SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal and endlines
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
 - h. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loss and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
 - i. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the cross bar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

SEC FOOTBALL ON TELEVISION

CBS SPORTS

On Aug. 14, 2008, CBS Sports and the SEC announced a history 15-year contract extension to broadcast its football and basketball games.

In the new agreement, beginning with the 2009-10 season, CBS Sports continues to be the exclusive national network broadcaster of SEC home football games, including the SEC Championship Game. CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball.

In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this comprehensive long-team deal includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSSports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN has acquired rights to every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package) and will serve as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference.

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks will increase coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two prime-time Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network, which launched in March 2005, will present a package of SEC football for the first time, with a Saturday game-of-the-week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually).

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, becomes the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature a game-of-the-week package (generally at 12:30 p.m. ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT will produce and distribute a studio show.

ESPN360.com: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts will be offered on the broadband network.

ESPN Mobile TV: Live games will be simulcast on mobile phones.

ESPN International: The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations.

ESPN Deportes: ESPN has acquired domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on the 24-hour, U.S.-based network.

ESPN GamePlan: The out-of-market college football pay-per-view service, will offer SEC action.

ESPN Classic: The network may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations.

ESPN.com: Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

On May 21, 2009, Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, announced it has reached a five-year agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement will begin with the 2009-10 academic year. Events and times will be announced as determined.

FOX SPORTS NET

FOX Sports Net (FSN), the nation's leader in local sports, today announced a new multi-year television rights agreement with ESPN that expands its long-time partnership with the Southeastern Conference (SEC).

Beginning with the 2009-10 academic year, FSN's three regional sports networks serving the SEC territory – FOX Sports South, Sun Sports and FOX Sports Southwest – will be the outlets for a minimum of 91 SEC athletic events each year. Events will include seven live, exclusive football games, 20 men's basketball games, 24 women's basketball games (16 regular season, eight tournament), 16 baseball games (10 regular season, six tournament) and 24 additional Olympic sporting events (softball, volleyball, soccer, gymnastics).

FSN will distribute these events to more than 24 million cable and satellite households across the SEC coverage area.

SEC FOOTBALL SHOWS ON TELEVISION

SEC Weekly on ESPNU

SEC Weekly, a one-hour program will air Thursdays at 4:30 p.m. on ESPNU, throughout the academic year and will cover SEC sports, including sport-by-sport previews, reviews, specials and features on student-athletes. The show will be hosted by Cara Capuano, who will anchor, and new analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia All-America and NFL player. SEC Weekly is a product of ESPN's landmark 15-year agreement with the Southeastern Conference. ESPNU will complement the show with SEC game telecasts, including football, basketball, Olympic sports and select conference championships.

SEC Gridiron Live

SEC Gridiron LIVE, a 60-minute studio show offering game previews, expert analysis and a fast-paced social networking component that enables fan interaction, will air on FOX Sports South, FOX Sports Southwest and SUN Sports. The show is hosted by broadcasting veteran Charles Davis, with analysts Randy Cross and David Pollack and social media reporter Cassidy Hubbard. SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2009 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of

preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

2008-09 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed five national championships in the 2008-09 year, tying it with the total from the 2007-08 season.

In 10 of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up.

The SEC had national championships in football (Florida), men's swimming & diving (Auburn), women's indoor track & field (Tennessee), gymnastics (Georgia) and baseball (LSU). The SEC also had national runners-up finishes in men's golf (Arkansas), gymnastics (Alabama), softball (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Georgia) and men's indoor track & field (Florida).

In its 76 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 179 team national championships, including 63 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2008-09 MEN'S SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY; 2nd in WOMEN'S SPORTS

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in the nine men's sports it sponsors and second in the 11 women's sports the league sponsors.

The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in each sport and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish.

In the nine men's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC had 440.5 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 375 points, followed by the Big 12 with 337.5 points, ACC with 214 points, Big East 102.5 points and the Big Ten with 80 points.

In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the Pac-10 was first with 615 points followed by the SEC with 431 points, the Big 12 with 337 points, Big Ten with 318.5 points, ACC with 277.5 points and the Big East with 161.5 points.

Combining the 20 sponsored sports, the Pac-10 had 990 points followed by the SEC with 806 points, Big 12 with 674.5 points, ACC with 491.5 points, Big Ten with 398.5 points and the Big East with 264 points.

The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 15 of the last 17 seasons (exceptions: 2007-08: Big 12; 1997-98: Pac-10). The Pac-10 has had the highest women's point totals each year since 1986 with the exception of four years the SEC has had the highest total (1990-91; 1995-96; 2004-05; 2006-07).

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 41 of its student-athletes each ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team mention, the most of any Division I conference in the nation.

The Academic All-America Program is administered and voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The SEC had 15 student-athletes earn first-team mention, 14 earn second-team and 12 earn third-team mention.

The Big 12 was second with 38 total student athletes listed while the Big Ten was third at 34 and the ACC fourth at 26. The Big Ten led all conferences in first-team honorees with 18, followed by the SEC's 15.

Each SEC institution had at least one student-athlete earn first, second or third-team mention. Florida led the SEC with seven student-athletes on the lists while Tennessee had six, South Carolina and Arkansas had five each. Alabama, Florida and Tennessee each led the SEC with three on the various first-team lists.

Florida's Stacey Nelson (softball) and Tim Tebow (football) were named Academic All-Americans of the Year in their respective sports.

SEC LAUNCHES ACADEMIC NETWORK TO PROMOTE 12 MEMBER INSTITUTIONS

The 12 institutions of the Southeastern Conference institutions have joined together in the launch of the SEC Academic Network, a website (www.secacademicnetwork.com) designed to promote the academic programs of SEC universities. The SEC Academic Network is being established by the SEC in partnership with ESPN and the member universities.

The Academic Network, developed using technology and coordination from ESPN Digital Media and Origin Digital, will feature content from every institution ranging from research, innovation and economic development to community partnerships, civic engagement and service.

"Our commitment to highlight the accomplishments of SEC member institution's academic programs was a key component of our new television agreements," said SEC Commissioner Mike Slive. "We are grateful to ESPN for providing the technology, expertise and tools they use in sports media to our institutions in support of academic pursuits."

Each institution has its own page on the website that includes videos categorized by topic. Alumni, fans and students worldwide will have the ability to learn more about SEC academics in one place through video features that are posted by the league institutions.

The Academic Network is a component of the SEC's 15-year television package with ESPN, which is the most comprehensive in the history of intercollegiate athletics. Also part of ESPN's commitment to SEC academic programs is the production of an annual Campus Connection telecast at each SEC institution, in which students take part in the production; telecasts of two programs annually dedicated to the academic accomplishments of SEC student-athletes; a weekly academic feature segment on ESPN's SEC show; and selection of one undergraduate student from every SEC institution to participate in ESPN's summer internship program.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:

"Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

THE COACHES

Steve Kragthrope is in his third season at Louisville with a record of 12-13 (.480) and seventh overall with a record of 41-35 (.539). Kragthrope serves as the Cardinals' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Brent Guy.

Rich Brooks is in his seventh season at Kentucky with a record of 33-41 (.446) and 19th overall with a record of 124-150-4 (.453). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and Steve Brown serves as the defensive coordinator.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LOUISVILLE HAS THE BALL

QB Justin Burke completed 17-of-31 passes for 223 yards with two interceptions in his first collegiate start. After starting the game 1-of-8 passing, he completed his next six straight passes. RB Victor Anderson gained 93 yards on 14 carries with two touchdowns, his sixth career game with over 90 rushing yards. It was the second time in his career that he scored as many as two touchdowns in a game. Senior wide receiver Scott Long made his much anticipated return to the lineup last Saturday versus Indiana State.

Senior cornerback Trevard Lindley was named the SEC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in the season-opening victory vs. Miami. Lindley had an interception, three pass breakups and three tackles against the RedHawks. He returned the interception 25 yards for a touchdown, marking the third consecutive season he has tallied a defensive TD. Lindley's three breakups give him 37 in his career, moving him up to eighth place on the SEC career list. The Wildcats linebackers are led by senior Micah Johnson, who earned first-team Coaches All-SEC honors last season. Corey Peters has 99 tackles in his career, including 16 tackles for loss and 7.5 quarterback sacks.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

LB Jon Dempsey led the Cardinals with 10 total tackles (7 tackles, 3 assisted stops) last week. He has double-digit total tackles in his last three straight games (9 tackles, 1 assist vs. West Virginia; 4 tackles, 7 assists at Rutgers last season). DE William Savoy's sack of ISU QB Chris Stutzreim on the Sycamores' first drive of the third quarter was the first sack the Cardinals' defense has registered in six games. SS Terence Simien and Brandon Heath both produced their first career interception in the game.

Randall Cobb is proving to be a utility player for the Wildcats. He is playing primarily at wide receiver this season, with occasional action at quarterback in the "Wildcat" formation and he serves as UK's primary punt returner. In the season opener, Cobb totaled seven receptions for a career-high 96 yards and charted a rushing and receiving touchdown for the first time in the same game. Junior-college transfer Chris Matthews came up big in his first UK game as he caught four passes for 57 yards and a touchdown against Miami. In the season opener, Hartline was 18-of-27 for 222 yards and two touchdowns. He completed passes to six different receivers.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Senior special teams specialist Trent Guy had a solid night returning kickoffs and punts for the Cardinals in the opener. Guy returned three kicks for 100 yards, which was a 33.3 yard average. Guy is tied for 10th in the country in kickoff return yardage. The 5-9 speedster also averaged 17.0 yards a punt return, which ranks 13th in the country. K Ryan Payne booted three field goals versus Indiana State.

Senior Lones Seiber and sophomore Ryan Tydlacka are contending for the field goal/extra point duties. Seiber has 238 points in his career, only eight shy of the school record. His career-long field goal is 48 yards, done three times. Tydlacka saw brief action last year, making 3-of-6 field goals, including a 51-yarder. Tydlacka inherits full-time punting duties from departed All-SEC punter Tim Masthay. In the season opener vs. Miami, Tydlacka punted the ball very well, booting two 50-plus yarders with one inside the 20-yard line. He averaged 44.5 yards on four punts.

THE COACHES

Todd Dodge is in his third season at North Texas and overall with a record of 4-22 (.154). The Mean Green's offensive coordinator is Todd Ford and Gary DeLoach serves as the defensive coordinator.

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 21-8 (.724) and 16th overall with a record of 127-67-1 (.654). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN NORTH TEXAS HAS THE BALL

The last two seasons, wide receiver Casey Fitzgerald led the nation in receptions with over 110 each year. Running back Cam Montgomery has put together his best back-to-back games in a North Texas uniform to start the 2009 season. Montgomery followed up his 149-yard effort against Ball State with 88 yards against Ohio. True freshman Darius Carey had six catches for 47 yards against Ohio. Junior quarterback Nathan Tune was pressed into duty after Riley Dodge went down with an injury. He has never made a start at the collegiate level.

Alabama's has 10 sacks in its first two games of the season and ranks second nationally with 5.0 sacks per game. Sophomore defensive lineman Marcell Dareus leads the Crimson Tide with 3.5 (-25) sacks this season, while junior linebacker Rolando McClain has two sacks (-19). Last year as a junior, Terrence Cody recorded 24 tackles, 4 ½ tackles for loss and recovered. Alabama ranks fifth through two games this season in rush defense, allowing 32.5 yards per game, and is 10th nationally in total defense (184.5 ypg).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

After two games, North Texas ranks third in the Sun Belt Conference in rushing defense, allowing an average of 116.0 per game. Last season the Mean Green ranked last in the conference, allowing an average of 207.1. After two games this season, Tobe Nwigwe ranks first in the Sun Belt and fifth in the nation in tackles with an average of 13.0 per game. He had a career-high 15 tackles in the double over.

In addition to rushing for 206 yards through two games this season, Mark Ingram has added 7 receptions for 82 yards. Ingram has at least one rushing touchdown in five of his last six games. Trent Richardson enjoyed an impressive debut in his first action with the Crimson Tide at Bryant-Denny Stadium, rushing for 118 yards and 2 touchdowns on 15 carries against FIU. Greg McElroy has been impressive in his first two games as the Crimson Tide's starting quarterback, completing 61.1 percent (33 of 54) of his passes for 235.5 yards per game and two touchdowns with one interception. North Texas head coach Todd Dodge was his high school coach.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Last season North Texas ranked 114th in the nation with a kickoff return average of 18.5 yards and it ranked dead last in the nation in kickoff return coverage, allowing an average of 30.9 yards per return. Insert new special teams coach Shelton Gandy. In the win over Ball State, North Texas averaged 20.0 yards per return and allowed an average of 16.8 yards per return. Through two games, Will Atterberry leads the Sun Belt Conference with seven punts (of his nine attempts) downed inside the opponent 20-yard line. He is averaging 42.6 yards per attempt, which ranks third in the Sun Belt.

Senior placekicker Leigh Tiffin converted two field goal attempts against gives Tiffin 59 in his Alabama career, ranking him tied for third place in Crimson Tide history behind Philip Doyle (78 from 1987-90), Michael Proctor (65 from 1992-95). He is now tied with his father, Van Tiffin (59 from 1983-86) on the Alabama career field goals list.

Lane Kiffin is in his first season at Tennessee and in his third season overall with a record of 6-16 (.273). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and Monte Kiffin serves as the defensive coordinator.

Urban Meyer is in his fifth season at Florida with a record of 46-9 (.836) and in his ninth season overall with a record of 85-17 (.833). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Strong.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

In his starts vs. Western Kentucky and UCLA, Montario Hardesty has rushed for the two highest single-game totals in his career at 160 vs. WKU and 89 vs. UCLA. He is averaging 5.6 yards per carry through two games and has scored two touchdowns. Quintin Hancock has caught 10 passes for 123 yards and one touchdown after not catching a pass in all of 2008. Chris Scott has started 28 straight games on the offensive line.

Carlos Dunlap notched his first sack of the season and two tackles vs. Troy. Dunlap paced the Gators and the SEC with nine and a half sacks in 2008 despite making just two starts. Dunlap was also the Defensive MVP of the BCS Championship Game. A.J. Jones recorded his first sack of the season against Troy, while Ryan Stamper led the Gators with five tackles. Brandon Spikes recorded 1.5 tackles for loss in the game.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Eric Berry burst into the national conscience with a 96-yard interception return for a touchdown off of UF signal caller Tim Tebow at Florida in 2007. Since then, Berry has picked an additional 11 passes and returned them for UT and SEC record 487 yards. He stands just 15 yards shy of the NCAA career record. Berry and Tebow are the first two reigning SEC Players of the Year to meet on the gridiron. Nick Reveiz tied for the team lead with six tackles vs. W. Kentucky and posted a career high nine stops vs. UCLA.

Tim Tebow has at least one touchdown pass in 30 consecutive games, best in the nation. Tebow has also rushed for 45 career touchdowns, tying Carnell Williams (Auburn, 2001-04) for third on the all-time SEC list. Tebow's career rating of 175.1 currently ranks No. 1 in SEC history (min. 300 completions). Three different running backs have scored at least one touchdown in each game this season: Jeff Demps (three rushing), Chris Rainey (two rushing) and Mike Gillislee (one rushing, one receiving). Deonte Thompson had two receptions, both for touchdowns, against Troy.

SPECIAL TEAMS

After starting off the 2008 season a shaky one-of-four in field goal attempts, UT placekicker Daniel Lincoln has hit four of his last five dating back to the 2008 Vanderbilt game. Lincoln's two field goals against UCLA move him into a tie for seventh on the UT career field goals list with 33 conversions. He needs just two more makes to move alone into sixth. With his two kicks against the Bruins, Lincoln now has 12 multiple field goal games in his career.

Brandon James, with four career punt return touchdowns, recorded his first kickoff return for a touchdown in the season opener against Charleston Southern. James has 11 punt returns of 30 yards or more in his career, including four punt return touchdowns of 74-plus yards. Jonathan Phillips set a UF and SEC record in 2008 with 78 PATs, which ranked second in the nation. Chas Henry, a 2008 semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award who is again on the award's watch list, averaged 43.4 yards per punt on his 44 kicks in 2008, third in the SEC.

Les Miles is in his fifth season at LSU with a record of 44-11 (.800) and ninth overall with a record of 72-32 (.692). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LOUISIANA-LAFAYETTE HAS THE BALL

Chris Masson directed a pair of two-minute drills that led to scores each time vs. Kansas State. He was 5-for-7 for 55 yards on the final drive of the first half which led to a TD and 14-2 lead. In the fourth quarter, he completed three straight passes to get UL past midfield and into field goal range for the winning kick. Undrea Sails grounded out 78 yards on 20 carries against Kansas State. He recorded his second rushing TD of the season. WR Richie Falgout has as many career touchdown passes (4) as any of the Cajuns top three quarterbacks. Falgout's career passing line is 4-of-4 for 110 yards and four touchdowns. His career passing efficiency stands at 661.00.

Defensively, LSU is allowing 16.0 points and 344.0 yards per game (139.5 rushing, 204.5 passing). LB Harry Coleman leads the team with 17 tackles. Other defensive standouts include: LB Perry Riley (12 tackles, 1 TFL), DE Rahim Alem (10 tackles, 2 sacks) and DT Drake Nevis (8 tackles, 3 TFL, 1 sack). Alem has run his career sack total to 12. Alem goes into the ULLafayette contest have recorded a sack in four of LSU's last five games dating back to 2008.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

The defensive front is wealthy with upperclassmen. Seniors Hall Davis, Chris Lanaux and LaQuincy Williams join talented juniors Terrell Richardson, Jordan Topp, Sharrick Moore and Jermaine Rogers. Antwyne Zanders led UL in tackles for the second straight game, posting 15 (14 solo) vs. Kansas State. On the season, he is by far the team's top tackler with 24 (19 solo) — 14 more than the next player on the list. Maurice Rolle collected his second interception of the season versus Kansas State.

Offensively, the Tigers are averaging 27.0 points and 323.5 yards per game (163.5 rushing, 160.0 passing). QB Jordan Jefferson has completed 31 of 48 passes for 310 yards and 3 TDs. Keiland Williams (123 yards, 2 TDs) and Charles Scott (101 yards) pace the rushing attack, while Brandon LaFell (11 rec., 72 yards, 1 TD) and Terrance Toliver (7 for 138, 2 TDs) lead the receiving corps.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Tyler Albrecht attempted his first career collegiate field goal vs. Kansas State and was good from 48 yards lifting Louisiana to the 17-15 victory. The Cajuns unusual punting style sometimes limits Spencer Ortego's kicking distance, but the results are evident. While fifth in the conference in punting average, the Cajuns were second in net punts in 2008, meaning Ortego is placing the ball to limit a return. More than half of his punts (28 of 48) were not returned, including 12 placed inside the 20-yard line. The longest return allowed by Ortego was 16 yards.

Return specialist Trindon Holliday became the 100-meter dash national champion at the 2009 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Holliday clocked 10.00 in the national final of the 100-meter to claim the title. The time was the fastest of any player in the history of college football.

Dan Mullen is in his first season at MSU and overall. The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Les Koenning and the defensive coordinator is Carl Torbush.

Bobby Johnson is in his eighth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 28-57 (.337) and in his 16th season overall with a record of 88-93 (.486). Ted Cain serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Jaime Bryant.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Junior wide receiver Leon Berry totaled 246 all-purpose yards in State's loss at Auburn last weekend - the sixth highest single-game total in school history and the most in the SEC this season. The transfer from East Mississippi Community College caught four passes for 60 yards and returned seven kickoffs for 186 yards. Senior running back Anthony Dixon returned to the Mississippi State lineup last weekend, earning his 30th career start. Dixon rushed 20 times for 92 yards, and scored his 31st career rushing touchdown. Dixon is the school's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns, total touchdowns and rushing attempts.

Casey Hayward was nominated for SEC Defensive Player of the Week honors after posting 13 total tackles, including eight unassisted stops at LSU. It marks the highest tackle total by a Commodore cornerback since 2007. Chris Marve's 11-tackle performance represented the second highest single-game effort. Marve also forced his third fumble of the season, giving him seven in a 15-game career. Marve tops the SEC and shares the NCAA lead in forced fumbles. Sean Richardson finished with 10 total tackles. Brent Trice also had a career-high 10 total tackles. Senior captain Ryan Hamilton is out for the season after an injury at LSU.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

The Mississippi State defense allowed 589 yards of total offense, including 390 rushing yards in the loss at Auburn. The Bulldog D had been smothering in week one, holding Jackson State to only 194 yards of total offense and 62 on the ground. Senior Jamar Chaney heads the linebacking unit while sophomore DB Charles Mitchell leads the secondary.

Zac Stacy was impressive for the second consecutive game, as the true freshman back rushed for 89 yards on 20 carries, and caught two passes for 14 yards. He totaled 103 all-purpose yards. Through two games, Stacy is the SEC's fourth leading rusher with a 111-yard average. Quarterback Larry Smith finished the game at LSU 11-for-24 for 88 yards and one interception. Tight end Austin Monahan led the Commodores in receiving with three catches for 25 yards.

SPECIAL TEAMS

First-year punter Heath Hutchins has made quite an impression during the first two games of his career. The junior college transfer currently ranks second in the SEC and eighth nationally with a 46.13 yard-per-punt average. His eight punts have been returned for a total of six yards with three being fair caught.

Brett Upson was superb throughout the 2008 season, blending the best leg strength of his career with an accuracy that frequently pinned opponents deep in their own territory. While just the SEC's eighth best punter with a 40.4-yard average, Upson's hang time and pinpoint direction resulted in the league's fewest punt return yards allowed. He was MVP of the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA ATLANTIC HAS THE BALL

Rusty Smith will return for his third season as an Owl starter under center. The senior from Jacksonville, FL holds nearly every FAU passing record. He was the 2007 Sun Belt Player of the Year and the 2008 Preseason player of the year. He guided the Owls to back-to-back bowl victories and earned bowl game MVP honors in both. William Rose returns to the backfield as the most dominant fullback in the Sun Belt Conference. Rose averages 5.0 yards per carry and 6.9 yards per reception. He has 11 career scores.

Senior linebacker Eric Norwood needs just one sack to tie Andrew Provenge for the school record in that category; Norwood currently has 25.0 in his career, including 3.0 through two games this year. Darian Stewart leads team with 16 tackles thru two games and he equaled a career high with 11 stops at Georgia. Devin Taylor had an incredible collegiate debut vs. NC State with two forced fumbles, a blocked punt, sack and three tackles for loss.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

The defense will look to Josh Savidge for its experienced senior leadership. Savidge drew his first start as a true freshman against Oklahoma State in Land Shark Stadium. He played every game that followed until a knee injury in the fourth game of his junior season forced him to the sideline. He returned in 2008 to play and start in every game. Savidge recorded 28 tackles, including five for a loss of 12 yards. Michael Lockley led with nine tackles in the opener at Nebraska.

Stephen Garcia's 31-for-53, 313-yard, 2 TD performance at Georgia was the best of his career in all categories; Saturday will be his first home start against a non-conference team. Junior Brian Maddox made his second career start at NC State and did not disappoint, carrying the ball 23 times for 66 yards (both career highs) and the Gamecocks' only touchdown on a one-yard plunge early in the first quarter. Weslye Saunders led the way with eight grabs for 96 yards at Georgia.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Senior punter Keegan Peterson is a member of the Ray Guy watch list. He has logged over 100 punts in his career for a 39-yard average. Kicker Ross Gornall scored the team's only points at Nebraska. Gornall also handles kickoffs. Tavious Polo sees action in both kickoff and punt return duties.

Junior kick returner Chris Culliver needs only two kickoff returns and 155 kick return yards to match the all-time Carolina marks in both categories. WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Defensively, junior linebacker Ryan Godare has tallied a team-high 17 tackles for Southeastern in the opener with Mark Newbill and Lindsey Leavoy (2 sacks, 2 forced fumbles) next at 10 stops each. All-American safety Tommy Connors made his debut last week against Union, recording three tackles with a fumble recovery and a pass breakup.

Senior Dexter McCluster posted 115 all-purpose yards (nine rushes for 50, six passes for 65) and two TDs (one rushing, one receiving, both in the fourth quarter) at Memphis. He rushed for a TD for the third straight game and fourth time in the last five games. Senior WR Shay Hodge led the team in receiving yards with 77 on three grabs. Junior QB Jevan Snead extended his streak to 10 straight games with a TD pass, completing a pair of fourth-quarter scoring tosses. Snead finished 12-of-22 for 175 yards, two TDs and two interceptions.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Jeff Turner had a solid junior season at kicker for the Lions. He connected on 12 of 17 attempts with a long of 46 yards and was good on 39 of 41 extra-point attempts. His 75 points on the year was the seventh-most in school history. He ranked among the Southland Conference leaders in scoring (seventh), field goals (sixth), field-goal percentage (70.6, fourth) and point-after percentage (95.1, fifth) and had season-high four field goals and 14 points at Louisiana Tech.

With six extra points, junior K Joshua Shene extended his streak of successful PATs to 80, which is second on the all-time Rebel charts. Shene was 1-for-1 on field goals, connecting from 27 yards out. In his Rebel debut, freshman K Andrew Ritter handled all eight Ole Miss kickoffs and averaged 64.2 yards per kick (48.8 net) with three touchbacks.

Mark Richt is in his ninth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 83-23 (.643). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinators are Willie Martinez and John Jancek.

Bobby Petrino is in his second season at Arkansas with a record of 6-7 (.462) and seventh overall with a record of 50-26 (.658). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Patrino and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Joe Cox had a career-high 201 yards passing and two TDs in the win over USC. Cox tallied career highs of 201 yards passing on 17 completions for two touchdowns in the 41-37 win over USC. Against USC, A.J. Green hauled in six catches for 86 yards, including an acrobatic TD catch just before halftime. Richard Samuel rushed for a career-high 87 yards on 20 carries against #9 OSU before picking up 65 yards and a TD versus USC.

Defensive tackle Malcolm Sheppard opened the year with two tackles for a loss against Missouri State to bring his career total to 28, which is tied with two others for 16th in school history. Sheppard has led the Razorbacks in tackles for loss each of the last two seasons. Wendel Davis led the Razorbacks with seven tackles against Missouri State he also made the second interception of his career in the first quarter. Jerry Franklin has had five-or-more tackles in 12 of 13 games in his career and has had a pass breakup in three of his last four outings.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Junior WLB Rennie Curran leads the SEC with 23 tackles in two games. He is the top returning tackler in the SEC after recording 115 stops in 2008. Curran matched his career high with 15 tackles against USC in 2009 and had the game-winning pass breakup in the game's final seconds. Junior SLB Darryl Gamble was third on the team in tackles with six against OSU and had a season-high nine stops versus the Gamecocks. Fellow junior Akeem Dent returned from an injury versus USC to tally seven tackles. Geno Atkins anchors Georgia's defensive tackles with 20 consecutive starts.

Ryan Mallett was 17-of-22 for 309 yards with one touchdown in his Arkansas opener. Mallett's passing totals rank as the following for a single game: Comp. pct. (.773, T4), Yards (309, 12th). His 309 passing yards were the second-highest for a Razorback quarterback ever in a season opener. Michael Smith opened the season with four carries for 43 yards and a touchdown. He now rushed for 1,655 yards and 15 career touchdowns. Against Missouri State, Jarius Wright had six catches for 139 yards, both career highs. His receiving total of 139 yards was more than Missouri State's team total of 123.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Bulldog sophomore Blair Walsh drilled a career-long 53-yard field goal versus #9 OSU. This was the longest FG for the Bulldogs since Brandon Coutu connected on a 55 yarder against UAB in 2006. Drew Butler is averaging an SEC-leading 54.1 yards on seven punts. His 57.0 average against #9 OSU is the second-best average for a game since 1958 (Bobby Walden, 63.0). Sophomore defensive back Brandon Boykin set a school record against USC by returning a kickoff 100 yards for a TD.

Dennis Johnson returned the season opening kickoff 91-yards for a touchdown. Johnson's return for a touchdown was the second in his career. Johnson returned two kickoffs for 115 yards against Missouri State to bring his career total to 1,020 yards, which ranks as the fourth highest total in school history. Arkansas hired John L. Smith in January to coordinate the special teams. Smith was most recently the head coach at Michigan State from 2003-06.

Bill Stewart is in his second season at West Virginia with a record of 12-4 (.750) and in his fourth season overall with a record of 20-29 (.690). Jeff Mullen serves as the Mountaineers' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Jeff Casteel.

Gene Chizik is in his first season at Auburn and third overall with a record of 7-19 (.269). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN WEST VIRGINIA HAS THE BALL

West Virginia quarterback Jarrett Brown has been named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week following his standout performance in WVU's 35-20 win over East Carolina last Saturday. He completed 24 of 31 passes for 334 and four touchdowns. Brown also ran the ball 10 times for 73 yards to aid the Mountaineers on the ground. Brown's 407 yards of total offense make him just the fourth Mountaineer to amass 400 yards in one game. He accounted for nearly 80 percent of WVU's 509 total yards. Noel Devine is averaging nearly 100 yards per game and over five yards per rush. Jock Sanders, a second-team All-Big East honoree a year ago, has 17 receptions this season, which is tied for third most nationally.

Antonio Coleman is off to a strong start to the season. In the opener, he collected seven tackles, including a sack and 2.5 tackles for losses. His sack gave him 15.5 for his career, moving him into a tie for 10th in school history for career sacks with Stanley McClover (2004-05). Last Saturday against Mississippi State, he recorded his first career interception, returning it 20 yards for his second career defensive touchdown. Junior safety Zac Etheridge has tied for the team lead with eight tackles in each of Auburn's first two games, and has now led or shared the team lead in tackles in five of Auburn's last six games.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Najee Goode played the entire second half last week with starting linebacker Reed Williams out with a sprained foot. Goode had a pair of tackles and a pass breakup. Ovid Goulbourne also had his most productive day as a Mountaineer with five tackles, two sacks and a pair of tackles for losses. Goulbourne was personally responsible for 28 of East Carolina's 56 yards in negative yardage plays. Brandon Hogan also played well with a team-high 11 tackles to go with two pass breakups.

Auburn is the only team in the nation to have two backs averaging at least 100 yards rushing per game, and the two backs rank 1-2 in the SEC and are both ranked in the top 10 in the nation. Senior Ben Tate leads the SEC and ranks seventh nationally, averaging 137.0 yards per game, while freshman Onterio McCalebb is second in the league and ninth in the country, averaging 131.0 yards per game. Senior quarterback Chris Todd is off to a solid start to this season. Todd has completed 27 of his 49 pass attempts for 441 yards, averaging 16.3 yards per completion.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Mark Rodgers is averaging over 25 yards per kickoff return. The speedy Devine is also a danger in the return game. Tyler Bitancurt is a perfect 4-4 on field goals so far this season. Scott Kozlowski is averaging 48 yards per punt, including a long of 63.

Junior Wes Byrum has led Auburn in scoring in each of the past two seasons, converting 28-of-42 field goal attempts during his career for 141 career points. Senior punter Clinton Durst was fifth in the SEC and 26th in the NCAA last season averaging 42.1 yards per punt, while junior Ryan Shoemaker averaged 42.4 yards per kick as a freshman in 2006, ranking 16th nationally.
