SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Raycom Sports) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (new in 2008 / when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (new in 2008 / only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2008 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

2009 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2008 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the FedEx Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose presented by Citi, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

FOX Sports will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games, with the exception of the Rose Bowl, which will be televised by ABC Sports.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

At the conclusion of the 2008 regular season, the FedEx BCS National Championship Game will be hosted in Miami on Jan. 8 at 8 p.m. EST. The FedEx BCS National Championship Game will have the top two teams ranked in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS games following the 2008 regular season include the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 4:30 p.m. EST, FedEx Orange Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 p.m. EST, Allstate Sugar Bowl on Jan. 2 at 8 p.m. EST, and the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 5 at 8 p.m. ET.

CBS SPORTS - The 2008 season marks the 12th year for CBS as the league's national network television partner. CBS will televise up to 15 games per year throughout the season. CBS will normally broadcast its SEC games in the late afternoon window beginning at 3:30 p.m. ET. CBS provides exclusive national network broadcasts of conference home games during the season. CBS will televise the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be on Dec. 6 at 4 p.m. ET. The SEC and CBS announced a 15-year extension agreement in August.

ESPN/ESPN2, the SEC's national cable provider, may televise up to 18 regular season games each year, with a minimum of nine on ESPN through the season. ESPN GamePlan offers fans extra college football games and is available on television or online. Viewers can order ESPN GamePlan on ESPN.com

(search "GamePlan"), or by contacting their cable or satellite Pay-Per-View provider.

RAYCOM SPORTS (Formerly Jefferson-Pilot/Lincoln Financial Sports) will continue its highly successful SEC Football Game of the Week this season. The Charlotte, N.C. company, holds the rights to televise 13 games annually throughout the nine-state SEC region on a syndicated basis. The games will be broadcast in the early afternoon at 12:30 p.m. ET.

FOX Sports Net South (FSNS), FOX Sports Net Southwest (FSNSW) and SUN Sports (SUN) together form **SEC-TV**, the league's regional cable package. SEC-TV Weekly airs Thursday nights and Saturday mornings during the season, highlighting all of the SEC's athletic teams and events.

ALABAMA CRIMSON TIDE

In its history, Alabama is 46-7-2 when it is ranked #2 in the Associated Press poll ... Dating back to last season, Alabama has won nine straight games, tied for the third longest in the nation (10-Penn State/Texas Tech, 9-Utah/Alabama) ... The Tide has outscored its opponents 184-23 in the first half this season ... In each of its four road games, Alabama has scored on its opening drive (2 TDs/2 FGs) ... Jr. PK Leigh Tiffin had three field goals against Tennessee, raising his career total to 46, ranking him fourth in Alabama history ... Fr. Julio Jones had career highs in catches (6) and yards (103).

LSU TIGERS



WR Brandon LaFell has now caught a pass in 22 straight games dating back to the 2007 Sugar Bowl versus Notre Dame ... PK Colt David shattered the LSU all-time career scoring mark with a career-long 51-yard field goal against Georgia ... With David's eight points against Georgia, David stands at 324 for his career (46 FG, 180 PATs, 1 touchdown) ... For his career, David has 13 field goals over 40 yards on 22 attempts, second all-time in school history ... RB Charles Scott recorded his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season and sixth of his career with his 144 yards against Georgia.

ARKANSAS RAZORBACKS



RB Michael Smith has now rushed for a touchdown in four consecutive games, a career best, and the most since Darren McFadden opened the 2007 season with rushing touchdowns in five straight games ... He finished the game with 19 carries for 129 yards and a touchdown ... Smith now has six 100-yard games for his career with five this season ... QB Casey Dick completed 20-of-38 passes for 282 yards and two touchdowns with an interception ... He now ranks third in Arkansas history in TD passes (42) and fourth in passing yards (5,057) and completions (414).



OLE MISS REBELS

Ole Miss is off to its best start (4-4) and equaled its most wins since 2003 ... Soph. QB Jevan Snead threw multiple TD passes for the fourth time this year and topped 200 yards passing for the fourth time ... Snead completed 14-of-27 passes for 209 yards, two TDs and one interception ... Sr. DT Peria Jerry posted five total tackles and a career-high two sacks ... Jerry has 4.5 TFLs in his last two games ... Ole Miss had just one turnover against Arkansas, improving to 4-0 when turning the ball over two times or fewer ... Junior RB Cordera Eason had a career-high 19 carries, totaling a team-high 81 yards.

AUBURN TIGERS



Auburn marched 81 yards on 20 plays during its opening drive against West Virginia, using 9:54 on the clock ... It marked the longest scoring drive of the season for the Tigers in terms of yardage, plays and time ... It also tied for the longest drive of the season in plays in the SEC this season and the second longest by time ... QB Kodi Burns had a season-high 82 rushing yards against the Mountaineers ... Antonio Coleman had his sixth sack of the season and now has 14.5 for his career ... He needs one more to crack Auburn's career top 10 list.

MISSISSIPPI STATE BULLDOGS



State scored a touchdown on its opening possession for the first time this season ... It was the third time in the last four games that the Bulldogs have scored on its first drive ... State scored two touchdowns in the first quarter for the first time since 2004 (vs. Arkansas) ... State rushed for four TDs against Middle Tennessee, the first time the Bulldogs have accomplished that feat since 2001 (vs. Ole Miss) ... Derek Pegues is now the all-time leader in kickoff return yards in the SEC with 2,321 yards after returning four kicks for 88 yards against the Blue Raiders.

FLORIDA GATORS



Jr. QB Tim Tebow scored two rushing TDs against Kentucky to bring his career total to 36, tying Emmitt Smith for the most rushing TDs in Florida history ... Florida's 63 points against the Wildcats were the most scored by the Gators in an SEC game under Urban Meyer ... The Gators tied a school record with three blocked kicks (2 punts / 1 field goal) vs. Kentucky ... The Gators have blocked 23 kicks under Meyer, five this season ... Fr. RB Jeff Demps made his first career start, leading the Gators in rushing (50 yards), receiving (4 for 67 yards) and also had a punt return for 27 yards.



SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS

Kenny McKinley extended his school record for consecutive games with at least one reception to 38 ... With 77 receiving yards against LSU, McKinley moved past Zola Davis (1995-98) into second place in school history with 2,422 career receiving yards. He is 75 yards behind school-record holder Sterling Sharpe (1983-87), who amassed 2,497 receiving yards in his career ... Stephen Garcia threw for a career-high 215 yards, attempting a career-high 26 passes and completing 14 ... Emanuel Cook tied his career high with 11 tackles, including eight solo ... The Gamecocks lead the SEC and are sixth in the nation in total defense, allowing 256.1 yards per game.

GEORGIA BULLDOGS



Georgia's 52 points against LSU were the most points by the Bulldogs in an SEC game since 2004 when it beat Kentucky 62-17 in Lexington ... Georgia improved to 28-4 in an opponent's stadium including 10-2 against ranked foes under Mark Richt since 2001 ... Georgia sophomore Darryl Gamble tied an NCAA record for Interception Returns for Touchdowns by a linebacker in game with two (40 & 53 yards) ... Fr. FL A.J. Green (3 rec., 89 yards vs. LSU) has caught at least one catch in every game this season ... Soph. TB Knowshon Moreno had his 11th career 100-yard rushing game after going for a 163 yards on 21 carries with a touchdown.

TENNESSEE VOLUNTEERS



DB Eric Berry saw action on offense for the first time in his career, catching one pass for three yards against Alabama ... He also made his debut on kickoff returns, with two returns for 32 yards ... Tennessee's defense has allowed just one rushing play all season of 20-yards or longer with none by Alabama ... Soph. DB Dennis Rogan returned four kickoffs for 78 yards and is sixth on the UT career kickoff return yardage list with 876 ... Senior Austin Rogers (WR) and junior Jeff Cottam (TE) made their first starts of the season.

KENTUCKY WILDCATS



Kentucky rushed for 141 yards on 33 carries against Florida ... It was UK's fourth 100+ yard day on the ground and first since gaining 216 yards in the win over Western Kentucky ... The Wildcats' 17 first downs were a season-high in Southeastern Conference play ... Kentucky totaled 32 minutes and 17 seconds in time of possession which was also a season high in SEC play ... UK recorded a safety in the fourth quarter on a Florida muffed punt attempt ... The last time Kentucky recorded a safety was November 18, 2006 vs. Louisiana-Monroe ... Sr. LB Braxton Kelley totaled 11 tackles in the game. Kelley has totaled 10+ tackles three times this season and eight times in his career



VANDERBILT COMMODORES

WR Sean Walker finished with career highs with six catches for 138 yards and a touchdown against Duke ... The receiving yardage was a season high for Vanderbilt receivers, besting his 66-yard effort against Auburn on Oct. 4 ... QB Mackenzi Adams threw for a career best 210 yards. It was the first time a VU QB threw for over 200 yards this season ... LB Chris Marve finished with a career high 16 tackles, including 2.5 for loss, with one forced fumble ... DE Brandon Stewart finished with two sacks, and two forced fumbles ... TE Brandon Barden recorded career highs with five catches and 53 yards.

2008 SEC DIVISIONAL TIE-BREAKER

In the event of a tie for the division championship, the following procedures will be used to break all ties to determine the SEC Football Championship Game representative. All Conference versus Conference Games (both division and non-division) will be counted in the Conference Standings.

TWO-TEAM TIE. In the event two teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order:

- A. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams;
- B. Records of the tied teams within the division;
- C. Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference record, and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall record against non-divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional or non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- G. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game.

THREE-TEAM TIE (OR MORE). If three teams are tied for a division title, the following procedure will be used in the following order: (Note: If one of the procedures results in one team being eliminated and two remaining, the two-team tiebreaker procedure as stated in No. 1 above will be used):

- A. Combined head to head record among the tied teams;
- B. Record of the tied teams within the division;
- C. Head to head competition against the team within the division with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall Conference record against non divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non divisional) and proceeding through other common non divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- G. The tied team with the highest ranking in the Bowl Championship Series Standings following the last weekend of regular-season games shall be the divisional representative in the SEC Championship Game, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest-ranked tied team. In this case, the head-to-head results of the top two ranked tied teams shall determine the representative in the SEC Championship Game.

For the 27th straight season, the SEC recorded the largest total attendance figure of any conference in the nation. In 2007, a total of 6,687,342 fans attended 89 games, an average of 75,139 per contest, also tops in the nation. SEC stadiums were filled to 97.69 percent of capacity for each home game in 2007. The SEC had six of the top 10 schools in total attendance in 2007 - Tennessee (4), Auburn (5), Georgia (6), LSU (7), Alabama (8) and Florida (9).

SEC LEADS NATION WITH 263 FORMER PLAYERS ON 2007 NFL OPENING DAY ROSTERS

The Southeastern Conference had 263 players on the 2007 National Football League opening day active rosters, which led all conferences.

The Atlantic Coast Conference was second with 238 players, followed by the Big Ten with 234 players, Pac-10 with 183 players, Big 12 with 176 players and the Big East with 84 players.

Among SEC schools, Georgia was first with 37 former players on NFL rosters, followed by Tennessee with 36, LSU with 33, Florida with 31 and Auburn with 30. Alabama had 21 players on NFL rosters, while South Carolina had 19, Ole Miss and Mississippi State had 17 each, Arkansas had 12, Kentucky six and Vanderbilt with five.

The SEC had five of its schools with 30-or-more-players on NFL rosters. No other conference had two.

Nationally, Miami (Fla.) leads with 46 former players on NFL rosters, followed by Ohio State with 44, Florida State with 41, Tennessee with 36 and Georgia with 35.

The NFL Kickoff Weekend numbers were furnished by the National Football League and does not include any former SEC players that may have been activated after the opening weekend.

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

- The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports - 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.
- The SEC's mission statement reflects the priorities of the league. "The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

- During the last six years, the SEC has had more student-athletes honored as CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans than any other conference. The league has had 211 student-athletes named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, including 95 named to the first-team.
- During the last 12 years, the SEC has had 19 winners of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award, which is given annually to eight outstanding senior student-athletes. Since 1997, no other conference has had as many student-athletes honored with this prestigious award.
- Kentucky's Jacob Tamme was named by the National Football Foundation as a National Scholar-Athlete. During the last six years, the SEC has had 12 student-athletes honored, the most of any conference. LSU's Rudy Niswanger won the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award given by the National Football Foundation in 2005 as the nation's top football scholar-athlete. Niswanger became the sixth SEC student-athlete to claim the "Academic Heisman" since the award was established in 1990.

FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

- The 12 member institutions of the SEC provide nearly \$65 million in scholarships for the more than 4,200 student-athletes each year.
- The SEC distributed nearly \$675,000 during the 2006-2007 academic year from the NCAA Special Assistance Fund for Student-Athletes. This program was implemented to provide financial aid to student-athletes with specific needs such as clothing and shoes, medical or vision care, academic course supplies and family emergencies.
- During the 2008-09 academic year, the SEC will distribute more than \$1 million to directly benefit student-athletes from the Student-Athlete Opportunity Fund.
- The SEC awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$130,000 to 24 student-athletes each year. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award, named for the league's fourth commissioner, and a \$10,000 scholarship. Last year, 22 additional student-athletes (11 female and 11 male) received \$5,000 to continue their education. Alabama golfer Joseph Sykora and Auburn swimmer Kristen Hastrup were named McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award winners in 2007-08.
- The SEC has established a Community Service Award to honor a male and female student-athlete with a \$5,000 scholarship for outstanding service in the community. South Carolina football player William Brown and Vanderbilt lacrosse player Brooke Shinaberry were named recipients of this award in 2007-08.

A LEADER IN WOMEN'S SPORTS

- The SEC has developed a "Principles for Gender Equity," which, calls for each league school to provide equitable funding for women's sports, promotions and marketing and other support services. The SEC currently conducts championships in 11 women's sports and nine men's sports.
- The SEC had three sport winners of the Collegiate Woman of the Year Award sponsored by Honda. Tennessee's Candace Parker won for women's basketball, Katie Heenan of Georgia took top honors in gymnastics and Florida's Carolina Burckle was the top student-athlete in swimming & diving. Parker was the winner of the Honda National Collegiate Woman of the Year honor in 2007-08.
- Since 1987, SEC schools have won 69 NCAA women's national championships, an average of more than three per year in the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors. Nine of the 12 SEC institutions have won a national women's team championship since 1987.

COMPLIANCE AND EDUCATION

- The SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement has issued a report of recommendations that represents an important initial step in a formal process of establishing a new standard of compliance excellence within the Southeastern Conference. Among the recommendations included in this report was how institutions will handle reports of allegations, strengthening the relationship between the league's institutions and the conference office, developing new orientation programs and establishing an annual review of compliance issues.
- The SEC also conducts a New Coaches Orientation Program four times a year, which supplements institutional orientation programs and enhance the professional development of coaches. Topics of discussion range from the role of the SEC and NCAA to the role of athletics in higher education.

SPORTSMANSHIP

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:
 "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

IN THE COMMUNITY

- The SEC launched its education initiative in 2002, utilizing the platform of intercollegiate athletics to provide elementary school teachers with relevant resources they can use to educate and prepare children for life. The SEC became the nation's first conference to develop customized educational software, providing a CD-ROM containing SEC-branded content correlating to national educational standards. Since the CD-ROM was produced, the SEC has initiated an online program for K-8 students on education content and character development.
- SECKids.com is a website uniquely designed for school-age students. Now fans of all ages can access exciting, interactive and educational information on the SEC and its universities. SECKids.com features exclusive behind-the-scenes access at championship events, profiles of student-athletes and coaches, along with games and video highlights. Teachers can also register online to utilize the SEC Kids's college software in their classroom. The SEC is the only conference in the country to develop a site of this kind.

OVERALL ATHLETICS SUCCESS

- In 2007-08, the SEC had 168 teams in 20 sports take part in NCAA post-season play, an average of almost eight teams per sport. Along with those numbers, the league also produced 457 first-team All-Americans, won five team and 46 individual national titles.
- Since 1990, the SEC has won 123 team and 851 individual national championships. Since that time, the SEC has had at least one team ranked in the top five nationally in 76.2 percent of the total sports win which the league has competed (281 of 369). Ten of the SEC's 12 schools have won at least one national championship since 1990.
- In the SEC's 20 sponsored sports since 2000, the SEC has won 55 team titles. The SEC has won team titles in 16 different sports since 2000, the most of any conference.

THE COACHES

Tommy Tuberville is in his 10th season at Auburn with a record of 84-37 (.694) and in his 14th season overall with a record of 109-57 (.657). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Steve Ensminger and the defensive coordinator is Paul Rhoads.

Houston Nutt is in his first season at Ole Miss and in his 16th season overall with a record of 115-74 (.608). Kent Austin serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Junior RB Ben Tate has been their top offensive weapon, averaging 67.2 rushing yards per game with a pair of TDs. Junior Chris Todd and sophomore Kodi Burns have split time at quarterback with Burns getting the starting nod last time out. Todd has completed 86-of-156 for 903 yards, five TDs and six interceptions, while Burns is 30-of-63 for 309 yards, one score and four picks.

Peria Jerry leads the team and is fourth in the SEC with 9.0 TFLs, and sophomore NT Ted Laurent is tied for 10th in the league with 7.0. Jerry has 4.5 TFLs in his last two games. Jamarca Sanford has recorded double-figure tackles in two of the last four games and 10 times in his career. Sanford is tied for seventh in the SEC in tackles per game (8.0) and is the league's active career leader (269 total stops).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Auburn ranks fifth in the SEC in total defense and fourth in pass defense. Junior DL Antonio Coleman tops the conference in sacks (6.0) and TFLs (10.5), and sophomore DB Mike McNeil is the squad's leading tackler with 43 total stops. Sen'Derrick Marks is tied for third in the SEC with nine tackles for loss, including two sacks. Marks, who has started all 34 games since the start of the 2006 season, now has 29 tackles for loss during his career.

Jevan Snead is tied for the SEC lead in TD passes (12) and ranks third in passing average (209.1 ypg) and fourth in total offense (214.0 ypg). Shay Hodge is tied for the SEC lead in touchdown catches with six and ranks first in yards per catch (19.3) and fourth in receiving yards per game (60.4 ypg), ahead of teammate Dexter McCluster in sixth (56.4). Mike Wallace posted the fourth 100-yard receiving game of his career and second of the year with a career-high 120 yards on five catches at Arkansas.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Robert Dunn is second nationally in punt returns (21.4), while Tristan Davis is 13th nationally in kickoff returns (28.4). Both have returned kicks for touchdowns. Davis set an Auburn single-game record with 182 kickoff return yards Oct. 11 vs. Arkansas. Davis, who accumulated the 182 yard on five returns, brought back his first return of the game 97 yards for a touchdown, which was the sixth-longest kickoff return in school history. His 182 yards were the eighth most in a single game in SEC history.

Joshua Shene has quietly emerged as the top kicker in the SEC, ranking first in field goal percentage (92.3) and tied for first in PATs (1.000). Since his lone missed kick of the year at Vanderbilt on a 47-yard try, Shene has made eight straight FGs and is 12-of-13 overall. Wallace ranks fourth in the SEC in average at 26.8 yards per kickoff return, and he has posted three of the top-11 single-game totals in school history, including the best ever.

THE COACHES

Todd Graham is in his second season at Tulsa with a record of 18-4 (.818) and in his third season overall with a record of 25-10 (.714). The Golden Hurricane's offensive coordinators are Herb Hand and Gus Malzahn. Keith Patterson and Paul Randolph serve as defensive coordinators.

Bobby Petrino is in his first season at Arkansas and sixth overall with a record of 47-23 (.671). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Patrino and the defensive coordinator is Willy Robinson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TULSA HAS THE BALL

David Johnson threw for 264 yards and a touchdown, ran for two more scores and No. 19 Tulsa overpowered UCF 49-19 Sunday night in the Golden Hurricane's first game in the Top 25 in 17 years. Damaris Johnson recorded the first rushing touchdown of his career versus UCF. It was his seventh total touchdown this season (5 receiving, 1 kick return).

Malcolm Sheppard ranks fourth on the team in tackles (39) and is tied for the lead in TFL (7.0-22). He ranks second with 2.5 sacks (-11) and six quarterback hurries. Jerry Franklin leads the Hogs with 68 tackles in the first eight games. He has garnered 44 solo tackles and 24 assisted stops. He has 3.5 tackles for loss (-17), 1.5 sack (-14), one interception, two quarterback hurries, two pass break ups, one forced fumble and one recovered fumble.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

In Tulsa's 49-19 win over UCF on Sunday night, James Lockett tallied five solo tackles, including three quarterback sacks for -27 yards and two forced fumbles. Lockett's first forced fumble resulted in Tulsa scoring the first touchdown of the game, while his second caused fumble led to a score that put the Golden Hurricane ahead 28-19 in the third quarter. Lockett is the first TU player to force two fumbles in a game since Nick Bunting accomplished it in the 2005 C-USA Championship Game.

Michael Smith has racked up 920 yards and six touchdowns on 163 carries thus far this season. The Razorback tailback leads the SEC with 131.4 yards rushing per game. D.J. Williams leads the Razorbacks in catches and receiving yards with 38 receptions for 444 yards. He also leads the Hogs with two touchdowns. Williams ranks tied for seventh in the nation in catches per game (4.75) among tight ends and eighth in receiving yards per game (55.5). Casey Dick is second in the SEC in passing yards per game (223.4 ypg.)

SPECIAL TEAMS

Damaris Johnson earned the Special Teams Player of the Week award for the second consecutive week. He went over 100 yards in kickoff returns with four returns for 134 yards and a 33.5 average per return. With Tulsa trailing 19-14 to start the second half, Johnson took the opening kickoff 70 yards to the UCF 29-yard line and three plays later Tulsa scored the go-ahead touchdown. For the game, Johnson had a game-high 183 all-purpose yards.

Jeremy Davis is averaging 42.8 yards per punt in his first eight games including a career long punt of 58 yards earlier this year against Auburn. So far this season, Davis has punted 37 times for 1,584 yards and has landed 12 kicks inside the opponents' 20-yard line. He has recorded eight punts of 50 yards or more this season. Davis ranks third in the SEC and 22nd in the nation with his 42.8 yards per punt average.

Sylvester Croom is in his fifth season at Mississippi State and overall with a record of 20-35 (.364). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Woody McCorvey and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Harbison.

UK quarterback Mike Hartline ranks seventh in the SEC in the total offense, averaging 161.1 yards per game, however, freshman Randall Cobb will start for UK this weekend. With UK's top two receivers out with season-ending knee injuries (Dicky Lyons and Derrick Locke), Cobb leads the receiving corps with 18 catches for 164 yards and two touchdowns. TB Alonso Smith had a career day in receiving yards vs. Arkansas, catching five passes for a career-high 108 yards.

Dominic Douglas moved into the middle linebacker position in Week 4 after starting 14 times at weakside linebacker. He currently leads the Bulldogs with 58 total tackles, and that total ranks 11th in the SEC. Last weekend against MTSU, Douglas posted eight tackles, a pair of quarterback hurries and a pass breakup. Derek Pegues holds the MSU school record with three interception returns for touchdowns, which is tied for second in the SEC. Also, his 11 total interceptions tie him for third in school history in that category and it is the highest active total in the conference.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Trevar Lindley, who holds the school record for career pass breakups (32), leads the SEC and is tied for seventh in the nation in passes defended. He has charted nine pass breakups, including three against Alabama, and four interceptions (T-12th in the nation) this season. Jeremy Jarmon currently has 5.5 tackle for loss, two sacks, three pass breakups and two quarterback hurries. Braxton Kelley currently leads the team and ranks seventh in the SEC in tackles with 64.

Brandon McRae has hauled in a team-leading 37 passes on the season for 361 yards and a pair of touchdowns. He ranks fifth in the SEC with a 4.6-catch-per-game average. With 599 yards on 140 carries in the first eight games of the season, State junior tailback Anthony Dixon has now compiled 2,333 rushing yards on 596 attempts in 33 career games. Dixon rushed 27 times for 126 yards and three touchdowns last week versus MTSU.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Kicker Tim Masthay leads the SEC and ranks fifth nationally in punting with a 46.03 yards per punt average. On kickoffs, he also leads the SEC in touchbacks with 18. Masthay led the SEC last season with 23. Against Florida, Masthay totaled three punts for 50+ yards in the game. Lones Seiber has made 33-of-56 in his career and 6-of-12 this season.

Pegues has played in 43 games during his MSU career and last week set the SEC record with 2,321 career kickoff return yards (passing Derek Abney, Kentucky, 2000-03, 2,315). He also stands in fourth all-time in the SEC with 3,078 total kick return yards (2,321 kickoff return / 757 punt return). Adam Carlson has connected on six-of-10 field goal attempts this fall, but the senior has been at his best from longer distances. He has been true on each attempt over 40 yards, a perfect 3-for-3.

Steve Roberts is in his seventh season at Arkansas State with a record of 35-44 (.443) and 16th overall with a record of 84-77-1 (.522). The Red Wolves' offensive coordinator is Doug Ruse and the defensive coordinators are Kevin Corless and Jack Curtis.

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 14-6 (.700) and 15th overall with a record of 120-65-1 (.648). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS STATE HAS THE BALL

Jahbari McLennan's 63-yard run against ULM was the second longest by an ASU player this year, but the longest for a touchdown. He also had a 63-yard reception against Texas Southern. Junior quarterback Corey Leonard has been named the league's offensive player of the week twice this season and six times for his career. He is just the fourth player in school history to pass for over 4,500 yards (4,795), the third player to throw at least 30 touchdowns (34).

The Crimson Tide ranks fifth nationally in total defense, allowing just 263.1 yards per game. Injured star Terrence Cody has recorded 15 tackles, including 3.5 tackles for loss this season. He has also added one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one quarterback pressure. Dont'a Hightower is third on the team in tackles with 37 stops - 16 solo - in eight games (4.6 tackles per game). Hightower has also forced one fumble and recovered two more to rank tied for second in the SEC at .25 per game.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Daylan Walker and Ben Owens have been named the SBC Defensive Player of the Week this season. Alex Carrington already had a Sun Belt Conference-high 11.5 tackles for loss entering the ULL game, which more than doubled his previous career best for a single season (5 in 2007). Carrington had a league-high 7.5 sacks as well, which easily tops his total of two for his freshman and sophomore seasons combined.

Andre Smith is one of 12 semifinalists for the 2008 Rotary Lombardi Award and was named to The Sporting News Midseason All-America team. Glen Coffee has three rushes of 50 yards or more. Coffee ranks fourth in the SEC and 21st nationally in rushing at 104.75 yards per game and leads the top 10 SEC rushers at 6.6 yards per carry. Julio Jones leads the Tide with 55.5 receiving yards per game. John Parker Wilson now has 45 career touchdown passes and 6,911 yards.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Josh Arauco was named the Sun Belt Special Teams Player of the Week for the third time this season, including the last two weeks in a row, last Monday after hitting all three of his field goal attempts and breaking the school record for career field goals in the Red Wolves' game against Louisiana-Lafayette. Arauco moved into first place in the NCAA for field goals made this season, connecting on the three field goals to make him a perfect 15-of-15 on the season.

Leigh Tiffin leads the SEC and is tied for 13th nationally with 1.62 field goals per game in 2008. He has connected on 13 of 17 this season. He now has 67 points in seven games this season, averaging 8.38 per contest that ranks sixth in the SEC. P.J. Fitzgerald is averaging a career-best 41.9-yard per kick to rank fifth in the SEC with six punts inside the 20. Javier Arenas ranks fifth in the SEC and 13th nationally with a 14.52 yards per return average.

Mark Richt is in his eighth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 79-20 (.798). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinator is Willie Martinez.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Darryl Gambale tied a Georgia and SEC record after returning a pair of interceptions for touchdowns in the Bulldogs' 52-38 win over #11 LSU in Baton Rouge. Gambale also had a career-high 13 tackles, which was second on the team against the Tigers. Rennie Curran continues to lead the team in tackles (69), including a career-high 14 against No. 11 LSU and No. 8 Alabama. Curran has been the Bulldogs' top tackler six times this season and also leads the team with 3.0 sacks.

Against Kentucky, Tim Tebow rushed for two touchdowns to bring his career total to 36. The amount is tied with Emmitt Smith for the most in school history. Jeff Demps' average of 11.9 yards per carry leads the nation (min. 25 attempts). His average TD run this year is 47 yards. He had the first receiving touchdown of his career vs. UK on a 61-yard reception. Over the last three games, Demps and Chris Rainey have carried the ball 52 times for 487 yards and four rushing touchdowns (avg. 9.4 per carry). Percy Harvin has scored a touchdown in each of the last nine games he has played in.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Matthew Stafford is 24-5 as a starter and has 6,218 yards with 38 TDs in his career. Knowshon Moreno registered his third-highest rushing total of the season after tallying 163 yards and a touchdown on 21 carries to lead Georgia to a 52-38 win at #11 LSU. Georgia's top two receiving threats are freshman FLK A.J. Green (39 rec., 662 yds., 5 TDs) and senior SE Mohamed Massaquoi (28 rec., 366 yds., 4 TDs).

Brandon Spikes is third in the SEC in tackles per game this year and is 44th nationally with 8.67. Spikes has led the Gators in tackles in eight of the last 11 games he has played in. In addition, he has recorded 10-or-more tackles in five of his last eight outings. Ahmad Black recorded his team-leading third interception of the season against Kentucky. Carlos Dunlap is fourth in the SEC in sacks per game (.57) and is tied for 58th nationally.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Blair Walsh is 12-for-17 on the year in field goal attempts but three of his misses have come from 50+ yards. He is 2-for-5 from that range. Brian Mimbs is averaging 43.8 yards a punt with 11 inside the 20 and seven covering 50+ yards. He is also the holder for Walsh. Ramarcus Brown is averaging 24.0 yds./return. Brown had a season-long 44-yarder at Arizona State. He had 146 yards on six returns against Alabama.

Brandon James is one of three players in the country to return two punts for touchdowns this season. Demps blocked the second punt of his career in UF's last game against Kentucky. Jonathan Phillips improved to 9-of-9 on field goals by connecting on all three of his attempts against LSU. Chas Henry has averaged 43.8 yards per punt on his 22 kicks this season, which is second in the SEC.

Elix Wilson has led the team in tackles in four of his seven games including a career-high 16 at Georgia. Rico McCoy is third on the team with 49 tackles after posting a team-high 13 vs. Alabama. DE Robert Ayers has nine TFLs through eight games after posting 5.5 in the last three games. Eric Berry has 10 career interceptions (five this season) and is the SEC record holder in career interception return yards with 397. He has 55 tackles this season after leading the team with 10 vs. MSU and posting 11 vs. UA.

Kenny McKinley leads the SEC active players with 177 career receptions. He needs 11 catches to tie Vanderbilt's Boo Mitchell (188) for 10th place in the SEC's all-time list. He also leads the SEC active players with 2,422 career receiving yards. Mike Davis has carried 97 times for 377 yards, an average of 3.9 yards per carry. Les Miles is in his fourth season at LSU with a record of 39-8 (.830) and eighth overall with a record of 67-28 (.705). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinators are Doug Mallory and Bradley Peveto.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TULANE HAS THE BALL

Andre Anderson ranks eighth nationally and first among C-USA players in rushing yards per game (123.43) and is 24th in the nation and fifth in C-USA for all-purpose yards per contest (152.29). He has rushed for 100 or more yards in four games and has 864 yards on 174 carries and seven touchdowns on the ground this year. Jeremy Williams leads Tulane in receiving with 27 receptions for 437 yards and five touchdowns, and he ranks second on the team in all-purpose yards with 135.2 yards.

Defensively, S Harry Coleman leads the Tigers with 41 tackles, while DE Rahim Alem has 5.0 sacks and DE Tyson Jackson 4.5 sacks, fourth in the SEC. Jackson ran his career total to 18.5, which ranks eighth in school history. Alem, a junior, ranks No. 2 in the SEC in sacks per game with 0.71 a contest. The Tulane defense remains ranked among the nation's top teams in total sacks at No. 28 with 16 for minus 106 yards. TU is averaging 2.43 sacks per game this season. Corey Sonnier leads the team with 50 tackles. Reggie Scott has 4.5 TFLs and two sacks, while Josh Lumar has 4.0 TFLs, two sacks and one interception. Logan Kelley leads the team with 4.0 sacks.

RB Charles Scott is coming off another outstanding performance, rushing for 144 yards and a pair of TDs against Georgia. In seven games, Scott has rushed for 100 yards five times and third in the SEC with 110.7 yards per game. Scott has rushed for 775 yards and 10 TDs. LSU QB Jarrett Lee has thrown for 1,328 yards and 11 TDs. WR Brandon LaFell has been the top target for LSU quarterbacks, catching 36 passes for 524 yards and five touchdowns.

Ross Thevenot is a two-year letterwinner who has played in 30 career games. For his career, he is 72-of-77 on PAT attempts and 29-of-43 field goal attempts (.674).
