CBS SPORTS

CBS Sports and the SEC announced a history 15-year contract extension to broadcast its football and basketball games. In the new agreement, beginning with the 2009-10 season, CBS Sports continues to be the exclusive national network broadcaster of SEC home football games, including the SEC Championship Game. CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball.

In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this comprehensive long-team deal includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSSports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN has acquired rights to every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package) and will serve as the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rightsholder for the conference.

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks will increase coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network, which launched in March 2005, will present a package of SEC football for the first time, with a Saturday game-of-the-week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually).

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, becomes the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature a game-of-the-week package (generally at 12:30 p.m. ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT will produce and distribute a studio show.

Also: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts will be offered on ESPN360.com. Live games will be simulcast on mobile phones. The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations on ESPN International. ESPN has acquired domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on ESPN Deportes (24-hour, U.S.-based network). **ESPN GamePlan, ESPN's** college football pay-per-view service, will offer SEC action. **ESPN Classic** may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations. Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online ESPN.com.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

On May 21, 2009, Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, announced it has reached a five-year agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement will begin with the 2009-10 academic year. Events and times will be announced as determined.

FOX SPORTS NET

FOX Sports Net (FSN), the nation's leader in local sports, today announced a new multi-year television rights agreement with ESPN that expands its long-time partnership with the Southeastern Conference (SEC).

Beginning with the 2009-10 academic year, FSN's three regional sports networks serving the SEC territory - FOX Sports South, Sun Sports and FOX Sports Southwest - will be the outlets for a minimum of 91 SEC athletic events each year. Events will include seven live, exclusive football games, 20 men's basketball games, 24 women's basketball games (16 regular season, eight tournament), 16 baseball games (10 regular season, six tournament) and 24 additional Olympic sporting events (softball, volleyball, soccer, gymnastics). FSN will distribute these events to more than 24 million cable and satellite households across the SEC coverage area.

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

A new rule expands the ability of a head coach to challenge a reviewable play on the field. The head coach now retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game (CBS Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, Lincoln Financial) or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal and endlines
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player
 - d. Quarterback (Passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, play is finalized)
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
 - h. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loose and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
 - i. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Other Detectable Infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with overturned plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with a DVSPORT Digital Replay System. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official is selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live video feed is sent directly to the replay booth. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while capturing/digitizing it into the DVSPORT Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play as well as any replays as they occur in real time.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Communicator. As the Technician marks the incoming video, each view (by mark) will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Communicator can touch/click on a thumbnail and immediately send that play/replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a remote device controlled by the Replay Official. All replays/video are viewed on an output monitor. The touch screen is only used to select the replays.

While most plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the Digital Replay System developed by DVSPORT of Pittsburgh, Pa. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from DVSPORT.

This season, the SEC is the home for the Heisman Trophy (Mark Ingram, Alabama) and the "Academic Heisman" (Tim Tebow, Florida). The "Academic Heisman" is the moniker given to the William V. Campbell Trophy, awarded by the National Football Foundation as the nation's top football scholar-athlete.

The last time a conference secured both awards was 1996, when Florida's Danny Wuerffel took both honors for the SEC. Since 1990, a conference has taken both honors six times (SEC twice). The list of those include:

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2009 season. The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One (2nd), will then make its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The Outback, Chick-fil-A and AT&T Cotton Bowls will work with the conference office to determine picks 3-5. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference. The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the selection of preference following the Cotton and Outback Bowls.

In selections 6-7, the AutoZone Liberty and Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowls will make their selections, not in any specific order, but in consultation with the SEC Office. The Bowls will rank available qualified teams in order of preference. If there are no similarities in the order of selection, the bowls will be granted its selection. If the bowls rank the same teams in preference, the team involved in the process would get its preference of which bowl to participate.

The PetroSun Independence Bowl will receive the eighth selection and the Papajohns.com Bowl will have the ninth pick of available SEC teams.

BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The Bowl Championships Series is a five-game arrangement for post-season college football that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive match-ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The five bowl games are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Citi, the Allstate Sugar Bowl and the BCS National Championship Game that is played at one of the bowl sites. The 2010 Citi BCS National Championship Game will be played in the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

Unless a Southeastern Conference champion qualifies to play in the BCS National Championship Game, it will play in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Fox Sports will televise the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl and the Allstate Sugar Bowl at the conclusion of the 2009 regular season. ESPN/ABC will televise the Rose Bowl presented by Citi and the Citi BCS National Championship Game.

In the 11 previous years of the BCS, the Southeastern Conference holds a 12-5 mark in BCS games (.706) - the most wins of any other conference and the highest winning percentage of any conference participating in more than two BCS games.

In BCS National Championship Games, the SEC is 5-0 (1.000) and has more BCS titles than any other conference. The SEC has won BCS crowns in 1998 (Tennessee), 2003 (LSU), 2006 (Florida), 2007 (LSU) and 2008 (Florida).

In the history of the BCS, an SEC team has been in the BCS standings 328 times, second only to the Big 12 with 331. The SEC and the ACC have had 11 of its 12 teams ranked in the BCS standings at some point since 1998 - more than any other conference.

SEC LEADS NATION IN DEFENSE

Southeastern Conference defenses are leading the nation when it comes to limiting yards per play. In 146 games this season, SEC teams are giving up an average of 4.97 yards per play, which is the lowest of any NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision conference.

The SEC leads the NCAA FBS conferences in passing yards allowed per play (6.38) and is fourth in rushing yards allowed per play (3.85).

In this week's 2009 season statistics, the SEC has seven of the top 60 teams in the nation in rushing defense, 10 of the top 35 teams in passing defense, nine of the top 35 in pass efficiency defense, seven of the top 30 teams in total defense and eight of the top 50 teams in scoring defense.

SEC BOWL NOTES

- The Alabama-Texas BCS National Championship Game matchup is the first to pair undefeated and untied teams in a bowl game since the 2006 Rose Bowl (Texas vs. Southern California). It is the 20th time in history that two undefeated and untied teams have been matched up in a bowl game. In the BCS era, it is the fifth time. Between 1957 and 1996, there were seven meetings of undefeated and untied teams in bowl games.
- The Alabama-Texas BCS National Championship Game matchup is the ninth time in the BCS era that the AP #1 and #2 teams have been matched up in a bowl game. Prior to the BCS, the AP #1 and #2 teams were matched up in bowl games 11 times since the creation of the AP poll in 1936.
- The SEC has the most wins (12) and the highest winning percentage (.706) of any conference that has three-or-more appearances in BCS bowl games. The SEC is 12-5 in BCS games, including a 5-0 mark in BCS National Championship Games.
- Every SEC team has appeared in a bowl game at least once during the last three seasons. Every SEC team has won at least one bowl game since 2003, and 11 have won bowl games since 2006.
- Only 11 teams in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision have won bowl games each of the last three years. The list includes three SEC teams: LSU (4 straight seasons with bowl wins), Kentucky (3) and Georgia (3). Utah leads the nation with six straight seasons with bowl victories.

BCS NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Since the inception of the BCS in 1998, the SEC leads all conferences with five national champions. Tennessee won the BCS' first national title in 1998, LSU won the crown in 2003, Florida's claimed the national championship in 2006 and 2008 while LSU took the title in 2007. The Big 12 has two BCS national titles followed by the ACC, Big Ten, Pac-10 and Big East with one each.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS SINCE 1992

Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC has the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with seven. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (4). Here is a breakdown:

TOP 25 FINISHES

Since 2000, the Southeastern Conference has had more teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Poll than any other conference. The SEC has had 43 teams ranked in the last nine final USA Today Coaches polls, an average of almost five per season. The Big 12 is second with 36 teams ranked since 2000. The SEC has led or tied for lead in most teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Polls in seven of the last nine seasons.

SEC LEADS NATION IN ATTENDANCE IN 2009

For the 29th straight season, the SEC recorded the largest total attendance figure of any conference in the nation. In 2009, a total of 6,560,738 fans attended 86 games, an average of 76,288 per contest, also tops in the nation. SEC stadiums were filled to 98.10 percent of capacity for each home game in 2009. The SEC had seven of the top 15 schools in total attendance in 2009 - Tennessee (3), Auburn (6), LSU (6), Alabama (7), Florida (8), Georgia (13) and South Carolina (15).

Since 2000, the SEC has more bowl appearances (71) and bowl wins (36) than any other conference. (See Non-Conference Records Since 2000 chart on this page).

SEC / NFL SNAPSHOT

- Three SEC schools were among the top 10 in most players on 2009 opening weekend rosters. LSU and Miami (Fla.) led the nation with 41 each, while Georgia was sixth with 35 and Tennessee seventh with 30.
- Among position groups, LSU has the most centers (3) and tied for most guards (5) and running backs (4). Auburn is tied for most running backs (4) and Georgia has the most defensive ends (8).
- The SEC had the most selections in the 2009 National Football League player draft. The SEC had 37 of its players selected followed by the ACC with 33, the Pac-10 with 32, Big 12 and the Big Ten with 28 each and the Big East with 27. The Mountain West Conference had 16 players selected while the Western Athletic Conference and Conference USA had 10 each.
- The SEC has now led or tied for the lead in the most selections in an NFL Draft in 10 of the last 12 years, including the last three drafts.
- Since 1990, the SEC has had 739 players selected in NFL Drafts, tops in the nation.

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

2008-09 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed five national championships in the 2008-09 year, tying it with the total from the 2007-08 season.

In 10 of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up.

The SEC had national championships in football (Florida), men's swimming & diving (Auburn), women's indoor track & field (Tennessee), gymnastics (Georgia) and baseball (LSU). The SEC also had national runners-up finishes in men's golf (Arkansas), gymnastics (Alabama), softball (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Georgia) and men's indoor track & field (Florida).

In its 76 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 179 team national championships, including 63 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2008-09 MEN'S SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY; 2nd in WOMEN'S SPORTS

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in the nine men's sports it sponsors and second in the 11 women's sports the league sponsors.

The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in each sport and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish.

In the nine men's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC had 440.5 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 375 points, followed by the Big 12 with 337.5 points, ACC with 214 points, Big East 102.5 points and the Big Ten with 80 points.

In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the Pac-10 was first with 615 points followed by the SEC with 431 points, the Big 12 with 337 points, Big Ten with 318.5 points, ACC with 277.5 points and the Big East with 161.5 points.

Combining the 20 sponsored sports, the Pac-10 had 990 points followed by the SEC with 806 points, Big 12 with 674.5 points, ACC with 491.5 points, Big Ten with 398.5 points and the Big East with 264 points.

The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 15 of the last 17 seasons (exceptions: 2007-08: Big 12; 1997-98: Pac-10). The Pac-10 has had the highest women's point totals each year since 1986 with the exception of four years the SEC has had the highest total (1990-91; 1995-96; 2004-05; 2006-07).

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 41 of its student-athletes each ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team mention, the most of any Division I conference in the nation.

The Academic All-America Program is administered and voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The SEC had 15 student-athletes earn first-team mention, 14 earn second-team and 12 earn third-team mention.

The Big 12 was second with 38 total student athletes listed while the Big Ten was third at 34 and the ACC fourth at 26. The Big Ten led all conferences in first-team honorees with 18, followed by the SEC's 15.

Each SEC institution had at least one student-athlete earn first, second or third-team mention. Florida led the SEC with seven student-athletes on the lists while Tennessee had six, South Carolina and Arkansas had five each. Alabama, Florida and Tennessee each led the SEC with three on the various first-team lists.

Florida's Stacey Nelson (softball) and Tim Tebow (football) were named Academic All-Americans of the Year in their respective sports.

SEC LAUNCHES ACADEMIC NETWORK TO PROMOTE 12 MEMBER INSTITUTIONS

The 12 institutions of the Southeastern Conference institutions have joined together in the launch of the SEC Academic Network, a website (www.secacademicnetwork.com) designed to promote the academic programs of SEC universities. The SEC Academic Network is being established by the SEC in partnership with ESPN and the member universities.

The Academic Network, developed using technology and coordination from ESPN Digital Media and Origin Digital, will feature content from every institution ranging from research, innovation and economic development to community partnerships, civic engagement and service.

"Our commitment to highlight the accomplishments of SEC member institution's academic programs was a key component of our new television agreements," said SEC Commissioner Mike Slive. "We are grateful to ESPN for providing the technology, expertise and tools they use in sports media to our institutions in support of academic pursuits."

Each institution has its own page on the website that includes videos categorized by topic. Alumni, fans and students worldwide will have the ability to learn more about SEC academics in one place through video features that are posted by the league institutions.

The Academic Network is a component of the SEC's 15-year television package with ESPN, which is the most comprehensive in the history of intercollegiate athletics. Also part of ESPN's commitment to SEC academic programs is the production of an annual Campus Connection telecast at each SEC institution, in which students take part in the production; telecasts of two programs annually dedicated to the academic accomplishments of SEC student-athletes; a weekly academic feature segment on ESPN's SEC show; and selection of one undergraduate student from every SEC institution to participate in ESPN's summer internship program.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

• The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states:

"Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

THE COACHES

Rich Brooks is in his seventh season at Kentucky with a record of 39-46 (.459) and 19th overall with a record of 130-155-4 (.457). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Randy Sanders and Steve Brown serves as the defensive coordinator.

Dabo Swinney is in his second season at Clemson and overall with a record of 12-8 (.600). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Billy Napier and the defensive coordinator is Kevin Steele.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Randall Cobb, a sophomore from Alcoa, Tenn., leads the team in pass receiving with 37 catches for 427 yards and four touchdowns. While operating at QB out of the "WildCobb" formation, he has rushed for 537 yards and 10 TDs. He ranks second in the SEC in touchdowns, third in scoring third in punt returns and third in all-purpose yardage. Derrick Locke leads the team and is sixth in the SEC in rushing with 843 yards and six touchdowns. He added 25 pass receptions for 254 yards and two scores. Morgan Newton guided the Wildcats to a 5-2 record in his starting assignments, including SEC road wins at Auburn, Vanderbilt and Georgia.

DeAndre McDaniel has eight interceptions to rank second in the nation and first in the ACC. He needs just one more to establish the Clemson single season record. He has been the leader of a Clemson team that ranks third in the nation in interceptions and 11th in pass defense. McDaniel has 87 tackles from his safety position, including two sacks. Rashard Hall ranks 13th in the nation and second in the ACC in interceptions this season with six in the 13 Tiger games. It is tied for the third most interceptions in Clemson history by a freshman.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN CLEMSON HAS THE BALL

Corey Peters, a senior from Louisville, notched 52 tackles, 11 tackles for loss, four quarterback sacks and five pass breakups in 2009. He was chosen SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week twice this season. All-SEC LB Sam Maxwell, a senior from Hartwell, Ga., will miss the bowl game due to injury. He totaled 80 tackles, including 5.5 for loss, with his biggest value coming on his game-changing plays. He ranked second in the SEC in interceptions and fifth in total passes defended, rare feats for a linebacker. Micah Johnson hit the century mark with 100 tackles, with six games in double figures, despite playing with a sprained knee for much of the season. He also had 6.5 tackles for loss.

A finalist for the Doak Walker Award, C.J. Spiller had 233 yards rushing in 20 attempts and scored a career high four touchdowns in the ACC Championship game against Georgia Tech on December 5. He now has 1145 rushing yards this year and 445 receiving yards. He has 50 career touchdowns and needs just one to become Clemson's career leader. Kyle Parker was Clemson's starting quarterback in all 13 games this year. The native of Jacksonville, FL, is tied for first in the nation in wins by freshman starting quarterbacks this year with eight, a total that is a Clemson freshman record. Parker completed 197-355 passes for 19 touchdowns and 2385 yards so far this season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Locke leads the SEC in kickoff returns with a sizzling 29.6-yard average, including a 100-yard touchdown runback vs. Louisville. Cobb averages 13.5 yards on punt returns and 26.5 yards on kickoff returns. Ryan Tydlacka averaged 40.7 yards per punt. Even more valuable was his hang time and punt placement, which allowed only 10 of his 60 punts to be returned. As a team, UK ranked fourth in the SEC in net punting.

Spiller established an NCAA record for kickoff returns for touchdowns in a career with seven. He is the only player in the nation to score a touchdown in every game this year. This year he has accounted for a touchdown five different ways, 11 rushing, four receiving, four on kickoff returns, one on a punt return and one by throwing a touchdown pass. He has 7416 all-purpose yards for his career, third best in NCAA history.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: UK, 8-4 • **Last:** Kentucky, 28-20 (2006 at Music City Bowl)

This game will mark the first time that Kentucky football teams have seen post-season action for four-straight years... UK began the string with a win against Clemson in the 2006 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl, followed by another Music City victory in 2007 over Florida State... The Wildcats capped last season with a comeback triumph over East Carolina in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl... This will be the 14th bowl appearance in school history, with the Wildcats carrying an 8-5 record in post-season play... It will be the fourth time for UK to participate in the Music City Bowl... Kentucky has a 2-1 mark in the Nashville event, with a loss to Syracuse in 1999.

THE COACHES

Mark Richt is in his ninth season at Georgia and overall with a record of 89-27 (.767). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo. Richt will work along with defensive line coach Rodney Garner, and graduate assistants Todd Hartley and Mitch Doolittle in preparing the defense for the bowl game.

Mike Sherman is in his second season at Texas A&M with a record of 10-14 (.417) and in his eighth season overall with a record of 69-57 (.548). The Aggies' offensive coordinator is Nolan Cromwell and the defensive coordinator is Joe Kines.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

Washaun Ealey is the team's leading rusher with 649 yards on 112 carries. Ealey has three touchdowns, while Caleb King has five. Joe Cox started all 12 game at quarterback, completing 170 of 303 passes for 2426 yards, 22 touchdowns and 14 interceptions. A.J. Green, who missed some games late due to injury was the team's leading receiver with 751 yards and six touchdowns.

Von Miller, playing at the hybrid "jack" position, has racked up 21 tackles for loss and a nation-leading 17 sacks and sits just three sacks shy of tying the school record. He also forced a team-high four fumbles and broke up five passes, second most on the defense. Trent Hunter started all 12 games at strong safety and led the defense in tackles (87) and solo stops (53).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TEXAS A&M HAS THE BALL

Rennie Curran is the leading tackler in the SEC with 122 on the season, including 64 solo. Justin Houston is second in the SEC with 15.5 tackles for loss, including 7.5 sacks. Reshad Jones brings 68 tackles and three interceptions to the Georgia defense. Brandon Boykin also has three picks on the season. Marcus Dowtin has six TFLs and two sacks for UGA.

Christine Michael ran for 767 yards and nine touchdowns, both team highs, in 11 games. His pair of 100-yard rushing efforts helped A&M to big wins over Texas Tech and Baylor, while setting the school record for longest play from scrimmage with a 97-yard TD run against the Bears. Jerrod Johnson has shattered numerous school records this fall in leading the Aggies to a bowl berth. The junior has thrown for a school record 28 touchdowns and became the first player in A&M history to surpass 3,000 yards through the air (3,217). Lee Grimes, who has started 11 games at right tackle, is an anchor of an offensive line who helped the Big 12's best offense to an average of over 465 yards per game during the regular season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Georgia All-American Drew Butler has been named the winner of the 2009 Ray Guy Award, which is presented annually to college football's top punter by the Greater Augusta Sports Council. Butler is leading the nation in punting with a 48.8 average on 50 punts. Butler and the Bulldogs also lead the NCAA in Net Punting at 42.8. Butler is on pace to become only the third Bulldog in school history to lead the NCAA in punting. He is also on target to break the school's single season punting average record.

Randy Bullock is 12-18 on field goals this season with a long of 50 yards. Three of his misses came from over 40 yards. As the kickoff man, Bullock has nine touchbacks on the season. Cyrus Gray leads the team in kickoff returns with a 25.5 average, including a 99 yard return for a touchdown.

The last time A&M and Georgia faced each other on the gridiron was 1980 in Athens with a Bulldog freshman running back by the name of Herschel Walker leading Georgia to a 42-0 victory... The Aggie Presidential Bowl victory in 1950 (40-20), a 14-12 A&M decision over Georgia in a game played in Dallas in 1953, and an Aggie 6-0 victory in 1954 played in Athens, which was the first A&M win for new head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant... The Bulldogs have made one previous trip to the Shreveport bowl in 1991. Lane Kiffin is in his first season at Tennessee and in his third season overall with a record of 12-20 (.375). The Volunteers' offensive coordinator is Jim Chaney and Monte Kiffin serves as the defensive coordinator.

Frank Beamer is in his 23rd season at Virginia Tech with a record of 186-92-2 (.668) and in his 29th season overall with a record of 228-115-4 (.663). The Hokies' offensive coordinator is Bryan Stinespring and the defensive coordinator is Bud Foster.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Chris Scott started all 12 games for the Vols and did not allow a sack of quarterback Jonathan Crompton in more than 700 snaps. He has started a team-high 38-straight games entering UT's Chick-fil-A Bowl showdown with Virginia Tech on Dec. 31. Montario Hardesty ranked third in the league in rushing at 108.8 yards per game and scored 12 touchdowns. His season total of 1,308 rushing yards is fifth-best total in school history and 156 yards shy of the school record held by Travis Henry.

Cody Grimm, a former walk-on from Fairfax, had 99 total tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss and seven sacks while anchoring the Hokies' defense. He earned first-team All-ACC honors last week. Barquell Rivers is second on the team with 94 tackles, including 4.5 for loss. Rashad Carmichael leads the secondary with five interceptions this season. Nekos Brown and Jason Worilds both bring 4.5 sacks into the game.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VIRGINIA TECH HAS THE BALL

Eric Berry, 2009 Jim Thorpe Award winner, enters the Chick-fil-A Bowl in his home city of Atlanta second on the Tennessee team and third among SEC defensive backs with 83 tackles. He leads the team with 18 defensive big plays, which includes seven pass breakups, six tackles for loss (for minus-15 yards), two fumble returns (for 48 yards), two interceptions (for seven yards) and a forced fumble. Dan Williams wrapped his Tennessee career with a 61-tackle season, a career high and the fourth most by an interior lineman at Tennessee since 1990. He also led the Vols in quarterback hurries with nine and tied for the team lead with 8.5 tackles for loss. Rico McCoy led the team and finished third in the conference with a career-high 112 tackles. He also led the league and ranked sixth nationally with five forced fumbles.

Ryan Williams, a redshirt freshman from Manassas, Va., leads the league in rushing yards and touchdowns. He has rushed for 1,538 yards and has scored 20 touchdowns. His current total is the eighth highest by a freshman in NCAA history. Quarterback Tyrod Taylor adds 344 yards rushing. Taylor was 126-226 passing on the year for 2,102 yards, 13 touchdowns and four interceptions. His leading receiver is Jarrett Boykin, who had 715 yards and five touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

David Oku averages 26 yards per kickoff return. Daniel Lincoln is 10-16 on field goals this season with a long of 49. He only has one miss under 40 yards and has had three blocked. Chad Cunningham averages 42 yards per punt, good enough for sixth in the SEC. He has placed 11 inside the 20 yard line.

Brent Bowden, a redshirt senior from Centerville, Va., leads the lead and is 13th nationally with an average of 43.9 yards per kick. Matt Waldron joins Grimm as former walk-ons to make the first team this year. The senior from Oakfield, N.Y., leads the conference in kick scoring and is a perfect 44-for-44 on PATs and 17-for-20 on field goals. Both VT kickers were first team All-SEC in 2009.

Gene Chizik is in his first season at Auburn and third overall with a record of 12-24 (.333). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

Pat Fitzgerald is in his fourth season at Northwestern overall with a record of 27-22 (.551). The Wildcats' offensive coordinator is Mick McCall and the defensive coordinator is Mike Hankwitz.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Running back Ben Tate ranks fourth in the SEC and 23rd nationally averaging 104.5 yards rushing per game. Tate, who was named to the All-SEC second team by the league's media, has also added 20 catches for 105 yards and five kick returns for 139 yards (27.8 yards per return). Chris Todd has thrown a school single-season record 21 touchdown passes. Darvin Adams leads the team in catches (48), receiving yards (855) and touchdown receptions (10), while Terrell Zachery has 24 grabs for 466 yards (19.4 ypc) and five touchdowns. Adams is tied for the SEC lead in TD reception with 10.

Defensive end Corey Wootton has started 48 career games and has 19.5 career sacks and 38 career tackles for loss. Sherrick McManis leads the Wildcats with four interceptions on the year in nine games played. He returned from a leg injury early in the season to record a team-best 11 passes defended, a forced fumble and 34 tackles. Brad Phillips paces Northwestern with 84 tackles on the year, forcing a team-high four fumbles and making three sacks while battling through several nagging injuries to play all 12 games.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN NORTHWESTERN HAS THE BALL

Antonio Coleman, who was named First Team All-SEC following the season by the league's media and coaches, leads the SEC with 15.5 tackles for loss and 9.0 sacks. Coleman also has 45 total tackles, an interception which he returned for a touchdown against Mississippi State, a blocked kick, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. Walter McFadden leads the team with four interceptions which is tied for fifth most in the SEC, and his 12 passes defended (four interceptions, eight pass break-ups) is tied for sixth best. Josh Byrnes leads the team and is sixth in the SEC with 94 tackles, while Craig Stevens is 11th with 89.

Northwestern ranks second in the Big Ten and 29th nationally in passing offense (266.1) behind quarterback Mike Kafka, whose 2,898 passing yards are third most in a single season in school history. Kafka has thrown 116 consecutive attempts without an interception. Zeke Markshausen has caught 79 passes, which is second in the Big Ten and tied for fourth most in a season in Northwestern history. Al Netter earned honorable mention All-Big Ten accolades from the coaches and the media. He has started every game at left tackle this year for Northwestern.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior Wes Byrum has excelled during his junior season, connecting on 14-of-15 field goals and all 49 extra point attempts. Among kickers who have attempted at least 10 field goals, Byrum's percentage of .933 ranks fifth nationally. Byrum has scored 91 points this season, which is seventh best in school history and just 11 shy of the school single-season record, and just three points shy of the most points ever scored by an Auburn kicker in a single season.

Also a consensus second-team All-Big Ten pick was junior place-kicker Stefan Demos (Scottsdale, Ariz./Horizon), who was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week three separate times in 2009. Demos has made 18-of-23 field goal attempts on the year, good for fourth-most makes in a single season and two shy of the school record. He twice hit four field goals in a game during Big Ten play and nailed last minute game winners against both Eastern Michigan and Indiana.

THE COACHES

Les Miles is in his fifth season at LSU with a record of 52-14 (.788) and ninth overall with a record of 79-35 (.693). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gary Crowton and the defensive coordinator is John Chavis.

Joe Paterno is in his 44th season at Penn State and overall with a record of 393-129-3 (.751). The Nittany Lions' offensive coordinator is Galen Hall and the defensive coordinator is Tom Bradley.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

Ciron Black has started 52 straight games at left tackle, which has tied the school record of consecutive starts set by Andrew Whitworth. With one more start in the Capital One Bowl, Black will become the school's record holder in that category. Brandon LaFell has caught 52 passes for 705 yards and 10 touchdowns. His 10 touchdown receptions are tied for fourth in the LSU single-season record books. QB Jordan Jefferson is 169-272 for 1,964 yards and 16 touchdowns this season.

The 2009 Big Ten Defensive Player and Defensive Lineman of the Year, Jared Odrick is the 80th Penn State football student-athlete to earn first team All-America recognition. He is ranked No. 8 in the conference with 6.0 sacks for minus-45 yards. Odrick is fifth on the team with 41 tackles, has 10.0 tackles for loss (minus-56 yards), with one blocked field goal, one pass break-up and three quarterback hurries. Navorro Bowman leads the team with 15.5 TFL (minus-55) despite missing 2 ¾ games with an early season injury. Bowman is No. 2 nationally among all linebackers in TFL with a 1.55 average and No. 10 nationally overall in minus-yardage hits. Sean Lee made seven tackles in the season finale to move into fourth place in school career tackles with 319, passing Brian Gelzeiser (315).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN PENN STATE HAS THE BALL

Patrick Peterson, one of the nation's elite cornerbacks, ranked third in the SEC in passes defended with 14. The sophomore registered 47 tackles and two interceptions while returning a blocked field goal 53 yards for a touchdown at Ole Miss. Chad Jones, a two-sport standout from Baton Rouge, led all LSU defensive backs in tackles with 66, including 1.5 tackles for loss. He racked up three interceptions, five pass breakups and returned a punt 93 yards for a touchdown at Mississippi State. Kelvin Sheppard leads the team with 103 tackles, including 8.5 for loss.

Daryll Clark has a 21-4 record as the starting quarterback and owns multiple Penn State season and career passing and total offense records. He leads the Big Ten in pass efficiency (145.7) and touchdown passes (23). This season, he is 214 of 346 (61.8) for a school record 2,787 yards, with a Penn State record 23 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. Evan Royster's 5.9 average on 188 carries is best in the Big Ten among rushers with at least 90 carries. Royster is No. 2 in the Big Ten in rushing (92.0 ypg) and No. 3 in all-purpose yards (108.2 ypg).

SPECIAL TEAMS

Trindon Holliday, a native of Zachary, has returned 18 punts for 319 yards and one score this season. His 87-yard punt return for a touchdown against Arkansas was the second of his career. Holliday has added 474 yards on 20 kick returns. His 1,743 yards in kick returns ranks third in LSU history.

Jeremy Boone headlines the special teams unit, averaging 43.5 yards per punt. He had 13 punts this season over 50 yards and placed 20 kicks inside the 20 yard line. Collin Wagner was 11-18 on field goals this season, with a long of 47 yards. Five of his misses came from over 40 yards. Chaz Powell is a threat on kickoff returns, claiming over 24 yards per return.

Penn State, behind Heisman Trophy winner John Cappelletti, beat the Tigers, 16-9, in the Orange Bowl following the 1973 season in the only meeting between the teams...The appearance will be LSU's third in the Capital One Bowl and the first since dropping a last-second 30-25 decision to Iowa in the 2005 game...LSU also took part in the 1979 Capital One Bowl (then called the Tangerine Bowl), beating Wake Forest, 34-10...LSU will be making its 41st appearance in a bowl game, including its 10th straight. The 41 bowl appearances rank ninth all-time, while the current 10-game bowl streak is the nation's ninth-longest streak.

THE COACHES

Urban Meyer is in his fifth season at Florida with a record of 56-10 (.848) and in his ninth season overall with a record of 95-18 (.841). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Charlie Strong.

University of Cincinnati offensive coordinator/offensive line coach Jeff Quinn will coach the Bearcats in the 76th Allstate Sugar Bowl. Quinn, in his third year at UC and 26th season in college football, was recently named one of five finalists for the 2009 Broyles Award, which is given to the nation's top assistant coach. The Bearcats' defensive coordinator is Bob Diaco.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

Tim Tebow has rushed for 13 touchdowns this season, bringing him to 56 for his career. Tebow's career rating of 168.5 currently ranks No. 1 in SEC history. Jeff Demps paces the Gator running backs with 738 yards, seven rushing touchdowns and averaging 7.7 yards per carry, which is tied for No. 2 in the nation (min. five attempts per team game). Florida's receiving corps is led by Aaron Hernandez and Riley Cooper. Hernandez has 739 yards on a team-best 59 grabs along with four touchdowns. Riley Cooper has 44 receptions for team bests of 780 yards and eight touchdowns.

Aaron Webster was third on the team with 62 tackles, including 36 solo stops. He had 2.0 tackles for a loss as well as leading the team in interceptions (4), and pass breakups (5). He also forced two fumbles on the year. Ricardo Mathews, in his first year as a full-time starter, led the Bearcats with 11.5 tackles for a loss. He also had 42 tackles, 3.5 sacks, and a pair of quarterback hurries.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN CINCINNATI HAS THE BALL

Jermaine Cunningham and Carlos Dunlap lead the team with seven sacks each, while Ryan Stamper paces the Gators with 76 tackles. Cunningham also adds 12 tackles for loss, a team high, to go with two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, six quarterback hurries and 33 total tackles (20 solo). Dunlap had 8.5 tackles for loss, six pass breakups and 35 tackles (26 solo) on the season. Joe Haden leads the way with four interceptions. Brandon Spikes is the only player in the nation to have four interception return touchdowns over the past two seasons. Spikes has been credited with 62 tackles this season.

Mardy Gilyard is a repeat All-BIG EAST First Team pick at both wide receiver and return specialist. He has 11 TDs and 1,150 receiving yards in 2009, good for second all-time on the single-season charts, behind himself (1,276/2008). He has caught a pass in 17-straight game. Tony Pike, a second-team honoree a year ago, was 184-of-293 for 2,350 yards and 26 touchdowns. His efficiency rating of 155.36 ranks second in the BIG EAST and ninth nationally. He led the BIG EAST in total offense, averaging 263.1 yards per game.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Caleb Sturgis has connected on 19 of 23 field goal attempts from 40 yards and in. Sturgis has connected on his last three attempts, including successful tries from 48 and 32 yards against Alabama in the SEC Championship Game. Brandon James has 12 punt returns of 30 yards or more in his career, including four punt return touchdowns of 74-plus yards. Chas Henry, a 2009 finalist and 2008 semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award, has punted 33 times for a 43.4 average. Only three punts have been returned for positive yards (21 yards allowed), and 15 have been inside the 20.

Gilyard is the first player to win BIG EAST Special Teams Player of the Year honors in back-to-back seasons since Pittsburgh punter Andy Lee won in 2002 and 2003. Gilyard finished the regular season with 1,074 yards on 34 kickoff returns for an average of 31.6 yards per return that would stand as a BIG EAST single-season record. He tied the conference's single-season mark with two kickoff returns for touchdowns, including a 99-yard return against Pittsburgh to spark the Bearcats' comeback from a 21-point deficit in the title-clinching game.

THE COACHES

Steve Spurrier is in his fifth season at South Carolina with a record of 35-27 (.565) and in his 25th season overall with a record of 224-108-2 (.674). Spurrier serves as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Lorenzo Ward.

Randy Edsall is in his 11th season at UConn and overall with a record of 65-65 (.500). Joe Moorhead serves as the offensive coordinator for the Huskies and the defensive coordinator is Todd Orlando.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Alshon Jeffery leads the Gamecocks with 43 catches for 735 yards and six touchdowns, becoming South Carolina's go-to receiver midway through the season. Jeffery is sixth in the SEC averaging 61.2 receiving yards per game and is the only freshman in the league's top 10. T.J. Johnson was the only Gamecock offensive lineman to start all 12 games at the same position during the season. Stephen Garcia was 223 for 394 with 2733 yards and 17 touchdowns on the season.

Lawrence Wilson leads the Huskies in tackles with 130 stops, including ten for a loss, and started all 12 games for the Huskies at linebacker. He led the league in tackles at 11.23 per game and is fourth in the country in that category. Greg Lloyd was the second-leading tackler on the Husky team with 91 stops and three tackles for a loss. Zach Hurd started all 12 games for the Huskies at right guard and helped the team fashion a balanced attack in both the rushing and passing games. Lindsey Witten started all 12 games at the defensive end spot and made 41 tackles on the season with 11.5 sacks for a loss of 75 yards. He led the BIG EAST Conference in sacks and is seventh in the nation entering bowl season. Robert McClain was tied for second in the BIG EAST in interceptions this year with four and also was third on the team with 60 tackles.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN CONNECTICUT HAS THE BALL

Eric Norwood is tied for third in the SEC with 7.0 sacks this season. He is tied for eighth in the league with 11.5 total tackles for loss. He also leads the team with two interceptions, has recovered a fumble, forced a fumble, leads the team with 11 quarterback hurries and has blocked three kicks. He is the school's all-time leader in career sacks (29.0) and tackles for loss (54.5). Chris Culliver ranks third on the team with 58 tackles including 38 solo stops. He logged 3.0 tackles for loss and two sacks and owns one fumble recovery. Stephon finished fifth on the team with 52 tackles on the season, including 5.0 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks. Devin Taylor finished the regular season with 26 tackles, including 5.5 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks.

Jordan Todman gained 1,152 yards of rushing during the regular season and was the third-leading rusher in the conference and is ranked 41st nationally. His 1,152 yards currently ranks sixth in school history. Andre Dixon, who also earned Second Team All-BIG EAST honors in 2007, gained 967 yards on the ground during the regular season and scored 13 touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Gilmore averaged 11.4 yards per punt return on 13 attempts. Culliver was the leading kickoff returners with 22.5 per return. Spencer Lanning, the team's leading scorer, was 17-20 on field goals, including 11 for 13 beyond 30 yards. Lanning serves as the punter as well, building a 41.8 yard average with nine punts over 50 yards and 15 downed inside the 20 yard line.

It was Dave Teggart that sealed the victory for the Huskies with a 42-yard field goal in blustery conditions on senior night to end the season versus South Florida. He is 12-21 on the season. Desi Cullen averages 43.1 yards per punt for UCONN. He also has 12 touchbacks on kickoffs. Four different players have returned a punt or a kickoff for a touchdown during the 2009 season for UC.

Mike Gundy is in his fifth season at OSU and overall with a record of 36-26 (.581). The Cowboys' offensive coordinators are Gunter Brewer and Joe Wickline and the defensive coordinator is Bill Young.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OLE MISS HAS THE BALL

Senior Dexter McCluster is bidding to become first player in SEC history with 1,000 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in same season. He needs 15 more rushing yards and 25 more receiving yards in the bowl game. McCluster is averaging 219.6 all-purpose yards and 164.2 rushing yards with eight TDs responsible for (four rushing, two receiving, one passing) over the last five SEC games. He has posted at least 145 all-purpose yards in each outing. With his 96 receiving yards at Mississippi State, Shay Hodge established the Ole Miss single-season record for receiving yards and became the first 1,000-yard receiver in school history with 1,023. Hodge is currently the SEC leader in receiving yards (85.2 ypg) and receptions (5.3 rpg).

One of 11 semifinalists for the Thorpe Award, Perrish Cox leads the nation with 1.73 passes defended per game. The Waco, Texas native routinely matched up against the top receiver from the opposing team as a senior in 2009, holding Biletnikoff Award finalist Jordan Shipley from Texas and first-team All-SEC honoree A.J. Green from Georgia well below their respective season averages. Donald Booker leads OSU with 86 tackles, including eight TFLs and five sacks. Patrick Levine adds 70 tackles, 6.5 TFLs, 2.5 sacks and five interceptions. Andre Sexton brings 62 tackles and four TFLs on D.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN OKLAHOMA STATE HAS THE BALL

Senior S Kendrick Lewis leads the team in tackles (80) and blocked kicks (2) and is third for the team lead in pass break-ups (9) and forced fumbles (2). Lewis has notched nine or more stops in three of the last four games, including his first two career double-digit tackle performances. He also notched a pair of field goal blocks in that span. Kentrell Lockett boasts a team-high 11 QB pressures and is second on the team in TFLs with 10.0 and sacks with 5.0. Lockett posted at least a half TFL in 10 of 12 games this year. In his first year as a starter, junior NT Jerrrell Powe is tied for team lead and 10th in the SEC in TFLs (11.0). With 5.0 TFLs in the last two games, senior LB Patrick Trahan is tied for team lead and 10th in the SEC in TFLs with 11.

OSU boasts the Big 12's top rushing attack at 191.75 ypg. Senior RB Keith Toston has totaled 1,177 yards and 11 TDs on the ground. Led by All-American LT Russell Okung, the State offensive line has surrendered just 10 sacks, which tops the conference and is sixth in the NCAA. Okung leads all Oklahoma State players with 46 consecutive starts entering the Cowboys' Cotton Bowl date with Ole Miss and through 12 games this season, he has 127 knockdown blocks and 58 domination blocks. Also earning Big 12 honors were first team fullback Bryant Ward and QB Zac Robinson, who received honorable mention.

SPECIAL TEAMS

It took freshman Jesse Grandy just a month to carve his name in the Ole Miss record book. In only his fourth game handling returns, Grandy notched his second kickoff return for a TD with an 82-yarder against Auburn. He is only the third Rebel to return two kickoffs for TDs in the same season and the first since John Avery in 1996. The other is Vernon Studdard in 1970. Grandy's current 25.7-yard average would be the second-highest ever by a Rebel with at least 20 returns. Grandy returned the opening kickoff of the UAB game 88 yards for a touchdown.

The Big 12 career leader in kick return yards, Cox owns the Oklahoma State career record for kickoff returns for touchdowns. Cox also gets over 10 yards per punt return, including a touchdown for 67 yards earlier this season. Punter Quinn Sharp averaged 44.4 yards per punt, including 20 kicks placed inside the 20 yard line and 11 fair catches. Sharp also has 34 touchbacks on kickoffs.

Bobby Petrino is in his second season at Arkansas with a record of 12-12 (.500) and seventh overall with a record of 56-31 (.644). The Razorbacks' offensive coordinator is Garrick McGee and the defensive coordinator is Willie Robinson.

Skip Holtz is in his fifth season at East Carolina with a record of 38-26 (.594) and in his 10th season overall with a record of 72-49 (.595). Todd Fitch and Steve Shankweiler serve as the offensive coordinators for the Pirates and the defensive coordinator is Greg Hudson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

Ryan Mallett is directing the unit and is doing more than averaging a record every time he sets foot on the field. In 12 games as a Razorback, Mallett has set or matched 16 different school records. He leads the SEC and ranks 15th nationally in total offense (282.2). He also leads the league and ranks eighth nationally in passing yards per game (285.2) and he is first in the SEC and sixth nationally in pass efficiency (157.8). D.J. Williams ranks tied for 23rd in the SEC in receptions per game (2.58) and 24th in receiving yards per game (33.25). He ranks third on the Arkansas roster in catches with 31 for 399 yards, a total that ranks fourth on the team. Mitch Petrus anchors the line, starting all 12 games at offensive guard for the Razorbacks.

Van Eskridge has intercepted 10 passes during the last two seasons, including a team-best six in 2009. He picked off two fourth-quarter Case Keenum throws in the C-USA Championship Game, one of which serving as the game-saver in the Pirate endzone with just 42 seconds remaining. C.J. Wilson, who has netted 27.0 sacks and 44.5 TFL during his career, also posted his fourth block when he knocked down USM's extra point in the fourth quarter. DT Linval Joseph has booked 15.0 TFLs in the last 14 games (28.5 career) in addition to scoring his first TD on the offensive side of the ball vs. Southern Miss.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN EAST CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

Malcolm Sheppard ranks tied for 94th in the nation in tackles for loss (.92) and is tied for 10th in the SEC in tackles for loss. Arkansas' leader in tackles for loss (11.0-39) and is tied for third in sacks (2.5-19), he had multi-tackle games in nine of 12 contests in 2009. Sheppard currently ranks tied for third on Arkansas' career tackles for loss list with 37.0 for 130 yards. Tenarius Wright finished the season with 32 total tackles (21 solo), seven tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks and three forced fumbles. His seven tackles for loss ranked fifth on the squad.

In the last seven contests, Patrick Pinkney has averaged 238.6 yards, posted a 62.6 completion percentage and tossed 10 TDs. He's also been interception-free in the past four contests. Darryl Freaney has broken out with 36 catches for 568 yards and three TDs in his last six outings, an average of 15.8 yards per grab. RB Dominique Lindsay established career bests in rushing attempts (31) and rushing yards (172) against Tulsa, which followed 144-yard and 139-yard outings against SMU and Memphis, respectively. He averaged 112.7 rushing yards per game in the last six C-USA tilts (676 yards).

SPECIAL TEAMS

Alex Tejada leads the team in scoring with 98 points. He is 14 of 19 on field goals in 2009, including 3-4 between 40 and 49 yards. His longest made attempt this season is 47 yards. Dennis Johnson is a constant danger returning kicks, averaging 26 yards per return, including a 91 yard touchdown. Dylan Breeding gets 39 yards per punt, including five over 50 yards. He had put 11 inside the 20 yard line this season.

Senior Matt Dodge is enjoying the best year of his career, currently ranking second nationally in punting with 45.8 yards per boot. Dodge has boomed 21 punts of over 50 yards this season, including a long of 73 yards at Memphis Oct. 27, after having 13 "lengthy" kicks in 2008. He has also placed 22 punts inside the 20-yard line after having 19 a year ago. Dwayne Harris' 99-yard KOR for a TD vs. UAB was his third of the season (SMU, Rice), good enough for an ECU single-season and career record.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: First Meeting

Arkansas will be making its 37th bowl appearance and first under head coach Bobby Petrino... The Razorbacks will be making their fourth appearance in the Liberty Bowl (1971, 1984 and 1987)... The bowl appearance will be the ninth in the last 12 years for the Razorbacks and it will also be the 24th January bowl appearance in school history... For the fourth time in school history, and the first time since 1987, Arkansas will conclude its season at the Liberty Bowl... UA faced Tennessee in the 1971 Liberty Bowl followed by Auburn in 1984 and Georgia in 1987.

THE COACHES

Nick Saban is in his second season at Alabama with a record of 32-8 (.800) and 16th overall with a record of 138-67-1 (.672). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

Mack Brown is in his 12 season at Texas with a record of 128-26 (.831) and 25th overall with a record of 213-100-1 (.680). The Longhorns' offensive coordinator is Greg Davis and the defensive coordinator is Will Muschamp.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

Mark Ingram is the first Alabama player in history to win the Heisman Trophy. He shattered the Alabama single-season rushing record with 1,542 yards this season and 15 rushing touchdowns. He averaged 118.6 yards rushing per game and 6.2 yards per carry while touching 30 passes out of the backfield for 322 yards and three touchdowns. Mike Johnson led a rebuilt offensive line that helped clear a path for 215.9 rushing yards per game and 413.77 yards of total offense while surrendering just 1.15 sacks per game to rank 19th nationally. Julio Jones was the Tide's leading receiver with 42 catches for 573 yards and four touchdowns this season.

Earl Thomas has posted 71 tackles (45 solo), five TFL, eight INTs, 16 PBU and a forced fumble in 2009. His 24 passes defended rank first nationally and his eight INTs are tied for second. The eight INTs set a UT single-season record, breaking the oldest standing Longhorn record after the mark of seven was set in 1940.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TEXAS HAS THE BALL

Rolando McClain led the defensive unit with 101 tackles, including 12.5 tackles for loss (-58 yards) and four sacks (-36 yards). He also added 14 quarterback pressures, three pass breakups, two interceptions (21 return yards) and forced one fumble. Mark Barron was the Tide's second-leading tackler this season with 70 total stops. He led the SEC with 17 passes defended and seven interceptions. Javier Arenas, who was a first-team All-SEC pick at two positions, was third on the UA team with 66 tackles this season. He was also second on the team with five sacks and 12 tackles for loss. Terrence Cody anchored an Alabama defensive front that held opponents to 77.9 rushing yards per game, a figure that ranks second nationally.

In 13 games this year, Colt McCoy has gone 330-of-468 (70.5%) for 3,512 yards and 27 TDs for a 147.5 passer rating, while rushing for another 348 yards and three TDs. His 70.5 completion percentage ranks third nationally. McCoy became the all-time winningest quarterback in NCAA history when he won his 43rd game as a starter against Kansas. Jordan Shipley is the leading target with 1,363 yards and 11 touchdowns on the season. He has a long of 88 yards. Cody Johnson has 12 rushings TDs. Tre' Newton is the leading rusher with 513, adding six touchdowns as well.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Leigh Tiffin, a Lou Groza finalist, is Alabama's all-time leader with 378 points and 82 field goals during his 45-game career with the Tide. He has also converted 132 career extra points. During the 2009 season, Tiffin has converted 29 of 33 field goal attempts and 38 of 41 extra points. The 29 field goals established the single-season school record. Arenas is the SEC's all-time leader with 1,733 career punt return yards and seven touchdowns.

Shipley powers the return game, led by his 13 yard average per punt return and two touchdowns this season in that category. D.J. Monroe gets over 35 yards per kickoff return, returning two for scores in 2009. Lawrence Hunter is 22-25 on field goals this season, including 17-18 between 30 and 49 yards. Justin Tucker averages 40.6 yards per punt, with a long of 60 yards and 15 placed inside the 20 yard line. He's had six punts over 50 yards and has not had a punt blocked this season.
