SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Raycom Sports) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (new in 2008 / when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (new in 2008 / only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

CBS SPORTS - The 2008 season marks the 12th year for CBS as the league's national network television partner. CBS will televise up to 15 games per year throughout the season. CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 6 at 4 p.m. ET. The SEC and CBS announced a 15-year extension agreement in August.

ESPN/ESPN2, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com

(search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

RAYCOM SPORTS (Formerly Jefferson-Pilot/Lincoln Financial Sports) will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2008 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

2009 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2008 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2008 regular season, the FedEx BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in Miami on Jan. 8 at 8 p.m. EST. The FedEx BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2008 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, FedEx Orange Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Allstate Sugar Bowl on Jan. 2 at 8 p.m. EST, and the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 5 at 8 p.m. ET.



SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE TEAM NOTES



ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

Junior Glen Coffee rushed for a career-high 218 yards on 25 carries and one TD against Kentucky, the sixth-best rushing game in UA history ... Alabama scored its third defensive touchdown of the season (4-yard fumble return by Rolando McClain) against Kentucky ... The Tide has five non-offensive TDs this season, which leads the SEC ... Alabama allowed just 35 rushing yards against Kentucky and has held all six of its opponents to less than 100 yards rushing this season ... The Tide leads the SEC and is second in the nation in rushing defense.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS

Arkansas' 238 yards of total offense in the first half against Florida was a season high for the first half ... The Razorbacks 3rd quarter touchdown marked their first points in the third quarter since the UL-Monroe game ... Casey Dick completed 24-of-38 passes for 220 yards with one interception ... His career yardage total of 4,459 moved him past Joe Ferguson to seventh on the Razorback's all-time list ... Michael Smith rushed for 133 yards on 20 carries against the Gators ... The junior leads the SEC in all-purpose rushing with 150.0 yards per game.



LSU TIGERS

WR Brandon LaFell tied a career-best with seven catches against Mississippi State ... WR Demetrius Byrd has caught a pass in 13 straight games ... PK Colt David tallied two field goals and four PATs against State, giving him 307 total points in his career, second at LSU ... QB Jarrett Lee became the first redshirt freshman to start a game for LSU since JaMarcus Russell did so at Arkansas on Nov. 26, 2004 ... RB Charles Scott is the first LSU player to open a season with four straight 100+ yard rushing performances since Charles Alexander (1978) ... Scott had 141 yards on 27 carries vs. MSU.



AUBURN TIGERS

Auburn has scored first in five of its six games this season ... The Tigers have outscored their opponents, 34-3, in the first quarter this season ... QB Chris Todd had his first multiple-TD effort of his AU career with two scoring passes ... He had three TD passes entering the Vandy game ... WR Rodgeriqu Smith became the 7th player in Auburn history to have 100 career receptions ... He now has 103 career catches, which is sixth in school history ... Ben Tate had a career-high 27 carries for 108 yards, his fifth career triple digit game and second of the season.



OLE MISS REBELS

Ole Miss leads the SEC in total tackles for loss with 8.33 per game ... The Rebels have 50 stops behind the line for minus 155 yards this season ... Dexter McCluster leads the SEC in total receiving yards with 411 (25 catches) ... Sophomore QB Jevan Snead finished 21-of-32 for 243 yards, one TD and one interception ... His 21 completions is a season high, and the 243 yards is 10 short of his season best ... Ole Miss notched three sacks for the second straight game ... CB Fon Ingram notched his first career sack, LB Ashlee Palmer his first of the year and LB Allen Walker his second of the season ... The Rebels scored first for the fifth time in six games this season.



FLORIDA GATORS

Florida has shutout four of five opponents in at least one half of a game this season ... Five different defensive backs have interceptions thus far in 2008, matches the total of all of last season ... The Gators have two blocked kicks this season and 19 under Urban Meyer at Florida ... The Gators are second in the SEC and third in the nation in turnover margin (+1.6 per game) ... Florida was 3-for-3 in redzone trips against Arkansas and is now 17-for-18 this season ... Only one of Florida's five opponents this season has started a drive in Florida territory.



MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS

Junior TB Anthony Dixon had his 26th career touchdown run against LSU and is just one within the school record (Michael Davis, 1991-94) ... RS/DB Derek Pegues had 176 return yards against the Tigers, moving him to fourth all-time in the SEC with 2,842 yards ... He is also fourth in the SEC in career kickoff return yards (2,151 yards) ... He also had an interception against LSU, giving him 11 in his career, tying him for third all time at State and is the SEC's leading active interceptor ... Junior Tyson Lee started his first career game at QB against LSU and was 17-of-26 for 175 yards.



GEORGIA BULLDOGS

Junior CB Prince Miller returned a punt 92 yards for a touchdown against Alabama, the second-longest punt return in Georgia history ... Freshman PK Blair Walsh is now 6-for-8 in field goals this season after hitting a 43 yarder against the Tide ... Redshirt frosh SE Zach Renner has blocked two punts this season (Arizona State, Alabama) ... QB Matthew Stafford threw a career-best 24 completions against the Tide ... Redshirt frosh Justin Houston made his first career start against Alabama at DE ... Sophomore LB Rennie Curran led the Bulldogs in tackles for the third time this season with 14 stops ... Sophomore LB Akeem Dent had a career-high 10 stops and a sack.



SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS

WR Kenny McKinley returned to action and had four catches for 58 yards against Ole Miss ... McKinley moves to second place at Carolina in career receptions with 166 and into third place in career receiving yards with 2,257 ... Emanuel Cook had a career-high 14 stops against the Rebels (previous high - 11) ... PK/P Ryan Succop is now second on the Gamecocks career scoring list with 209 points and in field goals made (40) ... Carolina leads the SEC and is second in the nation in pass defense, allowing just 128.0 yards per game through the air.



TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS

Sophomore Nick Stephens made his first career start at quarterback against Northern Illinois ... He completed 11-of-18 passes for 156 yards and a TD ... He has appeared in only two games this season, but is responsible for three of the four longest pass plays by UT this season ... DT Walter Fisher, LB Nevin McKenzie and LB Nick Reveiz made their first starts of the season for the Vol defense ... The Vols had a season-best four sacks against NIU ... UT has not allowed a rushing TD since the first game of the season and only one all season.



KENTUCKY WILDCATS

WR Dicky Lyons is now fifth all-time on the UK career receptions list with 137 and ranks fifth in career receiving yards with 1,740 and tied for third in career TD catches with 18 ... He had six grabs against Alabama for 63 yards and a TD ... Trevard Lindley had three pass deflections against Alabama and now has a school-record 29, breaking Antoine Huffman's mark of 27 ... Derrick Locke had career highs in catches (8) and receiving yards (81) against Alabama ... Braxton Kelley had a career-best 13 tackles against Alabama ... Kentucky leads the SEC and is second in the nation in pass efficiency defense, allowing just 63 completions in five games (87.62 rating).



VANDERBILT COMMODORES

Vanderbilt is now 5-0 for the first time since 1943 ... The Commodores are 3-0 in SEC play for the first time since 1950 and remain atop the Eastern Division standings ... Vanderbilt came back from a 13-0 deficit against Auburn and has now rallied from behind to win in all five games this season ... The Commodores have outscored their opponents, 58-10, in the second half ... Vandy passed for a season high 157 yards against the Tigers ... Mackenzi Adams came off the bench to complete 13-of-23 passes for 153 yards and 2 TDs (all season highs for Vandy) ... He also had 54 yards rushing to lead the 'Dores ... 2008 SEC DIVISIONAL TIE-BREAKER

In the event of a tie for the division championship, the following procedures will be used to break all ties to determine the SEC Football Championship Game representative. All Conference versus Conference Games (both division and non-division) will be counted in the Conference Standings.

TWO-TEAM TIE. In the event two teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order:

- Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams;
- Records of the tied teams within the division;
- Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference record, and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- Overall record against non-divisional teams;
- Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional or non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game.

THREE-TEAM TIE (OR MORE). If three teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order: (Note: If one of the procedures results in one team being eliminated and two remaining, the two-team tiebreaker procedure as stated in No. 1 above will be used):

- Combined head to head record among the tied teams;
- Record of the tied teams within the division;
- Head to head competition against the team within the division with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- Overall Conference record against non divisional teams;
- Combined record against all common non divisional teams;
- Record against the common non divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through other common non divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest-ranked tied team. In this case, the head-to-head results of the top two ranked tied teams shall determine the representative in the SEC Championship Game.

BCS NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Since the inception of the BCS in 1998, the SEC leads all conferences with four national champions. Tennessee won the BCS' first national title in 1998, LSU won the crown in 2003, Florida's claimed the national championship in 2006 and LSU took the title this season. The Big 12 has two BCS national titles followed by the ACC, Big Ten, Pac-10 and Big East with one each.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS SINCE 1992

Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC has the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with six. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (4). Here is a breakdown:

TOP 25 FINISHES

Since 2000, the Southeastern Conference has had more teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Poll than any other conference. The SEC has had 39 teams ranked in the last eight final USA Today Coaches polls, an average of almost five per season. The Big 12 is second with 31 teams ranked since 2000. The SEC has led or tied for lead in most teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Polls in seven of the last eight seasons.

NON-CONFERENCE RECORD SINCE 2000

The Southeastern Conference has the nation's top non-conference winning percentage (including bowl games) since 2000. The SEC is 294-105 (.737) against non-conference foes during the last eight seasons. In the regular season, the Big 12 has the top winning percentage (.761) while the SEC is second (.752). In bowl games, the SEC is third in winning percentage (.558) behind the Big East (.618) and the Mountain West (.565).

SEC LEADS NATION IN ATTENDANCE

For the 27th straight season, the SEC recorded the largest total attendance figure of any conference in the nation. In 2007, a total of 6,687,342 fans attended 89 games, an average of 75,139 per contest, also tops in the nation. SEC stadiums were filled to 97.69 percent of capacity for each home game in 2007. The SEC had six of the top 10 schools in total attendance in 2007 - Tennessee (4), Auburn (5), Georgia (6), LSU (7), Alabama (8) and Florida (9).

SEC LEADS NATION WITH 263 FORMER PLAYERS ON 2007 NFL OPENING DAY ROSTERS

The Southeastern Conference had 263 players on the 2007 National Football League opening day active rosters, which led all conferences.

The Atlantic Coast Conference was second with 238 players, followed by the Big Ten with 234 players, Pac-10 with 183 players, Big 12 with 176 players and the Big East with 84 players.

Among SEC schools, Georgia was first with 37 former players on NFL rosters, followed by Tennessee with 36, LSU with 33, Florida with 31 and Auburn with 30. Alabama had 21 players on NFL rosters, while South Carolina had 19, Ole Miss and Mississippi State had 17 each, Arkansas had 12, Kentucky six and Vanderbilt with five.

The SEC had five of its schools with 30-or-more-players on NFL rosters. No other conference had two.

Nationally, Miami (Fla.) leads with 46 former players on NFL rosters, followed by Ohio State with 44, Florida State with 41, Tennessee with 36 and Georgia with 35.

The NFL Kickoff Weekend numbers were furnished by the National Football League and does not include any former SEC players that may have been activated after the opening weekend.

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last six years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 211 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 95 named to the first-team.
- During the last 12 years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award.
- Kentucky's Jacob Tamme was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last six years, the SEC has had 12 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2008-09 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama golfer Joseph Sykora and Auburn swimmer Kristen Hastrup were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2007-08.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. South Carolina football player William Brown and Vanderbilt lacrosse player Brooke Shinaberry were named recipients of this award in 2007-08.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had three sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Katie Heenan of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics and Florida's Carolina Burckle was the top student-athlete in swimming & diving. Parker was the winner of the Honda National Collegiate Woman of the Year honor in 2007-08.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 69 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- In 2007-08, the SEC had 168 teams in 20 sports take part in NCAA post-season play, an average of almost eight teams per sport. Along with those numbers, the league also produced 457 first-team All-Americans, won five team and 46 individual national titles.
- Since 1990, the SEC has won 123 team and 851 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.2 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (281 of 369). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won 55 team titles. The SEC has won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, the most of any conference.

THE COACHES

Steve Spurrier is in his fourth season at South Carolina with a record of 25-18 (.581) and in his 19th season overall with a record of 167-58-2 (.740). The Gamecocks' offensive coordinator is Spurrier and Spurrier Jr. and the defensive coordinator is Ellis Johnson.

Rich Brooks is in his sixth season at Kentucky with a record of 29-36 (.446) and 24th overall with a record of 120-145-4 (.454). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Joker Phillips and the defensive coordinator is Steve Brown.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Chris Smelley completed 22-of-32 passes for a career-high 327 yards and three touchdowns in South Carolina's 31-24 win at Ole Miss. His three touchdowns tied a career-high and were for 20, 6 and 4 yards. Smelley connected on a career-best 63-yard completion to Jared Cook in the first quarter that set up a Gamecock touchdown. For the season, Smelley has completed 99-of-157 passes for 1,171 yards. His completion rate of 63.06 percent is second among SEC quarterbacks.

Jeremy Jarmon leads the team and is tied for sixth in the SEC in tackles for loss this season with 5.5. Jarmon has 15 career sacks. The linebackers are led by Braxton Kelley, who has 223 tackles in his career. Micah Johnson is the team's third-leading tackler with 17 stops despite missing the last two games with injury. Trevard Lindley, who holds the school record for career pass breakups (29), leads the SEC and ranks 13th in the nation in passes defended.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Emanuel Cook finished the Ole Miss game with a career-high 14 tackles, eclipsing his previous career mark of 11 set last season against both LSU and Vanderbilt. He collected his first career fumble recovery in the third quarter. Recovering the Ole Miss fumbled caused by Clifton Geathers, Nathan Peppers ran for his second career touchdown. Eric Norwood moved into a tie for fourth place in school history with his 15th career sack. He also moved into third place in school history in career tackles for loss. He now has 31.5 in his career.

Mike Hartline is in his first season as the starting quarterback. He had his best game against Middle Tennessee, completing 28 of 47 passes for 254 yards and two touchdowns, all career highs. Derrick Locke is the team's leading rusher with 218 yards, including a career-long 68-yard dash vs. Norfolk State. Locke is second on the team in receiving, totaling 132 yards on 14 catches. He averages 9.4 yards per catch. Dicky Lyons leads the SEC in receptions per game, catching 6.2 ppg.

SPECIAL TEAMS

With his first-quarter 48-yard field goal at Ole Miss, Ryan Succop moved past George Rogers (1977-80) into sole possession of second place on both the Gamecocks' all-time points scored list and the school's career field goals made slate. With one field goal among his seven points this afternoon, Succop has 209 career points and 40 career field goals. He missed just his second career field goal inside of 40 yards. He is now 22-of-24 inside 40 yards.

Tim Masthay is second in the SEC in punting, averaging 44.8 yards per punt. He averaged 52.7 yards per punt vs. Middle Tennessee, the best game of his career. Masthay has continued his excellent kickoff work this season as 16 of his 29 kickoffs have been touchbacks. Kentucky ranks second in the SEC in kickoff coverage, averaging 47.8 net yards per kickoff.

THE COACHES

Bobby Johnson is in his seventh season at Vanderbilt with a record of 25-50 (.333) and in his 15th season overall with a record of 85-86 (.497). The Commodores' offensive coordinator is Ted Cain and the defensive coordinator is Bruce Fowler.

Sylvester Croom is in his fifth season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 18-34 (.346). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorvey and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Harbison.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

For the second straight week, Mackenzi Adams guided VU to an SEC victory after entering in a relief role at quarterback. Adams was superb against Auburn after senior starter Chris Nickson departed in the second quarter with a hurt shoulder. Adams generated 207 yards of total offense – 153 passing and 54 rushing – and directed both scoring drives in the Vanderbilt comeback win from a 13-point deficit. Adams hit on 13 of 23 passes, including touchdown strikes of 15 yards to junior WR Justin Wheeler and 1 yard to freshman TE Brandon Barden. He did not throw an interception.

Derek Pegues holds the MSU school record with three interception returns for touchdowns, which is tied for second in the SEC. Also, his 11 total interceptions tie him for third in school history in that category. Tim Bailey currently has 4.0 tackles for loss on the season. Dominic Douglas currently ranks 11th in the SEC with a 7.2-tackle-per-game average, and at Georgia Tech started his first career game at middle linebacker.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Five different defenders have contributed interceptions, including junior safety Ryan Hamilton, who had three picks in the win at Ole Miss on Sept. 13. Myron Lewis and senior safety Reshard Langford have a pair of interceptions. Opponents have scored just five touchdowns in 13 red-zone opportunities against the Commodores. Vanderbilt tops the SEC – and ranks sixth nationally – with 16 quarterback sacks. Patrick Benoist contributed a team-high 13 tackles vs Auburn. He also accounted for two tackles for losses, including a quarterback sack, and a pass deflection.

Brandon McRae has hauled in 28 passes on the season for 263 yards and a pair of touchdowns. He currently ranks second in the SEC with a 5.6-catch-per-game average. With 320 yards on 71 carries in the first five games of the season, tailback Anthony Dixon has now compiled 2,054 rushing yards on 527 attempts in 30 career games. Against LSU, Derek Sherrod had the highest graded game of his career, posting a 92 percent while playing every snap.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior punter Brett Upson was again superb last Saturday, averaging a net of 38.1 yards. His last effort of 55 yards pinned Auburn inside its own 5-yard line late in the game. League officials recognized Upson's effort on Monday, naming him SEC Special of the Week. Senior kicker Bryant Hahnfeldt missed two field goals against Auburn, but still has hit on 7-of-9 FGAs. Junior D.J. Moore has been one of the nation's top return specialists. Moore tops the nation with a 28.5-yard punt return average.

Blake McAdams has started each game for the past four seasons for the Bulldogs, and his career numbers are approaching some of the all-time records set in the SEC. McAdams set a new MSU school record for total punts with his 241. He is now only 36 shy of the SEC mark. McAdams punted 10 times for 381 yards against Auburn in State's SEC opener, pinning the Tigers inside the 20 three times.

THE COACHES

Phillip Fulmer is in his 17th season at Tennessee and overall with a record of 149-48 (.756). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Dave Clawson and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

Mark Richt is in his eighth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 76-20 (.792). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinator is Willie Martinez.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Nick Stephens will remain the starting quarterback after completing 10 of 17 passes for 152 yards and a score vs. Northern Illinois. Arian Foster boasted 196 yards on 25 carries in his first two games (98 ypg, 7.8 ypc), but has gained just 142 yards on 40 carries in his last three games (47.3 ypg, 3.5 ypc) ... He is 346 yards from being UT's all-time leading rusher. Lucas Taylor leads the team with 15 grabs for 199 yards through five games after posting 1,000 yards last season.

Rennie Curran leads the team in tackles (43), including coming off a career-high 14 (10 solo) in a loss to Alabama. Curran has been the Bulldogs' top tackler four times this season and also leads the team with 3.0 sacks (tied for fourth in the SEC). Akeem Dent was second on the team with 10 tackles (six solo) and a sack against the Crimson Tide. The defense is led by LB Dannelle Ellerbe and cornerback Asher Allen.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Dan Williams posted eight tackles and two TFL at Auburn. He leads the unit with 21 tackles this season. Ellix Wilson has led the team in tackles in three of five games, though he did not play vs. NIU due to a shoulder injury. Rico McCoy led the Vols with 10 stops vs. Florida and nine vs. NIU. Eric Berry has eight career interceptions (three this season). He has 27 tackles this season after leading the team with eight vs. Florida, posting three at Auburn and six vs. NIU.

Matthew Stafford is 21-5 as the UG starter. He registered career-high 285 yards passing during 27-10 road win over ASU and has thrown for 5,465 yards with 33 TDs and 24 INTs in his Bulldog career. Knowshon Moreno is tied for third in the nation in scoring with 60. Georgia's top two receiving threats are freshman A.J. Green (22 rec., 388 yds., 3 TDs) and senior Mohamed Massaquoi (18 rec., 228 yds., 2 TDs).

SPECIAL TEAMS

Daniel Lincoln is 5-of-9 this season after making 21 of 29 a year ago. The Vols did not attempt a field goal in the UAB or Florida games but converted twice at Auburn and twice vs. NIU. Chad Cunningham is averaging 39.5 yards per punt this season after averaging 46 yards per punt last season. Britton Colquitt will likely take over the punting duties at Georgia.

Blair Walsh has made six of his first eight kicks. His two misses have come from 52 and 54 yards. Brian Mimbs ranks seventh in the SEC with a 41.0 punting average. He is also the holder for Walsh. Ramarcus Brown is fifth in the SEC, averaging 25.4 yds./kickoff return. Brown had a season-long 44-yarder versus Arizona State.

THE COACHES

Bobby Petrino is in his first season at Arkansas and sixth overall with a record of 46-21 (.687). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Patrino and the defensive coordinator is Willy Robinson.

Tommy Tuberville is in his 10th season at Auburn with a record of 84-35 (.706) and in his 14th season overall with a record of 109-55 (.665). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Tony Franklin and the defensive coordinator is Paul Rhoads.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Michael Smith leads the Razorbacks with 423 yards and three touchdowns on 74 carries thus far this season. He ranks third in the SEC and 19th in the nation with 105.8 yards rushing per game. He has two 100-yard rushing games to his credit this season (ULM and Florida). Casey Dick is third in the SEC and ranks 44th in the nation in total offense per game with an average of 225.6 yards per outing. He is second in the SEC in passing yards per game (237.8 ypg.).

Sen'Derrick Marks has been a terror on the defensive line for the Auburn defense. Marks leads the SEC and ranks tied for 28th nationally with eight tackles for loss, including two sacks. Marks, who has started all 32 games since the start of the 2006 season, now has 28 tackles for loss during his career. Antonio Coleman has four sacks in Auburn's first six games to lead the team and rank third in the SEC, and his seven tackles for loss ranks second on the team behind Marks and tied for fourth in the SEC.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Jerry Franklin is leading the way on the Razorbacks' defense. Franklin leads the Hogs with 45 tackles in the first five games. He has garnered 30 solo tackles and 15 assisted stops. He has 2.5 tackles for loss (-9), 0.5 sack (-6), one interception, two quarterback hurries and one forced fumble. Elton Ford is pacing all Southeastern Conference true freshmen in tackles per game with 5.2 stops per outing. Antwain Robinson has scored four touchdowns in his career returning two fumbles and two interceptions for touchdowns.

Auburn is continuing its tradition of producing high-caliber running backs, with two backs on the squad that have over 1,500 career rushing yards. Junior Ben Tate leads the team with 501 yards rushing and ranks 16th in Auburn history with 1,796 career yards. Senior Brad Lester had 186 yards this season and has pushed his career total to 1,586, which ranks 21st. Rodgeriquis Smith became the seventh player in Auburn history to accumulate 100 career receptions during Auburn's game against VU.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Jeremy Davis is averaging 42.8 yards per punt in his first five games including a career long punt of 56 yards earlier this year against Alabama. So far this season, Davis has punted 21 times for 898 yards and has landed seven kicks inside the opponents' 20-yard line. Davis ranks fourth in the SEC and 22nd in the nation with his 42.8 yards per punt average.

Robert Dunn currently ranks fifth nationally in punt returns, averaging 21.4 yards per return. In the season opener against Louisiana-Monroe, Dunn snapped an Auburn streak of 144 consecutive games and 374 punt returns without a touchdown, which was the longest streak in the nation, by returning a kick 66 yards for a score. Clinton Durst ranks third in the SEC and 21st nationally, averaging 42.9 yards per punt this year with 11 punts placed inside the 20-yard line.

THE COACHES

Les Miles is in his fourth season at LSU with a record of 38-6 (.864) and eighth overall with a record of 66-27 (.710). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinators are Doug Mallory and Bradley Peveto.

Urban Meyer is in his fourth season at Florida with a record of 35-8 (.814) and in his eighth season overall with a record of 74-17 (.813). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Dan Mullen and Charlie Strong serves as the defensive coordinator.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

RB Charles Scott continues to lead the SEC with 133.8 yards rushing per game. In four games, Scott has rushed for 535 yards and six TDs. LSU QB Jarrett Lee is second to Tim Tebow in the league in pass efficiency with a 146.5 rating. Lee has connected on 45 of 77 passes for 643 yards, six touchdowns and just three interceptions. His top target has been that of Brandon LaFell, who leads the SEC in yards per game with 87 and he's third in the league with 5.5 catches per game.

Brandon Spikes leads the SEC in tackles per game this year and tied for 17th nationally with 10.25. He is also tied for sixth in the league in tackles for loss per game (1.13). Brandon Spikes has led the Gators in tackles in eight of the last nine games he has played in. In addition, he has recorded 10-or-more tackles in five of his last six outings. Carlos Dunlap is tied for the lead in the SEC in sacks per game (.70) and is tied for 33rd nationally. His 3.5 sacks lead all Gators this season.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Defensively, LSU is fifth in the SEC in total defense (260.8 ypg) and sixth in scoring defense (15.2 ppg). The Tigers are allowing 191.8 yards passing per game and just 69.0 yards rushing per game. Darry Beckwith is expected to return to action this week after missing games against Auburn and Mississippi State. Charles Alexander and Ricky Jean-Francois as well as linebacker Kelvin Sheppard are all expected back after missing practice time last week.

In two games against the Tigers, Tim Tebow is 14-of-28 passing for 194 yards and four touchdowns. He has ran 25 times for 102 yards and two touchdowns. In Florida's last game, Chris Rainey and Jeff Demps each rushed for 103 yards. Percy Harvin has scored a touchdown in each of the last seven games he has played in. In the last seven games he has played in, Harvin has touched the ball 109 times for 1,150 yards (10.6 yards per touch) and has had 10 touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Colt David continues his climb up both the school and SEC record books. David goes into the Florida game ranked second in LSU history in career scoring with 307 points, just 12 points from moving past Kevin Faulk. In addition, David is third in school history in career field goals with 44 and field goal attempts with 58. Brady Dalfrey is averaging 38.9 yards punts. However, of his 15 punts, 8 have been downed inside the 20-yard line.

Jonathan Phillips improved to 6-of-6 on field goals with his 37-yard connection on UF's opening drive of the second half at Arkansas. Phillips' streak of six-consecutive field goals is the longest since Chris Hetland opened the 2005 season with eight straight. Brandon James is tied for first nationally on the NCAA active leader chart for career punt returns for a touchdown (4). He is third nationally in punt return avg. (14.8) and fourth in punt return yards (904).
