**SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY**

**THE OBJECTIVE**

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

**THE COACHES' CHALLENGE**

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

**THE SOURCE**

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Raycom Sports) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

**THE PLAYS**

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
  - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
  - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
  - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
  - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
  - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
  - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
  - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
  - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
  - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
  - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
  - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
  - a. Runner ruled not down.
  - b. Runner ruled down (new in 2008 / when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
  - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
  - d. Touching of a kick
  - e. Number of players on field
  - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
  - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
  - h. Field Goal Attempts (new in 2008 / only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

**THE PROCESS**

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

**THE EQUIPMENT**

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 6 at 4 p.m. ET. The SEC and CBS announced a 15-year extension agreement in August.

**ESPN/ESPN2**, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com

(search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

**RAYCOM SPORTS (Formerly Jefferson-Pilot/Lincoln Financial Sports)** will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

**FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN)** together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

**SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS**

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2008 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

**2009 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE**

Following the 2008 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2008 regular season, the FedEx BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in Miami on Jan. 8 at 8 p.m. EST. The FedEx BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2008 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, FedEx Orange Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Allstate Sugar Bowl on Jan. 2 at 8 p.m. EST, and the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 5 at 8 p.m. ET.



## SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES



## ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

Alabama's defense scored two touchdowns against Arkansas, marking the fourth time since 2001 the Tide has accomplished the feat ... It is the first time in school history that two interception were returned for scores (Javier Arenas 63 yards, Justin Woodall 74 yards) ... The Tide have outscored opponents 64-0 in the first quarter this season ... The 35 first-half points were the most for the Tide since scoring 42 against UTEP in 2001 ... Alabama's 49 points were the most by a Tide team in an SEC game since scoring 59 against Vanderbilt in 1990 ... Alabama's defense has not allowed a rushing touchdown in 20 quarters ... QB John Parker Wilson set a Tide career mark with 42 TD passes.

## ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS

Nine different Razorbacks caught passes against Alabama - a season high ... QB Casey Dick completed 20-of-39 passes for 190 yards against Alabama ... In the Arkansas career record books, Dick is now fifth in completions (335), sixth in attempts (607), eighth in passing yards (4,101), third in TD passes (39) and tied for fourth in completion percentage (.552) ... Michael Smith had a career-high six receptions for 67 yards ... Arkansas' defense recorded its first takeaway of the season on Ramon Broadway's interception in the fourth quarter ... Arkansas was 2-for-3 on fourth downs against Alabama and is now 4-of-6 this season.



## LSU TIGERS

LSU won at Auburn, 26-21, for its first win on the Plains since 1998 ... LSU recovered an onside kick in the third quarter, which was its first recovered onside kick since 2001 ... RB Charles Scott became the first LSU running back to rush for three consecutive 100-yard games since Joseph Addai did it against Vanderbilt, Florida and Auburn in October 2005 ... Keiland Williams is the first LSU running back to complete a TD pass since Kevin Faulk did so to Larry Foster versus Mississippi State on Oct. 26, 1996 ... After converting just one of eight drives for points in the first half, LSU scored on four of seven possessions in the second half against Auburn.



## AUBURN TIGERS

LSU's field goal with 2:02 left in the first quarter were the first points allowed in the first half by Auburn this season ... LSU converted a third-and-four in the second quarter, marking the first successful third-down conversion against Auburn since the first quarter of the Southern Miss game ... Auburn had not allowed a successful conversion in 28 consecutive tries ... Auburn allowed LSU to convert just 4-of-14 third-down attempts. Auburn opponents are now 7-of-60 on third downs this season .. Rodrigues Smith is now tied for 8th in Tiger history with 97 career receptions.



## OLE MISS REBELS

Junior Dexter McCluster recorded a career-high 132 receiving yards and equaled his career best of seven receptions ... He finished with 176 all-purpose yards, having also rushed for 44 yards on seven carries ... Senior DT Peria Jerry scored the first TD of his career on a fumble recovery and 13-yard return ... It was Ole Miss' first fumble return for a score since 2005 ... Junior DE Greg Hardy saw his first action of the season and had two solo tackles, including a five-yard sack ... Senior Mike Wallace returned a kickoff 98 yards for a TD against Vanderbilt and had a school record 202 return yards in the game (fourth-highest in SEC history).



## MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS

With 94 yards against Georgia Tech, Junior TB Anthony Dixon now has 2,004 career rushing yards, making him the 10th player in State history to pass the 2,000 yard mark ... Dixon's 71-yard rush against Tech was the longest of his career ... Dixon now has 512 career rushing attempts, the fifth player in school history to have more than 500 career attempts in MSU annals ... Redshirt frosh Terrell Johnson earned the first start of his career at WLB ... True freshman TE Kendrick Cook saw the first action of his career ... Redshirt freshman RB Robert Elliott finished with a career-high 36 yards on nine carries.



## FLORIDA GATORS

RS Brandon James had his fourth career punt return for a TD, which tied the school record (Jacquez Green, 1995-97) and is tied for third in SEC history ... Florida has outscored opponents, 24-0, in the first quarter this season ... The Gators have not allowed a touchdown in the opening half of any game this season ... UF has outscored opponents, 57-3, prior to halftime in 2008 ... The Gators are +9 in turnover margin this season ... PK Jonathan Phillips connected on all three field goal attempts against the Vols (39, 40, 27 yards) ... There were 16 players on the UF travel roster to Knoxville that were making their first career road trip.



## SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS

Carolina tied its season high with 42 rushes and amassed a season-high 172 yards on the ground against Wofford ... The Gamecocks had season highs of 76 plays for 376 yards and 30 first downs against the Terriers ... Making their first career starts against Wofford were Terrence Campbell at right guard and Weslye Saunders at tight end ... PK Ryan Succop is now third in the Carolina record books with 35 career field goals made and is tied for sixth place with 187 points scored ... Carolina did not punt against Wofford and had three drives of five minutes or more.



## GEORGIA BULLDOGS

Georgia held Arizona State to four yards rushing on 19 attempts ... It was Arizona State's lowest rushing total since they netted minus-2 against California on Nov. 9, 2002 ... TB Knowshon Moreno rushed for 149 yards on 23 carries and two touchdowns while freshman WR A.J. Green caught a career-best eight passes for 159 yards and a score ... Georgia's defense held Arizona State in 7 of 11 drives to five plays or less ... The Sun Devils were held to just 2-of-11 on third down conversions ... Georgia outgained ASU 461-212 in the game ... QB Matthew Stafford completed 16-of-28 passes for 285 yards with a TD and no interceptions.



## TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS

Eight different Vols caught passes against Florida ... Senior WR Lucas Taylor extended his streak to 17 straight games with at least one catch, tying for eighth the longest streak in UT history ... Soph. WR Gerald Jones led the Vols against the Gators with career-highs in receptions (5) and receiving yards (40) ... Senior TB Arian Foster is sixth in career rushing at UT with 2,627 yards ... He had 37 yards on 14 carries against Florida ... Soph. DB Dennis Rogan had a career-high 165 kickoff return yards ... Tennessee's defense held Florida to just 243 yards on 54 plays, an average of 4.5 yards per play.



## KENTUCKY WILDCATS

Kentucky's 20-14 win over Middle Tennessee was UK's 12th consecutive non-conference victory, currently tied for the third-longest streak in the nation ... Boston College has an 18-game such streak followed by LSU (16) while Georgia and the Wildcats are tied for third (12) ... QB Mike Hartline completed 28 of 47 passes for 254 yards and two touchdowns, all career highs ... Dicky Lyons caught a career-high 12 passes for 79 yards ... The last time a UK player caught 10+ passes was Rafael Little with 11 catches vs. Tennessee last season ... Lyons ranks 8th on the career receptions list (127), 5th on the career receiving yards list (1,643) and tied for 4th on the career receiving TD list (17).



## VANDERBILT COMMODORES

The Commodores are 4-0 for the first time since the 2005 season and the second time the 'Dores have accomplished that feat since 1984 ... Vandy is ranked in the Top 25 for the first time since 1984 ... It is the first 2-0 SEC start since 2004 and just the second time since 1956 for the Commodores to open league play with two straight wins ... Ryan Hamilton tied a school record with three interceptions against Ole Miss and also had a fumble recovery ... Vandy has trailed in every game so far this season but has outscored opponents 51-10 in the second half this season ... LB Chris Marve set a career-high with 11 tackles against the Rebels.

**BCS NATIONAL CHAMPIONS**

Since the inception of the BCS in 1998, the SEC leads all conferences with four national champions. Tennessee won the BCS' first national title in 1998, LSU won the crown in 2003, Florida's claimed the national championship in 2006 and LSU took the title this season. The Big 12 has two BCS national titles followed by the ACC, Big Ten, Pac-10 and Big East with one each.

**NATIONAL CHAMPIONS SINCE 1992**

Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC has the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with six. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (4). Here is a breakdown:

- Big 12 - Texas (2005), Oklahoma (2000), Nebraska (1994, 1995, 1997)

- Big East - Miami, Fla. (2001)

**TOP 25 FINISHES**

Since 2000, the Southeastern Conference has had more teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Poll than any other conference. The SEC has had 39 teams ranked in the last eight final USA Today Coaches polls, an average of almost five per season. The Big 12 is second with 31 teams ranked since 2000. The SEC has led or tied for lead in most teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Polls in seven of the last eight seasons.

For the 27th straight season, the SEC recorded the largest total attendance figure of any conference in the nation. In 2007, a total of 6,687,342 fans attended 89 games, an average of 75,139 per contest, also tops in the nation. SEC stadiums were filled to 97.69 percent of capacity for each home game in 2007. The SEC had six of the top 10 schools in total attendance in 2007 - Tennessee (4), Auburn (5), Georgia (6), LSU (7), Alabama (8) and Florida (9).

**SEC LEADS NATION WITH 263 FORMER PLAYERS ON 2007 NFL OPENING DAY**

**ROSTERS**

The Southeastern Conference had 263 players on the 2007 National Football League opening day active rosters, which led all conferences.

The Atlantic Coast Conference was second with 238 players, followed by the Big Ten with 234 players, Pac-10 with 183 players, Big 12 with 176 players and the Big East with 84 players.

Among SEC schools, Georgia was first with 37 former players on NFL rosters, followed by Tennessee with 36, LSU with 33, Florida with 31 and Auburn with 30. Alabama had 21 players on NFL rosters, while South Carolina had 19, Ole Miss and Mississippi State had 17 each, Arkansas had 12, Kentucky six and Vanderbilt with five.

The SEC had five of its schools with 30-or-more-players on NFL rosters. No other conference had two.

Nationally, Miami (Fla.) leads with 46 former players on NFL rosters, followed by Ohio State with 44, Florida State with 41, Tennessee with 36 and Georgia with 35.

The NFL Kickoff Weekend numbers were furnished by the National Football League and does not include any former SEC players that may have been activated after the opening weekend.

## THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

### THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

### ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last six years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 211 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 95 named to the first-team.
- During the last 12 years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award.
- Kentucky's Jacob Tamme was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last six years, the SEC has had 12 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

### FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2008-09 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama golfer Joseph Sykora and Auburn swimmer Kristen Hastrup were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2007-08.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. South Carolina football player William Brown and Vanderbilt lacrosse player Brooke Shinaberry were named recipients of this award in 2007-08.

### A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had three sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Katie Heenan of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics and Florida's Carolina Burckle was the top student-athlete in swimming & diving. Parker was the winner of the Honda National Collegiate Woman of the Year honor in 2007-08.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 69 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

### COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

### SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:  
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

### IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

### OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- In 2007-08, the SEC had 168 teams in 20 sports take part in NCAA post-season play, an average of almost eight teams per sport. Along with those numbers, the league also produced 457 first-team All-Americans, won five team and 46 individual national titles.
- Since 1990, the SEC has won 123 team and 851 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.2 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (281 of 369). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won 55 team titles. The SEC has won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, the most of any conference.

**THE COACHES**

Houston Nutt is in his first season at Ole Miss and in his 16th season overall with a record of 113-72 (.611). Kent Austin serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

Urban Meyer is in his fourth season at Florida with a record of 34-8 (.810) and in his eighth season overall with a record of 73-16 (.820). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Dan Mullen and Charlie Strong serves as the defensive coordinator.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL**

Cordera Eason is averaging 78.0 rushing yards per game in the last two outings and is now tied with Brandon Bolden for the team-lead in rushing yards with 206 on 43 carries. Dexter McCluster is tied for fifth in the SEC in all-purpose yards (102.5 per game), just ahead of teammate Mike Wallace (102.2 per game). He recorded a career-high 132 receiving yards and equaled his career-best of seven receptions against Vanderbilt. Among the SEC leaders, sophomore QB Jevan Snead is tied for first in TD tosses (6) and is third in total offense (215.5 ypg) and passing average (211.0 ypg).

Brandon Spikes led the Gators in tackles against Tennessee with 10 stops. He has led the Gators in tackles in each of the last seven games he has played in. In addition, he has recorded 10-or-more tackles in each of his last four outings. Jermaine Cunningham leads the SEC and is tied for 23rd nationally in sacks this season with a total of 2.5 (.83 per game).

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL**

Peria Jerry finished with six total tackles, including 2.5 for losses, with a fumble recovery and a return for a touchdown in Ole Miss' 23-17 loss to Vanderbilt. Jerry's forced fumble and 13-yard return for a touchdown came in the first quarter and gave the Rebels a 10-0 lead. Jerry is tied for the team-lead in TFLs with 4.5, despite missing the opener. Kendrick Lewis led the team against Vanderbilt and equaled his career high with nine total tackles. Lewis is tied for fifth in the SEC. Jamarca Sanford is fifth in the SEC with 8.0 tackles per game.

UF is also the only team in the nation that has not turned the ball over this year. The Gator offense is led by 2007 Heisman Trophy winner and junior QB Tim Tebow, who tops the team in rushing (118 yards) and passing (489 yards). He ranks second in the SEC in pass efficiency with a mark of 149.3. Percy Harvin has scored a touchdown in each of the last five games he has played in. In the last five games he has played in, Harvin has touched the ball 77 times for 808 yards (10.5 yards per touch) and he has had seven touchdowns.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Ole Miss has registered two TDs in the return game in the last two games with Mike Wallace's 98-yard kickoff return against Vanderbilt and Marshay Green's 77-yard punt return against Samford. After no touchbacks on kickoffs last year, the Rebels have registered seven in the first four games, courtesy of junior Justin Sparks.

Brandon James is the only player in the nation to return two punts for touchdowns this season. James had a 74-yard return against Hawaii and an 78-yard return at Tennessee to increase his career total to four. The total is tied for the UF school record (Jacquez Green, 1995-96) and is tied for third with several others in SEC history. James has also tied the school record for punt returns for touchdowns in a season.

Phillip Fulmer is in his 17th season at Tennessee and overall with a record of 148-47 (.758). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Dave Clawson and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

Tommy Tuberville is in his 10th season at Auburn with a record of 83-34 (.709) and in his 14th season overall with a record of 108-54 (.667). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Tony Franklin and the defensive coordinator is Paul Rhoads.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL**

Jonathan Crompton will start his fifth career game. Crompton has played in 17 career games. He has four interceptions through three games. Arian Foster boasted 196 yards on 25 carries in his first two games, but gained on 37 yards on 14 carries vs. Florida. He is 451 yards from being UT's all-time leading rusher. Lucas Taylor led the team with 73 catches for 1,000 yards last season and had nine catches for 132 yards vs. UAB.

Sen'Derrick Marks has been a terror on the defensive line for the Auburn defense. Marks leads the SEC and ranks tied for 11th nationally with seven tackles for loss. Marks, who has started all 30 games since the start of the 2006 season, now has 27 tackles for loss during his career. Antonio Coleman has three sacks, which is tied for second in the SEC, and has 15 tackles, including 5.5 for loss. Jerraud Powers is off to a terrific start to the 2008 season, leading the squad with 22 tackles (16 solo).

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL**

Eli Wilson led the team in tackles in each of the first two games (12 at UCLA, 7 vs. UAB). Rico McCoy led the Vols with 10 stops vs. Florida. He and Wilson have stepped up to assume leadership roles. Wilson has 3.5 TFLs this season and one sack. McCoy was second on the team with 106 tackles last season. He posted four tackles at UCLA and four vs. UAB. SS Eric Berry has seven career interceptions (two this season).

Junior Ben Tate leads the team with 323 yards rushing and ranks 20th in Auburn history with 1,618 career yards. Senior Brad Lester had 174 yards this season and has pushed his career total to 1,574, which ranks 21st. Chris Todd threw for a career-best 250 yards Sept. 20 against LSU, tossing a go-ahead 15-yard touchdown to Robert Dunn with 6:40 left in the game. Rodgeriquis Smith has a team-high 13 receptions for 159 yards this season, and now ranks in the top 10 in school history in both receptions and receiving yards.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Daniel Lincoln is 1-of-4 this season after making 21 of 29 a year ago. The Vols have not attempted a field goal since the UCLA game. Chad Cunningham is averaging 37.8 yards per punt this season after averaging 46 yards per punt last season. Gerald Jones posted 109 yards in punt and kickoff returns at UCLA, but only got one opportunity vs. UAB.

Robert Dunn currently ranks eighth nationally in punt returns, averaging 21.4 yards per return, and his 193 punt return yards is tied for sixth most in the nation. In the season opener against Louisiana-Monroe, Dunn snapped an Auburn streak of 144 consecutive games and 374 punt returns without a touchdown, which was the longest streak in the nation, by returning a kick 66 yards for a score.

Bobby Petrino is in his first season at Arkansas and sixth overall with a record of 46-19 (.708). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Patrino and the defensive coordinator is Willy Robinson.

Mack Brown is in his 11th season at Texas with a record of 106-25 (.809) and in his 24th season overall with a record of 192-100-1 (.657). The Longhorns' offensive coordinator is Greg Davis and the defensive coordinator is Will Muschamp.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL**

Casey Dick leads the SEC and ranks 20th in the nation in total offense per game with an average of 288.33 yards per outing. He leads the SEC in passing yards per game (277.0 ypg). Michael Smith leads the Razorbacks with 248 yards and two touchdowns on 41 carries thus far this season. D.J. Williams leads the Razorbacks in catches and receiving yards with 15 receptions for 217 yards. He also leads the Hogs with two touchdowns.

Brian Orakpo has posted 13 tackles, four sacks, five TFL, eight pressures, two PBD and a forced fumble. Ryan Palmer has notched 116 tackles, six TFL, two INTs, 17 PBU, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery during his 39-game career (16 starts). Palmer opened 2008 by notching two tackles and an INT. Rashad Bobino has started 40 of his 42 career games and posted 202 tackles, 24 TFL, 4.5 sacks, 20 pressures, 10 PBU, an INT, two fumble recoveries and one forced fumble.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TEXAS HAS THE BALL**

Freddy Burton quickly made an impact on the Razorback defense in his first game of the 2008 season. Burton racked up a team-high 16 tackles, including nine solo stops, against No. 9 Alabama. Jerry Franklin is leading the way on the Razorbacks' defense. Franklin leads the Hogs with 27 tackles in the first three games. He has garnered 19 solo tackles and eight assisted stops. He has 1.5 tackles for loss (-8), 0.5 sack (-6), one quarterback hurry and one forced fumble. Franklin ranks third in the SEC and tied for 37th in the country with an average of 9.0 tackles per game.

After three games, Colt McCoy has gone 63-of-81 (77.8%) for 833 yards and 11 TDs, with only one INT, for a passer rating of 206.5. His 77.8% completion percentage and his 206.5 passer rating both rank third nationally and his 11-to-1 TD-to-INT ratio ranks second. Quan Cosby leads the team in both receptions (18) and yards (278) and is averaging 15.4 yards per catch. His 92.7 yards per game rank 26th nationally. Cosby has also scored two TDs on the year.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Alex Tejada had a huge impact as a freshman. Arkansas' place kicker converted 58-of-60 extra point attempts and was 17-of-23 on field goals, and led the team with 109 points scored. His .739 field goal percentage was the ninth-best in school history. The last Hog to make more than 17 was Todd Wright, who was 20-of-23 in 1989. Tejada was 13-of-15 from 39 yards and closer.

Hunter Lawrence has been perfect so far this season in scoring 24 points. He is 18-of-18 on PATs and has hit both of his field goal attempts, which were both from 40 yards. Justin Tucker has kicked off 23 times for a 67.4 ypk average, recorded 10 touchbacks and is holding opponents to an average starting field position of the 23 yard line.

David Elson is in his sixth season at Western Kentucky and overall with a record of 39-24 (.619). The Hilltoppers' offensive coordinator is Kevin Wright and the defensive coordinator is Elson.

Rich Brooks is in his sixth season at Kentucky with a record of 28-35 (.444) and 24th overall with a record of 119-144-4 (.453). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Joker Phillips and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN WESTERN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL**

Since taking over for an injured K.J. Black late in the first quarter of the second game of the season, senior David Wolke has taken advantage of his chance under center— especially in the passing game. Wolke has completed 38 of his 68 attempts for 454 yards and three touchdowns. That included a career-high 254 passing yards last week against Murray State.

Junior cornerback Trevard Lindley needs just one pass breakup to tie the school record of 27 set by Antoine Huffman in 2002-05. He currently has seven interceptions, 26 pass and 128 tackles during his Wildcat career. Six of his seven interceptions have been key plays in Kentucky victories. Jeremy Jarmon was the leader of the Wildcat line last season with 62 tackles, including nine sacks. He leads the team in tackles for loss this season with 3.5. Micah Johnson is the team's leading tackler with 17 stops.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL**

Four times in the first half of last Saturday's win over Murray State, the WKU defense picked off a pass thrown by Racer quarterback Chris Franklin. That included a pick returned for a 25-yard touchdown by Blake Boyd. Four different Hilltoppers accounted for the interceptions, including the first career picks for three members of the Toppers secondary — Ryan Beard, Mark Santoro and Orlando Misaalefua. It was the first time the Hilltoppers had picked off four passes in a game since Nov. 6, 2004 when they picked off four passes at Missouri State.

Mike Hartline completed 28 of 47 passes for 254 yards and two touchdowns in the last outing, all career highs. Hartline also brought the Wildcats from behind to win the game and was named SEC Player of the Week. Dicky Lyons Jr. has caught at least two passes in 24-straight games, dating back to 2006 and ranks first in the SEC in receptions per game (6.3 rpg). Derrick Locke is the team's leading rusher with 156 yards, including a career-long 68 yards vs. Norfolk State.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Bobby Rainey was the main man on kick returns for the Hilltoppers last week against Murray State. In all, Rainey returned five kicks — three kickoffs and two punts — for a total of 144 yards. His three kickoff returns went for a total of 137 of those yards, including a 92-yard return to the one-yard line to set up a Topper touchdown.

Tim Masthay is averaging 46.3 yards per punt, second in the SEC. He averaged 52.7 yards per punt vs. Middle Tennessee, the best game of his career. Masthay has continued his excellent kickoff work in the first two games as 12 of his 19 kickoffs have been touchbacks. Kentucky leads the SEC in kickoff coverage, averaging 51.6 net yards per kickoff.

Neil Callaway is in his 2nd season at UAB and overall with a record of 3-13 (.188). The Blazers' offensive coordinator is Kim Helton and the defensive coordinator is Eric Schumann.

Steve Spurrier is in his fourth season at South Carolina with a record of 23-18 (.561) and in his 19th season overall with a record of 165-58-2 (.738). The Gamecocks' offensive coordinator is Spurrier and Spurrier Jr. and the defensive coordinator is Ellis Johnson.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN UAB HAS THE BALL**

Blazers' quarterback Joe Webb threw for 238 yards and two touchdowns while running for 121 yards and one score last week. Webb enters Saturday's game with an average of 225.0 passing yards per game. He is one of two UAB players ranked among the top 10 nationally in respective statistical categories. Webb is No. 9 in total offense (325.3 ypg) while WR Frantrell Forrest is No. 8 in all-purpose yards (180.0) in the latest NCAA statistics.

Emanuel Cook is an all-conference performer in the Gamecock secondary. Captain Munnerlyn is one of the SEC's top cornerbacks and has made 18 starts over the past three seasons, recording five interceptions. Jasper Brinkley is an all-league candidate in his final season at Carolina. After being held without a tackle in the win over NC State (he did have a fumble recovery), Eric Norwood logged a team-high 10 tackles including a sack against Vanderbilt and had six tackles, forced a fumble and had two quarterback hurries against Georgia.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL**

Kevin Sanders led the team in interceptions last season with three, and after registering a pick two weeks ago at Tennessee, he is tied for No. 4 all-time at UAB in picks with nine. Sanders has started 29 games entering the 2008 season. Joe Henderson has also been tabbed to the preseason first-team unit for the 2008 season by the league's head coaches. Henderson registered 109 tackles in 2007, including a team-high 9.5 tackles for loss and five sacks.

Quarterback Chris Smelley had 204 yards passing as South Carolina struggled before putting away Wofford 23-13 on Saturday night. Brian Maddox led the Gamecocks with 12 carries for 52 yards, while starting tailback Mike Davis caught six passes for 51 yards. Moe Brown had career-highs in receptions (7) and reception yards (130) and a touchdown against Georgia. Jared Cook has emerged as a go-to receiver through the injury to Kenny McKinley earlier in the season.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Swayze Waters is currently averaging 40.0 yards through four games this season. He has recorded three punts inside the opponent's 20-yard-line. Last season, he averaged 41.4 yards on 69 punts. Waters is also one of the country's top collegiate place-kickers. He is 5-7 on field goals this season and last season hit 22-of-28 kicks as he was named a semifinalist for the Groza Award.

Senior Ryan Succop moved up in the South Carolina record book with a career-high tying three field goals and 11 points Saturday. He is currently in third place with 35 career field goal. Succop is four behind Mark Fleetwood and Reed Morton, who are tied for second with 39. With 187 career points, Succop moved into a tie for sixth place, sharing the position with Fleetwood and Dan Weaver, eight behind Scott Hagler's 195 career points.

The Gamecocks won the only previous matchup between the schools, taking a 42-10 decision over the Blazers on Sept. 20, 2003...South Carolina is playing its third consecutive home game and fourth home game in the first five of the season.

**THE COACHES**

Sylvester Croom is in his fifth season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 18-33 (.353). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorvey and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Harbison.

Les Miles is in his fourth season at LSU with a record of 37-6 (.860) and eighth overall with a record of 65-27 (.707). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinators are Doug Mallory and Bradley Peveto.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL**

Brandon McRae has hauled in a SEC-best 24 passes on the season for 249 yards and a pair of touchdowns. McRae's 10-catch, 102-yard game against Georgia Tech set new career highs in both categories. With 270 yards on 56 carries in the first four games, Anthony Dixon has now compiled 2,004 rushing yards on 512 attempts in 29 career games. He stands fourth all time in attempts and became the school's 10th 2,000-yard rusher last weekend.

Defensively, LSU is allowing 12.3 points and 252.7 yards (55.3 rush, 197.3 pass) per game. Thru 12 quarters of football this year, LSU's defense has yielded just three touchdowns. S Harry Coleman leads the Tiger with 17 tackles, while CB Chris Hawkins has a pair of interceptions. Darry Beckwith was a second-team All-SEC pick in 2007 and had 65 tackles and 6.5 tackles for loss last year.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL**

Jessie Bowman enjoyed the most productive game of his career with an eight-tackle performance against Auburn in Week 3. Bowman also notched three and a half tackles-for-loss and forced a fumble. Dominic Douglas currently ranks 12th in the SEC with a 7.0-tackle-per-game average, and last week at Georgia Tech was his first career game at middle linebacker. K.J. Wright leads the team with five tackles for loss and is third on the team with 17 total tackles.

RB Charles Scott continues to lead the SEC in rushing with 131.3 yards per game. Scott has rushed for 100 yards in each of LSU's three games, including 132 in the win over Auburn. LSU's dual QB system of Jarrett Lee and Andrew Hatch has combined to complete 46 of 87 passes for 600 yards and five touchdowns. Lee leads with 382 passing yards and four TDs. WR Brandon LaFell is tops on the squad and first in the SEC with 82.7 receiving yards per game.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

Derek Pegues has played in 39 games during his MSU career and he currently holds the Mississippi State record for kickoff returns in a career (88) and is 19 shy of setting the SEC career mark. His 1,985 career kickoff return yards is also a school record, as he passed Tony James (1,862, 1989-92) earlier this year. With 20 more yards, he will move ahead of Tony Jackson (Vanderbilt, 1989-93, 2,004) for fourth all time in the Southeastern Conference.

Senior P Brady Dalfrey had what could be considered his breakout game against Auburn as he punted 6 times for 290 yards and a 48.3 average. Four of Dalfrey's punts were downed inside the 20-yard line. Dalfrey had a long punt of 59 yards and added another 52-yarder. Of his 6 punts, four came to rest at the 1, 11, 13, and 14-yard line during the contest. Trindon Holliday has three returns for scores during his career (2 kickoffs, 1 punt). His 163 punt return yards versus North Texas is the second most in school history and the most in the SEC since 1983.

**THE COACHES**

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 10-6 (.625) and 15th overall with a record of 116-65-1 (.640). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

Mark Richt is in his eighth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 76-19 (.800). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinator is Willie Martinez.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL**

Glen Coffee set the Alabama single-game record with a 16.2-yard per carry average (minimum 10 attempts) at Arkansas last weekend. Coffee ran 10 times for 162 yards and scored on runs of 87 and 31 yards in the Tide's 35-point first half. John Parker Wilson broke the Alabama career record for touchdown passes on a 25-yard pass to Julio Jones with 8:31 left in the second quarter at Arkansas, the 42nd passing TD of his Crimson Tide career.

Rennie Curran had a team-high nine tackles against ASU and added a sack. For the season, Curran leads the team with 29 tackles, including five for a loss of 34 yards and team-high three sacks for -27. Darryl Gamble ranks second on the team with 15 tackles. Justin Houston and Demarcus Dobbs each recorded their first career sack against the Sun Devils.

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL**

Javier Arenas intercepted an Arkansas pass last week and returned it 63 yards for a touchdown with 53 seconds left in the first quarter to give Alabama a 21-0 lead. Justin Woodall intercepted an Arkansas pass and returned it 74 yards for a touchdown to give the Crimson Tide a 35-7 in the second quarter. The interception was the second of Woodall's Alabama career. The Crimson Tide ranks eighth nationally in rushing defense after the first four games of the 2008 season. Alabama opponents have 99 rushing attempts for 220 yards.

Matthew Stafford registered a career-high 285 yards passing during Georgia's 27-10 road win over Arizona State. He has thrown for 5,191 yards with 31 TDs and 23 INTs in his Bulldog career. A.J. Green was the top target against the Sun Devils after snagging eight passes for 159 yards (both career highs) and one TD. Knowshon Moreno is tied for third in the nation in scoring with 54.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

P.J. Fitzgerald's performance at Arkansas was one of his best punting games at Alabama. He averaged 45.2 yards on five punts, including a 56-yarder that was his longest kick of the season. Fitzgerald also pinned the Razorbacks inside their 20-yard line twice. He is averaging a career-best 41.4-yard per kick to rank seventh in the SEC with three punts inside the 20.

Blair Walsh has made five of his first seven kicks. His two misses have come from 52 and 54 yards. Brian Mimbs ranks third in the SEC with a 43.9 punting average (39.9 net, second in the SEC). He is also the holder for Walsh. Ramarcus Brown is third in the SEC, averaging 26.1 yards a kickoff return. Brown had a season-long 44-yard return versus Arizona State.
