FEW SECONDS ON THE SEC SEC FOOTBALL RELEASE HIGHLIGHTS

• SEC Football Players of the Week for games of Oct. 3: LSU RB Charles Scott (offense), Alabama LB Rolando McClain (defense), Auburn PK Wes Byrum (special teams), Ole Miss T John Jerry (offensive lineman), Arkansas DE Tenarius Wright (defensive lineman) and Auburn RS/RB Oterio McCalebb (freshman).

• #1-ranked Florida will visit #4 LSU on Saturday. The 8 p.m. ET kickoff on CBS Sports will feature for the 16th time in SEC history a matchup of top five conference teams. The last time it happened was in last year's SEC Championship Game when #2 Florida defeated #1 Alabama, 31-20.

• The SEC continues to lead the nation in non-conference winning percentage. The SEC is 26-3 this week, an 89.7 winning percentage.

• Since 1992, the SEC has had three-or-more teams ranked in the AP Top 10 in 40.8 percent of the polls (120 weeks of 294 weeks). It includes 21 weeks with four-or-more teams and one with five teams in the AP Top 10.

• Based on the latest SEC team two-deeps, Ole Miss is the most experienced team in the SEC while South Carolina is the youngest team. Ole Miss has the most seniors (20), Auburn the most juniors (21), Georgia the most sophomores (19) and South Carolina (17) the most freshmen on SEC two deeps.

SEC FOOTBALL ON TELEVISION

CBS SPORTS

CBS Sports and the SEC announced a history 15-year contract extension to broadcast its football and basketball games. In the new agreement, beginning with the 2009-10 season, CBS Sports continues to be the exclusive national network broadcaster of SEC home football games, including the SEC Championship Game. CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball.

In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this comprehensive long-team deal includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced high-light rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSsports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN has acquired rights to every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package) and will serve as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference.

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks will increase coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network, which launched in March 2005, will present a package of SEC football for the first time, with a Saturday game-of-the-week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually).

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, becomes the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature a game-of-the-week package (generally at 12:30 p.m. ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT will produce and distribute a studio show.

Also: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts will be offered on ESPN360.com. Live games will be simulcast on mobile phones. The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations on ESPN International. ESPN has acquired domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on ESPN Deportes (24-hour, U.S.-based network). ESPN GamePlan, ESPN's college football pay-per-view service, will offer SEC action. ESPN Classic may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations. Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online ESPN.com.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

On May 21, 2009, Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, announced it has reached a five-year agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement will begin with the 2009-10 academic year. Events and times will be announced as determined.

FOX SPORTS NET

FOX Sports Net (FSN), the nation's leader in local sports, today announced a new multi-year television rights agreement with ESPN that expands its long-time partnership with the Southeastern Conference (SEC).

Beginning with the 2009-10 academic year, FSN's three regional sports networks serving the SEC territory – FOX Sports South, Sun Sports and FOX Sports Southwest – will be the outlets for a minimum of 91 SEC athletic events each year. Events will include seven live, exclusive football games, 20 men's basketball games, 24 women's basketball games (16 regular season, eight tournament), 16 baseball games (10 regular season, six tournament) and 24 additional Olympic sporting events (softball, volleyball, soccer, gymnastics). FSN will distribute these events to more than 24 million cable and satellite households across the SEC coverage area.

SEC FOOTBALL SHOWS ON TELEVISION

SEC Weekly on ESPNU

SEC Weekly, a one-hour program will air Thursdays at 4:30 p.m. on ESPNU, throughout the academic year and will cover SEC sports, including sport-by-sport previews, reviews, specials and features on student-athletes. The show will be hosted by Cara Capuano, who will anchor, and new analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia All-America and NFL player. SEC Weekly is a product of ESPN's landmark 15-year agreement with the Southeastern Conference. ESPNU will complement the show with SEC game telecasts, including football, basketball, Olympic sports and select conference championships.

SEC Gridiron Live

SEC Gridiron LIVE, a 60-minute studio show offering game previews, expert analysis and a fast-paced social networking component that enables fan interaction, will air on FOX Sports South, FOX Sports Southwest and SUN Sports. The show is hosted by broadcasting veteran Charles Davis, with analysts Randy Cross and David Pollack and social media reporter Cassidy Hubbarth. The live studio show also incorporates a dynamic social networking component, providing viewers with the opportunity for lively and immediate interaction with the on-air broadcast team and SEC football fans across the country.

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal and endlines
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
 - h. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loss and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
 - i. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

This season, the SEC has had four teams in the AP Top 10 for weeks 2-3.

Since 1992, the SEC has had three-or-more teams ranked in 120 weeks, including 21 with four-or-more teams and one with five teams. In the 294 weeks of the AP poll since 1992, the SEC has had three-or-more teams in the top ten 40.8 percent of the time.

The SEC has had three of the top four teams in the AP weekly rankings for three straight weeks. The last conference to achieve that was the Big Eight in the final 1971 poll.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2009 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The Bowl Championships Series is a five-game arrangement for post-season college football that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive match-ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The five bowl games are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Citi, the Allstate Sugar Bowl and the BCS National Championship Game that is played at one of the bowl sites. The 2010 Citi BCS National Championship Game will be played in the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

Unless a Southeastern Conference champion qualifies to play in the BCS National Championship Game, it will play in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Fox Sports will televise the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl and the Allstate Sugar Bowl at the conclusion of the 2009 regular season. ESPN/ABC will televise the Rose Bowl presented by Citi and the Citi BCS National Championship Game.

In the 11 previous years of the BCS, the Southeastern Conference holds a 12-5 mark in BCS games (.706) - the most wins of any other conference and the highest winning percentage of any conference participating in more than two BCS games.

In BCS National Championship Games, the SEC is 5-0 (1.000) and has more BCS titles than any other conference. The SEC has won BCS crowns in 1998 (Tennessee), 2003 (LSU), 2006 (Florida), 2007 (LSU) and 2008 (Florida).

In the history of the BCS, an SEC team has been in the BCS standings 328 times, second only to the Big 12 with 331. The SEC and the ACC have had 11 of its 12 teams ranked in the BCS standings at some point since 1998 - more than any other conference.

Last year, #2 Florida defeated #1 Alabama, 31-20, in the 2008 SEC Championship Game in Atlanta.

2008-09 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed five national championships in the 2008-09 year, tying it with the total from the 2007-08 season.

In 10 of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up.

The SEC had national championships in football (Florida), men's swimming & diving (Auburn), women's indoor track & field (Tennessee), gymnastics (Georgia) and baseball (LSU). The SEC also had national runners-up finishes in men's golf (Arkansas), gymnastics (Alabama), softball (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Georgia) and men's indoor track & field (Florida).

In its 76 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 179 team national championships, including 63 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2008-09 MEN'S SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY; 2nd in WOMEN'S SPORTS

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in the nine men's sports it sponsors and second in the 11 women's sports the league sponsors.

The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in each sport and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish.

In the nine men's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC had 440.5 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 375 points, followed by the Big 12 with 337.5 points, ACC with 214 points, Big East 102.5 points and the Big Ten with 80 points.

In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the Pac-10 was first with 615 points followed by the SEC with 431 points, the Big 12 with 337 points, Big Ten with 318.5 points, ACC with 277.5 points and the Big East with 161.5 points.

Combining the 20 sponsored sports, the Pac-10 had 990 points followed by the SEC with 806 points, Big 12 with 674.5 points, ACC with 491.5 points, Big Ten with 398.5 points and the Big East with 264 points.

The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 15 of the last 17 seasons (exceptions: 2007-08: Big 12; 1997-98: Pac-10). The Pac-10 has had the highest women's point totals each year since 1986 with the exception of four years the SEC has had the highest total (1990-91; 1995-96; 2004-05; 2006-07).

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 41 of its student-athletes each ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team mention, the most of any Division I conference in the nation.

The Academic All-America Program is administered and voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The SEC had 15 student-athletes earn first-team mention, 14 earn second-team and 12 earn third-team mention.

The Big 12 was second with 38 total student athletes listed while the Big Ten was third at 34 and the ACC fourth at 26. The Big Ten led all conferences in first-team honorees with 18, followed by the SEC's 15.

Each SEC institution had at least one student-athlete earn first, second or third-team mention. Florida led the SEC with seven student-athletes on the lists while Tennessee had six, South Carolina and Arkansas had five each. Alabama, Florida and Tennessee each led the SEC with three on the various first-team lists.

Florida's Stacey Nelson (softball) and Tim Tebow (football) were named Academic All-Americans of the Year in their respective sports.

SEC LAUNCHES ACADEMIC NETWORK TO PROMOTE 12 MEMBER INSTITUTIONS

The 12 institutions of the Southeastern Conference institutions have joined together in the launch of the SEC Academic Network, a website (www.secacademicnetwork.com) designed to promote the academic programs of SEC universities. The SEC Academic Network is being established by the SEC in partnership with ESPN and the member universities.

The Academic Network, developed using technology and coordination from ESPN Digital Media and Origin Digital, will feature content from every institution ranging from research, innovation and economic development to community partnerships, civic engagement and service.

"Our commitment to highlight the accomplishments of SEC member institution's academic programs was a key component of our new television agreements," said SEC Commissioner Mike Slive. "We are grateful to ESPN for providing the technology, expertise and tools they use in sports media to our institutions in support of academic pursuits."

Each institution has its own page on the website that includes videos categorized by topic. Alumni, fans and students worldwide will have the ability to learn more about SEC academics in one place through video features that are posted by the league institutions.

The Academic Network is a component of the SEC's 15-year television package with ESPN, which is the most comprehensive in the history of intercollegiate athletics. Also part of ESPN's commitment to SEC academic programs is the production of an annual Campus Connection telecast at each SEC institution, in which students take part in the production; telecasts of two programs annually dedicated to the academic accomplishments of SEC student-athletes; a weekly academic feature segment on ESPN's SEC show; and selection of one undergraduate student from every SEC institution to participate in ESPN's summer internship program.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

- The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:

"Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

THE COACHES

Rich Ellerson is in his first season at Army and in his 10th season overall with a record of 62-44 (.585). Ian Shields serves as the offensive coordinator for the Black Knights and the defensive coordinators are Payam Saadat and Chris Smeland.

Bobby Johnson is in his eighth season at Vanderbilt with a record of 29-60 (.326) and in his 16th season overall with a record of 89-96 (.481). Ted Cain serves as the offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Jaime Bryant.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

The Commodores' top two rushers through five games are a pair of true freshmen: Warren Norman (336 yards) and Zac Stacy (236 yards). Stacy missed the Ole Miss with a foot injury. Norman needs 87 yards to move into the team's Top Ten all-time first-year rushers. Stacy will move into the top ten with 187 more yards. As a running back, Norman had 86 rushing yards against Ole Miss, including a long of 48 yards. He amassed 241 all-purpose yards in the game, including 143 yards on five kickoff returns, and 12 yards on two receptions.

Defensively, the Black Knights are among the top 35 stop units in the nation in both total defense (30th, 299.2 yds/game) and rushing defense (34th, 110.8 yds/game). Junior DE Josh McNary has had at least 2.0 tackles for loss in each of the first five games of the season. Both of his stops against Tulane were behind the line of scrimmage. McNary leads the team with 10.5 tackles for loss, including 4.5 sacks. He ranks fifth in the nation with 2.1 tackles for loss per game. He also added a fumble recovery and a pass breakup opposite the Green Wave.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARMY HAS THE BALL

The Vanderbilt defense ranks third in the SEC in pass efficiency, fifth in first downs allowed and points allowed, and sixth in fewest total yards. The defense has allowed only eight total touchdowns — four rushing and four passing — in its first five games. Chris Marve topped double digits in tackles for the third time this season by posting 11 total stops against Ole Miss. Marve's 9.2-tackle per game total ranks second in the SEC behind Georgia's LB Rennie Curran. Broderick Stewart closed within three of the Vanderbilt quarterback sack record with his second sack of the season — and 18th of his career.

Despite the relatively low rushing output last week, the Black Knights still rank seventh in the nation at 231.0 rushing yards per contest. Freshman QB Trent Steelman is coming off a career-best rushing day. Steelman ran 20 times for 95 yards and Army's lone touchdown against Tulane. It was Steelman's fifth consecutive start, breaking the Academy record for starts by a plebe quarterback. Patrick Mealy is Army's leading rusher with 303 yards (60.6/game). Mealy has gained the most yards despite ranking fourth on the team with 36 rushing attempts. His 8.4 yards per carry is tied for the second-highest among the top 100-ranked rushers in the nation.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Norman ranks second in the SEC in all-purpose yardage (150.6 yards), seventh in kickoff return average (26.3 yards) and ninth in rushing (67.2 yards). Placekicker Ryan Fowler is 5-9 on field goals this season, 0-2 over 40 yards. Brett Upson is averaging over 40 yards per punt and has nailed eight punts over 50 yards already this season. He has also placed 12 inside the 20 yard line.

Sophomore K Alex Carlton made his collegiate debut versus Duke, handling the Black Knights' PAT and field goal duties. In his three games as the Army kicker, Carlton has made 7-of-10 field goals and all six of his extra points. Carlton made a career-high three field goals against Tulane. It was the first time an Army player made three field goals in one game since Matt Parker on Sept. 11, 1999 versus Wake Forest.

THE COACHES

Gene Chizik is in his first season at Auburn and third overall with a record of 10-19 (.345). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

Bobby Petrino is in his second season at Arkansas with a record of 7-9 (.438) and seventh overall with a record of 51-28 (.646). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Paul Petrino and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Chris Todd ranks seventh in the nation in yards per completion (15.19) and eighth nationally in passing efficiency (160.81). Senior Ben Tate, who ranks eighth in Auburn history with 2,499 career rushing yards, averages 108.0 yards rushing per game, which is second in the league and 13rd nationally. He needs just 313 more yards rushing to crack Auburn's all-time top five. Freshman Onterio McCalebb is fifth in the SEC and 43rd nationally, averaging 83.2 yards rushing per game. McCalebb also ranks third in the SEC in all-purpose yards, averaging 145.6, while Tate is fifth (136.6).

Defensive tackle Malcolm Sheppard leads the team with 5.5 tackles for loss this season. His career total (31.5) ranks 12th in school history. Sheppard has led the Razorbacks in tackles for loss each of the last two seasons. Malcolm Sheppard leads all Razorbacks in career sacks with nine. Wendel Davis finished the Texas A&M game with a team-high 11 tackles and leads the squad with 30 on the season. Davis has led the team in tackles in three of four games this season. Jerry Franklin returned a fumble 85 yards in the second quarter of the Texas A&M game. It was his first fumble recovery of the season and third of his career and the first touchdown of his career.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Josh Byrnes and Craig Stevens share the team lead with 43 tackles each, ranking tied for sixth in the SEC. Both players have also recorded interceptions, while Stevens leads the team with 5.0 tackles for loss and Byrnes recorded a safety against Ball State. Antonio Coleman, a first-team preseason All-SEC selection, is off to a strong start to the season. He has 19 tackles including 4.5 tackles for loss, 2.5 sacks, an interception which he returned for a touchdown against Mississippi State and a fumble recovery. Coleman ranks tied for sixth in school history with 17.0 career sacks, and this season, he is tied for eighth in the league in tackles for loss and tied for 10th with 2.5 sacks.

Through four games, Ryan Mallett has thrown for 1,148 yards and 11 touchdowns. In just 16 quarters, Mallett has thrown for as many or more touchdowns than the Razorbacks did all season 35 times (records dating back to 1947). Mallett is tied for eighth nationally with 11 passing touchdowns this season. Joe Adams made Arkansas' first reception of the game against Texas A&M, on a 67-yard pass. Adams finished the game with three catches for 110 yards, his first 100-yard receiving game of his career. Greg Childs leads the team with three touchdown receptions this season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Wes Byrum earned SEC Special Teams Player of the Week after he set a career-high with four field goals made against the Vols. Byrum also chipped in a pair of extra-points to account for 14 of Auburn's 26 points in the game. Byrum hit 4-of-5 attempts, missing only from 46 yards. The miss was Byrum's first of the year, after connecting on eight straight field goals to begin the season. Byrum is 10-of-11 on field goal attempts this season. Byrum's 22-yard field goal with 39 seconds remaining sealed the victory for the Tigers, giving them a 26-16 lead before Tennessee's touchdown as time expired accounted for the final 26-22 margin.

Alex Tejada has been nearly perfect this year. On the season, he is 6-of-6 on field goals and 17-of-18 on extra points. Against Texas A&M, Dennis Johnson returned three kickoffs for 69 yards to bring his career total to 1,233 yards, which moved him into third all-time in school history. Joe Adams also had two kickoff returns against the Aggies for 41 yards.

THE COACHES

Mark Richt is in his ninth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 85-24 (.780). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and the defensive coordinators are Willie Martinez and John Jancek.

Lane Kiffin is in his first season at Tennessee and in his third season overall with a record of 7-18 (.280). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and Monte Kiffin serves as the defensive coordinator.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

A.J. Green is currently leading the SEC in total receiving yards (527), receiving yards per game (105.4) and rec. per game (6.0). His 527 yards ranks 11th in the nation. Green has had at least one TD in all of his last three games and is tied for the league lead with five TD receptions this season. Joe Cox led the Bulldogs on an 18-play, 60-yard TD drive that lasted 7:52 versus #4 LSU. This was the most plays during a TD scoring drive for the Bulldogs since they ran 19 plays covering 87 yards against Tennessee (1988).

While Eric Berry is still the NCAA active career leader in interceptions with 13, he is also first on the team and third in the SEC in tackles with 45, an average of nine per game. He tied his career high with 14 stops vs. Auburn, and has posted three double-digit tackle games this season and seven in his career. Rico McCoy posted a game-high and career-high 16 tackles vs. Auburn. McCoy is currently second on the team with 44 tackles, including two for lost yardage. Chris Walker has emerged as the star of DL, posting two sacks at Florida to give him four on the season. In the Ohio game, Walker registered his first career interception return for touchdown.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Junior WLB Rennie Curran leads the SEC with 55 tackles in five games. He is the top returning tackler in the SEC after recording 115 stops in 2008. Curran set a new career high with 16 tackles versus #4 LSU. The Bulldog defensive line features three senior veterans as Jeff Owens returns from a 2008 injury to rejoin Geno Atkins and Kade Weston. Owens registered a career-high seven tackles and Weston set a new personal best with five tackles, including a sack, against #4 LSU. Brandon Boykin had his second career interception and the team's third of the year to go along with four solo stops versus #4 LSU.

In four starts during the 2009 season, Montario Hardesty has produced rushing efforts of 160, 89, 96, 140 and 90 yards and scored five rushing touchdowns, one in each game. He is averaging 115.0 yards per game and 5.5 yards per carry. He currently ranks eighth in the nation and atop the SEC in rushing yards per game. He is on pace for 1,380 rushing yards in 2009. Hardesty has reeled off 21 runs of 10 yards or more, including four 20-plus yard treks and a career-long 43-yard touchdown run. Gerald Jones made his case to be the Vols' No. 1 receiver vs. Auburn, posting career highs in receptions with seven and receiving yards with 75

SPECIAL TEAMS

With the graduation of Brian Mimbs, redshirt sophomore Drew Butler took over the punting duties and has done a stellar job. Butler is averaging an NCAA-leading 49.8 yards on 23 punts. Bulldog sophomore Blair Walsh connected on a 37-yard FG to beat ASU as time expired. This was the first game-winning FG for the Bulldogs since Brandon Coutu drilled one from the same distance to beat Vanderbilt in 2007. Boykin set a school record against USC by returning a kickoff 100 yards for a TD. This was the longest scoring play for Georgia in Sanford Stadium history.

After not having to punt in the season opener, Chad Cunningham has kicked 19 times for a 41.2-yard average. He kicked three times for a 49.5-yard average vs. UCLA, which was the best single game average of his career. He also connected on a 57-yard boot vs. the Bruins, which tied a career long. After starting off the 2008 season a shaky one-of-four in field goal attempts, UT placekicker Daniel Lincoln has hit seven of nine attempts early in the 2009 campaign. He converted on a career-long field 49-yard field goal to seal Tennessee's win over Ohio and made a 26-yarder vs. Auburn. He has now made a field goal in four-straight games.

When Mark Richt took over as Georgia's head coach in 2001, the Bulldogs won four of the first five meetings against Tennessee... Kevin Sumlin is in his second season at Houston and overall with a record of 11-6 (.647). The Cougars' offensive coordinators are Dana Holgorsen and Jason Phillips, while John Skladany serves as the defensive coordinator.

Dan Mullen is in his first season at MSU and overall. The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Les Koenning and the defensive coordinator is Carl Torbush.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN HOUSTON HAS THE BALL

Case Keenum completed 51-of-76 passes for 536 yards and five touchdowns last week. His 51 completions set a new school record that bested David Klinger's total of 48 against SMU in 1990. Keenum's total of 76 pass attempts tied Klinger's record that same day. His total yardage figure of 544 is the highest total for a single game in 2009. The 536 passing yards Keenum recorded also established a new career best. The Cougars are now able to boast that they are the only team in college football with four receivers all averaging over 74 yards per game (Tyron Carrier 88.5, Charles Sims 84.8, James Cleveland 78.0, Patrick Edwards 74.5).

Senior linebacker Jamar Chaney and junior K.J. Wright are the team's leaders on defense, and their names appear atop the MSU defense statistics and among the conference leaders in total tackles. Wright has 38 tackles while Chaney has 34 stops. Junior defensive lineman Pernel McPhee had a stellar game against Georgia Tech and now ranks among the conference leaders in tackles for loss. McPhee recorded 11 total tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss, one sack and a forced fumble against the Jackets.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Marcus McGraw posted a career-high 19 tackles, including seven solo stops, against Texas Tech on Sept. 26. He enters the Mississippi State game tied for third in the nation with 11.75 tackles per game. So far after four games in 2009, C.J. Cavness has posted 39 tackles, including 14 stops against Texas Tech on Sept 26 and nine against UTEP on Oct. 3. Jamal Robinson enters the Mississippi State game with 11 total tackles and three pass breakups.

Mississippi State's offense has not punted in its last 13 possessions and has only punted five times in its last 29 possessions. MSU has gained 1025 yards (205.0 ypg) on the ground and ranks 22nd nationally and fourth in the SEC in rushing yardage per game. Anthony Dixon has racked up 427 yards in four games this season, good for an average of 106.8 yards per game - 15th highest in the nation and third in the SEC. Dixon has already entered the SEC record book as he is ninth all-time with 739 career rushing attempts and tied for 17th with 33 rushing touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

After two-plus seasons Chase Turner's career punting average is 43.6 ypp...a UH record. Because he has averaged fewer than 3.6 punts per game during his career, he is not listed among the NCAA active career leaders. However, his current career average of 43.60 yards per kick would lead all active punters this season. Jordan Mannisto enters the Mississippi State game leading UH in scoring with 37 total points. He has made 19-20 extra-point attempts and has nailed 6-of-9 field goals.

Junior Leon Berry had been close to breaking a kickoff return for score, entering last weekend with a 23.3 average. Against Georgia Tech, Berry broke loose on the second kickoff of the day and returned it 89 yards for a score. It was Mississippi State's first kickoff return for touchdown since Fred Reid returned one against Memphis in 2003, a stretch of 69 games and 281 kickoff returns. Berry returned the opening kickoff versus Vanderbilt for a touchdown, but it was called back due to a blocking penalty.

Rich Brooks is in his seventh season at Kentucky with a record of 34-43 (.442) and 19th overall with a record of 125-152-4 (.452). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and Steve Brown serves as the defensive coordinator.

Steve Spurrier is in his fifth season at South Carolina with a record of 32-23 (.582) and in his 25th season overall with a record of 221-104-2 (.679). Spurrier serves as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Lorenzo Ward.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

WR Randall Cobb also is a proven all-purpose threat for the Wildcats this season. The sophomore ranks in the SEC's top 10 in receptions per game (2nd - 5.2), punt return average (2nd - 10.8), receiving yards per game (8th - 62.0) and scoring (T-6th - 6.0 ppg). Kentucky has a 8-5 (.615) record with junior Mike Hartline as the starting quarterback. Hartline has completed 60.2 percent of his passes for 653 yards and five touchdowns. His 45-yard touchdown strike to Cobb against Alabama was a season-long.

Eric Norwood, with six sacks this season, leads the SEC in that category and is tied for seventh in the NCAA. He leads the league and is tied for 38th in the nation with 6.5 total tackles for loss. Norwood is the NCAA's active leader in career sacks and is second in career tackles for loss. Through five games, Devin Taylor has 16 tackles, including a sack and 4.5 for loss. Cliff Matthews' 4.0 sacks this season has already surpassed his career total coming into the season and is second in the SEC behind Norwood.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Trevarid Lindley currently has 10 interceptions and 38 pass breakups during his Wildcat career. Seven of his 10 interceptions have been key plays in Kentucky victories, with the eighth pick helping send a game into overtime. The Wildcats linebackers are paced by senior Micah Johnson, who leads the team in tackles with 35 stops. Sam Maxwell ranks tied for fourth in the SEC with teammate Trevarid Lindley in passes defended (1.25 per game).

Stephen Garcia ranks sixth in the SEC in total offense. Garcia has accounted for an average of 217.6 yards per game. He is also fifth in the league in passing average yards per game at 207.0. Senior Moe Brown put together the second 100-yard game of his career against South Carolina State, amassing exactly 100 yards on six catches while scoring twice in the win over the Bulldogs. Brian Maddox is tied for sixth in the SEC with five touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

RB Derrick Locke leads the SEC and ranks 10th in the nation in all-purpose yards. He averages 173.0 all-purpose yards per game. He also ranks second in the league and 11th nationally in kickoff returns with an average of 33.9. Lones Seiber became UK's all-time leading scorer with 254 career points after kicking a pair of career-long 49-yard field goals and adding two PATs vs. Alabama.

Despite a shaky start at NC State, Spencer Lanning jumped into the field goal kicking role in a huge way, connecting on 5-of-5 field goal attempts at Georgia to tie a 19-year-old school record held by Collin Mackie. He has run his streak to 10 straight field goals made, as he hit his only attempt vs. Florida Atlantic, connected on all three attempts vs. Ole Miss, then made his only attempt vs. South Carolina State. He is tied for the league lead with his 10 field goals and is tied for sixth in the nation.

The teams first met in 1937 - a 27-7 Kentucky win ... The teams only played three times (1937, 1978 and 1981) before South Carolina joined the SEC in 1992 ... Since '92, the teams have faced each other annually ... The Gamecocks defeated the Cats 24-17 in Lexington last season ... Five of the last seven meetings with the Gamecocks have been determined by seven points or less ... Kentucky is 0-2 against South Carolina when the Gamecocks have been ranked.

THE COACHES

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 24-8 (.750) and 16th overall with a record of 130-67-1 (.659). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

Houston Nutt is in his second season at Ole Miss with a record of 12-5 (.706) and 17th overall with a record of 123-75 (.621). The Rebels' offensive coordinator is Kent Austin and the defensive coordinator is Tyrone Nix.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

The balanced Crimson Tide attack ranks top-four in the SEC in total offense, rushing offense and passing offense. Sophomore RB Mark Ingram is averaging 97.4 yards per game with six TDs, while freshman RB Trent Richardson is adding 60.8 ypg with four scores. With three additional scoring catches, Ingram is the SEC leader in total TDs. Junior QB Greg McElroy is the sixth-most efficient passer in the NCAA, completing 65.6 percent of his passes and averaging 217.2 ypg with nine TDs and one interception.

Junior DE Kentrell Lockett has been credited with at least one TFL in each game and leads the team with 4.5. Lockett also boasts team highs of 3.0 sacks and five QB pressures. Senior CB Cassius Vaughn is the SEC leader in passes defended at 1.50 per game. Vaughn has recorded five pass break-ups and his third career interception and has registered two picks in the last five games, dating back to last season. Johnny Brown tops the team and ranks 11th in the SEC in tackles at 7.2 per game. He is also tied for fourth in the conference in passes defended at 1.25 per game (4 PB, 1 INT).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Alabama tops the conference in rushing defense and is second in total defense. Junior LB Rolando McClain boasts a team-high 35 tackles and is one of four players with at least four TFLs. Senior CB Javier Arenas boasts 26 stops and 3.0 sacks, in addition to leading the SEC in punt returns at 19.0 ypr. Defensive end Marcell Dareus has led the way for the Tide with 3.5 sacks (-25) to rank tied for 54th in the NCAA and sixth in the SEC. UA ranks tied for 11th nationally in sacks with 3.00 per game. The Tide is also 19th nationally in tackles for loss, averaging 7.40 per game. Alabama is ranked 10th nationally in pass defense.

QB Jevan Snead has completed at least one TD pass in 13 consecutive games. Snead has passed for multiple TD passes in eight of the last nine games, including three against Vanderbilt Saturday. Senior WR Shay Hodge notched his second career 100-yard receiving game and first of the year at Vanderbilt with a career-high eight receptions for season-high 122 yards and two TDs, which tied his career high. Hodge's team-high three scoring grabs this year move him alone into second on the Ole Miss all-time TD receptions list with 17. Dexter McCluster led the team in rushing against South Carolina for the first time this year with season highs of 15 carries for 85 yards. Brandon Bolden has led the team in rushing in three of the four games this year.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Arenas is quickly sneaking up on the all-time great punt returners in college football history. He has already broken all of the Crimson Tide punt return records, and now has his sights set on the SEC and NCAA records as well. He is the NCAA active leader in career punt returns, yards, touchdowns, returns per game and yards per game. After returning four punts for 59 yards against Arkansas, Arenas is just 152 punt return yards away from breaking Lee Nalley's long-standing SEC record of 1,695 (102 returns for a 14.4 ypr average).

Senior K Joshua Shene's streak of 88 straight PATs which stands as the second-longest in school history, came to an end at Vanderbilt as his third extra point attempt of the game was blocked. It marked Shene's only missed kick of the year (3-for-3 FGs, 14-for-15 PATs). Ole Miss ranks third in the SEC in kickoff coverage with a net of 45.3-yard average per kick. Senior Marshay Green ranks third in the SEC in PR average at 9.5 ypr ... Green had a season-long 36-yard punt return at South Carolina.

Record: UA, 45-9-2 • **Last:** Alabama, 24-20 (2008 at Tuscaloosa)

This meeting will be the 57th all-time between Ole Miss and Alabama dating back to 1894... The Crimson Tide holds a 45-9-2 advantage in the series, including a 46-8-2 lead on-the-field... Urban Meyer is in his fifth season at Florida with a record of 48-9 (.842) and in his ninth season overall with a record of 87-17 (.837). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Strong.

Les Miles is in his fifth season at LSU with a record of 47-11 (.810) and ninth overall with a record of 75-32 (.701). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Tim Tebow has rushed for five touchdowns this season, bringing him to 48 for his career, good for second on the all-time SEC list and just one shy of Herschel Walker. Tebow's career rating of 173.5 currently ranks No. 1 in SEC history (min. 300 completions). Florida's Danny Wuerffel ranks second at 163.6. Tebow's status for the LSU game is unknown after suffering a concussion versus Kentucky. Jeff Demps leads the Gators with four rushing touchdowns, while Chris Rainey tops the team with 225 rushing yards. Florida is led by Riley Cooper and Aaron Hernandez with 15 receptions and two touchdowns each. Cooper has tallied 242 yards and Hernandez 198.

LSU CB Patrick Peterson became the second Tiger to return an interception for a touchdown this year when he picked off a pass and returned it 37 yards for a first quarter score against Mississippi State. You don't have to look any further than brothers Chad Jones and Rahim Alem (formerly Al Jones) to see who's been the key to LSU's success on defense this year. Alem is the unquestioned leader of the Tiger defensive front, while Jones is the quarterback in the secondary for the Tigers. Alem, a defensive end, leads the Tigers in both tackles for losses (4.5-19 yards) and sacks (2-12 yards), while Jones, the free safety, is first on the squad in interceptions (2) and he's fifth in total tackles (23). LB Harry Coleman leads the Tiger defense with 34 tackles.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Carlos Dunlap has recorded two sacks, three tackles for loss, two pass breakups and eight tackles (four solo) on the season. Brandon Spikes led the team in tackles at Kentucky with 10, his best output of 2009. Ryan Stamper led the team in tackles against Troy and Tennessee. After posting five against Troy, Stamper racked up a career-high 12 tackles (three for loss) vs. Tennessee to go along with a sack and forced fumble. Ahmad Black racked up a career-high 11 tackles vs. Tennessee. He leads the team with 22 total tackles. UF grabbed two picks each against Tennessee and Kentucky.

Through five games, LSU is averaging 27.0 points per game and 321.6 total yards - 135.4 rushing, 186.2 passing. QB Jordan Jefferson has connected on 80 of 128 passes for 920 yards, seven touchdowns and just two interceptions. Jefferson is 6-1 as a starter. RB Charles Scott leads the Tigers rushing attack with 274 yards and a pair of TDs. Terrance Toliver leads the Tigers in receiving with 23 catches for 324 yards and two scores, while Brandon LaFell has 23 receptions for 282 yards and five TDs.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Caleb Sturgis, who had never attempted a field goal in his college career, was perfect on three attempts against Tennessee on Sept. 19. He followed that up by drilling two field goals at Kentucky, his first career attempts on the road. Chas Henry has punted five times for a 38.0 average. None of his punts have been returned, and he has placed two inside the 20. Brandon James, with four career punt return touchdowns, recorded his first kickoff return for a touchdown in the season opener against Charleston Southern.

Jones' 93-yard punt return for a touchdown early in the fourth quarter against Mississippi State ranks as the second-longest punt return in school history. Eddie Kennison holds the school record with a 100-yard return against Mississippi State in Tiger Stadium in 1994. By returning a punt for a TD, LSU now has two punt returners on its roster - Jones and Trindon Holliday - who have returned at least one punt for a touchdown during their career.
