## FEW SECONDS ON THE SEC SEC FOOTBALL RELEASE HIGHLIGHTS

• Georgia's Knowshon Moreno (offense), Vanderbilt's Patrick Benoist (defense), Alabama's Javier Arenas (special teams), Jason Bosley of Auburn (offensive line), Jermaine Cunningham of Florida (defense line) and Arkansas' Joe Adams (freshman) named SEC Players of the Week (See page 5).

**SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY**

**THE OBJECTIVE**

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

**THE COACHES' CHALLENGE**

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

**THE SOURCE**

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Raycom Sports) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

**THE PLAYS**

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
  - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
  - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
  - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
  - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
  - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
  - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
  - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
  - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
  - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
  - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
  - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
  - a. Runner ruled not down.
  - b. Runner ruled down (new in 2008 / when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
  - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
  - d. Touching of a kick
  - e. Number of players on field
  - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
  - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
  - h. Field Goal Attempts (new in 2008 / only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

**THE PROCESS**

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

**THE EQUIPMENT**

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

**CBS SPORTS** - The 2008 season marks the 12th year for CBS as the league's national network television partner. CBS will televise up to 15 games per year throughout the season. CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 6 at 4 p.m. ET. The SEC and CBS announced a 15-year extension agreement in August.

**ESPN/ESPN2**, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com

(search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

**RAYCOM SPORTS (Formerly Jefferson-Pilot/Lincoln Financial Sports)** will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

**FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN)** together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

**SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS**

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2008 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

**2008 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE**

Following the 2008 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2008 regular season, the FedEx BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in Miami on Jan. 8 at 8 p.m. EST. The FedEx BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2008 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, FedEx Orange Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Allstate Sugar Bowl on Jan. 2 at 8 p.m. EST, and the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 5 at 8 p.m. ET.

## ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS



QB Casey Dick threw for 323 yards against UL-Monroe, the 11th 300-yard passing game in Arkansas history ... It's the second straight week Dick has accomplished the feat (318 vs. Western Illinois) ... He is second in Hog history with 38 career TD passes and tied for second in career completion percentage (55.5) ... Junior TB Michael Smith had a career-high 157 yards on 22 carries and two TDs ... DE Jake Bequette, CB Tramain Thomas and SS Dallas Washington got their first starts of the season ... WR Joe Adams, TE Andrew Davie, WR Lucas Miller and TB Michael Smith earned first starts on offense ... TE D.J. Williams had five catches for 124 yards and two TDs.

## AUBURN TIGERS



Auburn QBs completed passes to 11 different receivers against Southern Miss, the most in a single game since 2005 (11 vs. Ole Miss) ... The Tiger defense allowed its first points of the season at the 3:16 mark of the 3rd quarter ... Chris Todd made his first career start for the Tigers at QB while Eric Smith earned his first career start at running back ... Robert Dunn had 103 punt return yards against the Golden Eagles, a career high ... It marked the first time a Tiger had triple digits in punt return yards since 2001 (Joe Watkins vs. Ball State, 2001) ... PK Wes Byrum connected on a career-long 52-yard field goal ... Tiger defenses have held opponents scoreless in first half 36 times in Tuberville era.

## FLORIDA GATORS



A Ben Hill Griffin Stadium record crowd of 90,833 witnessed Gator-Hurricane matchup ... Florida has not committed a turnover in each of its last four outings ... Senior PK Jonathan Phillips recorded his first career field goal on his first career attempt (29 yards) ... The Gators put together a season-high 95-yard scoring drive.

## GEORGIA BULLDOGS



Under Mark Richt, Georgia is now 32-2 in non-conference games, including a 22-0 home mark (since 2001) ... The 56 points against Central Michigan were the most by a Richt-coached Georgia team at home (second overall - 62 vs. Kentucky at Lexington in 2004) ... Sophomore DE Demarcus Dobbs returned an interception 78 yards for a score, the longest INT return for Georgia since 2003 (99 by Odell Thurman vs. Auburn) ... Sophomore RB Knowshon Moreno rushed for 168 yards and three TDs and now has 1,561 career rush yards ... Sophomore LB Rennie Curran had 11 stops, two for losses, including a sack ... Senior WR Mohamed Massaquoi now has caught a pass in 23 straight games.

## KENTUCKY WILDCATS



Kentucky's defense kept its second straight opponent out of the end zone ... The Wildcats have given up just a field goal on defense in two games ... The last time UK had not given up an offensive touchdown in consecutive games was 1993 (Vanderbilt / East Carolina) ... Kentucky has now won 11 straight non-conference games, the longest such streak since a 17-game roll from 1954-60 ... Kentucky rushed for 297 yards against Norfolk State, the most by the 'Cats since 2004 (355 vs. Indiana) ... UK has scored 27-or-more points in four straight games ... UK held Norfolk State to just 165 total offensive yards, the least by an opponent since 1996 (91, Vanderbilt).

## LSU TIGERS



LSU's scheduled game against Troy on Sept. 6 was postponed due to the effects of Hurricane Gustav ... The game has been rescheduled to Nov. 15 ... LSU used seven first-time starters against Appalachian State, including five on defense ... Six true freshmen saw action against the Mountaineers ... RB Charles Scott had a career-high 160 rushing yards and the most by a Tiger since 2004 (250, Alley Broussard vs. Ole Miss) ... LSU has won 15 straight non-conference games dating back to 2006 ... The Tigers have won 28 straight games in Tiger Stadium ... LSU scored 31 first-half points against ASU, the most for the Tigers since 35 vs. Miss. State in 2006.

## OLE MISS REBELS



QB Jevan Snead became the first Rebel QB with four TD passes since Eli Manning against Memphis in 2003 ... He finished with 20-of-31 passes for 253 yards ... Junior RB Cordera Eason had a career-high four receptions for 26 yards, including his first TD catch ... Junior WR Shay Hodge has three TD receptions in two games this season ... He had a team-high five grabs for 66 yards against Wake ... Ole Miss' defense had four sacks against Wake ... Junior S Kendrick Lewis led team with nine total tackles, tying a career-best ... Senior DE Jermey Parnell saw his first football action for the Rebels ... He was a four-year letterwinner for the Ole Miss basketball team.

## MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS



The State defense sacked Southeastern Louisiana quarterbacks five times, the highest for the Bulldogs since 2000 (7 vs. Florida) ... Georgia and Florida look like locks for BCS games, and Auburn and LSU have the juice to get there, too."

"If LSU coach Les Miles wanted to pop off about the strength of the SEC vs. everybody else this season, he'd get no argument here. **BCS NATIONAL CHAMPIONS**

Since the inception of the BCS in 1998, the SEC leads all conferences with four national champions. Tennessee won the BCS' first national title in 1998, LSU won the crown in 2003, Florida's claimed the national championship in 2006 and LSU took the title this season. The Big 12 has two BCS national titles followed by the ACC, Big Ten, Pac-10 and Big East with one each.

**NATIONAL CHAMPIONS SINCE 1992**

Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC has the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with six. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (4). Here is a breakdown:

**TOP 25 FINISHES**

Since 2000, the Southeastern Conference has had more teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Poll than any other conference. The SEC has had 39 teams ranked in the last eight final USA Today Coaches polls, an average of almost five per season. The Big 12 is second with 31 teams ranked since 2000. The SEC has led or tied for lead in most teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Polls in seven of the last eight seasons.

For the 27th straight season, the SEC recorded the largest total attendance figure of any conference in the nation. In 2007, a total of 6,687,342 fans attended 89 games, an average of 75,139 per contest, also tops in the nation. SEC stadiums were filled to 97.69 percent of capacity for each home game in 2007. The SEC had six of the top 10 schools in total attendance in 2007 - Tennessee (4), Auburn (5), Georgia (6), LSU (7), Alabama (8) and Florida (9).

**SEC LEADS NATION WITH 263 FORMER PLAYERS ON 2007 NFL OPENING DAY**

**ROSTERS**

The Southeastern Conference had 263 players on the 2007 National Football League opening day active rosters, which led all conferences.

The Atlantic Coast Conference was second with 238 players, followed by the Big Ten with 234 players, Pac-10 with 183 players, Big 12 with 176 players and the Big East with 84 players.

Among SEC schools, Georgia was first with 37 former players on NFL rosters, followed by Tennessee with 36, LSU with 33, Florida with 31 and Auburn with 30. Alabama had 21 players on NFL rosters, while South Carolina had 19, Ole Miss and Mississippi State had 17 each, Arkansas had 12, Kentucky six and Vanderbilt with five.

The SEC had five of its schools with 30-or-more-players on NFL rosters. No other conference had two.

Nationally, Miami (Fla.) leads with 46 former players on NFL rosters, followed by Ohio State with 44, Florida State with 41, Tennessee with 36 and Georgia with 35.

The NFL Kickoff Weekend numbers were furnished by the National Football League and does not include any former SEC players that may have been activated after the opening weekend.

## THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

### THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

### ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last six years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 211 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 95 named to the first-team.
- During the last 12 years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award.
- Kentucky's Jacob Tamme was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last six years, the SEC has had 12 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

### FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2008-09 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama golfer Joseph Sykora and Auburn swimmer Kristen Hastrup were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2007-08.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. South Carolina football player William Brown and Vanderbilt lacrosse player Brooke Shinaberry were named recipients of this award in 2007-08.

### A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had three sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Katie Heenan of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics and Florida's Carolina Burckle was the top student-athlete in swimming & diving. Parker was the winner of the Honda National Collegiate Woman of the Year honor in 2007-08.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 69 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

### COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

### SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:  
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

### IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

### OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- In 2007-08, the SEC had 168 teams in 20 sports take part in NCAA post-season play, an average of almost eight teams per sport. Along with those numbers, the league also produced 457 first-team All-Americans, won five team and 46 individual national titles.
- Since 1990, the SEC has won 123 team and 851 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.2 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (281 of 369). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won 55 team titles. The SEC has won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, the most of any conference.

Phillip Fulmer is in his 17th season at Tennessee and overall with a record of 147-46 (.762). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Dave Clawson and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN UAB HAS THE BALL**

QB Joe Webb led all rushers in UAB's season opener vs. Tulsa, more than doubling the second-highest performance. Webb finished with 136 rushing yards (18 attempts) and is listed second in the Conference USA second-week statistics. After 66 yards at FAU, he is averaging 101 yards and ranks 28th nationally after two weeks. Frantrell Forrest recorded 11 receptions in Saturday's game at Florida Atlantic, the most catches by a Blazer in a game since 2002.

DTs Demonté Bolden and Dan Williams each posted four tackles and two for losses at UCLA. Elix Wilson led the team with a career-high 12 stops at UCLA, including two for a loss and a sack. Rico McCoy was second on the team with 106 tackles last season. He posted four tackles at UCLA. The secondary picked off four passes in the first half at UCLA. FS Demetrice Morley posted seven tackles and an INT. SS Eric Berry had three stops and a pick. He was fourth on the team in tackles in 2007.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL**

Keon Harris has made the most of his first career starts in the first two games of the 2008 season. The native of LaGrange, Ga. leads the Blazers in tackles with 12.5 and also has 2.0 tackles for loss thus far. Kevin Sanders led the team in interceptions last season with three and ranks No. 6 all-time at UAB in picks with eight. Joe Henderson is on the Butkis list, while Will Dunbar is on the Bronko Nagurski list.

Junior Jonathan Crompton will start his third career game. Crompton has played in 15 career games. Crompton completed 19 of 41 passes for 189 yards at UCLA. Arian Foster returns as the feature back after rushing for 1,193 yards and 12 touchdowns a season ago. Foster posted 96 yards on 13 carries at UCLA. He is just 588 yards from being UT's all-time leading rusher.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Blazer kicker Swayze Waters was one of the nation's best in 2007 as he handled both placekicking and punting duties. Waters, who was named as a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award, finished the season with 22 field goals in 28 attempts. He connected on 11-of-14 field goals of 40 yards or more, including 3-of-4 from beyond 50 yards. Waters led the Blazers in scoring with 87 points. With a 3-for-3 start in 2008, Waters' career field goal numbers are now 34-of-43.

Daniel Lincoln missed three field goals at UCLA after making 21 of 29 a year ago. Chad Cunningham takes over the punting duties for the first five games of the season. He averaged 46 yards per punt last season and 39 yards per punt at UCLA. Gerald Jones posted 109 yards in punt and kickoff returns at UCLA.

Bobby Petrino is in his first season at Arkansas and sixth overall with a record of 46-19 (.708). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Patrino and the defensive coordinator is Willy Robinson.

Mack Brown is in his 11th season at Texas with a record of 105-25 (.808) and in his 24th season overall with a record of 191-99-1 (.658). The Longhorns' offensive coordinator is Tony Franklin and the defensive coordinator is Paul Rhoads.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL**

Casey Dick has been racking up passing yards and record performances early in the 2008 season. The Razorback signal caller has recorded back-to-back 300-yard passing games with 318 yards in the season opener against Western Illinois and 323 yards in a win over Louisiana-Monroe. The 300-yard outings were the first of Dick's career and only the 10th and 11th 300-yard passing games in Razorback history. In fact, Dick became the first UA quarterback to record back-to-back 300-yard passing games.

During his three seasons, Brian Orakpo has tallied 98 tackles, 12 sacks, 22 TFL, 38 pressures, four PBD, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 37 games (12 starts). Rashad Bobino will be counted on to lead the linebacking corp. He has started 39 of his 41 career games and posted 201 tackles, 24 TFL, 4.5 sacks, 20 pressures, 10 PBU, an INT, two fumble recoveries and one forced fumble.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TEXAS HAS THE BALL**

Redshirt freshman linebacker Jerry Franklin is leading the way on the Razorbacks' defense. Franklin leads the Hogs with 19 tackles in the first two games. He has garnered 11 solo tackles and eight assisted stops. He has one tackle for loss (-2) and one forced fumble. He tallied a career-high 12 tackles in Arkansas' 28-27 win over Louisiana-Monroe. Defensive end Jake Bequette, cornerback Tramain Thomas and strong safety Dallas Washington all earned their first starts of the season against ULM. For Washington, it was his first career start in 38 career games.

With a victory at UTEP, Colt McCoy improved his career record to 22-6, which ties current UT assistant coach and former Longhorn QB Major Applewhite for seventh on UT's all-time victories list. During his 28-game career, McCoy has completed 537-of-800 passes (67.1%/No. 1 on UT's all-time list) for 6,377 yards and 58 TDs against 26 INTs for a passer rating of 151.5. Two of McCoy's top receivers in 2007 are back for 2008 in seniors Quan Cosby and Jordan Shipley.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Sophomore kicker Shay Haddock tallied the first two PAT of his Razorback career against ULM. Haddock came on in relief of Alex Tejada and provided the winning margin (PAT) to give Arkansas a 28-27 win over the Warhawks.

Cosby has also been key in the Longhorns' return game and is considered one of the nation's top return men. For his career, he has returned 56 kickoffs (No. 2 on UT's all-time list) for 1,381 yards (No. 2 on UT's all-time list) for a 24.7 ypr average (No. 6 on UT's all-time list) and 29 punts for 352 yards (12.1 ypr) and a TD.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL**

Matthew Stafford registered a career-high 275 yards passing during Georgia's 45-21 win over Georgia Southern to open the 2008 campaign. He has thrown for 4,760 yards with 30 TDs and 23 INTs in his Bulldog career. Knowshon Moreno has matched his career high in touchdowns in both games this year scoring three in each. Moreno is also tied for second in the nation in scoring with 18 points. Mohamed Massaquoi is the team's top receiving threat (8 rec., 134 yds., 2 TDs).

With a sack in the second quarter last week, junior linebacker Eric Norwood moved into seventh place in school history with 14 career sacks. Darian Stewart forced and recovered the third fumble of his career. Captain Munneryn was credited with four solo tackles, recorded a fumble recovery and broke up two passes in the season-opening win over NC State.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL**

Rennie Curran led the team with 11 tackles against CMU, including eight solo stops, two tackles for a loss and one sack. It was this second 10+ tackle game of his career. He had a career-high 13 against Kentucky last year. Demarcus Dobbs snagged a pass that teammate Prince Miller tipped and returned it 78 yards for a touchdown with 1:10 left in the first half versus CMU.

Sophomore quarterback Chris Smelley had a career passing night with 23 completions on 39 attempts at Vanderbilt. Smelley also scrambled for a career-long 24 yards during a fourth-quarter drive. Kenny McKinley's 19-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter was the 16th of his career, giving him sole possession of sixth place in school history. McKinley moved into fifth place in career receiving yards adding 23 tonight to sit at 2,199 in his career.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Blair Walsh enjoyed a memorable start to his collegiate career as he scored nine points in the 45-21 victory over Georgia Southern. He boomed the opening kickoff through the end zone for a touchback. Then, his first career field goal attempt came from 52 yards out and he punched it through. Against CMU, Walsh was 7-for-7 in PATs and was wide right on his only attempt, a 56 yarder.

Ryan Succop's field goal to end the first half last Thursday was the 32nd of his career, moving him into a tie with Daniel Weaver for fourth place in school history. When Vanderbilt blocked a field goal in the third quarter, it was the first time a Gamecock field goal attempt has been blocked since the Nov. 11, 2006, game at Florida.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN WESTERN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL**

For the game last week, 60 of WKU's 85 plays were runs as it tallied 248 yards on the ground. Tyrell Hayden led the way with a game-high 98 yards on 26 carries, and accounted for one of WKU's three rushing TDs. Marell Booker averaged 6.1 yards per carry — tallying 49 yards on eight runs. Darrius Brooks finished the night with 76 all-purpose yards, rushing twice for 33 yards and a score, while catching five passes for 43 yards. Jake Gaebler led the Topper receiving corps with 45 yards on five catches.

Rashad Johnson is one of the top rated defensive backs in the SEC. He led the league with six interceptions in 2007 and was named to the 2008 Bronco Nagurski Trophy watch list and Jim Thorpe Award watch list. In 38 career games, Johnson has 148 tackles and six interceptions. Johnson led UA with 94 tackles last season and was named first-team preseason All-SEC.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL**

Defensively in the win over Eastern Kentucky, Alonzo Higgins recorded double-figure tackles for the second straight game, tallying a team-high 11 stops. Blake Boyd also finished with seven tackles — including a sack, while Darvis McBride and Ryan Beard accounted for five tackles each.

John Parker Wilson is one of the school's most prolific quarterbacks. He is Alabama's all-time career leader in pass completions (511) and attempts (905). He owns single-season school records for total plays (104), total offense (2,950), pass attempts (462), completions (225), passing yards (2,846) and touchdown passes (18). He has started 28 straight games. Andre Smith and Antoine Caldwell anchor the line.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

After taking over the kicking duties from graduated senior and WKU all-time leading point scorer Chris James, junior Zac Minturn had a successful debut at Indiana, connecting on both his field-goal attempts (27 yds and 22 yds) — the first of his career — and hitting his only extra point try. To date, Minturn has not missed a single kick as a Hilltopper, as he was 6-for-6 in PATs prior to the '08 campaign.

Alabama junior place-kicker Leigh Tiffin ranks tied for ninth in this week's NCAA statistical rankings. The Crimson Tide kicker is averaging 2.0 field goals per game. Tiffin was outstanding in the opener against Clemson, hitting on 4-of-5 field goals, including a career-long 54-yarder. Tiffin has made 23 of his last 28 field goal attempts dating back to the Georgia game last year.

Tommy Tuberville is in his 10th season at Auburn with a record of 82-33 (.713) and in his 14th season overall with a record of 107-53 (.669). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Tony Franklin and the defensive coordinator is Paul Rhoads.

Sylvester Croom is in his fifth season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 18-31 (.367). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorvey and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Harbison.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL**

Chris Todd completed 21-of-31 passes for 248 yards in his first career start for Auburn last Saturday vs. Southern Miss. Todd completed 7-of-9 passes for 90 yards in the first 10 minutes of the game, surpassing Auburn's entire passing yardage total from the season opener. Rodgeriquis Smith has a team-high six receptions for 78 yards this season. He needs just three more catches and 52 yards to move into the top 10 in both categories in Auburn history.

DB Keith Fitzhugh is tied for the SEC lead with two interceptions. Dominic Douglas racked up the second most tackles among all Bulldog defenders a year ago, and led the team in stops twice. Against Louisiana Tech, Douglas was second on the squad with nine tackles, one shy of his career high and against SLU Douglas recorded four stops, one tackle for loss and a forced fumble. All-SEC free safety Derek Pegues roams the secondary.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL**

The Tigers currently rank tied for eighth nationally in scoring defense (6.5) and are tied for 13th in rushing defense (60.5). Antonio Coleman and Sen'Derrick Marks anchor the defensive line. Coleman had team highs of 18.5 tackles for loss and 8.5 sacks last season, while Marks has been named to several preseason All-America teams. Tray Blackmon and Craig Stevens are the heart of the linebacker position.

Junior wideout Brandon McRae has hauled in 12 catches for 132 yards in the Bulldogs' first two games. His 12 receptions are the most by a State receiver through the first two games of the season since Justin Jenkins had 15 in the first two contests of 2003. McRae's 6.0 catch-per-game average ranks atop the SEC and 36th nationally. With 171 yards on 36 carries in the first two games, junior tailback Anthony Dixon has now compiled 1,905 rushing yards on 492 attempts in 27 career games.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Robert Dunn currently leads the SEC and ranks sixth nationally in punt returns, averaging 24.4 yards per return, and his 171 punt return yards is the most in the nation. In the season opener against Louisiana-Monroe, Dunn snapped an Auburn streak of 144 consecutive games and 374 punt returns without a touchdown, which was the longest streak in the nation, by returning a kick 66 yards for a score.

Senior punter Blake McAdams has started each game for the past three seasons for the Bulldogs, and his career numbers are approaching some of the all-time records set in the SEC. McAdams set a new MSU school record for total punts with his 224 (previous: 217, Dana Moore, 1979-82). He is now only 53 shy of the SEC mark.

Houston Nutt is in his first season at Ole Miss and in his 16th season overall with a record of 112-71 (.612). Kent Austin serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SAMFORD HAS THE BALL**

Marcus Rice led the group with 10 rushes for 81 yards and a touchdown last week, while Chris Evans rushed eight times for 66 yards and two touchdowns, all in the first half. Evans, who became Samford's first 1,000-yard rusher since 1999 last season, rushed for 180 yards and two touchdowns on 21 carries against West Georgia. Richie Fordham completed all six of his passes for 47 yards, while starter Dustin Taliaferro completed 5-of-7 passes for 95 yards and a TD.

Kendrick Lewis led the team and equaled his career high with nine total tackles against Wake Forest. He has registered seven or more stops in each of the first two games. After only two passes defended in 2007, Lewis leads the team with four this year. Senior S Jamarca Sanford was credited with eight total stops with 0.5 TFL and a forced fumble on Saturday. Sanford ranks second in the SEC with 10.5 tpp.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL**

Rodney Shepherd was Samford's leading tackler for the second year in a row in 2007. He tallied 88 tackles, including 68 solo stops. He had 4.0 tackles for a loss on the season as well. Rumiko Forrester and Ty Levie each had an interception versus Faulkner. Freshman Alex Davis had two and a half sacks for 13 yards. Jeremy Richardson had a blocked punt on special teams.

Jevan Snead finished the Wake Forest game 20-of-31 for 253 yards with one interception, four touchdowns and connected with six different receivers. In his first two outings, Snead has thrown an SEC-high six TDs with just one pick and is averaging 219.0 passing yards per game. Shay Hodge hauled in another TD Saturday, giving him three in the first two games. Dexter McCluster has scored a touchdown in both games, rushing for a 32-yard score in the opener and grabbing a 31-yard TD pass on Saturday.

Sophomore Mark Prevost returns as the team's place-kicker. As a true freshman in 2007, Prevost made 14 of 21 field goals and 28 of 31 extra-point attempts. Bob Hooper, who stepped in midseason last year, returns as the team's main punter. Last season, Hooper averaged 39.1 yards on 15 punts. He placed four of his kicks inside the opponents' 20-yard line.

K-P Justin Sparks posted a career-best three touchbacks in five kickoffs at Wake Forest. Sophomore WR Lionel Breaux notched his first career kickoff returns Saturday with two for 44 yards. Junior K Joshua Shene is a perfect 9-for-9 on PATs this year to extend his streak to 31 consecutive extra points converted. He has connected on 53-of-54 career PATs. Shene's 47-yard FG against Memphis marked the third longest of his career. He was 2-for-2 in the game and for the year.

David Bailiff is in his second season at Rice with a record of 5-9 (.357) and fifth overall with a record of 26-24 (.520). The Owls' offensive coordinator is Tom Herman and the defensive coordinators are Chuck Driesbach and Craig Naivar.

Bobby Johnson is in his seventh season at Vanderbilt with a record of 22-50 (.306) and in his 15th season overall with a record of 82-86 (.488). The Commodores' offensive coordinator is Ted Cain and the defensive coordinator is Bruce Fowler.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN RICE HAS THE BALL**

Jarett Dillard caught his fourth touchdown pass of the year at Memphis, after tying his school record by catching three TD passes against SMU (the sixth time he has caught three in a game). He now has 44 career touchdown catches, which ranks third on the NCAA career list. Chase Clement has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 12 consecutive games overall and in 18 consecutive C-USA games. He threw six versus SMU in week one.

Patrick Benoist set a career high with 15 total tackles against the Gamecocks, including a six-yard QB sack and a two-yard tackle for loss. He also added a defended pass in the performance. Benoist smashed his previous high of eight tackles against Temple in 2006. The effort earned him SEC Defensive Player of the Week honors. Greg Billinger had two sacks and a blocked field goal. Reshard Langford leads the secondary.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL**

Senior linebacker Brain Raines, who was added to the watch list for the Rotary Lombardi Award last week, has 233 career tackles heading into his senior season. Andrew Sendejo leads the team with 17 tackles in the first two games this year, including 13 against Memphis for his fifth career game in double figures. Brandon King has eight career interceptions heading into the 2008 season.

Chris Nickson compiled just 107 total yards versus USC, but managed the 'Dore offense with precision, accounting for two touchdowns and limiting mistakes for the second straight game. With 90 passing yards, he becomes just the third Commodore QB to reach 3,000 passing yards and 1,000 rushing yards in his career. Jared Hawkins finished the game with 84 rushing yards on 17 carries. The rushing attempts and yardage total marked new career highs for Hawkins.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Clark Fangmeier moved into the Rice career scoring chart with 10 points against Memphis, matching his career best set last year vs. Houston. He now has 144 career points, which ties him for seventh with Mark Williams and Chad Nelson. Fangmeier kicked his first two field goals of the year, to tie his single-game high. Fangmeier, who set a school record last year with 46 PATs, moved into second on the Owls' career list while tying his school record with eight conversions against SMU.

Bryant Hahnfeldt continued to take aim at the Commodore all-time scoring record for kickers. He added a 19-yard field goal and three PAT conversions to surpass the 200-point plateau for his career. Hahnfeldt is 3-3 this season on field goal attempts. D.J. Moore returned a punt 91 yards in the opener at Miami (Fla.)

Rick Stockstill is in his third season at MTSU and overall with a record of 13-14 (.481). The Blue Raiders' offensive coordinator is G.A. Mangus and the defensive coordinator is Manny Diaz.

Rich Brooks is in his sixth season at Kentucky with a record of 27-35 (.435) and 24th overall with a record of 118-144-4 (.451). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Joker Phillips and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MTSU HAS THE BALL**

In two games, Joe Craddock is averaging 228 yards through the air and has hit 48 of 72 passes (.667) to go along with three touchdowns. A two-time all-conference player as an all-purpose specialist, Desmond Gee has continued his artwork in 2008. The junior has been over the 100-yard mark eight times in the last 13 games, including a season-high of 127 yards against Troy.

Trevard Lindley broke up one pass against Norfolk State to increase his total to 25 career breakups, two shy of the record of 27 held by Antoine Huffman. Myron Pryor became the first Wildcat defensive lineman to be named the SEC Defensive Player of the Week in 16 years for his performance at Louisville in Week One after causing a fumble, stopping a key fourth down play and returning a fumble for a touchdown.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL**

Middle Tennessee came up with three interceptions in the win over Maryland to run its season total to four and all three were key to the victory. Two of the interceptions prevented Maryland scores, while the other set up a Blue Raider touchdown. LB Danny Carmichael and CB Ted Riley both came up with their first career picks with Carmichael's setting up a short touchdown run by Phillip Tanner. The last one was turned in by Alex Suber in the corner of the endzone to seal the win. It was the second of Suber's career.

True freshman Randall Cobb completed six of 11 passes for 87 yards with one touchdown, rushing for 49 yards on eight attempts with two touchdowns, all career highs, last week in the home opener. Dicky Lyons caught four passes for 43 yards with one receiving TD last week. He now ranks ninth on the career receptions list (115), fifth on the career receiving yards list (1,564) and tied for fourth on the career receiving TD list (17). Derrick Locke's rushing total of 96 yards was a career high.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

David DeFatta has been the best in the Sun Belt Conference at placing punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line. Last year, DeFatta put 28 of his 73 punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line (38 percent) to lead the league. His 28 inside the 20 went down as the most in a season since the stat started being kept in 1999. DeFatta, who has averaged over 40.0 yards a punt during his career, ran his career total to 30 with one in the win over Maryland and now has at least one punt downed inside the 20-yard line in 14 straight games.

Tim Masthay, the SEC leader in touchbacks last season, has 10 touchbacks on the season after six touchbacks against Norfolk State. He led the SEC with 23 touchbacks last season. Lones Seiber tallied 99 points last season, setting the school record for most points by a kicker.

Todd Dodge is in his second season at North Texas and overall with a record of 2-12 (.143). The Mean Green offensive coordinator is Todd Ford and the defensive coordinator is Gary DeLoach.

Les Miles is in his fourth season at LSU with a record of 35-6 (.854) and eighth overall with a record of 63-27 (.700). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinators are Doug Mallory and Bradley Peveto.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN NORTH TEXAS HAS THE BALL**

The Mean Green is averaging an impressive 5.1 yards per rush this season with true freshman Lance Dunbar leading the way with a 7.2 yards-per-carry average and junior Cam Montgomery not far behind at 6.9 yards-per-carry. Dunbar also had four kickoff returns for 51 yards. Casey Fitzgerald, despite having played only 25 career games entering this week's game, has a chance to become the all-time leading receiver in school history this season.

Defensively, S Danny McCray recording a team-best 7 tackles in the opener, while DE Rahim Alem led the Tigers with a pair of tackles for losses and one sack. Senior defensive end Tyson Jackson (36 tackles, 3.5 sacks in 2007) headlines the list of starters up front for the Tigers. The LSU linebacking corps will revolve around Darry Beckwith, who will occupy the middle for the Tigers. A second-team All-SEC pick in 2007, Beckwith had 65 tackles and 6.5 tackles for loss last year.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL**

Tobe Nwigwe had a career-high 13 tackles against Tulsa, leading all defenders in the game. Nwigwe had 10 solo stops and assisted on three more. He also had a tackle for a loss of two yards. Nwigwe is leading the team with 22 total tackles after two games. The defensive line does not have any quarterback sacks and has only senior Ryan Davenport among the team's top eight tacklers.

RB Charles Scott currently leads the SEC in both rushing yards per game (160.0) and total offense (174.0). Scott opened the season by rushing for 160 yards and a pair of TDs in the 41-13 win over Appalachian State. LSU QBs Andrew Hatch and Jarrett Lee combined to complete 13 of 24 passes for 193 yards and 3 scores in the season-opener with WR Brandon LaFell leading the team in receptions with 4 for 87 yards and a pair of scores. WR Demetrius Byrd caught the other TD pass for the Tigers.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Senior punter Truman Spencer has quietly put together one of the most consistent careers at North Texas. He has had back-to-back seasons of averaging over 40 yards per kick and has improved his average each year since his freshman season. Since 2002 North Texas has averaged at least 40 yards a kick or more from its punters in every year but one, 2005, which was Spencer's freshman season. Antoine Bush has started 25 of 26 games and played in all 26 games since his freshman year.

The LSU special teams have been one of the strengths of the team and that should continue in 2008 with the return of All-SEC place kicker Colt David and return specialist Trindon Holliday. David set both LSU and SEC records a year ago with 147 total points, which included kicking a school-record 26 field goals. He has battled injury early this fall. Holliday will continue to return kickoffs for the Tigers after a 26.2 yard per return average a year ago.
