2003-04 RECAP



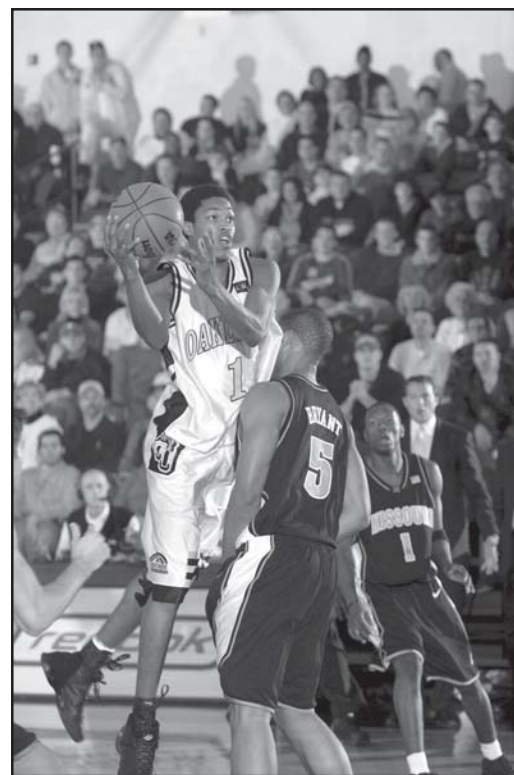
Going into the 2003-04 season all of the indicators seemed to point in the direction of success for Oakland's men's basketball team. The squad was returning all of its starters from a 17-win team the year before, three all-Mid-Continent Conference players and was the overwhelming choice to win the conference title and make its first trip to the NCAA Tournament. But somewhere along the way the Golden Grizzly express was derailed.

Things started on a positive note for Oakland as it started the season at the prestigious Dell BCA Classic tournament hosted by Xavier University. In a field of eight strong mid-major programs that had produced five post season teams the previous season, Oakland kicked off its year with an impressive second place finish.

Helms got things started by picking up where he left off from his junior season as he scored 31 points in the Golden Grizzlies' opening 93-68 win over San Diego. In a meeting of the two preseason picks in the Mid-Con and Horizon leagues, OU came out on top as Helms led the way again with 27 points in a 79-66 win over Illinois-Chicago that put the Golden Grizzlies in the championship game. Playing against host Xavier on the Musketeer's home court, Oakland had the game tied at the half before falling 76-66. Helms, who averaged over 24 points during the three games was named to the all-tournament team.

A highlight going into the season was the schedule, which featured five opponents in the non-conference portion that were from major conferences, including a home contest with Missouri. The first of those games was a contest at Michigan, and with the Wolverines playing their first game and OU having three under its belt, hopes were high that the Golden Grizzlies could pull off their second upset against the team from Ann Arbor. Instead signs of the team's shooting woes cropped up as Oakland shot only 34 percent and



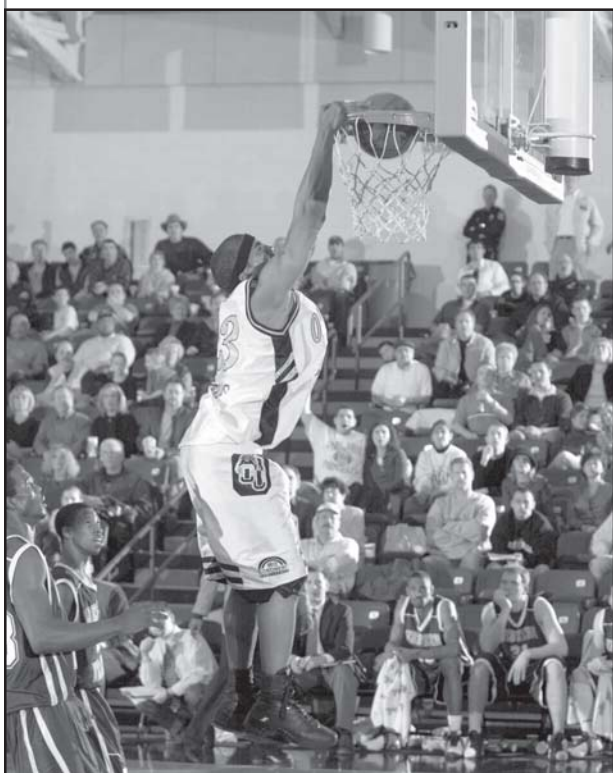
Rawle Marshall earned All-Mid-Con honors for a second straight season, placing among the league leaders in scoring, three-point shooting, blocked shots and steals.

fell to Michigan 84-58.

With the offense suddenly struggling, Oakland wound up dropping five straight, including back-to-back games against nationally ranked Cincinnati and Missouri. The game against the Tigers was the home opener for OU. In front of a sold-out, record crowd, the Golden Grizzlies gave then fifth ranked Mizzou all it could handle before falling 90-85. Rawle Marshall led Oakland with 27 points and the Golden Grizzlies were within a point in the final minutes, but the Tigers sank five of six free throws in the final minute to escape with the win.

Facing another Big XII team, Texas A&M, in its next home game, Oakland snapped out of its funk for a resounding 90-58 win over the Aggies behind Marshall's 21 points. It was the largest margin of victory ever for Oakland against a Division I team and its first win against a Big XII team.

That win propelled Oakland on a four-game win streak that pushed it

Senior Mike Helms returned for his final season as Oakland's first Division I men's basketball All-American and the nation's leading returning scorer, but it was offense that proved to be one of the team's troubles as Oakland struggled with its shooting percentages all season long. The result was a disappointing 13-17 record and a 6-10 mark in the Mid-Con, good for a tie for seventh place in the final conference

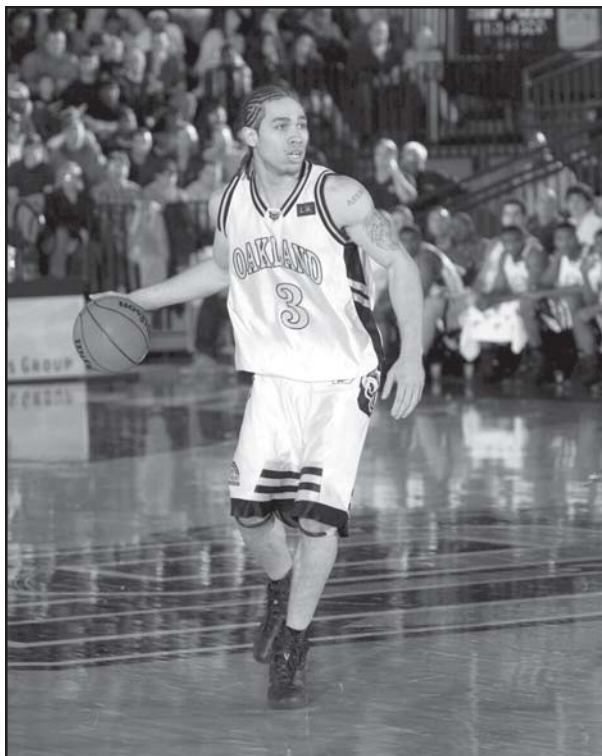
back over the .500 mark and included the first road win of the season. The Golden Grizzlies got wins over former GLIAC foes Northern Michigan and Saginaw Valley State in its next two outings, with Helms netting 32 against the Wildcats and Cortney Scott coming up with a career performance of 36 points and 21 rebounds in the win over the Cardinals.

After picking up its first road win at Youngstown State, Oakland traveled to Memphis for its final tune-up before the start of Mid-Con play. Once again it was close but no cigar against a team from a major conference. Much like the Missouri game, Oakland found itself in a two-point game in the final minute only to see the Tigers hit free throws down the stretch to seal the win.

With the pre-conference portion of the schedule behind them, Oakland began its quest to take home a Mid-Con title with a home game against one of its top rivals, Valparaiso. Unfortunately for the Golden Grizzlies, problems at the free throw line cropped up against the Crusaders. Leading most of the game, Oakland missed 11 freebies in the second half, allowing Valpo to get back in the game. With the game tied in the final minute Valpo escaped with a 79-76 win by hitting four free throws and watching as Helms' three-point shot at the buzzer fell short.

The close loss to Valpo started a streak of five straight games that all came down to the final minute. In the next outing Marshall hit a trey at the buzzer at Western Illinois to lift Oakland to the win, 74-73, but in the next five games, two of which were overtime affairs, it was the Golden Grizzlies who came up short, losing the four of the games by a combined eight points.

A highlight during this stretch of the season was Helms' game at Centenary. Despite OU losing the contest, Helms had one of his best nights of the season on the Gents home court,

pouring in 39 points and setting a school and Gold Dome record by hitting 20 of 21 attempts from the free throw line.

Oakland broke the streak of losses and close games with an 82-67 win over UMKC, but then saw a come from behind attempt at Valpo fall just short despite 29 points from Helms as OU started the second swing through the conference schedule with a 77-72 loss.

Oakland avenged its earlier loss to Chicago State in front of a regional TV audience in the O'Rena, getting 23 points from Marshall and 21 from Helms to down the Cougars 77-60.

Playing away from home still proved to be troublesome for the Golden Grizzlies, as the team dropped both ends of a road trip to Southern Utah and UMKC. Coming home to face Centenary, Oakland turned up the defensive heat against the Gents, coming up with 17 steals in a 76-64 win.

Finally it was Oakland's turn to get one of the close ones, as the Golden Grizzlies scored a 76-73 upset win at IUPUI in their next outing. Helms had 23 points and OU held the Jaguars to

just 38 percent shooting to walk away with its second conference road win of the season.

In their second Mid-Con TV game of the season, OU held a 10-point lead late in the second half at Oral Roberts only to see the Golden Eagles get hot in the final minutes to pull out an 84-75 win.

Oakland moved out of conference in its next game, getting an 88-77 win over IPFW that saw Marshall become the 22nd OU player to reach the 1,000-point plateau. The Golden Grizzlies finished off the season with an 88-59 win over Western Illinois, giving OU four wins in its final five games, but with the Southern Utah taking both games from OU during the regular season, Oakland went into the Mid-Con Tournament as the No. 8 seed with a date against top seeded Valparaiso.

Coming into the tournament on a bit of a roll, Oakland had primed itself to gain its first win at the Mid-Con tourney, but poor shooting came back to haunt the Golden Grizzlies one last time as the Crusaders broke open a close game in the second half to take a 73-64 win and end the OU season.

Helms finished the season with a 23.2 scoring average, again landing him in the top-10 of the nation and earning him first team All-Mid-Con honors for a third straight season. He wound up his career with 2,314 points, second in both the Oakland and Mid-Con record books. He also finished as OU's all-time leader in free throws and free throw attempts as well as finishing among the school's leaders in three-point shooting and steals.

Marshall, who scored his 1,000th point during the season, again finished among the league leaders in scoring, steals and blocked shots and earned second team all-conference accolades.

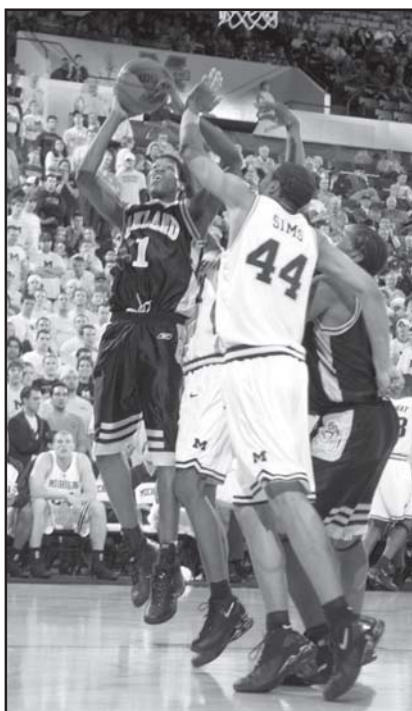

2004-05 OUTLOOK



There is both good news and bad news for the Oakland men's basketball team as it prepares for the 2004-05 season; it's seventh as a Division I program. The good news is that the Golden Grizzlies have turned their program into one of the most respected in the Mid-Continent Conference in their short time at the Division I level. In four seasons of eligibility for conference competition Oakland has already won one regular season title and has won more Mid-Con games than any other school in the conference during that time except for Valparaiso. The bad news is that going into this season Oakland has just four returning letterwinners back from last year's squad to work with.

In other words, youth will be the hallmark of the Oakland basketball team

in 2004-05. With only four returning players with experience, head coach **Greg Kampe** and his staff will have their work cut out for them as they will be forced to rely heavily on a cast of new faces to play some important roles on this season's squad. Looking at the roster Oakland has

three seniors, but no juniors; the rest of the team will be made up of sophomores and freshman, only one of which has seen action prior to this season.

Not all is bleak for the Golden Grizzlies, however, as they try and rebound from a disappointing 2003-04 campaign. The three seniors that do return are all starters and are arguably among the best players at their positions in the conference. Starting his 21st season at Oakland, Kampe's extensive experience will also be a plus for OU. At the start of the 2002-03 season Oakland found itself in much the same position it does this season, with just one starter and a team full of inexperienced players, but Kampe turned that team into a 17-game winner, matching OU's mark for the most wins as a DI program.

Probably the most obvious loss to the team for the 2004-05 season will be that for the first time in four years there will be no Mike Helms in the lineup for the Golden Grizzlies. His 2,000+ points will be missed, but Oakland does have options to fill his scoring void.

Tops on that options list is senior **Rawle Marshall**, a two-time All-Mid-Con performer. One of the top all-around players in the Mid-Con, he is already a 1,000-point scorer for OU in just two seasons of play and averaged over 17 points a game last season, second on the team and among the top-10 in the conference. The 6-7 swing player is equally skilled on both ends of the court and finished among the team leaders in every category that is tracked. Offensively he has the ability to slice to the basket for easy scores or he can take the long-range jump shot for a trey. His shooting numbers improved greatly from his sophomore to his junior seasons and another improvement this year could have him as much of a scoring threat as Helms was and place him among the contenders for Mid-Con Player of the Year.

On the defensive end of the court there are not many better than Marshall in the conference. The league's defensive player of the year as a sophomore, Marshall is already among OU's all-time leaders in both blocks and steals and holds the single-season records in both of those categories. He regularly draws the top defensive assignment for Oakland and his ability to cause turnovers on the defensive end of the floor should lead to fast break opportunities for the Golden Grizzlies offense.

Joining Marshall for his final season

and providing the Golden Grizzlies with a potent 1-2 punch is **Cortney Scott**, also a potential All-Mid-Con player. He has proven himself as one of the top post players in the conference over the past

two seasons, earning All-Mid-Con honors once and leading Oakland and finishing among the league rebounding leaders in each of those seasons. Already agile for a player of his size, Scott has shed some weight in the off season and should be even quicker this time around.

With his soft touch around the basket (career .543 shooter), Scott will provide Oakland some inside scoring punch. His 36-point, 21-rebound game last season against Saginaw Valley State showed what kind of numbers he is capable of putting up, and for Oakland to be successful this season more double-double efforts from his post position will be needed. His ability to find the open man from his post position is also an asset for the Golden Grizzlies; he has been among the team leaders in assists in each of his two seasons, averaging 2.5 a game for his career.

A troublesome position in the past for



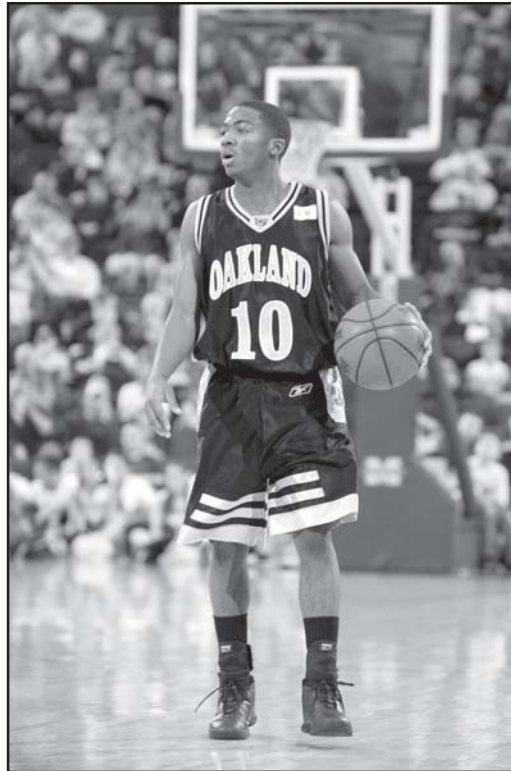
2004-05 OUTLOOK

Oakland has been at point guard. **DeMarcus Ishmeal** was brought in last season from Mott Community College, where he helped that team to a national junior college title, to fill the void. Finally taking over as a starter in the final half of the season, he showed that he is capable of handling the job, taking some of the pressure of handling the ball off of Marshall. Despite starting only half the season, Ishmeal still led the team with 83 assists. The majority of those, 53, came in 15 Mid-Con games, an average of over 3.5 a game and among the league leaders. With only 40 turnovers, his assist/turnover ratio was an impressive 2.08, third best in the Mid-Con.

A player who could prove to be a key component to the lineup, especially early in the season, is **Pierre Dukes**. With two years of experience under his belt, his knowledge of the OU system will be a valuable asset as the young team matures. He can play at either guard position and has the ability to bury the three-point shot. He has 18 career starts and has the ability to come up with a big scoring game, as evidenced by his 17-point outing at Western Illinois last season.

Entering the season as Oakland's top candidate at center is sophomore **Dave Ritzema**. At 6-10 he is the tallest player on the Golden Grizzly roster and could see his playing time increase this season with continued improvement in his play. After redshirting his first season at OU, Ritzema provided some solid minutes off the bench last season. With an accurate jump hook shot, he shot over 53 percent last season, he could provide OU with another scoring option around the basket. He also showed last season that he could become a capable rebounder, pulling down a total of 17 boards in the two regular season games against Valpo while scoring six points in each of those contests.

A group of five first-year players and one redshirt freshman will round out the remainder of the team. **Kris Krzyminski** joins Oakland from the junior college ranks, coming to the Golden Grizzlies from Mott Community College where he was a teammate of Ishmeal's for a season. An outside shooting expert, he will be expected to step in and contribute from the start with his long-range shooting ability. He will have three years of eligibility

with Oakland after averaging over 15 points and three assists a game in his one season at Mott where he was an all-region player.

Oakland had a solid recruiting class, getting a couple of standout players from Michigan and another from Indiana. Leading the group is **Patrick McCloskey** from Marshall, Michigan. A first team all-state player from the Class B ranks in Michigan, McCloskey is a 6-7, 230-lb. power forward with ball handling skills that should see a lot of playing time. A 1,000-point scorer at Marshall, he averaged over 20 points a game in his final two seasons for one of the top Class B teams in the state. He is also a solid rebounder, averaging over 10 a game as a junior and senior, plus he possesses solid ball handling skills for a big man.

Brandon Cassise and David Carson are OU's other two recruited freshmen. Cassise, who is a local player from Walled Lake, Michigan, was regarded as one of southeastern Michigan's premier marksmen from long-range during his senior season at Orchard Lake St. Mary's where he averaged over 17 points a game.

Twice last season he hit for over 30 in a game and he will provide another long-range scoring option for OU. **David Carson**, from Merrillville, Indiana, was an all-area player at Andean High School, averaging over 20 points and 10 rebounds a game. At 6-7 and 225 pounds he will give the Golden Grizzlies some much needed depth in the post.

After sitting out last season as a freshman, **Derrick Coleman** spent that time honing his game and should be ready to show what he can do at the Division I level. A tall, athletic player, he will add his name to the mix at a wing position.

With a lot being expected of the new faces on this season's roster, the newcomers will not have much of a chance to do much learning on the job, as the schedule that faces Oakland in 2004-05 is one of the toughest they have faced as a Division I program. The schedule could be called "Big", as in Big 10 and Big XII, as the Golden Grizzlies will play a total of five games against teams from those two conferences. Last season Oakland had one of the top non-conference schedules in the nation and this season will be no different, with the likes of Xavier, Illinois, Michigan State,

Missouri, Texas A&M and Kansas State on the schedule. In addition to the Big 10 and Big XII, the schedule also includes games against teams from Conference USA, the Atlantic 10 and the MAC before the Golden Grizzlies tackle the always challenging Mid-Con schedule. A highlight of the home non-conference schedule will be an early meeting with Marquette, the first appearance by a Conference USA team at the 'O'Rena.

There are many questions that will need to be answered early for Oakland in 2004-05. The Golden Grizzlies' three returning starters are among the best in the Mid-Continent Conference, and their leadership will be invaluable to the team in the tough early season schedule. If Kampe can find the right mix and chemistry on the squad and the new faces are able to withstand that tough schedule and find ways to contribute, the Golden Grizzlies could surprise a few people in 2004-05 and compete for a top spot in the Mid-Con race.

21ST SEASON

Entering his 21st year at the helm of the Oakland University men's basketball program, there is not much that Greg Kampe has not achieved with the Golden Grizzly program. At the beginning of his career he molded Oakland into one of the top teams in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletics Conference before successfully guiding the program in its transition from Division II to Division I play. After just five years in Division I, Kampe has already guided Oakland to within a game of the .500 mark, been named the national Coach of the Year and won a regular season Mid-Continent title. Entering the 2004-05 season, only seven other Division I coaches have been with their school longer than Kampe.

Overall Kampe has guided Oakland through 20 successful seasons, compiling an overall record of 336-236, a record that places him among the winningest active Division I coaches. Only twice in his career has his team finished its conference season with a sub-.500 record, with his squads finishing .500 or better in

conference play in a string of 15 straight conference seasons.

Following the 1999-00 season, Kampe was recognized for his accomplishments when he was named the NCAA Division I National Coach of the Year by *College Hoops Insider* magazine. This honor came after Oakland, in its first year eligible, won the Mid-Continent Conference regular season title after recording a 11-5 mark against Mid-Con opponents. In the last two seasons Oakland has won a school Division I record 17 games and in four seasons of Mid-Con play Oakland has won more conference games (39) than all but one school.

Kampe spent his first 14 seasons as the coach of a highly successful Division II program and the 1998-99 season marked year two of OU's transition from Division II to Division I status. The 1999-2000 season was the first for OU as a full-fledged NCAA Division I institution. The 2001-02 season was another milestone for Golden Grizzly basketball, with OU becoming eligible for the Mid-Con Tournament and the league's automatic NCAA Tournament berth.

In his first 14 years Kampe brought his OU teams to the top, winning two GLIAC titles in the final years in the conference and in 1997 OU went on to make its longest run in the NCAA Postseason. In 1997 the Golden Grizzlies were eliminated from the NCAA Tournament by eventual national runner up Northern Kentucky in the Sweet 16.

"I am extremely proud of the success of our program, both on and off the court," Kampe said. "Winning our second straight championship was just another piece of the puzzle. We have had great success both on the floor



and in the classroom and that's not just rhetoric because the numbers prove it."

Oakland posted its second straight 17-win season in 2002-03, claiming wins over every Mid-Con school by Valparaiso and finishing tied for second in the conference standings. Despite a first-round loss to Southern Utah at the Mid-Con Tournament, Oakland swept the Mid-Con awards at the end of the season, with Mike Helms being named the Player of the Year and Rawle Marshall the Newcomer of the Year.

The 2001-02 season proved to be valuable for the Grizzlies as the team edged it's way one step closer to making it into the NCAA Tournament. Big wins included victories over Detroit, Western Michigan, and Western Illinois, which helped the Grizzlies finish tied for second in the Mid-Con. However, the Grizzlies fell short of their goal to win the MCC with a loss in the quarterfinals against IUPUI, to whom the Grizzlies had beaten twice during regular season play.

The 13-17 record in 1999-2000 was highlighted by the 60-41 victory over Big Ten opponent Northwestern. Eleven of the other 12 victories came at the hands of Mid-Con opponents.

The 1998-99 season was the final for Oakland as a transitional Division I school and the Golden Grizzlies finished at 12-15 overall. The 12 victories were against a schedule that was tabbed during the year as the toughest in the nation by Jeff Sagarin of the Sagarin Ratings (*USA Today*). The first win of the season was at Illinois State (72-71) and has been said to be the biggest win in the history of Oakland basketball. Although Oakland wasn't eligible for the Mid-Continent Conference race, the Golden Grizzlies competed in a full Mid-Con schedule and finished 8-8 overall. The 8-8

record would have been good for fifth place.

The 1997-98 season marked the first of the two-year transition for Oakland from NCAA Division II to Division I athletics. In 1997-98 OU finished 15-12 overall as a Division II independent school. Kampe claimed his 250th career victory against Spring Arbor on January 31, 1998 as OU defeated SAC 95-72.

In 1996-97, the Golden Grizzlies set the school record with 24 wins, surpassing the previous record of 21 victories held by the 1995-96 and 1993-94 squads. Kampe's .774 winning percentage in 1996-97 is the highest in Oakland history. OU also made its fourth straight NCAA Division II Tournament appearance in 1997.

In 1994-95 Oakland made its second straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament in another record-breaking season. OU posted another 20 victories and its highest national ranking ever, that of seventh. The 1993-94 campaign saw Oakland earn a first-ever berth in the NCAA Division II Basketball Tournament, and post a school-record 21 wins, one of 28 different school records tied or broken by the team. Under Kampe the Golden Grizzlies enjoyed 12 straight winning seasons from 1986-1998 after only posting one winning campaign in the previous 12 years. Six of those winning seasons ended with at least 20 wins. Oakland finished in the top four in the GLIAC and had a non-losing league record in each of the final 11 years, something no other league school had done. OU's GLIAC record prior to Kampe's arrival was 37-92.

OU's success under Kampe is not just limited to the hardwood. The OU program has been outstanding in the classroom, something the coach takes great pride in. The Golden Grizzlies had a player on the Academic All-GLIAC team every year of Kampe's tenure, including a league record six players in 1995-96 and five players in 1994-95 and 1993-94. In 1989-90 guard Brian Gregory, now the head coach at Dayton, earned an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship and third-team GTE CoSIDA Academic All-America honors. Gregory is one of four Golden Grizzlies to be honored nationally for his academic and athletic prowess.

"We have a quality program that turns out talented student-athletes," Kampe said. "We try to do things the right way with good people who receive a good education and then go out into the world and have success after basketball. That's what our mission is."

Kampe came to OU from a program that has a long history of combining athletic and academic excellence. The Golden Grizzly coach spent six years as an assistant coach at the University of Toledo before coming to OU. During Kampe's six years at Toledo, the Rockets captured three Mid-American Conference (MAC) basketball championships and compiled a 117-57

overall record. The school earned two NCAA tournament bids and one to the NIT. Academically, 91 percent of Toledo's basketball players earned bachelor's degrees during Kampe's tenure, with 33 percent of those continuing to earn graduate degrees.

Kampe is a 1978 graduate of Bowling Green State University with a bachelor's degree in business and journalism. He started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Toledo before accepting the full-time assistant coach's position in 1979. He earned a Master of Arts degree in physical education while at Toledo.

Kampe personally combined excellence as an athlete and in the classroom in college. He is the only athlete in MAC history to earn first team all-Academic honors in both football and basketball. He earned dean's list honors with a 3.40 grade point average at BGSU, and received the President's Award as an outstanding senior student.

His late father, Kurt, was a guard on the University of Michigan's 1947 Rose Bowl and national championship football team, which went 10-0. Brother Kurt Kampe III, was a two-year letterwinner for the Wolverines in 1974 and 1975 as a defensive back.
