannin had a 67-yard touchdown run late in the game, which was the longest play from scrimmage for Auburn since Davis raced 75 yards for a score in that same game at Kentucky.

SENIOR SIGNAL CALLER = SUCCESS

Senior Brandon Cox, in his third season as Auburn's starting quarterback, has helped Auburn keep a string of successful seasons with returning senior starting quarterbacks alive. Including this season, the last 11 seasons that Auburn had a senior returning as the starter at quarterback, the Tigers have won at least eight games every year, averaging 9.5 wins per season during those campaigns. Auburn's combined record during those 11 seasons is 105-26-2, and the Tigers won SEC Championships in 1983, 1987, 1989 and 2004 and SEC Western Division

Championships in 1997 and 2000.

Incidentally, Auburn went 10-1 against Georgia during those 11 seasons, and 9-2 against Alabama with eight straight wins.

ELDER STATESMAN

Senior quarterback Brandon Cox is not only the oldest player on the Auburn team, he's older than 18 quarterbacks currently on NFL rosters. Cox, who turned 24 on Oct. 31, is nearly two full years older than the No. 1 pick in last year's NFL draft, JaMarcus Russell, who was born Aug. 9, 1985. Cox is the fourth-oldest starting quarterback in the Football Bowl Subdivision, being younger than only Ben Olsen of UCLA (2/23/83 DOB), Colt Brennan of Hawaii (8/16/83) and Adam Tafralis of San Jose State (8/30/83).

FILLING IN ADMIRABLY

Junior linebacker Chris Evans, who leads Auburn with 63 tackles, earned his first career start against South Florida Sept. 8. The result was the highest tackles total by an Auburn player in almost five years. Evans tallied 14 tackles (five solo, nine assists), which was the most by an Auburn player since Karlos Dansby had 14 tackles at Florida on Oct. 19, 2002. He posted a team-high eight tackles in the following game against Mississippi State, becoming the first Auburn player since Dansby in 2002 to have at least 22 tackles in two games.

50-YEAR ANNIVERSARY

Auburn honored its 1957 national championship team during an Oct. 6 game against Vanderbilt. The team wore their white road uniforms and helmets with no AU logos and gray facemasks, similar to those worn during the 1957 championship season.

The 2007 season marks the 50-year anniversary of Auburn's 1957 National Championship team. The '57 Tigers finished with a perfect 10-0 record, including a 7-0 mark in the SEC, and was selected as the national champion following the season by the *Associated Press*. Auburn outscored its opponents that season by a combined score of

207-28, posting six shutouts and ending the season with a 40-0 whitewashing of Alabama.

JORDAN-HARE STADIUM

Now in its 68th year as home to the Auburn football team, Jordan-Hare Stadium is the nation's ninth-largest on-campus stadium, with a capacity of 87,451 fans. The Tigers are **261-64-7 (.797)** at Jordan-Hare Stadium, including a **47-10 (.825)** mark over the past eight years. AU went 7-0 at home in both 2000 and 2004, and posted a 6-1 mark in 2005.

UNDER THE LIGHTS AT JORDAN-HARE

Auburn has been tough to beat in night games at Jordan-Hare Stadium, accumulating a record of 14-2 since the 2000 season in home games starting at 6 p.m. or later. That stretch includes a 4-0 record against ranked opponents, with wins over No. 1 Florida in 2001, No. 2 Florida in 2006, No. 7 Tennessee in 2003 and No. 14 Georgia in 2000. The Tigers had a four-game winning streak in home night games prior to an overtime loss to South Florida Sept. 15.

IRON MEN

Of Auburn's 17 seniors, 10 have seen time in at least 40 games during their careers, including three with at least 50 games played. Cole Bennett and Eric Brock lead the group with 51 career games played, followed by Quentin Groves (50), while King Dunlap, Josh Thompson and Patrick Lee have seen action in 48 games. Zach Gilbert is next with 47 games played, followed by Carl Stewart (46), Brandon Cox (43) and Leon Hart (40).

STARTS STREAK

Brandon Cox had a streak of 24 consecutive starts at quarterback snapped Sept. 22 against New Mexico State. He had started every game since a 2005 contest against Western Kentucky.

The longest active starting streaks now for Auburn belong to three players who started all 13 games last year and the first 12 games this season. Senior Josh Thompson, junior Rodgeriqu Smith and sophomore Sen'Derrick Marks all have started the last 25 games.

NO SHUTOUTS ALLOWED

Auburn has scored in 62 consecutive games, which is the second-longest streak in school history. The Tigers have not been shut out since a 23-0 loss to USC to open the 2003 season. It will be a while before Auburn could challenge the school record. The Tigers scored in 149 straight games from Oct. 4, 1980 through Nov. 14, 1992.

2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

WINNING THE CLOSE ONES

Auburn has had a knack for winning close ball games since Tommy Tuberville arrived as the Tigers' head coach. In his nine seasons at the helm, Auburn is 27-13 in games decided by seven points or less and has won 15 of its last 20, including all five games last season.

FATHERS AND SONS

Senior fullback Danny Perry is the son of Director of Football Operations Jimmy Perry. The younger Perry is the first Tiger to have his father on the football staff since Joe Whitt, Jr., played wide receiver from 1998-99 while Joe Whitt, Sr., who coached at Auburn from 1981-2005, was a linebackers coach.

Previously, Gene Lorendo, an assistant coach from 1951-75, saw his son, Mac, letter at offensive tackle from 1970-72, earning All-SEC honors as a senior, and Paul Davis, an assistant coach from 1967-80 and 1987-90, watched his son, Rhett, letter at split end from 1972-73.

In addition, Auburn freshman linebacker Adam Herring is the son of Arkansas defensive coordinator Reggie Herring.

TIGER GRADS

Auburn began the season with 10 graduates on the roster, which is the third most of any Football Bowl Subdivision team.

The Tiger graduates include: TE Cole Bennett (business administration), SS Eric Brock (public administration), QB Brandon Cox (business administration), DT Tez Doolittle (criminology), DB Zach Gilbert (public administration), DE Quentin Groves (criminology), CB Patrick Lee (criminology), H Matthew Motley (exercise science), RB Carl Stewart (political science) and NG Josh Thompson (physical education).

TIGER PROS

Auburn has demonstrated a proficiency for placing players in the National Football League. As of Aug. 21, 38 former Auburn Tigers were listed on NFL rosters. The Seattle Seahawks have the most former Tigers, with five former Auburn players on the roster, while the Washington Redskins and Atlanta Falcons have four each.

WHEN SCORING 20+ POINTS

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 65-7 when scoring 20 or more points in a game, including a 63-6 mark in the regular season. Dating back to 1995, Auburn is 86-14 when scoring 20 or more points in a game.

30+ POINTS EQUALS VICTORY

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 42-0 when scoring 30 or more points in a game. Auburn has won 47 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points.

The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49, four overtime loss to Georgia in 1996.

In the last 22 years, Auburn is 116-2 when scoring 30 points.

BRAMBLETT RECEIVES SPORTSCASTER OF THE YEAR AWARD

Rod Bramblett, who handles the play-by-play duties of Auburn football, men's basketball and baseball on the Auburn ISP Sports Network, has been named the 2007 Sportscaster of the Year in the state of Alabama by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association.

A Valley, Ala., native, Bramblett became Auburn's lead announcer for football and men's basketball in 2003. Bramblett, 41, has served as the voice of Auburn baseball since 1993. This is the first time he has received this Sportscaster of the Year honor.

Bramblett is a 1988 graduate of Auburn.

TIGERS GO HIGH DEFINITION

The most notable change to Jordan-Hare Stadium for the 2007 season is a new high definition video board above the south end zone. The \$2.9 million board is the first true HD video display in the SEC and makes Auburn just the second NCAA member institution to invest in true high definition LED video capabilities. The display measure approximately 30 feet high by 74 feet wide, and exceeds 2,200 square feet. It has the capability to show a single, wide screen image, and can also be split into multiple windows to show lineups, game statistics, out-of-town game information and much more.

TIGERS ON CSS

Comcast/Charter Sports Southeast (CSS) will broadcast a three-hour encore presentation of the Auburn-Alabama football game Sunday at 5 p.m. ET/4 p.m. CT with Andy Burcham handling play-by-play duties and Cole Cubelic doing color commentary. CSS also airs the Auburn Football Review every Tuesday at 5 p.m. ET/4 p.m. CT and the Auburn Football Preview every Friday at 4:30 p.m. ET/3:30 p.m. CT.

CSS is a 24-hour regional sports network serving approximately 5.8 million households across 12 Southeastern states.

Bennett was also married during the summer of 2007, joining Quentin Groves as married players on the Tigers' squad ... Linebacker Courtney Harden and defensive tackle Jake Ricks are brothers ... No. 18 Auburn scored two touchdowns a mere 50 seconds apart in the final 2:01 to come back for a stunning 23-13 season-opening victory over Kansas State before a Jordan-Hare Stadium crowd of 86,439, the most ever to see the Wildcats play.

Trailing 13-9 with 2:01 remaining, Brandon Cox connected on the Tigers first touchdown of the game, a 3-yard pass to tight end Gabe McKenzie, to give Auburn a 16-13 lead. Fifty seconds later, defensive end Quentin Groves sacked K-State quarterback Josh Freeman and forced a fumble that was scooped up by end Antonio Coleman and returned 34 yards for his first career touchdown to seal the victory.

Groves finished the game with two sacks to mark his 25th career sack and move within one sack of the Auburn career record held by Gerald Robinson (1982-85).

The Wildcats took the opening kickoff and drove 61 yards to the Auburn 2 before settling for a Brooks Rossman 20-yard field goal to give Kansas State a 3-0 lead.

A 55-yard Cox-to- Rodgeriquus Smith pass to the K-State 18 set up the first of freshman Wes Byrum's three field goals, a 20-yarder with 14:07 to go in the half, to tie the game at 3. Byrum closed out the first half scoring with a 39-yard field goal with 6:22 to give Auburn its first lead at 6-3.

After allowed Kansas State 91 yards offense in its first two drives, the Tigers defense allowed the Wildcats just 34 yards over their final five drives of the first half.

With Auburn starting the second half on their own 46 after a K-State face mask penalty on the second half kickoff return, Cox threw an interception on the first play at the Wildcat 31. Kansas State then used a 6-play, 69-yard drive that was capped off by a trick play in which wide receiver Jordy Nelson threw a 21-touchdown pass to tailback Leon Patton for a 10-6 lead less than two minutes into the third quarter.

K-State lengthened its lead to 13-6 on a Rossman 40-yard field goal with 7:31 left in the third. Byrum brought Auburn to within 13-9 with a 31-yard field goal with 1:46 left in the third.

Ten Tigers made the first starts of their careers including, Mike Berry, Zac Etheridge, Tyrone Green, Jerraud Powers, Rodriguez, Craig Stevens, Pat Sims, Tate and Lee Ziemba. Auburn improved to 88-25-2 all-time in season opening games and ended K-State's string of 17-straight season-opening wins.

No. 17 Auburn overcame five turnovers to take South Florida into overtime, but the Bulls prevailed 26-23 on a game-winning 14-yard touchdown pass from Matt Grothe to Jessie Hester in front of a stunned Jordan-Hare Stadium crowd of 82,617.

Auburn had taken a 23-20 advantage off a Wes Byrum 39-yard field goal to start overtime, but South Florida responded with the winning score moments later.

With the game on the line, Grothe ran three times, including a sneak on fourth-and-1 to keep the drive alive. The next play would be the game winner as he connected with Hester behind the defense in the end zone.

After missing four field goal attempts in the second half, South Florida made sure its fate was left in the hands of Grothe.

Auburn gained just 2 yards in its overtime possession before Byrum took the field for his third field goal of the game and sixth of the season.

Auburn committed five turnovers, including three inside its own 25-yard line, in the game, but the Bulls did not turn any of those opportunities into points.

South Florida jumped on the board early, scoring 14 points in the first quarter off a 1-yard run by Grothe and a 2-yarder by Mike Ford. Byrum put up Auburn's only points in the first quarter, a career-best 49-yard field goal.

Auburn would regroup in the second quarter, matching the Bulls offensive total from the first period. The Tigers pulled within four early in the second quarter as Mario Fannin ran four yards for the score.

The Tigers took their first lead of the game with 29 seconds remaining in the half when Gabe McKenzie grabbed a 3-yard pass from Cox.

Missed opportunities were the story of the third quarter for South Florida as kicker Delbert Alvarado missed a 21-yarder and three other field goals, including one that was blocked by Sen'Derrick Marks on the final play of the third quarter.

South Florida evened the ledger at 17 with 7:28 left to play in regulation after a 38-yard field goal by Alvarado.

With 2:54 left in the fourth quarter, Byrum kicked a 46-yarder to give Auburn a 20-17 lead after Cox completed 4-of-5 passes for 50 yards on the drive.

A mere nine yards separated Auburn from victory in its SEC opener versus Mississippi State. The Tigers drove the ball 67 yards and found themselves nine yards from the endzone, but four missed opportunities left the 82,129 Tiger fans stunned as Auburn fell 19-14 to the Bulldogs.

Christian Ducre scored the go-ahead touchdown with 5:15 remaining in the game to put the Bulldogs up 19-14.

It was a game of quarterbacks as Auburn and Mississippi State used a combined five different QB's during the game. Tiger fans got a glimpse of the future as true freshman Kodi Burns saw action early in the game after two quick Brandon Cox interceptions.

Mississippi State got on the board fast even after losing starting quarterback Michael Henig on the first drive. Adam Carlson booted a 32-yarder to put the Bulldogs up 3-0.

Derek Pegues intercepted Cox's first pass and returned it 20 yards for a touchdown less than a minute later, giving MSU an early 10-0 lead.

After Anthony Johnson intercepted Cox's second pass on Auburn's next offensive drive, Burns would take over the reins for the majority of the game.

The Bulldogs extended their lead to 13-0 on an Adam Carlson 30-yard field goal early in the second quarter.

Auburn responded at the 4:18 mark in the second quarter as Ben Tate put the Tigers on the board with a 28-yard touchdown run, marking the first TD run of the season for AU.

Burns' running game was effective as he put the Tigers up 14-13 on a one-yard sneak to the endzone.

The teams traded punts for most of the second half. Mississippi State's running game dominated, featured by Anthony Dixon and Ducre who combined for 44 yards on the 10-play scoring drive in the fourth quarter. Dixon finished the game with 103 yards on 29 carries, while Ducre had 63 yards on 10 carries.

Cox returned to the game in the fourth quarter and drove the Tigers 67 yards, most of which came on passes of 12 and 23 yards to Rodgeriqu Smith and a 17-yard run by Tate.

On fourth down with 53 seconds to play, Cox's pass fell short of Smith in the end zone giving Mississippi State earned its first win over Auburn since 2000.

Burns threw for 65 yards, while racking up 87 yards on the ground and a touchdown. Cox completed 4-of-10 passes for 42 yards.

The Auburn defense allowed the Bulldogs' trio of quarterbacks only 41 total yards in the air.

Auburn out gained the Bulldogs 323 to 213, but five costly turnovers thwarted the Tigers offensive efforts.

The Tigers tallied a season-best 216 yards on the run, marking the most in an SEC game since rushing for 227 at Georgia in 2005.

Auburn created six turnovers and Brandon Cox led the Tigers to 41 consecutive points to finish off New Mexico State 55-20 in front of a rowdy 83,012 fans at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Coming off the bench after 24 starts at quarterback, Cox passed for 135 yards (13-of-19) and a touchdown and rushed for another to help even Auburn's record at 2-2 on the season.

Defense put Auburn on the board in the first quarter when Zac Etheridge caused a fumble by the Aggies' A.J. Harris and Pat Sims recovered and returned it 21 yards for a score at the 7:33 mark.

The Aggies retaliated when Chase Holbrook drove 80 yards on 10 plays, including a 44-yard completion over the middle to Nick Cleaver. Holbrook turned in the Aggies' first score on a 1-yard sneak with 3:51 remaining in the opening quarter.

The Tigers didn't waste any time as Kodi Burns, who became the first freshman quarterback to start for Auburn since 1998, connected with Rodgeriqu Smith on a 58-yard touchdown pass. New Mexico State knotted the score at 14 on a 5-yard pass from Holbrook to Brandon Allen in the second quarter.

Two plays later, the Aggies took the lead for the first and final time of the night when Holbrook hit Chris Williams with a 25-yard pass. Holbrook finished the first half connecting on 20-of-23 pass attempts for 207 yards and two touchdowns.

On the next possession, Cox led a 9-play, 62-yard drive that was capped off by a 1-yard touchdown run by Mario Fannin, giving Auburn a lead that it would not relinquish.

Auburn took over in the second half. Jonathan Wilhite intercepted his first of two passes on New Mexico State's first series, which led to an 18-yard touchdown pass from Cox to Smith. A minute later, Sen'Derrick Marks intercepted a Holbrook pass with the help of Josh Thompson and returned it to the 2. Cox came in and finished the deal from a yard out to put the Tigers up 35-20.

New Mexico State would have its hopes of adding a score dashed late in the third quarter when Wilhite snagged his second interception that led to a Ben Tate 2-yard score to open the fourth quarter.

Holbrook ended the game completing 29-of-40 pass attempts for 254 yards, but was intercepted three times.

Freshman Wes Byrum kicked the game-winning 43-yard field goal as time expired to lift Auburn to a 20-17 victory over No. 4 Florida in front of 90,685 stunned fans at Ben Hill Griffin Stadium. Byrum actually made the final field goal twice, but his first attempt was nullified by a timeout called just before the snap.

The Tigers snapped the defending national champion's 11-game winning streak and gave Florida coach Urban Meyer his first home loss since he took over the program in 2005. Auburn was the last team to defeat the Gators as the Tigers won 27-17 last season in Auburn.

With 3:38 remaining, the Tigers used up as much time as possible on the game clock as Brandon Cox led a 10-play, 35-yard game-winning drive that included Ben Tate running for 19 yards and Rodgeriquus Smith and Prechae Rodriquez combining for 16 yards through the air.

Cox finished the game completing 17-of-26 passes for 227 yards.

The Auburn defense was the difference maker, as it held Florida to just 17 points, 312 yards of offense and 14 first downs. Entering the contest, Florida was averaging 49.2 points, 517.8 yards and 25 first downs per game.

In addition, Auburn shut out Florida in the first half, becoming the first team to hold Florida scoreless during the opening half since South Carolina on Nov. 14, 1992. The Tiger defense allowed just one play over 25 yards and held Florida without a first down on five of 10 offensive possessions.

The Tigers got on the board on their first possession as Cox took Auburn on its longest drive of the year. With the help of Tate and Mario Fannin's 42 yards on the ground and 35 yards in the air by Smith and Montez Billings, Kodi Burns was able to come in at quarterback and dart up the middle for a six-yard touchdown to cap the 14-play, 86-yard drive that consumed 7:32.

Auburn totaled 113 yards and eight first downs in the first quarter. Cox hit all five of his passes on Auburn's first drive that ended with Burns' score.

In the second quarter, Cox completed a 7-yard pass to Gabe McKenzie, a 22-yard pass to Carl Stewart and a 25-yarder to Montez Bilings to set up a fourth-and-1 on the Florida 4 that the Tigers converted. On the next play, Tate ran for three yards and gave Auburn a 14-0 lead with 6:21 remaining in the half.

Florida opened the third quarter with Tim Tebow connecting on a 52-yard pass to Percy Harvin that put the Gators on the Auburn 3. Auburn's defense stepped up and the Gators settled for a 23-yard Joey Iijas field goal.

After a Patrick Lee interception, Byrum put Auburn up by two touchdowns as he connected on a 30-yard field goal.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Tebow threw a 6-yard pass to

Scoring on its first three possessions en route to a 35-7 victory over Vanderbilt, head coach Tommy Tuberville earned his 100th career victory in front of 82,657 fans at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

On the opening drive, the Tigers marched 80 yards on nine plays and finished with a 4-yard touchdown by Ben Tate. The Commodores had to settle for three-and-out on their second drive, giving the Tigers the ball back less than a minute after the score.

Auburn responded with a 74-yard, seven-play drive that ended with Brandon Cox connecting with Rodgeriquus Smith in the end zone, putting the Tigers up 14-0 with 3:07 remaining in the first quarter. Cox finished the quarter 7-of-7 for 58 yards and a TD.

The Tigers opened the second quarter with the ball on the Vanderbilt 43. It only took two plays for Auburn to score again as Mario Fannin ran for 21 yards and a 22-yard touchdown on back-to-back carries.

Less than five minutes later, Brad Lester, who returned to the lineup for the first time this season, rushed over the Vanderbilt defense for a 17-yard score. The Tigers ended the half up 28-0 and outgained Vanderbilt 324-66 in the half. Auburn's defense allowed the Commodores just five first downs in the half.

Patrick Lee intercepted a tipped pass early in the third quarter and returned it to the Vanderbilt 10-yard line. Two plays later, Lester leaped across the goal line from 5 yards out, making it 35-0.

Cox completed 14 of 17 passes for 165 yards with a touchdown and an interception in three quarters. Kodi Burns took over the reins in the fourth quarter.

Playing against Auburn's reserve defenders, Vanderbilt took up half of the fourth quarter on a 15-play scoring drive that ended with Cassen Jackson-Garrison's 1-yard touchdown run. It was the only score by either team in the fourth quarter.

The Tiger trio of tailbacks finished the game with 227 yards on the ground and three touchdowns. Tate led the charge with 96 yards and a score, while Lester had 77 yards and two TDs. Fannin finished with 54 yards and a TD on the ground and 26 yards on three catches in the air.

The Commodores used three quarterbacks during the game. Starter Chris Nickson finished the first half completing just five of 16 passes for 38 yards and was replaced by backup Mackenzi Adams. Adams didn't fare much better, connecting on four of nine for 24 yards.

Richard Kovalcheck saw action in the final offensive series and completed three passes on six attempts for 26 yards.

The Tigers defense held Vanderbilt to 133 total yards on the ground and 88 in the air.

Once again, the Tigers played without four defensive starters, including defensive end Quentin Groves, who had played in 43 straight games.

True freshmen Josh Bynes and Ryan Williams saw action for the first time this season, bringing the number of true freshmen who have played this season to 15.

Brandon Cox marched Auburn 50 yards in a minute and 15 seconds and handed over the reigns to Wes Byrum it what seemed a deja vu moment for the Tigers. Byrum booted a 20-yard field goal with 21 seconds remaining to give Auburn a 9-7 win in front of a stunned 72,463 Arkansas fans in Razorback Stadium.

Two weeks ago Byrum drilled a 43-yard field goal as time expired to beat then-No. 4 Florida, 20-17, in Gainesville.

Auburn improved to 5-2 overall and 3-1 in the SEC, including a first-place tie in the SEC Western Division with LSU and Alabama.

Defense was the story of the game as the Tigers held the nation's best running duo - Darren McFadden and Felix Jones - to a mere 85 yards on the ground. It was their lowest combined total since Nov. 25, 2005.

Arkansas' running game averaged 338 yards per game entering the contest, but finished with a net of 67. McFadden brought with him the nation's third-ranked rushing game, averaging 155.8 yards, but was held to 43 total yards on 17 carries against the AU defense.

The Razorbacks were No. 10 in the nation in scoring at 42.6 points a game, but the Tigers limited Arkansas to seven points, which were not scored until 1:36 left in the fourth quarter.

After trailing most of the game, the Razorbacks were given new life when Byrum missed a 46-yard field goal with 4:19 left, keeping the score 6-0. A pass interference call against Auburn started the drive, and after 15-yard pass from Robert Johnson to Peyton Hills and a 17-yard run from Jones, Arkansas took the lead 7-6 when Casey Dick hit Lucas Miller with a 13-yarder in the end zone.

Brad Lester returned the ensuing kick 22 yards to the Auburn 47 and Cox came in and took over. He hit Rodgeriqu Smith for eight yards and Montez Billings for three before connecting with Robert Dunn for a 30-yard gain, the longest play of the game for either team. Ben Tate ran three straight times and set up Byrum for the game-winning kick.

Arkansas took possession after the Byrum kick and had 21 seconds to win the game, but Jerraud Powers ended any hope for the Razorbacks when he intercepted a Dick pass as the game clock expired.

For the third straight game, Auburn scored on its opening drive. The Tigers moved 67 yards on 14 plays and settled for a 22-yard Byrum field goal. Arkansas' best chance of scoring in the first half ended quickly when Alex Tejada missed a 41-yard field goal attempt with 10:51 left in the second quarter.

Auburn had two other scoring opportunities in the second half, but Byrum missed on a 36-yard field goal attempt on the last play of the third quarter and on the 46-yarder with 4:19 left in regulation.

With one second remaining in the game, LSU's Matt Flynn tossed a 22-yard touchdown pass to Demetrius Byrd in the back of the endzone, lifting fifth-ranked LSU to a 30-24 victory over No. 18 Auburn in front of 92,630 fans in Tiger Stadium.

Just minutes earlier it looked as if Brandon Cox had done it again as he led Auburn on an 83-yard touchdown drive that ended on a 3-yard pass to Rodgeriqu Smith with 3:21 remaining to give Auburn a 24-23 lead.

After a squibbed Auburn kickoff put LSU on its own 42, Flynn scrambled twice for 17 yards, and a 10-yard run by Jacob Hester gave LSU a first down at the Auburn 25. Two plays and three yards later it looked as if a game-winning field goal attempt for Colt David was on the horizon. Instead, LSU opted for game-winning Flynn pass to Byrd.

Hester gave LSU a 20-17 lead, its first of the game, early in the fourth quarter on a 5-yard touchdown catch and run just inside the pylon. Minutes later, LSU pushed its lead to 23-17 after David connected on a 33-yard field goal.

Auburn opened the game with an 11-play, 63-yard drive that ended in a 17-yard touchdown pass from Cox to Montez Billings. It marked the fourth straight game that Auburn has started with a lengthy scoring drive.

LSU tied it seven minutes later when Flynn found Keiland Williams for a 46-yard touchdown reception.

In the second quarter, Auburn forced its first of two game-changing turnovers, when Zac Etheridge caused LSU backup quarterback Ryan Perrilloux to fumble. Jerraud Powers recovered the ball and nearly reached the endzone on a 38-yard run to the 3-yard line.

Auburn's offense entered the game and moments later, Carl Stewart leaped into the endzone for the 1-yard score. After the Wes Byrum extra point, Auburn led 14-7.

Auburn entered halftime with a 17-7 lead after moving 90 yards in 12 plays to set up Byrum for a 22-yard field goal.

LSU inched with seven early in the third quarter after Flynn hit Early Doucet with a 33-yard pass, leading to a David 29-yard field goal. On its next drive, Flynn found a wide-open Brandon LaFell on the sideline, but LaFell bobbled the ball and it bounced into the hands of Patrick Lee.

Auburn's defense limited Ole Miss to 193 total yards and Brandon Cox threw a late 34-yard pass to Rodgeriquis Smith to clinch Auburn's 17-3 win over Ole Miss before a sellout crowd of 87,451 at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The Tigers led just 10-3 and faced third-and-eight at the Ole Miss 34 with 3:24 left in the game, when Cox hit Smith 10 yards downfield. Smith did the rest of the work himself, outracing the defenders to the end zone for the clinching score. Wes Byrum kicked the extra point to seal the victory with 3:15 remaining in the game.

Auburn's defense forced a three-and-out on the opening drive of the game and set up the Tigers offense from the 29. After nine running plays, Smith fumbled after catching a short pass from Cox and Ole Miss' Ashlee Palmer recovered at the 31.

After another Ole Miss three-and-out, Cox came in and marched 60 yards in nine plays that included a 27-yard pass to Mario Fannin. Brad Lester ran in for the 1-yard score and Zach Kutch added the extra point to put Auburn up 7-0 with 2:41 left in the first quarter.

Ole Miss got on the board at the end of the second quarter after a 14-play 56-yard drive that ended with a 51-yard field goal by Joshua Shene. The drive used up the final 3:57 of the half.

Auburn made it 10-3 when Byrum, who was nursing a quad injury, kicked a 36-yard field goal with 7:59 left in the third quarter.

After a pooch punt by Byrum in the fourth quarter, the Rebels made a strong attempt to tie the score after starting from their own 1-yard line. Ole Miss drove 79 yards in 13 plays to the Auburn 20, even while starting Rebel quarterback Seth Adams was replaced in the drive by Schaeffer after sustaining an injury.

On second-and-eight from the 20, Schaeffer fired a deep pass into the end zone that landed in the hands of Patrick Lee. The interception was Lee's fourth of the season and it gave Auburn the ball at its own 20.

On the ensuing drive, Cox converted third-down plays with a 23-yard pass to Smith and a 12-yarder to Montez Billings, setting up the score three plays later.

Brandon Cox played just three possessions but engineered three touchdown drives to help Auburn putt away Tennessee Tech, 35-3, on Homecoming in front of 85,754 fans in Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Auburn marched 64 yards in eight plays on its opening drive as Cox set up Ben Tate for a 2-yard touchdown run after just three minutes had ticked off the game clock.

Tennessee Tech's Henry Sailes returned Morgan Hull's 53-yard kickoff 67 yards to the Auburn 16. But the Golden Eagles gained just six yards on three plays, setting up Justin Kraemer for a 28-yard field goal. It would be Tennessee Tech's only points of the game.

A career-long 55-yard pass reception by Carl Stewart on Auburn's next drive set up his ensuing 2-yard rush up the middle for the score. Auburn finished the first quarter up, 14-3.

Cox completed his first seven passes, and connected four times on the Tigers' third offensive drive that ended with Robert Dunn's 16-yard touchdown to open the second quarter. It was Dunn's first career touchdown. With the score 21-3 and 13:59 remaining in the half, Cox made his exit from the game.

Blake Field, one of three quarterbacks to get playing time following Cox's departure, hit Dunn with a 20-yard touchdown pass with five minutes left in the third quarter, putting Auburn ahead 28-3. It was Field's first action at quarterback this season, and his fourth career touchdown pass.

The Tiger defense provided the final score of the game when Walter McFadden intercepted a Lee Sweeney pass and returned in 93 yards for the score. It was the third longest interception return in Auburn history and the first interception return for a touchdown since 2004.

Auburn accumulated 374 yards total offense, but allowed 304 by Tennessee Tech. The Tigers' four quarterbacks won the battle in the air as they finished with 259 yards, compared to 168 for the Golden Eagles.

Nine Auburn players had receptions during the game. Stewart racked up the most yards on his 55 -yard reception. Montez Billings added 44 yards on two catches and Dunn contributed 42 yards and two TD's.

In his short stay in the game, Cox finished completing 9-of-11 passes for

167 yards and a score. Field completed 6-of-11 for 92 yards and a TD.

Auburn's running game felt the loss of Brad Lester, who sat out with a minor groin injury. Tennessee Tech out-gained the Tigers on the ground, 168 to 115. Mario Fannin finished with 52 yards and Tate added 35 and a score.

The Bulldogs responded on their next possession as Matthew Stafford connected with Mohamed Massaquoi for a 58-yard touchdown as Georgia ended the quarter with a 10-3 advantage.

The Bulldogs extended their lead to 17-3 early in the second quarter when Stafford connected with Sean Bailey for a 13-yard score.

Auburn responded on its next drive as Ben Tate ran three consecutive times for 21 yards, including a 7-yard dash to the end zone. The Tigers were aided on the drive by a personal foul penalty by Georgia's Kelin Johnson, one of 10 penalties called against the Bulldogs during the game. Georgia ended the half up 17-10.

The Tigers evened the tilt early in the third quarter with the help of Jerraud Powers, who picked off a Stafford pass to set up the game-tying score. Brandon Cox found Mario Fannin for a 12-yard score to mark Fannin's first career receiving touchdown.

Auburn took the lead with 6:47 remaining in the third quarter on its next drive when Byrum sent a 33-yarder through the uprights.

Moments later, Stafford hit Bailey on a 45-yard pass, and Knowshon Moreno scored on a 24-yard run two plays later to give Georgia a 24-20 lead it would not relinquish the rest of the way.

The Bulldogs added two more scores in the fourth quarter on 1-yard runs by Brannan Southerland and Thomas Brown.

Cox completed 14-of-30 passes for 133 yards and a touchdown. Tate gained 58 yards on 13 carries and Lester added 45 yards on 16 carries.

Stafford finished 11-of-19 for 237 yards and two touchdowns. Georgia tallied 417 total offensive yards, while Auburn managed 216. Moreno finished with 101 yards on the ground and two scores.

Auburn ran its winning streak against Alabama to a school-record six games, limiting the Crimson Tide to season lows in points and total offense during a 17-10 victory in front of a sellout crowd of 87,451 fans at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The Tigers scored 10 first-quarter points then let their defense take over, as Alabama managed just 225 yards of offense, including a season low 113 through the air.

Auburn started strong, forcing a three-and-out, and then driving 65 yards on 12 plays, capped by a 3-yard touchdown run by Ben Tate that gave Auburn a 7-0 lead.

The Tigers' next possession started with a 31-yard pass from Brandon Cox to Rodgeriquis Smith, and ended with a 37-yard field goal by Wes Byrum for a 10-0 lead.

Alabama answered with an 11-play, 54-yard drive, but found itself facing a fourth down just outside the 1-yard line. John Parker Wilson's quarterback sneak appeared to come up short at first glance, but he eventually forced his way across the goal line for a touchdown to close the Tide within 10-7 with 11:37 left in the second quarter.

Alabama was driving towards another score late in the first half, but with just 17 seconds left, Jerraud Powers popped a potential 11-yard touchdown pass out of DJ Hall's hands, then caught the ball himself for an interception as the Tigers took a 10-7 lead into the lockerroom.

Auburn forced Alabama to punt on the Tide's first four possessions of the second half, and Robert Dunn's 31-yard punt return after the last punt set up Auburn's final scoring drive. Starting at the Alabama 44 with 8:48 left in the game, the Tigers ran nine plays before Cox snuck over from a yard out with 3:58 left to give Auburn a 17-7 lead.

Leigh Tiffin kicked a 49-yard field goal with 2:11 remaining to pull Alabama back within seven points, but Cole Bennett fell on an onsidess kick, and Brad Lester's 12-yard run on fourth-and-one allowed Auburn to run out the clock.

Lester finished with a career-best 98 yards rushing on 22 carries, while Tate had 77 yards and a score on just 11 rushes.

Cox, who became just the second Auburn quarterback after Jason Campbell to beat Alabama three times, completed 12 of his 22 passes for 117 yards.
